COMMISSIONER'S WELCOME



While the 2019-20 academic year brought unprecedented challenges, the dedication and resiliency of our Atlantic Coast Conference student-athletes, coaches and administrators continued to set the highest standard. That won't be forgotten, even as we eagerly anticipate returning to the universities we love and the passion that is college athletics.

With the COVID-19 pandemic forcing the cancellation of all competition following the second week of March, we will look back on 2019-20 with a certain sadness and thoughts of what might have been. At the same time, we will remember this year as one in which our student-athletes continued to excel in the classroom, and ACC teams again ranked among the nation's elite on the fields and courts of play.

The ACC's unique blend of public and private institutions continues to lead the way academically among Autonomy 5 conferences. This was again demonstrated in the "Best Colleges" rankings released by US News & World Report, as the ACC was the only Autonomy 5 conference to place six of its member institutions among the top 30 and seven member schools among the top 40. With an average rank of 54.7, the ACC led all FBS conferences for the 13th consecutive year.

Eighty-three ACC teams received Academic Progress Rate public recognition awards from the NCAA in May. The ACC has led all Autonomy 5 conferences in 14 of the 15 years since the NCAA began APR public recognition of Division I teams.

In the NCAA's Graduation Success Rate report released last November, the ACC's graduation rate of 92 percent ranked three points higher than the national average and led all Autonomy 5 conferences. Eighteen ACC teams achieved GSR scores of 100 in the sports of men's basketball, women's basketball and baseball.

Individually, our student-athletes excelled in the classroom with a record 5,611 being named to the 2019-20 ACC Honor Roll for earning a grade point average of 3.0 or better for the entire academic year.

The 2019-20 academic year will also be remembered for the launch of the much-anticipated launch of ACC Network last August. It proved a tremendous startup in every respect – viewership, talent, production and storytelling. The high level of commitment from our partners at ESPN has been truly gratifying.

Prior to the complications caused by COVID-19, the combined efforts of ACC Network and ACC Network Extra increased live viewership opportunities for our Championship and regular-season events to new levels, and we look forward raising the bar even higher.

The ACC added a national championship last November as the North Carolina field hockey team brought home its second straight NCAA title and the eighth overall under head coach Karen Shelton. Our conference teams own 161 national championships over the course of our 67-year history, and ACC student-athletes have claimed close to 330 individual NCAA titles.

This past year's ACC Football Championship Game at Charlotte's Bank of America Stadium attracted nearly 67,000 fans as Clemson defeated Virginia for its fifth consecutive conference title. The ACC then sent 10 teams to postseason bowl games. The 42 total ACC teams in bowl games over the past four years leads the nation, and 2019 marked the 19th consecutive year that at least six of our teams made bowl game appearances.

With Clemson advancing to the national title game, a conference team reached at least the semifinal round of national championship competition for the seventh straight year. The ACC ranks second among all conferences with 137 bowl appearances since 2005. The ACC is the only conference to send every member team to at least one bowl game over the previous four seasons (2016-19).

The COVID-19 pandemic forced cancellation of the final three rounds of the New York Life ACC Tournament and the entire NCAA Men's Basketball Championship, but ACC teams occupied their usual places in the national spotlight during the regular season. Four ACC teams were ranked in the final Associated Press poll: league champion Florida State (4), Duke (11), Louisville (14) and Virginia (16). This marked the seventh straight season in which the ACC had at least four teams in the top 25 of the final AP poll.

Greensboro, North Carolina, welcomed the New York Life ACC Tournament for a league-record 27th time. While this year's event ended prematurely, the conference looks forward to being back at the Greensboro Coliseum in 2023, following a return to Washington, D.C., next year and Brooklyn in 2022.

Following another successful ACC Women's Basketball Tournament at the Greensboro Coliseum, three league teams were ranked among the final top 25 with Louisville at No. 6, ACC champion NC State at No. 8 and Florida State at No. 19.

The ACC led all conferences with eight student-athletes selected in the 2020 WNBA Draft. It marked the second consecutive year that the ACC had more players chosen in the draft than any other conference, following a league-record 13 selections a season ago.

The ACC also made its mark in the Major League Baseball Draft as its six selections among the 29 in the first round tied for the most of any conference. The ACC has now had at least one player taken in the opening round of the MLB Draft for 29 consecutive years.

Overall, our conference remains poised to challenge at the national level. The ACC has won seven national championships in football, men's basketball, women's basketball and baseball since 2015. That is the most of any conference and the next closest has five. The ACC is the only conference to win each of those four titles over that stretch. The ACC shares the lead in football national titles since 2013 (three of the last seven) and more men's basketball national championships than any other league since 2015 (three of the last five).

As we weigh the changes of the recent months and prepare to move forward, the ACC and its member institutions remain poised to continue a long tradition of balancing athletics, academics and integrity. We look to the immediate future with high excitement and anticipation.

TRADITION *of* EXCELLENCE

Consistency. It is the mark of true excellence in any endeavor.

In today's intercollegiate athletics, competition is so balanced and so competitive that it is virtually impossible to maintain a high level of consistency. Yet the Atlantic Coast Conference has defied the odds.

Established in 1953, the ACC has long enjoyed the reputation as one of the strongest and most competitive intercollegiate conferences in the nation. And that is not mere conjecture, the numbers support it.

Through 67 years of competition, ACC schools have captured 161 NCAA team championships, including 80 in women's competition, 79 in men's sports and two in fencing. In addition, NCAA individual titles have gone to ACC student-athletes 186 times in men's competition and 141 times in women's action.

2019-20 IN REVIEW

The 2019-20 academic year saw all athletic competition come to an abrupt halt March 12 due to the outbreak of the COVID-19 pandemic. Prior to competition being canceled for the remainder of the academic year, the conference completed championship competition in 15 sports — seven for men and eight for women. The fall season also saw North Carolina's field hockey team capture its second consecutive NCAA title, and ACC teams were national contenders in numerous fall and winter sports. The ACC has averaged four national titles per year over the past two-plus decades (92 in 23 years) and has claimed multiple NCAA titles in 36 of the past 39 years.

Academically, the member institutions of the ACC again led the way among Power 5 conferences in the latest "Best Colleges" rankings released by US News & World Report. ACC member institutions combined for an average rank of 54.7, marking the 13th straight year that the ACC led all Power 5 conferences.

THE CHAMPIONSHIPS

The ACC conducts championship competition in all 27 sports — 13 for men and 14 for women. The first ACC championship was held in swimming at North Carolina State University on Feb. 25, 1954.

A HISTORY

The Atlantic Coast Conference was founded on May 8, 1953, at the Sedgefield Inn near Greensboro, North Carolina with seven charter members — Clemson, Duke, Maryland, North Carolina, North Carolina State, South Carolina and Wake Forest — drawing up the conference by-laws.

The withdrawal of seven schools from the Southern Conference came early on the morning of May 8, 1953, during the Southern Conference's annual spring meeting. On June 14, 1953, the seven members met in Raleigh, North Carolina, where a set of bylaws was adopted, and the name became officially the Atlantic Coast Conference.

Suggestions from fans for the name of the new conference appeared in the region's newspapers prior to the meeting in Raleigh. Some of the names suggested were Dixie, Mid-South, Mid-Atlantic, East Coast, Seaboard, Colonial, Tobacco, Blue-Gray, Piedmont, Southern Seven and the Shoreline.

Duke's Eddie Cameron recommended that the name of the conference be the Atlantic Coast Conference, and the motion was passed unanimously. The meeting concluded with each member institution assessed \$200.00 to pay for conference expenses.

On Dec. 4, 1953, conference officials met again at Sedgefield and officially admitted

The 13 sports for men include football, cross country, soccer, basketball, fencing, swimming & diving, indoor and outdoor track & field, wrestling, baseball, tennis, golf and lacrosse. Women's sports were initiated in 1977 with the first championship meet held in tennis October 6-8 at Wake Forest University. Championships for women are currently conducted in cross country, field hockey, soccer, basketball, fencing, swimming & diving, indoor and outdoor track & field, tennis, golf, lacrosse, softball and rowing, with volleyball deciding its champion by regular-season play.

Virginia as the league's eighth member. The first withdrawal of a school from the ACC came on June 30, 1971, when South Carolina tendered its resignation. The ACC operated with seven members until April 3, 1978, when Georgia Tech was admitted. The Atlanta school had withdrawn from the Southeastern Conference in January of 1964.

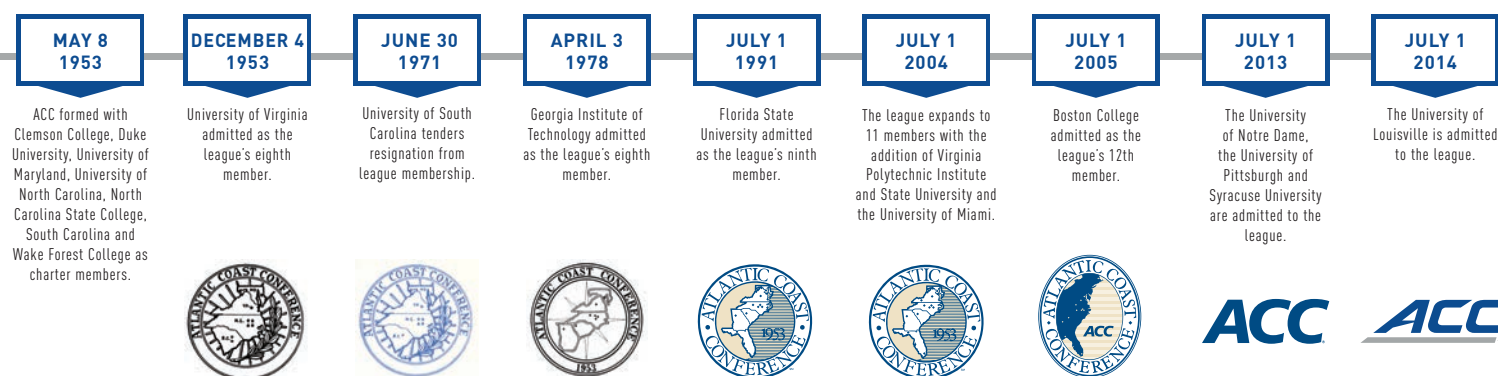
The ACC expanded to nine members on July 1, 1991, with the addition of Florida State.

The conference expanded to 11 members on July 1, 2004, with the addition of Miami and Virginia Tech. On Oct. 17, 2003, Boston College accepted an invitation to become the league's 12th member starting July 1, 2005.

The ACC added its 13th and 14th members on Sept. 18, 2011, when Pittsburgh and Syracuse accepted invitations to join the conference. The two schools officially joined the ACC on July 1, 2013. Notre Dame also officially joined the ACC on July 1, 2013, after announcing on Sept. 12, 2012 its intention to enter the league for competition in all sports but football, bringing the membership of the conference to 15. The Fighting Irish will play five games with ACC schools each year.

On July 1, 2014, Louisville entered the ACC on the same day Maryland withdrew, keeping the conference's membership at 15 institutions.

- **NC STATE**, buoyed by a gold medal from senior Elly Henes and a fourth-place showing by freshman Kelsey Chmiel, took home the league women's title for the fourth consecutive year and a conference-leading 25th time at the ACC Cross Country Championship held Nov. 1 at Virginia Tech.
- The ACC Championship is the program's fifth under the watch of head coach Laurie Henes, a former NC State All-American who ran on four ACC championship teams and was the league's gold medalist in 1991. While Elly Henes and Chmiel led the way, the Wolfpack added a 12th-place finish by Julia Zachgo, while Savannah Shaw placed 21st and Nevada Marenno 26th.
- Henes finished at 20:37.4. Virginia Tech's Sara Freix took second place in 20:48.7, and Notre Dame's Maddy Denner claimed the bronze medal with a time of 20:50.
- The NC State women, led by Elly Henes' 10th-place individual effort, led ACC women's teams with a fifth-place finish at the NCAA Championship on Nov. 23 at Terre Haute, Indiana. The ACC champion Wolfpack totaled 190 team points, 94 behind first-place Arkansas (96). It marks the fifth consecutive year the NC State women have placed among the top 15 at the NCAA finals. Florida State was second among ACC teams with a 12th-place finish.
- Henes led a trio of ACC-All America finishers with her time of 20:20.7. Notre Dame's Anna Rohrer placed 17th (20:28.3) to become the first four-time cross country All-American in school history. Rohrer's standout NCAA Championship finishes include the 2016 bronze medal and a 10th-place showing at least year's event. NC State's Chmiel capped her stellar freshman year by placing 22nd at 20:32.5.

- **SYRACUSE** claimed its sixth league title in seven seasons at the ACC Championship held Nov. 1 at Virginia Tech. The Orange placed six runners among the top 19 to finish with 68 points, five ahead of second-place Notre Dame. Host Virginia Tech took third place with an even 100 points.
- Virginia Tech senior Peter Seufer, expertly navigating wet and muddy conditions on his home course, took control of the men's race early to claim his second consecutive ACC gold medal.
- With his winning time of 23:42.7, Seufer crossed the finish line nearly 39 seconds ahead of runner-up Yared Nuguse of Notre Dame. Nuguse, last year's bronze medalist, checked in at 24:21.6, while NC State junior Ian Shanklin was third at 24:22.7. Wake Forest sophomore Zach Facioni, the 2018 silver medalist,

- took fourth this year with a time of 24:32.5.
- Notre Dame led all ACC teams with an eighth-place finish at the 2019 NCAA Championship on Nov. 23 at Terre Haute, Indiana. Virginia Tech's Seufer led all ACC runners with a fourth-place time of 30:40.1 on the 10k course.
- Seufer, coming off ACC and NCAA South Regional Championships, led the 10K finale as late as the 8K split and eventually placed just one-tenth of a second shy of the bronze medal. Seufer's fourth-place finish was the highest in Virginia Tech program history.
- Dylan Jacobs' All-America 29th-place individual finish of 31:12.9 led Notre Dame's top-10 team showing. The ACC picked up a third All-America finish from NC State's Shanklin, who crossed the finish line at 31:19.3.

- Top-seeded **NORTH CAROLINA** completed its second consecutive perfect season and captured the school's eighth NCAA Field Hockey Championship with a 6-1 win over Princeton on Nov. 24, at Wake Forest's Kentner Stadium.
- UNC sophomore Erin Matson was named the NCAA Tournament's Most Outstanding Player after scoring a combined six goals in a semifinal win over Boston College and the title game win over Princeton.
- It marked the third time in NCAA history that a team has gone back-to-back with undefeated seasons and the first time by an ACC program.
- North Carolina won its eighth NCAA title on the same field where the Tar Heels won their second, in 1995, and their sixth, in 2009.
- UNC also claimed the ACC Championship for the 22nd time, defeating second-seeded host Boston College, 3-1, in the title game on Nov. 10.
- Tar Heel senior Marissa Creatore was voted the ACC Championship Most Valuable Player.
- Virginia coach Michele Madison and Wake Forest coach Jen Averill both reached the 400-win milestone during the 2019

regular season. Three ACC coaches have now won at least 400 career matches.

- Three ACC teams advanced to the semifinals of the 2019 NCAA Division I Field Hockey Championship with third-seeded Virginia and Boston College joining top-seeded North Carolina.
- Six of the ACC's seven field hockey teams earned NCAA bids in 2019.
- NCAA Most Outstanding Player Matson was joined on the All-NCAA Championship Team by three teammates: senior Yentl Leemans and juniors Amanda Hendry and Eva Smolenaars.
- Four other ACC players earned spots on the All-NCAA Championship Team: Brigid Wood and Margo Carlin of Boston College, and Rachel Robinson and Amber Ezechiels of Virginia.
- ACC teams have now won 20 NCAA Field Hockey Championships, including 13 of the last 19.
- This season marked the 20th time in the last 21 NCAA Field Hockey Championships – and the 28th time in the last 31 years – that the ACC placed at least one team in the title game.
- In the ACC's 38 years as an NCAA Division I Field Hockey conference, league teams have accounted for more than half the total appearances in the national title game (41 of 76).

- Top-seeded **NORTH CAROLINA** Carolina won the 2019 ACC Women's Soccer Championship with a 2-1 double overtime victory against third-seeded Virginia.
- The Tar Heels advanced to the NCAA Women's College Cup for the second consecutive season and the 29th time in program history, finishing as the national runner-up.
- The ACC has placed a team in the NCAA Women's College Cup in 37 of the 38 NCAA Championships and in each of the past 15 years.
- ACC teams have advanced to the NCAA Women's College Cup 51 times, which is the most of any conference (with the next closest conference at 27). Current league members have combined for 63 appearances.
- Headlined by three No. 1 seeds, nine ACC women's soccer teams (Clemson, Duke, Florida State, Louisville, NC State, North Carolina, Notre Dame, Virginia and Virginia Tech) were selected to compete in the 2019 NCAA Championship.
- The ACC's nine teams were tied for the most of any league. All nine teams hosted a first-round match-up, and it marked the 11th time in the last 12 years that at least eight league teams have been selected to the NCAA Tournament.
- Florida State, North Carolina and Virginia each earned a No. 1 seed, marking the first time one conference has accounted for three top seeds since 2013, when all four No. 1 seeds were from the ACC.
- For the second time in the last three years, eight ACC teams advanced to the second round of the NCAA Championship, which were the most of any conference.
- Six ACC teams were ranked in the final United Soccer Coaches Poll, the most of any conference. The ACC had more ranked teams than any other conference in every poll this season (14 total).
- Ten ACC student-athletes earned United Soccer Coaches All-America honors, the most of any conference.
- North Carolina's coaching staff was recognized as the United Soccer Coaches Atlantic Region Staff of the Year and head coach Anson Dorrance was also the ACC Coach of the Year.
- The ACC finished the year with a 30-16-2 record against other Power Five conferences, highlighted by a winning record against each.

- **VIRGINIA** claimed the 2019 ACC Men's Soccer Championship after wins over Syracuse (2-1) in the quarterfinals, Wake Forest (1-0) in the semifinals and Clemson (3-1) in the title game. This was the Cavaliers' 16th ACC Men's Soccer title.
- Ten ACC teams — Boston College, Clemson, Louisville, NC State, Notre Dame, Pitt, Syracuse, Virginia, Virginia Tech and Wake Forest — earned bids to the 2019 NCAA Division I Men's Soccer Championship, breaking the ACC's own NCAA record of nine teams that was set in 2016 and matched the previous two seasons.
- Four of the ACC's 10 NCAA teams earned national seeds, including three of the top four seeds.
- The ACC had eight teams advance to the third round of the NCAA Championship, with Virginia and Wake Forest reaching the NCAA College Cup and Virginia advancing to the championship game.
- Five ACC teams were ranked in the final United Soccer Coaches Top 25, led by No. 2 Virginia. No. 3 Wake Forest was followed by No. 5 Clemson, No. 13 Virginia Tech and No. 20 Louisville.
- An ACC team held the No. 1 ranking in the United Soccer Coaches poll for eight weeks during the season.
- Nine from the ACC earned United Soccer Coaches All-America honors. Virginia goalkeeper Colin Shutler, Virginia midfielder Joe Bell, Wake Forest midfielder Bruno Lapa and Clemson forward Robbie Robinson were first-team selections, while Virginia defender Henry Kessler, Clemson midfielder Phillip Mayaka and Clemson forward Kimarni Smith were named to the second team. Virginia junior forward Daryl Dike and Clemson senior defender Malick Mbaye were tabbed on the third team.

- **Pitt** finished as the 2019 ACC Volleyball Champion and earned the league's automatic qualifying spot in the NCAA Division I Women's Volleyball Championship.
- The ACC title was the third straight for the Panthers and their second outright league championship. Pitt shared the title with Louisville in 2017.
- Pitt finished atop the ACC standings with an 18-0 league record and won 29 of 30 regular-season matches.
- Four teams earned NCAA bids: Florida State, Louisville, Notre Dame and Pitt. The Panthers earned the No. 6 seed and the Cardinals advanced to the regional finals.
- Georgia Tech won the NIVC after sweeping South Dakota for

the title. The Yellow Jackets defeated Alabama A&M, Troy, Liberty and TCU to reach the finals.

- Pitt's Kayla Lund was awarded Second-Team All-America honors, East Coast Region Player of the Year and ACC Player of the Year.
- Georgia Tech's Julia Bergmann received East Coast Region Freshman of the Year and ACC Freshman of the Year while her coach Michelle Collier received East Coast Region Coach of the Year and ACC Coach of the Year.
- Georgia Tech's Matti McKissock was named the ACC Setter of the Year and Florida State's Taryn Knuth was named the ACC Defensive Player of the Year.

2019 CHAMPION CLEMSON



- **Clemson** won its fifth consecutive league title in 2019 with a 62-17 win over Virginia in the ACC Football Championship Game in Charlotte, North Carolina. The Tigers earned a berth in the College Football Playoff semifinals, where they defeated No. 2 Ohio State, 29-23, before falling to No. 1 LSU, 42-25, in the CFP National Championship Game in New Orleans, Louisiana. The Tigers finished 14-1 overall and No. 2 in the final AP Top 25 poll.
- Virginia became the seventh different team in the last seven years to win the Coastal Division. The Cavaliers earned their first bid to the ACC Football Championship Game and played in the Capital One Orange Bowl. Virginia is the 11th different ACC team to play in the league's football championship game since the game began in 2005.
- The ACC landed a nation's best 10 bowl bids. It is the second consecutive season the ACC has had the most bowl teams of any conference (11 in 2018).
- The ACC has the most bowl teams (42) among all conferences over the last four years (11 in 2016, 10 in 2017, 11 in 2018, 10 in 2019) and the ACC is the only conference to send every team to at least one bowl game over the previous four seasons (2016-19).
- The ACC led all Power 5 conferences with 24 games decided by one possession (8 points or less).
- Clemson's 29-game win streak, which came to an end in the CFP National Championship Game, tied Florida State for the longest in ACC history.
- Louisville was one of the most improved teams in the country in 2019, improving from 2-10 in 2018 to 8-5 in 2019. Only Navy and Central Michigan improved by more games than the Cardinals. Louisville did not win an ACC game in 2018 but improved to 5-3 and second place in the Atlantic Division in 2019.
- Boston College became the first team other than Georgia Tech to lead the ACC in rushing since 2006. The Eagles led the league with 253.2 rushing yards per game.
- Florida State running back Cam Akers led the ACC and was sixth nationally with 10.0 points per game.
- Pitt led the nation with 3.92 sacks per game, which is the highest average in the ACC since FSU also averaged 3.92 in 2016.
- ACC Defensive Player of the Year Isaiah Simmons of Clemson won the 2019 Butkus Award, presented annually to the nation's top linebacker. Simmons becomes the first Clemson player to earn the honor in the award's 35-year history. Simmons is the first ACC player to collect the award since Boston College's Luke Kuechly in 2011.
- Clemson junior running back Travis Etienne became the ACC's all-time leader in rushing touchdowns (56) and total touchdowns (62).
- Virginia kick returner Joe Reed (2016-19) became the second player in ACC history with 3,000 kickoff return yards (3,042).
- Boston College running back AJ Dillon, who elected to forgo the bowl game and enter the 2020 NFL Draft, finished his stellar career with 4,382 rushing yards and joined Dalvin Cook (FSU), Travis Etienne (CU) and Lamar Jackson (UL) as the only ACC players to post 4,000 rushing yards in three seasons. Dillon is fourth in ACC career rushing yards.
- Dillon set the ACC career record for rushing yards per game with 125.2, ahead of FSU's Dalvin Cook (117.5 ypg from 2014-16).
- ACC Freshman of the Year Sam Howell of North Carolina threw 38 touchdown passes in 2019, the third-highest single-season total in ACC history, the most ever by an ACC true freshman and the second-highest total by any freshman.
- Howell led the ACC and ranked fourth in the country with 38 TD passes, while throwing just seven interceptions. Clemson's Trevor Lawrence tossed 36 touchdown passes, which was fifth in the country.
- Lawrence's 66 career touchdown passes over his first two seasons is an ACC record, and is the 11th highest total overall in league history.
- Wake Forest place-kicker Nick Sciba made an NCAA-record 34 consecutive field goals from 2018-19. Sciba made his last 11 attempts of 2018 and the first 23 in 2019 to surpass the previous mark of 30 straight held by Chuck Nelson of Washington from 1981-82.
- Two coaching changes were made in December as Jeff Hafley, former defensive coordinator at Ohio State, was hired at Boston College, and Mike Norvell was hired at Florida State after a successful stint at Memphis.

