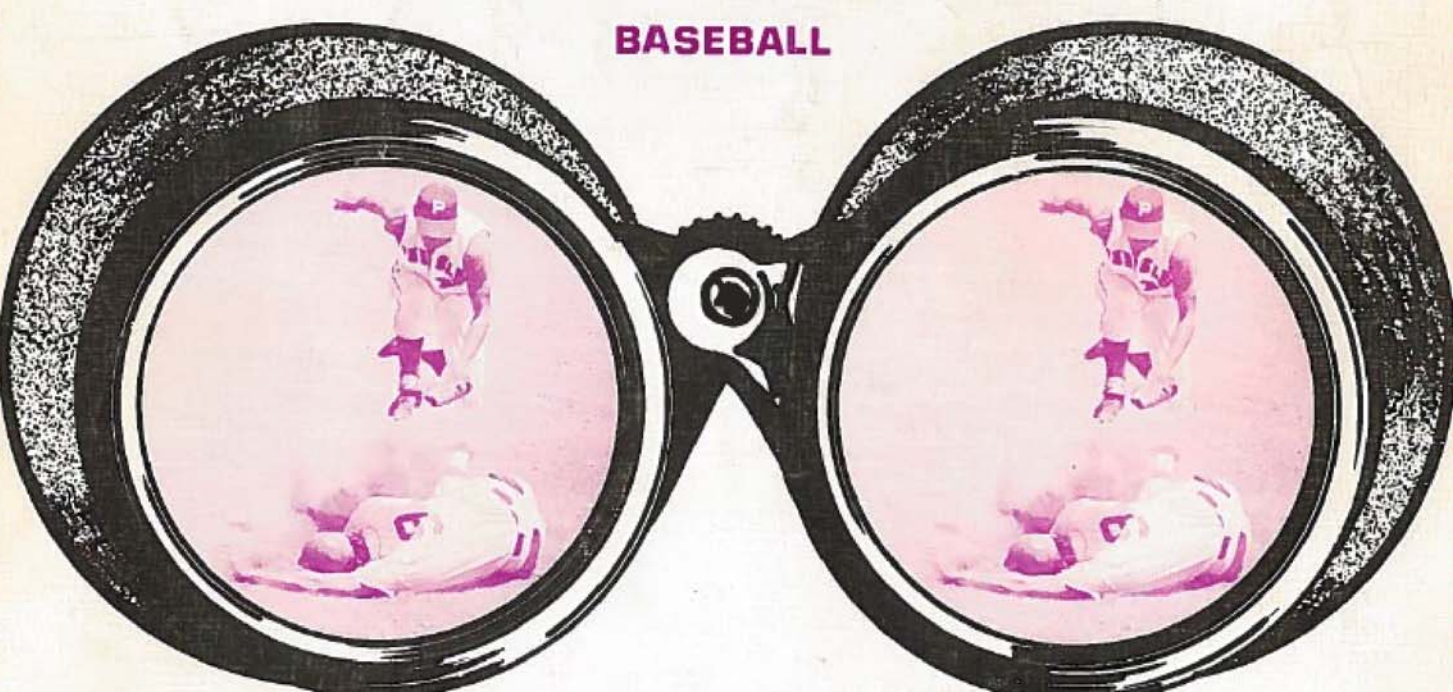

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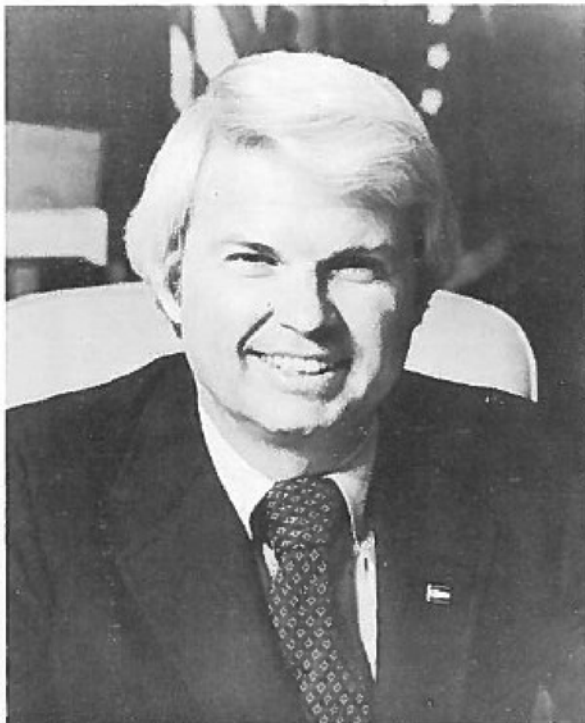

Middle Georgia Warriors Repeat as Champs

The 1980 JUCO World Series had a familiar ring to it. Fans flocked to the week-long National Junior College Baseball Tournament in record numbers to see a near rerun of the 1979 tournament. The Middle Georgia Warriors, national champions of 1979, returned to Grand Junction in 1980, and Coach Robert Sapp's Warriors left Grand Junction in 1980 as they had arrived—as national champions.

