CONCUSSION PREVENTION

The results of the Ivy League experimental kickoff rule study were published in the prestigious Journal of the American Medical Association on Oct. 1. In two seasons under the rule, the Ivy League has seen a 68 percent reduction in concussions on kickoffs.

NON-CONFERENCE MARK

The Ivy League boasts a 15-5 non-conference mark and is searching for its fourth-straight season with a .500-or-better non-conference record heading into the final weekend of non-League play. The League currently paces the FCS and ranks second in NCAA Division I—trailing only the SEC (.872)—with a .750 non-conference record.

FRIDAY NIGHT FOOTBALL

The Ivy League's six-game national television package, featuring all eight Ivy League programs, continues on Friday, Oct. 19, when Penn hosts reigning Ivy League champion Yale. The game will be broadcast on ESPNU, beginning at 7 p.m. ET.

ROOTED IN IVY

A record 28 Ivies participated in NFL training camps this season, with 21 earning roster spots entering the 2018 campaign. Ten Ivies saw game action during Week 5 of the 2018 NFL season, including seven that started for their respective teams.

Linebacker Foye Oluokun made his first career NFL regular-season start for the Atlanta Falcons.

CUTTING EDGE

Dartmouth hired Callie Brownson to be its offensive quality control coach entering the 2018 season. With the hiring, Brownson became the first known full-time female football coach at the NCAA Division I level.

NFL Commissioner Roger Goodell visited Callie Brownson and the Big Green on Saturday, Sept. 29, when Dartmouth bested Penn, 37-14, in League play.

PRESEASON POLL

Yale was picked to defend its Ivy League crown in the 2018 Ivy League Football Preseason Media Poll. The Bulldogs, who are coming off their first outright League title since 1980, received 11-of-17 first-place votes and accumulated 129 points. Yale will be searching for back-to-back Ivy League titles for the first time since a run of three-straight from 1979-81. To do so, the Bulldogs will rely heavily on sophomore running back Zane Dudek, who earned Ivy League Rookie of the Year honors in 2017 after becoming the first true freshman to lead the Ivy League in rushing with 1,133 yards.

The reigning League champions got the nod over Princeton, which returns 2016 Ivy League Offensive Player of the Year senior quarterback John Lovett and finished with three first-place votes and 104 points, and rival Harvard, which received a first-place vote and tallied 99 points.

To determine the all-time Top 100, the AP formula counted poll appearances (one point) to mark consistency, No. 1 rankings (two points) to acknowledge elite programs and gave a bonus for AP championships (10 points).

Penn led the Ivies, tallying 89 points to come in at No. 66. The Quakers were followed by Cornell (55 points, No. 72), Dartmouth (37 points, No. 87), Yale (30 points, No. 90), Princeton (29 points, No. 91) and Columbia (16 points, No. 99).

The Ivy League is the only FCS conference with six representatives on the top 100 list, followed by the Patriot and Colonial with two each and the NEC with one. The Ancient Eight is one of seven conferences overall with at least six representatives, joining American (8), ACC (14), Big 12 (10), Big Ten (14), Mountain West (7), Pac 12 (12) and SEC (14).

SCORING CONSISTENCY

Harvard has been a model of consistency on offense, especially when it comes to reaching the end zone over the past 19 seasons. The Crimson currently owns a consecutive scoring streak of 193 games. With its Oct. 18, 2014, win over Cornell, Harvard reset the Ivy League's consecutive points-scoring streak. The last time the Crimson failed to scratch the scoreboard was Sept. 19, 1998, in a 24-0 loss at Columbia. The previous record of 162-straight games without being shutout was held by Brown, which had its scoring streak halted on Oct. 13, 2012, in 19-0 defeat at Princeton. Penn had its 136-game scoring streak come to an end in a 6-0 loss to Brown on Oct. 29, 2011.

ENCOURAGING RESULTS FROM EXPERIMENTAL KICKOFF RULE

The Ivy League's experimental rule for conference matchups-only with kickoffs from the 40-yard line and touchbacks placed at the 20-yard line in an effort to reduce concussions and further promote the safety and welfare of its student-athletes saw positive results in 2016.

After averaging six concussions per year during the Ivy League conference slate the previous three seasons, athletes suffered zero concussions on kickoff plays in 2016.