ACC FOOTBALL CHAMPIONSHIP GAME

On December 7, Clemson defeated Virginia to capture the 2019 ACC Football Championship title in front of more than 500 credentialed media and a primetime national television audience on ABC. Details and information on FanFest, Varsity Cheer Clinic, Kids Combine, Fan 5K and various outreach initiatives were distributed across all ACC platforms and promoted socially. Clips of walk-throughs, pregame and postgame press conferences, and other championship-related content were provided to the media through the ACC Media Portal. The ACC Football Championship Game App featured social streams, live stats and event information. Press conferences were streamed live on theACC.com, with transcripts provided by ASAP.



- The annual ACC Fan 5K and Kids Mascot Run presented by Atrium Health took place the morning of the ACC Football Championship Game, with proceeds benefiting United Way of Central Carolinas. In addition to more than 750 runners, all of the ACC mascots joined in the festivities.
- The annual Varsity Cheer Practice for Performance was held in partnership with Varsity Spirit. The event provided youth cheerleaders the opportunity to receive private instruction from world renowned Varsity staff. This initiative sold 2,000 game tickets.
- The ACC Football Kids' Combine was held at FanFest in the Charlotte Convention Center. Held in partnership with USA Football and Dick's Sporting Goods, the combine tested 200 participants grades 1-8 on their skills in five areas: 40-yard dash, vertical leap, three-cone drill, W-drill, and quarterback toss.
- The ACC continued its 14-year collaboration with Wounded Warrior Project® (WWP) to invite WWP injured service members and their guests to the ACC Football Championship Game. The four invited WWP families enjoyed VIP experience at the game, and the heroes took part in a ceremony in between the third and fourth quarters.
- The ACC continued an initiative to recognize local Teachers of the Year, by inviting them to ACC Championship events. The Charlotte Mecklenburg Schools 2019 Teacher of the Year finalists and their guests were invited to attend the game. Each teacher received a \$2,500 DonorsChoose.org gift card, presented by the ACC in partnership with the College Football Playoff Extra Yard for Teachers Initiative.



FANFEST

In partnership with ESPN and its event agency, Etzel, the ACC hosted its FanFest event over consecutive days (Dec. 6-7) leading up to the 2019 ACC Football Championship. Fans of all ages enjoyed a passing accuracy station and 40-yard dash held on a half-sized turf football field, a field goal kicking station, gaming consoles, the Capital One Orange Bowl RV, the CFP Extra Yard for Teachers bus, an ESPN/ACC set and several photo opportunities with the ACC Football mega trophy and life-sized mannequins representing each of the league's football member institutions.

The event included activities and programming such as chalk talks, fan trivia, mascot meet and greets, a Packer and Durham show live broadcast, and ACCN talent appearances.

EXTRA YARD FOR TEACHERS

In partnership with the College Football Playoff Foundation's Extra Yard for Teachers initiative, the ACC provided more than \$150,000 to fully fund 367 classroom projects in Charlotte and the two participating teams' communities of Clemson and Charlottesville as part of the 2019 ACC Football Championship Game. In total, more than 43,000 students and nearly 300 teachers at 100 schools received financial support. Multiple press releases, graphics, and videos were distributed and promoted across all ACC platforms throughout the fall. The initiatives continued a regular-season partnership with the Extra Yard for Teachers Foundation, during which the ACC promoted EYFT Week across platforms.



UNITED WAY PARTNERSHIP

The ACC and United Way of Central Carolinas continued their partnership that began in 2015 to support student literacy through the ACC United Way Reading Challenge, a charitable initiative associated with the ACC Football Championship Game. Releases on the partnership and initiatives surrounding the game, including a mascot visit to a local school, were distributed across all ACC platforms and promoted socially. The partnership focuses on improving reading proficiency, a key component to raising the high school graduation rate for at-risk students. Select children were provided with an outing to the ACC Football Championship Game and were recognized on the field at Bank of America Stadium.



SCHEDULE RELEASE

The 2020 ACC Football schedule was released on January 22 on ACCN's Packer and Durham. The release highlighted message points regarding the challenging upcoming schedule. For example, in 2020 the ACC teams will play more games (19) against Power 5 competition (including Notre Dame) than any of their peers. Additionally, ACC teams will play more games against non-conference teams (15) ranked in last year's final Associated Press Top 25 than any other Power 5 conference.

In addition to the release, a logo schedule, team-by-team schedule, and composite schedule was released. Graphics outlining message points on the strength of the schedule were distributed across ACC platforms.



NFL DRAFT

Three ACC football players were selected in the first round of the 2020 National Football League Draft. The ACC has had 89 first-round draft picks in the last 16 years, beginning with the 2005 draft. That is second-highest total among all conferences. The league finished with 27 picks representing 13 different institutions.



DREAM ON 3

The ACC partnered with Dream on 3, a Charlotte non-profit that focuses on making sports dreams come true for children with life-threatening or life-altering conditions, to invite Dream Kid Zane to a special ACC Football Championship experience. Zane, accompanied by his parents and brothers, went on a stadium tour, stood sideline during pre-game warmups, met Coach Dabo Swinney and the league's mascots, and cheered on the Clemson Tigers to an ACC Championship title.



CFB 150

The ACC participated in the celebration of college football's 150th anniversary throughout the season. CFB 150 officials were invited to present at ACC Football Kickoff and the league participated in the Give A Kid A Football challenge. Anniversary information and content was distributed throughout the regular season, including through ACC weekly football press releases.



ACC IN BOWL GAMES

The ACC led all conferences with 10 bowl bids, including Clemson's fifth consecutive return to the College Football Playoff.

Over the last four years (2016-19), the ACC has placed a nation's best 42 teams in bowl games and is the only conference to send every team to at least one bowl game. As teams were announced during the bowl selection show, individual graphics were distributed across Twitter, Facebook and Instagram.

Schedule graphics were made prior to each bowl game and score bugs were posted on social media. Additional graphics related to bowl success, such as Clemson's National Championship appearance, were produced.

A page dedicated to ACC teams in bowl games was built, complete with times, television partners, links to bowl websites, and watch links. Scores and recaps were also posted to the website following the games.

ACC FOOTBALL KICKOFF

Held at The Westin Charlotte on July 17-18, the ACC's 14 head football coaches and 28 student-athletes gathered to meet with more than 500 credentialed media members. ESPN aired live shows from the event, and the media contingency included multiple ESPN platforms, as well as national, regional and local radio, print, web, and television entities. Press conferences with coaches and student-athletes were streamed live on ACC Network Extra, the ACCDN, and theACC.com. Player and coach press conferences, returning player highlights, footage from the Commissioner's Forum and other videos were posted on the ACC Media Portal. In addition, there was on-site media availability with ACC Commissioner Swofford and the ACC's Coordinator of Football Officials.

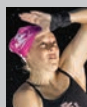

- **NC STATE** won its sixth straight ACC Men's Swimming & Diving Championship held at the Greensboro Aquatic Center. Virginia placed second, followed by Louisville in third.
- NC State's Coleman Stewart was named the ACC Swimmer of the Year and Most Valuable Swimmer of the ACC Championships after winning gold in the 100 and 200 backstroke races. The junior was also part of the winning squads on the 200 medley and 400 freestyle relays.
- The Wolfpack's James Brady was named the ACC Diver of the Year and the ACC Championships Most Valuable Diver after winning the 3-meter competition and diving in the finals of the 1-meter and platform events.
- Louisville's Nicolas Albiero was selected as the Scholar-Athlete of the Year. The junior won the 100 and 200 butterfly races.
- In total, seven ACC men's swim & dive teams finished in the final CSCAA Top 25, the most of any conference. NC State led the league at No. 5, followed by No. 9 Louisville, No. 14 Florida State, No. 15 Virginia, No. 18 Notre Dame, No. 19 Virginia Tech and No. 23 North Carolina.
- With the NCAA Championships canceled due to the COVID-19 pandemic, more than 160 ACC student-athletes received CSCAA All-America honors. The CSCAA altered its selection criteria to account for the canceled NCAA Championships.

- The **NOTRE DAME** women were ranked No. 3 nationally in the last CollegeFencing360 poll.
- Notre Dame won the team title at the 2020 ACC Fencing Championships, earning its second straight ACC championship and its fifth in the last six seasons. The Fighting Irish went 3-0 in the team competition with dominating victories over Boston College (19-8), North Carolina (22-5) and Duke (18-9).
- Notre Dame's Miriam Grady (epee) was named the Most Valuable Fencer at the ACC Championships.
- In the individual competition at the ACC Championships, Notre Dame swept the three gold medals: Grady (epee), Stefani Deschner (foil) and Kara Linder (sabre). Grady and Linder

- each won individual crowns for the second straight season.
- The Fighting Irish also picked up a silver and two bronzes in the individual championships. Duke won two silver medals, while Boston College earned a bronze.
- Ten ACC fencers qualified for the NCAA Championships (Notre Dame 6, Duke 2, Boston College 1, North Carolina 1), which ultimately were canceled because of the COVID-19 pandemic.
- Notre Dame joined Ohio State and Princeton as the lone programs to qualify the maximum of 12 fencers to the NCAA Championships (two per weapon, men and women). The Irish are the lone program nationally to qualify 12 to the NCAA Championships in each of the last six seasons.

- Notre Dame won the team title at the 2020 ACC Fencing Championships, capturing its second straight ACC championship as well as its fifth in the last six years. The Fighting Irish went 3-0 in the team competition with triumphs against Boston College (18-9), North Carolina (19-8) and Duke (16-11).
- Notre Dame's Marcello Olivares (sabre) was named the Most Valuable Fencer at the ACC Championships.
- In the individual competition at the ACC Championships, Notre Dame swept the three gold medals, as Josiah Broughton (epee), Andrew Machovec (foil) and Alessandro Contreras

(sabre) claimed the top spot on the podium for their respective weapons. The Irish also claimed a silver and two bronzes, while Duke earned two silvers and a bronze.

- Fifteen ACC fencers qualified for the NCAA Championships (Notre Dame 6, Duke 5, Boston College 2, North Carolina 2), which ultimately were canceled because of the COVID-19 pandemic.
- Notre Dame joined Ohio State and Princeton as the lone programs to qualify the maximum of 12 fencers to the NCAA Championships (two per weapon, men and women). The Irish are the lone program nationally to qualify 12 to the NCAA Championships in each of the last six seasons.

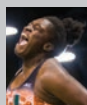

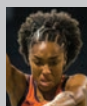

- The **VIRGINIA TECH** women captured their third conference championship during three days of competition at the ACC Indoor Track and Field Championships held Feb. 27-29 at Notre Dame's Loftus Sport Center.
- The Hokies' ACC title was their third in 16 seasons as a conference member and first since back-to-back championships in 2007 and 2008. All three titles have come under the watch of veteran head coach Dave Cianelli.
- Virginia Tech's women scored 105.5 points at the ACC Championships, well ahead of second-place Miami (73) and third-place Notre Dame (61).
- One ACC record fell during the regular season as Notre Dame's Rachel Tanczos' winning throw of 23.31 meters (76-5.75) on her first attempt at the Alex Wilson Invitational broke a league mark that had stood since 2002. Tanczos topped her own school record and ranks 11th all-time in NCAA Indoor Track and Field history.
- Tanczos became the first Notre Dame women's indoor track and field competitor to be named National Athlete of the Week by the USTFCCA and finished the season ranked No. 1 nationally among NCAA Division I women's weight throwers with her mark of 23.31 meters.
- Miami's Debbie Ajagbe set an ACC Championship meet record in the women's weight throw with her throw of 22.55 meters on her final attempt.
- Florida State junior sprinter Ka'Tia Seymour became the first student-athlete to claim ACC Indoor Championship Women's Track MVP honors three consecutive times. Seymour won the 200 meters for the third consecutive year with a meet and Loftus Center record time of 22.82 and claimed the gold medal in the 60-meter dash for the third year in a row. She also ran the anchor leg on FSU's bronze medal 4x400 relay team.

- **FLORIDA STATE** claimed its 13th ACC Men's Indoor Track and Field Championship and its 11th under head coach Bob Braman held Feb. 27-29 at Notre Dame's Loftus Sports Center.
- The Seminole men scored 140 points — the most by an ACC men's champion in seven years and the most since the conference expanded to 15 teams in 2014. Virginia Tech placed second with 109, followed by Virginia with 87.
- Virginia Tech distance runner Peter Seuffer was awarded the ACC Men's Track MVP after earning 20 points with a first-place finish in the 5k on Friday night and another gold medal in the 3k on Saturday. It continued a vintage running season for the Hokie senior, who was ACC Cross Country champion and Performer of the Year in the fall.
- Virginia senior Jordan Scott took home Men's Field MVP honors after winning the triple jump for the third consecutive year and adding a fifth-place finish in the long jump.
- Scott and Florida State 60-meter hurdler Trey Cunningham earned spots on the Bowerman watch list after setting ACC

records in their respective events during the regular season. Scott broke his own mark in the triple jump with a distance of 17.02 meters, while Cunningham set a new standard in the 60-meter hurdles with a time of 7.51. Both were nation-leading marks in 2020.

- The Notre Dame distance medley relay team of Dylan Jacobs (1200), Edward Cheatham (400), Sam Voelz (800) and Yared Nuguse (1600) also ran its way into the record book on Feb. 22 with a time of 9:25.80 that stands as the program, track and ACC record. It is also the second fastest time ever recorded in NCAA indoor track and field history for the event.
- Notre Dame's Nuguse set a meet, school and facility record with a blazing time of 3:55.62 in the men's mile at the ACC Championships on Feb. 29. Nuguse erased the previous ACC meet record of 3:56.40 by North Carolina's Tony Waldrop that had stood since 1974, while winning the mile for the second consecutive year.

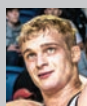

David McFadden, *Virginia Tech*

- **NC STATE** captured its 17th ACC Wrestling Championship title on March 8 at Pitt's Petersen Events Center. The conference title was the Wolfpack's second straight, and the 17th overall, which matches North Carolina for the most among current ACC teams.
- NC State finished with 81 points to edge the host Panthers, who followed with 77. North Carolina took third place with 67.5 points, followed by Virginia (60.5), Virginia Tech (52) and Duke (2).
- The ACC Championships capped a season in which a league-record four of the conference's six teams finished ranked among the nation's top nine with NC State at No. 3, North Carolina at No. 7, Pitt at No. 8 and Virginia Tech at No. 9.
- NC State (15-0) posted the first unbeaten dual season in the 91-year history of the program.
- Though the 2020 NCAA Championships were canceled due to the COVID-19 pandemic, the ACC saw 38 wrestlers qualify for the event — 35 automatic qualifiers and three at-large selections. The automatic qualifiers included three wrestlers seeded No. 2 in their respective weight classes — North Carolina's Austin O'Connor (149), NC State's Hayden Hidlay (157) and Virginia Tech's Hunter Bolen (184).
- A total of 12 ACC wrestlers were ranked among the NCAA's top 10 in their respective weight classes, including three at 184 pounds.
- Twenty-two ACC student-athletes were listed among the top 20 of their individual weight classes in the final InterMat regular-season rankings, including 12 among the top 10.
- Seventeen ACC wrestlers earned NWCA All-America honors, including six ACC champions on the first teams — Pitt's Micky Phillippi (133 pounds), North Carolina's Austin O'Connor (149), NC State's Hayden Hidlay (157), Virginia Tech's Hunter Bolen (184), Virginia's Jay Aiello (197) and Pitt's Demetrius Thomas (285). Other first-team honorees included Virginia's Jack Mueller (125), Virginia Tech's David McFadden (165) and NC State's Trent Hidlay (184).
- Three more ACC champions were among five conference wrestlers named to the second team — NC State's Jakob Camacho (125), North Carolina's Zach Sherman (141) and Pitt's Jake Wentzel (165). Other second-team selections included NC State's Thomas Bullard (165) and Pitt's Nino Bonaccorsi (184).

2020 CHAMPION **NC STATE**



- Aislinn Konig and Elissa Cunane each scored 18 points to lead second seed **NC STATE** to its first Atlantic Coast Conference Tournament championship in 29 years, as the Wolfpack beat fourth seed Florida State 71-66 in the finals on March 8 at the Greensboro Coliseum.
- Konig was named the tournament's MVP, after averaging 16.7 points per game and making 10 3-point field goals in just three games.
- Louisville claimed its first outright ACC regular-season title, after sharing the regular-season title in each of the past two seasons. Louisville was the No. 1 seed in the 2020 ACC Tournament for the second time since joining the conference.
- A season-high six teams were ranked in the Associated Press poll during the season, which tied for the most for any conference. The ACC is the only conference to have three teams ranked in the top 10 of the AP poll at the same time in each of the past seven years.
- Three ACC teams finished the year in the AP Top 25 with Louisville leading the way at No. 6, followed by No. 8 NC State and No. 19 Florida State.
- The conference had between three and six teams ranked in every poll with three teams among the top 10 in December.
- At least four ACC players were named to each All-America list, highlighted by eight on the WBCA Team, which tied for the most of any conference.
- The conference had a total of five players who were named among the nation's five best players at their respective positions, including two shooting guards, two centers and a power forward.
- For the third consecutive season, a Louisville guard earned the ACC Player of the Year honor as junior Dana Evans captured the honor in 2019-20.
- After leading Boston College to a program-record 11 ACC wins, Joanna Bernabei-McNamee was voted the league's Coach of the year.
- The ACC led all conferences with eight student-athletes selected in the 2020 WNBA Draft. It marked the second consecutive year the ACC had more players chosen in the draft than any other conference, following a league-record 13 selections a year ago.
- The ACC has now had at least one first-round selection in each of the past 15 WNBA Drafts, the most of any conference. The next-longest streak by any conference is six.

ACC WOMEN'S BASKETBALL TOURNAMENT

More than 300 credentialed media attended the 2020 ACC Women's Basketball Tournament at the Greensboro Coliseum, March 4-8. All 14 games were broadcast either on the league's regional sports networks or ESPN platforms. Releases on various outreach initiatives were distributed across all ACC platforms and promoted socially. All postgame press conferences were streamed live on ACC Network Extra, with transcripts provided by ASAP.



- Attendance for the 2020 ACC Women's Basketball Tournament was 51,893, which provided the highest gross ticket sales revenue in the past six seasons and a 12% increase over the previous year.
- Marketing activation took place at the ACC Women's Basketball Tournament to engage fans and provide a positive experience for participating student-athletes and attendees. Promotions included:
 - FanFest
 - Hoops for Kids
 - Boys and Girls Club
 - Mascot outreach - School Visit at Greene Elementary and Food Lion Store Visit
 - Mascot Night
 - In-arena emcee and DJ
 - Championship Game Food Drive
- Marketing and promotional activities were utilized to drive awareness and ticket sales for the 2020 ACC Women's Basketball Tournament. In a continued effort to better understand the fanbase and effective methods, trackable advertising on digital and social channels and in print were implemented. Initiatives included:
 - Facebook/Instagram advertising for FanFest, VIP Experience and general ticket sales
 - Regular season game program ad (for schools)
 - Ads (print, TV, digital, billboards) in/around the Greensboro area
 - Videoboard graphics (regular season)
 - Grassroots efforts with local grade schools and business community
- Special ticket sales initiatives included the Bojangles' Four Pack, Family Pick Your Pack, School Day, and IMGL Ticket Solutions game experiences (new)
- The ACC provided an enhanced level of branding at the Greensboro Coliseum with a unified ACC Basketball look in areas where appropriate. The ACC was also able to leverage several branding assets from previous years to create a cohesive, well-branded look in the arena. Among these items includes seat tarps, courtside banners, and major team tunnel and entrance branding.
- For the third consecutive year, the ACC partnered with Food Lion and Second Harvest Food Bank to raise awareness for hunger in the Greensboro area, while also encouraging people to attend the championship game. Fans received one free championship game ticket for every five canned goods they brought to the Coliseum on Sunday. More than 1,600 pounds of food were collected, and Food Lion matched each pound to donate more than 3,200 pounds to the Second Harvest Food Bank. A total of 255 tickets were distributed, an increase from 161 tickets the previous year.
- To grow its database of women's college basketball fans, the ACC continued an enter-to-win contest with the winner receiving a VIP trip to the ACC Women's Basketball Tournament. The strategy for contest promotion was altered slightly from past years to increase the quality of registrants to target folks who are more likely to be converted to a sale this year or in the future. The contest was promoted extensively via social media and theACC.com and received 1,935 entries.
- ACC Women's Basketball FanFest took on a new look during 2020. In partnership with media rights partner ESPN, the Etzel Agency was employed to develop an interactive experience for fans of all ages that included partner activations, as well as a host of basketball related activities and photo opportunities. The annual Hoops for Kids (HFK)



event was hosted in partnership with CP3 Basketball Academy across three dates at FanFest. CP3 utilized multiple mini-courts and a main court to host stations for the kids participating in HFK to hone their skills in a variety of areas. Each of the 419 youth participants received a free ACC basketball t-shirt, skills instruction, and a ticket to the Tournament. A total of 8,633 fans attended FanFest, a three-year high since the tournament's return to Greensboro.



