- Community leaders will serve as classroom speakers and provide resources to teachers needed.
- Area churches donate school supplies and provide various resources to families and students.

- The Sevier County Library helps support student learning through Accelerated Reading by providing resources.
- The school holds various fund raising activities during the year to raise money to donate to the Disaster Relief and Red Cross.

Building Capacity of Parents

- A minimum of two parent committee meetings will be held (fall & spring) and two parent teacher-conferences will be held (October 21, 2021 and March 17, 2022).
- The TRIO program from Rich Mountain Community College in Mena works with parents and seniors on both parent/teacher nights as well as once a month. They fill out the FAFSA, Arkansas Lottery Scholarship, as well as other college applications, and financial aid.
- Parents are chaperones for school field trips.
- Parents are invited to organizations' award banquets, concerts, National Honor Society Induction ceremony, plays, FFA county, district, and state fairs, sports events, and Booster Clubs.
- Parents will be provided online resources and paper resources in the information packet to assist students with understanding the curriculum.
- State assessment scores will be sent home to parents during the first nine weeks of the school year.
- Parents will be provided with information about state and local student. The ACT Aspire will be given in the late spring each year and STAR test will be administered three times during the school year. Science will take ACT Aspire interim twice yearly.
- The school website provides online resources for assisting students with homework.
- Parents, students and school personnel serve on the district wellness committee and assist in designing healthy school menus choices.
