Our school motto, "Academic Success is Non-negotiable" explains that teachers, students, administrators, and parents work together to ensure all students are successful.

III. Student Performance

The Standardized Testing and Reporting (STAR) Program consists of several key components, including:

- California Standards Tests (CSTs), which include English-language arts (ELA) and mathematics in grades two through eleven; science in grades five, eight, and nine through eleven; and history-social science in grades eight, and nine through eleven.
- California Modified Assessment (CMA), an alternate assessment that is based on modified achievement standards in ELA for grades three through eleven; mathematics for grades three through seven, Algebra I, and Geometry; and science in grades five and eight, and Life Science in grade ten. The CMA is designed to assess those students whose disabilities preclude them from achieving grade-level proficiency on an assessment of the California content standards with or without accommodations.
- California Alternate Performance Assessment (CAPA), includes ELA and mathematics in grades two through eleven, and science for grades five, eight, and ten. The CAPA is given to those students with significant cognitive disabilities whose disabilities prevent them from taking either the CSTs with accommodations or modifications or the CMA with accommodations.

The assessments under the STAR Program show how well students are doing in relation to the state content standards. On each of these assessments, student scores are reported as performance levels.

Our needs for professional development are based on on-going data analysis of our students' mastery of standards. All professional development training days are also aligned with the Single School Plan and the district's mission, goals and objectives. Mentor teachers provide assistance and trainings for the new teachers. New teachers are given support individually and in group sessions. On early release Thursdays our teachers mix grade levels and attend professional learning communities, and learn specific techniques, skills, or theories that are unique to their needs. Some of the topics of focus during professional development are: teaching students in poverty areas, engagement strategies, language arts, math, technology in the classroom, classroom management for class size reduction, Accelerated Reader, how to manage problematic students, explicit direct instruction, and brain research.