- The ACC Women's Basketball Tournament continued its partnership with Earlier.org and, alongside the Greensboro Coliseum and Greensboro Foundation, presented the organization with a \$10,000 donation. Over the course of the 21-year relationship, ACC women's basketball has generated more than \$225,000 in support of their mission to identify a biological earlier detection test for breast cancer.
- Teacher of the Year and Wounded Warrior Project initiatives were highlighted during the 2020 tournament. Guilford County Teacher and Principal of the Year finalists were invited to attend the tournament and two warriors were honored prior to the championship game. Both initiatives are also featured at the ACC's Football Championship Game and Men's Basketball Tournament, among several others.

TIPOFF

Held at The Westin Charlotte on October 3, the ACC's 15 head coaches and 25 student-athletes gathered to meet with media members and television partners. National, regional and local media attended the event. An ACC Network set, hosted by Kelsey Riggs, Debbie Antonelli, Monica McNutt and LaChina Robinson, featured live player and coach interviews. Player and coach interviews conducted by ESPN and Raycom during the event aired during game broadcasts. Graphics and videos were published during and following the event on ACC social media platforms.

The ACC has now had at least one first-round selection in each of the past 15 WNBA Drafts, the most of any conference. The next-longest streak by a peer conference is six.

The ad ran in the Triad region from mid-February until early March and was also distributed to Raycom and member schools to run on their platforms.

BIG TEN/ACC CHALLENGE

The Big Ten/ACC Challenge, one of the most anticipated events of the non-conference season, provided regional and national exposure for the league on back-to-back nights (Wednesday, Dec. 4 and Thursday, Dec. 5).

To promote the Big Ten/ACC Challenge schedule announcement on June 18, 2019, an infographic, release and message points were distributed across all ACC platforms and promoted socially. In addition, the information was sent to the head coaches, women's basketball committee and SIDs. During the week of the Challenge, all Big Ten/ACC Challenge games were promoted socially with several graphics highlighting each day's matchups. Message points highlighting the ACC's success in the Challenge were also distributed.

The Big Ten clinched its first-ever win in the Big Ten/ACC Challenge, earning a 9-5 victory. The ACC holds a 94-66 overall record in the

challenge since its inception in 2007.

2020 CHAMPION FLORIDA STATE



- **FLORIDA STATE** won the ACC regular-season championship for the first time after going 16-4 in league play, a game ahead of Virginia, Louisville and Duke.
- The Seminoles were crowned the official ACC Champion and earned the league's automatic berth in the NCAA Tournament after the ACC Tournament was canceled because of the COVID-19 pandemic. It marked FSU's second ACC title (2012).
- Four ACC teams were ranked in the final Associated Press poll: No. 4 Florida State, No. 11 Duke, No. 14 Louisville and No. 16 Virginia. This marks the seventh straight season in which the ACC has had at least four teams in the final AP poll.
- Three ACC student-athletes earned AP All-America honors: Duke freshman center Vernon Carey Jr. (second team), Louisville junior forward Jordan Nwora (third team) and Duke sophomore guard Tre Jones (third team). Carey also earned the USBWA's Wayman Tisdale Award as the national freshman of the year.
- Jones won ACC Player of the Year and Defensive Player of the Year honors, becoming just the second ACC player to capture both awards in the same season (Virginia's Malcolm Brogdon, 2016).
- Eighty-three of the 150 conference games were determined by single digits (55.3%). Fifty-three came by five points or fewer (35.3%). Forty ACC games this were decided by three or fewer points or overtime (26.7%), most in the ACC since the conference expanded to 15 teams (previous: 34 in 2014-15).
- Notre Dame's John Mooney led the nation in double-doubles with 25. That tied for the fourth most in ACC history and tied for the third most in a season by an ACC player over the last 30 seasons.

NEW YORK LIFE ACC TOURNAMENT

The 2020 New York Life ACC Tournament was played before more than 750 national, regional, and local credentialed media at Greensboro Coliseum March 10-12. Games were streamed on ACCNX and broadcast nationally on ESPN networks, including the first day of play on ACC Network. On Thursday, March 12, the tournament was canceled due to COVID-19.

ACC Network broadcast live from the tournament, in the mornings from 7-10 with Packer & Durham, and in the evenings with postgame shows. ESPN's College GameDay was scheduled to broadcast live for the fifth straight year.

Clips of postgame press conferences were available on the ACC Media Portal, photos were available on PhotoShelter and quotes were published online and distributed to media. The ACC Tournament app featured social streams, live stats and event information. ASAP transcripts were provided to media following all postgame press conferences and Commissioner John Swofford's Thursday press conference.

- The ACC provided an enhanced level of branding at the Greensboro Coliseum with a unified ACC Basketball look in areas where appropriate. Teams were greeted at their entry point by a host of branding to let them know they had arrived at the event, including tournament branding in the locker rooms and hallways, as well as leading out to the court with a large tournament banner and logo accompanied by a lit up tournament trophy.



- Courtside signage was used to highlight the strength of ACC Basketball:

- Most Overall No. 1 NBA Draft Picks
- Most NCAA Tournament Victories & Appearances
- 5 of the top 10 winningest programs
- Multiple teams with perfect NCAA GSR
- 8 of the last 19 NCAA Championships
- 3 of the last 5 NCAA Championships

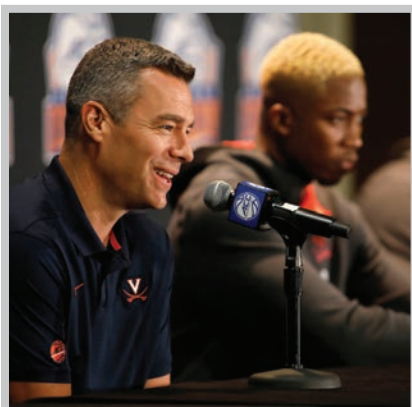
- For the fourth time, a public enter-to-win contest was conducted to attend the New York Life ACC Tournament. The strategy for contest promotion was altered slightly from the past to increase the quality of registrants to target folks who are more likely to be converted to a sale this year or in the future. With that, the contest was promoted extensively via social media and the ACC.com and received 26,504 entries.

- The ACC provided an enhanced fan experience for those attending the New York Life ACC Tournament by hosting ACC FanFest in the same footprint as the women's tournament the week prior. In partnership with media rights partner ESPN, the Etzel Agency was employed to develop an interactive experi-

ence for fans of all ages that included partner activations, as well as a host of basketball related activities and photo opportunities. Due to COVID-19, ACC FanFest was only open one day and attracted more than 2,100 fans.

- Before their community initiatives schedule was cut short, ACC school mascots visited students of Herbin-Metz Education Center and interacted with fans at FanFest.





OPERATION BASKETBALL

The league's annual Operation Basketball was held at the Marriott City Center in Uptown Charlotte on October 8. More than 300 media members were credentialed, including national, regional and local radio, print, digital and television outlets.

Coaches and student-athletes participated in live interviews from an on-site ACC Network set and appeared across a number of ESPN programs and platforms. Student-athlete and coach press conference excerpts, returning player highlights, footage of the Commissioner's Forum and photos were posted on the ACC Media Portal and Photoshelter.



NBA DRAFT

Due to the COVID-19 pandemic, the 2020 NBA Draft was postponed to October 16, 2020.

NCAA TOURNAMENT

Due to the COVID-19 pandemic, the 2020 NCAA Men's Basketball Tournament was canceled.

2019-20 REGULAR SEASON

Links to ACCNX broadcasts were shared with schools throughout the regular season. In addition, regular content was publicly released on all platforms including head coach teleconference information, Players of the Week, game recaps and updated statistics.



MBB SCHEDULE RELEASE

The 2019-20 ACC Men's Basketball conference schedule was unveiled on September 12 with a 1-hour special on ACC Network and fully announced on September 26 through a press release on theACC.com.

The ACC announced its 150-game regular season men's basketball schedule, including its first-ever 20-game conference slate, on September 26. Every conference game was available on ESPN networks, including ACC Network, or the conference's Regional Sports Networks (RSN). More than 100 games aired on ACC Network, including more than 60 conference games as well as two ACC Tournament matchups. In addition to the linear broadcast schedule, 30 non-conference ACC home games were broadcast online via ACC Network Extra.

MBB VIDEO SPOTS

To highlight ACC Basketball during television broadcasts, two ACC Basketball PSA's were created as part of the "Bring Your A Game" campaign for 2019-20. Similar to football, the first spot released in early November highlighted the atmosphere provided by the fans at our institutional venues, specifically the student sections. This was followed up in late January by a spot that featured game highlights from each of our 15 member schools.

BIG TEN/ACC CHALLENGE

The Big Ten/ACC Challenge, one of the most anticipated events on the college basketball calendar, provided national exposure for the league on three straight nights in early December across ESPN, ESPN2, and ESPNU. The 20th edition of the Big Ten/ACC Challenge featured all 14 games on the ESPN family of networks.

Graphics were created for both the matchup and schedule announcements and a release with messaging was distributed in advance of the Challenge.

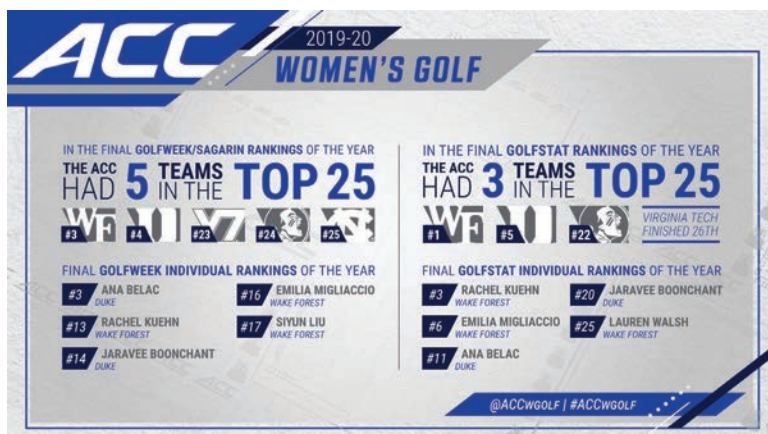

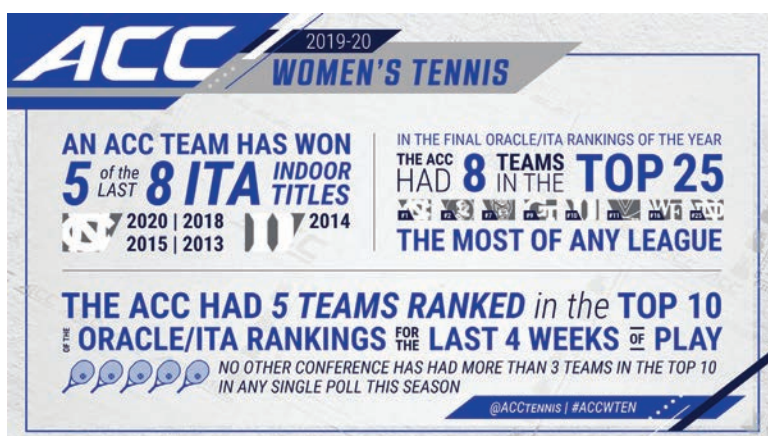

- Eight ACC golfers were named to the 2020 PING All-America Teams by the Golf Coaches Association of America. Earning second-team honors from the GCAA are Duke's Evan Katz and Adrien Pendaries, Florida State's John Pak, Georgia Tech's Andy Ogletree and Wake Forest's Mark Power. 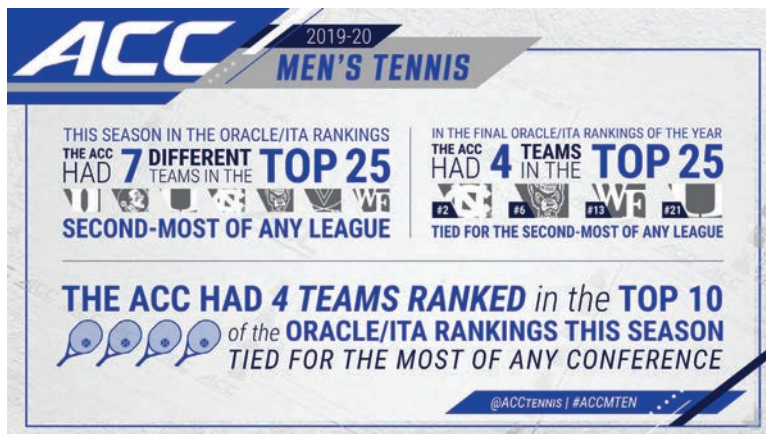
WOMEN'S TENNIS



- The ACC led all leagues with 17 student-athletes named to the ITA All-America teams, with 10 doubles players and seven singles players receiving the laurels. North Carolina tied for the most honors among all schools with five.
- All-American doubles pairs included Florida State's Victoria Allen and Petra Hule, Georgia Tech's Victoria Flores and Kenya Jones, NC State's Anna Rogers and Alana Smith, North Carolina's of Sara Daavettilla and Alexa Graham and Wake Forest's Mary Caroline Meredith and Aliza Omirou. In singles, the honor was claimed by Duke's Kelly Chen, Georgia Tech's Jones, Miami's Estela Perez-Somarriba, North Carolina's Daavettilla, Graham and Cameron Morra and Virginia's Natasha Subhash.

MEN'S TENNIS

- Seven ACC student-athletes were named to the ITA All-America teams, with four doubles players and three singles players earning the honor. North Carolina tied for the most All-Americans among all schools with five.
- North Carolina's Mac Kiger and Simon Soendergaard along with fellow teammates William Blumberg and Brian Cernoch were named All-Americans in doubles. Blumberg, NC State's Alexis Galarneau and Notre Dame's Richard Ciamarra were named All-Americans in singles.
- Blumberg has been named an ITA All-American eight times in his career, only the third student-athlete to accomplish the feat.



WOMEN'S LACROSSE



- 21 student-athletes from the ACC were named to the 2020 Inside Lacrosse All-America Team. Seven of the 21 were named First-Team All-Americans – both totals were the most among all conferences.
- North Carolina and Syracuse tied for the lead among all programs with five All-America honorees, while UNC topped all teams with three first-team selections. Notre Dame had four picks on the All-America team.
- UNC senior Katie Hoeg (attack), junior Jamie Ortega (attack) and Emma Trenchard (defender) were joined on the first team by Syracuse senior Emily Hawryschuk (attack), Duke sophomore Maddie Jenner (draw), Notre Dame junior Andie Aldave (midfielder) and Notre Dame junior Bridget Deehan (goalie).

MEN'S LACROSSE

- 23 student-athletes from the ACC's five programs were named to the 2020 Inside Lacrosse All-America Team, including five First-Team All-Americans – both totals were the most among all conferences.
- Each ACC program had at least two honorees on the team. Syracuse led all teams nationally with nine All-America selections. North Carolina recorded five picks, while Virginia had four, Notre Dame three and Duke two.
- Syracuse put a pair of players on the first team: Jamie Trimboli (midfield) and Brendan Curry (midfield). They were joined on the first team by North Carolina's Chris Gray (attack), Virginia's Jared Connors (LSM) and Duke's JT Giles-Harris (defense).

- When the 2020 collegiate baseball season was halted March 12 due to the COVID-19 pandemic, a total of eight ACC teams were ranked in at least one major poll, and none of the rankings featured fewer than five ACC teams. Top 10 rankings included Louisville (as high as No. 2), Miami (as high as No. 5), Duke (as high as No. 8) and NC State (as high as No. 9).
- The short season included several ACC coaching milestones — NC State's Elliott Avent notched his 1,100th career win when the Wolfpack blanked James Madison 4-0 on opening day. Avent is one of just eight active head coaches to reach that number, along with North Carolina's Mike Fox and Georgia Tech's Danny Hall. Wake Forest's Tom Walter picked up his 300th win as head coach of the Demon Deacons when Wake Forest defeated Brown 7-4 on Feb. 29. Walter owns 732 total wins in 24 seasons as a college head coach.
- ACC players netted a combined 11 National Pitcher of the Week accolades from the NCBWA and Collegiate Baseball before the season came to its abrupt halt.

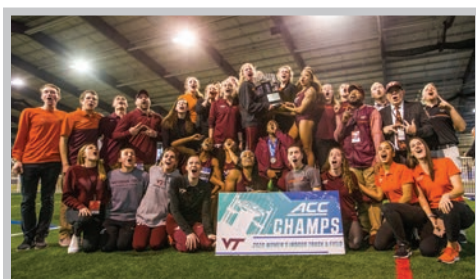

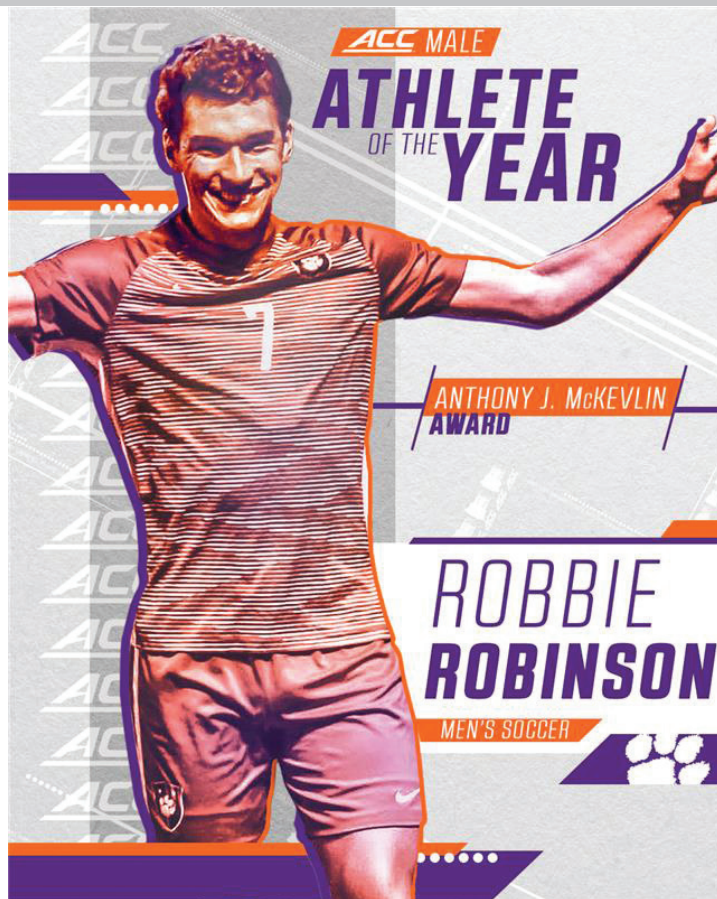

ROBBIE ROBINSON CLEMSON SOCCER



Robbie Robinson of Clemson University receives the 67th Anthony J. McKeivin Award as the conference's premier male athlete and is the first soccer player to receive the honor. It marks the fourth time a Clemson student-athlete has earned the award and the third time in five years (football quarterback Deshaun Watson in 2016 and 2017). In addition to receiving the Hermann Trophy as the nation's top men's soccer player, Robinson was the first overall pick in the 2020 MLS SuperDraft by Inter Miami, tying for Clemson's highest draft pick in any sport.

Robinson earned first-team All-America honors after he led the nation in points (45), tied for the national lead in goals (18) and was tied for fifth in assists (9). The ACC Offensive Player of the Year became the first Clemson player since 1998 to record multiple hat tricks in a single season. The junior forward led the nation in four statistical categories and ranked in the top 10 in eight different categories in leading the Tigers to the national quarterfinals.

Robinson is the 20th ACC men's soccer player to win the Hermann Trophy. He is the third

player in Clemson program history to win the award and the first since Wojtek Krakowiak in 1998. The Camden, South Carolina, native became the first ACC player to be selected No. 1 overall in the MLS SuperDraft since Wake Forest's Jack Harrison in 2016 and the seventh from a current ACC program.

With Robinson leading the way, Clemson earned a No. 2 overall seed in the NCAA tournament. The Tigers finished with an 18-2-2 overall record, the program's most wins since 2001 and fewest losses since 1998.

Robinson led the McKeivin Award balloting with 38 votes, followed by a pair of All-ACC basketball players — Duke's Tre Jones (13 votes) and Florida State's Trent Forrest (8).

FEMALE ATHLETE OF THE YEAR



ERIN MATSON NORTH CAROLINA FIELD HOCKEY



Erin Matson, a sophomore forward, is the first non-senior or junior to receive the Mary Garber Award as the league's top female athlete. She is the 10th North Carolina recipient and joins 2018-19 winner Ashley Hoffman as the Tar Heels' second consecutive field hockey honoree. Matson, who led the nation in points and goals per game, paced UNC (23-0) to its second consecutive unbeaten season and NCAA title.

Matson was named the NFHCA National Player the Year and became the first sophomore in UNC history to receive the Honda Sport Award as the nation's top field hockey player. Her other 2019 accolades included ACC Offensive Player of the Year for the second consecutive season.

The Chadds Ford, Pennsylvania, native ranked second on UNC's all-time single-season list with

33 goals and 81 points despite missing three regular-season games while competing with the U.S. National Team in India. She was voted the 2019 NCAA Tournament Most Outstanding Player after scoring four goals in the NCAA semifinal and two more in the national championship game.

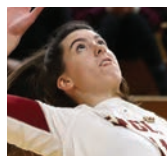
Matson also earned first-team spots on the All-America and All-ACC teams, in addition to being named to the All-ACC Tournament and All-ACC Academic teams. She was a three-time National Offensive Player of the Week, a five-time ACC Offensive Player of the Week and became the first player ever to win ACC and National Player of the Week honors in consecutive weeks.

Matson received 42 votes to lead the Garber Award balloting, while Louisville's All-ACC women's basketball standout Dana Evans received 12 votes to place second.

POSTGRADUATE SCHOLARS

Fifty ACC student-athletes were selected as 2020 Weaver-James-Corrigan Postgraduate Scholarship Award recipients. This year's list included three student-athletes who also received the Thacker Award and eight student-athletes who plan to pursue professional careers in their chosen sports and were named honorary recipients.

Due to COVID-19, the annual Cone Health ACC Postgraduate Scholarship Luncheon scheduled for April 8th in Greensboro, NC was canceled. Instead, Postgraduate Scholars were honored through videos and graphics posted on ACC social media platforms April 13-15.

Boston College alumnus Luke Kuechly, who recently retired from the NFL following an All-Pro career with the Carolina Panthers, was scheduled to serve as the luncheon keynote speaker. Although he was not able to address the recipients in-person, Kuechly recorded a special congratulatory video, which was delivered over ACC social media platforms.

