While still a student, she worked as a consultant at the Austrian Science Fund (FWF), later as a trainee lawyer, and from 1991 as a legal officer at the General Secretariat of the Austrian Rectors' Conference. One of her specializations - asylum and immigration law - helped determine her further career. From October 2010 to June 2011, she was head of the Vienna Foreign Police.
