Preparing for the Needs of Today's and Tomorrow's Students through a Strategic Planning Process

To ensure that USD 377 is fiscally responsible and focused on improvement, the district has embarked upon a thorough Long Range Strategic Planning process. The process began prior to the start of the school year by gaining insight from a contingent group of community members and will continue throughout the school year.

A group of 10 -12 community members met on June 11 & 18 to provide input into their perception of the schools. With the assistance from representatives of the Kansas Association of School Boards, the group discussed the Strengths, Weaknesses, Opportunities and Threats of the school district. The information from the community group was then compiled into themes and presented to the School Board and administration for guidance during the completion of the plan.

Utilizing the information from the community group, the school board and administration identified three purpose statements for the school district moving forward.

Provide Quality Educational Opportunities Designed to Produce Well Rounded Students with a Solid Foundation for Lifelong Learning.

Unite the Communities and Schools in Support of the Success of Each Student.

Provide Each Student a Stable, Efficient and Safe Learning Environment.

The overall strategic plan is still a work in process and will be comprised of objectives that will guide the district in achieving these purpose statements. These objectives will contain both short and long term items to be accomplished. The plan will allow the district to budget for the appropriate use of resources and ensure consistent improvement.

I was driving west on Friday evening to watch ACCHS play football at Horton--what a spectacular sunset I was privileged to and I hope many of you were able to experience that one. Seeing the combines in the field against the sunset and then seeing the Ti-



gers take a win over Horton was so satisfying. We always remember those things that make us who we are--rural, hard-working, ambitious, dedicated, and proud! Rock Steady, Tigers!

Been thinking lately about some of those attributes and the skills that our students learn from those who influence them the most--their parents, their friends and family, their neighbors, and their teachers. Problem solving skills are those that are modeled and demonstrated so we can learn from those who have experience. As a friend recently penned--those of us with experience have spirit, courage, and survival skills that we have learned along the way. One might call it, "we've all had to learn some from the school of hard knocks," borrowing an old cliche.

There really are four steps in problem solving, even though we sometimes get caught in one or more and never get through them all...

- 1. identify and define the real problem
- 2. generate some solutions or alternative solutions
- 3. select which alternative we are going to use
- 4. implement the solution

We could add a 5th one which would be (5) start all over again if 1-4 don't work. Hmmm? Maybe the problem wasn't correctly identified, or maybe the alternatives weren't the best alternatives, and lastly, maybe the solution that was chosen wasn't the real solution.

Now this could be where some failure comes about. Some people just aren't so good about their problem solving skills. We like to help our students by educating them in problem solving: math problem solving, scientific reasoning, how to set up and write a good essay, how to build a worthwhile project, how to analyze a political party or a strategy used in a war regime, maybe even how to correctly position their weight lifting stance. There are also skills that students learn while in school to help them with their problem solving including creativity, research methods, team work, risk management, and decision making.

As John Foster Dules, Former US Secretary of State once said, "The measure of success is not whether you have a tough problem to deal with, but whether it is the same problem you had last year." These are probably good words for all of us to think about. Learn from our problems, Learn to solve our problems, and Learn not to have the same problem over and over again.

Enjoy the month of November and Happy Problem Solving ahead. With the holidays approaching us, we probably all

have something to work out and solve before those big family gatherings. Help your students to problem solve on their own--let them experience some of those things you did, those which helped you to become who you are today.
