Students and staff will be provided with a safe, and drug free environment.

 The Arkansas Prevention Needs Assessment Student Survey reported in 2007, the average age of first time marijuana use was 13, in Booneville, and in 2008, 14 was the age most Booneville students first tried marijuana. 2009-10 showed an average age of first time use was14.

Supporting Data:

- According to the 2007 Arkansas Prevention Needs Assessment, 60% of 6th grade students feel very safe at school. The 2008 Arkansas Prevention Needs Assessment, reports that 60% feel very safe at school. In 2009-10 the percentage was 92%.
- Seniors reporting an intent to use drugs in 2007 seniors intending to use drugs was 24%, and in 2008, that percentage was 22%. In 2009-10 27% of seniors report intent to use drugs. This is all according to the Arkansas Prevention Needs Assessment given to students annually.

Goal

To provide a safe and drug free environment for both students and staff.

Benchmark

Decrease the average age of first time use of anti social behaviors including drug/alcohol/smoking and related behaviors.
