Directions to LIU

Via Subway: Take the M,R (local) or B, Q (express) to DeKalb Avenue or take the 2, 3, 4 or 5 to Nevins Street. Also, A, C can be taken to Jay St./Borough Hall.

Manhattan via the Manhattan Bridge: Proceed along Flatbush Avenue Extension to Myrtle Avenue and turn left at light. Take Myrtle Avenue to Ashland Place. Turn right onto Ashland Place and proceed to DeKalb Avenue, turning right. Parking garage is first brick building on the right.

From Manhattan via the Brooklyn Bridge: Proceed along Adams Street, making a left onto Tillary St. Turn right onto Flatbush Avenue Extension and make first left at Myrtle Avenue. Turn right onto Ashland Place and proceed to DeKalb Avenue and make a right. Parking garage is first brick building on the right.

From Brooklyn: Belt Parkway to BQE. Take BQE to Cadman Plaza West and proceed to Tillary Street. Turn left on Tillary Street and turn right onto Flatbush Avenue Extension. Make immediate left at light onto Myrtle Avenue. Turn right onto Ashland Place and proceed to DeKalb Ave. and make a right. Parking garage is first brick building on the right.

From Queens/Long Island: Long Island Expressway (495 West) to BQE (278 West) to Tillary Street exit. Turn right onto Flatbush Avenue Extension and make first left at Myrtle Avenue. Turn right onto Ashland Place and proceed to DeKalb Avenue, turning right.

From Staten Island: Take Verrazano Bridge to BQE. See above.

From Northern New Jersey: Take New Jersey Turnpike south to Holland Tunnel to Canal Street East and follow to Manhattan Bridge. See above.

From Southern New Jersey: New Jersey Turnpike north to Exit 10 (Outerbridge Crossing) to 278 East Verrazano Bridge to BQE. Follow directions from Brooklyn.

From New England/Westchester County: Merritt Parkway South or 95 South to the Hutchinson Parkway South and over the Whitestone Bridge. Take 678 South (Van Wyck Expressway) to 495 West (Long Island Expressway). Follow directions from Queens.



Season Outlook

Following a breakthrough season that saw the Long Island University men's soccer team accumulate its most wins in four years, the 2009 edition has raised the level of expectations. Fourteen returnees and a talented group of newcomers combine to give the Blackbirds a roster with the skill and experience to help earn their first Northeast Conference Tournament berth since winning the championship in 2004.

Head coach **TJ Kostecky** returns for his 10th season at the helm and welcomes back assistant coaches **Rhett Goldsmith** and **Rich Scheer** for their second year, giving the Blackbirds staff a sense of continuity. With eight returning starters and a bevy of newcomers, Kostecky expects the resurgence to come from all aspects of the squad.

"With a young team, we will certainly be filled with enthusiasm and an eagerness to learn," Kostecky said. "Our goal is to get better every day and by the end of the season put ourselves in a position to compete for the NEC Tourney and championship."

After a slow start to the 2008 season, the young squad turned a corner against CSU Bakersfield. Trailing 2-0 with 13 minutes to play, the Blackbirds rallied to force overtime and then-freshman **Steve Jakubowski** netted the game-winner in the extra period to give LIU its first victory on the year and spark a five-game win streak.

LIU went on to win eight of nine contests and opened NEC play 2-1 before stumbling down the stretch. Despite losing four their last five contests the Blackbirds showed the ability to give opposing defenses fits after being shut out just twice in 18 contests.

Forwards

Although four-year starter Jukka Lehto graduated, the Blackbirds return Jakubowski who led the team in scoring as a rookie. The sophomore made an immediate impression, tallying six goals on the year including a run of three straight games to close the year.

"With Jakubowski's return and the addition of several promising newcomers, I expect us to be more dangerous going forward."

Kostecky said. "In particular, Steve has shown consistent improvement from the end of last year and through summer club ball."

The Blackbirds will look to its incoming talent to aid Jakubowski up front. Junior Juan Lanza along with freshmen **Joseph Hess**, **Jakeem Johnson**, and **Roston Moore** all have the ability to contribute right away. Moore's versatility could also see him earn time at defense.

Midfield

A particular strength of the 2009 Long Island squad will be its depth in the midfield, led by senior **Adam Kelemet** and sophomore Josh Maley. Kelemet returned from a knee injury suffered during his sophomore season and made his presence felt last year, starting 14 contests. He was a driving force in the center of the pitch and finished a pair of scores, including a crucial game-winner against Robert Morris. He will also be relied upon as a senior to provide leadership to a young squad.

Maley enjoyed a solid inaugural season by appearing in 16 contests and making starts in 11 of the final 12 games. He chipped in a pair of goals and earned NEC Rookie of the Week honors after scoring the game-winner against Columbia.

"Adam Kelemet is our top returning midfielder with the most experience," Kostecky said. "He is a skillful player who has the ability to change the outcome of any game."

Also back to patrol the middle of the field are junior **Evan Fernandez** and sophomores **Nick Alderiso** and **Dan Sauerhoff**. Alderiso has the most experience of the trio and emerged as a valuable spark plug off the bench as the season progressed and also earned three starts. Fernandez and Sauerhoff both picked up experience during their first season with the Blackbirds and will push to earn an increased role on the squad.

Incoming freshmen **Anthony Costabile**, **Elliot Kane** and **Nate Simons**, along with Moore will provide Kostecky numerous options in the center of the pitch.

earned NEC Rookie of the Week honors during the season and tallied four shutouts between the pipes, including back-to-back clean sheets against Saint Francis (Pa.) and Robert Morris.

“He continues to gain knowledge, experience and confidence in the goal,” Kostecky said. “After a full year of competition, I expect Adam to be much more consistent in all aspects of his game.”

Freshmen **John Connolly** and **Nathan Stockie** will provide competition to Janssen and give LIU a talented trio of goalkeepers to turn to.

Schedule

LIU will play a competitive schedule in 2009 that will test the squad right away and help it develop as the schedule moves into conference play. The Blackbirds will open the season on the road against defending Patriot League champion Colgate before traveling cross-country for the UC Irvine College Classic. The Blackbirds will open the tournament against UC Irvine, which is coming off a Big West championship and its first NCAA appearance in 2008 before facing perennial power Santa Clara.

The Blackbirds will host Columbia on Sept. 12 and Stony Brook on Sept. 16 in a pair of matches with local interest to open the home slate at LIU Field. Road tilts at Manhattan, Cornell and NJIT will close out the non-conference portion of the schedule. Long Island will begin its NEC season at home against Bryant on Oct. 2. The rest of the conference slate is highlighted by a matchup against Saint Francis (Pa.) on Oct. 18 as part of LIU Men's Soccer Alumni Day and a visit from defending NEC champion Fairleigh Dickinson on Oct. 30. The top four teams in the regular season standings will advance to the NEC Tournament at the site of the highest seed on Nov. 13 and 15. The winner will gain the league's automatic berth to the NCAA Tournament.

With a veteran presence at all positions, the Blackbirds are poised to climb the NEC ladder and make a push for one of the coveted spots in the conference tournament.

Defense

Long Island's backline returns a trio of defenders in seniors **Emiliano Tramontozzi** and **Dan Wright** and sophomore **Nik Conklin**. The Blackbirds posted five shutouts in 2008 and Wright was a part of all of them having been the only LIU player to start all 18 contests last season. A native of Sydney, Australia, Wright anchored the central defense and will be looked upon to help lead this season's squad.

