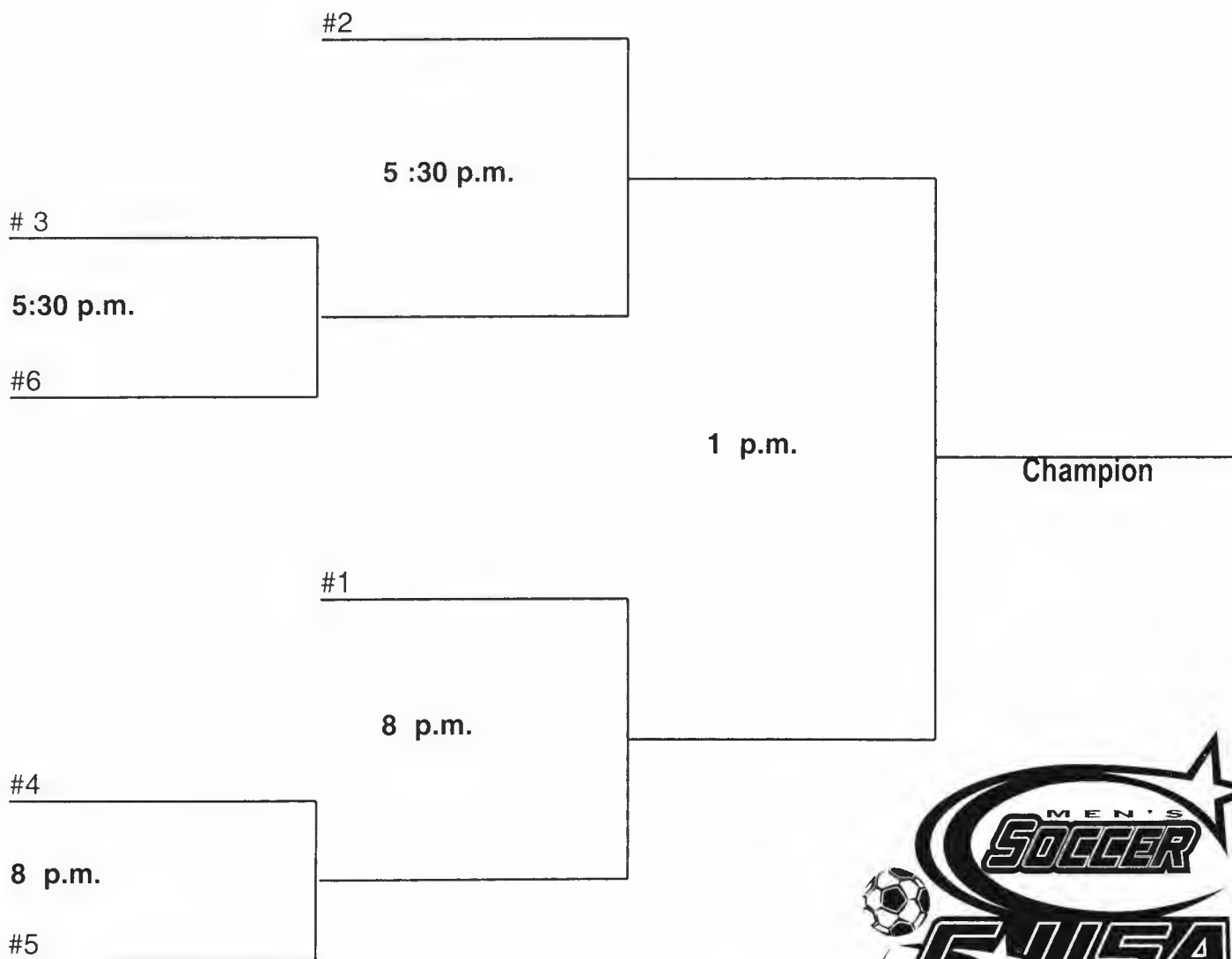

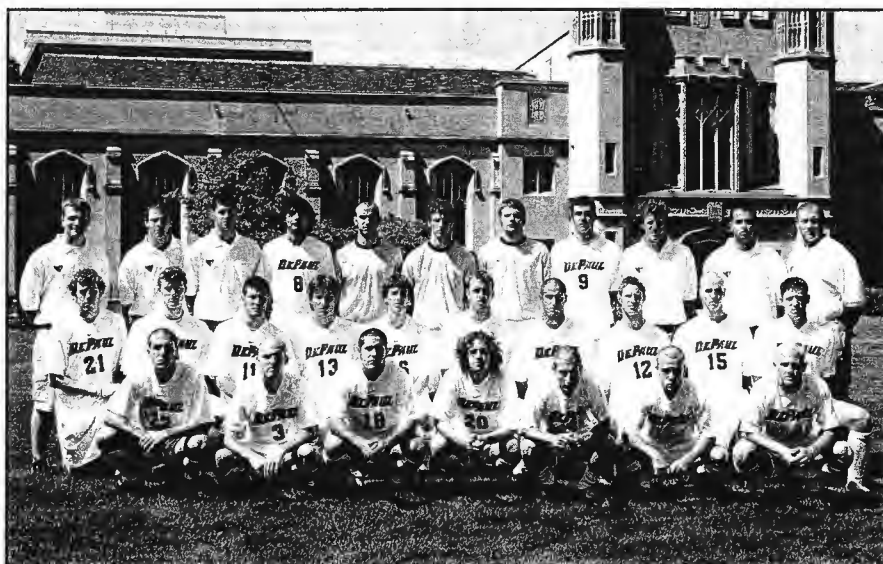

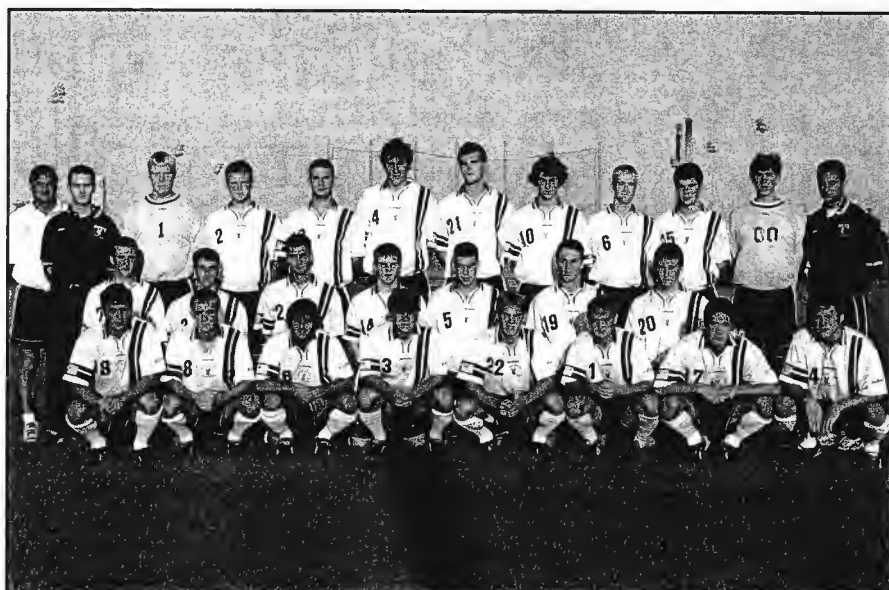

- The Golden Eagles are 5-5-0 all-time in Conference USA Tournament action and have twice advanced to the final.
- Senior defender Tom Nolan was named to *Soccer America's* Team of the Week on Sept. 9, after clearing a shot off the line in a 1-0 win over Saint Louis early in the season. It was the first such honor of his career.
- Marquette's offense came to life against Wright State and TCU, scoring four goals in each outing. Last season the Golden Eagles netted four games of four or more goals, including a 4-1 win over No. 24 UAB in the C-USA Tournament semifinals.

