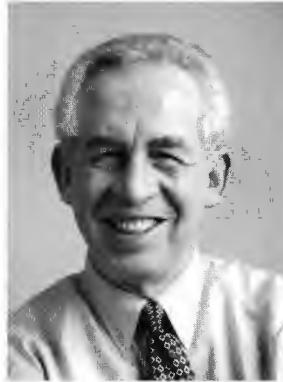

CONFERENCE HISTORY

In the world of intercollegiate sports, many considered the formation of Conference USA a bold move. Its formation occurred during a significant period of major conference realignment and restructuring of the NCAA. C-USA established a strong foundation while quickly earning a reputation of successfully competing at the highest levels of intercollegiate athletics. Capitalizing on the strengths of its 15 distinguished and diverse universities, Conference USA has quickly emerged as one of the nation's top conferences.

The millennium brings a new look to the league with membership expansion and the introduction of a brand identity program, featuring a family of new marks. East Carolina and TCU will join the league in all sports this season and South Florida will become a football member in 2003. The new marks reflect the urban, progressive and bold nature of the C-USA brand and are part of a comprehensive marketing and promotional program designed to reinforce the conference's athletic and national emergence.

C-USA member institutions span 13 states, more than any other Division I-A conference and are located in 13 major television markets. Along with the ACC, Big East, Big Ten, Big 12, Pac-10 and SEC, Conference USA is one of the seven conferences that has significant representation in the NCAA governance structure. The conference enjoys prominent national television exposure, NCAA automatic qualifications and major bowl tie-ins.

Success On and Off the Playing Field

Conference USA performers have achieved success in competition, placing the league among the top conferences in the nation. The league has consistently rated as one of the top basketball leagues in the country, producing 44 postseason teams (24 NCAA and 20 NIT). The conference also enjoys strong fan support, drawing more than 1.5 million fans each year and placing the league among the nation's best in home attendance.

C-USA football, which began competition in 1996, has rated among the top seven conferences in the nation. Thirteen football teams have earned bowl bids in the last five years. C-USA is a member of the Bowl Championship Series, and sends its regular season champion to the AXA Liberty Bowl in Memphis, Tenn., and teams to the GMAC Bowl in Mobile, Ala., the Houston Bowl and the New Orleans Bowl.

Conference USA women's sports have also enjoyed success. In women's basketball, the league has produced 25 NCAA teams in its first seven campaigns, including one team in the Sweet 16, along with 13 WNIT appearances. In volleyball, the league has earned 16 NCAA bids, with Louisville reaching the Sweet 16 in 1996 and 1998.

In addition, 18 men's and women's soccer teams, 14 baseball teams and five softball teams have earned NCAA Tournament bids. Last season, Tulane made its first appearance at the College World Series. C-USA has also sent two men's soccer teams to the Final Four and two teams to the Women's College World Series. The league has also had numerous NCAA individual and team competitors in golf, tennis and track and field. Overall, Conference USA teams and individuals have made more than 190 NCAA appearances.

Among C-USA's 5,000 student-athletes, there are champions off the playing field as well. In six years,

49 student-athletes earned national Verizon Academic All-America honors, while 106 were named All-District. In addition, more than 5,000 student-athletes have been named to the Commissioner's Honor Roll or received the Commissioner's Academic Medal, indicative of outstanding achievement in the classroom. The conference annually awards six postgraduate scholarships, along with the Sport Academic Award, Scholar Athletes of the Year and the Institutional Academic Excellence Award.

ESPN, Inc. and Conference USA recently entered into an exclusive eight-year agreement, beginning with the 2001 football season and the 2001-2002 basketball season. The multi-faceted agreement, which incorporates ESPN, ESPN2, ESPN Regional Television, ESPN.com and ESPN Classic, is highlighted by: ESPN/ESPN2's first-time coverage of C-USA football featuring weeknight games; televising future C-USA Football Championship Games on ABC Sports; men's basketball coverage Fridays on ESPN and Wednesdays on ESPN2; syndication and network rights for the conference's football and basketball coverage through ERT; continued exposure for women's basketball, along

with volleyball, baseball, soccer and softball, as well as marketing rights.

A Proud History

The conference unveiled its name, logo and commissioner on April 24, 1995 in Chicago. Mike Slive was named the first commissioner of Conference USA. Eleven of the institutions began athletic participation in 1995, while Houston joined competition in the fall of 1996. Conference USA added East Carolina (September, 1996) and the United States Military Academy (March, 1997) as football members. ECU began league competition in 1997; Army in 1998 and UAB in 1999. TCU began league play this season, along with ECU in all sports, and USF football will play in 2003.