The Warriors successfully defended their national championship with a devastating 18-8 victory over Cleveland State of Tennessee in the 1980 championship game. The final game victory avenged Middle Georgia's 8-6 loss to Cleveland State earlier in the double-elimination tournament.

The repeat title performance for Middle Georgia was the first such accomplishment since 1970-71-72 when Mesa (Ariz.) won three consecutive national titles.

The Middle Georgia Warriors from the Southeastern Region relied on an awesome hitting display to retain the national championship. In the final game, Middle Georgia ripped Cleveland State pitchers for 18 hits, including five home runs.

The Warriors, who ended the 1980 season with an impressive 48-3 overall record, also finished the season with a cool .315 team batting average.

Despite finishing as the runner-up team, Cleveland State still produced the 1980 tournament's most valuable player in rightfielder Greg Geren. The right-handed hitter won the MVP trophy after breaking the tournament record for runs-batted-in with 18, eclipsing the previous record of 15, set by Dan Townsend of Yavapai (Ariz.) in 1977. Geren, who hit .393 in the 1980 JUCO World Series, also led the tournament in hits with 11 and total bases with 23.

Geren, of course, led the selections to the 1980 all-tournament team. He was joined by Cleveland State teammates Wes Ivey (first base), Billy Butler (shortstop) and Keith Sloan (third base) on the all-tourney squad.

Middle Georgia also was well represented on the all-tourney team with popular centerfielder Tommy Dunbar leading the selections. Dunbar, the 1979 tourney's MVP hit an even .500 in the series, collecting 10 hits in 20

official at-bats.

Dunbar was selected to the all-star team with teammates Ernie Riles (shortstop), Steve Davis (left field), Bobby Roche (right field) and Mike Swain (catcher).

Riles also was named the tournament's outstanding defensive player.

The leading hitter in the 1980 tournament was Stan Claxton of McLennan (Texas). Claxton hit .563 as McLennan finished third in the 1980 tourney.

Despite the wealth of offensive talent on display in 1980, JUCO fans insisted in talking about pitchers. First and foremost on the list was McLennan righthander Craig McMurtry, who was named the tournament's top pitcher. The 6-6 McMurtry finished with an earned-run average of 1.14 in 23-1/3 innings of tournament pitching.

He also signed a professional baseball contract with the Atlanta Braves organization immediately following the 1980 tournament.

But McMurtry had quality company in a pair of pitchers from Seminole (Okla.), the fourth-place finisher in 1980. Jimmy Darnell and Steve True each produced impressive statistics in the 1980 tourney, with Darnell collecting a 1.59 ERA for 11 innings of tourney work and True compiling a 0.00 ERA with a 7-inning shutout.

In all, four records were either tied or broken in the 1980 JUCO World Series, with runner-up Cleveland State involved in all of them.

The Cleveland, Tenn., club scored 63 runs in the tournament, which broke the 6-game runs-scored record of 59 set by Middle Georgia in 1979.

Cleveland State shortstop Butler, tied the tournament record for individual runs scored with 13. The previous record was set in 1977 by Marc Goodson of Dekalb (Ga.).

In addition, Cleveland State had 23 hits in a 22-14 win over Linn-Benton of Oregon in the 1980 tournament, breaking the previous record of 20 hits in one game, shared by Trinidad (Colo., 1962), and Miami-Dade (Fla., 1964).

Tournament MVP Geren also made the record books with his 18-RBI performance in six tourney games, breaking the previous record of 15.

Tom Gorman — Gets last two words

Larry Wood of the Boston Globe said, "he is the consummate cleanup hitter in any lineup of after dinner speakers."

The famed sports writer of the New York Times, Red Smith said, "he has a million stories but he has the last two words in any argument — Get Out!"

These two sportswriters were talking about Tom Gorman, the former national league umpire who was the featured speaker at the National Junior College Baseball Tournament Banquet held Friday night.

Gorman handles special assignments for the National League these days and most of them involve public speaking. He retired in 1976 after 25 years in the majors, five World Series, two championship series and four all-star games.