A seven-time Pro Bowler, Kuechly finished with 1,092 tackles, which led the NFL from 2012-19. His 18 interceptions were the most by any linebacker over that stretch and rank third in franchise history. He owns three of the top five single-season tackle totals in team history and is the only player in franchise history to make more than 100 tackles in each of his first eight seasons as a Panther.

A native of Cincinnati, Kuechly earned both ACC Rookie of the Year (2009) and Defensive Player of the Year (2011) honors at

Boston College. As a junior in 2011, he earned the Bronko Nagurski Award as the nation's top defensive player, the Butkus Award as the nation's most outstanding linebacker and the Rotary Lombardi Award as the nation's best lineman or linebacker. He was the first player to lead the ACC in tackles three times.

The Weaver-James-Corrigan and Jim and Pat Thacker postgraduate scholarships are awarded to selected student-athletes who intend to pursue a graduate degree following completion of their undergraduate requirements. Each recipient will receive \$6,000 toward his or her graduate education. Those honored have per-

formed with distinction in both the classroom and their respective sport, while demonstrating exemplary conduct in the community.

GAME CHANGERS

The University of Virginia football program is the recipient of the Atlantic Coast Conference's Game Changers Award for the 2019-20 academic year.

The ACC's Game Changers initiative was introduced in 2015 to recognize and highlight specific conference teams' involvement with their local communities. Under the watch of current head football coach Bronco Mendenhall, "Thursday's Heroes" has provided support for 63 young people and their families in the Charlottesville, Virginia, area since its inception nearly four years ago.

"The impact being made by the Virginia football program through Thursday's Heroes is inspiring and commendable," said ACC Commissioner John Swofford. "Watching our institutions give back so profoundly to their communities is especially fulfilling and truly demonstrates the exceptional leadership qualities of our student-athletes."

Continuing the concept of a program Mendenhall and his wife, Holly, spearheaded at Brigham Young University prior to his arrival at Virginia, Thursday's Heroes reaches out to individuals who are undergoing a difficult circumstance (medical, physical, cognitive, etc.) and makes them feel a part of the Virginia football family.

"The trophies and the wins and all that - yeah, they're necessary for job security, and the world makes a big deal of that," Bronco Mendenhall said. "But it's hollow without the substance. Relationships are everything. Other than that, it would just be a game, and that doesn't sound quite meaningful enough to me."

Each Thursday, a Hero and their family is invited to tour the Cavalier football facilities, watch practice and meet players and coaches. Virginia players take turns showering their



Hero with gifts, which may include UVA gear, a signed football, Beats by Dre, a bicycle, school supplies, Halloween costumes, and special video messages from favorite celebrities (Peyton Manning, Kenny Chesney, Odell Beckham Jr. and Hugh Jackman are among past participants).

Players have been known to dress in costume to become the Hero's favorite character - Captain America, Mr. Incredible, Black Panther, Spider-Man, and even Santa Claus. The goal: to put a smile on each Hero's face.

"As a student-athlete, I feel as though so much of our life is devoted to academics and sports, but our Thursday's Heroes program has shown me that there is so much more to life than just football and school, (that) there are many people out there fighting battles much bigger than mine," UVA senior linebacker Reed Kellam said. "Thursday's Heroes is the best tradition of the UVA football program, and it has changed my life."

The program started at UVA in the fall of 2016. The initial step involved partnering with Charlottesville community members and hospitals around the state of Virginia. The football team also worked with K-12 schools and teachers to receive Hero nominations.

In order to provide the best experience, football staff are in contact early on with parents/guardians to determine the Hero's "favorites," with the goal of making the program's gifts and presentations unique. Each Hero also signs a flag that represents the team's core values and beliefs, receives tickets to a home football game and is recognized via a Jumbotron video and on-field presentation. Mendenhall and the coaching staff extend a standing invitation for the Hero to visit with the Cavaliers' football team.

Players and coaches from other UVA athletic teams often join the football program in celebrating and gifting Thursday's Heroes.

"Everything (they) do is touching and changing somebody's life," said Michelle Wright, the mother of a Thursday's Hero. "It could be big or small, but it's a difference - a positive difference."

Last year, the ACC's Game Changers Award was presented to Georgia Tech for its efforts to build partnerships with communities outside of local Atlanta and extend the reach of the university's athletic program via "Jackets Without Borders." In 2017-18, Clemson Athletics was recognized for its work with students with cognitive and/or physical development disabilities who desire a postsecondary experience on a college campus.

Other previous award winners included the 2016-17 Wake Forest field hockey, track & field and cross country teams for their work in battling hunger in their North Carolina community, the 2016 University of Louisville men's soccer team for teaming up with their city's special needs community to host soccer clinics and to celebrate life, and the 2015 Notre Dame men's lacrosse team for its ongoing partnership with the Dickinson Fine Arts Academy.

fellow students about resources and forming mental health subcommittees at the campus SAAC level.

- The group provided feedback on legislative topics, including: transfer waivers, sports wagering, and name, image, and likeness.
- The group voted for the University of Virginia's Thursday's Heroes as this year's ACC Game Changers Award winner.
- Due to campuses being closed from COVID-19, SAAC reps worked in concert with their advisors to ensure that their fellow student-athletes stayed connected with one another and to provide effective communication with campus coaches and administrators.

ACC SAAC DISCUSSION ITEMS:

- During the July meeting, ACC SAAC participated in a career tour of businesses in Atlanta, Ga. Those businesses included NCR, Home Depot Innovation Lab, and Accenture. In addition to the Career Tour, meeting attendees also engaged with ACC alumni at an ACC alumni networking dinner.

ACC SPORTSMANSHIP

The Atlantic Coast Conference continues to implement various initiatives in Sportsmanship, including the emphasis on the importance of good sportsmanship at every level of the Conference, including student-athletes, coaches, officials, administrators, fans, friends and alumni. The ACC continues to enforce the role of officiating in maintaining an atmosphere of good sportsmanship. Educational emphasis with all of the ACC's administrators, coaches and student-athletes was continued, and the league further refined a reporting and recording system to more accurately assess sportsmanship problems which might exist. Beginning in 2018-19, all ACC members have agreed to develop specific institutional initiatives to promote sportsmanship and educate relevant stakeholders on sportsmanship expectations.

ACC Sportsmanship School of the Year Awards

Prior to the 2008-09 academic year, the ACC awarded a sportsmanship award for each of its 25 sponsored sports. The concept of these awards was created by the ACC Student-Athlete Advisory Committee in an effort to recognize teams who earned the utmost regard from their peers during competition. As is stated in the conference's Mission Statement, "It [the ACC] strongly adheres to the principles of integrity and sportsmanship, and supports the total development of the student-athlete and each member institution's athletics department staff, with the intent of producing enlightened leadership for tomorrow." Teams receiving the award conducted themselves with a high degree of character and good sportsmanship, as determined by a vote of the league's teams.

The Academic Consortium is managed by the Provosts of the ACC's 15 universities under the auspices of the Presidents. Its mission is to enhance programs of ACC member institutions, especially in ways that promote the scholarly impact of faculty and the academic success and achievement of its students, including its student-athletes.

Eight programs were scheduled for 2019-20:

- Symposium on Leadership Skills for undergraduate students at the University of Louisville
- Workshops for Faculty and Administrative Leaders at the University of Pittsburgh, Florida State University, and NC State University
- Undergraduate Research Presentations at the University of North Carolina
- Inventure Prize Competition at NC State University
- Washington Seminar on the Federal Government coordinated by the University of Pittsburgh
- Debate Championship coordinated by Wake Forest University
- 3-Minute Thesis Presentations by graduate researchers, coordinated by Georgia Tech
- DemocraCCy Symposium coordinated by Clemson University and Duke University

Most programs involve work throughout the academic year and culminate in the spring. Only the Symposium on Leadership Skills could be completed as planned before the COVID-19 pandemic. In addition, two sessions of the workshops for faculty leaders (Academic Leadership Network) were held face-to-face, with a shortened third session held via Zoom. All other programs were unfortunately canceled — a real disappointment especially for the students involved.

ACADEMIC LEADERSHIP NETWORK

University of Pittsburgh | October 3-5, 2019

85 participants and facilitators (e.g. associate provosts, department chairs, faculty governance leaders, center directors) from all 15 universities came together for three days. Session topics included ACC trends and history, diversity and leading, difficult conversations and practicing collaboration. Speakers included Pittsburgh's president, provost, and provost emeritus as well as experts from eight ACC campuses. Increased emphasis was given to small group, participatory exercises, sharing beyond listening and doing beyond learning.



Florida State University | February 20-22, 2020

The same 85 participants and facilitators convened in Tallahassee for another three-day seminar including small group sharing sessions and leadership skill development. By popular demand, Elliott Visconsi (Notre Dame) repeated his highly participatory and instructive case study on Academic Freedom. Florida State's Thomas Joiner shared



national research on "Why People Die by Suicide." As in all ALN sessions, the host president and provost each shared their personal journey. From the candid presentations by President John Thrasher and Provost Sally McRorie came an increased appreciation for FSU's emphasis and strategy devoted to facilitating access to non-traditional and underserved groups of students. Small groups, networking across institutions, sharing and collaborating were again featured.

STUDENT LEADERSHIP SYMPOSIUM

University of Louisville | February 28-March 1, 2020

More than 80 undergraduate student leaders and leadership program administrators from all 15 universities gathered for three intensive days of workshops, seminars, hands-on exercises and community tours. The focus was upon practicing the art of storytelling as a leadership skill — explaining and advocating through storytelling. Participants were provided the opportunity to experience the diversity of Louisville with tours of the Muhammad Ali Museum and Institute, Churchill Downs, the Backside Clinic and the University of Louisville campus.

THE ROAD AHEAD

Final decisions about programming for Spring 2021 will be made in September 2020. Each of the universities scheduled to host in Spring 2020 have agreed to host next year. Even as face-to-face conferences are hoped for, the opportunities for virtual experiences are also being developed. For strong universities separated geographically, the push to invent virtual experiences will likely enrich programming for years to come.



ACC MAKES ANOTHER STRONG SHOWING IN NCAA GRADUATION SUCCESS RATES

The high level of academic success among Atlantic Coast Conference student-athletes is again reflected by the NCAA Graduation Success Rates (GSR) report released Oct. 16, 2019.

The ACC continues to lead peer conferences with an average graduation rate of 92 percent — up from 91 percent a year ago and three points higher than this year's national average of 89 percent. Other key notes for the ACC in comparison to peer conferences:

- Eighteen ACC teams achieved GSR scores of 100 in the sports of men's basketball, women's basketball and baseball.
- Ten ACC men's basketball teams earned higher than the Division I basketball GSR average, leading all Power 5 conferences. Clemson, Duke, Miami, Pitt, Virginia and Wake Forest posted GSR scores of 100. The six ACC men's basketball teams with perfect scores are the most of any Power 5 conference.
- Ten ACC football teams earned higher than the FBS football GSR average, second-most among Power 5 Conferences.
- In the sport of football, the ACC remains the only conference to have multiple teams register GSR scores of 90 or higher every year since 2005. Duke (96), Louisville (91) and Boston College (90) reached that plateau this year.
- Eleven ACC women's basketball teams earned higher than the Division I women's basketball GSR average, second-most among Power 5 conferences.
- This marks the 12th straight year that the ACC has had at least four women's basketball programs score 100, making it the only peer conference to do so. Six ACC teams — Florida State, Miami, Notre Dame, Pitt, Syracuse and Virginia — hit the century mark in the latest report.
- Ten ACC baseball teams earned higher than the Division I GSR baseball average, tying for the most among Power 5 conferences. Clemson, NC State, Notre Dame, Virginia, Virginia Tech and Wake Forest each registered a 100 GSR. The six ACC baseball teams with perfect scores are the most of any Power 5 conference.

The report is based on information obtained from the 2019 NCAA Graduation Rates Report and provides graduation information for students and student-athletes who entered in Fall 2010. This is the most recent graduating class for which the required six years of information is available. A graduation rate (percent) is based on a comparison of the number of students who entered a college or university and the number of those who graduated within six years. For example, if 100 students entered and 60 graduated, the graduation rate is 60 percent. The four-class average includes those who entered as freshmen in 2009-10, 2010-11, 2011-12 and 2012-13.

It should be noted that graduation rates are affected by a number of factors: some students transfer to another college, some may be dismissed for academic deficiencies, some may have to work part-time and need more than six years to graduate.

The Graduation Success Rate (GSR) subtracts students from the entering cohort who are considered allowable exclusions (those who either die or become personally disabled, those who leave school to join the armed forces, foreign services or attend a church mission) as well as those who would have been academically eligible to compete had they returned to the institution.

ACC TEAMS MAKE THE GRADE IN ANNUAL APR DATA

Atlantic Coast Conference teams continue to stand out among those from Division I colleges and universities that meet standards and excel academically, as evidenced by the annual Academic Progress Rate (APR) team data released by the NCAA on May 19.

Each Division I institution is held accountable for the academic progress of its student-athletes through the APR, a team-based metric that accounts for the eligibility and retention of each scholarship student-athlete, each term.

Nationally, NCAA Division I teams earned an overall Academic Progress Rate of 983 for the third consecutive year. Like the overall multiyear rate, which includes data from the 2015-16 academic year through the 2018-19 academic year, the multiyear rates for baseball, football, men's basketball and women's basketball were consistent or moved by a single point. Baseball was up one point to 977, football stayed at 964, men's basketball dropped one to 966 and women's basketball increased one to 983.

Current ACC highlights include:

- All 58 ACC football, men's basketball, women's basketball and baseball programs exceeded the required 930 APR.
- The ACC owns the highest APR among Power 5 conferences in the following men's sports: football, baseball, cross country, lacrosse, swimming & diving, and track & field.
- The ACC owns the highest APR among Power 5 conferences in the following women's sports: soccer, swimming & diving, tennis, and track & field.

- Men's Basketball: 10 ACC teams have an APR above the Division I average 966 (matching the most among Power 5 conferences).
- Football: 10 ACC teams have an APR above the Division I average 968 (second among peer conferences).
- Women's Basketball: Eight teams have an APR above the Division I average 983 (second among peer conferences).
- Baseball: 10 of 14 ACC teams have an APR above the average 977 (most among peer conferences and three more than the next-closest Power 5 league).
- Clemson baseball and two ACC women's basketball teams — Wake Forest and Louisville — recorded APR scores of 1000.

The ACC's strong showing comes one week after 83 teams from member schools received APR recognition awards, second-most among Division I Power 5 conferences.

To compete in the 2019-20 postseason, teams had to achieve a four-year APR of 930. NCAA members chose the 930 standard because that score predicts, on average, a 50% graduation rate for teams at that APR level. Additionally, teams must earn a four-year APR of at least 930 to avoid penalties.

EIGHTY-THREE ACC TEAMS EARN NCAA ACADEMIC RECOGNITION AWARDS

Eighty-three teams from Atlantic Coast Conference member schools were honored with NCAA Academic Progress Rate (APR) public recognition awards on May 12.

The awards recognize all teams nationally that scored in the top 10% of their sports in the most recent APR results. The APR is an annual scorecard of academic achievement calculated for all Division I sports teams.

The APR measures eligibility, graduation and retention each semester or academic term and provides a clear picture of the academic performance for each team in every sport. All teams must meet an academic threshold of 930 to qualify for the postseason and can face penalties for continued low academic performance. The most recent APRs are multiyear rates based on scores from the 2015-16, 2016-17, 2017-18 and 2018-19 academic years.

Even with rising academic standards, ACC teams continue to build upon their success in the classroom. Highlights from the most recent report:

- The ACC's 83 APR Public Recognition Awards are the second-most among Power 5 conferences.
- The ACC is one of two Power 5 conferences to have at least two teams recognized from each of its member schools.
- The ACC has led all Power 5 conferences in 14 of the 15 years since the NCAA began APR public recognition of Division I teams.
- The Clemson football team is one of 10 Division I national championship teams from 2018-19 that also earned an APR public recognition award.
- Seven teams from current ACC schools have been recognized in each of the 15 years of the NCAA APR public recognition award program's existence, more than twice as many as from any other conference.
- Nine ACC women's tennis teams and eight women's golf teams earned APR public recognition awards for 2018-19. Six ACC women's swimming teams made the list, as did six from ACC men's cross country.
- A total of 525 ACC teams have earned APR Public Recognition Awards over the past six years, which leads all Power 5 conferences.

ACC CONTINUES TO LEAD FBS CONFERENCES IN 'BEST COLLEGES' RANKINGS

For the 13th consecutive year, the Atlantic Coast Conference led the way among Football Bowl Subdivision (FBS) conferences in the "Best Colleges" rankings released by *U.S. News & World Report*. Notables from this year's rankings:

- The average rank of ACC schools is 54.7, tops among all FBS conferences.
- The ACC has led the FBS conferences in best average rank in each of the last 13 years.
- The ACC has had a school finish in the top 10 every year since 2006 (one of only two FBS conferences that can make that claim).
- The ACC's six schools ranked in the top 30 are also the most among FBS conferences.
- The ACC is the only FBS conference with seven member institutions among the top 40 — three more than any peer league.
- The ACC's 11 member schools among the top 60 also leads all FBS conferences.
- The ACC has more teams in the top 100 than any other FBS conference.

NCAA WOMAN OF THE YEAR



DUKE'S CARTA, PITT'S SCHRIEVER AMONG NCAA WOMAN OF YEAR TOP 30

Two Atlantic Coast Conference nominees — Duke golfer Virginia Elena Carta and Pitt distance runner Gillian Schriever — were among the Top 30 honorees for the 2019 NCAA Woman of the Year Award, and Carta went on to earn a spot among the nine finalists.

The Top 30 honorees were selected from an initial pool of 585 school nominees, a program record. From there, the pool was narrowed by conference offices and a selection committee to move forward 151 nominees for consideration. The Top 30 honorees included 10 from each of the three NCAA divisions, and each demonstrated excellence in academics, athletics, community service and leadership. The honorees competed in 13 sports — including, for the first time, equestrian and rifle — and studied a broad range of academic majors, including neuroscience, anthropology, economics, chemical engineering, political science and communication.

Duke's Carta was among the nine finalists announced by the committee in September. The finalist list consisted of three women from each of the NCAA's three divisions. Nebraska's Angela Mercurio (track and field) was named the 2019 NCAA Woman of the Year on Oct. 20 during a ceremony in Indianapolis.

Carta, the 2016 NCAA Women's Golf Individual Champion, capped her impressive career with a 2019 NCAA team championship in May, helping lead the Blue Devils to their seventh NCAA title in school history. She became the fourth Duke golfer to win both an NCAA team and individual title.

A native of Udine, Italy, Carta was selected a Google Cloud CoSIDA Academic All-America and Honorable Mention All-America by both Golfweek and the Women's Golf Coaches Association (WGCA). A four-time women's golf All-ACC Academic Team member and 2019 ACC Women's Golf Scholar-Athlete of the Year, Carta also earned four All-ACC selections over her Duke career.

Carta spearheaded the creation of the Birdies for Babies program at Duke to help raise money for

the Duke Children's Neonatal and Pediatric Intensive Care Units. Concluding year two of the program, it raised \$36,822.75 to help the children.

Pitt's Schriever, who hails from West Creek, New Jersey, qualified for two NCAA championships during her running career with the Panthers and has earned All-ACC honors in both cross country and track. When Schriever first qualified for the NCAA Cross Country Championships as a sophomore in 2016, she became the first Panther woman to do so in 12 seasons. She earned second-team All-America honors in the 10,000 meters with a school-record time at the 2017 NCAA Outdoor Championships.

While earning her degree from Pitt's prestigious Swanson School of Engineering, Schriever's work included researching the ability of plastic microspheres to treat dry eye disease.

Schriever also led Pitt's Engineers Without Borders technical team and helped oversee completion of a group project to provide a source of clean drinking water to a Brazilian village through building and implementing bios and filters.

Carta and Schriever emerged as the ACC's 2019 NCAA Woman of the Year candidates following a vote of the league's 15 member schools. The strong list of ACC nominees also included Boston College's Sam Apuzzo (lacrosse), Florida State's Meghan King (softball), Georgia Tech's Amy Ruiz (cross country/track & field), Louisville's Asia Durr (basketball), Miami's Samantha Gonzalez (track & field) and Emese Hof (basketball), North Carolina's Morgan Goetz (field hockey), NC State's Hannah Moore (swimming & diving), Notre Dame's Jessica Harris (cross country/track & field), Pitt's Kamalani Akeo (volleyball), Syracuse's Santita Ebangwese (volleyball) and Paige Stoner (cross country/track & field), and Wake Forest's Jennifer Kupcho (golf).

ACC member institutions claim three past NCAA Women of the Year honorees. Former Notre Dame soccer standout Elizabeth Tucker was named the 2014 NCAA Woman of the Year. Wake Forest's Annie Bersagel (cross country/track & field) was recognized in 2006, and Virginia's Peggy Boutilier (field hockey/lacrosse) received the honor in 1998.



INTERNAL OPERATIONS

SERVICES TO MEMBER SCHOOLS IN COMPLIANCE & GOVERNANCE

The ACC office provides timely information on NCAA and ACC governance items through its compliance and governance department. The work of the compliance and governance staff furthers the ACC's commitment to competing athletically at a high level with integrity and uniquely balancing academics and athletics. While some services focus on day-to-day assistance to member institutions, other services provide institutions with best practices and ideas on how to continuously improve their compliance operations. Among the services provided through the compliance and governance office were:

- Continued assistance with interpretations of NCAA and ACC rules.
- Quarterly calls and two in-person meetings with compliance personnel.
- Video assistance to ACC coaches as they prepare for the coaches recruiting certification exam.
- Implementation of institutional compliance reviews conducted through the contract services of The Compliance Group.
- Governance meeting support for the ACC governance structure, including coaches meetings.
- Distribution of more than \$8,800,000 to member institutions for direct benefits to ACC student-athletes.
- Enhanced Rules education program for institutional administrators through monthly newsletters.
- Despite having to cancel the in-person ACC Mental Health and Wellness Summit, videos related to mental health and wellness topics and QPR training were delivered to the membership during the month of May.

ACC SCHOOL REVENUE DISTRIBUTION REMAINS SIGNIFICANT

The ACC's total revenue has steadily increased and ranks among the highest in total conference revenue. Primary revenue sources include media rights, the College Football Playoff and bowl games, the ACC Football Championship Game, the NCAA Men's Basketball Tournament, and NCAA broad based funds. In addition, the Conference reimburses member schools for expenses related to their participation in all ACC championships and provides financial support for participation in select NCAA championships and bowl games.