Conference USA sponsors 19 sports - baseball, basketball, cross country, football, golf, soccer, tennis, and track and field (indoor and outdoor) for men and basketball, cross country, golf, soccer, softball, swimming, tennis, track and field (indoor and outdoor), and volleyball for women. The league's championship competition is enhanced by NCAA automatic bids in volleyball, men's and women's basketball, men's and women's soccer, men's and women's tennis and baseball.

Men's basketball competes in two divisions. Charlotte, Cincinnati, DePaul, East Carolina, Louisville, Marquette, and Saint Louis comprise the American Division, while Houston, Memphis, South Florida, Southern Miss, TCU, Tulane and UAB make up the National Division. All other sports compete in a single division.

The Presidents of the member institutions serve as Conference USA's Board of Directors. Dr. Joseph Steger of Cincinnati has served as the chair for the first four years and was succeeded by Dr. J.H. Woodward of Charlotte.

Loren Hibbs is in his 10th season as the 49ers' skipper with a baseball program ranked among Baseball America's top 100 collegiate baseball programs in the country. And, he already has two regular season conference titles, one conference tournament title and two NCAA Tournament appearances among his coaching accomplishments.

Hibbs arrived in Charlotte after serving as an assistant coach at his alma mater, Wichita State. He was hired as head coach of the Charlotte baseball program on February 26, 1992, and has taken the 49ers to places they had never been in their first 14 years.

Hibbs took the 49ers to their first NCAA Tournament in 1993 and guided them to their first-ever conference tournament championship with the 1993 Metro Tournament title. He led the 49ers to back-to-back conference regular season titles with the 1994 and 1995 Metro regular season crowns.

He is the all-time winningest coach in 49er history. The 49ers first-place league finish in 1994 earned him Metro Conference Coach of the Year. During the 1998 season, the 49ers won a school-record 43 games and advanced to the NCAA Tournament for the second time. As the 49ers were winning the 43 games, he garnered Conference USA Coach of the Year honors.

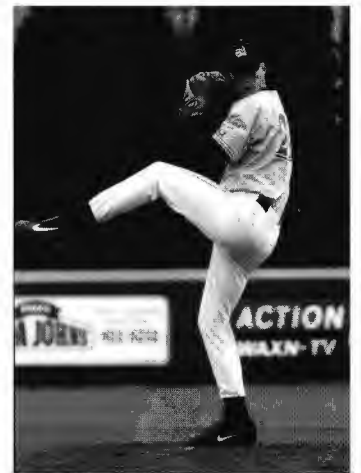

► John Maine is fourth on Charlotte's all-time career strikeout list.

► Earlier this season Charlotte coach Loren Hibbs became the 49ers' all-time winningest coach.

► Brad Lamm and George Sandel have had double-figure hitting streaks this season. Lamm's hitting streak ended at 22 games which ties him for the third longest hitting streak in school history. Sandel's hitting streak ended at 14 games.

Brian Cleary has reversed the fortunes of the baseball program during his six seasons as head coach at the University of Cincinnati. Cleary took over a struggling program in 1997 and has made it one of the fastest rising teams in the country.

The 33-year-old Cleary is regarded by many as one of the top young coaches in the country. Last year Baseball America named Cleary one of the 10 coaches on the rise in Division I. He already ranks second on the school's all-time wins list.

Cleary made an immediate impact upon joining the Bearcat family. After inheriting a team that won only five games in 1996, Cleary pushed his teams to increased win totals each of his first four years. After winning 12 games in his first year, he increased that total to 15 in 1998, 30 in 1999 and 35 in 2000.

Cleary came to UC after three seasons as an assistant at Tulane, where he helped the Green Wave to a 116-70 mark and two NCAA tournament appearances.

Cleary spent two seasons as assistant coach and recruiting coordinator at Notre Dame under current Arizona State head coach Pat Murphy.

Cleary launched his career as an assistant at Louisville in 1991, helping the Cardinals improve from a 15-29-1 record to a 32-30 ledger the next year.

OTHER FACTS

► Cincinnati tied the Conference USA record for home runs with eight against South Florida on April 12.

► In UC's 12-1 win over Xavier on April 10, the Bearcats smacked a school-record nine doubles, breaking the mark of seven set against Charlotte in 2001.

► On Sunday, March 17 the Bearcats tied East Carolina, 5-5, in 10 innings. The game was ended so the Pirates could make their plane back to North Carolina. It was the first time UC recorded a tie since a 6-6 deadlock in 11 innings against Ohio State in 1984. UC has tied just 11 games since 1959.