Gorman had the reputation as a highly unpopular guy with the fans, and easy-going umpire who was behind the plate when Don Larson tossed his World Series perfect game, also when Warren Spahn and Lew Burdette fashioned no-hitters.

"What you have to know about baseball," he explained, "is that there's no such thing as a tie. Anytime a play's that close, call 'em out! It makes the game shorter," Gorman explained at a recent dinner.

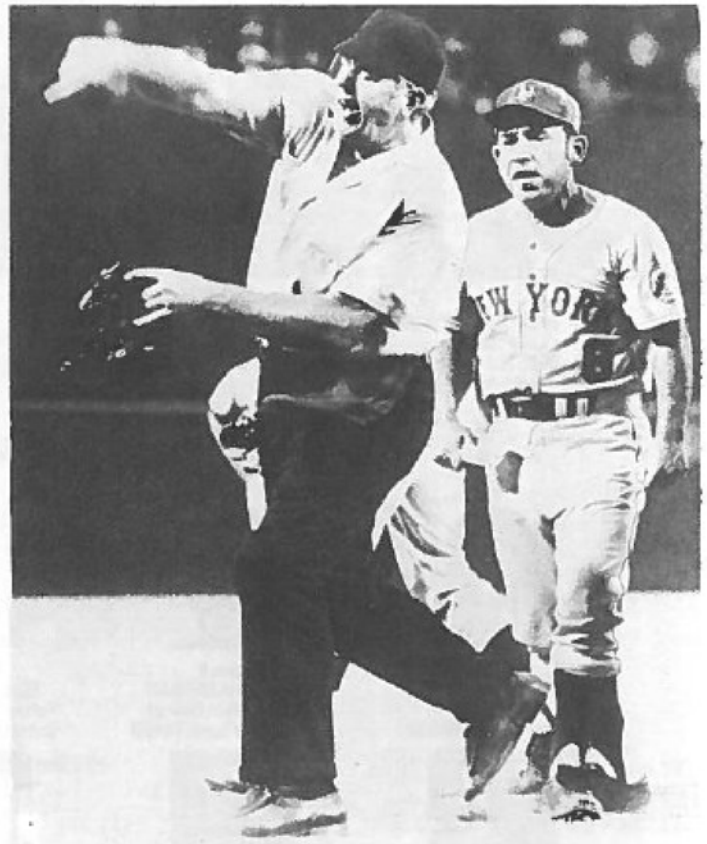
Another favorite story of Gorman's deals with former New York Mets manager, Yogi Berra. Berra was always reshuffling his lineup all the time and never would announce it to me. I always was yelling, "hey Yogi, where do you want to put 'em? And he would shrug and yell back, "be my guest." I won four or five games for him that season."

The best of Gorman, of course, has to do with Leo Durocher, the umpire's best friend.

"Everybody asks me how I feel about Durocher, and I tell 'em about the day the medics performed a heart bypass on him. I thought I'd give him a call but he was still under sedation so I left my number.

A few hours later he calls back flabbergasted. "Hey Tom," he said "I can't believe you called me. What do you want?" And I said, "I wanted to see if you were dead." End of conversation.

Gorman not only was a great umpire, he is also an author in addition to his humorous speaking ability. His book "Three and Two" is filled with stories similar to what many of you heard Friday night at the banquet.

