COMMISSIONER'S WELCOME

ACC

Last December, when I humbly accepted the offer to become the fifth commissioner of the Atlantic Coast Conference, I stated that I was joining one of the most prestigious athletic organizations in the world.

Our member schools and student-athletes more than confirmed that assessment as they completed a 2020-21 academic year that began with so much uncertainty on a note of triumph and accomplishment.

Despite some inevitable setbacks and detours as the ACC prioritized health and safety guidelines in the face of a worldwide pandemic, each of our conference's 27 sponsored sports completed their seasons and crowned a champion. Five ACC teams claimed NCAA championships, and our student-athletes captured an impressive 24 individual titles.

More importantly, the ACC's 15 public and private member institutions continued to set the highest academic standards as our league again stood out among peer conferences.

In the "Best Colleges" rankings released last September by US News & World Report, the ACC was only FBS conference with eight member institutions among the top 50 – four more than any peer league. The ACC's average rank of 54 led all peer conferences for the 14th consecutive year.

The ACC continued to lead peer conferences with an average graduation rate of 92 percent – matching the conference's average GSR achieved in 2019 and two points higher than this year's national average of 90 percent. Twenty-one ACC teams achieved GSR scores of 100 in the sports of men's basketball, women's basketball and baseball.

Our schools' student-athletes again set a record when it came to ACC Honor Roll numbers, with a record 5,791 recognized for earning a grade point average of 3.0 or better for the entire academic year.

I am also proud of the work of our Committee for Racial and Social Justice, which was formed and implemented under previous commissioner John Swofford in July of 2020, and the activism of our schools and student-athletes.

We all have a deep responsibility to do our part to ensure equality for all, and I have been deeply moved by the ongoing commitment, critical conversations and initiatives surrounding equality, racial and social justice within our conference.

After having its inaugural year interrupted by COVID-19, the ACC Network hit full stride in 2020-21. In addition to live game coverage of football, basketball, baseball and Olympic sports, the 24/7 window offered viewers insightful commentary, colorful features and the innovative programming our ESPN partners envisioned when the network launched in the late summer of 2019. We look forward with much excitement and anticipation as the Network's coverage expands even more and viewership continues to rise.

ACC teams claimed five NCAA titles in 2020-21, including the third straight for North Carolina field hockey under head coach Karen Shelton. After guiding her team to a record-tying ninth national title, Coach Shelton ended last season as the winningest coach in NCAA field hockey history with 711 wins.

Under the guidance of coach Todd DeSorbo, Virginia became just the ninth different school to win a women's swimming national championship and the first from the Atlantic Coast Conference. Paige Madden's three individual event titles for the Cavaliers were the most of any swimmer.

The tradition continues for Notre Dame fencing, which rolled to the 11th national championship in program history. The title was the third for the Fighting Irish in the last four championships, and the third for head coach Gia Kvaratskhelia. Notre Dame's 201 points at the NCAA Championships were a record under the current format.

The ACC ruled NCAA lacrosse with a pair of national titles. The Boston College women, led by head coach Acacia Walker-Weinstein and ACC Women's Athlete of the Year Charlotte North, brought home the program's first national title with a win over fellow conference member Syracuse in the NCAA title match.

On the very next day following the Eagles' win, the Virginia men brought home their seventh NCAA lacrosse championship and their second straight under head coach Lars Tiffany with an exciting one-goal win over Maryland. The Cavaliers' seven NCAA D1 men's lacrosse championships are third most all-time.

The flurry of national title activity bolstered some already impressive numbers for our conference. ACC teams have now won 166 national championships over the course of our 68-year history, and ACC student-athletes have claimed more than 350 individual NCAA titles.

This past year's ACC Football Championship Game at Charlotte's Bank of America Stadium offered a unique matchup between two of the nation's top three teams with five-time defending champion Clemson facing Notre Dame – which competed as conference member for the first time in 2020 due to revisions brought about by the pandemic.



Both teams then earned spots in the four-team College Football Playoff, marking the eighth straight year that an ACC team has reached at least the CFP semifinals. The ACC is one of just two conferences that has placed at least one team in the CFP or the BCS Championship each of the last eight years.

This also marked the 20th consecutive year that at least six ACC teams landed in bowl games. The league's 143 bowl appearances since 2005 rank second among all conferences.

A total of 51 players who either played for an ACC team or competed last year in the league were selected in the 2021 NFL Draft. Even minus the nine selections from Notre Dame, the 42 selections from traditional ACC teams tied for the fifth-most in league history.

The Greensboro Coliseum hosted both conference basketball tournaments in March, extending league records. The New York Life ACC Men's Tournament returned for the 28th time, and the ACC Women's Tournament called the venue home for the 21st time in 22 years.

Georgia Tech emerged as the ACC men's champion for the first time since 1993 and was one of seven ACC teams to earn an NCAA Tournament berth. The ACC extended a remarkable streak of placing at least one team in the Sweet 16 to 41 consecutive tournaments, as both Florida State and Syracuse advanced to the second weekend.

NC State claimed the ACC women's basketball title for the second consecutive year. The ACC led all conferences with eight teams selected to the NCAA women's field, with Louisville reaching the Elite Eight. It marked the 19th consecutive year that at least one team has reached the national quarterfinals, eight more than the next-longest streak nationally.

The academic year closed on a competitive high note as the ACC placed both NC State and Virginia in the College World Series. This marked the 15th consecutive year that at least one team from our conference has reached Omaha.

As we celebrate the ACC's most recent accomplishments, we look ahead to the immediate future. We anticipate some return to "normalcy" as we close the book on 2020-21, but this remains a time of constant change and reshaping for all of college athletics. My opening months with the Atlantic Coast Conference have only enhanced what was already the utmost confidence in our league and our 15 member institutions. I have no doubt that we will continue to lead academically and athletically as we adapt and move forward.

I am excited to be a part of that journey.

TRADITION *of* EXCELLENCE

Consistency. It is the mark of true excellence in any endeavor.

In today's intercollegiate athletics, competition is so balanced and so competitive that it is virtually impossible to maintain a high level of consistency. Yet the Atlantic Coast Conference has defied the odds.

Established in 1953, the ACC has long enjoyed the reputation as one of the strongest and most competitive intercollegiate conferences in the nation. And that is not mere conjecture, the numbers support it.

Through 68 years of competition, ACC schools have captured 166 NCAA team championships, including 83 in women's competition, 80 in men's sports and three in fencing. In addition, NCAA individual titles have gone to ACC student-athletes 192 times in men's competition and 159 times in women's action.

Since 2015, the ACC has won seven national championships in football, men's basketball, women's basketball and baseball. The ACC is the only conference to win each of those four titles over that stretch.

THE CHAMPIONSHIPS

The ACC conducts championship competition in all 27 sports – 13 for men and 14 for women. The first ACC championship was held in swimming at North Carolina State University on February 25, 1954.

The 13 sports for men include football, cross country, soccer, basketball, fencing, swimming & diving, indoor and outdoor track & field, wrestling, baseball, tennis, golf and lacrosse. Women's sports were initiated in 1977 with the first championship meet held in tennis October 6-8 at Wake Forest University. Championships for women are currently conducted in cross country, field hockey, soccer, basketball, fencing, swimming & diving, indoor and outdoor track & field, tennis, golf, lacrosse, softball and rowing, with volleyball deciding its champion by regular-season play.

A HISTORY

The Atlantic Coast Conference was founded on May 8, 1953, at the Sedgefield Inn near Greensboro, North Carolina with seven charter members – Clemson, Duke, Maryland, North Carolina, North Carolina State, South Carolina and Wake Forest – drawing up the conference by-laws.

The withdrawal of seven schools from the Southern Conference came early on the morning of May 8, 1953, during the Southern Conference's annual spring meeting. On June 14, 1953, the seven members met in Raleigh, North Carolina, where a set of bylaws was adopted, and the name became officially the Atlantic Coast Conference.

Suggestions from fans for the name of the new conference appeared in the region's newspapers prior to the meeting in Raleigh. Some of the names suggested were Dixie, Mid-South, Mid-Atlantic, East Coast, Seaboard, Colonial, Tobacco, Blue-Gray, Piedmont, Southern Seven and the Shoreline.

Duke's Eddie Cameron recommended that the name of the conference be the Atlantic Coast Conference, and the motion was passed unanimously. The meeting concluded with each member institution assessed \$200.00 to pay for conference expenses.

2020-21 YEAR IN REVIEW

The 2020-21 academic year saw athletic competition return after many sport seasons were canceled in 2019-20 due to the COVID-19 pandemic. The conference completed championship competition in all 27 sports with 10 different schools claiming at least one conference crown. ACC teams claimed five NCAA titles and 20 individuals won national championships. The ACC has averaged four national team titles per year over the past two-plus decades (97 in 24 years) and has claimed multiple NCAA titles in 37 of the past 40 years.

Academically, the member institutions of the ACC again led the way among Power 5 conferences in the "Best Colleges" rankings released by US News & World Report. ACC member institutions combined for an average rank of 54, marking the 14th straight year that the ACC led all Power 5 conferences.

On December 4, 1953, conference officials met again at Sedgefield and officially admitted Virginia as the league's eighth member. The first withdrawal of a school from the ACC came on June 30, 1971, when South Carolina tendered its resignation. The ACC operated with seven members until April 3, 1978, when Georgia Tech was admitted. The Atlanta school had withdrawn from the Southeastern Conference in January of 1964.


The ACC expanded to nine members on July 1, 1991, with the addition of Florida State.

The conference expanded to 11 members on July 1, 2004, with the addition of Miami and Virginia Tech. On October 17, 2003, Boston College accepted an invitation to become the league's 12th member starting July 1, 2005.

The ACC added its 13th and 14th members on Sept. 18, 2011, when Pittsburgh and Syracuse accepted invitations to join the conference. The two schools officially joined the ACC on July 1, 2013. Notre Dame also officially joined the ACC on July 1, 2013, after announcing on Sept. 12, 2012 its intention to enter the league for competition in all sports but football, bringing the membership of the conference to 15. The Fighting Irish will play five games with ACC schools each year.

On July 1, 2014, Louisville entered the ACC on the same day Maryland withdrew, keeping the conference's membership at 15 institutions.

- The host **NC STATE** women placed three runners among the top seven to take home their fifth straight conference title – and record 26th overall – at the 2020 ACC Cross Country Championships held October 30 at WakeMed Soccer Park in Cary, North Carolina.
- NC State senior Dominique Clairmonte, whose blazing 5K time during the regular season on the same course netted National Athlete of the Week honors from the USTFCCCA, followed suit at the ACC Championships with a 6K time of 19:55.1 that led the field by 11 seconds.
- Former Wolfpack All-American Laurie Henes has coached NC State to six ACC women's cross country championships, including the aforementioned five in succession.
- With their second-place finish behind NC State, Georgia Tech's women posted their best ACC Championship finish in program history. The Yellow Jackets also set a program first with three All-ACC women's finishers (top 21).
- Led by a fifth-place showing from All-American Hannah Steelman, NC State posted a second-place team finish at the NCAA Championships on March 16 at Stillwater, Oklahoma. Steelman posted a 6K time of 20:14.9, and sophomore Kelsey Chmiel took ninth place at 20:26.4. Freshman Katelyn Tuohy finished in 24th place with her time of 20:41.3.
- Other ACC All-America finishers included No. 12 Nicole Fegans of Georgia Tech (20:29.5), No. 23 Maudie Skyring of FSU (20:40.5), No. 29 Paige Hofstad of North Carolina (20:46.5) and No. 40 Rebecca Clark of Florida State (20:59.4).
- NC State's women posted their highest finish since 2001 while placing among the top 10 in the NCAA women's cross country field for the 15th time. This marks the sixth consecutive year the Wolfpack women have placed among the top 15.

- NOTRE DAME claimed its second ACC men's title in three years with a first-place finish at the ACC Cross Country Championships on Oct. 30 at the WakeMed Soccer Park course in Cary, North Carolina.
- Notre Dame senior Yared Nuguse led his team's victory with an 8K gold medal time of 23:03.6. Nuguse, whose collegiate resume includes an outdoor track national championship and multiple All-America honors, claimed the bronze medal at the 2018 ACC Men's Cross Country Championship and was the runner-up last year.
- As the top first-year finisher at the ACC Championship (11th-place overall), Notre Dame's Josh Methner was recognized as the ACC Freshman of the Year.
- Notre Dame went on the claim a second-place finish at the NCAA Championships. The Irish finished with 87 team points, 27 behind team champion Northern Arizona.
- The second-place finish is the best for Notre Dame since the 1957 team claimed the NCAA title.
- Danny Kilrea led the Notre Dame men with a 10th-place time of 30:11.5. The Fighting Irish placed a four-man pack at positions 20 through 23 to solidify their silver medal finish: Dylan Jacobs (30:25.6), Andrew Alexander (30:26.4), Jake Renfree (30:26.6) and Yared Nuguse (30:26.6). ACC Freshman of the Year Josh Methner was 36th with a time of 30:43.5.
- Florida State's Adriana Wildschut led all ACC runners at the NCAA finals with a silver medal time 29:48.2. The showing came just three days following his career-best 5,000 meters run of 13:30.55 that netted a fourth-place finish at the NCAA Division I Indoor Track and Field Championships at Fayetteville, Arkansas.
- Wildschut's finish is the highest for an ACC runner at the NCAA Men's Division I Cross Country finals since Syracuse's Justyn Knight had the league's only first-place finish to date in 2017.

- The ACC leads all conferences with 21 Division I field hockey national titles following [NORTH CAROLINA'S](#) 4-3 overtime win over Michigan in the finals on May 9.
- UNC's nine national field hockey titles – all under head coach Karen Shelton's watch – tie for the most in NCAA Division I history. Shelton became the winningest field hockey coach of all time over the course of the 2020-21 season and finished the year with 711 victories.
- Despite a reduced 12-team bracket for this year's event in the wake of the COVID-19 pandemic, the ACC placed multiple teams in the NCAA tournament field for the 26th consecutive season. Louisville joined UNC in this year's NCAA field and reached the semifinals before losing to Michigan, 2-1, in a sudden-victory shootout.
- Second-seeded and host North Carolina claimed its fourth consecutive ACC Field Hockey Championship title with a 4-2 win over top-seeded Louisville in the finals on Nov. 8. The ACC Field Hockey Championship is UNC's league-leading 23rd overall. Former ACC member Maryland ranks second with 10 ACC championships. Wake Forest has claimed four ACC titles, and Virginia owns one.
- Louisville secured the No. 1 seed in the ACC Field Hockey Championship for the first time since joining the conference prior to the 2014 season. Head coach Justine Sowry's Cardinals placed atop the fall standings after being tabbed for a fifth-place finish in the ACC preseason coaches' poll.

2020 CHAMPION CLEMSON



- **CLEMSON** won the 2020 ACC Men's Soccer Championship after victories over Virginia Tech (4-1) in the quarterfinals, Virginia (2-1) in the semifinals and Pitt (2-1) in the title game. This was the Tigers' 15th ACC Men's Soccer title, including their fourth tournament championship. Ranked No. 1 nationally for the first time in program history for several weeks this season, Pitt made its first title-game appearance.
- Five ACC teams – Clemson, North Carolina, Pitt, Virginia Tech and Wake Forest – earned bids to the 2020 NCAA Division I Men's Soccer Championship, which featured a smaller field of 36 teams because of pandemic restrictions.
- Clemson (1), Pitt (2) and Wake Forest (5) claimed three of top five national seeds for the NCAA Tournament.
- North Carolina and Pitt reached the NCAA College Cup. The Panthers earned their first-ever College Cup bid, becoming the 11th ACC program to record an appearance in the sport's

final four. Fifty-nine ACC teams have reached the College Cup all-time.

- Four ACC teams were ranked in the final United Soccer Coaches Top 25: No. 3 Pitt, No. 4 North Carolina, No. 6 Wake Forest and No. 15 Virginia Tech.
- Four from the ACC earned United Soccer Coaches All-America honors. Pitt midfielder Valentin Noel was selected to the first team, while the Panthers' Jasper Löeffelsend and Wake Forest's Isaiah Parente were second-team picks. North Carolina's Giovanni Montesdeoca was a third-team selection.
- Twenty-five ACC players were selected in the 2021 MLS SuperDraft, including 12 in the first round. Both totals broke the ACC's own records for a conference. The ACC had each of the top five picks, including the No. 1 overall pick by Austin FC, Virginia Tech midfieler Daniel Pereira.

- **Louisville** won the 2020 ACC Volleyball Championship, its third in the last six seasons and second outright. The Cardinals shared the championship with Pitt in 2017 after winning it outright in 2015.
- Four ACC volleyball teams were selected to the 2020 NCAA Division I Volleyball Championship. ACC Champion Louisville earned the league's NCAA automatic qualification and received a first-round bye as the No. 11 seed. Georgia Tech, Notre Dame and Pitt all earned at-large bids.
- Pitt defeated No. 3 Minnesota in the regional semifinals, marking the second straight postseason an ACC team has advanced to the regional finals.
- For the third time in the last seven NCAA Tournaments, at least two ACC teams advanced to the regional semifinals as No. 11 seed Louisville defeated San Diego and Pitt knocked off No. 14 Utah.
- Four ACC volleyball teams appear in the Final AVCA Poll. No. 8 Pitt led the conference, followed by No. 11 Louisville, No. 22 Notre Dame and No. 23 Georgia Tech.
- Louisville led the nation in blocks per set with 3.36 and ranked 20th in hitting percentage (.268). Georgia Tech ranked 10th nationally in hitting percentage (.285). Pitt was 13th in the nation in kills per set with 14.09 and 15th in assists per set with 13.03. Florida State was 15th nationally in hitting percentage (.275).
- Florida State's Taryn Knuth led the nation in hitting percentage at .549 and teammate Emma Clothier was second (.483). Louisville's Amaya Tillman ranked second nationally in blocks per set (1.78).
- Virginia canceled its season on March 19 and the remaining six matches were deemed forfeits by the ACC.

2020 CHAMPION CLEMSON



Trevor Lawrence had 412 yards of offense and three touchdowns, Travis Etienne ran for 124 yards and a score and No. 3 CLEMSON dominated No. 2 Notre Dame 34-10 to win its sixth straight Atlantic Coast Conference championship.

Lawrence threw long scoring passes to Amari Rodgers and E.J. Williams in the first half to help the Tigers avenge a 47-40 double-overtime loss at Notre Dame - with Lawrence sidelined because of the coronavirus - to lock up a spot in the College Football Playoff for the sixth straight season.

Lawrence, the game MVP, overcame an early interception on a tipped ball to complete 25 of 36 passes for 322 yards. He ran 14 times for 90 yards, with a 34-yard touchdown scamper.

The junior quarterback did it all, even throwing a block to spring Etienne for a 15-yard gain on a third-down run late in the second quarter leading to a touchdown and a 24-3 halftime lead.

Rodgers had eight catches for 121 yards, and Williams added four for 80 yards including a dynamic one-handed grab where he reached behind his head to snag the ball.

Clemson allowed Notre Dame to pile up 518 yards in the previous meeting, but limited the Fighting Irish to 263 yards and sacked quarterback Ian Book six times. Book spent most of the game under duress, regularly flushed from the pocket and forced to make plays on the run.

Clemson's secondary put the clamps on Notre Dame's wide receivers, and running back Kyren Williams was limited to 49 yards rushing after finishing with 140 yards on the ground and three TDs in the first game. Book was held to 219 yards passing and no touchdowns.

The momentum changed late in the first quarter when Notre Dame kicker Jonathan Doerer, who had converted an ACC title-game record 51-yard field goal on the game's

opening drive, clanked a 21-yard attempt off the right upright.

The Tigers quickly capitalized when Rodgers got cornerback Shaun Crawford to bite on a double move and hauled in a perfectly thrown pass from Lawrence for a 67-yard strike, the first of four straight scoring drives to close the first half.

After Clemson stopped Notre Dame on a key fourth-and-3, Lawrence moved the Tigers 72 yards in six plays, showing his pocket awareness by stepping up to avoid pressure and buy enough time to find Williams on a crossing route for a 33-yard score and a 14-3 lead - Notre Dame's largest deficit of the season.

Etienne broke it open when he took a handoff, slipped an ankle tackle and raced 44 yards for a touchdown on fourth-and-1 for a 24-3 lead with 21 seconds left in the first half. Lawrence essentially put it away with 3:43 left in the third quarter when he raced up the middle for a 34-yard touchdown run.

Mecklenburg Schools to identify and financially support six classrooms that have gone above and beyond in today's challenging learning environment. Additionally, CMS Teacher of the Year finalists were provided DonorsChoose gift cards for their respective classroom projects. In total, more than 2,500 students and 24 teachers at 24 schools received financial support this week.

The CFP Foundation and Dr Pepper expanded their Go Teach Tuition Giveaway program to partner with the ACC and award \$57,500 in scholarships to 15 of the conference's student-athletes that plan to pursue degrees in education. Student-athletes representing each ACC institution were nominated by campus representatives and received \$2,500 toward their tuition. North Carolina nominee Taylor McDaniels was selected by the league's awards committee to also receive a \$20,000 grand prize scholarship.

The sixth annual Extra Yard for Teachers Appreciation Week was celebrated Sept. 12-19, 2020 and included two new initiatives. On Sept. 14, the ACC surprised Guilford County's Teacher of the Year in a big way on the Big Day. Tammy White of Kiser Middle School in Greensboro, N.C. was presented a \$1,000 DonorsChoose gift certificate and celebrated on the league's social platforms. Additionally, the conference kicked off its season-long "Tag A Teacher" social media giveaway, which encouraged fans to tag their favorite educators on Facebook. Each week of the regular season, one teacher nomination was selected at random to receive a \$500 gift certificate for classroom resources or supplies.

Over the past six years, the ACC, in conjunction with the College Football Playoff Foundation, has funded nearly \$700,000 in support of teachers.



ACC & NFL DRAFT

A total of 51 players who either played for an ACC team or competed in the league in 2020 were selected in the 2021 NFL Draft in Cleveland. The ACC's total includes nine from Notre Dame who played in the conference in 2020 due to the COVID-19 pandemic. The 42 selections from the ACC's 14 football programs tied for the fifth-most in league history.

Six players were taken in the first round, followed by eight in the second round, 11 in the third round, seven in the fourth round, seven in the fifth round, nine in the sixth round and three in the seventh round.

Clemson quarterback Trevor Lawrence was the first pick in the draft and is the third ACC player to be selected No. 1 overall, joining Jameis Winston (2015, Florida State) and Mario Williams (2006, NC State).

The ACC's total includes nine from Notre Dame who played in the conference last season due to the COVID-19 pandemic. Without the nine from the Fighting Irish, the 42 traditional ACC selections tied for the fifth-most in league history.

Pitt led the league with six selections, followed by five from Clemson and North Carolina, four from Duke, Florida State, Miami and Virginia Tech, two from Boston College, Georgia Tech, Louisville and Syracuse and one each from NC State and Wake Forest.

ACC FOOTBALL SCHEDULE ANNOUNCED

The ACC announced its 2021 football schedule on ACCN's Packer & Durham, returning to two divisions - Atlantic & Coastal - with each team playing eight conference games and four non-conference games.

The release highlighted message points regarding the challenging upcoming schedule. For example, in addition to 23 games against Power 5 opponents (including Notre Dame), the ACC will play 13 non-conference games against teams ranked in the final 2020 AP Top 25 poll. All 14 teams play at least one Power 5 non-conference opponent, while nine teams - Clemson, Duke, Florida State, Georgia Tech, Louisville, Miami, North Carolina, Virginia and Virginia Tech - play two. For the second time in the last three years, North Carolina and Wake Forest will meet in a non-conference game on Nov. 6.

