

Select members of the ACCHS Math Club recently competed at two statewide math competitions. On October 30, the larger team traveled to Emporia State University and competed against over forty other high schools from across the state in multiple events including Team Algebra, Individual Algebra, Team Geometry, Individual Geometry, and Math Scramble. All members competed well. Juniors Kyle Kimmi and Jeremy Lutz both placed in the top 50% in their events, Individual Geometry and Individual Algebra, respectively. Senior Andrew Miller also finished in the top 50% and Senior Morgan Martin placed third in Individual Algebra. The Algebra Team consisted of Seniors Bridgett Kelly, Tannah Ernzen, and Katie Barnes who finished in the top 50% for Division II (1A, 2A, and 3A schools). Seniors Connor Hulett, Presley Rodecap, and Christian Cooper made up the Math Scramble team and placed fourth in Division II. On November 5, a smaller team of ten calculus students participated in the Washburn Math Day. All members completed individual tests and the top three scores from each school were compiled to determine team scores. Top scorers were Presley Rodecap, Andrew Miller, and Katie Barnes. The team placed second with a score of 44 points in the 3A-2A-1A Division beating Northwest High School with a tiebreaker.



Electrical Presentations

The 5th and 6th grade classes attended an electrical presentation on November 11th. The presentation was given by Mr. Pitts and Jimmy Davis of Westar Energy discussing the six types of simple machines/mechanics, simple circuits, short circuits, and the ground by the electricity escaping its "safe" path. The discussion led into electrical circuits, the testing of various items for electrical conductivity, and which items are the best conductors and insulators. Along with describing/demonstrating the flow of electricity in simple circuits, distinguished between safe and unsafe pathways of electricity, and recognizing potentially dangerous situations involving electricity. Following up with safety procedures when being involved or not involved with dangerous situations in different surroundings.



The presenters displayed various materials and demonstrated the construction of simple electrical circuits, the testing of various items for electrical conductivity, and which items are the best conductors and insulators. The classes discussed and described the flow of electricity in simple circuits, distinguished between safe and unsafe pathways of electricity, and recognized potentially dangerous situations involving electricity. The students organized notes of their observations to write a final summary of what they already knew and what they learned from the presentations. Also, the students reacted appropriately when confronted with electrical hazards and comprehended the ubiquitous role of electricity in their everyday lives.