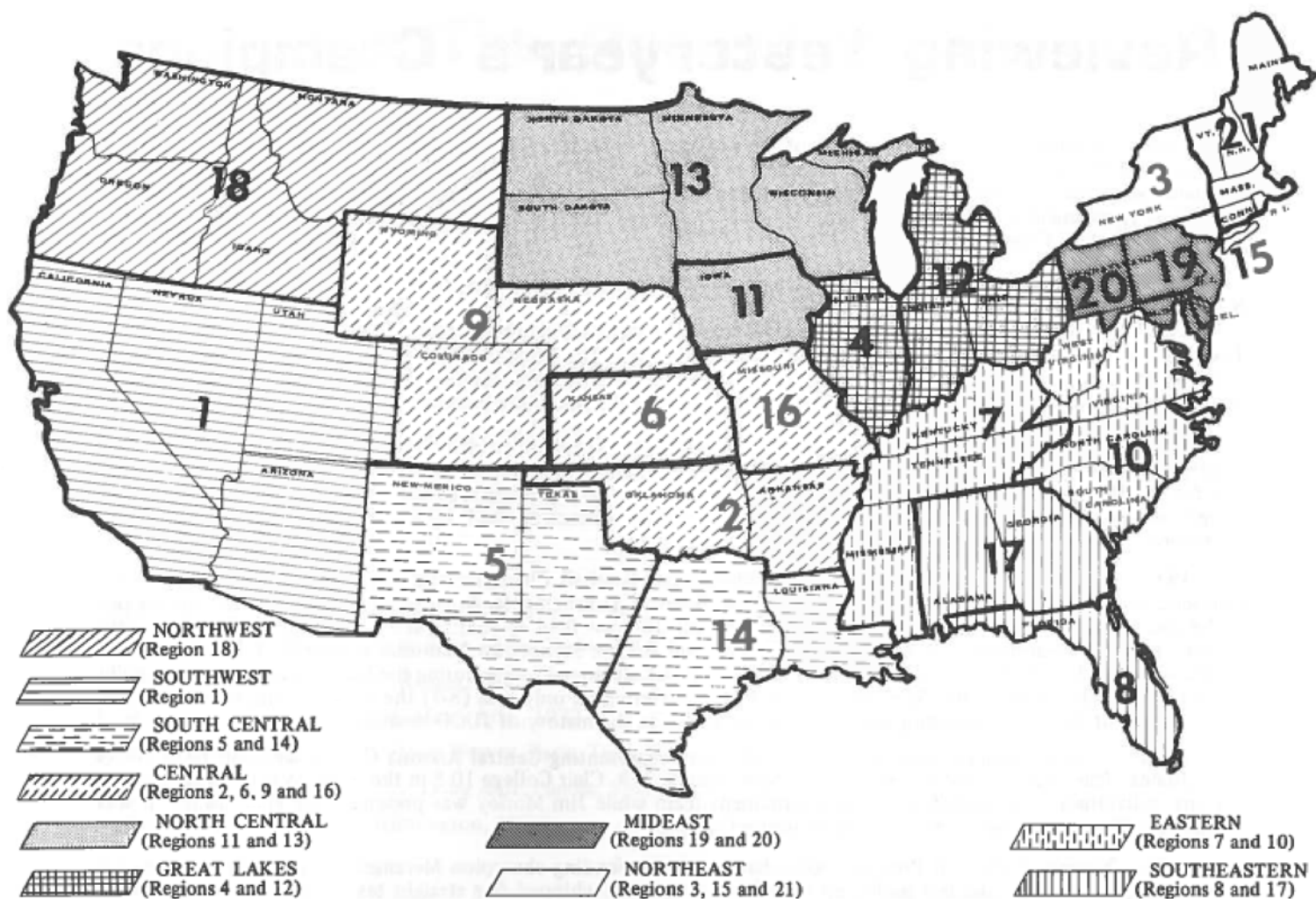

Notes of Interest to Fans

Introducing the Men in Blue — The tournament officials will be under the direction of Co-Tournament Directors Dick Reimer, Gene Haggerty and Mark Brown, in cooperation with the NJCAA rules and regulations. The 1981 tournament will feature: John Kelly, Phoenix Arizona; Bill Laude, Frankfort, Illinois; Terry Schiessler, Aurora, Colorado; Bud Schoepflin, Arvada, Colorado; Joel Sollish, Glendale, Arizona; John Toppi, Phoenix, Arizona.

Statistics at a Glance — All of the tournament games are scheduled, to be staffed by official scorers from The Daily Sentinel. They will be: Rick Jussel, Dale Strode and Dave Birdwell. Another duty for them will be to keep statistics and tournament records for the press and radio, plus the program.

Western Hospitality is Still Alive — One of the major roles of the JUCO Committee is played by the team hosts, who are responsible for making the various teams welcome to Colorado West. Ten Grand Junction service clubs are assigned to each of the district qualifiers that participate in the tournament. Each team is supplied with a courtesy car and the individual hosts have extended every means of hospitality to the out-of-town guests. Reviewing Yesteryear's Champions

1980—Cleveland State won the battle of the statistics, but Middle Georgia won the war and the National Championship. The Warriors left little doubt in anyone's mind, as to who was in control during the finale, as they pounded Cleveland State for 19 hits in winning a second consecutive title 18-8. During their stay, the Cougars from Tennessee broke four tournament records, landed four on the all-tournament team, plus the most valuable player award was given to one of their stars, Greg Geren.

1979—The Middle Georgia Warriors beat a determined Panola Texas team, two-out-of-three games to clinch the National championship trophy.