In addition to the release, a logo schedule, team-by-team schedule, and composite schedule was released. Graphics outlining message points on the strength of the schedule were distributed across ACC platforms.



ACC FOOTBALL COMPLETES HISTORIC SEASON

Under the guidance of its Medical Advisory Group, the ACC completed an historic season in 2020 while coping with the COVID-19 pandemic.

The 2020 ACC Football season included an 11-game scheduling model (10 plus one: 10 conference and one non-conference) with all non-conference game opponents played in the home state of the ACC institution.

There was just one division in 2020 and Notre Dame joined the conference for the season. The Fighting Irish went on to compete in the ACC Football Championship Game, which was moved back to Dec. 19.

The ACC played 85 of a possible 90-game regular-season schedule (94.4 percent) in 2020. No conference played more total regular-season games (85) than the ACC. Thirteen of the 15 teams (86.7 percent) played at least 10 games.

CLEMSON WINS SIXTH STRAIGHT ACC TITLE; TWO ACC TEAMS EARN CFP BID

Clemson won its sixth consecutive ACC title in 2020 with a 34-10 win over Notre Dame in the ACC Football Championship Game in Charlotte, North Carolina. Clemson and Notre Dame each earned a College Football Playoff bid. It was the first time in its seven-year history, that the CFP featured multiple ACC teams. Clemson landed the No. 2 spot in the four-team CFP field, earning a playoff spot for the sixth consecutive year. Notre Dame made the field as the No. 4 selection and appeared in the CFP for the second time in three seasons.

Four other ACC teams played in a bowl game - North Carolina in the Capital One Orange Bowl, Miami in the Cheez-It Bowl, NC State in the TaxSlayer Gator Bowl and Wake Forest in the Duke's Mayo Bowl. It is the 20th consecutive season in which the ACC earned at least six bowl bids. The ACC ranks second among all conferences with 143 bowl appearances since 2005.

2020 ACC FCG MOST-WATCHED OF ALL TIME

The 2020 ACC Championship Game between then-No. 2 Notre Dame and then-No. 3 Clemson registered 10,180,000 viewers across all TV and streaming platforms to rank as the most-viewed ACC Championship of all time.

FOUR ACC TEAMS IN FINAL AP & COACHES TOP 25 RANKINGS

Four ACC teams were ranked in the final AP Top 25 Poll, led by No. 3 Clemson. The Tigers were followed by No. 5 Notre Dame, No. 18 North Carolina and No. 22 Miami. In the Amway Coaches Top 25 Poll, Clemson was No. 3, followed by No. 5 Notre Dame, No. 17 North Carolina and No. 22 Miami. NC State received votes in both polls.

Five ACC teams were ranked in the final CFP Top 25 Poll released Tuesday, Dec. 20 - No. 2 Clemson, No. 4 Notre Dame, No. 13 North Carolina, No. 18 Miami and No. 23 NC State. The five ACC teams were the most from any conference.

AROUND THE ACC

Nine games featured a matchup of AP Top 25 ACC teams. That equals the most ranked matchups of any ACC season. There were also nine in 1992. Three of those games were between top 10 teams, the most matchups of top 10 ACC teams since 2004.

The ACC set a scoring record in conference regular-season games in 2020. The average scoring in league games was 60.4 points, just ahead of the average of 59.3 points in 2012.

ACC FOOTBALL 2020 ALL-AMERICANS

Twenty-two ACC football players earned at least one 2020 All-America team recognition from either the Walter Camp Football Foundation (WCFF), Associated Press (AP), Football Writers Association of America (FWAA), American Football Coaches Association (AFCA) or Sporting News.

Nine different ACC teams had at least one All-America selection, led by Notre Dame with six players earning recognition.



ACC RECORD-BREAKER

Clemson's Travis Etienne finished his career as the ACC's all-time rushing leader with 4,952 yards. In this year's win over Boston College he moved past NC State's Ted Brown, who had held the record since 1978. Etienne also holds the ACC career record for rushing touchdowns (70) and total touchdowns (78).

LAWRENCE NAMED HEISMAN TROPHY FINALIST

Clemson quarterback Trevor Lawrence finished second in the voting for the 2020 Heisman Trophy. Lawrence led Clemson to a 9-1 record in his 10 starts, improving to 34-2 for his career. Despite missing two games with COVID-19, Lawrence completed 231 of 334 pass attempts (69.2 percent) for 3,153 yards and 24 passing touchdowns. He also rushed for 203 yards on 68 carries with eight rushing touchdowns.

NOTRE DAME'S JEREMIAH OWUSU-KORAMOAH WINS BUTKUS AWARD

Notre Dame's Jeremiah Owusu-Koramoah was named the winner of the 2020 Butkus Award, which is presented annually to the nation's best collegiate linebacker. It is the second consecutive year that an ACC player has won the Butkus Award. Last season, Clemson's Isaiah Simmons won the award.

MIAMI'S JOSE BORREGALES WINS GROZA AWARD

Miami place-kicker Jose Borregales was named the winner of the 2020 Lou Groza Award, which is presented annually to the nation's top kicker. He is the second ACC player in the last three years to earn the award. A redshirt senior from Miami, Borregales transferred to the Hurricanes in January 2020 and converted 20 of 22 attempts on the year. He made eight field goals from at least 40 yards out during the regular season, a figure that was tied for fourth-most in the country. The list includes a 57-yard boot that came as part of a 4-for-4 field goal, 17-point performance on the road against Louisville that earned him ACC Specialist of the Week honors.

GEORGIA TECH'S PRESSLEY HARVIN III WINS RAY GUY AWARD

Georgia Tech senior Pressley Harvin III was named the winner of the 2020 Ray Guy Award as college football's top punter. Harvin set an ACC record with a 48.0-yard punting average in 2020 and 49 percent of his 45 punts this season traveled 50 or more yards. Harvin helped Georgia Tech rank second nationally in net punting (44.6-yard average).

2021 CHAMPION VIRGINIA



- **VIRGINIA** won the ACC's first NCAA Swimming and Diving National Championship in March, capturing the 2021 women's title over NC State, giving the league a 1-2 finish. No ACC team had ever finished better than third prior to this season. The Greensboro Aquatic Center in Greensboro, North Carolina, hosted the NCAA Championships.
- The 2021 NCAA Championships mark the sixth straight season the league has had at least two teams finish in the top 10. The ACC also had six teams in the top 25, with North Carolina finishing in 12th place, followed by No. 13 Louisville, No. 21 Virginia Tech and No. 23 Miami. Georgia Tech (No. 28), Notre Dame (No. 29) and Duke (No. 34) rounded out the conference's point-earning teams.
- The ACC won national titles in 13 events across both the men's and women's NCAA Championships, the most of any conference, earning gold medals in nine individual races and four relays.
- ACC swimmers won eight individual and three relay gold medals at the NCAA Championships.
- 2021 ACC Women's Swimmer of the Year Paige Madden won three individual NCAA Championships, winning 200 free, 500 free and 1650 free. Madden was also part of the NCAA Champion 800 free relay team with Kyla Valls, Ella Nelson and Alex Walsh. Teammates Kate Douglass (50 free) and Walsh (200 individual medley) also won individual gold medals.
- NC State swimmers captured five NCAA titles, with Sophie Hansson taking gold in the 100 breast and 200 breast, Katharine Berkoff winning the 100 back, and the national-champion teams of Berkoff, Hansson, Sirena Rowe and Kylee Alons in the 200 medley relay, and Berkoff, Hansson, Alons and Julia Poole in the 800 medley relay.
- Virginia's Todd DeSorbo was named the CSCAA Division I Women's Team Coach of the Year.
- Virginia captured the 2021 ACC Women's Swimming & Diving Championship at the Greensboro Aquatic Center, it's third in the last four season and ACC-record 17th overall. The Cavaliers compiled 13 event wins and claimed their record 17th ACC title on Saturday night at the Greensboro Aquatic Center.
- Madden was named the 2021 ACC Championships Most Valuable Swimmer, and North Carolina's Aranza Vazquez was named the Most Valuable Diver.
- Seven ACC women's teams are ranked in the CSCAA Poll, the second-highest total in the nation. Top-ranked Virginia leads the way, followed by No. 5 NC State, No. 13 Louisville, No. 17 Virginia Tech, No. 18 North Carolina, No. 21 Notre Dame and No. 25 Florida State.

- At least two ACC teams finished in the top 10 for the third consecutive NCAA Men's Swimming and Diving Championships. **Louisville** placed fifth with 211 points, marking the fifth straight NCAA Championships an ACC team has finished in the top five, followed by NC State in eighth and Virginia in ninth. The Greensboro Aquatic Center hosted the 2021 NCAA Championships.
- Ten teams finished in the top 25, more than any other conference. The Cavaliers were followed by Virginia Tech (11th), Miami (19th), Georgia Tech (21st), Florida State (23rd), North Carolina (24th) and Notre Dame (25th). Pitt rounded out the league's scoring teams in 26th place.
- Louisville won the NCAA title in the 200 medley relay with the team of Mitchell Whyte, Evgenii Somov, Nicolas Albiero, Haridi Sameh. Albiero also took gold in the 200 individual medley.
- Louisville captured the 2021 ACC Men's Swimming & Diving Championship, its first ever, at the Greensboro Aquatic

Center with 1181 points, just two points ahead of NC State. The Cardinals earned 16 podium finishes, including seven gold medals, to claim the 2021 crown.

- The championship came down to the final event, the 400 freestyle relay, with Louisville in the second heat and NC State in the third heat. The teams were separated by 10 points, and the Cardinals needed to finish in third place to secure at least a share of the ACC title, or finish in second to win it outright.
- Notre Dame's Jack Hoagland was named the 2021 ACC Championships Most Valuable Swimmer, while North Carolina's Anton Down-Jenkins was named the Most Valuable Diver.
- Eight ACC men's squads are ranked in the CSCAA Poll, the most of any conference. Louisville leads the league at No. 5, followed by No. 6 NC State, No. 10 Virginia Tech, No. 13 Virginia, No. 16 Florida State, No. 17 Georgia Tech, No. 20 Notre Dame and No. 22 North Carolina.

- Notre Dame rolled to the 11th national championship in program history, winning the team crown at the 2021 National Collegiate Men's and Women's Fencing Championships. The title is the third in the last four championships for Notre Dame, which racked up 201 points - most by any team in history in the current championship format.

- DUKE** rolled to the team title at the 2021 ACC Fencing Championships, marking the first league championship in program history. The Blue Devils went 2-0 in the team competition with victories over Boston College (20-7) and North Carolina (16-11). Out of an abundance of caution, Notre Dame did not travel to the ACC Championships following positive COVID-19 tests, subsequent quarantining and contact tracing within the team.
- Duke's Zoe Superville was named the 2021 ACC Women's Most Valuable Fencer at the ACC Championships. After posting a 13-0 record and winning the individual foil competition Saturday, Superville was 6-0 during the team championships.
- In the individual competition at the ACC Championships, Duke finished with seven of the nine medalists, including each of the three gold medals: Huda Aldadah (epee), Zoe Superville (foil) and Alex Gorman (sabre).

• **FLORIDA STATE** scored 85 of its total 95 team points on the final day of competition to claim the 2021 ACC Women's Indoor Track and Field Championship hosted by Clemson on Feb. 25-27.

- Miami placed second with 85 points, followed by Virginia (72.5), Virginia Tech (62.5) and Clemson (62).
- Florida State captured its fourth ACC women's indoor championship, all of which have come under current head coach Bob Braman since 2009. The Seminoles have placed first in the last three women's championships held at Clemson – 2014, 2018 and this season – and their four total ACC titles rank third in league history.
- Clemson's Trishauna Hemmings was named Most Valuable Women's Track Performer and Miami thrower Debbie Ajagbe grabbed the Women's Field MVP for the second straight year.
- The ACC qualified for 40 spots at the NCAA Indoor Women's Championships, where Virginia Tech led all ACC teams with a program-best 14th-place finish. The Hokies, who scored 15 team

points, were joined by a crowded league contingent among the top 30. Florida State and Notre Dame tied for 16th place with 13 points, and Louisville held the No. 20 spot with 10.

- Louisville senior Makenli Forrest highlighted ACC individual achievements at the NCAA Indoor Championships with her gold medal weight throw of 23.26 meters (76-3.75). Forrest's winning throw on her final attempt just edged Notre Dame's Rachel Tanczos (23.24/76-3) to give the ACC a 1-2 finish.
- Laurie Barton's time of 2:01.21 in the women's 800 netted the Clemson senior a silver medal and broke the previous ACC and school record of 2:01.64 set by Clemson's Natoya Goule.
- The ACC won four bronze medals in women's competition – NC State's Elly Henes in the 5,000 meters, Florida State's Ruta Lasmane in the triple jump, Duke's Erin Marsh in the pentathlon and the Florida State DMR team of Alyson Churchill, Edidiong Odiong, Yasmine Abbes and Maudie Skyring. ACC women also had fourth-place finishes in five events.

- VIRGINIA TECH** took home the 2021 Men's Indoor Track and Field Championship in competition held Feb. 25-27 at Clemson. After leading throughout the first two days of the event, the Hokies pulled away on Saturday to place 55 points ahead of their nearest opposition.
- Led by junior Jacory Patterson, who earned the meet's Men's Most Outstanding Track honors with gold medals in the 200 and 400 meters, the Hokies finished with a team score of 136 points. North Carolina took second place with 81 points, followed by Florida State with 76, and Clemson and Pitt with 48 points apiece.
- This year's ACC men's indoor championship is the sixth for Virginia Tech, all of which have come since 2011 under the watch of veteran head coach Dave Cianelli. The six men's championships rank fourth in ACC indoor history.
- The ACC qualified student-athletes for 31 spots at the NCAA Indoor Championships held March 11-13 in Fayetteville, Arkansas. Florida State placed sixth in the team scoring with

23 points to lead ACC teams. Virginia Tech tied for 16th place with 11 points, and North Carolina tied for 18th with 10 to give the ACC three teams among the top 20.

- The FSU men have now placed sixth in each of the last two NCAA Indoor Championships after earning that same spot in 2019 (the 2020 event was canceled due to the COVID-19 pandemic).
- Florida State senior Isaac Grimes took the silver medal with his long jump of 8.35 meters (27-4.75), which bettered his previous ACC record of 8.33 meters and currently stands fifth in the world. Virginia Tech junior sprinter Jacory Patterson took the bronze medal in the 400-meter dash in a league-record 45.14, a shade faster than the 45.24 time he posted during the ACC Championships on Feb. 27.
- Meanwhile, Florida State's Adriaan Wildschutt placed fourth in the 5,000 meters with an ACC-record time of 13:30.55 that toppled the previous conference mark of 13:32 by Clemson's Robert duBrouwer that had stood since 1985.

- Buoyed by Trent Hidlay's overtime sudden victory over top-ranked Hunter Bolen of Virginia Tech at 184 pounds, plus dominating efforts by four-time ACC champion Hayden Hidlay at 157 and Tariq Wilson at 141, nationally seventh-ranked **NC STATE** captured its 18th ACC team title in convincing fashion Feb. 28.
- With Daniel Bullard (174 pounds) and Deonte Wilson (285) adding overtime wins of their own, the Wolfpack led the team scoring with 89.5 points. Virginia Tech held second place 24 points back at 65.5, followed by North Carolina (63), Virginia (55), Pitt (45) and Duke (7.5).
- Virginia Tech senior Korbin Myers, who continued his streak of wins over ranked opponents with a 3-1 victory over two-time champion Micky Phillipi at 133 pounds, was selected the tournament's Most Outstanding Wrestler in a vote of the head coaches.
- A national title by North Carolina junior Austin O'Connor capped a historic night and a historic season for Atlantic Coast Conference wrestling March 20 in St. Louis. The second-seeded O'Connor's 3-2 win over No. 1 seed Sammy Sasso of Ohio State in the 149-pound final secured North Carolina's first NCAA gold medal since 1995 and the 20th all-time by an ACC wrestler.
- With 68 team points, NC State's sixth-place finish was the second-best in school history, the sixth top-10 finish for the program overall and the second top-10 finish in the last three NCAA Championships (a program-best fourth in 2018). Eleventh-place Pitt recorded its best NCAA finish since 1970 – when it took eighth – and tallied the Panthers' best points haul in the NCAA's current team scoring format (40.5 points).

- **NC STATE** claimed its second consecutive Atlantic Coast Conference Women's Basketball Tournament championship, turning back Louisville in a dramatic title game that lived up to its billing, 58-56. Prior to winning each of the last two years under head coach Wes Moore, the Wolfpack's previous tourney titles came in 1980, 1985, 1987 and 1991 under the legendary Kay Yow.
- Wolfpack junior center Elissa Cunane, who averaged 23.3 points and nine rebounds in three games here this weekend, was named the ACC Tournament's Most Valuable Player.
- Louisville claimed its second consecutive outright ACC regular-season title, earning at least a share for the fourth straight season. Louisville was the No. 1 seed in the 2021 Women's Basketball Tournament for the third time since joining the conference.
- Eight Atlantic Coast Conference women's basketball teams were selected to compete in the 2021 NCAA Tournament, the most of any conference.
- In the last four NCAA Tournaments, ACC teams have earned 31 selections to compete in the field, also the most of any conference.

- The ACC also owns the most NCAA Tournament wins (93) of any conference since 2014. The next closest conference has 80.
- For the eighth consecutive year, at least two ACC teams were ranked among the top 10 of the final Associated Press Top 25 Poll. After having the nation's top two teams for two weeks this season, NC State is ranked No. 3 in the final AP Poll, while Louisville is No. 8.
- NC State's Wes Moore was named the 2021 United States Marine Corps/Women's Basketball Coaches Association (WBCA) NCAA Division I National Coach of the Year, after earning 2021 Atlantic Coast Conference Women's Basketball Coach of the Year honors from the league's head coaches.
- For the fourth consecutive season, produced the ACC Player of the Year as senior Dana Evans captured the accolade for the second straight season. Evans was also the recipient of the Kay Yow Award, as the league's Scholar-Athlete for women's basketball.
- Picked to finish ninth in the preseason poll by the Blue Ribbon Panel, Nell Fortner led Georgia Tech to a third-place regular-season finish and was voted the league's Coach of the year.
- Syracuse's Kamilla Cardoso was tabbed the ACC Rookie of the Year and shared Defensive Player of the Year honors along with Georgia Tech's Lorela Cubaj.
- Georgia Tech's Lotta-Maj Lahtinen was the Most Improved Player, while NC State's Jada Boyd and Syracuse's Emily Engstler shared Sixth Player of the Year honors.
- Syracuse's Tiana Mangakahia was the recipient of the 16th annual Bob Bradley Spirit and Courage Award from the Atlantic Coast Sports Media Association (ACSMA) and the Atlantic Coast Conference. Mangakahia sat out the entire 2019-20 season while recovering from breast cancer surgery, but returned for the 2020-21 season to help lead the Orange to a tie for fourth place in the final ACC regular-season standings.
- For the 16th consecutive year, the Atlantic Coast Conference had at least one student-athlete selected in the first round of the WNBA Draft with North Carolina's Stephanie Watts as the 10th pick in the 2021 edition. That streak is the most of any conference and the next closest is seven.
- In the past five years, the conference has had 38 players selected in the draft - the most of any conference.

PACK TO PACK! NC STATE WOMEN AGAIN WEAR ACC TOURNAMENT CROWN

GREENSBORO, N.C. (theACC.com) – NC State claimed its second consecutive Atlantic Coast Conference Women's Basketball Tournament championship on Sunday, turning back Louisville in a dramatic title game that lived up to its billing.

The second-seeded Wolfpack prevailed 58-56 in what will be remembered as one of the tournament's more fantastic finishes. Raina Perez's 17-foot jumper with 2.1 seconds remaining snapped a tie score, and ACC Player of the Year Dana Evans missed a 3-point try at the buzzer that would have won it for the top-seeded Cardinals.

NC State (20-2) earned the conference's automatic NCAA Tournament qualifying spot while securing back-to-back ACC Tournament championships for the first time in program history. Prior to winning each of the last two years under head coach Wes Moore, the Wolfpack's previous tourney titles came in 1980, 1985, 1987 and 1991 under the legendary Kay Yow.

Wolfpack junior center Elissa Cunane, who averaged 23.3 points and nine rebounds in three games here this weekend, was named the ACC Tournament's Most Valuable Player.

With the score tied at 56-all and 26 seconds remaining, it was Cunane who snared the rebound on a missed jumper by Evans. Moore opted not to call timeout, and NC State played on.

The Wolfpack looked inside for Cunane first, but a reset pushed the ball back out to Perez at the top of the key. The 5-4 point guard penetrated slightly while dribbling to her left, then pulled up and swished through the tie-breaking jumper.

After Louisville took a timeout, Kianna Smith initially looked inside, where her inbounds pass was knocked out of bounds beneath the Cardinals' basket. The clock still showed 1.3 seconds.

On the second try, Smith found Evans on the right wing, but the Louisville senior's shot bounced off the rim as the buzzer sounded to set off NC State's celebration.

Though Louisville came up short to the nationally third-ranked Wolfpack for the second time this season, the fifth-ranked Cardinals (23-3) are assured of a high seed when the bracket is unveiled next week for the 2021 NCAA Women's Championship.

Cunane wound up the only NC State player scoring in double figures for NC State, but the Wolfpack got contributions from numerous others as it wiped out a 48-40 Louisville lead in the final nine minutes.

Kayla Jones, who pulled down a game-high 10 rebounds, brought State to within 54-53 on a rebound follow with 3:52 to play. Kai Crutchfield stood out defensively and contributed a key 3-pointer to the Wolfpack's decisive run.

Evans led the Cardinals with 15 points, and Smith added 13.

After leading 26-25 at the half, NC State appeared set to take control by outscoring Louisville 8-2 at the outset of the third quarter to go up 34-27. But the Wolfpack then missed six of its next seven shots from the floor, leading to a Cardinal counter-run that left NC State playing catch-up and setting up the dramatic finale.



THREE ACC STUDENT-ATHLETES SELECTED IN 2021 WNBA DRAFT

GREENSBORO, N.C. (theACC.com) – For the 16th consecutive year, the Atlantic Coast Conference had at least one student-athlete selected in the first round of the WNBA Draft, as the 2021 edition was held Thursday evening and broadcast live on ESPN. That streak is the most of any conference and the next closest is seven.

North Carolina guard Stephanie Watts was the first ACC player taken in the draft when she was selected by the Los Angeles Sparks with the 10th pick in the first round. She finished her career eighth in the conference and second in the Tar Heels' record books with 275 3-point field goals made.

Watts averaged 12 points and recorded 40 steals this season to help lead North Carolina to the NCAA Tournament.

It marks the second consecutive year that the 10th pick in the draft has come from an ACC program. Last year, Virginia's Jocelyn Willoughby was selected with the pick as the first ACC player off the board.

Two-time ACC Player of the Year Dana Evans of Louisville was the first player drafted in the second round with the 13th overall pick by the Dallas Wings. Hailing from Gary, Indiana, Evans was named the ACC's Kay Yow Scholar-Athlete of the Year this season and helped lead the Cardinals to the Elite Eight of the NCAA Tournament.

She led the conference in scoring with 20.1 points per game and recorded 19 20-point games, also the best in the league. Louisville has now had at least one player selected in each of the past four WNBA Drafts.

After leading Wake Forest to the NCAA Tournament for the first time since 1988, Ivana Raca was selected in the third round (28th overall) by the Sparks and will join Watts in Los Angeles. She is the first Demon Deacon to be selected in the WNBA Draft since Dearica Hamby in the first round of 2015.