The Ivy League's has yet to publish results from the 2017 season, but is again using the experimental rule in 2018.

The NCAA granted the League's request to implement the experimental rule for the 2016 season, moving kickoffs up five yards from the 35-yard line to the 40. The goal of the rule was to limit kickoff returns, which accounted for 23.4 percent of concussions during games despite representing only 5.8 percent of overall plays.

Despite averaging fewer kickoffs per game than the rest of FCS, the Ivy League more than doubled the amount of kickoffs into the end zone with its experimental rule, and nearly doubled the average touchbacks per game. Kicking from the 40-yard line enabled Ivy League kickers to record touchbacks 44.1 percent of the time, well ahead of the rest of FCS. The number of kicks returned dropped 15.2 percent in 2016, below that of the FCS, which stayed essentially the same.

The Ivy League complemented the experimental rule with a policy that originated from the League's eight head football coaches to eliminate to-the-ground ("live") tackling in practices during the regular season, which also went into effect with the 2016 campaign.

Both the kickoff rule and the tackling policy are part of The Ivy League's overall review of concussions, which began with football in 2010. The Ivy League expanded the review to include eight other sports (men's and women's lacrosse, men's and women's ice hockey, men's and women's soccer, wrestling and rugby). As a result of this comprehensive review of concussions, the League began an all-sports concussion data collection and study in 2013.

IVIES IN THE NFL

Twenty-one Ivies earned National Football League (NFL) roster spots entering the 2018 season, including 18 that will don NFL uniforms during the league's opening weekend as part of their team's 53-man active roster.

The active roster total includes a trio of rookies that will get their first taste of NFL regular-season action—Richard Jarvis, Foye Oluokun and Justin Watson. Watson (Tampa Bay Buccaneers) and Oluokun (Atlanta Falcons) were selected in the 2018 NFL Draft, while Jarvis (Atlanta Falcons) was a free-agent signing.

Harvard paces all Ivies—and all Football Championship Subdivision (FCS) programs—with eight alumni on NFL active rosters: Cameron Brate (Tampa Bay Buccaneers), Ben Braunecker (Chicago Bears), Anthony Firkser (Tennessee Titans), Ryan Fitzpatrick (Tampa Bay Buccaneers), Kyle Juszczyk (San Francisco 49ers), Tyler Ott (Seattle Seahawks), Adam Redmond (Dallas Cowboys) and Cole Toner (Los Angeles Chargers).

Fitzpatrick—who is entering his 14th season in the league—is the elder statesman among the Ivies in the NFL. Nick Easton (Minnesota Vikings) also represents the Crimson on the Vikings injured reserve list, but will likely be sidelined for the entirety of the 2018 season after surgery on a herniated disk in his neck.

Brown and Penn join Harvard in claiming multiple alumni on NFL opening weekend rosters. The Bears boast a pair of two-time Super Bowl champions in Zak DeOssie (New York Giants) and James Develin (New England Patriots), along with Falcons rookie Jarvis. Brandon Copeland (New York Jets) and Greg Van Roten (Carolina Panthers) join Buccaneers rookie Watson in representing the Quakers.

Columbia and Cornell are each represented by a sixth-year pro—Josh Martin (New York Jets) for the Lions and JC Tretter (Cleveland Browns) for the Big Red.

Princeton's Seth DeValve (Cleveland Browns) and Yale's Oluokun (Atlanta Falcons) round out the 18 lvies on NFL active rosters. The Tigers' Charles Kanoff (Arizona Cardinals) and Bulldogs' Jaeden Graham (Atlanta Falcons)—both rookies—landed slots on NFL 10-man practice squads, bringing the total number of lvies on NFL active rosters, injured reserve lists and practice squads to 21.

This follows a record 28-player training camp tally that topped the historic highwater mark set in 2017.

Ivy League football alumni dot 13-of-32 NFL active rosters. Four teams claim multiple Ivies heading into the opening weekend of the 2018 season: Tampa Bay Buccaneers (3), Atlanta Falcons (2), Cleveland Browns (2) and New York Jets (2).

Twelve Ivies appeared on NFL active rosters during the 2017 season, with Develin and Juszczyk earning Pro Bowl nods and Develin competing in his third Super Bowl for the New England Patriots.
