What to Expect & How to Succeed

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Who are you?

- Fit and values. What do you most value in education? In a school? What would be ideal fit?
- Real self-scrutiny. Get input from trusted others.
 - Strengths. What makes you flow?
 - Weaker points. Pay attention here!



Showing what you've done

- Focus on showing results. Showcase what you've achieved. In every job.
 - Why is it important? Why did your results leave the workplace/employer/mission better off?
- On a resume: describe the accomplishment; quantify when possible.
- In cover letter: explain 2-3 accomplishments that are highly relevant to the specific role.
- ▶ In Interviews: use PAR: Problem Action Result



Resume examples

- Teach MYP I & S classes (History, Geography and Humanities)
- Developed and taught curricula aligned to state standards. Achieved highest record of student performance on state proficiency test for school. 95% of students scored proficient or higher in science.
- Led and coordinated responsibilities of grade-level team to continuously improve and reflect upon team goals, school culture, and student performance



Problem - Action - Result

- Problem: describe the situation.
- Action: what action you took, and why. Use this to illuminate your thought process.
- Result: what changed, why it's significant, and how you know.
- Reflection: what you would do differently next time.
- And...practice! Plan out and practice with a peer how you'll illustrate key accomplishments in your resume, cover letter and interviews.



Tailoring to your experience

- If you have taught: use examples primarily from your teaching
- If you haven't taught: use examples from paid positions (best), and internships, volunteering, academic work. If it's not teaching, be explicit about how it applies.



No teaching experience? They'll look for potential.

- The trifecta: hungry, humble and smart.
- Hungry: driven to excel, you get things done and accomplish goals
- Humble: you're a learner, listen well, reflect constantly
- Smart: you think critically, solve problems, know content
- Commitment to kids is well-developed and compelling
- Clarity of purpose/motivation: you know why you're doing this



Who are they?

- Mission, values and culture. What does this school believe? What do they value? How do adults behave?
- Do research. Website, job description, your networks, online reviews, professors, other teachers, etc.
- Interview the interviewers. Have thoughtful questions ready to help assess fit.



Assorted tips

- Plan and Practice. Don't wing it come prepared.
- Cover Letters. Most aren't good. Write a great one and you'll stand out.
