April 2 :: Expositional Preaching

Seven Mile Road, 6-9pm

Purchase and read *Expositional Preaching* by David Helm. Write down questions and comments as you read. We will discuss the reading as well as talk through theology and praxis connected to preaching.

May 7 :: Studying Your Passage

Seven Mile Road, 6-9pm

Each person will choose a passage (TBD) with a view towards developing a sermon and preaching that sermon at Seven Mile Road. Come to the night having studied your passage (take notes on verses, read commentaries, etc). We will talk through the process of studying a passage and will group-study our various passages. Each person is then responsible to further study your portion and develop an outline/manuscript before the next meeting.

June 4 :: Developing Your Outline & Manuscript

Seven Mile Road, 6-9pm

Each of us will come to the night having developed either a very meaty outline or a full manuscript (based on personal preference). As a group, we will review one another's outlines and give honest and helpful feedback.

July 2:: Delivering Your Sermon

Seven Mile Road, 6-9pm

Each of us will preach to the others in the group. We will then give honest and helpful feedback. By this point, our focus will not be on content (to be dealt with in previous sessions) but on mechanics of communication and overall delivery.

6. Would your non-Christian friend have been able to follow along with the content/terminology? Would you want your friend to hear this sermon? Why or why not?
7. Did the preacher seem to believe what he was saying?
8. Describe the effect the sermon had on you.
