The Winds of Change are blowing across Kansas - Redefining Student Success, the Kansans Can Initiative.

What you need to know about Kansans Can and how it will affect USD 377

A year ago, the Kansas State Board of Education adopted a new vision for education in Kansas - Kansas leads the world in the success of each student. A vision crafted after spending a year of canvassing parents, community members, educators, and business leaders across the state. Leading the charge for change is our new Commissioner of Education, Randy Watson - "We are excited about this endeavor, and we want you, your staff members, your students and your parents to be excited, too."

During the statewide visits, Kansans were asked to share their thoughts on education; particularly what they believe defines a successful 24-year old, and what are the essential characteristics and skills for an employee, and more. From these discussions, five outcomes were identified to help measure the progress toward achieving the new vision: 1) Kindergarten Readiness, 2) Individual Plans of Study focused on career interests, 3) high school graduation rates, 4) student social/emotional growth and 5) postsecondary attainment. What does this mean for Kansas schools? Let me offer the following example as a point of context for where we are heading.

Over the weekend, while eating out with my wife in Atchison, we ran into Tobin Warriner, an ACCHS graduate. I asked Tobin how he was doing and his response was priceless. When he spoke, there was a sense of pride and passion in his voice. To paraphrase, Tobin said he was doing great and that he is working as a carpenter down in KC. He then made a point to impress upon us, in a very passionate and inspirational way, how much better life is when your job is something that you love doing. It was a simple, yet very powerful message. Talk about a Tiger Pride moment.

So what does this brief interaction between a superintendent and former student have to do with educational reform in Kansas? It's all about how we define success. Tobin is an example of what success can look like. It is something we want for all of our children - to be happy, productive, and living life to its fullest. I think that too often education tends to focus on the wrong things or tries to guide or steer students down a particular path when we should concentrate on providing them with the tools needed to be successful in whatever endeavor they choose.

In this new era of Kansans Can, I am hopeful we can continue to focus on providing a rigorous academic program, while at the same time help our students develop personal characteristics they will need to succeed in life with less focus on high stakes testing. Personal characteristics such as valuing of hard work, perseverance, being responsible and accountable, showing up on time, and overcoming adversity and hard times. Most of all, we need to help our students discover not only what they are good at, but what they are passionate about, as well.

I recently had the opportunity to travel to Washington, DC, to attend a National Conference on Character Education. The conference itself highlighted exemplary practices in schools throughout the nation who have created a culture that emphasizes good choices, social justice, and educational equity. Atchison County Community schools emphasizes the importance of a rural community in their

creed and this conference gave me the chance to reflect on who our families are, what we hope for in our students, and what plans we have to get them where they want to go.

One can learn many things while in Washington DC that have to do with hopes, dreams, and reality. I share with you the top five things I took away from the conference and the trip that affect what I do as an administrator in our school district.

- (1) The United States continues to be a melting pot of people, maybe more of a salad bowl, as we mix nationality, color, culture, and heritage. We can live and work together, and we emphasize this sense of community in our schools.
- (2) Patriotism Prevails while in DC. Seeing all of the federal buildings, walking in the footsteps of those influential leaders who have gone before us, visiting the stunning memorials (Korean War, Vietnam War, World War II, Lincoln

Memorial, Washington monument, and the list goes on), and seeing how the dignity of Arlington National Cemetery is maintained moved me to tears many times over and renewed my sense of patriotism. As we prepare for our Veteran's Day ceremony in our building, I am reminded how important this day of remembrance should be.

- (3) Diversity is Bountiful. The Character Conference had many sessions providing guidance and understanding for teachers in working with diverse students. #### First Grade News!

Wow, first quarter has flown by! First grade is ready to take on the challenge of the 2<sup>nd</sup> nine weeks! This year we've implemented a Guided Reading Program, which provides our students with balanced reading opportunities appropriate to their reading levels. Guided reading functions as differentiated small-group instruction, assessment, and independent practice.

At the beginning of the school year, each classroom took a couple weeks to establish routines and procedures as well as what is to be expected of the student during independent and smallgroup instruction. After Labor Day, we dove full force in to our Guided Reading Program. The students have a specific teacher for their reading level and rotate between four groups during Guided Reading, which takes place from 8:05am to 9:20am. During small-group instruction, students are teacher lead using decodable books build fluency, work on comprehension and phonics. The students have been and will continue to bring home books we read during small-group instruction in their Kiwi Bags. Please continue to read these books with your child.

While a group of students are working during small-group instruction, students may be working independently or with their peers. During this time they work on writing, word work, and silent reading or listening to books on audio. Writing during guided reading rotations consists of student free choice or topics chosen by the teacher. Word work consists of spelling word practice, phonics and phonemic awareness skills, and sight words.

Please continue to assist your child with their reading in the evenings! It's a great time for you to work together with your child to see how they're progressing. Happy Fall!