Tramantozzi has been a part-time starter during his career in Brooklyn and can help provide experience on the flanks. A starter in two contests last season, he will compete for a full-time spot this season.

Conklin enjoyed a solid freshman season and appeared in 17 contests. A starter in 16 games on the outside, he is another experienced option for Kostecky to turn to.

Versatile junior **Craig Stant** and sophomore speedster **Rommel Forde** also return after leading LIU in assists with five each. Stant stepped right in last season and played in every contest providing stability to the defensive unit.

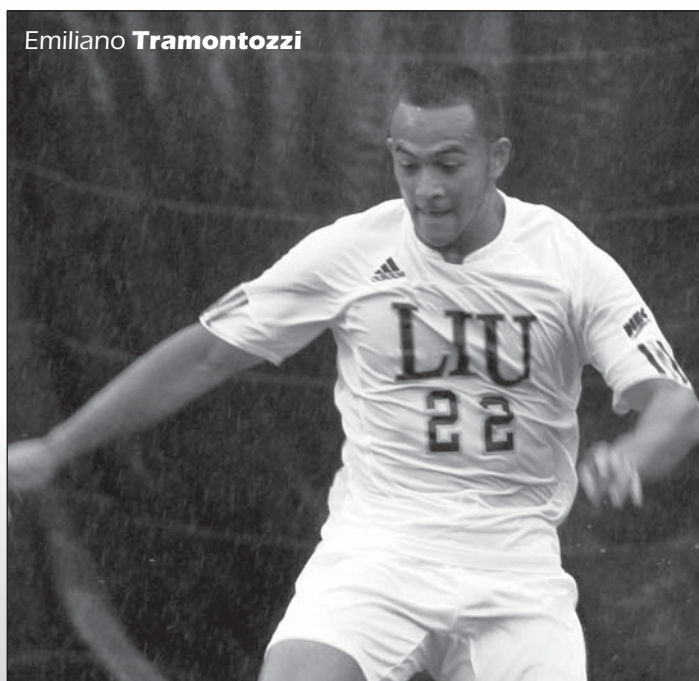
Forde appeared in 17 contests and made five starts. The native of Barbados is a good distributor of the ball and had a streak of three straight games with assists.

New additions **Mike Cable** and **Rob Schrock** will vie for time on the pitch in 2009.

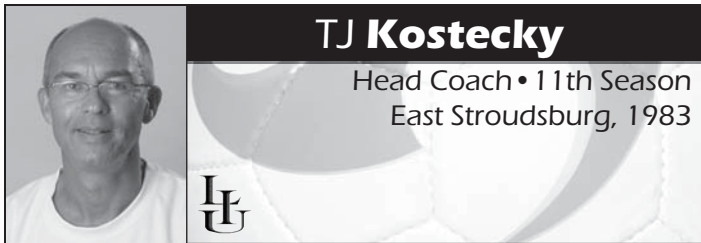
“We have a strong group of returning defenders in Danny Wright, Nik Conklin, Emiliano Tramontozzi and Rommel Forde and Craig Stant,” Kostecky said. “The newcomers are all talented and will look to step in for Frank Judice and challenge for playing time, giving us considerable depth.”

Goalkeeper

Sophomore **Adam Janssen** heads into his sophomore season as Long Island's top goalkeeper after an impressive debut in 2008. Janssen

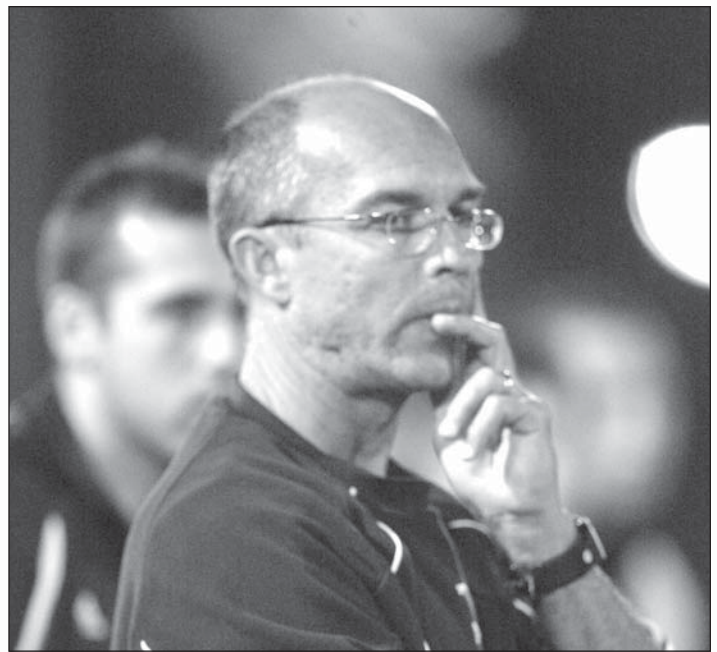


Architect. Tactician. Teacher. Builder. TJ Kostecky is responsible for returning the Long Island University men's soccer team to its former glory. He has accomplished the restoration project by bringing in the top local talent from New York City and its neighboring boroughs, outstanding talent from across the country and skilled international prospects from Europe, Canada and the Caribbean.

Kostecky completed the restoration of LIU's soccer success in 2004 after he led the Blackbirds to their first NCAA College Cup berth since 1986. The trip to the tournament, and the Northeast Conference Championship that preceded it, capped off an amazing season which had been anticipated after watching Kostecky and his squad make a steady climb in the conference since he took over the job. LIU reached the NEC title contest in 2001 and 2002 – losing on a penalty kick both times – before capturing the championship with a 1-0 win over Fairleigh Dickinson.

Kostecky is the second-winningest coach in the program's history and posted four winning seasons in his first six campaigns at LIU, including an impressive 11-6-3 mark in 2002. That squad rang up an 8-1-1 mark in conference play, which set the standard for most league wins since the Blackbirds joined the NEC.

As successful as his teams have been on the pitch, Kostecky's squads are also devoted in the classroom. His 2003 Blackbirds team posted the highest team grade point average in the nation. More recently, the 2008 squad was awarded the NEC Team Academic Award for posting the highest GPA among men's soccer teams in the league.



Kostecky has engineered successful rebuilding projects at each of his prior coaching stops. Prior to LIU, he directed a remarkable turnaround at Appalachian State in Boone, N.C.

Appalachian State had suffered four consecutive losing seasons prior to Kostecky's hiring in 1998. In his only season at the school, he led the Mountaineers to a 13-8 mark in 1998, marking the best first-year record for a coach in over 40 years of program history. For his efforts, he was named Southern Conference Coach of the Year.

