

# What's the deal with this "new math"?

An explanation for parents struggling to understand why the approach to teaching math has changed.

All too often we hear parents' frustration with trying to help their child with math at home. Many parents wonder why students can't just, "learn the way we learned in school". Some parents feel that the instruction students are given is "too complex" and "has too many steps" to complete the problems. The biggest hurdle both teachers and parents face in learning how to comprehend, teach, and support students with the current state/national standards is that it is very different from the way they learned math.

In school, you probably learned how to do arithmetic using simple algorithms. You were told what to do with the numbers given using a specific procedure. You also probably learned various "tricks" to solve problems; think: "go next door and borrow ten more". The problem with learning mathematics in that way, is that for many students, there is never a deep understanding or "conceptual understanding" as to why you are completing that procedure or algorithm. If the lesson is about addition with regrouping, you were told how to do the problem, the steps in which to solve the problem, and that was it.

An article featured in Forbes and Apple News by Peter Kruger explained it like this: from decades of data and analysis of assessment scores, what researchers found was students were able to learn mathematics by rote memorization of particular algorithms, but could not apply that knowledge to advanced mathematics. Students lacked what researchers understood to be "number sense" or the intuitive understanding that numbers are made up of other numbers and that numbers relate to each other. In other words, students could perform basic mathematics easily enough, but algebra, trigonometry, or calculus became failure points because students had no understanding of how to manipulate equations in order to simplify or solve them. Students would get frustrated and give up because there weren't any simple methods or formulas anymore.

In a recent KSDE conference, it was stated by the Kansas Commissioner of Education Dr. Randy Watson, that 'the level of mathematical learning that we were taught using just traditional algorithms would equate to a "level 2" score on the state assessment'. Our goal is for students to score at a "level 3 or 4" on the state assessment. This would show that students are able to demonstrate an understanding and application of the mathematics needed to be college and career ready, and not just basic mathematics knowledge. In other words, students would be able to understand their mistakes in order to correct their work and explain what they have done and why.

# Policy on School Closings Due to Bad Weather

It is that time of the year again to remind everyone of our school closing policy:

If adverse weather conditions exist which threaten student transportation safety before school begins, the announcement will be sent out on the districts automated SCHOOL MESSENGER SYSTEM. School Messenger allows us to make an actual recorded phone call to every parent phone number in our school data base. We also make calls to several radio and television stations who will announce the closing information on the air. OUR MAIN CONCERN IS THE SAFETY OF ALL OUR PEOPLE!

Every effort will be made to finalize the decision no later than 5:30 a.m. of school closing due to adverse weather conditions. On mornings when icing is a concern, and forecasts suggest clearing, school may be delayed with a late start time of 10:00 a.m.

Decisions on school closings are made at the district level based on National Weather Service Data, county-wide school weather hotline, and early morning observations by the superintendent and transportation director. Please do not call before 5:30 a.m., as we will be analyzing data, making observations and preparing to make the decision.

School will not be dismissed due to storm conditions that arise during the day as long as it is feasible for students and staff to remain at school safely. The district is extremely reluctant to dismiss school early if the weather is severe.



### What Is a FAFSA?

All college students are expected to contribute towards their education costs. How much you and your family will be expected to contribute depends on your financial situation — and is what's called your Expected Family Contribution (EFC). The Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA) is the form the U.S. Department of Education (ED) requires to determine your Expected Family Contribution (EFC). The government conducts a "need analysis" based on financial information, such as income, assets, and other family information, which you (and your parents if you are a dependent student) will be asked to provide. Your application is examined by a federal processor and the results are sent by computer to the financial aid offices of the colleges you've chosen. The FAFSA is the application most colleges use to determine eligibility for federal, state, and college-sponsored financial aid, including grants, educational loans, and workstudy programs.

## Federal Financial Aid Steps

Be sure to fill out the FAFSA even if you think you won't qualify for federal aid.

- 1. Go to www.fafsa.gov to apply for a FAFSA ID. (Both the student and parent need to apply)
- 2. When you get your FAFSA ID go to www. fafsa.gov to complete the FAFSA
- 3. Follow up on your FAFSA. After you complete the FAFSA you will receive a SAR-Student Aid Report by email or mail. Go to www.fafsa.gov "check the STATUS of a submitted FAFSA".

**BE AWARE OF DEADLINES:** You may have to meet application deadlines, depending on your college and where you live. State and school deadlines are usually earlier than federal deadlines.