COST CENTER BUDGETING SYSTEM

The Conference utilizes a budget process which includes significant involvement from the ACC Finance Committee, which is comprised of a representative of each member institution. Following review and adjustments to the proposed operating budget for the upcoming fiscal year, the Finance Committee is tasked with recommending a proposed budget for review and approval by the Executive Committee and then the Faculty Athletics Representatives during the final joint meeting session at the ACC Spring Meeting. Revenue projections are also reviewed as part of the overall budget process.

The ACC office continues to use an accounting system that allows departmental managers the ability to effectively monitor their budgets vs. actual expenses, review year over year comparisons, providing ACC staff with the tools necessary to make informed decisions based on timely and accurate financial information.

INVESTMENT POLICIES

The current allocation of asset investments for the Conference is delegated to the Finance Committee and its Investment Sub-Committee. This oversight committee includes development of the Conference Investment policy, including the determination of appropriate asset allocations, consistent review of invested funds and recommendations regarding Conference monetary investments. The committee meets annually with the current external investment management agency to make changes, as needed, with investment strategies.

ACC ACTIVELY PURSUES MINORITY CANDIDATES

The Atlantic Coast Conference is committed to achieving diversity in all aspects of its administration. One of the areas the Conference Office is looking to achieve this in is actively pursuing minority candidates for positions which are available in the ACC Office. The Conference Office conducts a concerted effort to identify, seek and hire qualified minority personnel.

ACC PRESIDENT'S AWARD

The ACC President's Award is presented at the discretion of the conference President to an individual who has provided exemplary service to the conference in a specific task, in a series of efforts during the year of the President's service, or over an extended period of time.

ACC AUTONOMY/MENTAL HEALTH



ACC AUTONOMY

Legislative action during the sixth year of NCAA Autonomy proved relatively light in comparison to previous years. Two proposals were approved, the first allowing awards, benefits and expenses for student-

athletes on Paralympic teams, and the second providing complimentary admission to athletics events for graduate assistant coaches in women's rowing and swimming & diving. Due to the limited autonomy business topics, the voting was held electronically instead of live at the NCAA Convention.

ACC MENTAL HEALTH AND WELLNESS

Building upon its previous initiatives and the overall priority to keep mental health awareness as a significant focus, the Atlantic Coast Conference has announced several initiatives and offerings as it continues its leadership role in student-athlete health and safety.

"The health and safety of our student-athletes, including mental health and wellness, remains one of our top priorities," said ACC Commissioner John Swofford. "Our conference will continue to take a leadership role as now, more than ever, it's critical to ensure our student-athletes, coaches and administrators have available resources and educational materials as we face unprecedented challenges in college athletics."

In May 2019, the league hosted the first ACC Mental Health and Wellness Summit in Durham, North Carolina. Due to the COVID-19 pandemic, the second summit, which was scheduled for May 18-19 in Charlotte, North Carolina, was canceled. However, the league moved quickly to provide mental health support throughout the ACC, beginning with an April 14 webinar ("Student-Athlete Mental Health During COVID-19") that attracted more than 400 participants in conjunction with Active Minds, a nonprofit organization dedicated to raising mental health awareness among college students, via peer-to-peer dialogue and interaction.

Building off the April event, and in an effort to bring extra focus during Mental Health Awareness month (May), the ACC began distributing a series of videos and educational materials each Monday. Videos include "Sleep: The No. 1 Factor in Performance," "Supporting Athletes Experiencing Athletic Injury" and "College Coaching and Mental Health: Top 5 Challenges Faced Today."

The ACC also hosted virtual QPR (Question, Persuade, Refer) training on May 19 and May 21. QPR Gatekeeper Training for Suicide Prevention is an educational workshop designed to teach the warning signs of a suicide crisis and how to respond.

In addition to the development of educational materials and virtual events, mental health professionals within the ACC host a monthly conference call in which they share best practices around education and methods of treatment. Videos and resources are available on the ACC Mental Health web page.

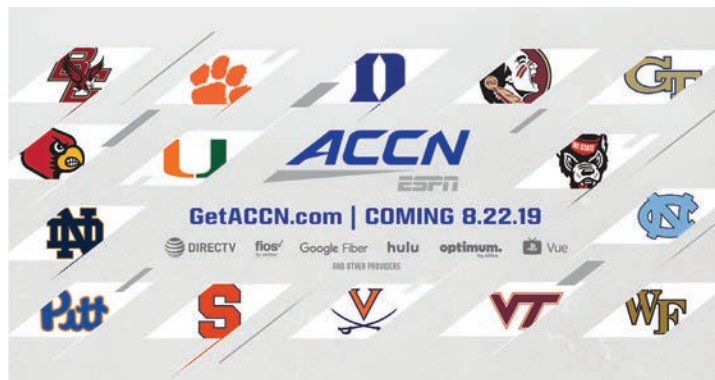


ACCN YEAR ONE HIGHLIGHTS

- One of the league's most significant historical accomplishments came on August 22, 2019 with the launch of ACC Network (ACCN), a 24/7 national network dedicated to ACC sports and league-wide original programming. Initially announced in July 2016, the launch was the culmination of years of planning by ACC Commissioner John Swofford, league administrators and ESPN officials.
- ACCN includes state-of-the-art campus studios at all 15 institutions.
- Among the many benefits of ACCN are increased revenue distribution for league institutions, employment opportunities for students, and promotion and coverage of Olympic Sports, including an enormous increase in programming for women's athletics.
- ACCN was nominated for three Sports Video Group awards and one Sports Emmy in its inaugural season. ACCN also won a gold medal for "Best Animation" at the New York Festivals TV & Film Awards.

REACH

- ACCN has extensive reach and is available to households throughout the ACC footprint and nationally through a multitude of traditional and streaming pay TV providers. All fans within the footprint and nationally have the ability to access the network.
- ACCN is available to nearly 70 million households.
- Carriage agreements are in place with nearly every major provider including: AT&T U-Verse, AT&T TV NOW, Cox, DIRECTV, DISH Network, fuboTV, Google Fiber, Hulu Live TV, Optimum, Sling TV, Spectrum TV, Suddenlink, TVision, Verizon Fios, YouTube TV, members of the NCTC, NRTC, Vidgo and Vivicast, among others.
- ACCN provides coverage of more than 450 exclusive ACC events annually across the ACC's 27 sponsored sports. Games/matches featured on the network extend across regular season and ACC Championships.
- Together, ACCN and its digital platform, ACC Network Extra (ACCNX), featured more than 1,350 ACC events in its first year.



ORIGINAL PROGRAMMING

- ACCN is committed to original storytelling and access programming – two hallmarks of the network and showcased through a multitude of documentaries and all-access series. Examples from Year 1 include: The Class That Saved Coach K, Greatest Ever: 2018 Clemson Tigers, Bowden Dynasty, Champions Coaches Conversations, Unbelievable: Virginia's Improbable Path to a Title, ACC Traditions, 1186 To Omaha: 2015 Virginia Baseball, All Access with Carolina Basketball, 3-Day Weekend: Virginia Tech and All Access The ACC Life.

- ACCN received unprecedented access to high profile programs including North Carolina men's basketball, Notre Dame women's basketball and Miami women's basketball.

LIVE EVENT COVERAGE

Football

- Last fall, ACCN televised 41 regular-season football games and had its franchise football studio show, The Huddle, at the inaugural ACCN game featuring defending national champion Clemson versus Georgia Tech, Notre Dame at Duke and the ACC Football Championship Game. ACCN studio programming - Packer and Durham, The Huddle and All ACC were also on hand at the College Football Playoff Semifinal at the PlayStation Fiesta Bowl and the National Championship Game at the Mercedes-Benz Superdome in New Orleans.

Basketball

- ACCN exclusively aired 110 regular-season men's basketball games in its debut season, including 68 conference matchups. ACCN also exclusively carried the first round of the 2020 New York Life ACC Tournament.
- ACCN aired 60 regular-season women's basketball games, including 42 conference matchups,

throughout the 2019-20 season, representing a 46-game increase in the number of ACC women's basketball events available on ESPN's linear networks over last year. Additionally, 140 more games were available on ACCNX. Thursday nights featured doubleheaders and dedicated women's basketball studio programming.

- ACCN had live studio sets at the conference's basketball media days — ACC Women's Basketball Tipoff and Operation Basketball, as well as the 2020 ACC Women's Basketball Tournament and New York Life ACC Men's Basketball Tournament delivering surrounding coverage of those events.

Women's Sports

- ACCN is committed to women's sports, delivering expansive coverage of field hockey, women's soccer and volleyball throughout the fall, women's basketball throughout the fall and winter, and softball and women's lacrosse throughout the spring. Additionally, cross country, swimming and diving, tennis and golf enjoy championship coverage on the network.
- ACCN carried 30 regular-season women's soccer games, 20 volleyball games and 12 field hockey matches during the fall sports season, while ACCNX carried 168 volleyball matches, 108 women's soccer games and 42 field hockey matches throughout the regular season. ACCNX also aired 16 NCAA women's soccer tournament games.
- Field hockey saw its first-ever linear broadcast of the sport this season — exclusively on ACCN. Overall, 18 field hockey matches were televised on ACCN, including all three rounds of the ACC Field Hockey Championship.
- The ACC's women's sports programs are regularly featured every day on Packer and Durham and All ACC, and women's sports highlights were shown during the two-hour The Huddle on Friday nights as well as All ACC following a full day of football. Thursday nights throughout conference basketball season was "Ladies Night" featuring halftime and between-game coverage of an ACC women's basketball doubleheader as well as a full recap of the day's action on All ACC following the second game.

Olympic Sports

- ACC Network delivers the most national linear coverage for the league's Olympic sport programs (field hockey, m/w soccer, wrestling, m/w lacrosse, softball and baseball). ACCN provided championship coverage for field hockey, m/w soccer and wrestling in its first year.
- ACC wrestling enjoyed a dedicated night of programming — Friday Night Duals ± highlighted by five straight weeks of conference matches and the finals of the ACC Wrestling Championship exclusively on ACCN. It marked the first time the ACC Wrestling Championship was featured on a linear network.

PACKER AND DURHAM/STUDIO SHOWS

- Each weekday morning from 7-10 a.m., Packer and Durham delivers news and commentary from around the ACC's 15 institutions.
- Packer and Durham is a tremendous service to ACC fans of all sports. Nearly every ACC sport program has been featured on Packer and Durham since the show debuted. Packer and Durham was onsite for key ACC events, including the first ACC football and basketball games on ACCN, basketball media days, the ACC Football Championship Game and the ACC men's and women's basketball tournaments.
- Along with Packer and Durham, ACCN's exclusive studio show lineup in its first year included All ACC, The Huddle, Nothing But Net and Bald Men on Campus.

TECHNOLOGY

- Select ACC men's and women's soccer telecasts on ACCN featured ESPN's exclusive "Keeper Cam" goal post camera system currently used on ESPN's Major League Soccer productions. The ACC is the first and only collegiate conference to deploy the camera system.
- ACCN utilized the Omnicam aerial camera each week during football games on the network. ACCN was also the first to use it during men's basketball games this season.
- New York Life and GEICO are founding partners of ACCN. New York Life remains the official life insurance company of the ACC and continues as the exclusive title sponsor of the ACC Men's Basketball Tournament which airs across ESPN and ACCN.
- In addition to the two founding sponsors, New York Life and GEICO, the ACC and ACCN also have official sponsorships with Bojangles, Food Lion and Gatorade.
- The ACC and ACC Network staffs partnered to create a new FanFest event in Charlotte surrounding the 2019 ACC Football Championship Game. The event moved into the Charlotte Convention Center for the first time and attracted fans from participating teams, as well as other ACC fans and those from the local Charlotte community. New exhibits and interactive opportunities included a 50-yard turf field, 40-yard dash, field goal kicking area, pep rally featuring band and cheer squads from both Clemson and Virginia, ACC Network talent appearances and live ACC Network show production. Attendance for this year's FanFest approached 10,000 and received a 96% satisfaction rate with three of every four attendees giving the event the maximum "5 stars." Similar FanFest events will be created for the ACC Men's and Women's Basketball Tournaments.

ACCDN

ACC Digital Network (ACCDN), the official digital home of ACC video, completed its ninth year covering the nation's premier college conference and its student-athletes. For a third consecutive year, ACCDN delivered a profit for the business while simultaneously advancing the coverage of the ACC and distribution points to fans across the nation. More than 2,500 videos were produced and distributed to the league's official platforms (theACC.com, ACC Mobile App, ACC social channels), rising OTT platforms (Roku, Xumo and SamsungTV) and other strategic viewing destinations such as MSN and SendToNews. The 2019-20 year saw an increase in overall time spent viewing, as fans watched more than 3 million hours of ACCDN programming. New sources of commercial inventory were created via enhanced distribution to the OTT platforms that generated increased revenue opportunities for the network.

ACCDN's programming continued to evolve, as the network extensively covered women's basketball more than ever with game highlights for all conference games and additional player highlight videos. Increased coverage was planned for the baseball season, which began just weeks before the COVID-19 pandemic ultimately forced the cancellation of spring sports. Despite the absence of live events after March, ACCDN still covered ACC teams and athletes, including those drafted by the WNBA, NFL and MLB. Additionally, the digital network experimented with new formats and types of programming, including an expanded use of the YouTube platform by creating and airing "Premieres" of game re-airs and archived programming such as the ACC Tournament Documentaries. New formats leverage the



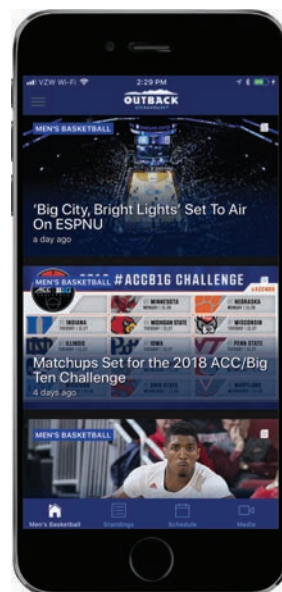
league's rich archives and the ACCDN's technology platforms to optimize performance on social platforms, including Twitter, Facebook and Instagram. ACCDN looks forward to additional innovation that will enable other new types of programming in the coming year.

The commitment to high-quality production and distribution to the most popular viewing platforms underscores the excellence that the student-athletes, coaches and the ACC demonstrate daily.

MOBILE

ACC digital and social platforms have positioned the league as the leader among college conferences in the mobile space. Already the first conference to introduce mobile gaming, the ACC expanded on that success with added features and enhancements to both its football and basketball games. Additionally, the ACC official mobile app has become a go-to resource for fans to follow all aspects of the conference. This year, the ACC added mobile ticketing for the Football Championship Game as a unique experience within the league's app, allowing for targeted coverage to fans who attended the game in Charlotte. The ACC suite of mobile apps, free on iOS and Android, consist of:

- **OFFICIAL MOBILE APP** — The ACC official mobile app serves fans of every ACC sport with news, video, scores, stats, and schedules. This year mobile ticketing was integrated successfully into the mobile app for the ACC Football Championship, paving the way for further usage in the future across other sports.
- **ACC QB CHALLENGE** — Entering its eighth year in the market — impressive longevity in the mobile gaming space — ACC QB Challenge maintains a high engagement with more than 400,000 downloads. Among its various features, the ability to represent your team and play fans across the conference remains the most engaging aspect.
- **ACC 3-POINT CHALLENGE** — Completing its fifth year in market, the first and still only conference level college basketball mobile game has experienced tremendous success with more than 500,000 downloads. New York Life renewed its sponsorship for the 2019-20 ACC Basketball season and maintained the charitable tie-in to the app with points scored equating to donations to each school's local Boys and Girls Club — boosting engagement even higher.

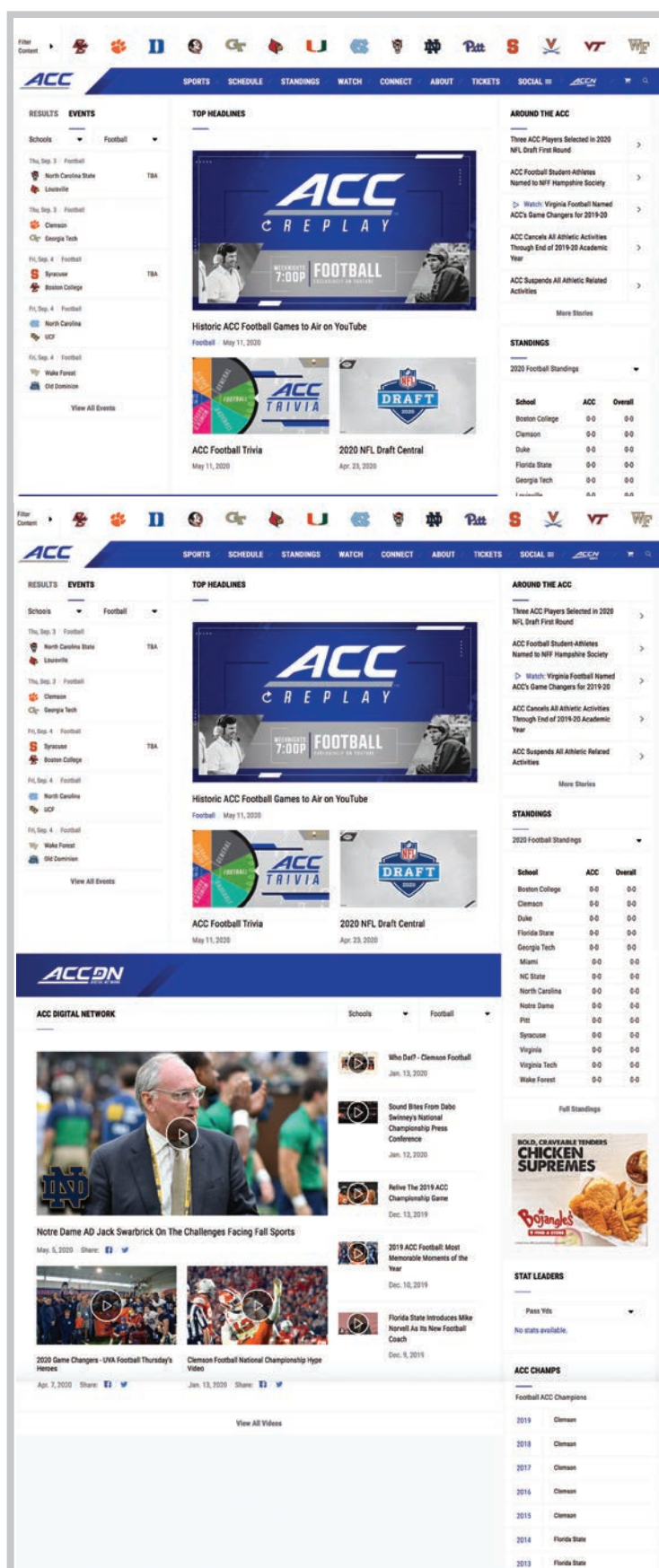


WEBSITE

NCAA POSTGRADUATE SCHOLARSHIPS

The NCAA awards up to 126 postgraduate scholarships annually. The scholarships are awarded to student-athletes who excel academically and athletically and who are at least in their final year of intercollegiate athletics competition.

The one-time non-renewable scholarships of \$10,000 are awarded three times a year corresponding to each sport season (fall, winter and spring). Each sports season there are 21 scholarships available for men and 21 scholarships available for women for use in an accredited graduate program.

All former student-athletes who earned an undergraduate degree from an NCAA member school are eligible to be nominated by that school for an NCAA graduate degree scholarship, regardless of when they received their undergraduate degree.

HONOR ROLL



The Atlantic Coast Conference announced the 2019-20 Honor Roll on June 18, recognizing a record 5,611 student-athletes for classroom excellence during the most recent academic year.

The ACC Honor Roll is comprised of student-athletes who participated in a varsity-level sport and registered a grade point average of 3.0 or better for the full academic year. The 5,611 recognized this year shattered the previous league mark of 4,769 set in 2018-19.

Duke led all schools with a record 572 student-athletes recognized, and Notre Dame placed

541 on the list. Virginia saw 497 student-athletes achieve Honor Roll status, followed by North Carolina with 468 and Boston College with 455.

Boston College's Isabelle Kennedy (cross country/track & field) and NC State's Ky-Lee Perry (swimming & diving) made the ACC Honor Roll for the sixth time. Thirteen schools had at least one student-athlete who earned honor roll status for the fifth time.