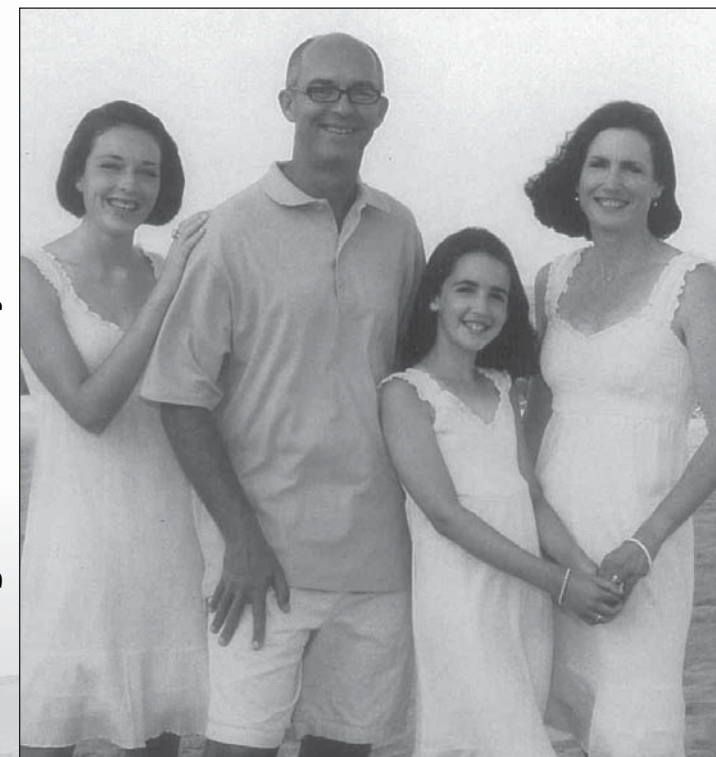
Kostecky arrived in Boone following a successful run as head coach and director of athletics at Pfeiffer University in Misenheimer, N.C., from 1994-97. He was handed the reins of a program that had suffered eight straight losing seasons before he came in and turned the program's fortunes around. During this tenure, the team boasted a 46-25-7 record and captured two Carolinas-Virginia Athletics Conference championships. Kostecky was named CVAC Coach of the Year in 1997 and mentored one All-American and nine all-conference honorees during his tenure.

He began his collegiate coaching career at New Jersey Institute of Technology, where he led the Highlanders from 1988-93. NJIT compiled a 67-37-11 mark in his six years, capturing conference championships in 1991 and 1992 and making four ECAC postseason trips. Kostecky's accomplishments at NJIT came in his native New Jersey, where he starred scholastically at Woodbridge Township High School.

In 1979 at age 20, Kostecky was named varsity coach at Jefferson Township (N.J.) High School. He founded and became president of the Jefferson Township Youth Soccer Club and today he serves as director of coaching for the club team, FC Copa.

Kostecky credits the success he has accumulated on the sidelines to his philosophies on game preparation and the involvement of his coaching staff and players in the program.

“My approach to coaching is based on the fact that soccer is





different from other American sports. It is really a player-directed game,” he said. “Most coaching is done in preparation for the game as opposed to in-game coaching. By game time, it is usually too late to accomplish anything.

“I also encourage players and coaching staff to evaluate all aspects of the program and to give me feedback. I am only one person and the players may have a different read on what is happening with the team.”

Tactically, Kostecky’s attacking practice sessions involve a system called Vision Training that he and business partner Len Bilous developed several years ago. This method helps players make smart, well-informed decisions by improving their field vision.

Throughout his career, Kostecky has been an instrumental figure in facilitating the growth of soccer in America. From 1987-94 he was a coach for New Jersey’s Olympic Development Team and was responsible for the training and selection of the state’s top players for the United States National Team. When he accepted his post at Pfeiffer, he filled a similar role with North Carolina’s Olympic Development squad. Several of the players he mentored played in Major League Soccer, including former U.S. National Team captain Claudio Reyna.

Kostecky has also worked with U.S. Men’s and Women’s National Team members, including Julie Foudy, a captain of the 1999 Women’s World Cup Champions. He conducted an instructional clinic for inner city children at the 1998 NCAA Division I Championships in Richmond, Va., for the NCAA Youth Education Through Sports



Program and was again a guest clinician for YES at the 1999 and 2000 NCAA Championships.

In 1989, Kostecky founded Soccer Start, a youth soccer program for inner city children. He served as the program’s National Chairman until 1993. The program continues to identify and cultivate the abundance of talent in the inner-cities. He was appointed World Cup ’94 Committee Chair by then New Jersey Governor Jim Florio and coordinated training site activities in the Metropolitan area for each international team.

A featured clinician around the world, Kostecky conducted a coaching seminar in Masku, Finland, in March of 2005 on Vision Training. In early 2005, he released a DVD under the same name for players and coaches to use. Since its release, it has become one of the most requested coaching DVDs in the country and abroad.

Kostecky is holder of an “A” license from the United States Soccer Federation and the “Premier Diploma” from the National Soccer Coaches Association of America, which are the highest coaching licences given in the U.S. Kostecky’s professional career began in 1981 as camp director for the Vision Training Soccer Camps. He serves as vice president of the camps that are running successfully throughout the East Coast. Last year marked the 28th anniversary of the Vision Training Soccer Camps.

A former all-state performer at Woodbridge, he was inducted into the school’s Hall of Fame in 1995. He played midfield on the men’s soccer team at East Stroudsburg University and received a bachelor’s degree in health and physical education in 1983. He completed his master’s degree at East Stroudsburg in the same field in 1992. Kostecky serves as adjunct professor in the Department of Sports Science at Long Island University. In addition, he serves as program director of the new concentration being offered in sports management.

Kostecky currently resides in Fair Haven, N.J., with his wife, Donna, and daughters, Kate and Caroline.

Rhett Goldsmith begins his second season on the Blackbirds' men's soccer staff since being hired in February 2008. Goldsmith has extensive coaching experience and assists in all aspects of the program.

Goldsmith joined LIU after serving as the associate men's soccer coach at Stevens Institute of Technology, where he helped build the Ducks into a Division III national power. As associate head coach in 2007 he helped the team to a 17-1-3 mark and a No. 17 ranking in the final National Soccer Coaches Association of America/adidas poll. In his five seasons at Stevens the Ducks posted a 91-9-11 record and advance to five consecutive NCAA Tournaments, including a trip to the sectional semifinals in 2005.

"I am thrilled to have Rhett Goldsmith on our coaching staff at LIU," Kostecky said. "From his extensive experience at Stevens, Rhett brings with him a record of proven success. He has spearheaded the recruitment of 10 of the top student-athletes from around the country to continue their careers at LIU. His experience certainly helps, as we focus our sights on capturing the Northeast Conference crown."

Prior to his time at Stevens, Goldsmith was the head men's soccer coach for two seasons at Albright College from 2001-03. Following graduation, he was an assistant coach at Muhlenberg College for two years with both the men's and women's programs.

Goldsmith has served as a coach at the Red Bull New York Academy for the past two seasons in East Rutherford, N.J. Goldsmith founded the Evergreen Soccer Academy in Reading, Pa., and was technical director for six years. He has also been a guest youth coach at academies held by Newcastle United FC in Newcastle, England, Aberdeen FC in Aberdeen, Scotland, and for Ross County FC in Dingwall, Scotland.

A native of England, Goldsmith graduated with a Bachelor of Science degree in biology from Muhlenberg College in 1998. He holds an NSCAA Premier Certification and NSCAA State Goalkeeping Level I Diploma. Goldsmith and his wife, Jill, live in Brooklyn.

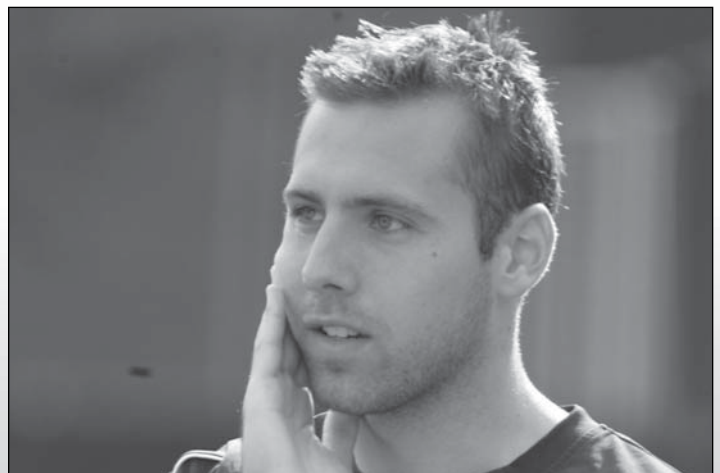
"Rich has played an integral part in improving Adam Janssen's overall performance," Kostecky said. "He was also instrumental in helping to bring in our largest incoming class in eight years."