Winning consistently is not something that comes easy, but East Carolina University head coach Keith LeClair has made it look simple in his 11 seasons as a Division I head coach.

During his career, LeClair, 36, has led his team to seven NCAA Regional Tournaments, six conference tournament championships and five regular-season conference crowns. He has also had numerous all-league and All-America selections while having several players chosen in the Major League Baseball Draft.

LeClair joined the program in the summer of 1997 after six seasons at the helm of his alma mater, Western Carolina University. His immediate goal was to help ECU reclaim its place among the top programs in the nation and LeClair, along with his staff, quickly put ECU back into the national spotlight.

He has not gone without accolades of his own at ECU as he was named both CAA Coach of the Year and the ABCA's East Region Coach of the Year in 1999 and 2001.

LeClair started the Pirates' return to the national spotlight in 1999 when he helped ECU to its second-best record in school history and a berth in the NCAA Tournament--ECU's first in six seasons. The impact of head coach Rayner Noble on the baseball program at his alma mater, the University of Houston, is easy to see.

In the win column, in the NCAA Tournament bids, in the major league draft and in the classroom, Cougar baseball has reached soaring heights with Noble at the helm of the program. His sixth season with the Cougars in 2000 was simply off the charts.

In orchestrating all the myriad of components necessary for a successful season, the program had its best year in over 30 years that culminated with the team coming within one run of reaching the College World Series on the last day of the year.

In the fall of 1987 he returned to UH as an assistant coach under Bragg Stockton. By 1990, with Noble coaching the pitchers and playing a major role in recruiting, the Cougars recorded one of the most successful seasons in years, finishing third in the NCAA South Regional Tournament in Baton Rouge, Louisiana.

After a brief stint in the minor leagues, Noble returned to UH in 1987 as an assistant coach and held that position for four years, before moving crosstown to Rice University in a similar role. Noble returned to his alma mater as head coach in 1994.

Lelo Prado will begin his seventh season at the helm of the Louisville Cardinals. His first six seasons produced the highest win total to begin a tenure in school history, he picked up his 400th career win during the 2000 season, became the first coach in school history with three thirty-win seasons and moved into second all-time at Louisville in wins behind the legendary Dr. John Heldman Jr.

This summer he will be guiding the USA Baseball National team as its Head Coach. The team will be selected from 40 invitees and will first play a series with the team from Japan at sites across the east coast of the USA. They will then travel to the Honkbal Tournament in The Netherlands before competing in the first ever World Championship in Italy.

In 2000 he was one of three assistant coaches on the under-22 USA National Team, which posted an all-time best 27-3-1 record. Prado served on the USA Baseball selection committee from 1995-1998 and helped select the '96 Olympic bronze medal winning squad.

When he was hired in June of 1995, Prado's credentials to lead a baseball team were clear, having won NCAA Division II baseball national championships in 1992 and 1993 with the University of Tampa. He averaged nearly 40 wins a season in his seven years at Tampa.

After the Tigers had posted four losing seasons in the last five years and also a school-worst 15-37 showing one year prior to his arrival, Anderson promptly grabbed the reins at his former school and never looked back. Stocked with a team that resembled a near mirror image of the 2000 squad, the first year skipper managed to squeeze out an amazing 34-24 finish and, following a one-year absence, notched the program's first-ever semi-final appearance at the C-USA postseason tournament.

Memphis' 26-game turnaround was the best in NCAA Division I during 2001. A major component for the Tigers' success was due to a high-powered offense which, under Anderson's guidance, finished the season ranked among the league's top four in home runs (70), RBI (361), slugging percentage (.457) and runs scored (387). Anderson's first squad also produced three MLB Amateur Draft picks and an All-American.

After spending 10 years as a player in the Major Leagues, Anderson served as a manager in the minor leagues for six years in the Detroit Tigers' organization before returning to his alma mater.

Anderson played just two seasons for the Tigers before being selected by the Los Angeles Dodgers in the 1981 MLB Amateur Draft.

► The Tigers played 14 of their home games at AutoZone Park, the state-of-the-art Triple-A ballpark in downtown Memphis.

► Since a 7-1 loss to No. 9 Ole Miss on April 9, Tiger skipper Dave Anderson has gone to his freshman class. Since that afternoon in Oxford, Miss., the Tigers have not started less than four freshmen per outing.

► Freshman shortstop Brent Dlugach is the son of University of Memphis Hall of Famer Mike Dlugach, a former Tiger catcher and four-time First-Team All-Metro Conference selection. The Elder Dlugach was drafted by the Chicago White Sox in 1973 and played as high as Class AAA before his playing career came to an end. Brent leads the Tigers in home runs.