Raca was fourth in the conference in scoring with 16.7 points per game. A native of Belgrade, Serbia, she averaged 9.0 rebounds per game to rank fifth in the league and logged 10 double-doubles.

The WNBA will tip off its landmark 25th season on Friday, May 14, with a full weekend of action featuring all 12 teams. The league will unveil its complete television schedule in the upcoming weeks.

The ACC led all conferences with 32 players on WNBA rosters and 22 players on WNBA Playoff rosters this past season. Both were the most of any conference.

- **GEORGIA TECH** defeated Florida State, 80-75, in the ACC Championship game, claiming its fourth ACC Tournament championship and its first since 1993.
- Georgia Tech junior guard Michael Devoe earned the ACC Tournament's Everett Case Award (Most Valuable Player) after averaging 16.5 ppg, 5.0 apg and 2.0 spg in the tournament.
- Seven ACC teams earned NCAA Tournament bids – Clemson, Florida State, Georgia Tech, North Carolina, Syracuse Virginia and Virginia Tech. This marked the seventh time – and the fifth straight tournament – the ACC has placed at least seven teams in the NCAA Tournament field (nine in 2017 and 2018, seven in 2007, 2009, 2016, 2019, 2021).
- Syracuse and Florida State reached the Sweet 16 in the NCAA Tournament. At least one ACC team has advanced to the Sweet 16 in 41 straight NCAA

- Tournaments, which is by far the longest in the history of the NCAA Tournament.
- Virginia won its fifth ACC regular-season championship in the last eight years and was the No. 1 seed in the ACC Tournament for the sixth time.
- Three ACC teams were ranked nationally in the final Associated Press Top 25 poll: Florida State (14), Virginia (15) and Virginia Tech (25).
- Georgia Tech forward Moses Wright was named the ACC Player of the Year, becoming just the second Yellow Jacket to win the award (Dennis Scott, 1990).
- Georgia Tech's Jose Alvarado ranked second nationally, recording the highest steals average by an ACC player since Maryland's Johnny Rhodes set the ACC record average of 3.7 in 1996.
- Florida State concluded its home slate with a 25-game ACC home win streak, second longest in league history. The stretch is one short of the ACC record and

dates to a Jan. 22, 2019 win over Clemson.

- Following the season, North Carolina head coach Roy Williams announced his retirement. In 18 seasons as head coach at UNC, he led the Tar Heels to a 485-163 record, two other Final Fours, nine ACC regular-season championships and three ACC Tournament crowns.
- Eight ACC standouts were selected in the 2020 NBA Draft on Nov. 18, including a pair of lottery picks from Florida State: Patrick Williams (fourth, Chicago) and Devin Vassell (11th, San Antonio).
- The ACC led all conferences with 84 alumni on opening day NBA rosters. Duke topped all ACC schools with 26 alums on opening day rosters.

NEW YORK LIFE ACC TOURNAMENT

The 2021 New York Life ACC Tournament was contested March 9-13 in Greensboro, North Carolina, for a record 28th time. Because of the COVID-19 pandemic, attendance was limited to 25% of seating capacity and there was limited in-person media access. Games were broadcast nationally on ESPN networks and streamed via ACCNX. The first two days of play aired on ACC Network.

In conjunction with the ACC Women's Basketball Tournament, which was played the previous week in Greensboro, the event featured a unified branding look and signage covering both weeks of the tournaments.

Press conferences all were done virtually. ASAP transcripts were provided to media following all virtual press conferences. Photos were available to the schools and media via the ACC's Box account.

- The ACC provided an enhanced level of branding at the Greensboro Coliseum with a unified ACC Basketball look in areas where appropriate. Teams were greeted at their entry point by a host of branding to let them know they had arrived at the event, including tournament branding in the locker rooms and hallways, as well as leading out to the court with a large tournament banner and logo accompanied by a lit up tournament trophy.
- Courtside signage was used to highlight the strength of ACC Men's Basketball:
 - Most Overall No. 1 NBA Draft Picks
 - Most NCAA Tournament Victories & Appearances
 - 5 of the top 10 winningest programs
 - Multiple teams with perfect NCAA GSR
 - 8 of the last 19 NCAA Championships
 - 3 of the last 5 NCAA Championships

NBA DRAFT

Seven ACC players were chosen in the 2021 NBA Draft. With four first-round picks, the ACC extended its streak of having at least one first-round selection to 33 consecutive years (1989-2021). Scottie Barnes (Florida State, No. 4, Toronto), Trey Murphy III (Virginia, No. 17, Memphis), Jalen Johnson (Duke, No. 20, Atlanta) and Day'Ron Sharpe (North Carolina, No. 29, Phoenix) each were selected in the first round.



NCAA TOURNAMENT

Seven ACC teams earned NCAA Tournament bids. This marked the seventh time – and the fifth straight tournament – the ACC has placed at least seven teams in the NCAA Tournament field (nine in 2017 and 2018, seven in 2007, 2009, 2016, 2019, 2021).

Syracuse and Florida State reached the Sweet 16 in the NCAA Tournament. At least one ACC team has advanced to the Sweet 16 in 41 straight NCAA Tournaments, which is by far the longest in the history of the NCAA Tournament. No other conference has a streak longer than 22.

2020-21 REGULAR SEASON

Links to ACCNX broadcasts were shared with schools throughout the regular season. In addition, regular content was publicly released on all platforms, including head coach weekly media Zoom information, Players of the Week, game recaps and updated statistics.

MBB SCHEDULE

Every conference game was available on ESPN networks, including ACC Network, or the conference's Regional Sports Networks (RSN). More than 100 games aired on ACC Network, including more than 60 conference games as well as seven ACC Tournament matchups. In addition to the linear broadcast schedule, several non-conference ACC home games were broadcast online via ACC Network Extra.



ACC/BIG TEN CHALLENGE

The ACC/Big Ten Challenge, one of the most anticipated events on the college basketball calendar, provided national exposure for the league in December across ESPN, ESPN2, and ESPNU. The 21st edition of the Big Ten/ACC Challenge featured all 14 scheduled games on the ESPN family of networks.

Graphics were created for both the matchup and schedule announcements and a release with messaging was distributed in advance of the Challenge.



- DUKE claimed the 2021 ACC Women's Golf Championship at Sedgefield Country Club with a 5-0 match play victory over Florida State. It was Duke's 22nd overall ACC women's golf title and first in the new match play format. Duke led after three days of stroke play to secure the No. 1 seed and then defeated Virginia in match play, 4-1-0 to advance to the finals. Duke has won 22 of the 32 ACC Women's Golf Championship, including four times at Sedgefield Country Club (2012-14). Duke's Dan Brooks has been the head coach for 21 of those titles.
- Duke junior Gina Kim shot three rounds in the 60s, including a final round 69 to capture individual medalist honors at the 2021 ACC Women's Golf Championship. Kim's three-day 10-under par total of 206 is the second-lowest in ACC Championship history and tied the Duke ACC Tournament 54-hole record.
- Eight ACC women's golf teams earned a bid to the 2021 NCAA Regionals. Duke and Wake Forest led the way as No. 1 seeds, and were joined in this year's competition by Clemson, Florida State, Louisville, Miami, Virginia and Virginia Tech. The league has earned eight-or-more NCAA Regional bids in each of the last seven NCAA competitions.
- Four ACC women's golf teams – Duke, Florida State, Virginia Tech and Wake Forest – finished in the top six at their respective NCAA Regionals and advanced to the national championships, at Grayhawk Golf Club in Scottsdale, Arizona. It is Virginia Tech's first appearance in the national

championships. Duke advanced to the match play competition where it defeated Arizona State in the quarterfinals and lost to Oklahoma State in the semifinals.

- Five ACC teams finished in the Golfstat Top 25 rankings, including No. 2 Duke, No. 7 Wake Forest, No. 10 Florida State, No. 17 Virginia and No. 19 Virginia Tech.
- Florida State's Beatrice Wallin finished the season ranked No. 8 by Golfstat and was joined in the top 25 by No. 10 Gina Kim of Duke, No. 11 Lauren Hartlage of Louisville, No. 13 Erica Shepherd, No. 14 and No. 17 Phoebe Brinker of Duke, and No. 23 Beth Lillie of Virginia.
- Wake Forest's Emilia Migliaccio, the defending ACC medalist from 2019, finished second at the 2021 Augusta National Women's Amateur. Migliaccio was tied for the lead after three rounds of competition, but lost in the first hole of the playoff. Florida State's Beatrice Wallin tied for 10th, while Duke teammates Gina Kim (13th) and Erica Shepherd (16th) finished among the top 30. A total of 10 ACC golfers from five schools competed in the event.
- Duke's Gina Kim and Florida State's Beatrice Wallin were named First-Team All-Americans by the Women's Golf Coaches Association (WGCA). In addition, Duke's Jaravee Boonchant, Duke's Erica Shepherd, Louisville's Lauren Hartlage, Wake Forest's Rachel Kuehn and Wake Forest's Lauren Walsh earned second-team All-America honors. Duke's Phoebe Brinker and Virginia's Beth Lillie were honorable-mention picks.

2021 CHAMPION CLEMSON



- A league record-tying 10 ACC teams earned bids to the 2021 NCAA Regionals. **CLEMSON**, Florida State and Wake Forest earned three of the six No. 1 regional seeds and were joined in the competition by Duke, Georgia Tech, Louisville, North Carolina, NC State, Notre Dame and Virginia.
- A league-record seven of those teams – the most of any conference – advanced from regional play to compete at the NCAA Championship at Grayhawk Golf Club in Scottsdale, Arizona. Clemson, Florida State, Georgia Tech, Louisville, North Carolina, NC State and Wake Forest all finished in the top five of their respective NCAA Regional to earn a spot in the national championship field. The previous record for ACC teams in the NCAA Championship was six, which occurred on five occasions, most recently in 2019.
- Florida State and North Carolina finished among the top eight in stroke play at the NCAA Championships to advance to match play before falling in the quarterfinals.
- Clemson's Turk Pettit posted a four-day total of 273 (-7) to capture the 2021 NCAA Men's Golf Individual Championship at Grayhawk Golf Club by one shot over Bo Jin of Oklahoma State. Pettit's title was the 10th men's golf individual national championship in ACC history and the first since Matt Hill of NC State in 2009.
- Clemson claimed the 2021 ACC Men's Golf Championship at Capital City Club's Crabapple Course with a dramatic 3-2 come-from-behind win over Florida State. It is the Tigers' 11th overall men's golf title, 10th under head coach Larry Penley and first since 2016. Clemson never led until Zack Gordon's 20-foot birdie putt dropped on the 21st overall hole (No. 3) to win the championship.
- North Carolina's Peter Fountain fired a third-round 66 to

become the 10th freshman in league history to claim the individual title and first since Georgia Tech's Cameron Tringale in 2006. Fountain, who trailed by two entering the final round, carded a three-day total of 200 to tie for the lowest 54-hole mark in ACC Championship history with Virginia's Thomas Walsh (2018). Fountain held off NC State's Benjamin Shipp, who shot a 1-under par 69 for a 201 total (-9).

- Florida State senior John Pak won a trio of national player of the year awards – Fred Haskins Award, Ben Hogan Award and Jack Nicklaus Award. Pak finished the season as the No. 1 ranked player by both Golfstat and Golfweek. He leaves FSU as its all-time leader in low stroke average (69.87), victories (11st with Nolan Henke at eight) and Top 10 finishes (29).
- Clemson's Jacob Bridgeman was the ACC Men's Golf Scholar-Athlete of the Year. A junior management major from Inman, South Carolina, Bridgeman won two stroke play events in 2021, finished fourth in the ACC with a 70.1 stroke average, and helped lead the Tigers to the ACC Championship with two individual match play victories.
- Seven ACC teams – the most of any conference – were ranked in the final Golfstat standings, led by No. 4 Florida State. The Seminoles were followed by No. 8 North Carolina, No. 9 Wake Forest, No. 10 Clemson, No. 20 NC State, No. 23 Louisville and No. 25 Georgia Tech.
- Clemson head coach Larry Penley announced his retirement effective at the end of the 2021 season. Penley recorded his ACC-record 83rd career win with the Tigers' ACC match play title. Wake Forest legend Jesse Haddock had 74 tournament wins and current Georgia Tech coach Bruce Heppeler has 65. Penley concluded his career with 10 ACC Championships.

- The ACC had seven teams in the top 20 of the final Oracle/ITA Rankings, including six of the top 10, both the most of any league. **NORTH CAROLINA** led the conference at No. 2, followed by No. 6 NC State, No. 7 Florida State, No. 8 Duke, No. 9 Virginia, No. 10 Georgia Tech and No. 20 Miami.
- Two ACC teams advanced to semifinals of the 2021 NCAA Division I Women's Tennis Championships, marking the third straight NCAA Tournament the ACC has had at least half the semifinalists. No. 1 North Carolina and No. 6 NC State both advanced to the semifinals.
- North Carolina won its fifth consecutive ACC Women's Tennis Championship, defeating Georgia Tech in Rome, Georgia. Fiona Crawley was named MVP.
- Miami's Estela Perez-Somarriba finished the season as the top-ranked singles player nationally and was named the ITA National Player of the Year.
- Virginia's Emma Navarro won the NCAA Singles Championship over Perez-Somarriba and was named the ITA National Rookie of the Year.
- North Carolina's doubles pair of Makenna Jones and Elizabeth Scotty won the NCAA Doubles Championship over Texas' Kylie Collins and Lulu Sun.
- North Carolina's Sara Daavettila was named the Honda Sport Award winner for tennis, becoming the ACC's ninth winner and the first for UNC. The Honda Sport Award has been presented annually by the CWSA for the past 45 years to the top women athletes in 12 NCAA-sanctioned sports and signifies "the best of the best in collegiate athletics".
- The ACC had 24 ITA All-America honors, with 14 singles players and 10 doubles pairs earning the nod, both the most of any league.

- North Carolina's William Blumberg was named an All-American in both singles and doubles, becoming the first 10-time men's ITA All-American.
- Five ACC men's singles players ranked among the top 25 in the final Oracle/ITA Rankings, the second most of any conference.

Virginia's Carl Söderlund led the group at No. 13, followed by No. 14 Blumberg, No. 19 Henri Squire of Wake Forest, No. 22 Rinky Hijikata of North Carolina and No. 25 Alexis Galarneau of NC State.

- Six ACC men's doubles pairs ranked among the top 25 in the final Oracle/ITA Rankings, the second most of any conference. The No. 4 duo of Blumberg and Brian Cernoch led the league, followed by the No. 15 pair of Söderlund and William Woodall, the No. 16 pair of Squire and Eduardo Nava, the No. 17 pair of Marcus McDaniel and Andres Martin of Georgia Tech, the No. 22 pair of Yannai Barkai and Tadas Babelis of NC State and the No. 25 pair of Sean Sculley and Garrett Johns of Duke.

- Boston College won its first NCAA Championship, downing ACC rival Syracuse, 16-10, in the title game in Towson, Maryland. The ACC now owns 16 NCAA Women's Lacrosse titles.
- The ACC had a team in the national title game for the 11th time in the last 12 tournaments and had at least one team in the national semifinals in the 31st straight tournament and 34th time overall. Syracuse played in the national championship game for the first time since 2014.
- The ACC had three teams competing in the NCAA's Championship Weekend for the fifth time in league history (1998, 2011, 2014, 2015).
- Six ACC teams - most of any conference - earned berths in the 2020 NCAA Championship, including national seeds North Carolina (1), Syracuse (3), Boston College (4), Notre Dame (5) and Duke (7). Virginia also received an at-large bid. The ACC had five teams among the eight quarterfinalists, second most for any conference in tournament history (ACC had six in 2014).
- Top-seeded **NORTH CAROLINA** won its fifth straight ACC Championship following wins over Louisville, Notre Dame and Syracuse in Chapel Hill, North Carolina. The title was the sixth overall for the Tar Heels. Senior goalie Taylor Moreno was named the tournament MVP.
- Boston College's Charlotte North became the ninth ACC woman to win the Tewaaraton Award, presented to the nation's top college player. With 102 goals, North set the NCAA single-season record. She also scored 31 goals in the 2021 NCAA Tournament, shattering the tournament record of 22.
- Three of the five Tewaaraton finalists hailed from the ACC: North and UNC's Taylor Moreno and Jamie Ortega.
- UNC senior attacker Katie Hoeg finished with an ACC-record 233 career assists, including a national-best 71 in 2021.
- In Inside Lacrosse's All-America honors, ACC players took eight of the 13 First-Team spots. In all, 29 ACC players earned All-America status - most of any league.
- Seven ACC teams were ranked in the final IWLCA poll, most of any league. BC topped the poll at No. 1 and was followed by Syracuse (2), North Carolina (3), Notre Dame (6), Duke (8), Virginia (11) and Louisville (25).

mother, Laurie Henes, in 1991. Henes outpaced fellow ACC runner Katie Wasserman of Notre Dame, who took the silver medal.

Meyer became the first female competitor in Virginia Track and Field program's history to win an individual NCAA title. Her personal best time of 2:00.28 that broke her own UVA school record. That ranks as the ninth fastest for the 800 meters in collegiate history. Clemson's Laurie Barton, who beat Meyer for the 800-meter title at the ACC Championships, placed second in 2:00.65.

Three ACC teams finished among the top 20 of the final NCAA team scoring, and 10 teams from the conference scored among the top 50. Florida State placed 14th with 28 points, while Virginia tied for 16th with 16 and Miami scored 14 team points to tie for 19th place.

Meyer went on to miss making the U.S. Olympic Team by a fraction of a second, but her 800 time of 1:58.65 during qualifying set an ACC record. Meyer also grabbed the ACC's women's record in the 1500 meters on July 18 with her time of 4:04.02 at the Sound Running Sunset Tour Meet at Mission Viejo, California, that ranks as the second fastest in NCAA history.

- FLORIDA STATE** piled up 136 points – the most by any men's team since FSU scored 149 in 2013 – to claim first place in the ACC Outdoor Track and Field Championships, which were held May 13-15 at NC State. Virginia Tech finished second (116.5), while Virginia placed third (92).
- The FSU men won their 13th team championship and first since 2018. The men's title was the Seminoles' 11th under head coach Bob Braman.
- The ACC Championships featured an NCAA record by Notre Dame's Yared Nuguse, who turned Thursday night's preliminary qualifier into a personal showcase, dusting the field with time of 3:36.19 in the trial finals June 27 at Eugene, Oregon.
- Florida State's 10th-place team showing led Atlantic Coast Conference teams as the 2021 NCAA Outdoor Track and Field Championships wrapped up men's competition on June 10.
- The Seminoles finished with 23.5 team points. Clemson scored 14 team points and finished tied for 20th overall. Virginia scored 12 team points to finish tied for 28th, followed among ACC teams by Notre Dame (tied for 34th with eight points), Virginia Tech (tied for 37th with six) and North Carolina (tied for 57th with two).
- ACC competitors earned three silver medals in this year's competition, with FSU's Isaac Grimes striking first in the long jump on Wednesday (8.05 meters), followed by Notre Dame's Yared Nuguse on Friday evening in the 1,500 meters run (3:35.60) and Clemson's Roje Stona in the discus (61.94 meters).
- Florida State picked up a bronze medal in the 4x100 relay, along with Virginia discus thrower Claudio Romero (61.36 meters).
- Nuguse went on to become the only current ACC collegian to qualify for the U.S. Olympic Team with his 1500 meters time of

- No. 10 seed Florida State advanced to its fourth Women's College World Series in the last seven postseasons, and second championship series in the last three postseasons.
- Florida State won its region and defeated No. 7 LSU in the Baton Rouge Super Regional to advance to the CWS. The Seminoles fell to No. 2 UCLA before defeating No. 11 Arizona, No. 5 Oklahoma State and No. 3 Alabama twice. Florida State fell to top-seeded Oklahoma in the championship series, 2-1. Virginia Tech advanced to the super regional round as well, taking UCLA to three games. Clemson, Duke and Notre Dame all advanced to the finals of their regions.
- Five ACC teams earned NCAA bids, No. 10 Florida State, No. 13 Duke, Clemson, Notre Dame and Virginia Tech.
- DUKE** won its first ACC Championship in program history with a 1-0 win over Clemson at Louisville's Ulmer Stadium. Pitcher Peyton St. George was named the Championship MVP.
- Three ACC teams finished the season with an ERA of less than 2.00 and ranked among the top 12 teams in the nation - Clemson (fifth, 1.50), Florida State (11th, 1.82), Virginia Tech (12th, 1.83). Duke is right behind at 2.02 and ranks 21st.
- Florida State finished the season ranked third nationally in shutouts with 21, and fifth in doubles plays per game with 0.52.
- Virginia Tech's Keely Rochard finished second in the nation in strikeouts (348) and third in shutouts (13) and wins (29). Clemson's Valerie Cagle finished fourth in wins with 28, and Florida State's Kathryn Sandercock placed fifth (27).
- Five ACC players were named NFCA All-Americans, led by Virginia Tech's Keely Rochard who earned First Team honors. Sandercock was named to the Second Team, along with Notre Dame's Abby Sweet, Clemson's Valerie Cagle and Duke's Deja Davis.

- VIRGINIA won all five events to capture its 11th consecutive ACC Rowing Championship — and its 20th title in the last 21 years — in competition May 15 on Clemson's Lake Hartwell.
- Heading into the final event of the day, the Varsity Eight, Virginia, Syracuse and Duke were all within striking distance of the championship. Thanks to a strong showing in the highest scoring event (36 points for first place), the Cavaliers pulled away in the team standings to win the championship by 15 points. Virginia started fast and continued the momentum throughout the race to log a time of 6:25.552, while Duke clocked a time of 6:30.266 and Syracuse recorded a 6:31.650 time.
- Virginia's Kevin Sauer was named the ACC Coach of the Year.

for the 13th time and Clemson sophomore Rachel Twitty, the stroke for the Tigers Varsity Eight, was tabbed the ACC Newcomer of the Year.

• Starting pitcher Cooper Stinson combined with relievers Jimmy Loper and Marcus Johnson to stifle third-seeded NC State, and ninth-seeded Duke's lone fourth-inning run held up for a 1-0 win in the 2021 ACC Baseball Championship title game May 30 at Charlotte, North Carolina's Truist Field. It marked the fourth ACC baseball championship in DUKE history – but the first since 1961 and the first since the conference began deciding its champion via a tournament format in 1973.

• Eight ACC teams were among the 64-team field for the 2021 NCAA Division I Baseball Championship, the second-most teams of any conference. ACC teams in the field included No. 10 national seed Notre Dame, Duke, Florida State, Georgia Tech, Miami, North Carolina, NC State and Virginia.

• The ACC has had at least six teams in the NCAA tournament for 17 straight years. This is the fifth year since 2010 that at least eight ACC teams have landed spots in the field. Two of the ACC teams selected this year rank among the top five nationally for all-time NCAA tournament appearances: No. 2 Florida State (58) and No. 3 Miami (47).

• NC State and Virginia advanced to the College World Series in Omaha, and the Wolfpack reached the national semifinals

before a number of positive COVID-19 tests forced the Wolfpack to bow out of the tournament.

• This marked the 15th consecutive year that the ACC placed at least one team in the College World Series and the 10th time during that period that multiple conference teams made the trip to Omaha. A total of 28 ACC teams – nearly a quarter of the total field – have earned CWS berths since 2006. NC State reached the CWS for the third time in program history and the first time since 2013. Virginia made its fifth appearance in Omaha and the first since the National Championship year of 2015.

• A total of 63 ACC players – second-most among all conferences – were selected in the 2021 Major League Baseball Draft. The ACC was the only conference to have at least one player taken in each of the draft's 20 rounds.