Scheer came to LIU after serving as the marketing manager for rEvolution Sports Marketing and ESPN in 2008. His primary role was to promote and increase awareness for the UEFA Euro 2008 tournament, while managing a staff and providing market information to rEvolution and ESPN.

Scheer enjoyed a standout playing career at Syracuse University from 2001-05. He ranks fifth on the school's all-time list with a 1.23 goals against average and in 2004 he posted a 1.04 GAA, which ranks ninth on the single-season list for the Orange. He collected BIG EAST Academic Honor Roll recognition during his career and was also a BIG EAST Rookie of the Week honoree.

Following his playing career, Scheer spent almost three years with the Red Bull New York and MetroStars franchise of Major League Soccer. Scheer joined the MetroStars in 2004 as an intern and was responsible for compiling reports for corporate sponsors and developing and executing programming for the MetroStars Coaches Club. He was promoted to manager of grassroots marketing for Red Bull New York in May of 2005. In that role he helped lead the re-branding of the MetroStars franchise and was responsible for organizing promotions and partnership programs, while overseeing interns. Scheer also organized and managed the club's initiative to start a freestyle soccer exhibition team.

A native of Livingston, N.J., Scheer graduated from Syracuse's Martin J. Whitman School of Management with a Bachelor of Science degree in marketing management. He was a Dean's List student and Athletic Director's Honor Roll member.

Northeast Conference



By providing opportunities for student-athletes to achieve their fullest potential both in athletic competition and in the classroom, the Northeast Conference (NEC) has charted a course of steady growth since its inception in 1981. Now in its 29th year of service, the

NEC's new Strategic Plan has established a blueprint for the future as the Conference strives toward becoming an NCAA Division I leader for athletic success, academic achievement and integrity, sportsmanship, equity and diversity, community partnership and national engagement.

The NEC can trace its roots back to 1981, when the league was first established as the men's basketball-only ECAC-Metro Conference. A single-sport entity at its inception, even the league's most ardent supporters during its formative years could not have envisioned a transformation into a burgeoning 12-member, 22-sport conference. The remarkable success story of the conference began to unfold in 1985, when the league began sponsoring additional sports. Three years later, a change of name was in order and the Northeast Conference as we know it today was born.

With membership and sport sponsorship continuing to grow over the next decade and beyond, the NEC now enjoys qualification or play-

in access to 13 different NCAA Championships (baseball, men's and women's basketball, field hockey, men's and women's golf, women's lacrosse, men's and women's soccer, softball, men's and women's tennis and women's volleyball).

Though the NEC has featured various looks since its inception, charter members Fairleigh Dickinson, Long Island, Robert Morris, St. Francis (N.Y.), Saint Francis (Pa.) and Wagner remain part of the current 12-school alignment. They are joined by Monmouth (admitted in 1985), Mount St. Mary's (1989), Central Connecticut State (1997), Quinnipiac (1998) and Sacred Heart (1999). NEC expansion continues with the addition of Bryant University in 2012 as the league's 12th member, which will give the league a six-state geographic footprint with access to such major media markets as New York City, Baltimore, Pittsburgh, Hartford and Providence.

NEC member institutions now compete in 22 championship sports: baseball, men's and women's basketball, women's bowling, men's and women's cross country, field hockey, football, men's and women's golf, men's and women's indoor track and field, women's lacrosse, men's and women's outdoor track and field, men's and women's soccer, softball, women's swimming, men's and women's tennis, and women's volleyball. Men's lacrosse will begin competition this season and officially become the league's 23rd sport in 2010-11.

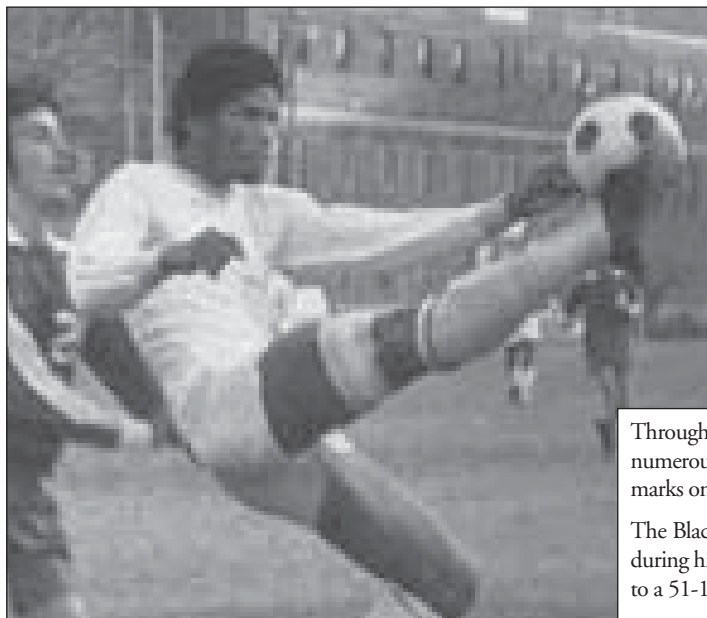

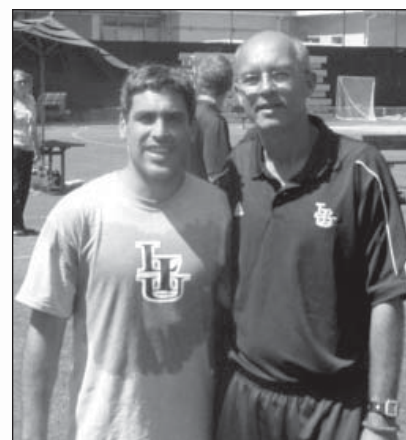
Throughout its history, the Long Island University men's soccer team has produced numerous professional players that have gone on to have stellar careers after leaving their marks on the Brooklyn Campus, including Richard Chinapoo.

The Blackbirds' only four-time All-American, Chinapoo was one of LIU's all-time greats during his career from 1978-1981. He finished his career with 55 career goals and led LIU to a 51-13-8 record and three conference championships.

Upon leaving Long Island, Chinapoo joined the world-famous New York Cosmos of the North American Soccer League. During his time with the Cosmos, he played alongside such greats as Pelé. After two seasons with the Cosmos, Chinapoo enjoyed a successful professional career indoors with the Baltimore Blast and Harrisburg Heat in the Major Indoor Soccer League.

Chinapoo was inducted into the LIU Athletics Hall of Fame in 2001. He was honored by the NCAA at the 2008 Men's Soccer College Cup when he was named to the NCAA College Cup 50th Anniversary Team.

Blackbirds **in the Community**

In addition, senior **Adam Kelemet** and sophomore **Josh Maley** used their time with the Laredo Heat Soccer Club of the Premier Development League to give back during the summer. While in Laredo, Texas, the duo participated in numerous community service efforts, including a visit to the Children's Ward of the Doctor's Hospital. Both members of the LIU Honors program, Kelemet and Maley also participated in a reading to school children between the ages of 8 and 10.

Kostecky and the Blackbirds will continue their work in the community throughout the 2009-10 with the Reyna Foundation and other worthwhile causes.