POINTS OF PRIDE



- The Atlantic Coast Conference was founded on May 8, 1953, at the Sedgefield Inn near Greensboro, North Carolina, with seven charter members — Clemson, Duke, Maryland, North Carolina, NC State, South Carolina and Wake Forest — drawing up the conference bylaws. On December 4, 1953, conference officials met again at Sedgefield and officially admitted Virginia as the league's eighth member. The first withdrawal of a school from the ACC came on June 30, 1971, when South Carolina tendered its resignation. The ACC operated with seven members until April 3, 1978, when Georgia Tech was admitted. The ACC expanded to nine members on July 1, 1991, with the addition of Florida State. The conference expanded to 11 members on July 1, 2004, with the addition of Miami and Virginia Tech. On October 17, 2003, Boston College accepted an invitation to become the league's 12th member starting July 1, 2005.
- The ACC added its 13th and 14th members on September 18, 2011, when Pittsburgh and Syracuse accepted invitations to join the conference. The two schools officially joined the ACC on July 1, 2013. Notre Dame also officially joined the ACC on July 1, 2013, after announcing on September 12, 2012, its intention to enter the league for competition in all sports but football, bringing the membership of the conference to 15. The Fighting Irish play five football games with ACC schools each year. On July 1, 2014, Louisville entered the ACC on the same day Maryland withdrew, keeping the conference's membership at 15 institutions.
- Since the league's inception in 1953, ACC schools have captured 161 national championships, including 80 in women's competition, 79 in men's competition and two in fencing. In addition, NCAA individual titles have gone to ACC student-athletes 186 times in men's competition and 141 times in women's action.
- The league's unique blend of public and private institutions continues to lead the way among Autonomy 5 conferences in the "Best Colleges" rankings released by US News & World Report. The ACC was the only FBS conference to place six of its members institutions among the top 20 and seven member schools among the top 40. With an average rank of 54.7, the ACC led all FBS conferences for the 13th consecutive year.
- The ACC had 83 combined teams that received Academic Progress Rate recognition awards from the NCAA in May of 2020. The ACC has led all Autonomy 5 conferences in 14 of the 15 years since the NCAA began APR public recognition of Division I teams.
- In the NCAA's Graduation Success Rate report released last November, the ACC's graduation rate of 92 percent ranked three points higher than the national average and led all Autonomy 5 conferences. Eighteen ACC teams achieved GSR scores of 100 in the sports of men's basketball, women's basketball and baseball.
- Some of the most influential people in history have been awarded the prestigious Rhodes Scholarship to pursue post-graduate education at the University of Oxford in England. The oldest international fellowships have been earned by a few extraordinary ACC student-athletes. Some of the names on this list include Florida State football student-athlete Myron Rolle, Duke tennis student-athlete Julia Parker Goyer, Florida State track and field student-athlete Garrett Johnson and Notre Dame fencing student-athlete Alex Coccia.
- The ACC Academic Consortium is a special commitment of the 15 university presidents and the conference office to enhance academic excellence. Originally funded by a portion of the revenues from the ACC Football Championship Game, the ACCAC works to advance the quality of education for all undergraduate students by sharing academic and administrative resources and by hosting conferences that bring together experts from all our campuses.
- ACC Postgraduate Scholarships: The Weaver-James-Corrigan and Jim and Pat Thacker scholarships are awarded to selected student-athletes — three from each league institution — who intend to pursue a graduate degree following completion of his or her undergraduate requirements. Each recipient receives \$5,000 to contribute to their graduate education. Each recipient has performed with distinction in both the classroom and in his/her respective sport, while also demonstrating exemplary conduct in the community. In addition, four student-athletes who intend to compete at the Olympic or professional level receive Weaver-James-Corrigan Honorary Awards in recognition of their outstanding performance in both athletic competition and the classroom throughout their collegiate careers.
- The ACC has won seven national championships in football, men's basketball, women's basketball and baseball since 2015. That is the most of any conference. The ACC is the only conference to win each of those four titles over that stretch.
- The ACC's seven national titles in those sports have come from six different programs — Virginia men's basketball (2019), Clemson football (2018, 2016), Notre Dame women's basketball (2018), North Carolina men's basketball (2017), Duke men's basketball (2015), Virginia baseball (2015).
- The ACC has won three of the last seven football national titles (ties for most of any conference) and three of the last five men's basketball national championships (most of any conference) since 2015:
 - Football — Clemson 2018 & 2016, Florida State 2013
 - Men's Basketball — Virginia 2019, North Carolina 2017, Duke 2015
- The ACC won the football and men's basketball national titles in the same academic year for the fourth time overall in 2018-19:
 - 2018-19: Clemson (football), Virginia (men's basketball)
 - 2016-17: Clemson (football), North Carolina (men's basketball)
 - 1990-91: Georgia Tech (football), Duke (men's basketball)
 - 1981-82: Clemson (football), North Carolina (men's basketball)
- The 2019-20 Division I Learfield IMG College Directors' Cup competition was canceled due to the COVID-19 pandemic, but the ACC led all conferences with four schools among the top 10 in the standings released at the end of the fall season. The ACC's nine member schools among the top 25 and 13 schools among the top 50 were also the most of any conference.



BOSTON COLLEGE

- Boston College, founded in 1863 by the Society of Jesus, was the first institution of higher education based in the city of Boston. Today it ranks among the nation's foremost private universities with a coeducational enrollment of 14,500 undergraduate and graduate students drawn from all 50 states and more than 100 countries.
- The core of Boston College's Jesuit, Catholic mission is a commitment to integrating intellectual, personal, ethical, and religious formation and uniting high academic achievement with service to others.
- Students at Boston College consistently win prestigious national awards for academic achievement, including Rhodes, Marshall, Churchill, Goldwater, Mellon, Truman, Beinecke, and Beckman scholarships. Boston College is annually among the top schools nationally in producing undergraduate Fulbright winners, with over 150 during the past decade.
- More than 5,000 Boston College students provide some 550,000 hours of community service in the Boston area each year, and approximately 850 participate in service and immersion trips during the academic year.
- Boston College is ranked 37th among national universities by U.S. News and World Report, and is home to highly ranked professional schools in Education, Law, Management, Nursing and Social Work.
- The School of Theology & Ministry, created when Weston Jesuit School of Theology re-affiliated with Boston College in 2008, is one of the world's top centers for Catholic theological education.
- Boston College is home to a rich array of academic and cultural resources: the McMullen Museum of Art is renowned for its groundbreaking exhibitions; the Burns Library is internationally recognized for the strength of its collections in several areas, including Irish Studies, Jesuit Studies, and the history and politics of Boston; the Bapst Library has been recognized as one of the most beautiful college libraries in the country.
- The Lynch School of Education is a leader in initiatives that enhance teaching and learning in public and Catholic K-12 schools and conducts two prominent research assessments of student achievement: TIMSS, which surveys math and science, and PIRLS, which surveys reading literacy. In collaboration with the Morrissey College of Arts and Sciences, the Lynch School has been a partner in the Carnegie Corporation's interdisciplinary Teachers for a New Era initiative, preparing, assessing, and supporting the teachers of tomorrow.
- The Center for Retirement Research and the Center on Aging and Work are nationally known for their research on issues facing older Americans.
- Boston College began construction this past year on a new science building intended to anchor the recently-launched Schiller Institute for Integrated Science and Society. The Institute will expand interdisciplinary collaborations to address global problems in energy, health, and the environment.
- The Boston College athletics program shares the University's commitment to the development of the whole person—body as well as mind and spirit. BC sponsors 31 varsity sports with approximately 700 student-athletes, and offers 53 intramural and 27 club teams involving approximately 5,000 students.
- Twelve Boston College varsity teams achieved perfect Graduation Success Rate (GSR) scores of 100 in the NCAA's most recently released public data. The NCAA recognized 6 Boston College varsity teams for having Academic Progress Rate (APR) scores in the top ten percent of all Division I squads in their respective sports.
- Summer 2018 marked the opening of the Fish Field House, an indoor practice facility for football and other varsity sports. The facility features a full regulation field with an AstroTurf playing surface, and a 12,000 square-foot strength and conditioning center. Last spring, the Harrington Athletics Village was dedicated, providing baseball and softball teams with state-of-the-art, all-season stadiums built to host both ACC and NCAA Championship games. The Village will include the Pete Frates Center, scheduled to open in summer 2020, which will provide a 31,000-square foot indoor baseball and softball facility featuring locker rooms, hitting tunnels, indoor turf field, strength and conditioning space, and a hospitality area. In summer 2019, the Margot Connell Recreation Center opened, offering numerous fitness programs to students and staff.
- Men's ice hockey has won NCAA national championships in 1949, 2000, 2008, 2010, and 2012. Schiller Family Head Hockey Coach Jerry York was inducted into the Hockey Hall of Fame last fall, becoming only the fifth NCAA coach to earn this honor. Women's ice hockey has appeared in the NCAA Frozen Four three of the last five years and six of the last nine. For the 2017-18 season, women's hockey player Daryl Watts was named the Patty Kazmaier Memorial Award winner as the nation's top D1 women's player, becoming the first underclassman to take home the honor. Women's lacrosse was runner up in the NCAA national championship game each of the past three years. Last spring, junior Sam Apuzzo became the first Boston College women's lacrosse player to win the Tewaaraton Award, given annually to the top female and male lacrosse players in the country. Field hockey advanced to the NCAA Final Four last fall.



- Clemson University is a land grant institution founded in 1889 and named for Thomas Green Clemson, a champion of formal scientific education and economic development who served as ambassador to Belgium and became the nation's first secretary of agriculture. Thomas Clemson inherited Fort Hill Plantation, and upon his death in 1888 he willed Fort Hill and his personal assets to the state of South Carolina for the establishment of a high seminary of learning dedicated to scientific education. Clemson has a proud history of military excellence and recently dedicated a Scroll of Honor memorial recognizing nearly 500 Clemson men and women who have lost their lives in service to their country. The University is organized into 7 colleges: Agriculture, Forestry, and Life Sciences; Architecture, Arts, and Humanities; Business & Behavioral Science; Science; Engineering, Computing and Applied Sciences; Behavioral, Social and Health Sciences; and Education.
- U.S. News & World Report ranks Clemson 27th among the nation's public universities for 2020.
- According to U.S. News and World Report, more than half of entering freshmen were ranked in the top 10 percent of their high school classes, and the freshman class scored in the top 20% nationally on the critical reading and math sections of the SAT. Freshmen who took the ACT scored in the top 15% nationally.
- Clemson is the number 1 national public university in South Carolina according to bestvalue-schools.com. and home to approximately 25,000 students, with a freshmen retention rate of 93% and a 6-year graduation rate of 83%. Clemson's retention and graduation rates rank among the highest in the country for public universities. We've been named among the "Best Public College Values" by Kiplinger magazine in 2019, and The Princeton Review named us among the "Best Value Colleges" for 2020
- Clemson is student centered, with a 16:1 student-to-teacher ratio and more than half of Clemson's courses have fewer than 20 students. U.S. News & World Report labeled Clemson as one of only 11 public universities recognized for excellence in undergraduate research and creative projects in 2018.
- Student life is priority at Clemson, and it shows! Clemson ranks 1st among colleges where town-gown relations are great, 2nd among colleges where students pack the stadiums, and 7th nationally for having the happiest students according to the 2020 Princeton Review.
- According to the 2018 U.S. News & World Report, Clemson is ranked 12th most innovative school among all national public universities, based on nominations from top college officials of schools that are making the most innovative improvements in curriculum, faculty, students, campus life, technology or facilities.
- Clemson's career services program is ranked 1st, and 9th among best schools for internships, according to the 2020 Princeton Review.
- U.S. News & World Report ranks Clemson 2nd in the nation for percentage of alumni who give back to their alma mater, and 1th among public universities for the best alumni network, according to the 2020 Princeton Review.
- Clemson prides itself in being "Solid Orange" with strong alumni support for both academics and athletics. Clemson ranks 4th among public universities for alumni giving, and Clemson's IPTAY program has over 17,000 donors and is a national model for athletic fund raising.
- Approximately 500 student-athletes participate as Clemson Tigers in 19 intercollegiate sports. A charter member of the Atlantic Coast Conference, Clemson has won 130 Championships since the ACC was established in 1953.
- Clemson is home to the 2016 and 2018 NCAA National Football Champions and has claimed team national championships in football (1981, 2016, 2018), men's soccer (1984, 1987), and men's golf (2003). Clemson's football team has received public recognition APR rankings and is one of only five FBS programs ranked in the top 10 percent each of the last five years. Clemson is the only FBS program nationally to finish each of the last four seasons in the top 25 of both polls on the field, and in the top 10 percent of APR scores in the classroom.
- Clemson is the original home of the "Tiger Paw" symbol for athletic teams. Clemson has strong athletic traditions including the football team's famous pre-game entrance into Death Valley, which has been described by a national sports broadcaster as "the most exciting 25 seconds in college football."



- Duke University traces its roots back to 1838, when Brown's Schoolhouse was founded in Randolph County, NC and eventually transformed into Trinity College, which moved to Durham in 1892. In 1924, businessman and philanthropist James B. Duke made a \$40 million gift to transform the small liberal arts college into what has become the youngest major private research university in the country.
- Duke includes 10 schools and colleges — in arts and sciences, engineering, divinity, nursing, medicine, the environment, business, public policy, law and a graduate school — as well as Duke Kunshan University in China and the Duke-National University of Singapore Medical School. As a global institution, Duke enrolls students from more than 160 countries and has people, programs and partnerships around the world.
- Duke has about 6,700 undergraduate students and about 9,100 graduate students. More than 42,000 candidates applied for the 1,700 spaces in the entering class of 2024. There are more than 180,000 Duke alumni.
- Duke has been ranked among the top 10 universities in the country by U.S. News and World Report for more than three decades, and among the leading research universities in the world by THES and QS. Duke's graduate and professional schools, and many academic programs and departments, are also ranked among the top 10.
- Duke is committed to affordability and access for all students with more than 50% of students receiving some form of financial assistance to attend the university. As one of the few colleges in the U.S. that admits students based solely on their academic performance and not on the applicant's financial status or ability to pay for college, and commits to providing 100 percent of a student's demonstrated financial need for all four years of the student's undergraduate education, Duke invests more than \$180 million a year in financial aid.
- Duke students and graduates are among the most frequent recipients of honor scholarships such as the Rhodes, Marshall and Truman. A total of 50 Rhodes Scholarships have been awarded to Duke graduates, including one in 2019.
- Duke's athletic programs have earned 17 national championship titles, including seven in women's golf (most recently in 2019), five in men's basketball, three in men's lacrosse, one in women's tennis and one in men's soccer. Duke has placed among the top 25 of the Learfield IMG Directors' Cup Standings, released by the National Association of Collegiate Directors of Athletics, in 15 of the past 16 years the cup has been awarded, including a ninth-place finish in 2019.
- Duke has led the ACC in Academic Honor Roll selections in 32 of the past 33 years.
- In the most recent data released by the NCAA, Duke boasts a 97 percent Graduation Success Rate. In addition, 10 Blue Devil teams were ranked in the top 10 percent of their respective sports in the most recent Academic Performance Rate (APR) Report.
- Two Nobel Prizes have been awarded to current Duke faculty members: in 2012, Professor of Medicine Robert Lefkowitz shared the Nobel Prize in Chemistry for his work on a class of cell receptors that have become the target of prescription drugs, including antihistamines, ulcer drugs and beta blockers to relieve hypertension, angina and coronary disease. And in 2015, Professor of Biochemistry Paul Modrich also shared the Nobel prize in Chemistry for discovering how mistakes in the DNA code are repaired.
- The Duke Marine Laboratory, at coastal Beaufort, N.C., is a campus of Duke University and a unit within the Nicholas School of the Environment. Its mission is education and research in basic ocean processes, coastal environment management, marine biotechnology and marine biomedicine. It is also the home of the research centers in biological and physical oceanography, marine biology and conservation, marine environmental health, marine biotechnology, and marine policy and management.
- Duke Health combines research, clinical care and education at many different sites throughout the region and beyond. Duke Hospital is the flagship of the broader Duke University Health System, which includes two community hospitals (Duke Hospital and Duke Raleigh Hospital), affiliations with other hospitals in the region, community-based primary care physician practices, home care, infusion services and hospice care. As the Southeast's preeminent health care provider, Duke University Health System attracted more than 70,000 inpatient stays and more than 2.4 million outpatient visits in FY19.
- Duke is the second-largest private employer in the state, with more than 43,000 employees in North Carolina.
- With more than seven million volumes, the Duke University Library System is one of the 10 largest private library systems in the U.S. and ranks as one of the nation's top 10 research library systems.
- Duke is the home of the Full Frame Documentary Film Festival, the only Oscar-qualifying film festival based at a university. Each year, more than 20,000 documentary producers, directors and fans come to Durham for four days of screenings and workshops.



- Florida State University has risen faster in the U.S. News & World Report rankings than any other Top 50 public university in the past four years – 25 spots. In 2019, FSU vaulted eight spots to No. 18 among national public universities – the biggest single-year improvement in university history.
- FSU is among the most in-demand universities in the nation for prospective students, receiving a record-breaking number of undergraduate applications for admission for the third consecutive year. Nearly 64,000 students from all 50 states and 77 different countries applied for undergraduate admission. Top five academic areas of interest for admitted students include biological science, business, engineering, chemistry/biochemistry and psychology.
- FSU's four-year graduation rate is among the highest in the country at 70 percent. FSU's six-year graduation rate rose to a record 83 percent, also among the highest in the nation. Most notably, FSU has proven graduation rate gaps between its traditional and underrepresented student populations can be erased. For example, our Unconquered Scholars group, comprised of hundreds of former foster care, wards of the state, and homeless students, graduates at the same or even higher rates, compared to the national average of 2-3 percent.
- FSU has tremendous depth with more than 295 degree programs and broad excellence across the sciences, arts, social sciences and globalization, emphasizing critical thinking and experiential learning.
- According to U.S. News and World Report's academic rankings, FSU provides an excellent return on investment, as noted by FSU's recognition as the most efficient university in the nation.
- FSU is ranked No. 9 best value among public universities for in-state students and No. 3 best value among public colleges for out-of-state students on Kiplinger's annual list of Best Values in Public Colleges.
- Florida State is one of the nation's top research institutions for producing Fulbright U.S. Scholars and students. A school-record nine FSU faculty scholars earned Fulbright grants for 2020-2021. FSU is also a top research institution for producing student Fulbright Scholars with nine students receiving awards in 2020-2021.
- Florida State University is ranked among the top 50 universities worldwide for producing patented technologies, according to a new report from the National Academy of Inventors and the Intellectual Property Owners Association.
- FSU recently became the largest university in the country to have an experiential learning graduation requirement for its undergraduates. Before graduating, students will engage in at least one transformational, career-building internship, undergraduate research experience, international study, service-learning, or other engaged learning program.
- FSU was selected for the top award in international education and study abroad programming by the Association for Public and Land Grant Universities. FSU was also named in the top 10 in the country for the number of students who study abroad, and number one in Florida, with nearly 30 percent of students who study overseas.
- FSU researchers received a record \$233.6 million in funding in the 2019 fiscal year, including an \$8 million grant from Triumph Gulf Coast as part of a major 10-year initiative to restore Apalachicola Bay and revive the region's imperiled oyster industry. FSU also will contribute \$1.5 million toward the project.
- Florida State is one of the top universities in the nation with the most recipients of doctoral degrees in the humanities and the arts.
- The FSU Film School is ranked No. 13 in the nation among all colleges and universities by The Hollywood Reporter, "Top 25 Film Schools," 2019.
- The College of Music – home to two Grammy Award winners and a Pulitzer Prize-winning composer – is the third largest music program in higher education. The college is highly rated among public universities, and its opera program ranks third in the United States, U.S. News & World Report.
- The College of Medicine is #1 in the nation for instruction in community health, (Association of American Medical Colleges), and is the #4 most competitive medical school in the nation in admissions, (U.S. News & World Report, 2018).
- Florida State University has been recognized by INSIGHT Into Diversity magazine as one of 14 Diversity Champion colleges and universities in the nation and has earned the "Higher Education Excellence in Diversity" (HEED) Award six years in a row!
- The only facility of its kind in the United States, the National High Magnetic Field Laboratory headquartered at Florida State is the largest and highest-powered magnet laboratory in the world. The magnet lab holds the most world records for the most powerful magnets on Earth.
- Florida State provides countless opportunities for students to be involved in service learning, civic education and leadership. With more than 650 registered student organizations, as well as Service Scholars and Garnet and Gold Scholars, the university is a leader of programs focused on community development and values education.
- Since they began fielding intercollegiate athletic teams in 1946, the Seminoles have won 17 national championships in nine sports, including the 2014 and 2018 NCAA Soccer Championship and the 2018 NCAA Softball Championship. The Seminole football program won its third national title in 2013.
- FSU has captured four team national championships in the last seven years. Of the school's 17 national titles, six have come since 2006.
- Since joining the ACC in 1992, the Seminoles have won 88 ACC team championships in 14 different sports. Twenty-nine of those titles have come in the past seven seasons.
- Since 2010, Seminole teams have qualified for NCAA postseason play in 196 of 204 opportunities. Over the last four years, 67 of 68 teams have qualified for NCAA postseason play.
- In the last 11 years FSU athletics have placed in the top 10 of the Learfield IMG College Athletic Director's Cup standings five times and in the top five three times.
- Over the last 14 years, FSU has finished in the top 15 every year except one. FSU has now finished as the ACC's top ranked overall athletics program two straight years and three times this decade. *In 2019-20 no final standings were released.

GEORGIA TECH

- The Georgia Institute of Technology, also known as Georgia Tech, is a top-ranked public college and one of the leading research universities in the United States. Georgia Tech provides a technologically focused education to more than 32,000 undergraduate and graduate students in six colleges and 28 schools focusing on business, computing, design, engineering, liberal arts, and sciences.
- The Institute is a national and international leader in research, and one of the South's largest industrial and engineering research engines. In 2019, research, economic development, and other sponsored activities at Georgia Tech topped \$1 billion, allowing the Institute to take on complex and significant challenges involving multiple disciplines and bringing together teams of researchers with a broad range of specialized expertise. Georgia Tech plays a leading role in the Georgia Research Alliance, a centerpiece of the state's economic development strategy, and has an estimated \$3.3 billion annual impact across the metro Atlanta economy, according to the latest study commissioned by the University System of Georgia.
- A four-year institution, Georgia Tech is consistently the only technological university ranked in U.S. News & World Report's listing of America's top 10 public universities. In addition, Georgia Tech's College of Engineering is consistently ranked in the nation's top five public engineering programs by U.S. News.
- The Institute is consistently rated among the top universities in the nation for graduation of underrepresented minorities in engineering, physical sciences, and architecture and planning. According to *Diverse: Issues in Higher Education* and the American Society of Engineering Education, Georgia Tech is the largest producer of engineering degrees for women and underrepresented minorities in the nation.
- Georgia Tech is ranked No. 5 in Top Public Universities. (Source: U.S. News & World Report)
- Georgia Tech is ranked No. 4 in Best Undergraduate Engineering Programs. All of our graduate engineering programs rank in the top 10. (Source: U.S. News & World Report)
- Scheller College of Business ranks No. 22 in Undergraduate Business Programs (Source: U.S. News & World Report). Scheller is also ranked No. 2 in the U.S. and No. 6 in the world on the Corporate Knights Better World MBA Ranking list.
- Computer Science ranks No. 8 by the Times Higher Education World University Rankings, U.S. News & World Report's Graduate Program Rankings, and No. 21 in The Guardian's QS World University Rankings.
- In the category of Architecture and the Built Environment, Georgia Tech ranks No. 19 in The Guardian's QS World University Rankings, and our graduate urban planning program is ranked No. 7 in the U.S. by Planetizen.
- Our Living Learning Communities are ranked No. 20 by U.S. News and World Report.
- Georgia Tech is one of the South's largest industrial and engineering research agencies.
- The Institute plays a leading role in the Georgia Research Alliance, a centerpiece of the state's economic development strategy.
- Research is conducted for industry and government by the Georgia Tech Research Institute, various academic schools and departments, and more than 100 interdisciplinary research units.
- U.S. News and World Report ranks us at No. 8 for Undergraduate Research/Creative Projects, and No. 12 for Senior Capstone Projects.
- The Institute is consistently rated among the top universities in the nation for graduation of underrepresented minorities in engineering, physical sciences, and architecture and planning.
- With more than 60 chartered student organizations exploring religious, racial, sexual, and ethnic identity (but open to all), our students find a way to celebrate, strengthen, and share their part of the robust cultural melting pot that thrives in our community.
- Georgia Tech is ranked No. 4 in Most Innovative Schools by U.S. News & World Report.
- The Advanced Technology Development Center (ATDC) is recognized by Forbes magazine as one of 12 incubators "changing the world." Founded in 1980, ATDC is the oldest technology incubator in the U.S. with more than \$2 billion raised by 150 graduates.
- Georgia Tech Research Corporation is No. 32 on the list of Top 100 Worldwide Universities Granted U.S. Utility Patents.
- PayScale.com ranks Tech as No. 1 in Georgia and No. 12 among all U.S. colleges for providing the best 20-Year Return on Investment.
- Ranked No. 3 by WalletHub for the Highest Return on Educational Investment.
- Our co-op and internship programs are ranked No. 5 by U.S. News and World Report.
- The Center for Career Discovery and Development is one of the nation's most successful and innovative university career support offices for its recruitment and job placement.
- Upon graduation in Fall 2018, 84 percent of undergraduate students had been offered a job, and the average starting salary was \$72,000 (not including bonus offers).
- More than 700 businesses, industries, and organizations throughout the U.S. and abroad employ Georgia Tech co-op students and interns each year.
- Georgia Tech's beautiful 400-acre, tree-lined campus is located in the heart of Atlanta, Georgia.
- We are ranked among the Top 50 Green Colleges by The Princeton Review.
- The Yellow Jackets have won five national championships during their illustrious athletics history (four in football – 1917, 1928, 1952, and 1990; one in women's tennis – 2007), appeared in two Final Fours in men's basketball (1990, 2004) and three College World Series in baseball (1994, 2002, 2006).
- Georgia Tech student-athletes excel in the classroom as well as the competitive arena. In the latest data released by the NCAA in 2020, 14 of Georgia Tech's 15 athletics programs have a multiyear NCAA Academic Progress Rate (APR) higher than the national average in their respective sports, which comes on the heels of Tech being the only institution from a Power Five conference (ACC, Big Ten, Big 12, Pac-12, Southeastern Conference) with an APR higher than the national average in every sport in 2019. Leading the way is the Yellow Jackets' golf team, which has posted a perfect 1,000 score every year since the NCAA APR program was introduced in 2003-2004. Tech student-athletes posted an all-time best 3.23 mean grade point average during the 2020 spring semester.