• This year's league contingent included No. 1 overall pick Henry Davis of Louisville, No. 15 overall pick Sal Frelick of Boston College and No. 24 overall pick Ryan Cusick of Wake Forest. It marked the 30th consecutive year that at least one ACC player has been taken in the opening round, and Davis became the fifth player from a current ACC school to be selected first overall.




TREVOR LAWRENCE CLEMSON FOOTBALL



Heisman Trophy finalist Trevor Lawrence of Clemson received the 68th Anthony J. McKevelin Award as the conference's premier male athlete. It marks the fifth time a Clemson student-athlete earned the award and the fourth time in six years (football quarterback Deshaun Watson in 2016 and 2017; soccer standout Robbie Robinson in 2020). Lawrence became Clemson's first number one overall pick in the NFL draft after being selected by the Jacksonville Jaguars, capping a junior season in which he led the Tigers to their sixth consecutive ACC title and College Football Playoff appearance.

The ACC Athlete of the Year Awards are given in memory of two distinguished journalists. McKevelin was a sports editor of the Raleigh (North Carolina) News and Observer, while Garber, of the Winston-Salem (North Carolina) Journal, was a pioneer as one of the first female sports journalists in the nation.

Clemson's Lawrence completed 231-of-334 passes with 24 touchdowns and five interceptions for a pass efficiency rating of 169.2 in 627 snaps over 10 games (all starts). The Knoxville, Tennessee, native and former Cartersville, Georgia, prep star also rushed 68 times for 203 yards with eight rushing touchdowns. Lawrence's average of 315.3 passing yards per game last season broke Deshaun Watson's previous school record mark from 2016 (306.2 ypg).

Lawrence became the second Heisman finalist in school history, joining 2015 and 2016 finalist Watson, and finished second in the 2020 voting. A third-team All-America selection by the Associated Press and the ACC Offensive Player of the Year, Lawrence won the Bobby Bowden Trophy and was a finalist for every major quarterback award.

Lawrence led the McKevelin Award balloting with 52 votes, followed by Florida State golfer John Pak with 12.

FEMALE ATHLETE OF THE YEAR

CHARLOTTE NORTH BOSTON COLLEGE LACROSSE



National women's lacrosse player of the year Charlotte North of Boston College received the Mary Garber Award as the ACC's top female athlete. She joined former Eagle lacrosse/ice hockey standout Kenzie Kent to become the second student-athlete from Boston College to be recognized as the ACC Female Athlete of the Year.


The ACC Athlete of the Year Awards are given in memory of two distinguished journalists. McKevelin was a sports editor of the Raleigh (North Carolina) News and Observer, while Garber, of the Winston-Salem (North Carolina) Journal, was a pioneer as one of the first female sports journalists in the nation.

Boston College's North set the NCAA record for goals in a season with 102 and shattered the record for goals in a single ACC tournament with 31 (previous record was 22). Her 174 draw controls were the second-most in a single season at BC.

North's other scoring records include the ACC and BC record for goals in a single game with 10, and she set the BC record for goals in a NCAA Tournament game with eight. The Dallas, Texas, senior tied the NCAA Championship game record with six goals.

A four-time IWLCA Offensive Player of the Week, North became the fastest BC player to reach 100 points in a season, doing so in just 19 games.

North received 43 votes to lead the Garber Award balloting. North Carolina junior field hockey standout Erin Matson, last year's recipient, received 19 votes this year to place second.

The Atlantic Coast Conference's 52 postgraduate scholarship award winners were featured on "No Limit: The ACC Salutes Scholar-Athletes," a one-hour show on ACC Network on Monday, May 17. The show was hosted by former ACC student-athletes and current ACCN personalities Katie George and EJ Manuel.

This class of outstanding scholar-athletes were the first to receive the newly-named Weaver-James-Corrigan-Swofford Postgraduate Scholarship as former Commissioner John Swofford's name was added to the award. During Swofford's 24 years as the league's Commissioner, the ACC won 92 national team titles in 19 of the league's 27 sponsored sports, and the league continued to set the standard academically by leading all conferences in nearly every comparison.

"No Limit" featured the best and brightest student-athletes from all 15 schools and included interviews about their passion for ACC athletics, academics and current issues.

"We are incredibly proud of these student-athletes for what they've accomplished in the classroom, on the playing field and in their communities," said ACC Commissioner Jim Phillips. "They've shown the dedication, leadership and passion to succeed in all areas and are an inspiration to the younger generation."

This year's class included three student-athletes who also received the Thacker Award and nine student-athletes who planned to pursue professional careers in their chosen sports and were named honorary recipients.

The Weaver-James-Corrigan-Swofford and Jim and Pat Thacker postgraduate scholarships are awarded to selected student-athletes who intend to pursue a graduate degree following completion of their undergraduate requirements. Each recipient received \$6,000 toward his or her graduate education. Those honored have performed with distinction in both the classroom and their respective sport, while demonstrating exemplary conduct in the community.

ABOUT THE WEAVER-JAMES-CORRIGAN-SWOFFORD AWARD

The Weaver-James-Corrigan-Swofford Award is named in honor of Jim Weaver, Bob James, Gene Corrigan and John Swofford, the first four ACC commissioners. The league's first commissioner, James H. Weaver, served the conference from 1954-70 after a stint as the Director of Athletics at Wake Forest. His early leadership and uncompromising integrity are largely responsible for the excellent reputation enjoyed by the ACC today.

Robert C. James, a former Maryland football player, was named commissioner in 1971 and served in that capacity for 16 years. During his tenure, the league continued to grow in stature and became recognized as a national leader in athletics and academics, winning 23 national championships and maintaining standards of excellence in the classroom.

Eugene F. Corrigan assumed his role as the third full-time commissioner on September 1, 1987 and served until August of 1997. During Corrigan's tenure, ACC schools captured 30 NCAA championships and two national football titles.

John Swofford, the longest-tenured commissioner in the 67-year history of the ACC, started in 1997 and served 24 years before retiring in February 2021. Swofford guided the league to unprecedented stability, success and growth as the league expanded from nine to 15 members. Expansion allowed the league to secure its future through the grant of media rights, creation of the ACC Football Championship Game, an invaluable partnership with the Orange Bowl, and joining with ESPN in August 2019 to establish the ACC Network.

ACC AGAIN HITS HIGH MARKS IN GRADUATION SUCCESS RATE REPORT

The Atlantic Coast Conference's collective high level of academic success is again reflected by the NCAA Graduation Success Rate (GSR) report.

The ACC continues to lead peer conferences with an average graduation rate of 92 percent – matching the conference's average GSR achieved a year ago and two points higher than this year's national average of 90 percent. Other key notes for the ACC in comparison to peer conferences:

- Twenty-one ACC teams achieved GSR scores of 100 in the sports of men's basketball, women's basketball and baseball.
- Eight ACC men's basketball teams earned higher than the Division I basketball GSR average, tying for the most among Power 5 conferences. Clemson, Duke, Miami, Virginia and Wake Forest posted GSR scores of 100. The five ACC men's basketball teams with perfect scores also match the most of any Power 5 conference.
- Eleven ACC football teams earned higher than the FBS football GSR average, tying for most among Power 5 conferences.
- In the sport of football, the ACC remains the only conference to have multiple teams register GSR scores of 90 or higher every year since 2005. Duke (97), Louisville (94), Boston College (90) and Virginia (90) reached that plateau in this year's report.
- Eleven ACC women's basketball teams earned higher than the Division I women's basketball GSR average, also tying for most among Power 5 conferences.
- This marks the 12th straight year that the ACC has had at least four women's basketball programs score 100, making it the only peer conference to do so. Nine ACC teams – Duke, Florida State, Louisville, Miami, North Carolina, Notre Dame, Pitt, Syracuse and Virginia – hit the century mark in the latest report.
- Ten ACC baseball teams earned higher than the Division I GSR baseball average, tying for the most among Power 5 conferences. Clemson, Duke, NC State, Notre Dame, Virginia, Virginia Tech and Wake Forest each registered a 100 GSR. The seven ACC baseball teams with perfect scores are the most of any Power 5 conference.

This year's report is based on information obtained from the 2020 NCAA Graduation Rate Report. This is the most recent graduating class for which the required six years of information is available. A graduation rate (percent) is based on a comparison of the number of students who entered a college or university and the number of those who graduated within six years. For example, if 100 students entered and 60 graduated, the graduation rate is 60 percent.

It should be noted that graduation rates are affected by a number of factors: some students transfer to another college, some may be dismissed for academic deficiencies, some may have to work part-time and need more than six years to graduate.

The Graduation Success Rate (GSR) subtracts students from the entering cohort who are considered allowable exclusions (those who either die or become personally disabled, those who leave school to join the armed forces, foreign services or attend a church mission) as well as those who would have been academically eligible to compete had they returned to the institution.

ACC CONTINUES TO LEAD FBS CONFERENCES IN 'BEST COLLEGES' RANKINGS

For the 14th consecutive year, the Atlantic Coast Conference leads the way among Football Bowl Subdivision (FBS) conferences in the "Best Colleges" rankings released by U.S. News & World Report.

NOTABLES FROM THIS YEAR'S RANKINGS:

- The average rank of ACC schools is 54, tops among all FBS conferences.
- The ACC has led the FBS conferences in best average rank in each of the last 14 years.
- The ACC's two schools among the top 20 of this year's rankings ties for the most among peer conferences.
- The ACC's five schools ranked in the top 30 are the most among FBS conferences.
- The ACC is also the only FBS conference with eight member institutions among the top 50 – four more than any peer league.

GEORGIA TECH'S MATTHEWS, NOTRE DAME'S DESCHNER LEAD ACC'S WOMAN OF THE YEAR NOMINATIONS

The Atlantic Coast Conference nominated All-Americans Bria Matthews (Georgia Tech track & field) and Stefani Deschner (Notre Dame fencing) for the 2021 NCAA Woman of the Year Award.

The NCAA Woman of the Year Award was established in 1991 to recognize graduating female student-athletes who have exhausted their eligibility and distinguished themselves in academics, athletics, service and leadership throughout their collegiate careers.

"Bria and Stefani embody everything that is special about college athletics," said ACC Commissioner Jim Phillips. "Throughout their respective careers, they have excelled in the classroom and in competition, while also setting the ultimate example in their commitment to community service. All of this year's ACC Woman of the Year nominees are exceptional leaders, and we are proud of their significant accomplishments."

Matthews will depart Georgia Tech as one of the most decorated athletes in program history for her accomplishments on and off the track.

In addition to earning six career All-America honors in the long jump and triple jump, the Morrow, Georgia, native received the Athletes for a Better World's prestigious 2021 John Wooden Citizenship Cup, which is presented annually to four distinguished athletes – one collegiate, one professional or Olympic, and a male and female from the high school ranks – for their character and leadership both on and off the field.

A six-time ACC Champion (four indoor, two outdoor), including five titles in the triple jump, Matthews earned Most Outstanding Field Performer honors at this past spring's ACC Outdoor Championship after earning a pair of silver medals for the seventh and eighth podium finishes of her ACC career.

After an impressive freshman season on The Flats in which she claimed the 2016 ACC Indoor Championship in the long jump and triple jump, ACC Outdoor Championship (triple jump) and competed at the Olympic Trials, Matthews experienced a career-halting injury that sidelined her for nearly two years. Upon her full return in 2019, Matthews came back stronger, switching her plant leg, and went on to win three ACC titles and be named All-American on four more occasions.

Matthews has taken three international service trips during her time at Georgia Tech – traveling to the Dominican Republic with Fellowship of Christian Athletes to enhance a local community center and build a dugout at a baseball field, Costa Rica with Jackets Without Borders to construct a multipurpose court at a local school and Haiti to distribute prototypes of portable solar charge controllers to families in need.

Additionally, Matthews has donated time to organizations such as Girls on the Run, the Michael Isenhour Toy Drive and Junior Achievement Biztown.

A two-time Academic All-American (2019, 2020), Matthews earned a bachelor's degree from Georgia Tech in electrical engineering in 2019 and received her master's degree in electrical and computer engineering in May.

Deschner was named the ACC Scholar-Athlete of the Year for the second consecutive season after a successful senior year in which she helped Notre Dame to the 11th NCAA Fencing Championship in program history.

The Versailles, Kentucky, native continued her strong play on the strip after a breakout junior season. She completed an undefeated regular season with a 17-0 record heading into the NCAA Championships. At the NCAAs, Deschner advanced to the semifinals and defeated teammate Amita Berthier to advance to the foil finals. In the finals, she scored the first seven touches of the match and ended up claiming the foil championship, 15-9.

With the win, she claimed her first career individual championship and was the first women's foil champion from Notre Dame since Olympic gold medalist Lee Kiefer back in 2017.

The co-executive chair of the ACC Student-Athlete Advisory Council (SAAC) mental health board, Deschner has organized additional mental health town halls, developed education modules, and created a mental health station to help direct student athletes to proper mental health professionals.

Deschner has also actively served as the fencing liaison with Fighting Irish Fight for Life (FIFL), an organization that pairs severely ill children with the university's sports teams.

Having recently earned her undergraduate degree in pre-professional studies and theology, Deschner has been accepted into three medical schools. She was a 2021 ACC Postgraduate Scholarship recipient, a three-time All-ACC Fencing Academic Team honoree and has made the Dean's List seven times.

Matthews and Deschner emerged as the ACC's 2021 NCAA Woman of the Year candidates following a vote of the league's 15 member schools. The strong list of nominees from member institutions also included:

From the group of conference nominees, the top 10 will be chosen from each NCAA division in September. The selection committee then will determine the top three honorees from each division from the Top 30 and announce the nine finalists. From those nine finalists, the NCAA Committee on Women's Athletics then will choose the 2021 NCAA Woman of the Year, which will be announced this fall.

ACC member institutions claim three past NCAA Women of the Year honorees. Former Notre Dame soccer standout Elizabeth Tucker was named the 2014 NCAA Woman of the Year. Wake Forest's Annie Bersagel (cross country/track & field) was recognized in 2006, and Virginia's Peggy Boutilier (field hockey/lacrosse) received the honor in 1998.

SERVICES TO MEMBER SCHOOLS IN COMPLIANCE & GOVERNANCE

The ACC office provides timely information on NCAA and ACC governance items through its compliance and governance department. The work of the compliance and governance staff furthers the ACC's commitment to competing athletically at a high level with integrity and uniquely balancing academics and athletics. While some services focus on day-to-day assistance to member institutions, other services provide institutions with best practices and ideas on how to continuously improve their compliance operations. Among the services provided through the compliance and governance office were:

- Continued assistance with interpretations of NCAA and ACC rules.
- Frequent calls throughout the pandemic with compliance personnel.
- Implementation of institutional compliance reviews conducted through the contract services of The Compliance Group.
- Governance meeting support for the ACC governance structure, including coaches meetings.
- Distribution of more than \$8,800,000 to member institutions for direct benefits to ACC student-athletes.
- Enhanced Rules education program for institutional administrators through monthly newsletters.
- Despite having to cancel the in-person ACC Mental Health and Wellness Summit, videos related to mental health and wellness topics were delivered to the membership during the month of May.

ACC SCHOOL REVENUE DISTRIBUTION REMAINS SIGNIFICANT

The ACC's total revenue has steadily increased and ranks among the highest in total conference revenue. Primary revenue sources include media rights, the College Football Playoff and bowl games, the ACC Football Championship Game, the NCAA Men's Basketball Tournament, and NCAA broad based funds. In addition, the Conference reimburses member schools for expenses related to their participation in all ACC championships and provides financial support for participation in select NCAA championships and bowl games.

The ACC President's Award is presented at the discretion of the chair of the Faculty Athletics Representatives to an individual who has provided exemplary service to the conference in a specific task, in a series of efforts during the year of the chair's service, or over an extended period of time.

COST CENTER BUDGETING SYSTEM

The Conference utilizes a budget process which includes significant involvement from the ACC Finance Committee, which is comprised of three members of the Board of Directors and the Conference Treasurer serving as the ex-officio. Following review and adjustments to the proposed operating budget for the upcoming fiscal year, the Finance Committee is tasked with recommending a proposed budget for review and approval by the Board at the Annual Meeting. Revenue projections are also reviewed as part of the overall budget process.

The ACC office uses an accounting system that allows departmental managers the ability to effectively monitor their budgets vs. actual expenses, review year over year comparisons, and provide ACC staff with the tools necessary to make informed decisions based on timely and accurate financial information.

INVESTMENT POLICIES

The current allocation of asset investments for the Conference is delegated to the Finance Committee. This oversight committee includes development of the Conference Investment policy, including the determination of appropriate asset allocations, consistent review of funds' performance versus benchmarks and recommendations regarding Conference monetary investments. The Committee meets annually with the current external investment management agency to make changes, as needed, with investment strategies. The Finance committee recommended an amended Investment Policy to the Board, simplifying the administration and execution of the policy. The Board unanimously approved the policy at the Annual Meeting.

ACC ACTIVELY PURSUES MINORITY CANDIDATES

The Atlantic Coast Conference is committed to achieving diversity in all aspects of its administration. One of the areas the Conference Office is looking to achieve this is in actively pursuing minority candidates for positions which are available in the ACC Office. The Conference Office conducts a concerted effort to identify, seek and hire qualified minority personnel.

The ACC Committee for Racial and Social Justice (C.O.R.E.) was created in June 2020 to support the ACC's commitment to inclusion, social justice and racial equity. Members of C.O.R.E. include conference office staff members and campus representatives from each of the league's 15 institutions. C.O.R.E.'s mission is to promote and encourage racial equity through education, partnerships, engagement and advocacy.

ADVOCACY

- Implemented a UNITY Week for each season (Fall, Winter, Spring) to showcase the ACC and its member institutions' commitment to and support of racial and social justice.
 - Fall – Theme: Activism and Allyship, featured a student-athlete webinar facilitated by the ISSJ.
 - Winter – Theme: Leadership Matters, featured the playing of Lift Every Voice and Sing at all ACC Winter Championships.
 - Spring – Theme: Activism Through Sports, featured unity walks on various campuses and in Greensboro, webinars with Dr. Joseph Cooper, PhD and Ms. Lonita Baker, JD, and an AD Panel with Dr. Carla Williams, PhD and Heather Lyke, JD.
- Developed a Social Justice Series and PSAs that were shared on ACC platforms featuring student-athletes and coaches speaking out on the need for change.
- Amplified campus and student-athlete participation in peaceful protests and advocacy for racial and social justice issues.
- Instituted the UNITE Award which recognizes, on an annual basis, individuals nominated by each institution that are affiliated with the ACC (student-athletes, alumni, coaches, athletic administrators and/or professionals with ties to the ACC) who have made an impact in areas of racial and social justice.
- Created the ACC unity symbol as a visual representation of solidarity among the ACC's 15 institutions around racial and social justice.
- Instituted the ACC unity statement to be read at conference events to show our collective commitment to unity behind common causes. The statement reads: "We, the ACC, are committed to seeing each other as equals, treating each other with respect and dignity at all times, recognizing that our differences do not divide us, but they make us stronger."
- Implemented the observance of Juneteenth and Election Day as conference office holidays.

EDUCATION

- Adopted conference-wide mandatory annual diversity and inclusion training for student-athletes, athletic department staff, and Conference office staff. This year's training focused on anti-racism.
- Launched an ACC staff book club designed to foster education and dialogue around the topics of racial and social justice. The first series of the book club began August 10, 2020 to read and discuss "So You Want to Talk About Race" by Ijeoma Oluo. The next installment of the ACC staff book club will involve reading and discussing "White Fragility" by Robin DeAngelo.
- Initiated planning for activities that will commemorate Pride Month (June 2021).
- Utilized the monthly internal newsletter to provide educational resources and keep staff updated on C.O.R.E. actions.

ENGAGEMENT

- Established a Voter Education Campaign that included conference-wide voting challenge to encourage student athletes, coaches, administrators, and staff to exercise their right and civic duty to vote. The campaign included promotion of educational materials and amplification of initiatives being executed on campus. Several campuses served as polling sites for the November 3 Election Day.
- Conducted a Men's and Women's Basketball Suit Drive during both league tournaments that yielded more than 275 suits donated to United Way of Greater Greensboro Family Success Center and other local organizations.



ORGANIZATIONAL CULTURE

- Reviewed department staff makeup, hiring practices and empowerment of diverse hires on campuses and at the Conference office.
- Developed a directory of local minority-owned businesses to encourage staff to utilize these vendors for conference operations.
- Pursuing collaborations with other collegiate athletic entities in our respective community to establish initiatives and programs in our community to bring about change in the areas of diversity, equity, inclusion, and social justice.

PARTNERSHIP

- Partnered with local organizations, International Civil Rights Center & Museum and United Way of Greater Greensboro's Family Success Centers.

ACC UNITY WEEKS

ACC UNITY WEEKS are an initiative of the ACC's Committee for Racial and Social Justice (C.O.R.E - Champions of Racial Equity) and were developed in conjunction with its 15 member institutions. The ACC held three Unity Weeks – Fall, Winter, Spring – during the 2020-21 academic year.

The first ACC Unity Week (Oct. 27-29) coincided with the NCAA Diversity & Inclusion Social Media Campaign, and the second (Feb. 20-28) was held during the final week of Black History Month. The third Unity Week (April 18-25) centered on 'Activism Through Sports,' with the league office and its member institutions participating in Unity walks across campuses and in Greensboro.

Every sport was in action during one of three weeks and several ACC Championships were conducted during the weekly celebrations.

Among the league's initiatives surrounding ACC Unity Weeks:

- ACC provided all student-athletes a UNITE wristband to wear
- All league social media handle profile pictures featured the ACC UNITE logo
- Conference office produced social justice videos highlighting the initiatives of student-athletes and teams
- ACC highlighted specific themes of UNITY each day of the week
- Conference office held a virtual webinar for the ACC's student-athletes on Oct. 29 on "Activism and Allyship"
- UNITE logo was included in ACCN television broadcasts
- ACCN's Packer and Durham/ACCN wore UNITE shirts and wristbands on air
- ACC Student-Athlete Advisory Committee (SAAC) posted messages and videos celebrating Unity and Black History Month
- UNITE videos were played at each of the Olympic Sport championships, and a Unity moment was recognized prior to the national anthem
- As part of ESPN's celebration of "Black History Always," ACCN hosted one-hour virtual roundtable on former ACC Trailblazers on Feb. 22 and a feature on Duke field hockey student-athlete Darcy Bourne on Feb. 16
- Unity Week information and initiatives were highlighted on the league's communications platforms
- Each ACC institution was invited to participate in a 1.5 mile Unity Walk on its campus in recognition of the 15 member schools with photos and video of the walks amplified and shared across ACC social platforms throughout the week
- The conference office participated in a 1.5 mile Unity Walk on the campus of North Carolina A&T and ended at the historic Woolworth building, which now houses the International Civil Rights Center & Museum

2021 VIRTUAL MENTAL HEALTH SUMMIT

For the third consecutive year, in recognition of mental health awareness month, the ACC hosted a mental health summit. The 2021 ACC Mental Health Summit was held virtually on May 18-19 and featured Victoria Garrick and Dr. Kensa Gunter as keynote speakers. The major themes of the summit were lessons learned from COVID-19 and how to move forward and providing culturally relevant mental health support.

The panel discussion "Mental Health Lessons Learned from COVID and How to Move Forward" featured: Amanda Butler (Women's Basketball Coach, Clemson), Anna Callahan (Women's Lacrosse Student-Athlete, Duke), Dr. Kristen Mackel (Sports Psychologist, Pitt) & Dr. Jeanne Doperak (Team Physician, Pitt).

The breakout sessions during the summit focused on discussing solutions on various topics related to mental health and support of student-athletes. The three breakout sessions provided discussions on how to develop an athletics culture that's inclusive of mental wellness, impact of social media, and best practices for developing and managing resources for student-athlete health.