LIU Soccer History

LIU has one of the oldest and most successful collegiate soccer programs on the East Coast. Since the early 1950s, LIU's most successful teams have produced several of the country's brightest players and coaches.

The Blackbirds have made 13 NCAA Tournaments since the program's inception and in 1966, LIU compiled a 15-2-0 record and rolled to the NCAA Tournament Final before falling to San Francisco. LIU returned to the semifinals in 1967 before falling to Michigan State.

The men's soccer program has produced 27 All-Americans, more than any other sport at LIU. Among them is Dov Markus who led the Blackbirds in scoring in 1967 and was named the first recipient of the prestigious M.A.C. Hermann Trophy, presented annually to the top collegiate soccer player in the country.

Richard Chinapoo, the school's only four-time All-American, enjoyed a professional soccer career that included a stint with the New York Cosmos. He played alongside such greats as Carlos Alberto, Franz Beckenbauer and Johann Neeskens and helped the team win a pair of Eastern Division titles. In the inaugural Major League Soccer draft on Feb. 6-7, 1996, six LIU players were drafted - more than any other college. Giovanni Savarese scored the first eight goals for the New York MetroStars and finished his career with a team-record 44 tallies.

Long Island Athletics **Hall of Fame**

The Long Island University Athletics Hall of Fame was established in 2000. In total, 60 individuals and two teams have been enshrined, including the 1966 squad and 13 individuals representing men's soccer, which is the second-most represented team in the Hall.

"This institution has one of the longest and proudest traditions of excellence that is unparalleled by most universities in the country," director of athletics John Suarez noted in February of that year. "We believed it was time to recognize those who have given so much to Blackbirds athletics."

The members are chosen from a committee comprised of current and former administrators. The inductees receive a replica plaque of the permanent version which is displayed on the Wall of Fame, located in the entrance lobby to the Wellness, Recreation and Athletic Center.

Giovanni Savarese, one of LIU's all-time great forwards, was inducted into the Hall of Fame in 2009. He ranks sixth all-time at LIU with 50 career goals, including 21 during the 1992 season when he was named Northeast Conference Player of the Year and led the Blackbirds to a 13-6 record. A First Team Academic All-American in 1993, he went on to enjoy a professional career that included a stop with the NY/NJ MetroStars where he left as the all-time leading scorer with 44 goals.

The 1966 men's soccer team, which is the only team in LIU history to compete in an NCAA title game, is also in the Hall of Fame, earning induction in 2008. The squad rolled to a 15-2-0 record, outscoring their opponents 85-19 during the season under the direction of Joseph Machnik. Reinhold Jabusch earned All-America honors while anchoring the defense, and Dov Markus, who went on to win the Hermann Trophy as national player of the year the following year, led the team with 27 goals. Prior to 1966, the Blackbirds had not won an NCAA game, but won three in a row to advance to the title game before falling to San Francisco.

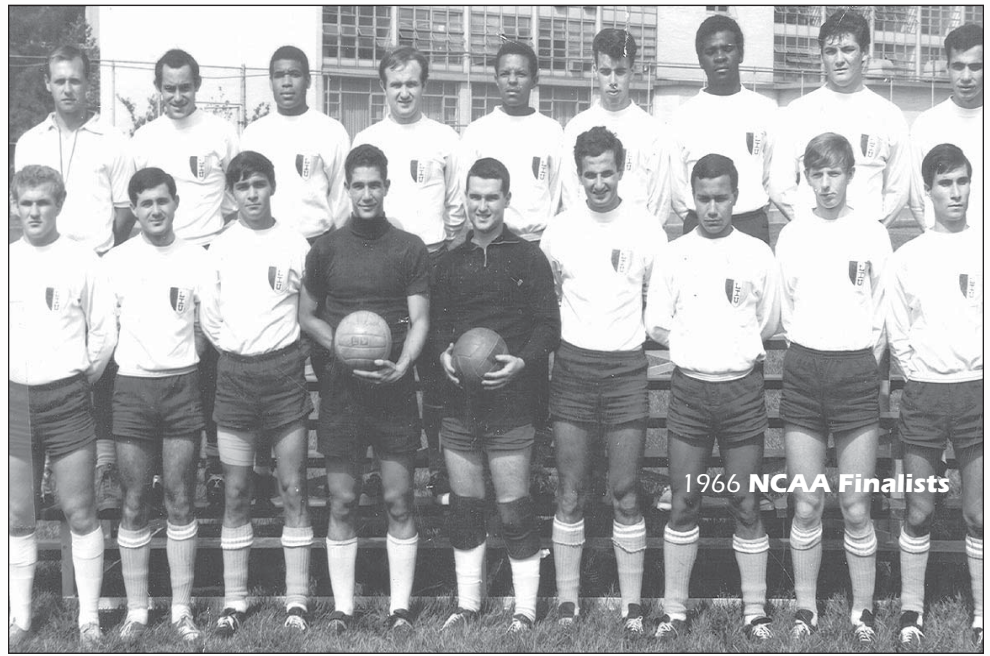

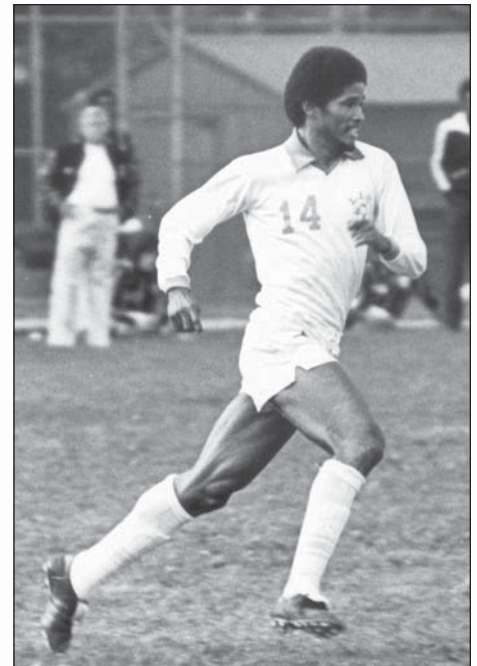

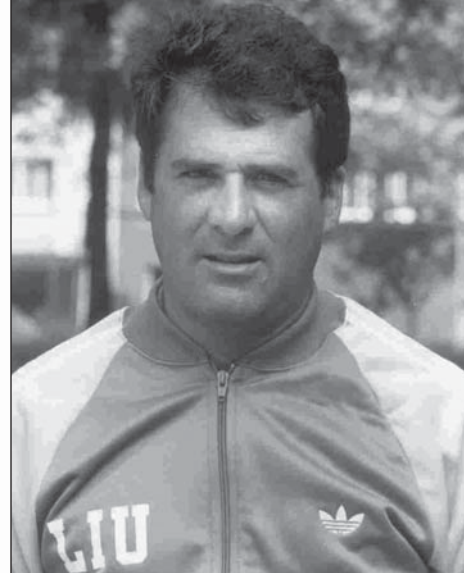

Dr. David Steinberg, the ninth president of Long Island University, was appointed April 1, 1985. During his tenure, the University has experienced a renaissance becoming one of the largest and most comprehensive private universities in the United States. Under his leadership, the University's endowment has increased nearly tenfold from \$4.8 million to over \$80 million, and its enrollment has risen from 19,000 to over 28,500. He has spearheaded a capital improvement plan, which has led to \$400 million in investments in new construction and major renovations, resulting in vast improvements in the quality of study and life on each of the University's campuses, especially, the C.W. Post and Brooklyn Campuses. New doctoral programs have been added and operating reserves have been created and increased.

