The 2001 Conference USA women's soccer tournament will be held Nov. 7-10 at Valley Fields in Milwaukee. Two-time defending champion Marquette will serve as the host of the event.

## **CONFERENCE USA**

In the world of intercollegiate sports, many considered the formation of Conference USA a bold move. Its formation occurred during a significant period of major conference realignment and restructuring of the NCAA. C-USA established a strong foundation while quickly earning a reputation of successfully competing at the highest levels of intercollegiate athletics. Capitalizing on the strengths of its 15 distinguished and diverse universities, Conference USA has quickly emerged as one of the nation's top conferences.

The millennium brings a new look to the league with membership expansion and the introduction of a brand identity program, featuring a family of new marks. East Carolina and TCU will join the league in all sports this season and South Florida will become a football member in 2003. The new marks reflect the urban, progressive and bold nature of the C-USA brand and are part of a comprehensive marketing and promotional program designed to reinforce the conference's athletic and national emergence.

C-USA member institutions span 13 states, more than any other Division I-A conference and are located in 13 major television markets. Along with the ACC, Big East, Big Ten, Big 12, Pac-10 and SEC, Conference USA is one of the seven conferences that has significant representation in the NCAA governance structure. The conference enjoys prominent national television exposure, NCAA automatic qualifications and major bowl tie-ins.

### **Success On and Off the Playing Field**

Conference USA performers have achieved success in competition, placing the league among the top conferences in the nation. The league has consistently rated as one of the top basketball leagues in the country, producing 37 postseason teams (21 NCAA and 16 NIT). The conference also enjoys strong fan support, drawing more than 1.5 million fans each year and placing the league among the nation's best in home attendance.

C-USA football, which began competition in 1996, has rated among the top seven conferences in the nation. Thirteen football teams have earned bowl bids in the last five years, including four last season. C-USA is a member of the Bowl Championship Series, and sends its regular season champion to the AXA Liberty Bowl in Memphis, Tenn., and teams to the GMAC Bowl in Mobile, Ala., the galleryfurniture.com Bowl in Houston and the Motor City Bowl in Pontiac, Mich.

Conference USA women's sports have also enjoyed success. In women's basketball, the league has produced 22 NCAA teams in its first five campaigns, including one team in the Sweet 16, along with 10 WNIT appearances. In volleyball, the league has earned 13 NCAA bids, with Louisville reaching the Sweet 16 in 1996 and 1998.

In addition, 12 soccer teams, 14 baseball teams and five softball teams have earned NCAA Tournament bids. Last season, Tulane made its first appearance at the College World Series. C-USA has also sent two men's soccer teams to the Final Four and two teams to the Women's College World Series. The league has also had numerous NCAA individual and team competitors in golf, tennis and track and field. Overall, Conference USA teams and individuals have made more than 190 NCAA appearances.

Among C-USA's 5,000 student-athletes, there are champions off the playing field as well. In six years, 49 student-athletes earned national Verizon Academic All-America honors, while 106 were named All-District. In addition, more than 5,000 student-athletes have been named to the Commissioner's Honor Roll or received the Commissioner's Academic Medal, indicative of outstanding achievement in the classroom. The conference annually awards six postgraduate scholarships, along with the Sport Academic Award, Scholar Athletes of the Year and the Institutional Academic Excellence Award.

ESPN, Inc. and Conference USA recently entered into an exclusive eight-year agreement, beginning with the 2001 football season and the 2001-2002 basketball season. The multi-faceted agreement, which incorporates ESPN, ESPN2, ESPN Regional Television, ESPN.com and ESPN Classic, is highlighted by: ESPN/ESPN2's first-time coverage of C-USA football featuring weeknight games; televising future C-USA Football Championship Games on ABC Sports; men's basketball coverage Fridays on ESPN and Wednesdays on ESPN2; syndication and network rights for the conference's football and basketball coverage through ERT; continued exposure for women's basketball, along with volleyball, baseball, soccer and softball, as well as marketing rights.

### **A Proud History**

The conference unveiled its name, logo and commissioner on April 24, 1995 in Chicago. Mike Slive was named the first commissioner of Conference USA. Eleven of the institutions began athletic participation in 1995, while Houston joined competition in the fall of 1996. Conference USA added East Carolina (September, 1996) and the United States Military Academy (March, 1997) as football members. ECU began league competition in 1997; Army in 1998 and UAB in 1999. TCU will begin league play this season, along with ECU in all sports, and USF football in 2003.

Conference USA sponsors 19 sports - baseball, basketball, cross country, football, golf, soccer, tennis, and track and field (indoor and outdoor) for men and basketball, cross country, golf, soccer, softball, swimming, tennis, track and field (indoor and outdoor), and volleyball for women. The league's championship competition is enhanced by NCAA automatic bids in volleyball, men's and women's basketball, men's and women's soccer, men's and women's tennis and baseball.

Men's basketball competes in two divisions. Charlotte, Cincinnati, DePaul, East Carolina, Louisville, Marquette, and Saint Louis comprise the American Division, while Houston, Memphis, South Florida, Southern Miss, TCU, Tulane and UAB make up the National Division. All other sports compete in a single division.

The Presidents of the member institutions serve as Conference USA's Board of Directors. Dr. Joseph Steger of Cincinnati has served as the chair for the first four years and was succeeded by Dr. J.H. Woodward of Charlotte. In addition to Drs. Steger and Woodward, Rev. Lawrence Biondi of Saint Louis and Dr. Horace Fleming of Southern Miss serve on the Board's Executive Committee. Commissioner Slive serves on the NCAA Management Council.

