Why are Standards Important for Students, Teachers and Schools?

Why are Standards important for students, teachers and parents? Education standards and level of rigor in instruction are often complicated and vary from state to state, which can be overwhelming for teachers to implement in the classroom. In addition, parents find it difficult to support their child's learning at home. The new Common Core State Standards ensure that teachers and parents know the exact end goal and can help each student meet that goal in the classroom and at home.

Prior to Common Core, students received a variable quality of education depending on their zip code, which is problematic given the high mobility of families, especially military families. College and career-ready standards are critical because, even in high-performing states, some students are passing all required tests and graduating, yet still require remediation in their postsecondary work. Every student needs rigorous academics to ensure U.S. graduates remain globally competitive.

Famous physicist and Nobel Prize winner Antony Hewish once stated, "I believe scientists have a duty to share the excitement and pleasure of their work with the general public, and I enjoy the challenge of presenting difficult ideas in an understandable

way." Hewish was describing the scientists to publically share their findings to the unscientific community. This makes the scientist much more knowledgeable about the topic because they must think about how to explain it in very simple terms.

On April 1st and 9th, twelve Chemistry II students were asked to listen to the words of Hewish. My class attended the elementary and middle schools to perform a chemistry demonstration show in hopes of building excitement in science at a very young age. Each student in my class was asked to pick an experiment that would excite and amaze an audience. After they had selected the demonstration, they researched and wrote a paper explaining how this happened from a detailed chemistry perspective. They then presented their experiment to all of the schools, and they did not disappoint.

The experiments performed varied, but some of them produced color changes, explosions, and what appeared to be magic. The students at the elementary and middle schools seemed to be amazed by the experiments that my students did. After doing the demonstration show, I ran into one of the elementary students at Wal-Mart, and they could not wait to ask me questions and tell me what their favorite part of the show was. It is my hope that this excitement and curiosity in the sciences stays with them for the rest of their life.