Born in New York City, Dr. Steinberg, is the son of the late Rabbi Milton Steinberg of Manhattan's Park Avenue Synagogue. He was educated at Phillips Academy at Andover, Malvern College in England, and Harvard College, from which he graduated magna cum laude and Phi Beta Kappa. After a Fulbright year at the University of the Philippines and a year at Columbia University on a Woodrow Wilson Fellowship, he returned to Harvard, where he received both a master's in East Asian Studies (1963) and a Ph.D. in History (1964). Dr. Steinberg also has received several honorary degrees. He began his teaching career in the Department of History at the University of Michigan, where he rose to the rank of full professor. In 1973, he joined the administration of Brandeis University as Executive Assistant to the President, becoming Vice President and University Secretary in 1977.

The author of numerous books and articles on Southeast Asia and, in particular, Philippine history, Steinberg has taught, lectured and written about this important area of the world for four decades. His first book, "Philippine Collaboration in World War II," won the University Press Award in 1969. "The Philippines: A Singular and a Plural Place," now in its fourth edition, was described by U.S. Ambassador to the Philippines, Nicholas Platt, as "the best single-volume guide to understanding the Philippines, past and present." Dr. Steinberg also edited and co-authored both editions of "In Search of Southeast Asia," one of the major textbooks on the area. He recently collaborated with top scholars from around the world to co-author "The Emergence of Modern Southeast Asia," a new and multifaceted history of this complex region. He is a co-author of "Religion and Religiosity in the Philippines and Indonesia: Essays on State, Society and Public Creeds," 2005.



"I am a big dreamer," says Gale Stevens Haynes, Provost of Long Island University's Brooklyn Campus and an exemplary educator, lawyer and role model. "If you don't dream, nothing ever changes."

As head of a doctoral-granting institution, Provost Haynes has achieved many of her dreams both as an educator and a parent. Today, she oversees one of the most diverse campuses in the country, with more than 11,000 students, managing an annual budget of over \$160 million. Provost Haynes has led her institution through a remarkable renaissance: doubling student enrollment, creating new facilities, diversifying faculty, forging links with the community and transforming the Campus into a vibrant urban academic center. One of the Provost's visions – a modern performing arts center for the students and the community – became a reality in 2005. The centerpiece of the new complex is the wood-paneled, 320-seat Kumble Theater for the Performing Arts, where cutting-edge and traditional dance, music and theater performances regularly draw standing-room-only crowds from the Campus and the surrounding region.

In 2006, under the Provost's leadership, the Campus completed the biggest building project in its history: the \$45 million Wellness, Recreation and Athletic Center. With state-of-the-art fitness and aquatic facilities for students and other members of the Campus, the WRAC also features an outstanding, 2,500-seat venue, open to the public for athletic and civic events. Its Harriet Rothkopf Heilbrunn '32 Academic Nursing Center offers an extensive array of free preventive health services as well as a home for Brooklyn's first Lupus outreach and education office, all in service to the entire community. A wider array of wellness services, including special cluster of intervention programs addressing asthma and lead poisoning in children, are planned to begin in 2007. In recent months, the Provost also has overseen a dramatic re-landscaping that has nearly tripled the green space for the central campus, with native plants and amenities that create a serene environment and enhance the "college experience" on this urban campus.

Involved in higher education for three decades, Provost Haynes began her association with the Brooklyn Campus as a student, earning a bachelor's degree in English and a master's degree in counseling. She started her career as director of the Higher Education Opportunity Program. Upon completing her law degree at St. John's University in 1983, she became Long Island University's legal counsel before assuming the position of Provost in 1989.

A Queens, N.Y., native, Provost Haynes grew up with a love of books and the spoken word, which she attributes to her West Indian heritage. She has passed on that love of learning to her three daughters – a doctor, a lawyer and an educator – whom she raised as a divorced single parent. "Parenting is a training ground for being a good CEO," she maintains. Acting on her belief that a sound education is the key to realizing one's dreams, Provost Haynes is dedicated to creating an urban campus whose varied pathways help students to realize theirs.



John Suarez

Director of Athletics

John Suarez enters his 13th year as director of athletics at Long Island University, where he has overseen a dramatic growth of the school's athletic department. During his tenure, Suarez has witnessed a sensational rise in the Blackbirds' on-field success with 27 Northeast Conference championships and 22 NEC Coach of the Year awards. Under his guidance, Long Island captured its first-ever NEC Women's Commissioner's Cup in 2006 and posted its best overall finish in over 20 years with a third-place standing in 2008-09.

Academic success has also been a priority in Suarez's tenure. The department posted its highest cumulative grade-point average in over 20 years of record keeping with a 3.14 mark following the 2008-09 school year. It was the eighth consecutive year that the department's cumulative GPA was above 3.0. In addition, LIU has been cited with two National Graduation Awards sponsored by *USA Today* and has had its programs regularly recognized by the NCAA for its Academic Progress Rate scores.

Suarez has also spearheaded the department as it has made major improvements to its facilities. The 2006 opening of the Wellness, Recreation and Athletic Center culminated a decade of facility improvement at the Brooklyn Campus. The \$45 million facility houses a 2,500-seat arena, an NCAA regulation-size swimming pool and a state-of-the-art fitness center. The WRAC also features a wellness center that is geared toward a growing Brooklyn community.

The Wellness Center came on the heels of other improvements that included the addition of lights to LIU Field in 1999, FieldTurf in 2001 and bleachers for softball and baseball in 2003. Suarez has also overseen upgrades to the weight room, locker rooms and scoreboards.

Suarez's work is not done, as there are plans to further upgrade to the Blackbirds' facilities, including an extensive redesign of LIU Field and the addition of a bubble atop the Wellness Center, covering the track and tennis courts.

With a keen eye toward the future, Suarez has been mindful of LIU's past. He helped spearhead the creation of the LIU Athletics Hall of Fame in 2000 with 11 inaugural members, as well as the reestablishment of the Blackbird Club in 2002.

Suarez has also continued to make his presence felt outside the downtown Brooklyn campus. He is currently on the national board of officers for the NCAA Division I-AAA Athletics Directors Association. He previously served on the NCAA Management Council from 2003-06 and was a member of the Division I Budget Committee from 2004-06. Prior to that, Suarez was on the NCAA Championship Cabinet from 2000-03 and served as chair of the NEC Athletic Directors Committee from 2000-02.

Suarez arrived following a three-year stint as athletics director at Mercer County College in Trenton, N.J., which won two national championships and produced 11 regional titles in that span. Eighty percent of the athletes in his time attended four-year schools and every team produced a winning record during his last two years.

Suarez earned his bachelor's degree in marketing at Fairleigh Dickinson University, where he competed on the baseball team. He completed his master's in sports management at East Stroudsburg University.

The campus' athletic training staff is dedicated to the prevention, rehabilitation and recovery needs of over 200 student-athletes for the school's 18 athletic teams. Headed by three full-time athletic trainers, the staff consists of several graduate and undergraduate trainers who are enrolled in LIU's renowned athletic training program. Due to the extreme availability of the training program's resources, LIU's athletic trainers strive to place great attention and detail on each athlete in order to provide the best care possible. The sports medicine staff prides themselves on not only providing the best injury-specific plan of care, but also ensuring that the athlete's long-term health goals are met.

