Coast Guard Response to Harvey

After a rocky start to my time in Houston, I soon settled into work at the Incident Command Post or ICP at Sector Houston Galveston. A floor of the sector had been opened up and arranged for an ICP. There were different teams grouped together and people coming and going at a fast pace. Phones rang and voices were raised to be heard over the organized chaos.

I was a part of the administrative team. We worked 10-12 hours each day the first week I was there. Before I arrived, phones

had been manned 24 hours and the team slept on cots in the office. Our job that week was to assist Coast Guard members being mobilized for the event by arranging for their transportation and berthing (which is the Coast Guard word for a place to sleep.) The phones rang and members came to us when reporting at the same time others came to us that were leaving for home.

During that first week, something very exciting happened: the Commandant of the Coast Guard paid us a visit. Admiral Paul F. Zukunft holds the highest office in

the Coast Guard. If the Coast Guard had a president, it would be him.

Admiral Zukunft encouraged us and had many positive words on the job that the Coast Guard had done during this disaster. I learned that the commanding officer of the sector and the officer in charge of logistics (the man who plans and organizes how things are going to get done) had only been working at the sector for a few months when the hurricane hit. They were still learning their jobs, unit and co-workers when the biggest challenge of their careers hit with vengeance.

I also learned that President Trump had visited the sector before I arrived. He had taken the time to shake the hand and personally speak to every Coastie that came to see him.

As for Houston, the only evidence of the disaster in my area of the city was heaps of sheetrock and belongings of residents and businesses piled outside. Some businesses and a few roads were closed, but for the most part it was business as usual.

The news ran a story on the people living with all their worldly possessions heaped up as trash in their yards. It was another emotional injury added to their pain as they saw the treasures turned to trash day after day.

The city garbage service is working 24 hours a day, but cannot keep up with the debris. Snakes, rats and mold made their homes in the piles. The smell drove many from their neighborhoods.
