







CIPA

The Children's Internet Protection Act (CIPA) is a federal law enacted by Congress to address concerns about access to offensive content over the internet on school and library computers. CIPA was signed into law on December 21, 2000. CIPA imposes certain types of requirements on any school or library that receives funding for internet access or internal connections from the E-Rate Program. E-Rate is a program that makes certain communications technology more affordable for eligible schools and libraries. In early 2001, the FCC issued rules implementing CIPA.

CIPA

The Magnet Cove School District certifies that it complies with all CIPA requirements set by the FCC and is eligible to receive E-Rate funding by having the following requirements in place:

- Technology Protection: Local control of the states M86 web content filter for the state supplied internet access; and a fortigate web content filter onsite to provide filtering for cable internet access.
- Internet Safety Policy: Internet Safety Policy is taught by MCSD Faculty in all buildings K-12.
- Adopt and Enforce a policy to monitor activities of minors: A policy is in place for monitoring students online activities by utilizing software on PC's and by MCSD staff visually monitoring student activities.

Title I funds are designated to assist the homeless and to provide classroom materials, supplies, technology and equipment needed by those students at-risk.

Title I fund purchases also include a membership to Above and Beyond the Core (ABC), a comprehensive and integrated approach to curriculum design and implementation pertaining to the Arkansas State Curriculum standards for K-8 Core Subjects.

All Title II-A and Title IV funds were transferred to Title I, an allowable action under federal guidelines, this year to develop a more comprehensive program.

Title II-A funds are designated for professional development and due to the significant reduction in these funds over the past few years in our district, the transfer to Title I combines funding which allows for the use of the funds for professional development that is part of a comprehensive program that focuses on improving student achievement.

Title IV-A funds were granted beginning last school year (2017-2018) school year, as part of the Every Student Succeeds Act (ESSA) from the federal government and were intend to supplement programs in on or more of these three areas; A well-rounded education, safe schools, or effective use of technology.

NSLA funds are budgeted to provide services in the area of reading to assist in developing skills in students who are struggling with basic reading skills or exhibit characteristics of dyslexia.

Funds are set aside to pay the salary and benefits of an additional school nurse, above the state nursing staff requirements.

Student assessment and new technology for the classroom, supplies to support literacy instruction and contracted professional support for our Advanced Placement programs are also budgeted.

NSLA funds are budgeted to pay the salary and benefits of additional paraprofessional support staff.

A school resource officer is contracted and paid using NSLA funds to assist in the area of school safety.

An ACSIP stipend for the MS Principal is budget using NSLA funding to support and coordinate overall district and school level improvement plans.

State Professional Development Funds





New Technology/Facility Upgrades

- Current Chromebooks in the Elementary were combined to create one-to-one Chromebooks for all three 4th grade classes. Each 1st and 2nd grade class is receiving 5 new touchscreen/flip screen Chromebooks for their classrooms.
- 5 new Touchscreen monitors were bought for classrooms in the elementary school, and each touch screen monitor is now equipped with is own computer hard drive so teachers can use the touchscreen monitor and their desktop computer simultaneously.
- New Foyer area added
- Teacher's lounge updated and upgrade

New Programs

- After extensive work last school year and this summer, the elementary school has implemented a standards-based grade system with standards-based report cards for Kindergarten through 4th grade.
- Magnet Cove Elementary PPO purchased the Car Rider Pro System for student dismissal, which has been implemented this year to created a more streamlined, safe dismissal process.
- Each Friday, members of the High School Football team participate in our morning drop-off for elementary students, thank to Coach Carmikle and his team.
- The elementary school has added an Alternative Learning Environment this school year. Currently there are 8 students enrolled in this program
- Professional Learning Communities are being fully implemented for teachers this school year.



Parent Involvement

- The Magnet Cove Panther Parent Organization continues to be a strong support system for parent involvement. They help to sponsor T-shirts for ALL elementary students to support our PBIS goals, as well hold a very successful fall festival.

 A grandparents lunch was held in September and several other events, including Muffins for Moms and Donuts for Dads will be held throughout the year.

Student Safety

- We have focused on our new Car Rider Pro system for drop-off/pick-up system for Magnet Cove Elementary. The car rider line has been reorganized and safety measures have been enforced. Mr. Smith, our school security officer, acts as the crossing guard during morning drop-off and afternoon dismissal at our crosswalk; which has been moved to the Annex end of the elementary building. A foyer area has been created at the elementary by adding a 2nd set of doors at the front entrance and a sliding glass window to access the office staff. This new door is controlled with an electromagnet and holds visitors in the foyer area until they are granted permission into the building by the office staff. This has significantly lessoned the traffic in the elementary office and ensures that those who enter our building are first identified. The two sets of doors on each end of the elementary building are locked at all times an "Exit Only" except for staff who may use their key to enter through these doors.
- The entire staff also participated in the Active Shooter Training this year provided by Strategos. This is the second time the district has contracted this training, however it was the first time several of our new staff members participated in the training.

We continue to implement the following activities to support good citizenship:

- Character Education Program Our 4th grade students (seniors of our building;) take turns giving the character message each morning during our announcements. The messages stress the importance of making good choices, being leaders, doing the right thing even when no one is watching. The importance of Being Respectful, Responsible and Safe is always a part of this message.
- Two student ambassadors were chose from each class this year; one boy and one girl. This is a program that is be "revived" and these students are there to assist Mrs. Whisenhunt and Mrs. McCutcheon when needed and welcome new students to our school.

We continue to implement the following activities to support good citizenship:

- We have teamed with the Kiwanis Club of Malvern for the Kiwanis Terrific Kid Program. One student is chosen from each classroom each semester as the Terrific Kid. Using good character and making good choices are the criteria that teachers use to make this important choice. The students are honored by the Kiwanis Club.
- Students of the Month Classroom teachers choose one student each month to receive this award. Students are chosen for a variety of reasons which may include good behavior, good grades, improvement in an area, working hard etc. Students are treated to lunch provided by Wendy's in Malvern.
- St. Jude Children's Hospital Math-A-Thon Fundraiser, "Help Pick Up The Tab For Ronald McDonald House", "Paws for a Cause" for AR Children's Hospital.

Title VI-B funds along with District Maintenance of Effort funds are used to pay salaries and benefits for a Special Education Supervisor, Special Education Teachers, and Special Education Paraprofessionals.

Academic Language Therapy, provided by Jessica Johnson, is budgeted partially in NSLA and Title VI-B (to the allowable proportion) to provide Early Intervention Services to meet the needs of struggling students.

Additionally, these funds pay for psyco-educational testing by a licensed psychological examiner and tuition for specialized services at day treatment and vocational facilities and professional behavior consultant support. Special Education funding also pays for classroom materials, supplies, technology and equipment, and professional development and training opportunities that provide information that will assist in educating students with disabilities.







College & Career Readiness: Predicted Path