## **C-USA WOMEN'S SOCCER HISTORY**

### **2000 Conference USA Women's Soccer Accomplishments:**

- Marquette became the first team in Conference USA history to finish a season nationally-ranked. The Golden Eagles were ranked 24th in the final NSCAA poll.
- Four C-USA schools (Charlotte, Cincinnati, Marquette and Saint Louis) were regionally-ranked in the final NSCAA regional polls.
- Charlotte, Cincinnati, Marquette and Saint Louis each won at least 12 matches, with Marquette winning a Conference USA record 20 times and Cincinnati posting 16 victories.
- For the third straight season, C-USA won its opening round match in the NCAA Tournament. Marquette defeated Wright State in the opening round, before falling to Texas A&M.
- UAB's Denise Peters was named to *Soccer America's* Team of the Week on October 2.
- Two players were named All-Americans.
- Seven players were named to the NSCAA All-Region teams.
- Two players were honored as Academic All-Americans.

### **Conference USA Women's Soccer History:**

- Six different schools (Charlotte, Cincinnati, Louisville, Marquette, Saint Louis and South Florida) have posted at least a share of the regular season title in the league's first six seasons.
- Three schools (Charlotte, Cincinnati and Marquette) have represented Conference USA in the NCAA Championship, with three straight opening round wins.
- Conference USA has placed 15 players on *Soccer America's* Team of the Week since 1995.

**NOTING THE 49ERS**

The 49ers will have to replace their two leading scorers from last year in two-time C-USA Player of the Year Jill Currie and Meredith Mayo. Those players combined for 17 goals and 56 points.

Junior JENNIFER HOWELL is back in goal for Charlotte this fall after posting a 1.37 GAA and 77 saves in 15 matches last year.

Forward JILL HAYES (11 points) is one of the top two returning scorers for the 49ers and was named to Conference USA's All-Freshman team after a debut season in which she netted four goals with three assists on 38 shots.

Charlotte's 2001 schedule features a match against defending national champion North Carolina in Chapel Hill on September 7, as part of the Carolina Classic Tournament. It is one of 10 road matches on the Niners slate this fall.

**NOTING THE BEARCATS**

At 16-6-0, Cincinnati was the most improved team in Conference USA last season, doubling its win total from the previous season (8-10-1). The Bearcats 9-2-0 league record kept alive the school's streak of being the only C-USA team to post a winning conference ledger each season.

The Bearcats return a pair of third team All-Conference USA selections in defender KRISTINA WILSON and goalkeeper CHRISTY HOFFMAN. Wilson keyed a UC defense that allowed more than a half a goal less per game than the previous season. Hoffman returned to action after missing the entire 1999 season with a knee injury, to post a 1.34 GAA in the regular season before being named the Most Valuable Goalkeeper at the conference tournament.

Cincinnati's incoming recruiting class includes three All-State selections. Midfielder ASHLEY ROUSH (Ohio), midfielder LISA STEPHENS (Missouri) and forward MARIE STRELKA (Connecticut) all earned that honor following the 2000 campaign.

With seven starters and 18 letterwinners returning, the Bearcats will have one of the league's most experienced teams this fall.

Entering her junior season, CHRISTY YOUNG is making her mark in the DePaul record books. She is ranked second in assists, third in scoring and fourth in goals scored.

Head coach JOHN WILSON'S first recruiting class includes four high school and a pair of junior college players.

The Blue Demons will open the season with seven of their first eight matches at home, including its first two league outings.

**NOTING THE PIRATES**

Head coach ROB DONNENWIRTH completed his second season as head coach by guiding the women's soccer team to a record of 10-7-2, marking its third consecutive 10-win season. In two seasons at the helm of East Carolina, Donnenthirth has guided the Pirates to a 21-12-3 record.

The Pirates will have to replace the most prolific player in the history of ECU women's soccer, Kim Sandhoff. A two-time all-region performer and school record holder in every major offensive category, Sandhoff finished the 2000 campaign with 15 assists (0.79 per game, fifth-best in the country). However, ECU had six freshman who were starters by the end of the season and will return one of its top players in redshirt junior AMANDA DUFFY who sat out the 2000 campaign with a knee injury. Together they will try and make up for the loss of Sandhoff and the three other seniors.

ECU will have 29 members on this year's squad, however, of the 29 members, four are seniors, two are juniors and the rest are comprised of sophomores and freshmen. The Pirates return nine starters from its 10-win team in 2000.

Defender MINDY NIXON is coming off of one of the best freshman years in women's soccer history at ECU. Nixon became the first freshman since 1997 to be voted to the all-conference team (second). She led all defenders with a goal, three assists and five points on the campaign.

**NOTING THE HORNED FROGS**

Junior forward SHERRY DICK'S team-high 11 goals last season tied her with Jill Cook (1997) and Jennifer Thompson (1992) for the second most goals in one season by a Horned Frog. Dick's 15 goals in two seasons has her on pace to break Sarah Campbell's school-record 24 goals. Campbell played for the Frogs from 1986-89.

Sophomore goalkeeper SHANNON WAGNER certainly made an impact on TCU in her first season last year, starting all 20 games for TCU en route to her 116 saves, 1.55 goals-against average and six shutouts. Wagner's 116 saves broke the previous mark for a TCU freshman held by Maribeth Forrest (115 in 1987).

Since TCU began its inaugural season for women's soccer in 1986, the face of their head coach has remained the same ever since: Dave Rubinson. Rubinson graduated from TCU in 1977 with a B.A. in political science and has also served as the head coach for the men's program since 1981.

With a total of 13 juniors and seniors on this year's squad, Rubinson will be guiding one of his most experienced teams yet. The Horned Frogs 10-9-1 record last year was their first winning season since 1994, and with the amount of depth on this year's team, they will look for back-to-back winning seasons for only the second time in school history (1987-88).