In the winter of 2005, a state-of-the-art Athletic Training Room opened in the Wellness, Recreation and Athletic Center. It is fully equipped with the latest modalities and rehabilitative equipment to ensure the needs of each individual student-athlete are fully met. The new Athletic Training Room allows the LIU sports medicine staff to conduct all short-term and post-operative rehabilitation on-site. The staff also works in conjunction with LIU's Center for Physical Rehabilitation in order to utilize a HydroWorx therapy pool.

The Wellness Center also houses resources and programs to promote the health of community residents. Cardiac rehabilitation, orthopedic therapy and asthma education services are available. In addition to providing treatment and rehabilitation, the athletic training staff provides education to student-athletes regarding health matters and concerns in order to aid students in achieving optimum health and conditioning.

Danny O'Connor has directed the sports medicine program since being promoted to head trainer in 2001. O'Connor, who started with LIU as a graduate student in 1994, and his staff are responsible for maintaining the operation of the athletic training room. His office coordinates the medical coverage and the administering of the athletic department's drug education and testing program. The athletic trainers also schedule appointments with the program's physician, coordinate preseason physical exams and design treatment and rehabilitation programs.

O'Connor and his staff consult regularly with athletic department orthopedic surgeon Dr. Howard Levy, a doctor of orthopedic surgery and sports medicine at Lenox Hill Hospital in New York City. Levy and a network of medical staff, mostly from Lenox Hill, work closely with LIU athletes to meet their surgical and rehabilitative needs.


Richard James

Strength and Conditioning Coach

The strength and conditioning program at Long Island University is designed to help student-athletes maximize their athletic potential and performance while reducing the risk of injury. Coordinated by Richard James, a former Blackbird and All-American in the 400-meter dash, specialized workout programs are tailored to enhance athletes' physical abilities in their specific sports, as each sport places different demands on the body. Included in his regimen are weight training, power and speed training, flexibility training, plyometrics and conditioning. James, who represented Jamaica in the 4x400-meter relay at the 2004 Olympics held in Athens and holds a master's degree in exercise physiology from Long Island, is a Certified Strength and Conditioning Specialist and a U.S.A. Weightlifting Performance Specialist.

The weight training room is located in the new state-of-the-art Wellness, Recreation and Athletic Center. The facility houses not only a fitness center equipped with the latest equipment - from stationary bikes with built-in televisions to a full weight station - but also a separate weight room especially geared for student-athletes.

The balancing of academic achievement and athletic success is the primary concern of LIU's Department of Athletics. The University's student-athlete academic services are designed to help the department fulfill its commitment to all student-athletes in their pursuit of academic excellence.

At LIU, there is a high priority placed on academic integrity, along with an opportunity to take advantage of extraordinary academic programs. The goal of the LIU Athletic Department is to give student-athletes an avenue to seek help, whether it be for tutorial assistance, scheduling of classes, personal or career development or to improve on their test-taking and time-management skills.

In her sixth year, Nora Mavashev is responsible for monitoring academic progress of the student-athletes, ensuring they meet and exceed the University's academic goals in compliance with NCAA and institutional standards. In conjunction with the director and senior associate director of athletics, Mavashev has formed close relationships with the academic advisement office and counseling center to assist the student-athlete in negotiating the demands of daily practices and games.

The athletic department had an overall grade point average this past year of 3.14. During the 2008-09 academic year, 15 of the 18 teams posted cumulative averages above 3.00. There were 111 student-athletes (58 percent) who had a cumulative GPA above 3.00 and 32 student-athletes (17 percent) with GPAs above 3.50. Over 100 student-athletes were named to the Northeast Conference Academic Honor Roll and for the second straight year, the NCAA announced Public Recognition Awards for the academic work of the women's golf, indoor track and field and cross country teams. In addition, the men's golf and soccer teams earned NEC Team Academic Awards.

The University has twice been recognized by the NCAA and *USA Today* for having the highest graduation rate in the nation as compared to the remainder of the student body.

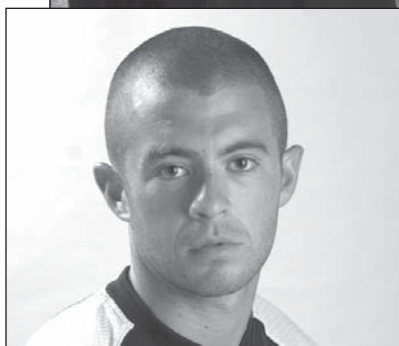

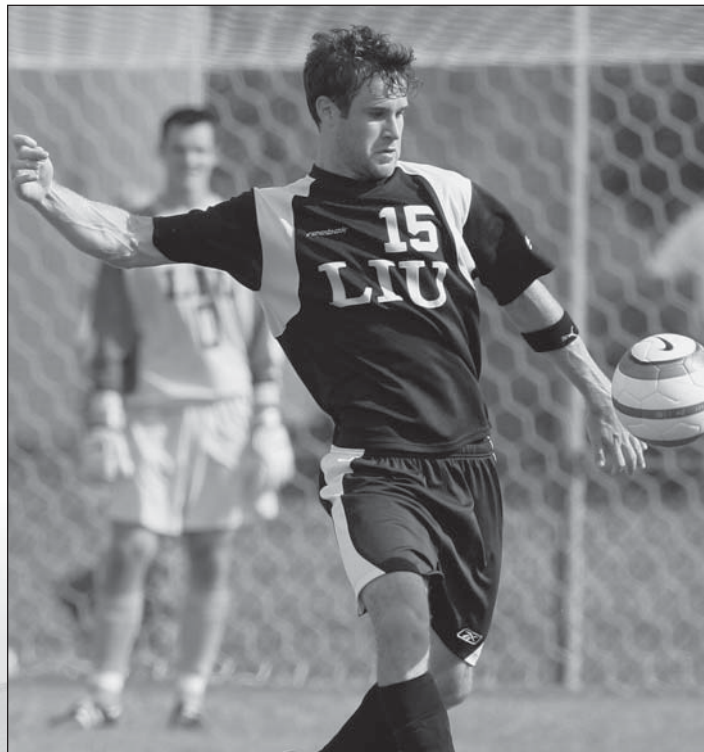
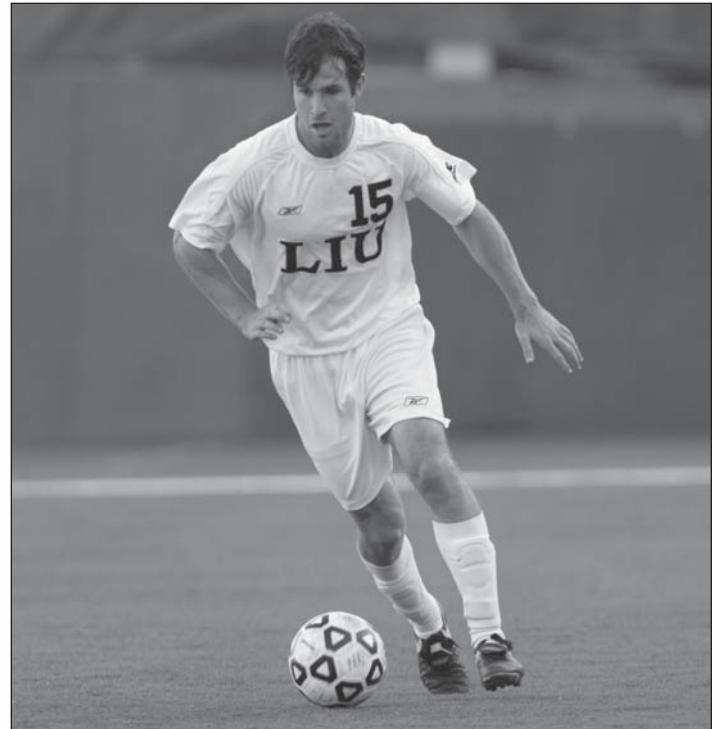
Ledet penned the following letter just after graduation to head coach TJ Kosticky, reflecting on his time and memories at LIU:

“I want to thank you specifically for your invaluable support for my athletic and academic endeavors. It is the combination of location and administration that has made LIU such a distinguished academic and athletic atmosphere for me.

