NCAA Gambling and Sports Wagering Rules

As March Madness begins, please remind your student-athletes, coaches, conference staff members, athletic administrators, and non-athletics staff members who have responsibilities within or over athletics departments about the NCAA regulations regarding gambling and sports wagering.

NCAA bylaws prohibit student-athletes, coaches, conference staff members, athletics administrators and non-athletics staff members who have responsibilities within or over athletics departments from engaging in sports wagering activities.

Sports wagering is defined as putting something at risk, such as an entry fee or tangible item, with the opportunity to win something in return. Therefore, all student-athletes, coaches, conference staff members, athletics administrators and non-athletics staff members who have responsibilities within or over athletics departments may not participate in sports wagering activities where there is an entry fee and an opportunity to win a prize. This would include fantasy leagues, Super Bowl pools and March Madness brackets.

Potential Consequences for Student-Athletes:

- Permanent Ineligibility if you engage in activities designed to influence a portion or final outcome of a sports contest (i.e., point-shaving, spot fixing).
- Minimum of one year ineligibility if you participates in a sports bet of any kind via internet, a bookie or parlay card.

Ineligibility length to be determined if you participate in a sports bet of any kind by putting something at risk (i.e., money, entry fee or tangible item) for the opportunity to win something. (This would include fantasy leagues, Super Bowl pools and March Madness brackets.

NCAA Bylaw 10.3.1 The prohibition against sports wagering applies to any institutional practice or any competition (intercollegiate, amateur or professional) in a sport in which the Association conducts championship competition, in bowl subdivision football and in emerging sports for women. (Adopted: 4/26/07 effective 8/1/07)

NCAA Official Interpretation- 2/7/14- Institution Providing Expenses Related to Delivery of a Prospective Student-Athlete's Transcript and Test Score

It is permissible for an institution to provide expenses (e.g., transcript fee, express delivery charges) for a prospective student-athlete's institution to send his or her academic transcript to the institution or the NCAA Eligibility Center and to pay the fee for a prospective student-athlete's ACT or SAT score to be sent from the testing agency to the institution, provided the prospective student-athlete has signed a National Letter of Intent or the institution's written offer of admission and/or financial aid or the institution has received his or her financial deposit in response to its offer of admission.

NCAA Staff Interpretation

Personalized Audio/Video Presentations After Prospective Student-Athlete's Commitment

Date Published: February 2, 2015

The academic and membership affairs staff determined that an institution may produce and arrange personalized audio/video presentations to show to or play for a prospective student-athlete after he or she has signed a National Letter of Intent or the institution's written offer of admission and/or financial aid or after the institution has received his or her financial deposit in response to its offer of admission.

NCAA Staff Interpretation

Contact and Ground Transportation to/from Bus or Train Station or Airport during Official Visit Outside a Contact Period

Date Published: February 19, 2015

The academic and membership affairs staff confirmed that at any time other than a dead period and, in women's basketball, during the July evaluation periods, institutional staff members may have contact with a prospective student-athlete within 30-miles of the institution's campus during the prospective student-athlete's official visit.

Further, ground transportation provided by any member of the institution's athletics department staff for a prospective student-athlete, his or her parents, relatives or legal guardians for an official visit between the campus and any bus or train station or airport outside of the 30-mile radius of the institution's campus is not considered a contact.

Official Interpretation

Student-Athlete Performing Required Field or Facility Preparation or Maintenance

Date Published: December 21, 2011

Item Ref: 1

Interpretation:

The committee determined that field or facility preparation or maintenance that is performed by a student-athlete, related to practice or competition and required, supervised or monitored by a coaching staff member is not a countable athletically related activity.

NCAA Staff Interpretation

Student-Athletes Selling Items Received for Participation in Intercollegiate Athletics

Date Published: December 5, 2013

The academic and membership affaire staff confirmed that a student-athlete may not sell, or exchange for another item of value, any item received for athletics participation. (e.g. institutional or conference championship gift/awards)

Official Interpretation

Use of Sports Psychologist

Date Published: February 2, 2015

The committee confirmed that a sports psychologist may attend practice sessions without being included in the institution's coaching limitations in a particular sport, provided the individual does not provide any technical or tactical instruction related to the sport or make or assist in making tactical decisions related to the sport during on-court or on-field practice or competition. A sports psychologist may evaluate a student-athlete during a practice session only for the purposes of assisting the student-athlete in off-court or off-field noncoaching activities (e.g., mental imagery) directly related to the sport; however, if a student-athlete is required to meet with the sports psychologist, such a meeting is considered a countable athletically related activity.

Further, an institution may require a student-athlete to meet with a sports psychologist as a permissible out-of-season conditioning activity, provided the time engaged in the sessions are included in the maximum limit of eight hours per week for countable athletically related activities outside the playing season. In bowl subdivision football, the sports psychologist does not have to count as one of the five strength and conditioning coaches permitted to work with the football program in any capacity.
