#### >Final Check: The One-Room Schoolhouse

Here is a final opportunity for you to strengthen your knowledge of the ten words. First read the following selection carefully. For many years, the one-room rural schoolhouse was part of the American scene. This tiny (1)\_\_\_\_\_\_ did have only one room, where all the pupils, ranging in age from five or six to their teens, sat together with one teacher—a(n) (2)\_\_\_\_\_ young man or woman newly graduated from a "normal school" (a teacher-training institute) but trying to seem as serious and dignified as possible.
