### LEA Plan for Safe Return to In-Person Instruction and Continuity of Service Pursuant to the Federal American Rescue Plan Act, Section 2001(i)

#### **Introduction and Background**

In March 2021 President Biden signed the Federal American Rescue Plan (ARP) Act, Public Law 117-2, into law. The ARP Act provides an additional \$122 billion in Elementary and Secondary School Emergency Relief (ARP ESSER) to States and school districts to help safely reopen, sustain the safe operation of schools, and address the impacts of the COVID-19 pandemic on the nation's students. As with the previous ESSER funds available under the Coronavirus Aid, Relief and Economic Security (CARES) Act, and the Coronavirus Response and Relief Supplemental Appropriations Act (CRRSA), the purpose of the additional funding is to support local educational agencies (LEAs) in preparing for and responding to the impacts of COVID-19 on educators, students, and families.

Section 2001(i)(1) of the ARP Act requires each LEA that receives ARP ESSER funds to develop and make publicly available on the LEA's website, no later than 30 days after receiving ARP ESSER funds, a plan for the safe return to in-person instruction and continuity of services for all schools (Safe Return Plan) A Safe Return Plan is required of all fund recipients, including those that have already returned to in-person instruction. Section 2001(i)(2) of the ARP Act further requires that the LEA seek public comment on the Safe Return Plan and take those comments into account in finalization of the Safe Return Plan. Under the interim final requirements published in <u>Volume 86, No. 76 of the Federal Register</u> by the U.S. Department of Education (USDE), an LEA must periodically, but no less frequently than every six months through September 30, 2023, review and, as appropriate, revise its Safe Return Plan.

This template incorporates the federally-required components of the Safe Return Plan.

Note that Governor Abbott has announced that remote learning will be rescinded, meaning that schools will be required to provide full-day, in-person instruction, as we were prior to the COVID-19 Public Health Emergency.

The policy goes on to say that the district will remain vigilant with many of the cleaning and disinfecting procedures put in place for the 2020-2021 school year.

On May 20, 2021, the Harts Bluff Board of Trustees put into policy that on June 1, 2021 all COVID-19 protocols will end and face coverings will be optional. The policy goes on to say that the district will remain vigilant with many of the cleaning and disinfecting procedures put in place for the 2020-2021 school year.

#### C. Handwashing and respiratory etiquette

On May 20, 2021, the Harts Bluff Board of Trustees put into policy that on June 1, 2021 all COVID-19 protocols will end and face coverings will be optional. The policy goes on to say that the district will remain vigilant with many of the cleaning and disinfecting procedures put in place for the 2020-2021 school year.

Harts Bluff ISD will continue to encourage staff and students to wash hands often throughout the school day. Handwashing and personal hygiene are also included in the Pre-k and Kindergarten curriculum.

#### D. Cleaning and maintaining healthy facilities, including improving ventilation

On May 20, 2021, the Harts Bluff Board of Trustees put into policy that on June 1, 2021 all COVID-19 protocols will end and face coverings will be optional. The policy goes on to say that the district will remain vigilant with many of the cleaning and disinfecting procedures put in place for the 2020-2021 school year.

#### E. Contact tracing in combination with isolation and quarantine, in collaboration with the State, local, territorial, or Tribal health departments

On May 20, 2021, the Harts Bluff Board of Trustees put into policy that on June 1, 2021 all COVID-19 protocols will end and face coverings will be optional. The policy goes on to say that the district will remain vigilant with many of the cleaning and disinfecting procedures put in place for the 2020-2021 school year.

#### F. Diagnostic and screening testing

On May 20, 2021, the Harts Bluff Board of Trustees put into policy that on June 1, 2021 all COVID-19 protocols will end and face coverings will be optional. The policy goes on to say that the district will remain vigilant with many of the cleaning and disinfecting procedures put in place for the 2020-2021 school year.

#### G. Efforts to provide vaccinations to educators, other staff, and students, if eligible

Harts Bluff ISD works closely with Titus Regional Medical Center to ensure that all eligible educators, other staff, and students have the opportunity for vaccination.

The policy goes on to say that the district will remain vigilant with many of the cleaning and disinfecting procedures put in place for the 2020-2021 school year.

#### H. Appropriate accommodations for children with disabilities with respect to the health and safety policies

On May 20, 2021, the Harts Bluff Board of Trustees put into policy that on June 1, 2021 all COVID-19 protocols will end and face coverings will be optional. The policy goes on to say that the district will remain vigilant with many of the cleaning and disinfecting procedures put in place for the 2020-2021 school year.

Harts Bluff ISD will continue to work with parents, educators and health care professionals to provide the safest environment for our students with disabilities. The ARD committee will address concerns and IEP recommendations will be made in order to provide safe access to the curriculum and classroom.

#### 2. Ensuring Continuity of Services

On May 20, 2021, the Harts Bluff Board of Trustees put into policy that on June 1, 2021 all COVID-19 protocols will end and continuity of services will proceed as provided prior to March 2021. This includes, but is not limited to students' academic needs and students' and staff's social, emotional, mental health, and other needs, which may include student health and food services.

Additionally, Harts Bluff has partnered with the Flippen Group to provide Capturing Kids Hearts training for all teachers in an effort to provide consistency and meet some of the social, emotional, and mental health needs of students. Harts Bluff has doubled the number of nurses in the district to provide additional services for student health and the district continues to work with the United States Department of Agriculture to ensure that all students have access to free meals throughout the 2021-2022 school year.