In his second decade at Saint Louis University, head coach Bob Hughes has worked tirelessly to bring respectability back to Billiken baseball. In 1996, the Billikens earned their first winning season in 19 years and in 1999 reached the semifinals of the Conference USA Tournament. Despite last season's downturn, Saint Louis has hit the 20-win plateau six times during the past eight years. The team missed the mark by a single victory last season.

The 48-year old Belleville, Ill., native came to Saint Louis from Belleville Area College, where he helped guide BAC to the Junior College World Series in 1984. Before his stint at BAC, he was the head coach at Jefferson Community College, where his two-year record was 54-28.

Saint Louis reached 25 wins in 1996, the highest win total for a Billiken team in 14 years. Hughes earned his 100th victory during the 1994 season and now has an overall coaching mark at the University of 187-231-1 over 10 seasons.

Hughes broke into the coaching ranks as an assistant at his alma mater, Southern Illinois University-Edwardsville. During each of his seasons at SIU-E, 1975 and 1976, the Cougars advanced to the NCAA Division II World Series.

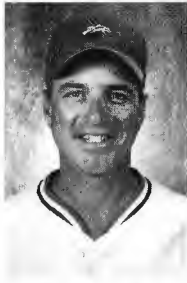
► Junior RHP Corey Lawson threw five consecutive complete games earlier this season.

USF began its baseball program in 1966 and Eddie Cardieri has been the head coach for over half of the program's existence, 20 years (17 as head coach, three as an assistant coach).

Cardieri, who was the top assistant to Hall of Famer Robin Roberts three seasons before assuming control in 1986, surpassed the 500th win plateau in 1999 and led the program to its 1,000th win in 2000. In 2001 the Bulls returned to the NCAA tournament for the first time in four seasons.

While the numbers indicate longevity in the coaching ranks (the 2002 season is his 25th of coaching), they also indicate a great deal of success.

USF's all-time winningest coach has guided the program to eight of its nine NCAA Tournament appearances. The Bulls have played in four of the past six NCAA Tournaments.

Cardieri owns school records for wins in a season (52 in 1986), games coached (976), NCAA Tournament appearances (8) and highest ranking (No. 1 in 1989).

Cardieri joined the USF coaching staff in 1983 as Roberts' top assistant. When Roberts retired following the 1985 campaign, Cardieri was promoted to head coach and led the Bulls to championship game of the NCAA South II Regional in just his first year.

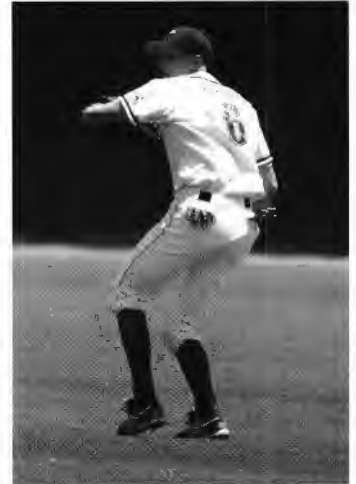

While his coaching career has not been limited just to the Hattiesburg area, the name Carlton Devan "Corky" Palmer is, however, irrevocably linked with the Hub City, and in particular, baseball in the Hub City.

Palmer started with a successful high school playing career at Hattiesburg High School and then enhanced his reputation as a player with a four-year stint as a catcher for legendary Golden Eagle coach Pete Taylor at Southern Miss.

A Hattiesburg native, who lettered three years at Hattiesburg High and graduated in 1972, Palmer played four seasons for Taylor, where he was the starting catcher his final three seasons. As a team captain his senior season, Corky began paving the way for an eventual career in coaching.

With his undergraduate degree in athletic administration and coaching in hand, Palmer took his talents to the high school ranks, where at Columbus' Lee High School and Columbus High, his teams consistently won conference titles and were in the state playoffs. In his six years at the high school level, his teams posted an impressive 102-52 record.

In 1987, Palmer was named head coach at Meridian Community College before coming back to USM as an assistant in 1997 and taking the reigns as head coach in 1998.

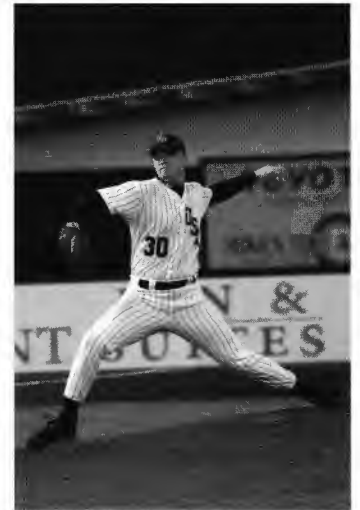

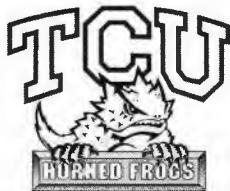

Lance Brown, TCU's all-time winningest coach, is in his 16th season as the Horned Frogs' head mentor.