Coach Robert Sapp's team put on a display of power, before a record setting crowd, in the finals to whip the Texas faction 8-4 after dropping a 4-2 decision in the semi-finals. The Warriors broke a team record by scoring 59 runs in six games and placed five players on the All-Tournament team plus team member Tommy Dunbar was chosen as the most valuable player, out of the 223 players that participated in the seven-day event.

1978—The Ranger Junior College Rangers from Ranger, Texas came into Grand Junction with both six-guns blazing and rode into the sunset with the National Junior College Baseball Championship. It was the second national title for the Rangers and the second time they broke up a three-year domination of the Arizona Connection. However, Ranger met defending champion Yavapai in the finals and won a heads-up duel, by a 12-5 margin and finished with a 4-1 record.

1977—Ho, hum . . . another National Junior College Baseball Championship is taken home by the Arizona representative. Out of the 20 National Junior College Baseball Tournaments, Arizona teams have won ten and six out of the last eight events. This year, Yavapai conquered the 10-team field by scoring at a 9.0 run average in winning six of seven games. Spear-headed by MVP Dan Townsend and Robert Perkey, Jr. Memorial winner Rick Kranitz, a 5-11 righthander, the Rough Riders turned back a determined DeKalb squad twice during the tournament. Yavapai finally applied the clincher 10-4 in the finals over DeKalb after suffering its only loss (8-7) the night before, in what turned out to be one of the most interesting and controversial games in the history of JUCO baseball.

1976—A well balanced, determined baseball team, representing Central Arizona College won the 1976 JUCO Tournament. The Vaqueros from Casa Grande, Ariz., upended St. Clair College 10-8 in the finals. A total of six Central Arizona individuals were named to the all-tournament team while Jim Morley was presented the MVP award. It was the ninth JUCO crown claimed by an Arizona Junior College.

1975—Yavapai College of Prescott, Ariz., had to beat defending champion Meramec twice to win the National Tournament, but the Roughriders pulled up their boot straps and whipped five straight teams. It was the eighth title for a team out of the Southwestern Region to win the crown out of the past 17 years. Yavapai finished undefeated and come-from-behind to beat Meramec 7-3 in the finals, but Neil Fiala won the MVP Award. Steve Coats of Louisburg highlighted the tourney with five home runs in four games to set a new record which incidentally was the only one broken in the 14 games played.

1974—For the first time in the 17-year history of the National Tournament, a team from the Central Division won the event . . . Meramec Community College of St. Louis, Mo. The Warriors utilized the balance of pitchers Mike Murphy and Joe Muich plus the offensive and defensive play of shortstop Steve Viehhaus to claim the title with five straight victories. Meramec topped Miami-Dade North 6-4 in the finals before a sell-out crowd in Lincoln Park.

1973—Ranger, Tex., broke a three-year domination by the Mesa Arizona HoKams and captured the tourney with a 5-1 record. The Texans, sparked by the MVP pitcher Donnie Moore, knocked the defending champion into the losers' bracket in the opening round and eventually whipped Gulf Coast of Panama City, Fla., 5-0 in the championship finals.

1972—Mesa Community College of Mesa, Ariz., became a triple crown winner by defeating Manatee College of Florida 4-2. Individual standout for the HoKams was outfielder Greg Snowden. Snowden repeated on the all-tournament team and was named the 1972 tournament's Most Valuable Player.

1971—Mesa Community College of Mesa, Ariz., won its second straight baseball championship with a 7-2 triumph over Miami-Dade North of Miami, Fla. Miami won its first four tournament games, but the hustling HoKams came out of the losers' bracket to defeat the Falcons twice on the final two days of the tournament. Jim Otten of Mesa was selected as the tourney's Most Valuable Player after winning two games and playing in the outfield in the other tournament contests.

1970—After finishing second in 1969, the HoKams of Mesa Community College of Mesa, Ariz., reached the JUCO tourney throne room in 1970. Coach Jim Brock's HoKams defeated Mesa College of Grand Junction 8-0. Jim Otten held the Mavs to three hits and Ken Reed, one of the smallest players in the tournament, delivered a key two-run homer. Larry Patton of Columbia State College, Tenn., won the Most Valuable Player award.

1969—Panola College of Carthage, Tex., used only 12 players in the six-day, double-elimination; but the lack of depth did not hamper the tireless Texans from capturing the national title with an 8-6 victory over Mesa, Ariz. Most Valuable Player honors went to Doug Ault, who won three games in the tournament for Panola, and hit .318. Ault played in the outfield when not pitching. Randy Bayer, a 6-5 first baseman with sprinter speed from Mesa, Ariz., was voted the player most likely to succeed.

