Good Morning,

I had to rush out yesterday after the wellness meeting to go to the doctor but wanted to take a moment to share Mr. Novak's words from our monitoring yesterday.

He said, "You have no findings or recommendations. We found everything in order. All monitoring points are fully implemented. In 20 days you will receive an initial report with all fully implemented. Then, in 60 days you will receive a final report from ADE."

While this part was good the next part is why I am so honored to work here...the people I work with. Mr. Novak said, "All of the files were wonderful. The bookkeeper being present made this meeting easier. The organizational skills made us able to complete our audit by 10:30 when we have been closer to 1:00 the two previous days. The patrons, students and staff were well represented today. All of you are obviously doing a great job for kids."

He also made comments about how our administrators often don't hear thank you enough. The ADE team praised our administrators several times. He said it was obvious that we are concerned about students and student achievement. Mr. Novak spoke about the quality of teaching staff we must have in order to plan and implement programs to raise student achievement while the scores are already in the 80s. He praised the teachers and staff for their commitment to move all students.

I just have to tell you how that makes my heart swell with pride. Each of you worked very hard to pull this visit off successfully. Everyone has been open and willing to make little adjustments here and there to meet compliance requirements. But the greatest thing is each of you do so much more than that. You go far beyond minimum standards every day and to have someone from outside come in and recognize that in a few hours is testimony to your character and commitment to Westside Schools.

Please pass this along to those who worked behind the scenes to make this happen. Thank you for all of your hard work and dedication. So proud to be a Warrior!

On December 9, 2014, Johanna Henderson, Barbara Means, and Charles Nowak, conducted a comprehensive evaluation at the **Westside Consolidated School District** (hereafter, the District or LEA). Mr. Willie Morris, Director of Federal and State Monitoring, provided notice to the District of the scheduled evaluation.

The review was conducted following the **Financial and Programmatic Monitoring Guide** in order to ensure school district compliance with federal and state mandates.
