

Sophomores: Summer College Enrollment

When you leave school on May 17, you will be a Junior and eligible to take concurrent college classes if you meet the following requirements: composite ACT score of at least 19 and at least a 3.0 GPA to be able to enroll in any community college class. However, if your composite score is less than 19 you may still be able to enroll in a subject area that you have at least a 19 on the ACT. For example, if your math ACT score is 22, you would be able to enroll in a college math class. You can take up to 6 hours of college credit each semester of your Junior year, including the summer semester. Keep in mind that you will have to pay for the college classes. But what better time to begin college classes than when you are still living at home! Contact Mrs. Traxler for enrollment details.



Freshman: Focus on Your Future

As enrollment quickly approaches, begin thinking about your future goals and plans. Work to connect your coursework with your goals for the future by taking relevant classes. However, if you don't know what career you want to pursue, consider taking a class in an area in which you are interested. For example, you might

What is an ICAP?



ICAP is an acronym for **I**ndividual **C**areer and **A**cademic **P**lan. It is an intentional, multi-year process developed by students along with parents and school staff that will guide students as they explore academic and career opportunities. The ICAP will actively engage students to understand their interests, strengths and values; to create a vision of their future; to develop academic

and career goals; and to prepare a plan for achieving their vision and goals. Through the ICAP process students will explore post-secondary career and academic opportunities, align their coursework and curriculum, apply to post-secondary institutions, secure financial aid and ultimately enter the workforce.
