Parents have expressed concern that their children are being bullied at school. Also needs assessment shows acts of violence increased in 2012-2013 by 1%. Discipline referrals also show a need for continued teaching in the areas addressed in this action. The following action will improve achievement because students will respond positively in an environment in which they feel safe. Parents give more encouragement to children to achieve when they know safety needs are being met. All students, including special education students, will receive drug education and character education training with emphasis on anti-bullying, violence prevention, and character development. Anti-bullying curriculum, parent booklets, and character education curriculum will be used in classes and shared with parents. Students will be taught to recognize social and peer pressures to use drugs and skills for resisting such pressures. They will also be taught ways to deal with bullying. Parent involvement programs will be conducted. Use of illegal drugs or alcohol on campus remained at 0%; weapons incidents and expulsions remained at 0%. In the 2010-2011 school year student assaults increased from 1% to 2%; illegal use of drugs increased from 0% to -1% (1 incident). Priority 2: Increase administrative support.

1. Analysis of data from both high school and elementary school shows the following needs: For the past three years, 2010-2011,2011-2012, 2012-2013, reading comprehension has been the weakest area in literacy on both norm referenced and criterion referenced exams for both campuses with scores for grades and sub populations ranging from the 30th%iles to low 50th%iles. Open response continues to show weaknesses in literacy with building level goals to improve writing on style, content, sentence formation and vocabulary. Math weak areas for both campuses include problem solving and open response, and at the elementary level measurement, data analysis probability were identified as weak areas for more grade levels with other math strands along in various grade levels or sub groups. Please see building level plans for more specific percentages.

- 2. Attendance rates district wide for the past three years, 2010-2011,2011-2012,2012-2013 range from 94-99%.
- 3. To address the needs district wide, the decision was made to contract with The Learning Institute (TLI) and use their assessments and tools and to upgrade technology to better facilitate the goals of each campus. TLI includes training teachers and staff, aligining curriculum and developing pacing guides. After student assessments, in-depth assessment of student responses will be conducted and decisions made for reteaching/remediation. An expected outcome is that students will have improved benchmark scores due to the experience of frequent assessments using the benchmark format. Actions to provide for all sub population are included in building plans. The district goal is to provide support to the separate campuses to achieve their goals.