1968—Glendale Community College battled the odds to win the national crown. The Gauchos dropped their tournament opener 15-8 at the hands of Manatee College, but rebounded to win five straight games and the crown. Glendale's Otis McCowan was selected as the tournament's Most Valuable Player.

JUCO Master of Ceremonies Features Popular Sportscaster

In keeping with tradition, the JUCO committee landed yet another celebrity to handle the Master of Ceremonies duties at the banquet. . . Gary Cruz, the popular sportscaster of KBTV Channel Nine of Denver.

The personable Cruz is no stranger to baseball. Cruz, a hard-throwing righthander, pitched in Alameda, Ca., for the Northern California Semi-Pro League in 1968. "The only thing I didn't like about my year in Alameda, was the 290-foot leftfield fence," Cruz remarked.

"I am excited and looking forward to visiting Grand Junction. To be able to rub elbows with all the big names in baseball will be a big thrill for me," Cruz continued.

"I have heard many nice comments about Grand Junction and the tournament was even mentioned on the baseball game of the week (on national television), so I realize the magnitude of the event.

"I have spoken to many people from Grand Junction and now I will get a chance to meet them," Cruz concluded.

One of the highlights of his baseball playing days, came in Alameda when the Oakland A's sent Reggie Jackson to Cruz' semi-pro team to give him some more playing time and a chance to heal a minor injury. Chris Speier, now with Montreal, also played on the team with Cruz.

Cruz, who joined Channel Nine in 1974, will be at the head table with a host of professional baseball notables as well as 700 players and fans at the festive gathering which traditionally sets off a week-long baseball extravaganza.

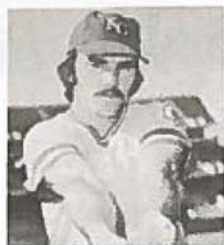
After graduating from Amador High School in Pleasanton, Ca., Cruz attended Chabot College in Hayward, Ca., where he was a wide receiver in football and a pitcher on the baseball team. He followed with the University of Maryland Extension in the Far East in 1969 and enrolled at the University of Colorado (1971-74) but was also working as a newscaster for KIMN radio, and subsequently as sports and news director until his appointment at Channel Nine.

Cruz served in the U.S. Army during his Far East extension work. He and his wife Trisha, have a ten-month-old son, Kevin.

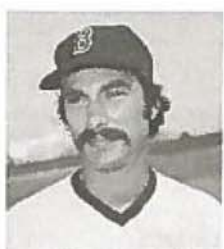
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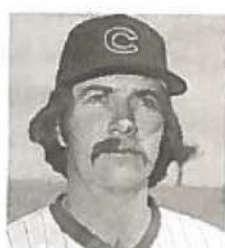

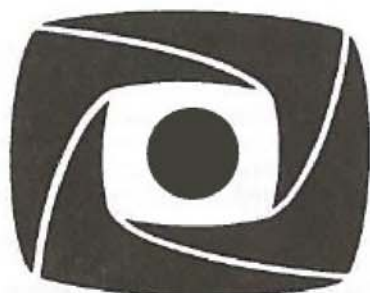


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Most Valuable Players

. . . . Were Invaluable

1980 — Cleveland State did not win the National Championship but one of its players was chosen as MVP — Greg Geren, 6-1, 197-pound, sophomore from Cleveland Tennessee.

The righthanded Slugger broke the tournament record for RBI's with 18, batted .393 and scored eight times as the strong outfielder helped the Cougars to second place.

1979 — Freshman Tommy Dunbar displayed his versatility on the field and at the plate to pace Middle Georgia to a National Championship.

The superb, 5-11, 170-pound centerfielder hit .444, with four extra base hits, two stolen bases, scored six times and drove in seven runs to help the Warriors finish with a 5-1 tournament record.

1978 — Jim Mick, a powerful freshman from Brooklyn, N.Y., was voted the MVP after he led Ranger Junior College to the national championship.

The 6-2, 190 pound first baseman pounded the ball at a .526 clip, had two game winning hits and finished just as strong. . . as he went three-for-five in the finale with three RBI's and scored two runs against runnerup Yavapai of Arizona.

1977 — A defensive sensation, who also hit for a .354 batting average, named Dan Townsend, was voted the Most Valuable Player in the 1977 tournament.

The 5-11, sophomore from Lompoc, Calif., set a tournament record of 15 RBI's and scored five runs to help lead Yavapai College of Prescott, Ariz., to the 20th annual Junior College Baseball World Series.

1976 — A righthanded, sophomore named Jim Morley, from Phoenix, Ariz., was selected as the tournament's Most Valuable Player.