“I have heard from friends of mine who played at bigger Division I schools where they were confronted with coaches and teachers who were often too busy to give them personal attention or too disconnected to understand the importance of both aspects of athletic life at a university. Many did not finish their athletic or academic careers. Fortunately for me, this is the opposite of what LIU has been.

“The open dialogue between, for instance, the Honors and Athletics programs allowed me to take advantage of all of the opportunities this university provides. The fact our team won conference and attended the NCAA Tournament while achieving the highest GPA in Division I is a testament to the focus you put on excellence on and off the field.

“One should not overlook the fact LIU is located less than two miles from the largest financial center in the world. The significance of this is that career opportunities are close at hand. Internships and organizations aimed at incorporating students into their workforce and providing funding for their participation is a benefit that does not exist at other universities.



“Part of coaching is being able to connect all of these features in order to encourage teammates to grow as a team and as individuals. In a word, LIU offered me a venue to explore my athletic and individual potential by encouraging excellence on the field and in the classroom. Specifically, you were understanding when conflicts inevitably arose between soccer and work. I could not imagine a better atmosphere for growing as a player and a student. I mean that quite seriously.

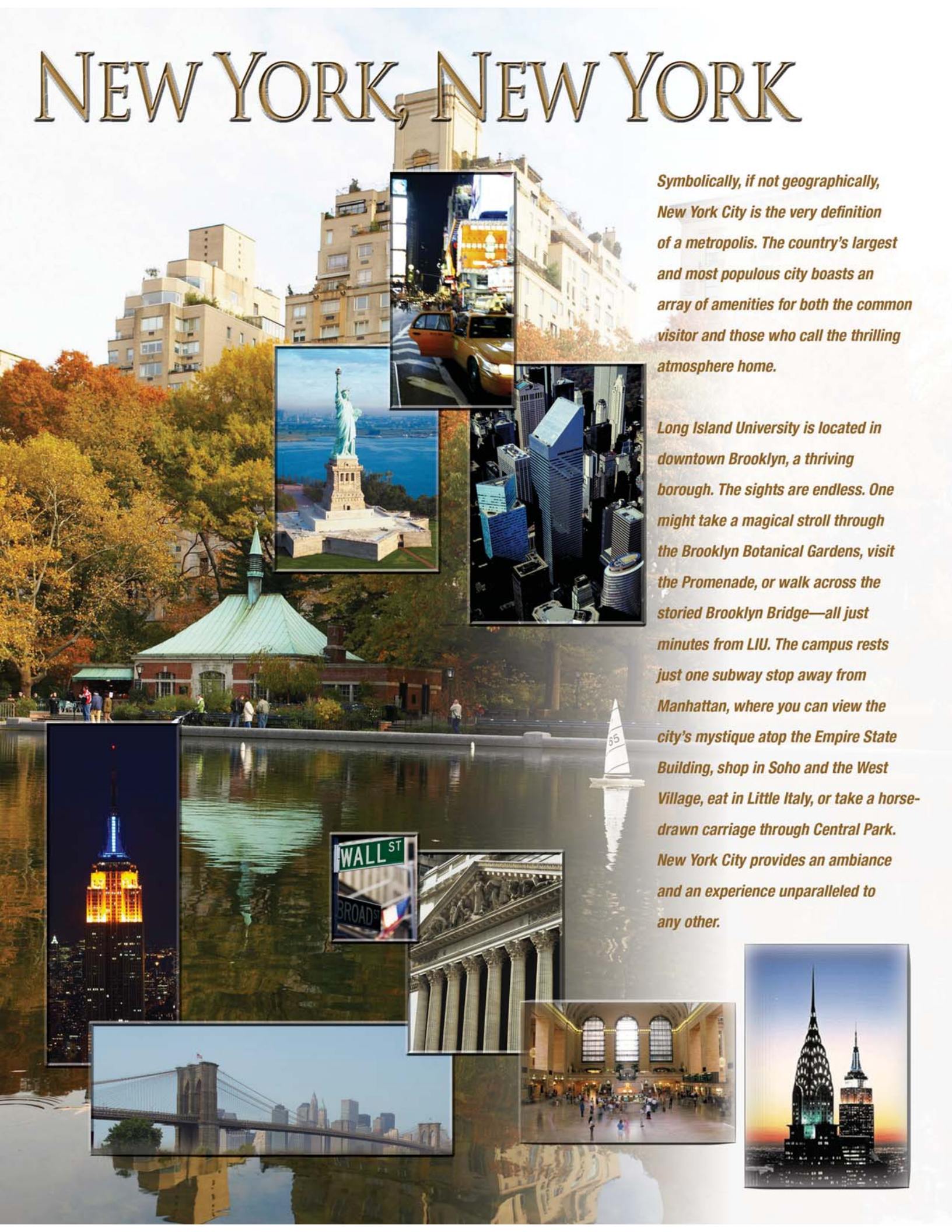

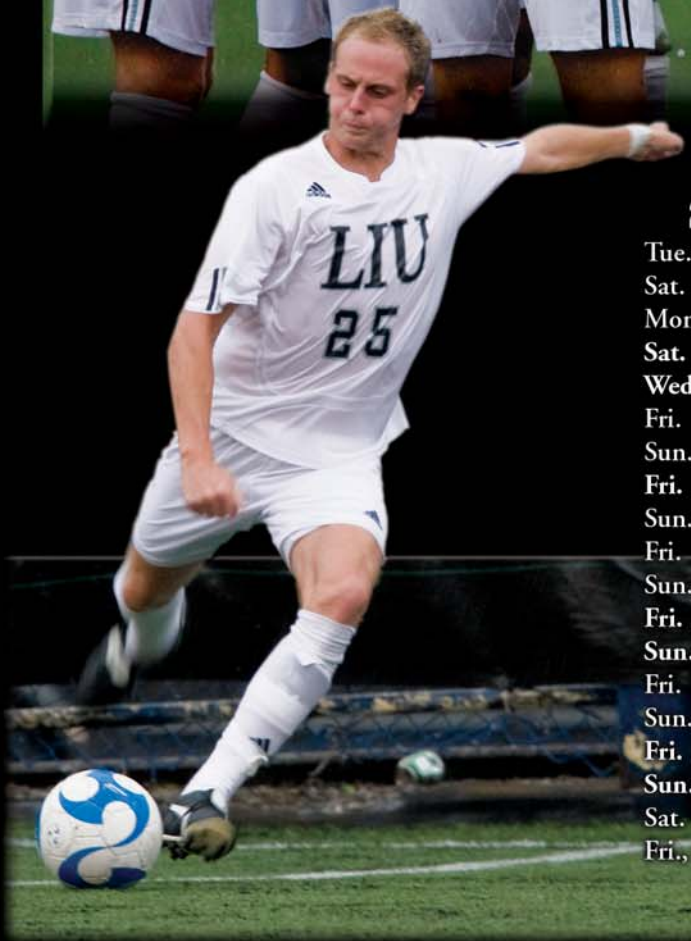
