The Johnson County Westside Secondary School shall provide all students an opportunity to become proficient in reading, writing, and mathematics. The staff is committed to provide the skills required for each of them to become self-assured, successful, life-long learners.

Grade Span: 7-12 Title I: Title I Schoolwide School Improvement: SI M

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Priority 1: Literacy

Goal: During the 2011-12 school year, Westside High School students in all student groups performed above the AMO in literacy. For the 2012-13 school year, all student groups will continue to improve reading comprehension; reading and interpreting a variety of text including practical, informational, and technical texts; writing with understanding of purpose, speaker, audience, and form; and writing conventions with attention given to sentence structure, type and length, rules of capitalization and punctuation. We will reduce the number of below-proficient students by 10% during the 2012-13 school year.

Priority 2: Math

Goal: All student groups and ESEA subgroups met the Annual Measurable Objectives (AMO) for 2011-12. It is expected that all student groups and ESEA subgroups will meet or exceed the AMO's for 2012-13. **Priority 3:** Wellness

Goal: Students participating in the BMI assessments show a need to improve their cardiovascular, muscular, strength, endurance, and flexibility capabilities.

To continue to improve literacy scores by meeting or exceeding the AMO for 2012-13 Priority 1:

- 1. Westside High School conducted a three-year data trend analysis of literacy achievement using the results from Target Assessments, local common assessments, Benchmark and 11th grade literacy exam. Results showed that, even though all student groups and ESEA subgroups met AMO for 2011-12, there are still areas of weakness that need to be addressed. These areas include: reading practical, literary and content passages, and writing in literary passages, content domain and writing style. Teaching strategies have been adjusted so that these areas of weakness are addressed. Literacy teachers meet once a month with an instructional facilitator to review classroom performance data and teaching strategies that are being used in the classroom. The entire faculty meets once a month to review and discuss ways literacy has been incorporated into curriculum across the board. Available funds will be used to implement appropriate interventions and programs that will best address the needs of our students.
- 2. THE ATTENDANCE RATE for 2008-09 was 93%, for 2009-10-92.6% and for 2010-11 it was 94.3%. THE GRADUATION RATE: In 2009 the rate was 93.2%; in 2010 the graduation rate was 95.3%; in 2011 the graduation rate was 83.7%. (Graduation Rate and Attendance Rate information for 2012 is unavailable at the time of ACSIP submission.)

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Priority 2: Westside High School will meet or exceed the AMO for math in 2012-13.

1. Westside High school conducted a three-year data trend analysis of math achievement using the results from Target Assessments, local common assessments, Benchmark, Algebra and Geometry exams. Results showed that, even though all student groups and ESEA subgroups met AMO for 2011-12, there are still areas of weakness that need to be addressed. These areas include: numbers and operation, measurement, data analysis and probability, understanding algebra, and solving equations and inequalities. Students are performing poorly on open response questions. Research has been conducted on project-based learning activities that can be used in math classes that will help address the weak areas. Teaching strategies have been adjusted to help address the problem with answering open response questions in math. Math teachers meet once a month with an instructional facilitator to review and discuss classroom practices that best serve our students. The entire faculty meets once a month to discuss ways they can incorporate math into all disciplines. Available funds will be used to implement appropriate interventions and programs that best address the needs of our students.

Priority 3: To improve the health and wellness of all students.

- 1. MALES: In 2009-10, according to BMI screening results for 10th grade boys, 38.1% were overweight or obese. In 2010-11, BMI screening results showed that 50% of males in grades 8 and 10 were considered overweight or obese. This is an increase of 11.9%. In 2011-12, only 8th grade males had BMI screening. Of those screened, 55% were shown to be obese/overweight. This is an increase of 5% over the previous year.
- 2. FEMALES: In 2009-10, 50% of 8th grade girls were considered to be overweight or obese while 38.1% of 10th grade girls were considered to be overweight or obese. In 2011, 40% of 8th grade girls were considered to be overweight or obese, a 10% decrease over the previous year. In that same year 35.3% of 10th grade girls were considered to be overweight or obese, a decrease of 2.8% over the previous year. In 2012, only 8th grade girls had BMI screening. Results show that 33.3% of these students were considered to be obese/overweight, a decrease of 6.7%

- 4. After reviewing the 2011-12 School Health Index (SHI) reports the following strategies will be implemented: A. Provide staff and students with CPR & First Aid training. B. Adopt additional lessons on health and safety issues to be taught in the health education classes as well as Family and Consumer Sciences classes. C. Change meal menus that will incorporate more fruits and vegetables and less fried foods. D. Identify students with nutritional deficits and provide healthy food items for them to take home on the weekends. E. Provide more workshops, health fairs, and healthy living seminars for parents and staff to help promote healtier lifestyles.
- 5. The Westside School District's communities are socio-economically disadvantaged, with an average per capita income of \$14,364. 23.3% of the population in this area are living below

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> the national poverty level. These factors also contribute detrimentally to the overall well being of our students.

Students participating in the BMI assessments show a need to improve their cardiovascular, Goal muscular, strength, endurance, and flexibility capabilities.

Healthier BMI results will continue to be evident by June 30, 2013. There is a definite need for our Benchmark male students to decrease their BMI rate by 10% over the next year. Comparisons will be made when the 2013 BMI results are posted.