Morley, a 6-0, 190 pound outfielder, slugged the ball at a .473 clip and drove home eight runs to help pace Central Arizona College to the Junior College World Series Title.

1975 — Shortstop Neil Fiala of Meramec Community College had a big pair of shoes to fill when he joined the team, but the high school All-American lived up to all expectations by not only winning the MVP Award but he also captured the Big Stick Award with a .529 batting average. The 6-1½, 182-pound freshman replaced shortstop Steve Viefhaus who was the 1974 MVP on the Meramec championship team.

1974 — Steve Viefhaus of Meramec Community College accomplished some amazing feats during five straight victories and the national championship trophy won by his team.

The 6-4, 190-pound freshman collected ten hits for a .526 batting average and was near perfect at his shortstop position which not only earned him the most valuable player award but the best defensive player in the eight-team tourney.

What was an almost impossible feat, four of Viefhaus' hits sailed out of the ball park to accomplish a new home run record for the tournament.

1973 — Donnie Moore of Ranger, Tex., established himself as a one-man pitching team and guided the Rangers to their first national baseball championship.

Moore, a 6-0, 170 pound righthander, was a tireless workhorse as the Ranger pitcher tossed 30 innings, had an ERA of 1.20 and set a new tourney record of four wins without a loss. Moore finished the season with an 18-1 mark.

The Most Valuable Player award was given to Moore after balloting conducted by the press, radio, Major League scouts and the NJCAA Committee.

1972 — Hard hitting Greg Snowden of the champion Mesa, Ariz., grabbed the title while being named to the all-tournament team for the second year. Statistically, Snowden led the tourney with 10 hits, along with a .435 batting average, 10 RBI's, two triples and two home runs.

The pinpoint accuracy of his arm in the outfield also helped establish him as the top vote getter in the all-tournament selections.

1971 — Mesa, Ariz., again took the championship, and again fielded the recipient of the MVP. Jim Otten pitched 20 innings on the way to a 1.35 ERA and the only pitcher in the tourney's 14-year history to win five tournament games. Otten also won three games in Mesa's 1970 national triumph.

1970 — Although Columbia State Community College of Columbia, Tenn., did not win the title, one member of the Charger team displayed versatility to win the MVP award. Larry Patton won three games for the third-place Columbia team, while doubling as a slugger with five RBI's and a .471 batting average.

1969 — Once again, an outstanding athlete in both hitting and pitching came away with the MVP trophy. Doug Ault of the national champion Panola squad of Carthage, Tex., won three games along with a .318 batting average. He also drove in five runs.

The Beaumont, Tex., standout pitched 24 innings for a 2.62 ERA and a 5-1 tournament record for the title team.

1968 — Glendale, Ariz., Community College won the national title, and MVP Otis McCowan was a major factor. The centerfielder tied a tourney record with two home runs, picked up a double and a triple, and was 10 for 22 during the tournament for a hefty .455 batting average.

McCowan knocked in 11 runs and scored four times himself. After completing the 1969 season, he signed with the Seattle Pilots of the American League.

1967 — National champion Bacone's pitching ace won the most valuable player award with an ERA of 0.45. Gerald Pirtle won two games, saved two more in relief, and batted .375 during the tournament slate. He gave up one earned run in 20 innings and struckout 31.

1966 — Joe Arnold of the Miami-Dade Falcons established a new tournament record when he pitched 30 2-3 innings to win the MVP trophy. The workhorse of the third-place team also played third base.

