USD 372 has recently issued a new late start program. The first late start of the school year was on Sept. 21, and the next one will be tomorrow, Oct. 19.

On the third Wednesday of each month, junior high and high school begins at 8:55 a.m. instead of 7:55 a.m. However, students should not arrive prior to 7:40 a.m. because staff members are in meetings. The grade school begins at 9 a.m.

Faculty and administrators use the late PAGES 1 & 2 start time for curriculum and professional development development.

'This gives our staff more opportunities to meet on a regular basis to discuss changes that will affect the students," Brad Womack, junior/senior high principal, said.

Many students said they felt that the first late start had both advantages and his thoughts about the pros and cons of this

"I think that the late start program is a mix of a couple things. I really enjoyed sleeping in, but I do like to procrastinate my homework until seminar," Klucas said.

Freshman Riley Cobb explained how the new program affected him.

"The late start affected me because I had to get up really early to get ready because I had to go into my aunt's because my parents

couldn't take me earlier," Cobb said.

Womack said he felt that the first late start was successful but still needs some improve-

"It was successful from the teacher and staff's point of view because we were able to get a lot of organizational things we had to get done for the school year, but for the students, it could have been better. I think a lot of that had to do with a lack of communication on our part to the students about whether or not we were going to have seminar. Some students on screening procedures and assigning still felt like they could come in and get help from teachers when they were in meetings. Administration adopts new online education program

The high school faculty and administration have recently started researching a new program called e2020. The program helps students redeem credits, take courses that the school does not offer, or make up a class if they experience a long-term absence.

Deb Howser, director of special services, said she feels the program will be advantageous for many students.

"I thought it was a good idea because sometimes our students who have not done well in a particular class need another opportunity to get their credit in that class. Right now, the only option they have is to go to New Directions during the summer. So, this is another way they could be able to go back and retake a class and focus on the skills and concepts that they missed in that class," Howser mentioned.

Brad Womack, principal, said the program would not only help credit recovery students but would also assist students who are looking

to expand their classes beyond what Silver Lake offers.

"e2020 offers an opportunity for advanced placement courses, and it also offers an opportunity for courses that we wouldn't have the staff to teach whether that be a different foreign language or maybe an advanced art history class. Just things that we wouldn't be able to teach here," Womack explained.

Howser said the reduction of staff brought about problems that the new program would help alleviate

"With budget cuts and everything that has gone on, we have had to reduce some staff and that has trickled down to students and is having an impact on them because we don't have as many sections of a class that we can

"If something is only offered, let's say, first block on a gold day, and they want to be in band, the only time you could do that is

first block. So, that ties their schedule down and they would have to make choices that they may not otherwise have to make. With e2020, they could take the class they wanted on-line and still participate in band," Howser said.

Behind all the opportunities and benefits, there are also some concerns. The new program would require an outside-of-school effort by the

"The biggest disadvantage that I see right now is that the majority of the time that you would need to spend on it is out-of-school. That is simply because at this time, we do not have an additional staff person who can facilitate the running of the class. So if I need to retake a geometry class, I might have to take it on my own with a computer to do it," Womack indicated.

Six high school teachers were recently trained on the e2020 program. Womack said he hopes to have e2020 ready for student use before the end of first semester





Facebook still hot for local students

In the past few years, Facebook and Twitter have been two of the most popular websites among teenagers. Casey Kelly, Ashley Williams, Katlvn Kirkwood, Gracie Petrie and Dallas Maddox have all been using Facebook for a while and have some different opinions on the way Facebook is used.

Having a Facebook account and being able to talk to people online made Kirkwood a little more nervous when talking to people face-to-face.


Petrie has a different perspective on what Facebook has to offer.