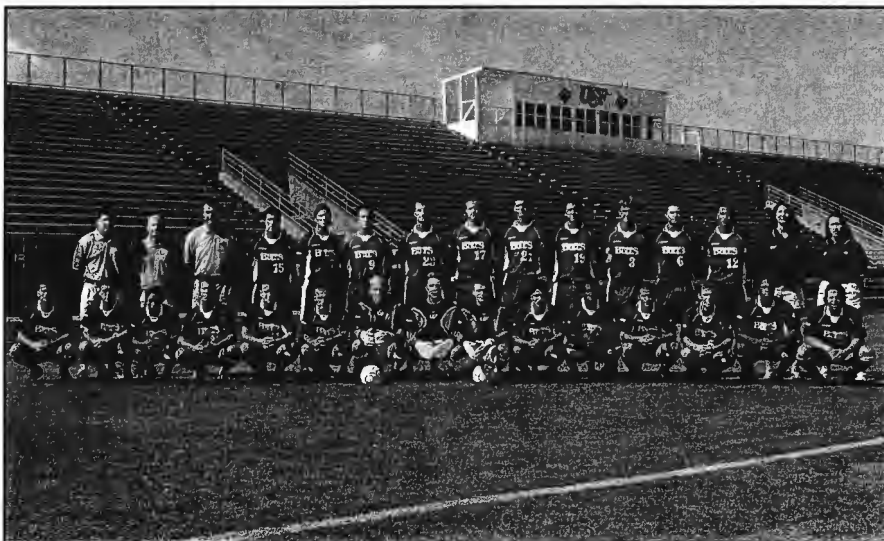

CONFERENCE USA



In the world of intercollegiate sports, many considered the formation of Conference USA a bold move. Its formation occurred during a significant period of major conference realignment and restructuring of the NCAA. C-USA established a strong foundation while quickly earning a reputation of successfully competing at the highest levels of intercollegiate athletics. Capitalizing on the strengths of its 15 distinguished and diverse universities, Conference USA has quickly emerged as one of the nation's top conferences.

A PROUD HISTORY

The conference unveiled its name, logo and commissioner on April 24, 1995 in Chicago. Mike Slive was named the first commissioner of Conference USA. Eleven of the institutions began athletic participation in 1995, while Houston joined competition in the fall of 1996. The league's headquarters were established in Chicago.

PROMISE IN EXPANSION

Conference USA added East Carolina (September, 1996) and the United States Military Academy (March, 1997) as football members. ECU began league competition in 1997; Army in 1998 and UAB began football play in 1999. The league added TCU and ECU (1999) for all sports and they began competition in 2001. South Florida starts C-USA football in 2003.

COMPETITION

Conference USA sponsors 19 sports - baseball, basketball, cross country, football, golf, soccer, tennis, and track and field (indoor and outdoor) for men and basketball, cross country, golf, soccer, softball, swimming, tennis, track and field (indoor and outdoor), and volleyball for women. The league's championship competition is enhanced by NCAA automatic bids in volleyball, men's and women's basketball, men's and women's soccer, men's and women's tennis and baseball.

Conference sports compete in a single division, except for men's basketball, which currently competes in two. Charlotte, Cincinnati, DePaul, East Carolina, Louisville, Marquette, and Saint Louis comprise the American Division, while Houston, Memphis,

South Florida, Southern Miss, TCU, Tulane and UAB make up the National Division.

SUCCESS ON THE PLAYING FIELD

Conference USA performers have achieved great success in competition, placing the league among the top conferences in the nation.

In addition, 23 men's and women's soccer teams, 19 baseball teams and six softball teams have earned NCAA Tournament bids. Tulane made its first appearance at the College World Series in 2001. C-USA has also sent two men's soccer teams to the Final Four and two teams to the Women's College World Series. The league has also had three national champions in NCAA track and field competition and numerous NCAA individual and team competitors in golf, tennis and track and field. Overall, Conference USA teams and

individuals have made more than 237 NCAA appearances.

SUCCESS OFF THE FIELD

Among C-USA's 5,000 student-athletes, there are champions off the playing field as well. In seven years, 62 student-athletes earned national Verizon Academic All-America honors, while 134 were named All-District. In addition, more than 6,000 student-athletes have been named to the Commissioner's Honor Roll or received the Commissioner's Academic Medal, indicative of outstanding achievement in the classroom. The conference annually awards six postgraduate scholarships, along with the Sport Academic Award, Scholar Athletes of the Year and the Institutional Academic Excellence Award.

GOVERNANCE

Along with the ACC, Big East, Big Ten, Big 12, Pac-10 and SEC, Conference USA is one of the seven conferences having significant representation in the NCAA governance structure. The Presidents of the member institutions serve as the league's Board of Directors. Dr. Joseph Steger of Cincinnati served as the chair for the first four years and was succeeded by Dr. J.H. Woodward of Charlotte.

Robert R. Hermann Stadium

The 1999 season marked a significant time period for Saint Louis University's soccer program as both men's and women's teams returned to the newly renovated Robert R. Hermann Stadium and enjoyed the benefits of a true home field advantage as both won Conference USA championships.