The second day of the mental health summit began with Dr. Kensa Gunter speaking about "The A.I.R. (Advocacy, Inclusion, Representation) We Breathe."

The summit closed with a fireside chat that was facilitated by Dr. Omar Dawood, Chief Medical Officer for Calm. Dr. Dawood interviewed Virginia Tech men's soccer student-athlete Khalil Dover.





ACC COMMISSIONER JOHN SWOFFORD ANNOUNCES RETIREMENT

John Swofford, the longest-tenured commissioner in the history of the Atlantic Coast Conference, retired in January 2021.

As the fourth commissioner of the ACC, Swofford guided the league to unprecedented stability, success and growth, expanding from nine to 15 members beginning with Miami and Virginia Tech in 2004, quickly followed by Boston College and later joined by Pitt, Syracuse, Notre Dame and Louisville.

Expansion allowed the league to secure its future through the grant of media rights, to create the creation of the ACC Football Championship Game, to develop an invaluable partnership with the Orange Bowl, and to join with ESPN in August 2019 to establish the ACC Network, which provides fans exceptional access to live events via a comprehensive, multi-platform network.

"It has been a privilege to be a part of the ACC for over five decades, and my respect and appreciation for those associated with the league throughout its history is immeasurable," said Swofford at the time of his announcement. "Having been an ACC student-athlete, athletics director and commissioner has been an absolute honor. There are immediate challenges that face not only college athletics, but our entire country, and I will continue to do my very best to help guide the conference in these unprecedented times through the remainder of my tenure. Nora and I have been planning for this to be my last year for some time, and I look forward to enjoying the remarkable friendships and memories I've been blessed with long after I leave this chair."

Swofford's impact was felt far beyond the ACC footprint. He played a key role in the evolution of the College Football Playoff, as well as being a leading advocate for NCAA legislation that allows Autonomy 5 conferences to better address the needs of their institutions, athletic programs and student-athletes. He was instrumental in starting the ACC/Big Ten Challenge, now an early-season staple for both men's and women's college basketball, and oversaw the development of the ACC Football Championship Game. During his tenure, he hired the league's first full-time women's basketball administrator, started the ACC Student-Athlete Advisory Committee and implemented the annual ACC Mental Health and Wellness Summit.

During his 24 years of service, the ACC was at the forefront of college athletics, winning 92 national team titles in 19 of the league's 27 sponsored sports. Beyond athletics, the league continued to set the standard academically by leading all conferences in nearly every comparison.

Kent Syverud, Chancellor of Syracuse University and the Chair of the ACC Board of Directors, praised Commissioner Swofford's character and service.

"John Swofford, in his historic tenure, has come to embody the very best of the ACC," Syverud said. "The Conference has been dramatically enhanced in every way during the last quarter century, especially in its balance of academics and athletics. All 15 Presidents of the Conference, like their universities, are deeply grateful to John for his transformative leadership."

A native of North Wilkesboro, North Carolina, where he was a three-sport most valuable player and all-state quarterback, Swofford attended the University of North Carolina on a Morehead Scholarship as part of head coach Bill Dooley's first football recruiting class. In addition to earning a spot on the ACC Academic Honor Roll as a student-athlete, he started at quarterback as a sophomore and part of his junior year, and then finished his career as a defensive back for UNC's 1971 ACC Championship team. He played in the Peach Bowl as a junior and the Gator Bowl as a senior.

Swofford received his Master's in Athletics Administration from Ohio University. His first job in college athletics came at the University of Virginia — where he worked under future ACC Commissioner Gene Corrigan — before returning to North Carolina.

In 1980, at the age of 31, Swofford was named the athletics director at his alma mater. He held that post for 17 years. UNC teams won more ACC and NCAA championships under his watch than any other athletic director in ACC history, a record that still stands. In 1994, Carolina won the Sears Director's Cup, awarded to the top overall athletics program in the nation, the only ACC program to ever win that award.

At the time he became athletics director, North Carolina had not won a national championship in any sport since 1957. The Tar Heels won at least one national title every year of Swofford's tenure. During his time in Chapel Hill, Carolina's women's sports programs soared to unprecedented heights, winning 65 ACC and 17 NCAA Championships. Swofford also hired six head coaches that went on to win national championships. In 1981, he hired the first Black head coach in the ACC.

Swofford is a member of five Halls of Fame — the NACDA Hall of Fame, the North Carolina Sports Hall of Fame, the North Carolina High School Athletic Association Hall of Fame, the Chick-fil-A Bowl Hall of Fame, and the Wilkes County Hall of Fame. He has been awarded the Corbett Award, which is the highest administrative honor given nationally to a collegiate athletics administrator. Swofford has received the Homer Rice Award from the Division 1A Athletic Directors' Association and is a recipient of the Ohio University Distinguished Alumnus Award. In 2011, he also received one of Greensboro's Father of the Year Awards.

Swofford and his wife, Nora, continue to reside in Greensboro, North Carolina.

“CHAPTERS: THE LEGACY OF JOHN SWOFFORD”

"Chapters: The Legacy of John Swofford," a 60-minute documentary that detailed the distinguished career of the former ACC Commissioner, debuted on March 25 on ACC Network.

"Chapters" featured personal reflections of Swofford's career, beginning with his days as a high school football star in North Wilkesboro, North Carolina, and continuing through his unprecedented 24-year run as ACC Commissioner. Produced in black and white, the documentary provided a unique perspective on Swofford's time as a University of North Carolina quarterback under first-year head coach Bill Dooley; his first job at Virginia under athletic director and future league commissioner Gene Corrigan; his tenure as North Carolina's athletic director; and the important impact of his family on his career.

The documentary included interviews with Swofford at locations across North Carolina, including North Wilkesboro, Chapel Hill, his home in Greensboro and the conference office. "Chapters" contained exclusive video of Swofford at work and at home with his family, as well as extensive archival footage and photos from his career.

WELCOME COMMISSIONER JAMES J. PHILLIPS

ACC

JAMES J. PHILLIPS, PH.D., BEGAN HIS TENURE AS ATLANTIC COAST CONFERENCE COMMISSIONER ON FEBRUARY 1, 2021. The fifth commissioner in the history of the ACC, Phillips brings more than three decades of experience in Division I athletics, a track record of tremendous achievement, a vision for the future of intercollegiate athletics and a passion for helping student-athletes achieve impact and success in competition, in the classroom and in their communities.

Phillips is known as one of the leading voices across the college sports landscape. He was elected as the inaugural chair of the NCAA Division I Council in February 2015 and served as the first-ever sitting athletic director on the NCAA Board of Directors and Board of Governors. In March 2017, he was appointed to the NCAA Division I Men's Basketball Selection Committee. Phillips also served as a member of the NCAA Men's Basketball Oversight Committee, was appointed to the Fiesta Bowl Board of Directors in June 2018 and chaired the Big Ten TV/Media Committee. He twice served as a member of the Rose Bowl Management Committee and was honored as the 2018 Sports Business Journal Athletic Director of the Year for his leadership at Northwestern.

Prior to being named commissioner, Phillips served as the Combe Family Vice President for Athletics & Recreation at Northwestern University. He was named Northwestern's 21st director of intercollegiate athletics and recreation in April 2008. By 2012, Phillips was elevated by Northwestern President Morton Schapiro to the position of Combe Family Vice President for Athletics & Recreation, a title reflecting the campus-wide responsibilities of the role as well as its voice on the President's Senior Staff.

Phillips led Northwestern to elite status both on and off the playing fields. In competition, under his leadership, 10 of Northwestern's athletic programs won conference or national championships, with the football team clinching the Big Ten West Division crown twice in the last three seasons of Phillips' tenure. Nine of Northwestern's 15 all-time football bowl appearances occurred with Phillips at the helm, as well as the school's first-ever berth in the NCAA Men's Basketball Tournament. During Phillips' final five years, Northwestern invested more than \$500 million in new and renovated facilities, supported by record fundraising success.

Academically, Wildcats student-athletes surpassed 200 Academic All-Big Ten honorees in each of Phillips' last 10 years, including a record 288 in 2019-20. Northwestern scored a 98 percent overall Graduation Success Rate (GSR) in 2020 data released by the NCAA — a figure which led all FBS schools for the third consecutive year — and finished in the Top-4 nationally in all 15 years the metric was released during his tenure.



Phillips' commitment to inclusiveness in athletics was recognized in 2019 when he was honored by the NCAA as a Champion of Diversity and Inclusion. The honor recognizes those who work to support underrepresented communities among college athletics administrators. In 2020, Phillips announced the creation of a new senior leadership position, the Senior Associate A.D./Chief Diversity & Inclusion Officer, to lead the department's foundational commitment to a world-class experience for all Northwestern student-athletes. He also established senior staff positions for leaders in community relations, to focus staff and student-athlete service initiatives, and the Kabiller NU For Life professional development program.

Before arriving at Northwestern, Phillips held several leadership positions in major athletics programs, including director of athletics at Northern Illinois University (NIU) from 2004-08. Prior to NIU, Phillips served as associate director of athletics, then senior associate director of athletics for external affairs at the University of Notre Dame from 2000-04. Before that, he was assistant athletic director for annual giving and major gifts at the University of Tennessee (1998-2000). Phillips began his career on the coaching side as a basketball team manager and student assistant at the University of Illinois. He went on to serve as a graduate assistant coach and later an assistant basketball coach at Arizona State University before transitioning to athletics administration work in 1997.

A Chicago native, Phillips earned a Ph.D. in education administration from the University of Tennessee, a master's degree in education from Arizona State University and an undergraduate degree from the University of Illinois. He and his wife, Laura, have five children: Luke, Madeline, Meredith, John and James.




ACCN HIGHLIGHTS

- One of the ACC's most significant historical accomplishments came on August 22, 2019 with the launch of ACC Network (ACCN), a 24/7 national network dedicated to ACC sports and league-wide original programming. Initially announced in July 2016, the launch was the culmination of years of planning by former ACC Commissioner John Swofford, league administrators and ESPN officials.
- ACCN includes state-of-the-art campus production facilities at all 15 institutions.
- Among the many benefits of ACCN are increased revenue distribution for league institutions, employment opportunities for students, and promotion and coverage of Olympic Sports, including an enormous increase in programming for women's athletics.
- ACCN continues to super-serve ACC fans with first-class content representing the ACC's 15 member institutions, student-athletes and alumni.
- ACCN was nominated for three Sports Video Group awards and one Sports Emmy in its debut 2019-20 season. ACCN also won a gold medal for "Best Animation" at the 2020 New York Festivals TV & Film Awards.

REACH

- ACCN has extensive reach and is available to households throughout the ACC footprint and nationally through a multitude of traditional and streaming pay TV providers. All fans within the footprint and nationally have the ability to access the network.
- ACCN is available to nearly 70 million households.
- Carriage agreements are in place with nearly every major provider including: AT&T U-Verse, AT&T TV NOW, Cox, DIRECTV, DISH Network, fuboTV, Google Fiber, Hulu Live TV, Mediacom, Optimum, Sling TV, Spectrum TV, Suddenlink, TVision, Verizon Fios, YouTube TV, members of the NCTC, NRTC, Vidgo and Vivicast, among others.
- ACCN provides coverage of more than 500 exclusive ACC events annually across the ACC's 27 sponsored sports. Games/matches featured on the network extend across regular season and ACC Championships.
- Together, ACCN and its digital platform, ACC Network Extra (ACCNX), features more than 1,500 ACC events annually.



ORIGINAL PROGRAMMING

- ACCN is committed to original storytelling and access programming – two hallmarks of the network and showcased through a multitude of documentaries and all-access series. Examples include: *The Class That Saved Coach K*, *Greatest Ever: 2018 Clemson Tigers*, *Champions Coaches Conversations*, *Unbelievable: Virginia's Improbable Path to a Title*, *ACC Traditions*, *1186 To Omaha: 2015 Virginia Baseball*, *All Access with Carolina Basketball*, *3-Day Weekend: Virginia Tech and All Access The ACC Life*.
- ACCN has received unprecedented access to high profile programs including North Carolina men's basketball, Louisville football, and Notre Dame and Miami women's basketball. Post-COVID, ACCN will continue its push around access programming.

LIVE EVENT COVERAGE

FOOTBALL

- Along with a full slate of season-long football games on ACCN, the network provides wall to wall coverage every Saturday throughout the fall. *The Huddle*, ACCN's franchise football studio show leads into the action with a two-hour pregame show, provides coverage at halftime and between games, as well as an hour-long postgame show. *The Huddle* also appears on ACCN around other tentpole football events – ACC Football Kickoff, Pro Days, Signing Day, CFP and select bowl games. *The Huddle* originates out of ESPN's Bristol, Connecticut studios but will occasionally travel as storylines and content priorities dictate.

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
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BASKETBALL

- ACC men's and women's basketball enjoys tremendous exposure through ACC Network. In its debut year, ACCN doubled linear exposure for ACC men's basketball and caused an 800 percent increase in women's basketball linear coverage.
- ACCN provides dedicated studio coverage of the conference's basketball media days - ACC Women's Basketball Tipoff and Operation Basketball as well as both men's and women's conference tournaments. The network had live studio sets at 2019 Tipoff and Operation Basketball as well as at the 2020 ACC Women's Basketball Tournament and New York Life ACC Men's Basketball Tournament, delivering surrounding coverage of those events. Due to the COVID-19 pandemic, studio shows did not travel for 2021 WBBT and MBBT events in Greensboro, but shows are expected to return on-site this upcoming season.



WOMEN'S SPORTS

- ACCN is committed to women's sports delivering expansive coverage of field hockey, women's soccer and volleyball throughout the fall, women's basketball throughout the fall and winter, and softball and women's lacrosse throughout the spring. Additionally, cross country, swimming and diving, tennis and golf enjoy championship coverage on the network.
- ACC Field hockey saw its first-ever linear broadcast of the sport during the 2019 season – exclusively on ACCN. It is regularly featured each week throughout the regular season on ACCN, along with all three rounds of the ACC Field Hockey Championship.
- The ACC's women's sports programs are regularly featured every day on *Packer and Durham* and *All ACC*. Thursday nights throughout conference basketball season is "ladies night" featuring halftime and between-game coverage of an ACC women's basketball doubleheader as well as a full recap of the day's action on *All ACC* following the second game.
- Post COVID, ACCN will continue looking at ways to deliver a schedule that provides achieves gender equity. Despite the challenges of 2020-21 season, ACCN saw increases in linear exposure for women's basketball (64 vs. 60 games), field hockey (19 vs. 13 games), and women's lacrosse (28 vs. planned 18 games). When looking at both ACCN and ACCNX, women's events enjoy 17 percent more coverage than men's.

OLYMPIC SPORTS

- ACC Network delivers the most national linear coverage for the league's Olympic sport programs (field hockey, m/w soccer, wrestling, m/w lacrosse, softball and baseball). ACCN provides live championship coverage for field hockey, m/w soccer, wrestling, softball and baseball.
- ACC wrestling enjoys a dedicated night of programming – *Friday Night Duals* – highlighted by five straight weeks of conference matches and the finals of the ACC Wrestling Championship exclusively on ACCN. 2020 marked the first time the ACC Wrestling Championship was featured on a linear network.

PACKER AND DURHAM/STUDIO SHOWS


- Each weekday morning from 7-10 a.m., *Packer and Durham* delivers news and commentary from around the ACC's 15 institutions.
- Packer and Durham* is a tremendous service to ACC fans of all sports. Nearly every ACC sport program has been featured on *Packer and Durham* since the show debuted. Upon the network

launching, *Packer and Durham* was onsite for key ACC events, including the first ACC football and basketball games on ACCN, basketball media days, the ACC Football Championship Game and the ACC men's and women's basketball tournaments. Post-COVID, the goal is for *Packer and Durham* to be on-site as storytelling and content priorities dictate.

- Despite challenges surrounding the COVID-19 pandemic, in September, 2020 ACCN debuted a new studio program *In Play* with Kelsey Riggs and EJ Manuel. *In Play* features interviews with legendary ACC athletes and coaches and discussion surrounding timely topics, big-picture events and pop culture. Guests have included Super Bowl Champions, NFL Hall of Famers, Heisman Trophy winners, NBA Champions, WNBA Champions, Olympic and World Cup Champions, Rhodes Scholars and The Bachelor. *In Play* will move to Friday's beginning in fall 2021.
- Along with *Packer and Durham* and *In Play*, ACCN's exclusive studio show lineup includes *All ACC*, *The Huddle*, *Nothing But Net* and *Bald Men on Campus*, which features *ESPN College GameDay*'s LaPhonso Ellis, Seth Greenberg and Jay Bilas. Muffet McGraw was added this year as a basketball analyst across ACCN's basketball studio shows.

TECHNOLOGY

- Select ACC men's and women's soccer telecasts on ACCN feature ESPN's exclusive "Keeper Cam" goal post camera system currently used on ESPN's Major League Soccer productions. The ACC is the first and only collegiate conference to deploy the camera system. "Keeper Cams" were not used during the 2019-20 season due to COVID and manufacturing issues with the vendor. ACCN is investigating the return of these cameras for the 2021-22.
- ACCN has utilized the Omnicam aerial camera during the network's inaugural football season. ACCN was also the first to use it during men's basketball games during the 2019-20 season. With schools producing football for the network in 2020, the Omnicam camera was not utilized.
- New York Life and GEICO are founding partners of ACCN. New York Life remains the official life insurance company of the ACC and continues as the exclusive title sponsor of the ACC Men's Basketball Tournament which airs across ESPN and ACCN.
- In addition to the two founding sponsors, New York Life and GEICO, the ACC and ACCN also have official sponsorships with Bojangles', Food Lion and Gatorade.

NCAA POSTGRADUATE SCHOLARSHIPS

The NCAA awards up to 126 postgraduate scholarships annually. The scholarships are awarded to student-athletes who excel academically and athletically and who are at least in their final year of intercollegiate athletics competition.

The one-time non-renewable scholarships of \$10,000 are awarded three times a year corresponding to each sport season (fall, winter and spring). Each sports season there are 21 scholarships available for men and 21 scholarships available for women for use in an accredited graduate program.

All former student-athletes who earned an undergraduate degree from an NCAA member school are eligible to be nominated by that school for an NCAA graduate degree scholarship, regardless of when they received their undergraduate degree.

The Atlantic Coast Conference announced the 2020-21 Academic Honor Roll on July 18, recognizing a record 5,791 student-athletes for classroom excellence during the most recent academic year.

The ACC Academic Honor Roll is comprised of student-athletes who participated in a varsity-level sport and registered a grade point average of 3.0 or better for the full academic year. The 5,791 recognized this year bettered the previous league mark of 5,611 set in 2019-20.

Duke led all schools with a record 615 student-athletes recognized, and Notre Dame placed 593 on the list. Virginia saw 493 student-athletes achieve Honor Roll status, followed by North

Carolina with 463, Boston College with 451 and NC State with 411.

Nine student-athletes made the ACC Honor Roll for the sixth time – Boston College's Paige Duca (track & field), Duke's Turner Uppgren (lacrosse), Florida State's Chase Haney (baseball), Georgia Tech's Bria Matthews (track & field), Louisville's Christian Buckley (track & field) and Halee Hudson (track & field), NC State's Dylan Autenrieth (football), Notre Dame's Jared Miller (baseball) and Syracuse's Simon Smith (track & field).

All 15 schools had at least one student-athlete who earned honor roll status for a fifth time.

POINTS OF PRIDE



ATLANTIC COAST CONFERENCE

- The Atlantic Coast Conference was founded on May 8, 1953, at the Sedgefield Inn near Greensboro, North Carolina, with seven charter members — Clemson, Duke, Maryland, North Carolina, NC State, South Carolina and Wake Forest — drawing up the conference bylaws. On December 4, 1953, conference officials met again at Sedgefield and officially admitted Virginia as the league's eighth member. The first withdrawal of a school from the ACC came on June 30, 1971, when South Carolina tendered its resignation. The ACC operated with seven members until April 3, 1978, when Georgia Tech was admitted. The ACC expanded to nine members on July 1, 1991, with the addition of Florida State. The conference expanded to 11 members on July 1, 2004, with the addition of Miami and Virginia Tech. On October 17, 2003, Boston College accepted an invitation to become the league's 12th member starting July 1, 2005.
- The ACC added its 13th and 14th members on September 18, 2011, when Pittsburgh and Syracuse accepted invitations to join the conference. The two schools officially joined the ACC on July 1, 2013. Notre Dame also officially joined the ACC on July 1, 2013, after announcing on September 12, 2012, its intention to enter the league for competition in all sports but football, bringing the membership of the conference to 15. The Fighting Irish play five football games with ACC schools each year. On July 1, 2014, Louisville entered the ACC on the same day Maryland withdrew, keeping the conference's membership at 15 institutions.
- Since the league's inception in 1953, ACC schools have captured 161 national championships, including 80 in women's competition, 79 in men's competition and two in fencing. In addition, NCAA individual titles have gone to ACC student-athletes 186 times in men's competition and 141 times in women's action.
- The league's unique blend of public and private institutions continues to lead the way among Autonomy 5 conferences in the "Best Colleges" rankings released by US News & World Report. The ACC was the only FBS conference to place six of its members institutions among the top 20 and seven member schools among the top 40. With an average rank of 54.7, the ACC led all FBS conferences for the 13th consecutive year.
- In the NCAA's Graduation Success Rate report released last November, the ACC's graduation rate of 92 percent ranked three points higher than the national average and led all Autonomy 5 conferences. Eighteen ACC teams achieved GSR scores of 100 in the sports of men's basketball, women's basketball and baseball.
- Some of the most influential people in history have been awarded the prestigious Rhodes Scholarship to pursue post-graduate education at the University of Oxford in England. The oldest international fellowships have been earned by a few extraordinary ACC student-athletes. Some of the names on this list include Florida State football student-athlete Myron Rolle, Duke tennis student-athlete Julia Parker Goyer, Florida State track and field student-athlete Garrett Johnson and Notre Dame fencing student-athlete Alex Coccia.
- The ACC Academic Consortium is a special commitment of the 15 university presidents and the conference office to enhance academic excellence. Originally funded by a portion of the revenues from the ACC Football Championship Game, the ACCAC works to advance the quality of education for all undergraduate students by sharing academic and administrative resources and by hosting conferences that bring together experts from all our campuses.
- ACC Postgraduate Scholarships: The Weaver-James-Corrigan-Swofford and Jim and Pat Thacker scholarships are awarded to selected student-athletes who intend to pursue a graduate degree following completion of his or her undergraduate requirements. Each recipient receives \$6,000 to contribute to their graduate education. Each recipient has performed with distinction in both the classroom and in his/her respective sport, while also demonstrating exemplary conduct in the community. In addition, three student-athletes who intend to compete at the Olympic or professional level receive Weaver-James-Corrigan-Swofford Honorary Awards in recognition of their outstanding performance in both athletic competition and the classroom throughout their collegiate careers.
- The ACC has won seven national championships in football, men's basketball, women's basketball and baseball since 2015. The ACC is the only conference to win each of those four titles over that stretch.
- The ACC's seven national titles in those sports have come from six different programs – Virginia men's basketball (2019), Clemson football (2018, 2016), Notre Dame women's basketball (2018), North Carolina men's basketball (2017), Duke men's basketball (2015), Virginia baseball (2015).
- The ACC has won three of the last eight football national titles (ties for most of any conference) and three of the last six men's basketball national championships since 2015:
 - Football – Clemson 2018 & 2016, Florida State 2013
 - Men's Basketball – Virginia 2019, North Carolina 2017, Duke 2015
- Six ACC schools ranked among the top 25 of the final Division I Learfield IMG College Directors' Cup standings. North Carolina finished fourth with 1,126.25 points – just .25 out of third place. Virginia (11th), Notre Dame (14th), Florida State (16th), Duke (21st) and NC State (23rd) completed the ACC's top-25 contingent. Three schools among the ACC's top 25 – North Carolina (field hockey), Virginia (women's swimming & diving and men's lacrosse) and Notre Dame (fencing) – were buoyed by at least one NCAA championship during the 2020-21 academic year. Boston College added a fifth ACC national championship in women's lacrosse, and ACC student-athletes claimed 20 individual NCAA titles. Ten ACC schools finished among the final top 50, with Virginia Tech placing 32nd, followed by Clemson (36th), Louisville (40th) and Georgia Tech (44th). Wake Forest (54th), Miami (62nd), Syracuse (64th), Pitt (73rd) and Boston College (74th) followed, placing all 15 ACC member institutions among the top 75.
- The 2019-20 Division I Learfield IMG College Directors' Cup competition was canceled due to the COVID-19 pandemic, but the ACC led all conferences with four schools among the top 10 in the standings released at the end of the fall season. The ACC's nine member schools among the top 25 and 13 schools among the top 50 were also the most of any conference.