- Established in 1798, the University of Louisville is Kentucky's premier, nationally recognized metropolitan research university.
- With a student body of over 22,000 and faculty and staff of nearly 7,000, UofL offers more than 250 areas of study.
- UofL is ranked among the top 12 "Best Neighbor" schools in the nation and, based on its outreach and partnerships, also ranks as a Carnegie Community Engagement university, one of fewer than 200 such institutions nationwide.
- Dr. Neeli Bendapudi was named UofL's 18th president in April of 2018. She is the institution's first female president and the first person of color to hold the position.
- Since 2003, UofL scholars have earned 139 prestigious Fulbright Scholarships, more than all other Kentucky public institutions combined.
- UofL's most famous landmark is a large original bronze casting of Rodin's "The Thinker," which stands in front of Grawemeyer Hall. The statue, given to the City of Louisville to recognize its namesake, French monarch Louis XVI, has been in place at UofL since 1949.
- UofL is a long-time leader in medical breakthroughs, including helping a paralyzed man stand unaided six years after a spinal cord injury, as well as revolutionizing the treatment of heart disease and cancer. In 2018, the university and its partner, the Jewish Hospital Trager Transplant Center, marked their 500th heart transplant.
- With a \$5 million gift from the Owsley Brown II Family Foundation, the university established the Christina Lee Brown Envirome Institute, the first known research center in the nation examining the link between health and environmental effects.
- The UofL James Graham Brown Cancer Center was the first in the interior of the United States to provide the cancer immunotherapy drug Keytruda in both research and FDA-approved forms. The Brown Cancer Center continues to be among the first to offer cancer immunotherapy drugs that activate the patient's own immune system to fight cancer.
- The Signature Partnership Initiative at the University of Louisville was begun in 2007 to increase the educational attainment and improve the quality of life for those living in Louisville's poorest areas. Since then, the university community has recorded more than 21,000 instances of community engagement and 250,000 hours of community service as part of the program.
- The Additive Manufacturing Institute of Science and Technology at UofL trains engineers and other professionals from around the world on sophisticated 3D printing and other additive manufacturing machinery.
- The University of Louisville sponsors 23 varsity athletic programs, 10 for men and 13 for women. The Cardinals have won two NCAA team championships (men's basketball in 1980, 1986) and 17 NCAA individual titles (four in men's swimming, four in men's track and field, seven in women's swimming, and two in women's track and field).
- Louisville stood at seventh in the nation in the Learfield IMG College Director's Cup Division I fall 2019 national all-sports standings, before the COVID-19 pandemic forced the cancellation of winter sports championships and nearly all of the springs sports season. Louisville and Michigan were the only two programs to collectively reach the postseason in fall 2019 in football, men's soccer, women's soccer, field hockey and volleyball.
- Cardinal Athletic teams achieved an impressive 3.332 combined grade point average for the 2019-20 academic year, including a record 3.507 GPA for the 2020 Spring semester. All 23 sports programs were above a 3.0 collective GPA for the 2020 Spring semester, with 84 percent (472 of 562) of the Cardinals' student-athletes earning a 3.0 GPA or better, earning Athletic Director's Honor Roll status. A total of 318 student-athletes were 2020 Red and Black Scholars, representing a cumulative GPA of 3.25 or better.
- Five Louisville athletic teams — men's and women's basketball, women's cross country, women's golf and volleyball — received public recognition through the NCAA Academic Performance Program for ranking in the top 10 percent in the 2015-19 most recent multiyear Academic Progress Rate scores, which measures academic eligibility, retention, and graduation for student-athletes. Fourteen UofL programs produced perfect APR scores for the most recent single-year figures. UofL student-athletes achieved a record 91 percent graduation rate in the most recent Graduation Success Rate report.
- UofL Athletics won the 2019-20 NCAA Team Works Award competition, its second national title for outstanding community service in the six years of the competition. For the 2019 fall semester during the national competition, UofL student-athletes amassed over 6,800 service hours through its CardsCARE community outreach program in the NCAA Team Works Helper Helper Community Service Challenge. The Cardinals have ranked in the top 10 nationally in service hours for six consecutive years.
- The KFC Yum! Center basketball arena, Cardinal Stadium for football, and Mark and Cindy Lynn Stadium for soccer are state-of-the-art facilities. Since 2010, UofL has also built a rowing center, expanded its football, baseball and softball stadiums, and purchased the University of Louisville Golf Club. UofL opened its \$14.5 million student-athlete academic center in 2016 and \$8 million broadcast center in 2018.

- The University of Miami is the youngest institution in the ACC. Although founded in 1925, UM did not start classes until October 1926 in a partially constructed hotel after a hurricane had devastated other opening facilities. This auspicious start not only provided the name for the Miami Hurricanes, but also provided a foundation for a fast growing citizen-founded university, which has had only six presidents during its entire existence.
- The University of Miami awarded the first athletic scholarship to a female student-athlete.
- UM is among the first institutions, if not the first, to adopt an athletics logo as its school-wide symbol, the U.
- The Miller School of Medicine, founded in 1952, was the first medical school in Florida.
- For the 18th time, U.S. News & World Report ranked Bascom Palmer Eye Institute of the University of Miami Health System No. 1 in ophthalmology in its 2019-20 "Best Hospitals" rankings. The list also ranked the Miller School of Medicine's Department of Otolaryngology No. 9 in the nation, a dramatic jump from No. 41 the previous year.
- Sylvester Comprehensive Cancer Center, part of the University of Miami Leonard M. Miller School of Medicine, received the prestigious NCI designation from the National Cancer Institute. Sylvester is one of only two NCI-designated cancer centers in Florida and one of just 71 across the nation.
- Trumpeter John Daversa, associate professor and chair of studio music and jazz at the Frost School of Music, won three Grammy Awards in 2019 for his "American Dreamers: Voices of Hope, Music of Freedom" album. Fellow faculty members Dafnis Prieto and Brian Lynch also earned Grammys, with Prieto winning in 2019 for Best Latin Jazz Album and Lynch winning in 2020 for Best Large Jazz Ensemble.
- The University of Miami's College of Engineering-Johnson & Johnson 3D Printing Center of Excellence Collaborative Laboratory gives faculty and students access to 3D printing technology to make objects limited only by imagination.
- By replicating real-life hospital, outpatient clinic, and home environments, the School of Nursing and Health Studies' Simulation Hospital enables health care students and professionals, first responders, and corporate partners to design, test, and master skills, technologies, and innovations.
- The University of Miami hosted the first Miami Climate Symposium, held over three days in January of 2020 at the Rosenstiel School of Marine and Atmospheric Science and on the Coral Gables campus, bringing together scientists and experts on extreme weather patterns that are linked to climate change.
- Researchers at the Rosenstiel School of Marine and Atmospheric Science received a \$3 million grant from the National Fish and Wildlife Foundation to harvest healthy corals that will be transplanted into the 125 acres of the Florida Reef Tract that have been decimated by disease.
- NASA and the National Space Grant Foundation selected a team led by Victoria Coverstone, professor and chair of the College of Engineering's Department of Mechanical and Aerospace Engineering, as one of just 11 national teams that will design systems and technologies to support deep-space exploration.
- Nurse practitioner students from the School of Nursing and Health Studies deployed with the U.S. Army to Huehuetenango, Guatemala, to provide health care as part of the Army's Beyond the Horizon 2019 humanitarian assistance program.
- Selected for its expertise in genetics and genomics and its location, the University of Miami received a \$60 million grant from the National Institutes of Health to lead the SouthEast Enrollment Center for All of Us, a program to build the most inclusive and diverse health database in history. The center will enroll 100,000 participants as part of the more than 1 million U.S. participants expected over the next five years.
- The 90,000-square-foot Carol Soffer Indoor Practice Facility features two high-performance artificial turf fields and a football operations center with coaches' offices, conference and meeting rooms, a video center, a recruiting suite, and displays celebrating the University's football history.
- Nine University of Miami Athletics programs — men's basketball, men's and women's cross country, men's diving, golf, rowing, men's and women's tennis, and women's track and field — were recognized for perfect single-year scores of 1,000 in the 2018-19 Academic Progress Report released by the NCAA.
- The National Collegiate Athletic Association awarded the University of Miami a 2019 NCAA CHOICES Grant for its 'Canes Connected peer-education program. The program is a commitment from the Division of Student Affairs, Department of Athletics, and all Hurricanes to promote healthy lifestyles and to educate students about the negative consequences of high-risk use of alcohol, tobacco, and other drugs.
- The Rosenstiel School of Marine and Atmospheric Science's Marine Technology and Life Sciences Seawater Complex includes the Alfred C. Glassell, Jr. SUSTAIN Building, a wind-wave-storm surge simulator capable of generating Category 5 hurricane-force winds.



- The University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill is the nation's first public university.
- In September 2019, UNC-Chapel Hill tied for fifth in U.S. News & World Report's annual "Best Colleges" rankings among national public universities. That same month, the Wall Street Journal/Times Higher Education College Rankings ranked Carolina third among all public universities nationwide.
- Reuters ranked UNC-Chapel Hill sixth in its 2019 list of the World's Most Innovative Universities.
- The University offers 77 bachelor's, 107 master's, 65 doctorate and seven professional degree programs through 14 schools, including the College of Arts & Sciences.
- The University was one of the country's first public universities to adopt a debt-free financial aid initiative. The Carolina Covenant serves as a national model for providing a debt-free education to qualified low-income students. More than one in 10 undergraduate students is a Carolina Covenant Scholar. More than 8,000 students have benefited from the Carolina Covenant since the program began in 2003.
- In 2018, the University expanded its commitment to access and affordability for North Carolina families with the Blue Sky Scholars program. This \$20 million scholarship initiative is designed to fill an important gap by supporting exceptionally qualified North Carolina residents from middle-class backgrounds who qualify for financial aid but do not meet the requirements for the Carolina Covenant.
- UNC-Chapel Hill aims to provide students with a global experience. With more than 420 programs in 70 countries, 41% of UNC-Chapel Hill undergraduates study in other countries before graduation — one of the highest study abroad rates among public universities nationwide. Since 1973, our students have received more than 336 Fulbright Student Program Awards for global research and study.
- Seventeen Tar Heel varsity athletics teams exceeded the national average for the past four years in the NCAA's Academic Progress Rates, which track the academic performance of scholarship students who compete on varsity teams. The score measures eligibility and retention each semester by student athletes at every NCAA institution.
- With more than \$1.4 billion reached in annual research expenditures, The University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill is 12th among universities in the United States for the amount of research conducted each year, ranking fifth in the nation for federal research expenditures, and first for federally funded social and behavioral sciences research and development.
- Among its diverse faculty, Carolina has a co-recipient of the 2015 Nobel Prize in Chemistry; 37 members of the American Academy of Arts and Sciences; 22 members of the National Academy of Medicine; seven members of the National Academy of Engineering; 12 members of the National Academy of Sciences; and 84 fellows of the American Association for the Advancement of Science.
- The University is a founding member of the American Talent Initiative. This initiative aims to attract, enroll and graduate an additional 50,000 lower-income students by 2025. American Talent Initiative members are a subset of colleges and universities that consistently graduate at least 70% of their students in six years and include a mix of public and private colleges and universities from all over the country.
- Multiple UNC-Chapel Hill graduate programs were highly ranked on U.S. News & World Report's "Best Graduate Schools" list, including the Eshelman School of Pharmacy (overall, No. 1) and the School of Medicine (Primary Care, No. 1).
- Since launching Innovate Carolina in 2010, UNC-Chapel Hill has significantly strengthened efforts to commercialize research-based intellectual property. A 2020 Innovate Carolina commercialization impact report shows that, when comparing the two most recent five-year periods, faculty invention disclosures are up 19%, new patent applications are up 25%, U.S. patents issued are up 85% and licensing revenue is up 47%. Highlights include creating the \$10 million Carolina Research Ventures Fund to spur investments in startups and collaborating in creating a downtown Chapel Hill accelerator that has worked with 132 companies since 2013. Those companies earned \$43 million in revenue and created 460 jobs in 2019.

- NC State is one of the nation's pre-eminent research institutions. Every day, our accomplished, high-performing students, faculty, staff and alumni create economic, societal and intellectual prosperity.
- With over 34,000 students, NC State educates more North Carolinians than any other university.
- U.S. News & World Report ranks NC State as one of the top 10 best values among the nation's public universities.
- PayScale.com ranks NC State first among North Carolina public universities for the early and midcareer salaries earned by its graduates.
- NC State was the first ACC institution to integrate athletics in 1956.
- In the classroom, NC State student-athletes continue to perform at an extremely high level. Over the past six years, NC State has posted the six highest graduation success rate (GSR) figures in school history. Last year NC State posted its highest APR mark ever.
- Wolfpack athletes continue to perform well in the competitive arena, five teams finished in the Top 25 in their respective polls in an abbreviated year, while seven teams were ranked in the Top 10 in the nation when play was halted. The NC State women's cross country team finished fifth in the nation in 2019, the third time in the last five years they finished within the Top 5 in the nation.
- NC State won four ACC titles during the 2019-20 year, defending titles in women's cross country and men's swimming and diving, while claiming wrestling and the first women's basketball tournament title since 1991.
- NC State's Centennial Campus is the premier public-private university research campus in the country, where more than 70 corporate, government and nonprofit partners work in state-of-the-art facilities alongside more than 70 NC State research and academic units.
- NC State research has yielded more than 950 U.S. patents and nearly 2,000 patents worldwide, leading to the commercialization of more than 500 consumer products.
- More than 100 startups and spinoffs have been founded based on NC State research, attracting a total of \$1.6 billion in venture capital.
- NC State is one of only two universities in the country leading two National Science Foundation Engineering Research Centers, one creating the smart grid of the future and the other pioneering self-powered health monitoring devices.
- Researchers at NC State recently were awarded the National Medal of Technology and Innovation, elected to the National Academy of Engineering, inducted into the National Inventors Hall of Fame and selected for MIT Technology Review's "35 Innovators Under 35" and Popular Science's "Brilliant 10."
- NC State's James B. Hunt Jr. Library, one of the world's most innovative and advanced centers for learning, is a winner of the prestigious Stanford Prize for Innovation in Research Libraries. The library's automated book retrieval and storage system, the bookBot, creates space for technology-rich collaboration spaces by holding more than 1 million volumes in 18,172 bins stacked 50 feet high. The Hunt Library includes a computer gaming lab, an immersive visualization lab and ultra-HD media production facilities.
- NC State's College of Textiles produces more than half of the textile graduates in the country each year. The university's College of Veterinary Medicine is ranked third in the nation, and the College of Engineering is one of the top 20 public engineering schools in the U.S.
- Fifty-two NC State student-athletes have been awarded the Weaver-James Corrigan Postgraduate Scholarship since 1997 — the highest number of honorees among all league schools.
- NC State is one of only 16 Division I schools to have won two or more NCAA titles in men's basketball (1974 and 1983).
- NC State and its students, alumni and associated startups generate \$6.5 billion in annual added income for the state.



- For 178 years, the University of Notre Dame has provided a distinctive voice in higher education that is at once rigorously intellectual, unapologetically moral in orientation, and firmly embracing of a service ethos. Founded in 1842 by a priest of the Congregation of Holy Cross, Notre Dame is a national Catholic research university located adjacent to the city of South Bend, Indiana, in a metropolitan area of some 325,000, approximately 90 miles east of Chicago.
- Admission to the University is highly competitive, with 38 percent of incoming first-year students ranking in the top 1 percent of their high school graduating classes and 89 percent in the top 10 percent of their classes.
- Notre Dame is organized into four undergraduate colleges—Arts and Letters, Science, Engineering, and the Mendoza College of Business—the School of Architecture, the Law School, the Graduate School, the Keough School for Global Affairs, 13 major research institutes, three dozen centers and special programs, and the University Library system.
- The Graduate School, established in 1918, encompasses nine terminal master's degree programs, six professional master's programs, plus 26 doctoral degree programs in and among 30 departments, institutes, and programs.
- Notre Dame is among the most geographically diverse universities in the country with students from all 50 states and over 90 countries.
- Notre Dame faculty members have earned 65 fellowships from the National Endowment for the Humanities since 1999, more than for any other research university in the nation.
- More than 75 percent of Notre Dame students participate in study abroad programs, a figure ranking in the top 10 among American doctoral/research institutions. The University recently added nine new short-term summer programs.
- Notre Dame's service to the Catholic Church is extensive, including the Alliance for Catholic Education, a master's program in which recent graduates serve in under-resourced Catholic K-12 schools nationwide.
- More U.S. presidents (6) have delivered commencement addresses at Notre Dame than any other university in the nation outside of the military academies.
- The Basilica of the Sacred Heart, the 14-story Hesburgh Library with its 132-foot-high mural depicting Christ the Teacher, and the university's historic Main Building with its famed Golden Dome are among the most widely recognized university landmarks in the world.
- Notre Dame sponsors 26 varsity athletics programs (13 men's, 13 women's) and has won 31 national championships (11 consensus titles in football—1924-29-30-43-46-47-49-66-73-77-88; 10 in fencing—men in 1977-78-86, women in 1987, combined in 1994, 2003-05-11-17-18; plus NCAA crowns in women's soccer in 1995, 2004 and 2010; women's basketball in 2000-01 and 2017-18; men's tennis in 1944 and 1959; men's golf in 1944, men's cross country in 1957, and men's soccer in 2013.
- Notre Dame consistently leads all Football Bowl Subdivision institutions in athletic graduation rate measurements. In NCAA Graduation Success Rate figures, Notre Dame student-athletes have ranked No. 1 among FBS schools for 14 straight years (2007-2020). No other FBS institution has had more years of at least 13 perfect APR scores than Notre Dame. Only three schools (Notre Dame, Boston College and Stanford) in the history of the APR have had 13 or more teams post scores of 1,000 in a single report. In other GSR ratings, Notre Dame male student-athletes ranked first for six straight years (2009-14), female student-athletes have ranked No. 1 for 13 straight years (nine of those years at 100), and football student-athletes have finished first four of the last 10 years.
- Notre Dame athletics in recent years has produced two student body presidents (fencer Alex Coccia in 2013-14 and football player Corey Robinson in 2016-17), a University valedictorian (rower Anna Kottkamp in 2015), a NCAA Woman of the Year honoree (Elizabeth Tucker from women's soccer in 2014), and a Summer Olympic Games flag-bearer (fencer Mariel Zagunis for the United States delegation in London in 2012). Coccia also won a Rhodes Scholarship.
- Notre Dame ranks third all-time, only behind Nebraska and MIT, in production of Academic All-Americans, as chosen by the College Sports Information Directors of America (CoSIDA). In addition, Notre Dame has produced the most Google Cloud Academic All-America® Hall of Fame honorees (9).
- The extensive RecSports program at Notre Dame features two historic offerings—the Bengal Bouts, the men's boxing club's annual charity tournament that since 1920 has benefited the missions in Bangladesh, and also Bookstore Basketball, the largest five-on-five outdoor basketball tournament in the world, annually featuring more than 700 team entries.

