Have You Heard What's Happening with Douglass Schools?

Exciting things are happening at Douglass Schools. The Community of Douglass has spoken and shown their support for the school district. The importance of education and the belief that the children of the community should have safe and secure schools is a message that we have heard loud and clear. The May passage of the \$8.99 million bond issue was approved by voters with an 83% margin. The staff and school district are grateful for the overwhelming support and very appreciative of the confidence the citizens have in the Douglass School District. We are pleased that through the efforts of our district steering committee of over 30 district patrons, a transparent approach has garnered overwhelming support for the bond issue.

The school improvement project is moving along and the pieces are falling into place. The project is focused on three major areas; safety and security improvements, aging facility upgrades and facility renovations and additions. The improvements at Seal Elementary will help bring our oldest building in the district up to modern standards, while keeping the focus on creating a safe and secure learning environment. The updates to the high school and middle school not only focuses on safety and security, but utilize existing space to make much needed upgrades to enhance the learning environment for our students. During the information phase before the bond election, it was estimated that the bond issue would increase the tax rate by 4.25 mills. I am pleased to report that the bond issue actually did not raise the mill rate, as a matter of fact the total mill levy dropped 2 mills. The district is currently working with the architects to finalize the designs of the project and the board will be issuing requests for proposals for a Construction Manager at Risk. The initial timeline has construction slated to begin in December 2016 and end in the fall of 2017.

Enrollment numbers at the elementary and middle school have increased for the first time in over 15 years. Due to the welcomed increase in enrollment, the district hired two new elementary teachers to help keep the class sizes manageable. We are very excited about the signs of growth and the stabilization of the numbers at Seal Elementary and look forward to providing a wonderful education to the children of the Douglass Community.

In keeping technology at the forefront of preparing our children for the future, Douglass High School rolled out Chromebooks this fall. Our students are engaged in a full one to one implementation of Chromebook devises, which will support the implementation of Google Classroom. With the outstanding efforts and preparation of the Douglass staff, our kids are already taking advantage of improved learning opportunities through the use of technology. Improvements to the districts wireless infrastructure through the use of e-rate funds, the district has been able to cost-effectively maintain the district's technology infrastructure. Elementary and middle school students are also receiving enhanced technology opportunities with additional IPads and laptop availability in their classrooms.

On behalf of the staff, students and Board of education I would like to thank the community for its continued support and we look forward to the exciting opportunities in store for the students at Douglass Schools.

That first year, approximately 6-10 middle school students in each Butler county school were chosen as part of the first group of campers that learned leadership skills, college and career readiness expectations. What began on the Butler Community College campus 25 years ago, and has changed hundreds of lives for students, is still going strong today. On June 9th, Douglass was proud to have six eighth grade students graduate from Camp Butler 2000. These students began as sixth graders, completed all three years of summer camp and graduated from the program at the formal banquet. DHS Launches a 1:1 Technology Initiative

I am excited to announce that Douglass High School has launched a one to one technology initiative for students for the 2016/2017 school year. After a two year process, through which a team of teachers and administrators have researched, tested devices, visited other area schools, and attended training sessions, we have chosen Chromebooks and the Google platform for this venture.

One to one simply means that each and every student has been issued a school owned Chromebook to use for educational purposes both at school and at home. For those of you who may not be familiar, Chromebooks are devices that have the capabilities of a laptop with several advantages in the school setting that typical PC's do not allow. Chromebooks run on the Google Chrome Operating System, and they deliver applications over the internet. All information is continuously saved in the cloud as students work, and software updates automatically. Chromebooks do have a single USB port as well which allows for flash storage so students have the capability of working offline when necessary. Another key advantage of Chromebooks is that, unlike PC's, they boot up almost instantaneously which translates to minimal class time being lost. Chromebooks also have a battery life that will typically have the ability to extend throughout the school day under normal use. Lastly, because these devices operate on the Google Operating System, teachers have the ability to utilize Google Classroom and Google Apps for Education to streamline assigning of tasks and class work while enabling students the ability to complete and turn in assignments electronically.

We are confident that this initiative of technology will continue to help our students develop 21st Century Skills such as project collaboration and communication as well as further their progress toward becoming college and career ready. This will provide an excellent opportunity for our students, and we are looking forward to an outstanding year of learning!



PSAT/NMSQT

On Wednesday, October 19, juniors and sophomores at Douglass High School will have the opportunity to take the Preliminary Scholastic Aptitude Test/National Merit Scholarship Qualifying Test (PSAT/NMSQT). Taking this test should provide helpful assistance to students in making future plans concerning college.

The PSAT/NMSQT measures verbal and mathematical reasoning skills and writing skills which are abilities important in doing college work. The test also allows students a chance to find out what the SAT is like.

Other reasons for taking this test include: 1) a chance to compete for scholarships; 2) an opportunity to compare results with others; and 3) an opportunity to enter the student search and receive materials from different colleges and universities.

The cost is \$14.00 make checks payable to Douglass High School. Sophomores and Juniors should sign up in the office. The test will be given in the multi-purpose room starting at 8:00 a.m. Students may pick up a study guide in from Dana Houser. Deadline for registering for the test is Wednesday, October 12th.

ASVAB

The Armed Services Vocational Aptitude Battery (ASVAB) will be given to all interested juniors and seniors at DHS on Wednesday, September 21. The test will be given in the multi-purpose room beginning at 8:00 a.m.

The ASVAB is designed to help students in making decisions concerning their future plans. The test is also a required step for those who ultimately decide on a military enlistment. Military and civilian personnel will administer the test at no cost to students. Students are under no obligation to anyone by taking the test.



KANSAS HONORS PROGRAM

Each year the University of Kansas Alumni Association honors the top ten percent academically of each senior class in all Kansas high schools. Academic records through the previously completed semester are used to determine the students to be honored.

DHS STUCO Hosts Freshmen Orientation Day By Gretchen Grimmett, STUCO Reporter