- Boston College, founded in 1863 by the Society of Jesus, was the first institution of higher education based in the city of Boston. Today it ranks among the nation's foremost private universities with a coeducational enrollment of 14,500 undergraduate and graduate students drawn from all 50 states and more than 100 countries.
- The core of Boston College's Jesuit, Catholic mission is a commitment to integrating intellectual, personal, ethical, and religious formation and uniting high academic achievement with service to others.
- Students at Boston College consistently win prestigious national awards for academic achievement, including Rhodes, Marshall, Churchill, Goldwater, Mellon, Truman, Beinecke, and Beckman scholarships. Boston College is annually among the top schools nationally in producing undergraduate Fulbright winners, with over 150 during the past decade.
- More than 5,000 Boston College students provide some 550,000 hours of community service in the Boston area each year, and approximately 850 participate in service and immersion trips during the academic year.
- Boston College is ranked 35th among national universities by *U.S. News and World Report*, and is home to highly ranked professional schools in Education, Law, Management, Nursing and Social Work.
- The School of Theology & Ministry, created when Weston Jesuit School of Theology re-affiliated with Boston College in 2008, is one of the world's top centers for Catholic theological education.
- Boston College is home to a rich array of academic and cultural resources: the McMullen Museum of Art is renowned for its groundbreaking exhibitions; the Burns Library is internationally recognized for the strength of its collections in several areas, including Irish Studies, Jesuit Studies, and the history and politics of Boston; the Bapst Library has been recognized as one of the most the beautiful college libraries in the country.
- The Lynch School of Education is a leader in initiatives that enhance teaching and learning in public and Catholic K-12 schools and conducts two prominent research assessments of student achievement: TIMSS, which surveys math and science, and PIRLS, which surveys reading literacy. In collaboration with the Morrissey College of Arts and Sciences, the Lynch School has been a partner in the Carnegie Corporation's interdisciplinary Teachers for a New Era initiative, preparing, assessing, and supporting the teachers of tomorrow.
- The Center for Retirement Research and the Center on Aging and Work are nationally known for their research on issues facing older Americans.
- Construction continued this past year on a new science building intended to anchor the recently-launched Schiller Institute for Integrated Science and Society. The Institute will expand interdisciplinary collaborations to address global problems in energy, health, and the environment.
- The Boston College athletics program shares the University's commitment to the development of the whole person—body as well as mind and spirit. BC sponsors 31 varsity sports with approximately 700 student-athletes, and offers 53 intramural and 27 club teams involving approximately 5,000 students.
- Twelve Boston College varsity teams achieved perfect Graduation Success Rate (GSR) scores of 100 in the NCAA's most recently released public data.
- Summer 2018 marked the opening of the Fish Field House, an indoor practice facility for football and other varsity sports. The facility features a full regulation field with an AstroTurf playing surface, and a 12,000 square-foot strength and conditioning center. In spring 2019, the Harrington Athletics Village was dedicated, providing baseball and softball teams with state-of-the-art, all-season stadiums built to host both ACC and NCAA Championship games. The Village includes the Pete Frates Center containing a 31,000-square foot indoor baseball and softball facility with locker rooms, hitting tunnels, indoor turf field, strength and conditioning space, and a hospitality area. In summer 2019, the Margot Connell Recreation Center opened, offering numerous fitness programs to students and staff.
- Men's ice hockey has won NCAA national championships in 1949, 2000, 2008, 2010, and 2012. Schiller Family Head Hockey Coach Jerry York was inducted into the Hockey Hall of Fame in fall 2019, becoming only the fifth NCAA coach to earn this honor. Women's ice hockey has appeared in the NCAA Frozen Four three of the last six years and six of the last ten. For the 2017-18 season, women's hockey player Daryl Watts was named the Patty Kazmaier Memorial Award winner as the nation's top D1 women's player, becoming the first underclassman to take home the honor. Field hockey advanced to the NCAA Final Four in fall 2019. Women's lacrosse played in the last four NCAA championship finals, winning the trophy this past spring. In 2018, junior Sam Apuzzo became the first Boston College women's lacrosse player to win the Tewaaraton Award, given annually to the top female and male lacrosse players in the country. This past spring, Charlotte North won the Tewaaraton, capping a season in which she set the all-time NCAA Women's Lacrosse record for goals with 102.



Clemson University is a land-grant institution founded in 1889 and named for Thomas Green Clemson, a champion of formal scientific education and economic development who served as ambassador to Belgium and became the nation's first secretary of agriculture. Thomas Clemson inherited Fort Hill Plantation, and upon his death in 1888, he willed Fort Hill and his personal assets to the state of South Carolina for the establishment of a high seminary of learning dedicated to scientific education. Clemson has a proud history of military excellence and recently dedicated a Scroll of Honor memorial recognizing nearly 500 Clemson men and women who have lost their lives in service to their country. The University is organized into seven colleges: Agriculture, Forestry, and Life Sciences; Architecture, Arts, and Humanities; Wilbur O. and Ann Powers College of Business; Science; Engineering, Computing, and Applied Sciences; Behavioral, Social, and Health Sciences; and Education.

- *U.S. News & World Report* ranks Clemson 29th among the nation's public universities for 2021.
- According to *U.S. News and World Report*, 57% of entering freshmen were ranked in the top 10% of their high school classes, and the freshman class scored in the top 20% nationally on the critical reading and math sections of the SAT. Freshmen who took the ACT scored in the top 15% nationally.
- Clemson is the top value university in South Carolina according to *bestvalueschools.com* and home to approximately 26,000 students, with a freshmen retention rate of 93% and a six-year graduation rate of 83%. Clemson's retention and graduation rates rank among the highest in the country for public universities. We were named among the Best Public College Values by *Kiplinger* magazine in 2019, and *The Princeton Review* named us among the Best Value Colleges" for 2021.
- Clemson is student centered, with a 16:1 student-to-teacher ratio. More than half of Clemson's courses have fewer than 20 students. *U.S. News & World Report* has ranked Clemson among its Most Innovative Schools, Schools with Great Internships/Co-Ops, Best Undergraduate Teaching and Colleges with Great First-Year Experiences for 2021.
- *The 2021 Princeton Review* ranks Clemson first nationally among colleges where Town-Gown Relations are Great, fourth among colleges where Students Pack the Stadiums, and 11th nationally for having the Happiest Students.
- *The 2021 Princeton Review* ranks Clemson third in the Top 20 Best Schools for Internships (Public Schools) and third nationally for Best Career Services. Clemson also ranks fifth for Their Students Love These Colleges and 17th for Best Quality of Life.
- *U.S. News & World Report* ranks Clemson second among national public universities for percentage of alumni who give back to their alma mater, and *The Princeton Review* ranks Clemson 10th in the Top 20 Best Alumni Networks (Public Schools).
- Clemson prides itself in being "Solid Orange" with strong alumni support for both academics and athletics. Clemson's IPTAY program has over 17,000 donors and is a national model for athletic fundraising.
- Approximately 500 student-athletes participate as Clemson Tigers in 19 intercollegiate sports. Beginning in 2022-2023, Clemson will participate in 21 intercollegiate sports. A charter member of the Atlantic Coast Conference, Clemson has won 133 conference championships since the ACC was established in 1953.
- Clemson is home to the 2016 and 2018 NCAA National Football Champions and has claimed team national championships in football (1981, 2016, 2018), men's soccer (1984, 1987), and men's golf (2003).
- Clemson is the original home of the "Tiger Paw" symbol for athletic teams. Clemson has strong athletic traditions including the football team's famous pre-game entrance into Death Valley, which has been described by a national sports broadcaster as "the most exciting 25 seconds in college football."



- Duke University traces its roots back to 1838, when Brown's Schoolhouse was founded in Randolph County, NC and eventually transformed into Trinity College, which moved to Durham in 1892. In 1924, businessman and philanthropist James B. Duke made a \$40 million gift to transform the small liberal arts college into what has become the youngest major private research university in the country.
- Duke includes 10 schools and colleges – in arts and sciences, engineering, divinity, nursing, medicine, the environment, business, public policy, law and a graduate school – as well as Duke Kunshan University in China and the Duke-National University of Singapore Medical School. Duke enrolls students from all 50 states and more than 160 countries, and has people, programs and partnerships around the world.
- Duke has more than 6,500 undergraduate students and 9,000 graduate students. More than 50,000 candidates applied for the 1,700 spaces in the entering undergraduate class of 2025. There are more than 179,000 Duke alumni around the world.
- Duke has been ranked among the top 12 universities in the country by *U.S. News and World Report* for more than three decades, and among the leading research universities in the world by THES and QS. Duke's graduate and professional schools, and many academic programs and departments are among the top in their fields.
- Duke is committed to affordability and access for all students with more than 50% of undergraduate students receiving some form of financial assistance. As one of the few colleges in the U.S. that admits students based solely on their academic performance and not on the applicant's financial status or ability to pay for college, and commits to providing 100 percent of a student's demonstrated financial need for all four years of the student's undergraduate education, Duke invests more than \$180 million each year in financial aid.
- Duke students and alumni have been awarded merit scholarships including the Rhodes, Marshall and Truman. There are more than 50 Rhodes Scholars among Duke graduates.
- Duke's athletic programs have earned 17 national championship titles, including seven in women's golf (most recently in 2019), five in men's basketball, three in men's lacrosse, one in women's tennis and one in men's soccer. Duke has placed among the top 25 of the Learfield IMG Directors' Cup Standings, released by the National Association of Collegiate Directors of Athletics, in 15 of the past 17 years the cup has been awarded, including a ninth-place finish in 2019.
- Duke has led the ACC in Academic Honor Roll selections in 33 of the past 34 years (includes this year – confirmed with Tracey Haith).
- Duke finished the 2020-21 academic year with ACC championships in seven different sports, which led all conference institutions and tied a school record. The Blue Devils claimed conference titles in baseball, softball, women's outdoor track and field, men's and women's fencing, women's golf and men's lacrosse. The titles for softball, women's outdoor track and field and women's fencing were each the first for those respective programs.
- Nina King was tapped to succeed Kevin White as Duke's next Vice President and Director of Athletics when White retires on September 1. King will become just the third Black female director of athletics among Power 5 institutions.
- In the most recent data released by the NCAA, Duke boasts a 98 percent Graduation Success Rate. In addition, 10 Blue Devil teams were ranked in the top 10 percent of their respective sports in the most recent Academic Performance Rate (APR) Report.
- Two Nobel Prizes have been awarded to Duke faculty members: in 2012, Professor of Medicine Robert Lefkowitz shared the Nobel Prize in Chemistry for his work on a class of cell receptors that have become the target of prescription drugs, including antihistamines, ulcer drugs and beta blockers to relieve hypertension, angina and coronary disease. And in 2015, Professor of Biochemistry Paul Modrich also shared the Nobel prize in Chemistry for discovering how mistakes in the DNA code are repaired.
- In fiscal year 2019, Duke University spent \$1.226 billion on research, ranking it tenth in the country. The rankings place Duke as the ninth largest recipient of federal research support, having risen from 13th place in 2010. Duke is the fourth-largest for life sciences research, with \$1.02 billion in expenditures, and the fourth-largest private institution on the list.
- The Duke Marine Laboratory, at coastal Beaufort, N.C., is a campus of Duke University and a unit within the Nicholas School of the Environment. Its mission is education and research in basic ocean processes, coastal environment management, marine biotechnology and marine biomedicine. It is also the home of the research centers in biological and physical oceanography, marine biology and conservation, marine environmental health, marine biotechnology, and marine policy and management.
- Duke Health combines research, clinical care and education at sites throughout the region and beyond. Duke Hospital is the flagship of the Duke University Health System, which includes two community hospitals (Duke Hospital and Duke Raleigh Hospital), affiliations with other hospitals in the region, community-based primary care physician practices, home care, infusion services, speciality practices, and hospice care.
- Duke is the second-largest private employer in North Carolina, with more than 40,000 employees.
- With more than seven million volumes, the Duke University Library System is one of the 10 largest private library systems in the U.S.
- Duke is the home of the Full Frame Documentary Film Festival, the only Oscar-qualifying film festival based at a university. Each year, more than 20,000 documentary producers, directors and fans come to Durham for four days of screenings and workshops.



- Florida State University has risen faster in the *U.S. News & World Report* rankings than any other Top 50 public university in the past five years – 24 spots. For the second consecutive year, FSU maintained its Top 20 ranking among national public universities.
- More than 30 graduate programs ranked in the Top 25 in *U.S. News & World Report*'s 2022 edition of "Best Graduate Schools."
- FSU is among the most in-demand universities in the nation for prospective students, receiving a record-breaking number of undergraduate applications for admission for the third consecutive year. In 2021, more than 62,500 students from 39 different countries applied for undergraduate admission.
- FSU's four-year graduation rate is among the top 10 in the country and the highest in Florida at 74 percent. FSU's six-year graduation rate rose to a record 84 percent, also among the highest in the nation.
- The university's freshman retention rate of 95 percent ranks among the Top 15 in the country.
- FSU has tremendous depth with more than 275 degree programs and broad excellence across the sciences, arts, social sciences and globalization, emphasizing critical thinking and experiential learning.
- FSU recently became the largest university in the country to have an experiential learning graduation requirement for its undergraduates. Before graduating, students will engage in at least one transformational, career-building internship, undergraduate research experience, international study, service-learning, or other engaged-learning program.
- FSU earned the highest credit rating of any public university in the state of Florida and became one of only eight public universities in the United States with an AA+ rating or better from both S&P Global and Fitch.
- Florida State is one of the nation's top research institutions for producing Fulbright U.S. Scholars and students. A school-record nine FSU faculty scholars earned Fulbright grants for 2020-2021. FSU is also a top research institution for producing student Fulbright Scholars with nine students receiving awards in 2020-2021.
- FSU researchers received record funding in Fiscal Year 2020, bringing in \$250.1 million in grants from federal, state and private sources.
- FSU launched the Institute of Politics at Florida State University in 2020, a nonpartisan, world-class home for civic engagement and research, housed within the College of Social Sciences and Public Policy.
- Florida State is one of the top universities in the nation with the most recipients of doctoral degrees in the humanities and the arts.
- The FSU College of Motion Picture Arts ranks among the nation's Top 20 film schools according to *The Hollywood Reporter*, and is among the nation's Top 50 Film Schools according to *The Wrap News*.
- The College of Music – home to two Grammy Award winners and a Pulitzer Prize-winning composer – is the third-largest music program in higher education. The college is highly rated among public universities, and its opera program ranks third in the United States, according to *U.S. News & World Report*.
- The College of Medicine is among the Top 3 in the nation for instruction in community health, *Association of American Medical Colleges*, 2020, and is the nation's most selective medical school for admissions, (2019 and 2020), based on *U.S. News & World Report* rankings.
- Florida State University has been recognized by *INSIGHT Into Diversity* magazine as one of 15 *Diversity Champion* colleges and universities in the nation and has earned the "Higher Education Excellence in Diversity" (HEED) Award seven years in a row!
- The only facility of its kind in the United States, the National High Magnetic Field Laboratory at Florida State is the largest and highest-powered magnet laboratory in the world. The magnet lab holds the most world records for the most powerful magnets on Earth.
- Florida State provides countless opportunities for students to be involved in service learning, civic education and leadership. With more than 750 registered student organizations, as well as Service Scholars and Garnet and Gold Scholars, the university is a leader of programs focused on community development and values education.
- Since they began fielding intercollegiate athletic teams in 1946, the Seminoles have won 17 national championships in nine sports, including the 2014 and 2018 NCAA Soccer Championship and the 2018 NCAA Softball Championship. The Seminole football program won its third national title in 2013.
- FSU has captured four team national championships in the last eight years. Of the school's 17 national titles, six have come since 2006.
- In 2020-21, FSU played for the national championship in soccer and softball and had two student-athletes named national player of the year.
- Since joining the ACC in 1992, the Seminoles have won 92 ACC team championships in 14 different sports. Thirty-two of those titles have come in the past eight seasons.
- Since 2010, Seminole teams have qualified for NCAA postseason play in 212 of 224 opportunities. Over the last five years, 83 of 88 teams have qualified for NCAA postseason play.
- In the last 11 years FSU athletics have placed in the top 10 of the Learfield IMG College Athletic Director's Cup standings five times and in the top five three times. Over the last 14 years, FSU has finished in the top 15 every year except one. FSU has now finished as the ACC's top ranked overall athletics program two straight years and three times this decade. *In 2019-20 no final standings were released.



- The Georgia Institute of Technology, also known as Georgia Tech, is a top-ranked public college and one of the leading research universities in the United States. Georgia Tech provides a technologically focused education to more than 39,000 undergraduate and graduate students in six colleges and 29 schools focusing on business, computing, design, engineering, liberal arts, and sciences.
- The Institute is a national and international leader in research, and one of the South's largest industrial and engineering research engines. In 2020, research, economic development, and other sponsored activities at Georgia Tech topped \$1.06 billion, allowing the Institute to take on complex and significant challenges involving multiple disciplines and bringing together teams of researchers with a broad range of specialized expertise. Georgia Tech plays a leading role in the Georgia Research Alliance, a centerpiece of the state's economic development strategy, and has an estimated \$3.9 billion annual impact across the metro Atlanta economy, according to the latest study commissioned by the University System of Georgia released in 2020.
- A four-year institution, Georgia Tech is consistently the only technological university ranked in *U.S. News & World Report's* listing of America's top 10 public universities. In addition, Georgia Tech's College of Engineering is consistently ranked in the nation's top five public engineering programs by *U.S. News*.
- The Institute is consistently rated among the top universities in the nation for graduation of underrepresented minorities in engineering, physical sciences, and architecture and planning. According to Diverse: Issues in Higher Education and the American Society of Engineering Education, Georgia Tech is the largest producer of engineering degrees for underrepresented minorities and minority women in the nation. Georgia Tech is the largest producer of engineering degrees for women according to 2019 IPEDS data.
- Georgia Tech is ranked No. 8 in Top Public Universities. (Source: *U.S. News & World Report*)
- Georgia Tech is ranked No. 4 in Best Undergraduate Engineering Programs. All of our graduate engineering programs rank in the top 10. (Source: *U.S. News & World Report*)
- Scheller College of Business ranks No. 27 in Undergraduate Business Programs (Source: *U.S. News & World Report*). Scheller is also ranked No. 4 in the U.S. and No. 15 in the world on the Corporate Knights Better World MBA Ranking list.
- Computer Science ranks No. 13 by the Times Higher Education World University Rankings, No. 8 by the *U.S. News & World Report's* Graduate Program Rankings, and No. 38 in The Guardian's QS World University Rankings.
- In the category of Architecture and the Built Environment, Georgia Tech ranks No. 23 in The Guardian's QS World University Rankings, and our graduate urban planning program is ranked No. 10 in the U.S. by Planetizen.
- Our Living Learning Communities are ranked No. 24 by *U.S. News and World Report*.
- Georgia Tech is one of the South's largest industrial and engineering research agencies.
- Teams of faculty, students, and researchers throughout our six colleges, 11 interdisciplinary research institutes, the Georgia Tech Research Institute (GTRI), and hundreds of research labs and centers are pushing the boundaries of science and technology every day. With a "get it done attitude," we've broken down the barriers between research units to provide federal agencies, companies, state agencies, private organizations and others with the results they need from research investments.
- U.S. News and World Report* ranks us at No. 11 for Undergraduate Research/Creative Projects, and No. 19 for Senior Capstone Projects.
- With more than 60 chartered student organizations exploring religious, racial, sexual, and ethnic identity (but open to all), our students find a way to celebrate, strengthen, and share their part of the robust cultural melting pot that thrives in our community.
- Georgia Tech is ranked No. 4 in Most Innovative Schools by *U.S. News & World Report*.
- The Advanced Technology Development Center (ATDC) has been recognized by Forbes magazine as one of 12 incubators "changing the world." Founded in 1980, ATDC is the oldest technology incubator in the U.S. with nearly \$3 billion raised by over 190 graduate companies.
- Georgia Tech Research Corporation is No. 48 on the list of Top 100 Worldwide Universities Granted U.S. Utility Patents 2019.
- PayScale.com ranks Tech as No. 1 in Georgia and No. 14 among all U.S. colleges for providing the best 20-Year Return on Investment.
- Ranked No. 4 by WalletHub for the Highest Return on Educational Investment.
- Our co-op and internship programs are ranked No. 3 by *U.S. News and World Report*.
- Georgia Tech was ranked No. 1 among public schools on the 2021 Top 20 Best Career Placement list by The Princeton Review thanks largely to the Center for Career Discovery and Development, which is one of the nation's most successful and innovative university career support offices for its recruitment and job placement.
- In the 2019-2020 academic year, 81 percent of graduating undergraduate students had been offered a job, and the median starting salary was \$75,000 (not including bonus offers).
- More than 700 businesses, industries, and organizations throughout the U.S. and abroad employ Georgia Tech co-op students and interns each year.
- Georgia Tech's beautiful 400-acre, tree-lined campus is located in the heart of Atlanta, Georgia.
- The Yellow Jackets have won five national championships during their illustrious athletics history (four in football – 1917, 1929, 1952, and 1990; one in women's tennis – 2007), appeared in two Final Fours in men's basketball (1990, 2004) and three College World Series in baseball (1994, 2002, 2006).
- During the 2020-21 academic year, 11 of Georgia Tech's 17 sports programs qualified for NCAA postseason play, which were the most Tech teams to earn NCAA postseason berths in 11 years. Each of those 11 teams – baseball, men's basketball, women's basketball, women's cross country, golf, men's swimming and diving, men's swimming and diving, men's tennis, women's tennis, women's indoor track and field, women's outdoor track and field and volleyball – finished ranked among the top 50 nationally in their respective sports. Leading the way, women's basketball, golf and women's tennis all reached the final 16 in their respective NCAA Championships, while men's basketball won the ACC Championship for first time since 1993.
- Georgia Tech student-athletes excel in the classroom as well as the competitive arena. In the latest data released by the NCAA in 2020, 14 of Georgia Tech's 15 athletics programs have a multiyear NCAA Academic Progress Rate (APR) higher than the national average in their respective sports, which comes on the heels of Tech being the only institution from a Power Five conference (ACC, Big Ten, Big 12, Pac-12, Southeastern Conference) with an APR higher than the national average in every sport in 2019. Leading the way is the Yellow Jackets' golf team, which has posted a perfect 1,000 score every year since the NCAA APR program was introduced in 2003-2004. Tech student-athletes posted an all-time best 3.28 mean grade point average during the 2020 spring semester.



