From the Superintendent.....

The Foundation is Key

A recent *60 Minutes* segment titled "The Leaning Tower of San Francisco" discussed how one of the most impressive and popular residential buildings ever built in San Francisco has begun to sink into the earth it was built upon. The building is filled with multi-million dollar condos that are losing their value drastically because the building is slowly falling over. Why is this? How does a building that was so expensive fall so suddenly?

As you watch the segment you learn that in order to cut costs the engineers and builders made some crucial decisions that are causing the building's demise. They used concrete instead of steel to build the massive building because it was cheaper but weighs a lot more. Another crucial error is that they did not focus on the foundation to ensure it would support the weight of the giant concrete structure.

While watching this scene unfold, I couldn't help but think to myself, "How could they make such a huge mistake?" I came to the conclusion it happens much more often than you really think. How often do we get focused on what is above ground and forget to ensure that what is below ground is sufficient? This is the premise of numerous self-help books that promise to solve all your problems, and there is so much truth to it. If we take time to make sure that our foundation is solid, then we can build to the sky.

Prior to this year, the district completed a needs assessment to determine the direction that we should take for our accreditation. During this needs assessment, the district felt that the time had not been taken to ensure that our foundation is solid. I am not saying that the district is crumbling or even insufficient but that time must be dedicated and a process developed to ensure that our foundation is solid. In education, our foundation is our curriculum or the "what, how and when" students learn. IT IS EDUCATION.

In order to ensure that our foundation is solid, the district will dedicate time for teachers to evaluate, reflect and collaborate on the curriculum so that it can be modified to best meet the needs of our students. The district will also dedicate time for teachers to reflect and collaborate on student data. This time will allow teachers to collaboratively design and implement interventions to allow each child the opportunity to meet the criteria of the existing curriculum, our foundation.

It is important that we learn from the mistakes of others. As our budget and staffing have decreased, we cannot take our eyes off of our foundation. We must ensure that our students continue to receive the best education possible.

Immunization Requirements for the 2018 - 2019 School Year

Hepatitis B

K.A.R. 28-1-20 defines immunizations required for any individual who attends school or a childcare program operated by a school. Below are the requirements for the indicated school year. Please carefully review the requirements. The usual number of doses required are listed; however there are exceptional circumstances that could alter the number of doses a child needs. If you have questions about your child's immunization status, contact your child's primary care provider or local health department.



3 doses

Proof of receiving the required immunizations must be provided to the school prior to the student attending the first day of school.

Additional ACIP Recommended Vaccines Not Required for School Entry

- HPV (Human Papillomavirus) Vaccine: Two doses are recommended at age 11 years.
 HPV is a cancer prevention vaccine!
- Meningococcal MCV4 (Meningitis) vaccine:
 One dose is recommended at 11 years of age with a booster dose at 16 years of age
- Influenza (flu) Vaccine: Annual vaccination is recommended for all those 6 months of age and older.

• Influenza (flu): Annual vaccination recommended for all those 6 months of age and older.







Notes

- * Varicella (chickenpox) vaccine is not required if child has had chickenpox disease <u>and</u> disease is documented by a physician signature. Without a physician signature, vaccine is required even if you believe your child has had chickenpox disease.
- ** Total doses needed are dependent on vaccine type and the age doses were administered.
- *** All students in grades K 7, all new students and students currently completing the polio series must have 6 months between the last 2 doses of polio vaccine, and one dose must be after the 4th birthday.

 All students in grades 7 12 are required to have one dose of Tdap regardless of the interval since the last

dose of DTaP or Td.