When the Horned Frogs step on the field, they are as intense a team as there is in the country. Never afraid to play the top teams in the nation, Brown's Frogs have posted 19 wins in the last three seasons over nationally ranked opponents (entering 2002).

Win or lose, Brown's teams have carried themselves with class, both on and off the field. The mark of a good program is one that knows how to handle success and failure. Why does Brown operate with such intensity and class? It is all because of his love for the game of baseball.

Brown has played a large role in the success of TCU baseball. En route to All-America honors in 1963, he pitched the Horned Frogs to the 1963 SWC championship. Thirty-one years later, he guided the Frogs to the 1994 SWC title as the head coach, making him one of only two men to win SWC Player and Coach of the Year.

When Brown took over as TCU's head baseball coach in May 1986, he inherited a program that was making its fourth coaching change in 11 years, one which, during that same timespan, had only five winning seasons and its best finish in the Southwest Conference had been sixth.

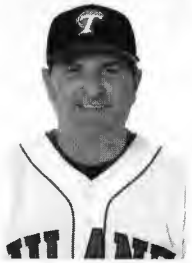
► Head Coach Lance Brown reached a milestone on March 9 vs. Texas-Pan American when he reached his 900th game as TCU's head mentor.

He has led his Tulane team to the NCAA Regionals in six of his eight seasons in the Green Wave dugout. He has helped Tulane win three Conference USA regular-season championships, and the team has won the league tournament title on four occasions. To date, the crowning achievement for Jones and the Tulane program came during the 2001 season, as the Green Wave earned its first-ever NCAA Regional Championship, Super Regional Championship and subsequent trip to the College World Series.

Jones has earned a pair of Conference USA Coach of the Year titles and was named Louisiana Coach of the Year three times. Following the 2001 season, Jones also earned his first national coach of the year award at the highest level of collegiate competition when he was named the American Baseball Coaches Association/Diamond Sport Company Division I South Region Coach of the Year.

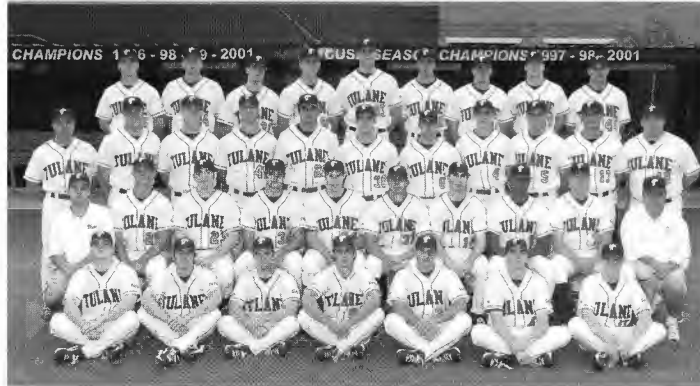

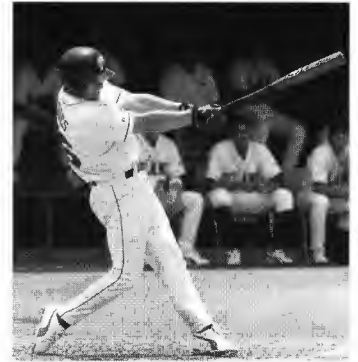

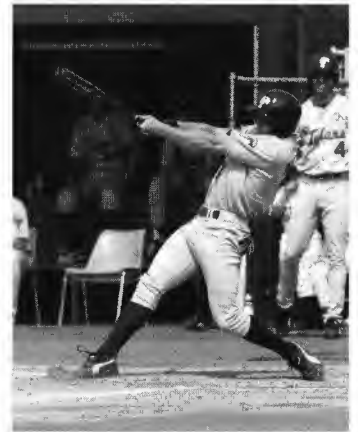

The Trojan recorded eight consecutive winning seasons under his tutelage and captured the 1998 Alabama Junior and Community College Conference championship.

Giangrosso was twice named the AJCCA Coach of the Year and led his team to three consecutive Central Division titles (1992-94).

During his nine seasons there, 90 of his 102 lettermen earned scholarships to four-year schools and all 102 of his student-athletes earned their degrees.