- Established in 1798, the University of Louisville is Kentucky's premier, nationally recognized metropolitan research university.
- With a student body of over 22,000 and faculty and staff of nearly 7,000, UofL offers more than 250 areas of study.
- UofL is ranked among the top 12 "Best Neighbor" schools in the nation and, based on its outreach and partnerships, also ranks as a Carnegie Community Engagement university, one of fewer than 200 such institutions nationwide.
- Dr. Neeli Bendapudi was named UofL's 18th president in April of 2018. She is the institution's first female president and the first person of color to hold the position.
- Since 2003, UofL scholars have earned 150 prestigious Fulbright Scholarships, more than all other Kentucky public institutions combined.
- UofL's most famous landmark is a large original bronze casting of Rodin's "The Thinker," which stands in front of Grawemeyer Hall. The statue, given to the City of Louisville to recognize its namesake, French monarch Louis XVI, has been in place at UofL since 1949.
- UofL is a long-time leader in medical breakthroughs, including helping a paralyzed man stand unaided six years after a spinal cord injury, as well as revolutionizing the treatment of heart disease and cancer. In 2018, the university and its partner, the Jewish Hospital Trager Transplant Center, marked their 500th heart transplant.
- With a \$5 million gift from the Owsley Brown II Family Foundation, the university established the Christina Lee Brown Envirome Institute, the first known research center in the nation examining the link between health and environmental effects.
- The UofL James Graham Brown Cancer Center was the first in the interior of the United States to provide the cancer immunotherapy drug Keytruda in both research and FDA-approved forms.
- The Brown Cancer Center continues to be among the first to offer cancer immunotherapy drugs that activate the patient's own immune system to fight cancer.
- The Signature Partnership Initiative at the University of Louisville was begun in 2007 to increase the educational attainment and improve the quality of life for those living in Louisville's poorest areas. Since then, the university community has recorded more than 21,000 instances of community engagement and 250,000 hours of community service as part of the program.
- The Additive Manufacturing Institute of Science and Technology at UofL trains engineers and other professionals from around the world on sophisticated 3D printing and other additive manufacturing machinery.
- The University of Louisville sponsors 23 varsity athletic programs, 10 for men and 13 for women. The Cardinals have won two NCAA team championships (men's basketball in 1980, 1986) and 20 NCAA individual titles (six in men's swimming, four in men's track and field, seven in women's swimming, and three in women's track and field).
- Louisville ranked 23rd in the nation in the 2020-21 Learfield IMG College Director's Cup Division I national all-sports standings through the winter sports season. Men's swimming and diving matched its highest-ever finish, ranking fifth in the NCAA Championship with an individual and relay national title, while women's swimming and diving finished 13th. Women's track & field captured its third NCAA National Individual Champion in school history as Makenli Forrest won the NCAA indoor weight throw national title. Louisville field hockey reached the program's first Final Four, women's basketball advanced to the NCAA Elite Eight, and volleyball reached the NCAA Sweet 16. Men's golf tied for ninth in the NCAA Championship, its best finish in school history.
- Cardinal Athletic teams achieved an impressive 3.256 combined grade point average for the 2020-21 academic year, including a 3.289 GPA for the 2021 Spring semester. Twenty of 23 sports programs were above a 3.0 collective GPA for the 2021 Spring semester. A total of 360 student-athletes were 2020 Red and Black Scholars, representing a cumulative GPA of 3.25 or better.
- Five Louisville athletic teams - men's and women's basketball, women's cross country, women's golf and volleyball - received public recognition through the NCAA Academic Performance Program for ranking in the top 10 percent in the 2015-19 most recent multiyear Academic Progress Rate scores, which measures academic eligibility, retention, and graduation for student-athletes. Fourteen UofL programs produced perfect APR scores for the most recent single-year figures. UofL student-athletes achieved a record 91 percent graduation rate in the most recent Graduation Success Rate report.
- UofL Athletics finished second in the nation in the 2021 NCAA Team Works Service Challenge. In the competition which ran from Jan. 15-April 1, Cardinal student-athletes totaled 1,405 hours of service and had 94 percent participation in service opportunities during the time period. The Cardinals have ranked in the top 10 nationally in service hours for all seven years of the competition, including winning the service award twice.
- Louisville's all-girl cheerleading team won its seventh consecutive and 17th overall National Cheer Association championship and its small co-ed team won its 11th national title. Cardinal spirit groups also finished among the top four in the nation in large co-ed (third), group stunt (fourth), Ladybirds dance team (second) and Ladybirds dance team hip hop competition (second).
- The KFC Yum! Center basketball arena, Cardinal Stadium for football, and Mark and Cindy Lynn Stadium for soccer are among Louisville's state-of-the-art facilities. Since 2010, UofL has also built a rowing center, expanded its football, baseball and softball stadiums, and purchased the University of Louisville Golf Club. UofL opened its \$14.5 million student-athlete academic center in 2016 and \$8 million broadcast center in 2018.



- The University of Miami is the youngest institution in the ACC. Although founded in 1925, UM did not start classes until October 1926 in a partially constructed hotel after a hurricane had devastated other opening facilities. This auspicious start not only provided the name for the Miami Hurricanes, but also provided a foundation for a fast-growing citizen-founded university, which has had only six presidents during its entire existence.
- The University of Miami awarded the first athletic scholarship to a female student-athlete.
- UM is among the first institutions, if not the first, to adopt an athletics logo as its school-wide symbol, the U.
- The Miller School of Medicine, founded in 1952, was the first medical school in Florida.
- Bascom Palmer Eye Institute of the UHealth-University of Miami Health System has been ranked No. 1 in ophthalmology for the 18th consecutive year—20th time overall—in *U.S. News & World Report's* 2021-22 "Best Hospitals" rankings.
- Sylvester Comprehensive Cancer Center, part of the University of Miami Leonard M. Miller School of Medicine, received the prestigious NCI designation from the National Cancer Institute. Sylvester is one of only two NCI-designated cancer centers in Florida and one of just 71 across the nation.
- The University of Miami implemented a comprehensive plan to support racial equality, inclusion, and justice. Initiatives of the plan include creating an Office for Faculty Inclusion and Diversity, appointing a special advisor to University of Miami President Julio Frenk on racial justice, and establishing the University of Miami Center for Global Black Studies.
- The University of Miami's College of Engineering-Johnson & Johnson 3D Printing Center of Excellence Collaborative Laboratory gives faculty and students access to 3D printing technology to make objects limited only by imagination.
- By replicating real-life hospital, outpatient clinic, and home environments, the School of Nursing and Health Studies' Simulation Hospital enables health care students and professionals, first responders, and corporate partners to design, test, and master skills, technologies, and innovations.
- The National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration selected the Rosenstiel School of Marine and Atmospheric Science to host the Cooperative Institute for Marine and Atmospheric Studies, which includes a renewable award of up to \$310 million over five years to advance research in weather and climate observations, ecosystem science, and the restoration of marine resources.
- NASA and the National Space Grant Foundation selected a team led by Victoria Coverstone, professor and chair of the College of Engineering's Department of Mechanical and Aerospace Engineering, as one of just 11 national teams that will design systems and technologies to support deep-space exploration.
- Quinton Lawton and Jimmy Yun Ge, doctoral students at the Rosenstiel School of Marine and Atmospheric Science who research hurricane formation, each received one of only four National Science Foundation Graduate Research Fellowships awarded nationally in the Physical and Dynamic Meteorology category.
- Selected for its expertise in genetics and genomics and its location, the University of Miami received a \$60 million grant from the National Institutes of Health to lead the SouthEast Enrollment Center for All of Us, a program to build the most inclusive and diverse health database in history. The center will enroll 100,000 participants as part of the more than 1 million U.S. participants expected over the next five years.
- The 90,000-square-foot Carol Soffer Indoor Practice Facility features two high-performance artificial turf fields and a football operations center with coaches' offices, conference and meeting rooms, a video center, a recruiting suite, and displays celebrating the University's football history.
- Nine University of Miami Athletics programs—men's basketball, men's and women's cross country, men's diving, golf, rowing, men's and women's tennis, and women's track and field—were recognized for perfect single-year scores of 1,000 in the 2018-19 Academic Progress Report released by the NCAA.
- The Rosenstiel School of Marine and Atmospheric Science's Marine Technology and Life Sciences Seawater Complex includes the Alfred C. Glassell, Jr. SUSTAIN Building, a wind-wave-storm surge simulator capable of generating Category 5 hurricane-force winds.



- The University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill is the nation's first public university.
- The University offers 74 bachelor's, 104 master's, 65 doctoral and seven professional degree programs through 13 schools and the College of Arts & Sciences.
- The University was one of the country's first public universities to adopt a debt-free financial aid initiative. The Carolina Covenant serves as a national model for providing a debt-free education to qualified low-income students. More than 9,500 students have benefited from the Carolina Covenant since the program began in 2003.
- Among its diverse faculty, Carolina has a co-recipient of the 2015 Nobel Prize in Chemistry; 39 members of the American Academy of Arts and Sciences; 22 members of the National Academy of Medicine; seven members of the National Academy of Engineering; 16 members of the National Academy of Sciences; and 88 fellows of the American Association for the Advancement of Science.
- Carolina was named the fifth best public university in *U.S. News & World Report's* 2021 "Best Colleges" guidebook for the 20th year. The 2021 Wall Street Journal/Times Higher Education College Rankings ranked the University third among all public universities nationwide.
- Multiple UNC-Chapel Hill graduate programs were highly ranked on *U.S. News & World Report's* "Best Graduate Schools" list, including the Eshelman School of Pharmacy (#1) and the Gillings School of Global Public Health (top public school of public health).
- In fiscal year 2020, Carolina raised \$565 million from nearly 60,000 donors to support UNC-Chapel Hill's students, faculty, research and innovation in their work.
- Nearly \$2 million raised to help almost 2,000 students navigate their studies during the novel coronavirus pandemic thanks to the Carolina Student Impact Fund and other University, federal and private funding.
- With more than \$1.15 billion reached in annual research expenditures, the University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill is 12th among public and private universities in the United States for the amount of research conducted each year and ranks sixth in the nation for federal funding devoted to research and development in all fields.
- In 2020, \$29 million was granted to the North Carolina Policy Collaboratory for 85 projects focused on treatment, community testing and prevention of COVID-19. Additionally, UNC-Chapel Hill has won 266 awards (grants/contracts) for 198 covid-related projects totaling \$96M since the start of the pandemic.
- In 2020, Carolina earned a Gold rating in Diversity & Equity Coordination from the Sustainability Tracking, Assessment & Rating System, an Association for the Advancement of Sustainability in Higher Education program.
- In the 2019-2020 academic year, students, faculty and staff engaged in 1.95+ million hours volunteering in our local community.
- Since launching Innovate Carolina in 2010, UNC-Chapel Hill has significantly strengthened efforts to commercialize research-based intellectual property. A 2020 Innovate Carolina commercialization impact report shows that, when comparing the two most recent five-year periods, faculty invention disclosures are up 22%, new patent applications are up 26%, U.S. patents issued are up 66% and licensing revenue is up 58%. Highlights include creating the \$10 million Carolina Research Ventures Fund to spur investments in startups and collaborating in creating a downtown Chapel Hill accelerator that has worked with 153 companies since 2013. Those companies earned \$69 million in revenue and employed more than 802 employees in 2020.



- NC State is one of the nation's pre-eminent research institutions. Every day, our accomplished, high-performing students, faculty, staff and alumni create economic, societal and intellectual prosperity.
- With over 34,000 students, NC State educates more North Carolinians than any other university.
- *U.S. News & World Report* ranks NC State as one of the top 10 best values among the nation's public universities.
- PayScale.com ranks NC State first among North Carolina public universities for the early and midcareer salaries earned by its graduates.
- NC State was the first ACC institution to integrate athletics in 1956.
- In the classroom, NC State student-athletes continue to perform at an extremely high level. Over the past seven years, NC State has posted the seven highest graduation success rate (GSR) figures in school history, posting its highest ever this past Fall.
- Wolfpack athletes continue to perform well in the competitive arena, 12 teams finished their respective seasons ranked in the Top 25, including six in the Top 10. The NC State women's cross country team finished second in the nation, their highest finish since 2001 and the fourth time in the last six years they finished within the Top 5 in the nation, while women's swimming and diving posted a program-best No. 2 national finish.
- NC State won three ACC titles during the 2019-20 year, defending titles in women's cross country, wrestling and women's basketball. The football team reached a January Bowl game and recorded a program-best seven ACC wins, while baseball reached the College World Series and women's basketball advanced to its third straight Sweet Sixteen.
- NC State's Centennial Campus is the premier public-private university research campus in the country, where more than 70 corporate, government and nonprofit partners work in state-of-the-art facilities alongside more than 70 NC State research and academic units.
- NC State research has yielded more than 950 U.S. patents and nearly 2,000 patents worldwide, leading to the commercialization of more than 500 consumer products.
- More than 100 startups and spinoffs have been founded based on NC State research, attracting a total of \$1.6 billion in venture capital.
- NC State is one of only two universities in the country leading two National Science Foundation Engineering Research Centers, one creating the smart grid of the future and the other pioneering self-powered health monitoring devices.
- Researchers at NC State recently were awarded the National Medal of Technology and Innovation, elected to the National Academy of Engineering, inducted into the National Inventors Hall of Fame and selected for MIT Technology Review's "35 Innovators Under 35" and Popular Science's "Brilliant 10."
- NC State's James B. Hunt Jr. Library, one of the world's most innovative and advanced centers for learning, is a winner of the prestigious Stanford Prize for Innovation in Research Libraries. The library's automated book retrieval and storage system, the bookBot, creates space for technology-rich collaboration spaces by holding more than 1 million volumes in 18,172 bins stacked 50 feet high. The Hunt Library includes a computer gaming lab, an immersive visualization lab and ultra-HD media production facilities.
- NC State's College of Textiles produces more than half of the textile graduates in the country each year. The university's College of Veterinary Medicine is ranked third in the nation, and the College of Engineering is one of the top 20 public engineering schools in the U.S.
- Fifty-two NC State student-athletes have been awarded the Weaver-James Corrigan Postgraduate Scholarship since 1997 — the highest number of honorees among all league schools.
- NC State is one of only 16 Division I schools to have won two or more NCAA titles in men's basketball (1974 and 1983).
- NC State and its students, alumni and associated startups generate nearly \$7 billion in annual added income for the state.



- For 179 years, the University of Notre Dame has provided a distinctive voice in higher education that is at once rigorously intellectual, boldly moral in orientation, and firmly embracing of a service ethos. Founded in 1842 by a priest of the Congregation of Holy Cross, Notre Dame is a national Catholic research university located adjacent to the city of South Bend, Indiana, in a metropolitan area of some 325,000, approximately 90 miles east of Chicago.
- Admission to the University is highly competitive, with 38 percent of incoming first-year students ranking in the top 1 percent of their high school graduating classes and 89 percent in the top 10 percent of their classes.
- Notre Dame is organized into four undergraduate colleges — Arts and Letters, Science, Engineering, and the Mendoza College of Business — the School of Architecture, the Law School, the Graduate School, the Keough School for Global Affairs, 13 major research institutes, three dozen centers and special programs, and the University Library system.
- The Graduate School, established in 1918, encompasses 14 terminal master's degree programs, eight professional master's programs, plus 31 doctoral degree programs in and among 31 departments, institutes, and programs.
- Notre Dame is among the most geographically diverse universities in the world with students from all 50 states and over 90 countries.
- Notre Dame faculty members have earned 65 fellowships from the National Endowment for the Humanities since 1999, more than for any other research university in the nation.
- More than 75 percent of Notre Dame students participate in study abroad programs, a figure ranking in the top 10 among American doctoral/research institutions. The University recently added nine new short-term summer programs.
- Notre Dame's service to the Catholic Church is extensive, including the Alliance for Catholic Education, a master's program in which recent graduates serve in under-resourced Catholic K-12 schools nationwide.
- More U.S. presidents (6) have delivered commencement addresses at Notre Dame than any other university in the nation outside of the military academies.
- The Basilica of the Sacred Heart, the 14-story Hesburgh Library with its 132-feet-high mural depicting Christ the Teacher, and the university's historic Main Building with its famed Golden Dome are among the most widely recognized university landmarks in the world.
- Notre Dame sponsors 26 varsity athletics programs (13 men's, 13 women's) and has won 32 national championships (11 consensus titles in football — 1924-29-30-43-46-47-49-66-73-77-88 and fencing — men in 1977-78-86, women in 1987, combined in 1994, 2003-05-11-17-18-21; plus NCAA crowns in women's soccer in 1995, 2004 and 2010; women's basketball in 2000-01 and 2017-18; men's tennis in 1944 and 1959; men's golf in 1944, men's cross country in 1957, and men's soccer in 2013).
- Notre Dame consistently leads all Football Bowl Subdivision institutions in athletic graduation rate measurements. In NCAA Graduation Success Rate figures, Notre Dame student-athletes have ranked No. 1 among FBS schools for 14 straight years (2007-2020).
- Notre Dame is the only university in 2020-21 to have a football team that participated in the College Football Playoff and be ranked in the top-50 of the annual *U.S. News and World Report* ranking of national research universities.
- Notre Dame athletics in recent years has produced two student body presidents (fencer Alex Coccia in 2013-14 and football player Corey Robinson in 2016-17), a University valedictorian (rower Anna Kottkamp in 2015), an NCAA Woman of the Year honoree (Elizabeth Tucker from women's soccer in 2014), and a Summer Olympic Games flag-bearer (fencer Mariel Zagunis for the United States delegation in London in 2012). Coccia also won a Rhodes Scholarship.
- Notre Dame ranks second all-time among Football Bowl Subdivision schools, only behind Nebraska, in production of Academic All-Americans, as chosen by the College Sports Information Directors of America (CoSIDA). In addition, Notre Dame has produced the most Google Cloud Academic All-America® Hall of Fame honorees (9).
- The extensive RecSports program at Notre Dame features two historic offerings — the Bengal Bouts, the men's boxing club's annual charity tournament that since 1920 has benefited the missions in Bangladesh, and also Bookstore Basketball, the largest five-on-five outdoor basketball tournament in the world, annually featuring more than 700 team entries.

- The University of Pittsburgh is a state-related university and a world leader in education, research and innovation. Pitt's enrollment for fall term 2020 was more than 33,300 undergraduate and graduate students for all campuses. In addition, Pitt has more than 320,000 alumni around the world.
- The University's nearly 14,000 employees, including more than 5,500 faculty members, served more than 33,300 students from all 50 states, the District of Columbia, three U.S. territories, and more than 100 foreign countries through the programs of its 16 undergraduate, graduate, and professional schools in the 2020-21 academic year.
- The University of Pittsburgh has again been named the top public university in the Northeast, according to recent rankings by the Wall Street Journal/Times Higher Education. This is the fifth time in six years that Pitt has received the top spot in this nationally regarded ranking. In addition, *U.S. News & World Report* ranked Pitt among the nation's top 20 public colleges and universities in its 2021 Best Colleges rankings.
- Pitt students consistently win a significant number of prestigious national and international awards for academic achievement. Pitt undergraduates have claimed one Gates Cambridge Scholarship, two Churchill Scholarships, eight Rhodes Scholarships, nine Marshall Scholarships, nine Udall Scholarships, 12 Truman Scholarships, and an astounding 62 Goldwater Scholarships.
- In 2020, 15 Pitt students and alumni received U.S. Fulbright Scholarships, the most ever received in a single year in University history. This was the 10th time in 11 years that Pitt has been named among the nation's top producers of Fulbright award winners.
- Senior faculty members have been elected to such prestigious groups as the Health and Medicine Division of the National Academies of Sciences, Engineering, and Medicine; American Association for the Advancement of Science; American Society for Clinical Investigation; National Academy of Education; American Academy of Nursing; and National Academy of Sciences. And they have claimed some of the country's most prestigious awards, including the National Medal of Science, Lasker-DeBakey Clinical Medical Research Award, John D. and Catherine T. MacArthur Foundation "Genius Grant," and Andrew W. Mellon Foundation Distinguished Achievement Award.
- Since the beginning of this century, Pitt alumni have received the Nobel Peace Prize, Nobel Prize in Physiology or Medicine, Pulitzer Prize for fiction, National Medal of Science, National Book Award, John Fritz Medal in engineering, Shaw Prize in Life Science and Medicine, Albany Medical Center Prize in Medicine and Biomedical Research, and many other high honors.
- In the most recent QS World University Rankings (2022), a ranking of the world's top 1,300 universities, the University of Pittsburgh was ranked 41st in the United States and 163rd in the world. The QS World University Rankings by Subject 2021 gave the third spot in the world to Pitt's philosophy department.
- Pitt's intercollegiate athletics history dates back to 1869, when the university began to field a baseball team. Today, Pitt sponsors 19 varsity sports with more than 450 student-athletes vying for conference, regional and national honors.
- The Panthers rank fifth among all schools with nine inductees in the Pro Football Hall of Fame, including 2020 inductee Jimbo Covert. Pitt's gridiron legacy also includes 24 College Hall of Famers, 94 first-team All-America citations and nine national championships.
- Pitt's graduated defensive end duo of Patrick Jones II and Rashad Weaver earned consensus All-America status for the 2020 season. Pitt was one of only four schools to have multiple consensus All-Americans last season, joining Alabama, Ohio State and Notre Dame.
- Pitt led the ACC and ranked eighth nationally with six NFL Draft selections in 2021.
- Volleyball made its longest NCAA Tournament run in program history, reaching the Regional Final/Round of Eight following an upset of No. 3 seed Minnesota. The Panthers earned their highest final American Volleyball Coaches Association (AVCA) poll ranking in program history at No. 8.
- Pitt had three AVCA All-America selections: Kayla Lund (second team), Chinaza Ndee (second team) and Chiamaka Nwokolo (honorable mention). Lund became Pitt's first two-time member of an All-America Team, in addition to becoming the ACC's first repeat Volleyball Player of the Year.
- Men's soccer achieved the finest season in the program's nearly seven-decade history, compiling a 16-4 overall record, winning the ACC Coastal Division and twice ascending to No. 1 in the United Soccer Coaches national poll. Earning a No. 2 overall NCAA seed, the Panthers advanced to their first-ever College Cup.
- Two men's soccer players became the first All-Americans in program history: Valentin Noel and Jasper Loeffelsend. The Panthers also boasted the ACC's Offensive Player of the Year (Noel), Defensive Player of the Year (Loeffelsend), Freshman of the Year (Bertin Jacquesson) and Coach of the Year (Jay Vidovich).
- Women's soccer won a school-record 11 games despite playing a shortened season. The Panthers opened 6-0 to reach No. 12 in the United Soccer Coaches poll. Amanda West earned All-ACC and All-Atlantic Region after becoming Pitt's all-time leader with 62 career points and tying the career goals mark with 23. West also set season records for points (33) and goals (13).
- Wrestling achieved an 11th-place finish at the NCAA Championships, the program's best NCAA ranking since 1970. The Panthers also produced two NCAA finalists in the same year for the first time since 1963. Nino Bonaccorsi and Jake Wentzel finished as the national runner-up in their respective weight classes, earning All-America status in the process.
- Baseball ranked as high as No. 14 during the regular season—the program's highest national ranking ever—and set a record by spending nine consecutive weeks in the nation's Top 25. The Panthers set another program milestone with 16 ACC victories and six ACC series wins. An unprecedented four Panthers earned All-ACC baseball honors: Sky Duff, Mitch Myers, Nico Popa and David Yanni.
- Felix Wolter made history as Pitt's first ACC champion and first team All-American in the heptathlon. Wolter finished fourth in the nation with a school-record 5,907 points in the heptathlon at the 2021 NCAA Indoor Championships.
- Women's Track and Field had four athletes earn All-ACC honors this past year: Eddita Pessima (indoor 60-meter hurdles), Abena Atuobi (indoor shot put), Lydia Bottelier (outdoor high jump) and Eddita Pessima (outdoor 400-meter hurdles).
- Justin Champagnie ranked among the very best men's basketball players in the ACC and nationally, averaging 18 points and 11.1 rebounds per game. Champagnie was a first-team All-ACC selection and also was received Honorable Mention All-America from Associated Press.
- Women's basketball had a newcomer of impact in transfer Jayla Everett, who led the team in scoring (15.4 points per game) and set a school record with an average of 2.7 three-pointers made per contest. Everett received Honorable Mention All-ACC.
- Men's swimming and diving had two All-Americans in the same season for the first time ever. Blaise Vera was a first-team honoree in the 50 freestyle (Pitt's first since 1980) and Honorable Mention in the 100 free. Cooper Van Der Laan was a first-team performer in the 100 breaststroke.
- Two women's divers competed at the NCAA Championships: Amy Read and Claire McDaniels. Read became the first women's diver to compete in all three diving events at the NCAA Championships and the third diver—male or female—to reach the finals in all three dives at the ACC Championships.
- Softball had three players earn All-ACC honors, matching the highest total in program history: Sarah Seamans, EC Taylor and Cami Compson, who was also an ACC All-Freshman honoree.
- Three Pitt gymnasts qualified for the 2021 National Collegiate Gymnastics Regional: Lauren Beckwith (balance beam), Katie Chamberlain (uneven bars) and Katrina Coca (uneven bars).
- The dawn of a new era in Pitt Athletics launches this year with the official addition of women's lacrosse as a varsity sport. The fully funded program will play its inaugural season as a member of the ACC against NCAA Division I competition in the upcoming 2021-22 academic year.
- For the second consecutive year, the University of Pittsburgh placed a school-record number of student-athletes on the annual Atlantic Coast Conference Academic Honor Roll. The Panthers had 315 names on the list for the 2020-21 academic year.
- The Panthers received the NCAA Team Works Community Service Competition Award for Division I, based on the number of service hours completed and the number of participating student-athletes.