- The University of Pittsburgh is a state-related university and a world leader in education, research and innovation. Pitt's enrollment for fall term 2019 was nearly 33,800 undergraduate and graduate students for all campuses. In addition, Pitt has more than 320,000 alumni around the world.
- The University's more than 14,400 employees, including more than 5,600 faculty members, served nearly 33,800 students from all 50 states, the District of Columbia, three U.S. territories, and 105 foreign countries through the programs of its 16 undergraduate, graduate, and professional schools in the 2019-20 academic year.
- The University of Pittsburgh has again been named the top public university in the Northeast, according to recent rankings by the Wall Street Journal/Times Higher Education College Rankings. This is the fourth time in five years that Pitt has been recognized as No. 1 on this nationally regarded ranking. In addition to being named the top public university in the Northeast, Pitt was also ranked No. 25 among best public schools in the country. In September 2019, the U.S. News & World Report ranked Pitt among the nation's top 20 public colleges and universities in their 2020 Best Colleges rankings.
- Pitt students consistently win a significant number of prestigious national and international awards for academic achievement. Pitt undergraduates have claimed one Gates Cambridge Scholarship, two Churchill Scholarships, eight Rhodes Scholarships, 12 Truman Scholarships, nine Marshall Scholarships, nine Udall Scholarships, and an astounding 60 Goldwater Scholarships.
- Pitt is among the nation's leading producers of student Fulbright grant winners, with nearly 300 to date. Pitt also is among the nation's leading producers of Boren scholars, Whitaker International fellows, Critical Language scholars, and Humanity in Action fellows.
- Senior faculty members have been elected to such prestigious groups as the Health and Medicine Division of the National Academies of Sciences, Engineering, and Medicine; American Association for the Advancement of Science; American Society for Clinical Investigation; National Academy of Education; American Academy of Nursing; and National Academy of Sciences. And they have claimed some of the country's most prestigious awards, including the National Medal of Science, Lasker-DeBakey Clinical Medical Research Award, John D. and Catherine T. MacArthur Foundation "Genius Grant," and Andrew W. Mellon Foundation Distinguished Achievement Award.
- In the 2018-19 academic year, faculty members were awarded the American Society for Clinical Investigation Council Young Physician-Scientist Award, Association for Psychological Science Rising Star designation, American Geophysical Union Biogeosciences section Sulzmann Award for Excellence in Education and Mentoring, National Institutes of Health (NIH) Director's New Innovator Award, NIH Director's Transformative Research Award, and the Jonathan E. Rhoads Medal. Faculty members also were named fellows of the American Association for the Advancement of Science, American Physical Society, and Geological Society of America.
- Since the beginning of this century, Pitt alumni have received the Nobel Peace Prize, Nobel Prize in Physiology or Medicine, Pulitzer Prize for fiction, National Medal of Science, National Book Award, John Fritz Medal in engineering, Shaw Prize in Life Science and Medicine, Albany Medical Center Prize in Medicine and Biomedical Research, and many other high honors.
- In the most recent QS World University Rankings (2020), a ranking of the world's top 1,000 universities, the University of Pittsburgh was ranked 37th in the United States and 140th in the world. The QS World University Rankings by Subject 2020 gave the third spot in the world to Pitt's philosophy department.
- The leaders of Pitt Athletics assembled the ultimate lineup to support the Pitt's Center for Vaccine Research (CVR), which is working to create a vaccine for the virus that causes the disease COVID-19. The families of head football coach Pat Narduzzi, head men's basketball coach Jeff Capel, head women's basketball coach Lance White and director of athletics Heather Lyke made a combined \$500,000 lead donation to CVR. They were joined by the Penguins of the National Hockey League, the Pirates of Major League Baseball and the Steelers of the National Football League—which each donated \$100,000. The result of this team effort is a grand total of \$800,000 in support of Pittsburgh's "scientific champions."
- Pitt's intercollegiate athletics history dates back to 1869, when the university began to field a baseball team. Today, Pitt sponsors 19 varsity sports with more than 450 student-athletes vying for conference, regional and national honors.
- The Panthers rank fifth among all schools with nine inductees in the Pro Football Hall of Fame. Pitt's gridiron legacy also includes 24 College Hall of Famers, 92 first-team All-America citations and nine national championships. Pitt's latest Pro Football Hall of Fame honoree is offensive tackle Jimbo Covert, who spearheaded the Chicago Bears' vaunted rushing attack in the 1980s. Covert was named to the special 20-member Centennial Class of 2020 commemorating the NFL's 100th season.
- In 2019, the Pitt football team achieved its third eight-win season under Coach Pat Narduzzi, capped by a 34-30 victory over Eastern Michigan in the Quick Lane Bowl. Under Narduzzi since 2015, the Panthers own the third-best record in ACC play with a 24-16 mark (tied with Virginia Tech). Only Clemson (38-2) and Miami (25-15) have better ACC records during that timeframe.
- The Panthers' volleyball program, under the leadership of two-time ACC Coach of the Year Dan Fisher, won a third consecutive ACC championship in 2019 and hosted the NCAA Tournament's opening rounds for the second consecutive season. Pitt recorded its first unbeaten ACC campaign, finishing at 18-0, while matching its best overall single-season winning percentage at .938 (30-2). It was the fourth consecutive season that the Panthers advanced to the NCAA Tournament under Fisher's watch.
- Men's soccer, under the direction of Coach Jay Vidovich, earned an at-large bid to the NCAA Men's Soccer Championship Tournament, the Panthers' first NCAA berth since 1965. Pitt defeated Lehigh, 2-0, in the opening round, achieving the program's first NCAA victory in school history. During the regular season, the Panthers defeated No. 1 Virginia, 2-0, on the road on Oct. 18, 2019, the first time the program ever defeated the nation's top-ranked team.
- Under Coach Keith Gavin, the wrestling program had three ACC champions. Pitt finished the season ranked eighth in the NWCA rankings, its highest to end the season since 1960. Two of Pitt's ACC champions — Micky Phillippi and Jake Wentzel — were named NWCA All-Americans, NWCA Scholar All-Americans and All-ACC Wrestling Academic Team honorees. In addition, Demetrius Thomas and Nino Bonaccorsi were also named NWCA All-Americans.
- Coach Jeff Capel's men's basketball team posted its most overall wins since the 2016-17 season and doubling its conference victory total from a year ago. Those wins included a season sweep of North Carolina and a season-opening win over 2020 ACC Champion Florida State. Justin Champagne became the first freshman since Charles Smith (1984-85) to lead the team in scoring and rebounds.
- Lance White's women's basketball team closed the 2019-20 with a pulsating ACC Tournament victory over defending conference champion Notre Dame, 67-65, thanks to a last-second jumper by freshman Dayshannette Harris. The frosh phenom earned All-ACC Freshman Team honors.
- Under Coach Alonzo Webb's watch, men's track and field performer Greg Lauray earned All-America accolades in the high jump. Lauray qualified for the NCAA Track and Field Indoor Championships, achieving the ninth best height nationally. Lauray became the first Pitt men's high jumper to earn indoor All-America honors.
- Coach John Hargis' swimming and diving program produced three 2020 All-Americans as selected by the College Swimming & Diving Coaches Association of America (CSCAA): swimmer Blaise Vera and divers Serena Buchwald and Amy Read.
- Randy Waldrum's women's soccer team had stirring ACC victories over Boston College (2-1 in overtime) and NC State (2-1), an opponent that was receiving national Top 25 votes. Amanda West earned All-ACC and All-Atlantic Region accolades. West broke Pitt's single-season points record with 29 and also tied for most goals (10) and assists (nine).
- Under Coach Samantha Snider, the Panthers' gymnastics team broke two school records during the shortened 2020 season: best team road score (196.500) and best team vault score (49.325). Michaela Burton tied a program record with three East Atlantic Gymnastics League (EAGL) Gymnast of the Week honors, while leading the league on balance beam (9.885 NQS) and uneven bars (9.850 NQS).
- In an abbreviated season, Mike Bell's baseball team opened with a 10-1 record, tied for the second-best start through 11 games in program history (1963, 1967 and 1993). Kyle Hess ranked sixth in the nation in doubles (nine) and 35th in RBI's (20).
- Two Pitt student-athletes — Taylor Middleton (women's track and field) and Stephanie Williams (volleyball) — were selected as 2020 ACC Postgraduate Scholarship recipients. Both received the ACC's prestigious Weaver-James-Corrigan Postgraduate Award.
- Six Pitt athletic programs — football, men's cross country, men's soccer, softball, volleyball and wrestling — set or matched their multi-year Academic Progress Report (APR) scores from a year ago. Pitt had nine programs perform at or above the national average for multi-year rate ending with the 2018-19 academic year, including the football and men's cross country teams that earned APR Public Recognition honors.

- Syracuse University is a private research university that advances knowledge across disciplines to drive breakthrough discoveries and breakout leadership. Our collection of 13 schools and colleges with more than 200 customizable majors closes the gap between education and action so students can take on the world. In and beyond the classroom, we connect people, perspectives and practices to solve interconnected challenges with interdisciplinary approaches. Together, we're a powerful community that moves ideas, individuals and impact beyond what's possible.
- The depth and breadth of the university's program offerings are a testament to its enduring strength, with more than 200 majors and 100 minors offered through 13 schools and colleges and 22 online degree programs. Notably, the first fully interactive online JD program in the nation, JDinteractive, offers a full law degree experience, with each course blending live classes and self-paced lessons offered on a flexible schedule for part-time students.
- More than 15,000 undergraduates and 7,500 graduate students who come from all 50 states and 123 countries join a global network of nearly 242,000 alumni spanning 160 countries.
- The University has a long legacy of commitment to diversity and inclusion across multiple dimensions, with minority students comprising about 25 percent of current enrollment and international students making up about 15 percent. With seven overseas locations and more than 100 programs within 60 countries, nearly half of Syracuse University students study abroad at some point during their academic careers.
- Syracuse University distinguishes itself among the nation's best research universities as determined by the Carnegie Foundation. As a Carnegie classification Research 1 institution, Syracuse offers students hands-on opportunities through the Office of Undergraduate Research and Creative Engagement.
- Interdisciplinary study opportunities allow students to expand options and enhance preparedness for post-academic success. For example, BioInspired Syracuse supports research into complex biological systems and smart materials to address global needs in health, medicine and materials innovation; the Syracuse University Autonomous Systems Policy Institute combines public policy, law, scientific research, design, aging, disability studies, security, and public communication to the study of artificial intelligence, big data, and data analytics.
- Several schools and colleges — Architecture, Information Studies, Maxwell School of Citizenship and Public Affairs, Newhouse School of Public Communications, and Whitman School of Management — rank among the nation's best in their fields.
- Nationally-recognized programs include creative writing, entrepreneurship and emerging enterprises, industrial design, information systems, drama, and social work.
- Invest Syracuse, a \$100 million dollar initiative, was launched to increase access and opportunity to promising students from across the socioeconomic spectrum, and to invest in new faculty positions in bio-enabled science and technology; artificial intelligence, deep learning, autonomous systems and policy; social differences and social justice, among others.
- Syracuse University students have access to one of the most comprehensive and innovative health and wellness complexes in the nation in the Barnes Center at The Arch, which brings together health and recreation services including everything from a climbing wall to Esports to meditation classes in a holistic approach to enhancing the student experience.
- Syracuse University has earned a reputation as the best university for veterans and military-connected students, who make up more than five percent of the student body (nearly double the national average), with such precedent-setting initiatives as the Entrepreneurship Bootcamp for Veterans with Disabilities.
- Through its innovative Institute for Veterans and Military Families, Syracuse University has provided programs and services to more than 90,000 veterans, service members and their families since 2011.
- Opening in 2020, the \$63 million National Veterans Resource Center (NVRC) is dedicated to advancing the social and economic well-being of the nation's veterans and their families on the campus of Syracuse University and beyond.
- Syracuse University Athletics is a source of university and community pride with the largest on-campus basketball arena and the largest domed stadium in the northeast.
- The famous Dome stadium is a hub of economic activity in Central New York, attracting visitors from around the country. The university has committed more than \$100 million to create a new stadium experience, including a roof replacement and comprehensive series of Americans with Disabilities Act (ADA)-related accessibility upgrades.
- Success for Syracuse University Athletics is as prevalent in the classroom as it is in the competitive sports environment. The more than 600 Orange student-athletes recorded a cumulative grade point average of 3.04 with an NCAA Graduation Success Rate (GSR) of 93%, the highest in school history. Six Orange teams earned the NCAA's Public Recognition Award for scoring in the top 10 percent of their sport nationally, including men's cross country, men's track & field, men's lacrosse, women's volleyball, women's tennis and women's soccer. Five of these teams achieved a perfect multi-year score of 1,000, marking the third straight year that Syracuse has had at least five teams achieve a perfect multi-year score.
- The University boasts eight alumni in the Pro Football Hall of Fame; 18 coaches and players in the College Football Hall of Fame; the 2003 men's basketball national championship; three members in the Naismith Memorial Basketball Hall of Fame; 11 NCAA championships in men's lacrosse; 28 members in the National Lacrosse Hall of Fame; and in 2015 the field hockey and men's cross country teams won national championships within 24 hours of each other.
- On big game days, the campus is flooded by fans covered in Orange. In 1890, Syracuse became the first university to adopt one official color. Orange pride is obvious throughout the region. The university mascot is Otto, a giant orange ball.
- And then there's the Legend of 44, one of the most fabled numbers ever associated with a college football program. Since 1954, eleven players have worn the number and three earned All-American honors. Those three — Jim Brown, Ernie Davis, and Floyd Little — rank among the finest running backs ever to play the college game. In recognition of the number's significance, the University resides within the 13244 zip code, and all University phone numbers start with "44."

VIRGINIA

- The University of Virginia is one of the nation's top public universities. Thomas Jefferson — who designed the buildings, planned the curriculum, and hired the first faculty members — founded UVA in 1819.
- The original governing board of the University included Jefferson and his friends Presidents James Madison and James Monroe. Jefferson's original "Academical Village" remains the heart of the University's Grounds and is the only university in America designated as a UNESCO World Heritage Site.
- Rankings for UVA are consistently high. U.S. News & World Report ranks UVA as the No. 4 public national university. UVA has been among the top four public universities in the magazine's annual rankings every year since 1991.
- UVA is highly selective. Among 2019 first-year students, 90 percent ranked in the top 10 percent of their high school graduating class.
- Graduation rates at UVA are among the highest in the country. The six-year graduation rate for students who entered in fall 2013 is 94.6 percent.
- Student-athletes excel on the field and in the classroom. In 2019-2020, UVA won two Atlantic Coast Conference championships — men's soccer and women's swimming and diving.
- UVA Medical Center — named No. 1 in a list of "Best Hospitals" in Virginia by U.S. News & World Report — is a nationally renowned academic medical center committed to educating tomorrow's health-care leaders, offering outstanding patient care, and discovering better ways to treat diseases.
- UVA is recognized as a leader in humanities, social sciences, and arts scholarship and is enhancing research efforts in science and engineering to support the pursuit of innovation and discoveries with the potential to transform society.
- As a member of the Association of American Universities and a leading research institution, UVA offers undergraduates an outstanding educational experience with a wide range of volunteer-service and extracurricular opportunities.
- Students at UVA have a long tradition of student self-governance. The University Judiciary Committee, the Honor Committee, Student Council, the Lawn Selection Committee, and many others are staffed and governed solely by students.

- Virginia Tech is home to 567 total student-athletes of which 407 were named to the Dean's List in Spring 2020 and 205 Fall 2019.
- Three hundred seventy-eight student-athletes maintained a cumulative GPA of 3.0 or better and six had cumulative GPAs of 4.0.
- The average student-athlete cumulative GPA was 3.15, with 378 earning a 3.0 or greater in Spring 2019 (with 100 achieving 4.0s).
- Student athlete average term GPA for Spring 2020: 3.54.
- The Hokies had 20 out of 20 teams achieve a 3.0 or greater this spring, while 16 teams maintained a cumulative GPAs of 3.0 or better.
- Women's tennis had 3.82 Spring 2020 GPA, the best among Hokie teams. In all, five teams had 3.75 GPAs or higher (women's tennis, women's swimming, lacrosse, volleyball and men's tennis).
- Sarah Edwards (WXC/T&F), Natalie Novotna (WTEN) and Jaylyn Thompson (WSOC) won ACC Postgraduate Scholarships in Spring 2020.
- Bashir Mosavel-Lo (men's track & field) and Sarah Spicer (women's golf) earned the Virginia Tech Athletics Skelton Award for Academic Excellence in Spring 2020.
- Students are extremely involved in co-curricular activities. They rank 13 percentage points higher than college students nationally and double that of students at other large institutions.
- College of Engineering ranks No. 8 in the nation for research expenditures and No. 13 for its undergraduate program.
- Master of Information Technology program ranked No. 2 nationally. Evening MBA program ranked No. 17.
- Virginia Tech consistently ranks as nation's best for studying natural resources and conservation.
- College of Architecture and Urban Studies ranked in top five nationally for its undergraduate programs in architecture and interior design.
- Corps of Cadets boasts the highest commissioning rate — 79 percent — of all the senior military and service academies in nation.
- Professor Marc Edwards named to Time magazine's 100 Most Influential People for uncovering the lead-in-water issue in Flint, Michigan.
- Peter Seuffer claimed the ACC Men's Cross Country title for the second consecutive season. He finished fourth in the NCAA Championship, the best-ever finish in the men's distance program's history. He earned All-American honors for the second consecutive season and won the NCAA Southeast Region championship. Seuffer was named the NCAA Southeast Region Athlete of the Year.
- Jacory Patterson set a new U.S. collegiate record in the 300-meter dash with a time of 32.28. The time is the sixth-fastest time ever for an American and the 11th-fastest time ever internationally.
- Women's golf won the 2019 Princess Anne Invitational for its first-ever team title. Emily Mahar won her first-ever individual title in the same event.
- Four teams (men's soccer, women's soccer, men's cross country, football) qualified for NCAA postseason competition.
- The football team's appearance in the 2019 Belk Bowl was the 27th straight for the Hokies — the longest active streak in the NCAA and the third-longest in NCAA history.
- In the fall, the men's soccer team made its fourth consecutive appearance in the NCAA Tournament and the women's team made the NCAA Tournament for the second consecutive season.
- The men's basketball team defeated No. 3 Michigan State in the first round of the Maui Invitational.
- Women's soccer's Mandy McGlynn completed her collegiate career with honors both on the field and in the classroom. She was named first team All-ACC, first team All-Atlantic Region and second team All-American. Academically, she was named first team Scholar All-South Region and first team Scholar.
- All-American. She was also named the VaSID Player of the Year and capped it off by being selected in the NWSL College Draft.
- The women's basketball team finished the season tied for fourth in the ACC with a 21-9 overall and 11-7 in conference action. The 11 ACC wins sets a new mark for most wins in an ACC conference season.
- Aaron Boyd was named second runner-up for the Arthur Ashe Award, given annually to young, outstanding minority men and women who have distinguished themselves in their academic and athletics pursuits.



POINTS OF PRIDE



WAKE FOREST

- In 1956 Wake Forest successfully moved the approximately 120 miles from Wake Forest, NC, to Winston-Salem, NC, while retaining its name, heritage, traditions, and uniqueness as an institution.
- In 1962 Wake Forest became the first southern private university to integrate.
- In 2009, Wake Forest was the first top-30 university to adopt a test-optional policy and stop requiring standardized tests for undergraduate admission.
- Wake Forest was one of eight teams to play in the first NCAA basketball tournament in 1939.
- In 1953 Wake Forest was one of the seven institutions that founded the Atlantic Coast Conference and provided the new Conference with its first Commissioner. Persons closely associated with Wake Forest have stated the moving of the University from Wake Forest to Winston-Salem and the joining with six other institutions to form the ACC have been the two most important historical events that have contributed to the subsequent growth of Wake Forest to become a top-30 ranked national University today.
- Wake Forest's 1955 College World Series championship marked the first national championship by an Atlantic Coast Conference member institution.
- Jim Caldwell was the first African American head football coach in the Atlantic Coast Conference. The first African American quarterback and the first African American to earn All-ACC honors in three straight years in the ACC were Wake Forest student-athletes.
- Wake Forest has had 16 Rhodes Scholars.
- Wake Forest has had 96 Fulbright Scholars in the past 20 years.
- Students in Wake Forest's accountancy program have achieved the highest passage rate in the nation on the Certified Public Accountant (CPA) examination more than any other school in the past 20 years. Since the program began offering a master's degree in accounting in 1997, the graduates have achieved the top national ranking in passage rate of the CPA exam 13 times.
- Located at Wake Downtown in the city's Innovation Quarter, Wake Forest's undergraduate engineering program pioneered a new path for engineering education with a curriculum grounded in the liberal arts tradition at a research university. Sixty percent of engineering faculty are women, including the chair. Over forty percent of students enrolled in the engineering program are women, more than twice the national average.
- The James W. Denmark Loan Fund, originally named the North Carolina Baptist Students' Aid Association, is the oldest student loan fund in the United States, having been established at Wake Forest on November 30, 1875.
- Wake Forest's Magnolia Scholars program for first-generation students goes beyond a traditional scholarship — inviting the students into a specialized program with community, accountability and targeted mentoring. In 2019, the Magnolia Scholars program celebrated 10 years of providing scholarships, academic support, study abroad opportunities and counseling for 120 first-generation students.
- As a national leader in the college to career experience, Wake Forest continues to transform the traditional, outdated concept of "career services" into a holistic, four-year approach to personal and career development. Wake Forest prepares students for a lifelong career journey, not just the first job after college. The Office of Personal and Career Development's innovative and effective initiatives support career development from a student's first days on campus. The National Association of Colleges and Employers awarded Wake Forest President Nathan O. Hatch the 2018 Career Services Excellence Award in recognition of the University's career development program. In 2020, Wake Forest University was awarded the National Career Development Association's (NCDA) Exemplary Career Center Program Award.
- "Suited Up," a program for Wake Forest Division I student-athletes, tailors personal and career development to student-athletes' demanding schedules. Student-athletes complete a career readiness program and participate in tailored internships created through the partnership between Student-Athlete Development and local organizations.
- With "Pro Humanitate" as its motto Wake Forest has a tradition of service and community engagement. The Office of Civic and Community Engagement facilitates meaningful opportunities for students, faculty and staff to volunteer in the surrounding area. Wake Forest students established the Brian Piccolo Cancer Fund in 1980 in memory of the alumnus and Chicago Bear football star who died of cancer in 1970 at age 26. Students have raised more than \$3 million to support innovative cancer research at the Comprehensive Cancer Center of Wake Forest University Baptist Medical Center.
- Wake Forest has a long and distinguished history in debate dating to the old campus in Wake Forest, NC. Having had final four finishes at the National Debate Tournament in 1993, 1994, 1995, 1997, 2006, 2008, and 2009 and with championships in 1997 and 2008, Wake Forest is among a small number of schools that has qualified most often for the national debate finals. Wake Forest has hosted two Presidential Debates, George H.W. Bush and Governor Michael Dukakis in 1988 and Al Gore and George W. Bush in 2000.
- Wake Forest has been a pioneer in study abroad beginning in the 1970s. Each semester Wake Forest faculty and students gather for semester long study at each of the University-owned houses in London, Venice and Vienna, and visit more than 70 countries worldwide. Nearly 75% of Wake Forest undergraduates receive credit for study abroad.
- The Wake Washington Center - centrally located at One Dupont Circle - is the home of the Wake Washington program, a semester-long study away program combining internship and academic experience in the nation's capital. The center is also a home base for the thousands of Wake Forest alumni who live in the Washington area.
- The Wake Forest Institute for Regenerative Medicine is recognized as an international leader in its field. Physicians and scientists were the first in the world to engineer laboratory-grown organs that were successfully implanted into humans. The Center for Nanotechnology and Molecular Materials is known internationally for leading research efforts in their fields.
- On Arnold Palmer Day (April 13), Wake Forest celebrates the birthday of the legendary Demon Deacon golfer with his signature drink, a mixture of lemonade and iced tea.
- Maya Angelou, the poet, actress, author and civil rights activist, taught at Wake Forest from 1982 until her death in 2014. She once said, "I'm not a writer who teaches. I'm a teacher who writes. But I had to work at Wake Forest to know that." A University residence hall is named in her honor and the Z. Smith Reynolds Library is home to a collection of her movie scripts and drafts of plays and other materials related to her work in film and theater.



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