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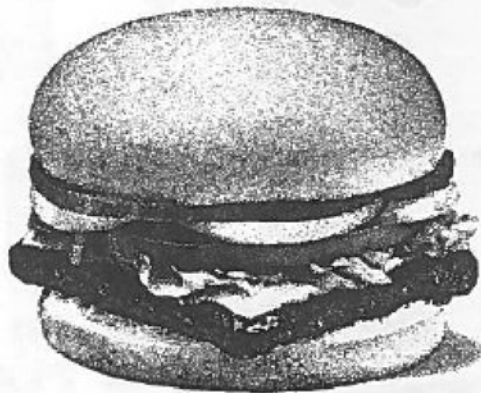
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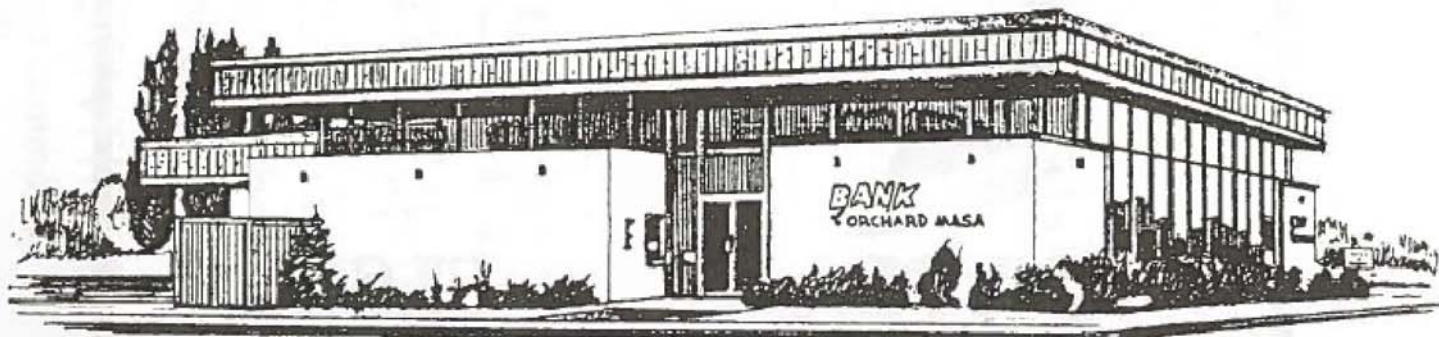


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Championship Baseball — General Information

GENERAL INFORMATION: Grand Junction, at an altitude of 4,600 feet, is located in Western Colorado on highway U.S. 50, U.S. 6 & 24, and Interstate 70. The city is midway between Denver and Salt Lake City and is served by Frontier and Continental airlines, Continental Trailways and the Rio Grande Zephyr train.

Grand Junction is bordered on three sides by mountains, including the world famous flat-top mountain, Grand Mesa, known for hundreds of trout fishing lakes, and the renowned Colorado National Monument Park.

THE TOURNAMENT: The tournament is co-sponsored by the Grand Junction Area Chamber of Commerce and the City of Grand Junction in cooperation with the National Junior College Athletic Association. The tournament is planned for a ten-team double elimination invitational meet. All the necessary arrangements are under the direction of the Grand Junction Area Chamber of Commerce Athletic Committee.

BASEBALL PARK: Lincoln Park Stadium is the equivalent of a Class AAA baseball facility. It comfortably seats 5,000 fans and features clean dressing rooms, new concession stands, complete press box facilities, spacious paved parking areas, and an excellent playing field.

Through a cooperative community effort over \$45,000 has gone into making Lincoln Park a first class facility for the NJCAA Tournament. The addition of new lights, new permanent stands, new concession stands and rest rooms, renovated playing surface, dugouts, scoreboard and outfield fence are all part of the past 10 years' building program.

HOTELS—MOTELS: Grand Junction's hotels, motels, and tourist courts provide 3,000 modern units. Many of the hotels and motels are equipped with restaurants and swimming pools. Team motel accommodations are assigned by Regions by the Chairman of Team Housing. All accommodation inquiries should be directed to Wayne Nelson, c/o Mesa College, (303) 248-1304.

TEAM EXPENSES: Each participating team will be reimbursed by the Grand Junction Area Chamber of Commerce at a minimum rate of \$9.00 per day per player with a maximum team roster of 18 players. Teams will be paid only for the actual number of players brought to the tourney up to 18. Major League baseball, through the Baseball Commissioners office in New York, contributes money to the Junior College Baseball Tournament which is prorated among the participating teams based upon miles traveled to Grand Junction. NEWS MEDIA: Complete radio, television and press facilities are available. Complete game reports will be filed with AP and UPI. All tourney games will be broadcast and radio feed services is available either on a direct basis or by recording. An established fee schedule for broadcasting games has been set by the NJCAA. OFFICIALS: The tournament officials will be under the direction of Tournament Directors Dick Reimer, Gene Haggerty and Mark Brown along with official chairman Bill Schilling in cooperation with the NJCAA rules and regulations. Experienced and qualified officials are brought to Grand Junction after being approved by the NJCAA Baseball Committee. HOSPITALITY: A complete hospitality center is provided at the Bar X Motel, 1600 North Ave. to greet all incoming teams, visitors, and scouts and provide all necessary incidentals, tickets, schedules, and information.

All participating teams have individual hosts who arrange for all the team's local needs and supply transportation as well as provide tours of the area.

Every effort is being made to assure that all participants and guests enjoy their baseball stay in Grand Junction and that the NJCAA National Baseball Tournament will continue to be the finest baseball tournament of its kind in the nation.