- Syracuse University is a private research university that advances knowledge across disciplines to drive breakthrough discoveries and breakout leadership. Our collection of 13 schools and colleges with more than 200 customizable majors closes the gap between education and action so students can take on the world. In and beyond the classroom, we connect people, perspectives and practices to solve interconnected challenges with interdisciplinary approaches. Together, we're a powerful community that moves ideas, individuals and impact beyond what's possible.
- The depth and breadth of the university's program offerings are a testament to its enduring strength, with more than 200 majors and 100 minors offered through 13 schools and colleges and 22 online degree programs. Notably, the first fully interactive online JD program in the nation, JDinteractive, offers a full law degree experience, with each course blending live classes and self-paced lessons offered on a flexible schedule for part-time students.
- More than 15,000 undergraduates and 7,500 graduate students who come from all 50 states and 123 countries join a global network of nearly 242,000 alumni spanning 160 countries.
- The University has a long legacy of commitment to diversity and inclusion across multiple dimensions, with minority students comprising about 25 percent of current enrollment and international students making up about 15 percent. With seven overseas locations and more than 100 programs within 60 countries, nearly half of Syracuse University students study abroad at some point during their academic careers.
- Syracuse University distinguishes itself among the nation's best research universities as determined by the Carnegie Foundation. As a Carnegie classification Research 1 institution, Syracuse offers students hands-on opportunities through the Office of Undergraduate Research and Creative Engagement.
- Interdisciplinary study opportunities allow students to expand options and enhance preparedness for post-academic success. For example, BiolInspired Syracuse supports research into complex biological systems and smart materials to address global needs in health, medicine and materials innovation; the Syracuse University Autonomous Systems Policy Institute combines public policy, law, scientific research, design, aging, disability studies, security, and public communication to the study of artificial intelligence, big data, and data analytics.
- Several schools and colleges — Architecture, Information Studies, Maxwell School of Citizenship and Public Affairs, Newhouse School of Public Communications, and Whitman School of Management — rank among the nation's best in their fields.
- Nationally-recognized programs include creative writing, entrepreneurship and emerging enterprises, industrial design, information systems, drama, and social work.
- Invest Syracuse, a \$100 million dollar initiative, was launched to increase access and opportunity to promising students from across the socioeconomic spectrum, and to invest in new faculty positions in bio-enabled science and technology; artificial intelligence, deep learning, autonomous systems and policy; social differences and social justice, among others.
- Forever Orange: The Campaign for Syracuse University reached the \$1 billion milestone. The campaign, built on three foundational pillars: ensuring philanthropic support for an unsurpassed student experience; advancing academic excellence; and providing unique learning opportunities, will fuel research, faculty recruitment, world-class teaching and learning, expanded financial aid and immersion programs, a powerhouse athletics program, entrepreneurship, innovation and more for generations to come.
- Syracuse University students have access to one of the most comprehensive and innovative health and wellness complexes in the nation in the Barnes Center at The Arch, which brings together health and recreation services including everything from a climbing wall to Esports to meditation classes in a holistic approach to enhancing the student experience.
- Syracuse University has earned a reputation as the best university for veterans and military-connected students, who make up more than five percent of the student body (nearly double the national average), with such precedent-setting initiatives as the Entrepreneurship Bootcamp for Veterans with Disabilities.
- Through its innovative Institute for Veterans and Military Families, Syracuse University has provided programs and services to more than 90,000 veterans, service members and their families since 2011.
- Opening in 2020, the \$63 million National Veterans Resource Center (NVRC) is dedicated to advancing the social and economic well-being of the nation's veterans and their families on the campus of Syracuse University and beyond. This fully-accessible facility houses the Institute for Veterans and Military Families, the Office of Veterans and Military Affairs and Syracuse University's ROTC programs.
- Syracuse University Athletics is a source of university and community pride with the largest on-campus basketball arena and the largest domed stadium in the northeast.
- The famous Dome stadium is a hub of economic activity in Central New York, attracting visitors from around the country. The university has committed more than \$100 million to create a new stadium experience, including a roof replacement and comprehensive series of Americans with Disabilities Act (ADA)-related accessibility upgrades. I would update this to reflect what has been completed. In its current form, it makes it sound like the renovations are in the future, whereas many have already occurred.
- Success for Syracuse University Athletics is as prevalent in the classroom as it is in the competitive sports environment. The more than 600 Orange student-athletes recorded a cumulative grade point average of 3.1 with an NCAA Graduation Success Rate (GSR) of 94%, the highest in school history. Six Orange teams earned the NCAA's Public Recognition Award for scoring in the top 10 percent of their sport nationally, including men's cross country, men's track & field, softball, women's volleyball, women's tennis and women's soccer, marking the fourth straight year that Syracuse has had at least five teams achieve a perfect multi-year score.
- The University boasts eight alumni in the Pro Football Hall of Fame; 18 coaches and players in the College Football Hall of Fame; the 2003 men's basketball national championship; three members in the Naismith Memorial Basketball Hall of Fame; 11 NCAA championships in men's lacrosse; 30 members in the National Lacrosse Hall of Fame; and in 2015 the field hockey and men's cross country teams won national championships within 24 hours of each other.
- On big game days, the campus is flooded by fans covered in Orange. In 1890, Syracuse became the first university to adopt one official color. Orange pride is obvious throughout the region. The university mascot is Otto the Orange, a giant orange ball.
- And then there's the Legend of 44, one of the most fabled numbers ever associated with a college football program. Since 1954, eleven players have worn the number and three earned All-America honors. Those three — Jim Brown, Ernie Davis, and Floyd Little — rank among the finest running backs ever to play the college game. In recognition of the number's significance, the University resides within the 13244 zip code, and all University phone numbers start with "44."



- The University of Virginia is one of the nation's top public universities. Thomas Jefferson — who designed the buildings, planned the curriculum, and hired the first faculty members — founded UVA in 1819.
- The original governing board of the University included Jefferson and his friends, Presidents James Madison and James Monroe. Jefferson's original "Academical Village" remains the heart of the University's Grounds and is the only university in America designated as a UNESCO World Heritage Site.
- Students at UVA have a long tradition of student self-governance. The University Judiciary Committee, the Honor Committee, Student Council, the Lawn Selection Committees, and many others are staffed and governed solely by students.
- Graduation rates at UVA are among the highest in the country. The six-year graduation rate for students who entered in fall 2014 is 94%.
- The Princeton Review ranked UVA as the No. 1 public school for financial aid in the nation. The University is committed to financial support for students with demonstrated need, especially for students from historically underrepresented groups.
- UVA is committed to making higher education accessible to all students. Virginia families earning less than \$80,000 per year can send their children to UVA tuition-free. UVA also commits to cover tuition and room and board for students from Virginia families earning less than \$30,000.
- In the fall of 2020, UVA received a historic number of applicants with 47,827 total applicants, a roughly 17% increase since 2019.
- UVA Medical Center: Becker's Hospital Review, which is a national health care publication, added the University of Virginia Medical Center to its 2020 list of "100 great hospitals in America." Becker's selects hospitals known for their innovation and patient care and patient outcomes. UVA also received recognition from the *U.S. News & World Report* list of "Best Hospitals" for being the No. 1 hospital in Virginia in 2019-2020.
- Student Health: UVA is building a leading Student Health and Wellness Center, which will provide preventive care, mental health services, lounge areas, research labs, and the support and resources needed to care for the overall well-being of students.
- UVA launched the School of Data Science—its 12th school and the first established since 2007—making the University a global leader in efforts to improve society through teaching and researching the emerging field of data science.
- The University is committed to investing in research and research infrastructure, and for five consecutive years, research funding has grown steadily. In 2018-2019, UVA reached \$412 million in research funding, which is the highest in the school's history.
- UVA has ambitious sustainability goals and pledges to be carbon-neutral by 2030 and fossil-fuel-free by 2050.
- The University is dedicated to preparing students to be citizen-leaders. In 2020, UVA ranked 10th nationally and 1st among public universities in the number of students receiving Fulbright awards.
- Free Speech: College Pulse, the Foundation for Individual Rights in Education (FIRE), and RealClearEducation released their first-ever College Free Speech rankings in December of 2020. The University of Virginia received a green light rating from FIRE and was ranked #6 among all schools (out of 55 total) in terms of climate for free speech on campus.
- Led by the Karsh family gift, UVA established the Karsh Institute of Democracy. The nonpartisan Institute will build upon UVA's existing expertise in the study of democracy and leadership and help prepare citizen-leaders to serve the nation's democracy.

- UVA dedicated the Memorial to Enslaved Laborers to acknowledge and honor the 4,000 or more individuals who built and maintained the early University. UVA works hard to make its academic and residential community welcoming and inclusive to people from all backgrounds.

Team Highlights

- Men's Lacrosse captured its seventh NCAA championship and Women's Swimming and Diving won its first NCAA championship.
- Baseball advanced to the College World Series for the fifth time in program history.
- Women's soccer advanced to its fourth NCAA College Cup, appearing in the Final Four for the first time since 2014.
- Virginia rowed to a fifth-place finish at the NCAA Championships.
- UVA captured three Atlantic Coast Conference championship and its 86 conference titles since the spring of 2002 are the most of any ACC school during that time.
- In 2020-21, UVA claimed ACC championships in women's swimming and diving (17th championship in program history and 12th title since 2008), men's tennis (13th championship in program history) and rowing (11th consecutive and 20 of 21 overall).
- The Cavaliers claimed ACC regular-season titles in men's basketball and men's tennis.
- Men's Basketball claimed its 10th ACC regular-season championship and earned its school-record seventh straight NCAA Tournament appearance.
- Men's Swimming and Diving finished ninth at the NCAA Championships, marking the team's best finish since 2011.
- Men's and Women's Tennis each advanced to the NCAA Round of 16.
- Women's Lacrosse advanced to the NCAA Second Round.
- Eight wrestlers to the NCAA Championship with senior Louie Hayes placing 8th to become the 23rd All-American in the program's history. Five wrestlers were named to the All-ACC Academic Team.
- Four individuals advanced to the NCAA Indoor Track & Field Championships and earn All-America honors.
- The state-of-the-art Virginia Tennis Complex at the Boar's Head Sports Club opened for the 2021 season.

Individual Highlights

- Paige Madden won three NCAA individual titles and helped UVA to the win in the 800 free relay and qualified for the 2021 Summer Olympics swim team in Tokyo.
- Emma Navarro captured the NCAA Singles Championship, joining Danielle Collins (2014 & 2016) as Cavaliers to win the event.
- Michaela Meyer became the first female competitor in UVA track and field history to win an individual NCAA title, capturing the 800 meters at the NCAA Women's Track and Field Championships.
- Todd DeSorbo (women's swimming) was named the national coach of the year, ACC Women's Swimming Coach of the Year, and was invited to serve as an assistant coach on the 2021 US Summer Olympic team.
- Carl Söderlund was named ACC Men's Tennis Player of the Year and Atlantic Region Senior of the Year.
- Emma Navarro was named ACC Women's Tennis Freshman of the Year and Atlantic Region Rookie of the Year.

- Andres Pedroso was named ACC Men's Tennis Coach of the Year.
- Kevin Sauer was named ACC Rowing Coach of the Year.
- Virginia's Varsity Eight was named ACC Crew of the Year.
- Women's tennis associate head coach Gina Suarez-Malagutti was named the region's ITA Assistant Coach of the Year.
- Navarro was one of four finalists for the Class of 2021 Honda Sport Award for Tennis.
- Navarro was named ITA National Rookie of the Year.
- Jeffrey von der Schulenburg was named the Atlantic Region Rookie of the Year.
- Head coach Andres Pedroso was named the Wilson ITA Atlantic Region Coach of the Year.
- Men's tennis associate head coach Scott Brown was named the ITA Atlantic Region Assistant Coach of the Year.

- The athletics department achieved its highest Graduation Success Rate (95 percent).
- Paige Madden (women's swimming), Sophia Kershner (rowing) and Alexa Spaanstra (women's soccer) earned ACC Scholar-Athlete of the Year honors.
- Rachel Robinson (field hockey) and Madden received Weaver-James-Corrigan postgraduate scholarships from the ACC.
- Madden was also a recipient of the NCAA Postgraduate Scholarship.
- Terrell Jana (football) was named the Wells Fargo Humanitarian Award recipient. Jana is a member of UVA's Groundkeepers, which won UVA's 2020 Marcus L. Martin Endorsed Award that recognizes groups or individuals who work to facilitate long-term, institutional change in inclusion, diversity, equity or access. Jana also earned an ISO Graduation Award, which honors undergraduate leadership and excellence from UVA's International Students & Scholars program.
- Spencer Bozsik (men's tennis) earned the T. Rodney Crowley, Jr. Memorial Scholarship.
- Ethan Weatherspoon (wrestling) was an ACC recipient of the Dr. Pepper Go Teach Tuition Giveaway.
- Alexa Spaanstra was named a Scholar All-America selection by the United Soccer Coaches.
- Wrestlers Jay Aiello, Michael Battista, Louie Hayes, Patrick McCormick and Justin McCoy earned Scholar All-America honors by the National Wrestling Coaches Association.
- Women's soccer players Rebecca Jarrett, Lizzy Sieracki and Taryn Torres were named CoSIDA Academic All-District First Team.
- Jamey Bulloch, Grace Comerford, Janet Conklin, Katy Flynn, Colette Glass, Gabby Grob, Lily Jarrett, Sophia Kershner, Elizabeth Kilgore, Nicola Lawless, Lauren Orr, Charlotte Quinn, Brooke Rickert, Maggie Taylor, Leah Till and Carrie Warner were named Collegiate Rowing Coaches Association National Scholar-Athletes.
- Women's tennis senior Rosie Johanson was a recipient of the Arthur Ashe Leadership & Sportsmanship Award.

- In the classroom, 16 of Tech's teams registered a collective 3.0 or better team GPA during both the fall and spring semesters in 2020-21.
- Master of Information Technology program ranked No. 4 nationally. Evening MBA program ranked No. 28.
- Virginia Tech is one of two institutions in the nation to have a Corps of Cadets embedded in a large civilian student body, and the corps boasts the highest commissioning rate — 79 percent — of all senior military and service academies in nation. Enrollment exceeds 1,100 cadets, with plans to grow to 1,400.
- On the court, Virginia Tech's men's and women's basketball teams both made the NCAA Tournament in the same season for the first time in school history.
- Men's basketball coach Mike Young was named the ACC Coach of the Year in his second season guiding the Hokies, while women's coach Kenny Brooks owns a 101-59 record during his five seasons in Blacksburg.
- Under the leadership of Dave Cianelli, Tech's men's indoor track squad won the ACC indoor title by the largest margin in modern conference history. It marked the 12th overall team ACC championship claimed by the Hokies under Cianelli.
- In 2021, Tech's softball program coached by Pete D'Amour reached the NCAA Super Regional for the first time since 2008.
- Tech's women's golf coach Carol Robertson continued leading her team to new heights as the Hokies qualified for the third round of the NCAA Tournament in 2021 for the first time in program history.
- Tech's wrestling team under the direction of Tony Robie also continued its streak of NCAA Tournament appearances.
- The men's soccer program led by Mike Brizendine qualified for NCAA postseason competition for the fifth straight year as standout performer Daniel Pereira made history as the school's first No. 1 overall pick in the Major League Soccer Draft.
- On the football field, head coach Justin Fuente and the Hokies reclaimed the Commonwealth Cup and finished the season on a positive note with a convincing 33-15 victory to end the season vs. Virginia.
- The Hokies boasted a pair of first-round NFL Draft picks for the second time in four years in CB Caleb Farley and T Christian Darrisaw, while a total of four Tech players were selected in the 2021 NFL Draft.
- Tech's baseball squad under the direction of John Szefc returned to the field after having their 2020 season truncated. The Hokies enjoyed enthusiastic crowds as Tech returned to the national rankings and finished the year with 27 victories.

- In 1956 Wake Forest successfully moved the approximately 120 miles from Wake Forest, NC, to Winston-Salem, NC, while retaining its name, heritage, traditions, and uniqueness as an institution.
- In 1962 Wake Forest became the first major southern private college university to integrate.
- In 2009, Wake Forest was the first top-30 university to adopt a test-optional policy and stop requiring standardized tests for undergraduate admission.
- Wake Forest was one of eight teams to play in the first NCAA basketball tournament in 1939.
- In 1953, Wake Forest was one of the seven institutions that founded the Atlantic Coast Conference and provided the new Conference with its first Commissioner. Persons closely associated with Wake Forest have stated the moving of the University from Wake Forest to Winston-Salem and the joining with six other institutions to form the ACC have been the two most important historical events that have contributed to the subsequent growth of Wake Forest to become a top-30 ranked national University today.
- Wake Forest's 1955 College World Series championship marked the first national championship by an Atlantic Coast Conference member institution.
- Jim Caldwell was the first African American head football coach in the Atlantic Coast Conference. The first African American quarterback and the first African American to earn All-ACC honors in three straight years in the ACC were Wake Forest student-athletes.
- Wake Forest has had 17 Rhodes Scholars.
- Wake Forest has had 126 Fulbright Scholars in the past 20 years.
- Students in Wake Forest's accountancy program have achieved the highest passage rate in the nation on the Certified Public Accountant (CPA) examination more than any other school in the past 20 years. Since the program began offering a master's degree in accounting in 1997, the graduates have achieved the top national ranking in passage rate of the CPA exam 13 times.
- Located at Wake Downtown in the city's Innovation Quarter, Wake Forest's undergraduate engineering program pioneered a new path for engineering education with a curriculum grounded in the liberal arts tradition at a research university. The first class of engineers graduated in 2021. Sixty percent of engineering faculty are women, including the chair. Over 40% of students enrolled in the engineering program are women, more than twice the national average.
- The James W. Denmark Loan Fund, originally named the North Carolina Baptist Students' Aid Association, is the oldest student loan fund in the United States, having been established at Wake Forest on November 30, 1875.
- Wake Forest's Magnolia Scholars program for first-generation students goes beyond a traditional scholarship — inviting the students into a specialized program with community, accountability and targeted mentoring. In 2019, the Magnolia Scholars program celebrated 10 years of providing scholarships, academic support, study abroad opportunities and counseling for 120 first-generation students. In recent years, Magnolia Scholars have posted a four-year graduation rate of more than 90%.
- As a national leader in the college-to-career experience, Wake Forest continues to transform the traditional, outdated concept of "career services" into a holistic, four-year approach to personal and career development. Wake Forest prepares students for a lifelong career journey, not just the first job after college. The Office of Personal and Career Development's innovative and effective initiatives support career development from a student's first days on campus. The National Association of Colleges and Employers awarded Wake Forest President Nathan O. Hatch the 2018 Career Services Excellence Award in recognition of the University's career development program. In 2020, Wake Forest University was awarded the National Career Development Association's (NCDA) Exemplary Career Center Program Award.
- "Suited Up," a program for Wake Forest Division I student-athletes, tailors personal and career development to student-athletes' demanding schedules. Student-athletes complete a career readiness program and participate in tailored internships created through the partnership between Student-Athlete Development and local organizations.
- With "Pro Humanitate" as its motto, Wake Forest has a tradition of service and community engagement. The Office of Civic and Community Engagement facilitates meaningful opportunities for students, faculty and staff to volunteer in the local community. Wake Forest students established the Brian Piccolo Cancer Fund in 1980 in memory of the alumnus and Chicago Bear football star who died of cancer in 1970 at age 26. Students have raised more than \$3 million to support innovative cancer research at the Comprehensive Cancer Center of Wake Forest University Baptist Medical Center.
- Wake Forest has a long and distinguished history in debate dating to the old campus in Wake Forest, NC. Having had final four finishes at the National Debate Tournament in 1993, 1994, 1995, 1997, 2006, 2008, and 2009 and with championships in 1997 and 2008, Wake Forest is among a small number of schools that has qualified most often for the national debate finals. Wake Forest has hosted two Presidential Debates, George H.W. Bush and Governor Michael Dukakis in 1988 and Al Gore and George W. Bush in 2000.
- Wake Forest has been a pioneer in study abroad beginning in the 1970s. Each semester Wake Forest faculty and students gather for semester long study at each of the University-owned houses in London, Venice and Vienna, and visit more than 70 countries worldwide. Wake Forest earned the Institute of International Education Seal of Excellence for increasing the number of U.S. students studying abroad. Eighty-one percent of Wake Forest undergraduates receive credit for study abroad.
- The Wake Washington Center - centrally located at One Dupont Circle - is the home of the Wake Washington program, a semester-long study away program combining internship and academic experience in the nation's capital. The center is also a home base for the thousands of Wake Forest alumni who live in the Washington area.
- The Wake Forest Institute for Regenerative Medicine is recognized as an international leader in its field. Physicians and scientists were the first in the world to engineer laboratory-grown organs that were successfully implanted into humans. The Center for Nanotechnology and Molecular Materials is known internationally for leading research efforts in their fields.
- On Arnold Palmer Day (April 13), Wake Forest celebrates the birthday of the legendary Demon Deacon golfer with his signature drink, a mixture of lemonade and iced tea.
- Maya Angelou, the poet, actress, author and civil rights activist, taught at Wake Forest from 1982 until her death in 2014. She once said, "I'm not a writer who teaches. I'm a teacher who writes. But I had to work at Wake Forest to know that." A University residence hall is named in her honor and the Z. Smith Reynolds Library is home to a collection of her movie scripts and drafts of plays and other materials related to her work in film and theater.
- Wake Forest is one of four U.S. News Top-30 universities to receive the Carnegie Community Engagement Classification in 2020 from the Carnegie Foundation in recognition of institutional commitment to community engagement.



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