The Billikens christened Hermann Stadium by knocking off defending national champion and preseason No. 1 Indiana 3-2 on Aug. 21, 1999, before a record on-campus crowd of 6,517.

The project began on March 17, 1999, with the removal of the synthetic surface, and the sod was laid on May 25. The new surface is a mixture of blue grasses that covers an area of 155,000 square feet. The Billikens play on a regulation 120 x 75-yard soccer pitch.

The surface sits upon an 8,400-ton root zone composed of 90 percent sand and 10 percent peat moss. A four-inch gravel drainage blanket is composed of 3,100 tons of pea gravel. The drainage system is capable of filtering 10 inches of rain in an hour. The grass is watered with a sprinkler system that features 70 sprinkler heads connected by approximately 1.5 miles of piping.

The addition of permanent seating on the east side of the stadium, along with expanding the main grandstand, increased the facility's seating capacity to 6,050 from 2,400.

Munie Outdoor Services of Caseyville, Ill., was the contractor for the project under the direction of the University's grounds and materials management office.

The field is located one block east of Grand Boulevard on Laclede Avenue, just behind Busch Memorial Student Center on the University's Frost Campus. Visitors to campus are able to park in the 2,000-car Olive Parking Garage adjacent to the soccer facility.

Originally opened for play in 1990 as The Billiken Sports Center, the facility was home to the men's soccer team until 1994. It also served as a site for NCAA Division I and II playoff games and as a home field for other local collegiate soccer programs when their fields were unplayable due to severe weather conditions. The Billikens are a dominating 63-7-2 (.889) and 5-1-0 in NCAA Tournament play at the on-campus site.

After the soccer team moved its home games to the Anheuser-Busch Conference & Sports Centre in 1995, the field was used for Billiken field hockey games as well as campus intramurals. Adjacent to Hermann Stadium is The Billiken Sports Center's baseball and softball diamonds and tennis complex.

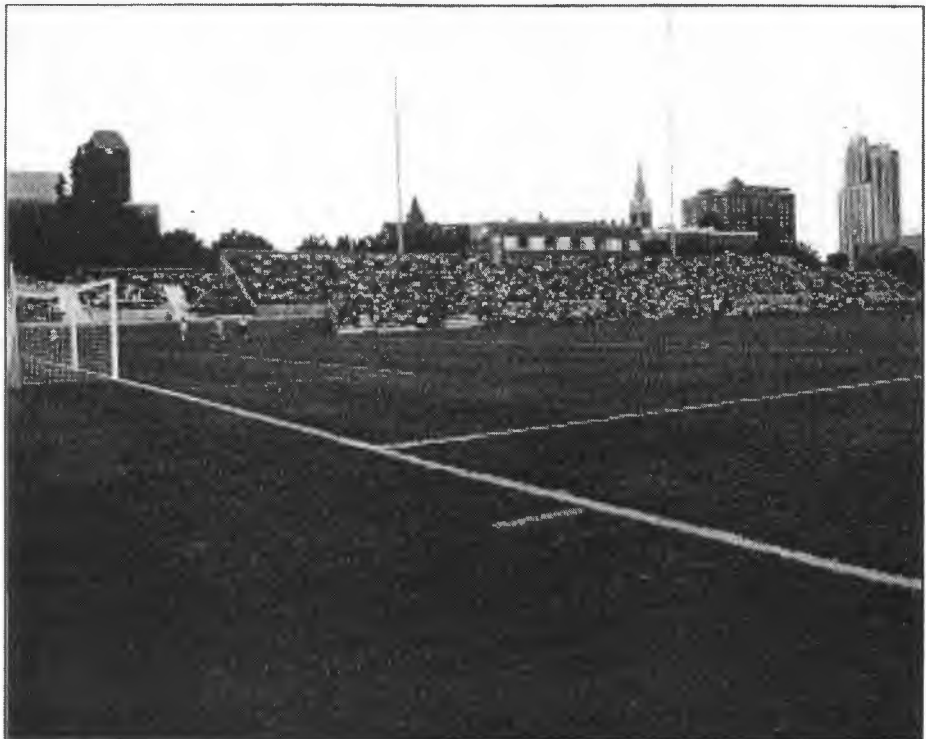


