LSC BASKETBALL

The Lone Star Conference has four unbeaten teams - three men's and one women's. Non-conference action continues with one league game this week on the women's side (Texas Woman's at Midwestern State).

The LSC men have a 39-17 overall record so far this season. In the NCAA South Central Region, the men's teams are currently 12-6 combined versus Heartland Conference teams and 1-3 against the Rocky Mountain Athletic Conference.

The LSC women are 34-24 overall. The women's squads are currently 9-10 combined against the Heartland, and 7-5 versus RMAC teams, which are the other conferences in the NCAA South Central Region.

PLAYERS OF THE WEEK

MEN'S OFFENSIVE

Rashad Basey, Texas A&M University - Kingsville, SR, Guard, Louisville, Ky, Jefferstown HS

Basey continues to play a key role in the Javelina offense averaging 21.5 points a game last week on 43.3 shooting. He was 15-of-18 free throw on the week in the two games for 83.3%. Basey added six assists and six steals. In the Javelinas win over St. Edward's, Basey was 6-of-13 from the floor with a pair of 3-point baskets. He added 10-of-12 free throw shooting in the game. Basey scored six points and a key assists in the final three minutes to seal the win. In Saturday's rematch with UTPB, Basey finished with 19 points, two assists and three steals. On the year, Basey leads the Javelinas with 19 points which is tied for the LSC lead.

MEN'S DEFENSIVE

Christian Macauley, Texas A&M University - Commerce, JR, Forward, Washington, D.C., Paint Brush HS

Macauley played a key role in helping A&M-Commerce to a pair of victories in Arkansas over the weekend. The junior pulled down 15 rebounds while adding seven blocks and two steals, all while averaging eight points a game. In the 96-78 rout of Southern Arkansas, Macauley recorded the second double-double of his Lion career with 11 points and 10 rebounds, including six defensive, with a block and a steal. Against Henderson State, Macauley came up big with a career-best six blocks, one shy of the program's single game record, with four defensive rebounds and a steal while adding five points as the Lions rallied for a 75-74 victory over Henderson State. Macauley's performance has helped A&M-Commerce to an 8-0 start, matching the program's second-best start to a season and the first since the 1953-54 season.

WOMEN'S OFFENSIVE

Lindsey Mahone, Texas A&M University - Kingsville, JR, Guard, Corpus Christi, Texas, Carroll HS

In two games this past week, junior transfer Lindsey Mahone had a tremendous all-around week. Mahone led the Javelinas to a 1-1 record on the week averaging 24.5 points, 8.5 rebounds, and 4.5 steals. She hit 56% (14-25) from the floor and was 19-of-32 at the foul line. In a last second loss to Southern Arkansas, Mahone scored a season-high 27 points with five rebounds on 7-of-14 shooting the floor. She was 12-of-15 from the foul line. Defensively, she added six steals matching Rosalie Cutri's high. In Saturday's win over Texas A&M International in double overtime, she recorded the first double-double of the year by a Javelina. She finished with 22 points and 7-of-11 from the field with 12 rebounds. Ten of her rebounds came on the defensive end and she added three more steals.

WOMEN'S DEFENSIVE

Devin Griffin, West Texas A&M University, SR, Forward, Lubbock, Texas, Coronado HS

Griffin had another outstanding weekend as she was second in scoring at 10.5 points and second in rebounding at 7.0 per game. She shot .471 from the field on 8 of 17 and was 5 of 8 from the line. Griffin earned a spot on the PAK-A-SAK Classic All-Tournament Team and helped hold the opposition to .390 from the field and .290 from beyond the arc. It was the third and fourth consecutive opponents WT has held under 40 percent shooting and the third and fourth opponents WT has held under 60 points. The Lady Buffs held the opponents to average just 30.0 rebounds per game and forced 40 turnovers and tallied 29 steals with a season-high 19 steals against Incarnate Word Friday. Griffin tied for the team lead with five steals for the week.

MEN'S OTHER TOP PERFORMERS

Will Cook, Cameron University, accounted for nearly half of Cameron's offense against #4 Drury in their 70-66 overtime loss. Cook scored a career high 26 points and 12 rebounds for his second double-double of the season. In two games Cook shot 55% from the field and went 81.3% from the line. He also averaged 19.5 points and 10 rebounds in two games for the Aggies. So far this season Cook has averaged 16.4 points per game and 8.9 rebounds per game.

De'Andre Upchurch, Tarleton State University, had a great week for the Texans, averaging 16.0 points per game in a pair of Tarleton State wins. Upchurch shot 52 percent from the field, which included going 8-for-17 (.471) from downtown. He came within a point shy of tying his career high on Tuesday, pouring in a game-high 22 points on 8-of-12 shooting. The Flint, Mich., native pulled down five rebounds, dished out four assists and had one steal on the week as well.

Devone Davis, Eastern New Mexico University, put up 15.7 points, 4.3 assists, 4.0 rebounds and 1.3 steals in 31.7 minutes of action over three games for Eastern New Mexico. He scored 20 points on 7-of-9 (77.8%) shooting as the Greyhounds nearly came back to defeat Pittsburg State in the Pak-A-Sak WT Thanksgiving Classic. Davis followed the next day with a 19-points, 7-assist and 7-rebound performance versus Southwestern

Oklahoma State while going 7-for-8 (87.5%) at the free throw line. His seven boards were a new season-high for him. Against Lubbock Christian, Davis had eight points, two rebounds and a team-high five assists.

Bryan Hammond, Angelo State University, scored 15 points on a 6 for 6 shooting performance against McMurry last Friday in the only game on the ASU schedule last week. Hammond scored 11 of his points in the second half and helped lead the Rams to a 73-70 road win. He is averaging 11.1 points per game this season and leads the Rams with 31 assists. He had three assists against McMurry.

Devondrick Walker, Texas A&M University - Commerce, was nearly unstoppable in helping A&M-Commerce to a pair of wins in Arkansas over the weekend. Walker hit 9-of-12 shots from the floor over the two games, including going a perfect 7-of-7 from three-point range and 2-of-2 from the free throw line. Walker had eight points and three rebounds in 14 minutes in the Lions' 96-78 rout of Southern Arkansas, leading into arguably his best game in a Lion uniform. Coming off the bench, Walker hit 7-of-8 shots, including 5-of-5 from three-point range, helping A&M-Commerce erase a nine-point first half deficit. Trailing by three with 30 seconds remaining, Walker hit the game-tying three-pointer as A&M-Commerce held off Henderson State 75-74. The Lions are 8-0 in the season, tying the second-best start in program history and their best since the 1953-54 season.

Jordan Jahr, Texas A&M University - Kingsville, averaged a double-double in the Javelinas two games last week. He led the team with 13 rebounds a game and 10.5 points a game. After 12 points and 10 rebounds in the win over St. Edward's, he had 16 rebounds at UTPB on Saturday to go with nine points. Jahr's 16 rebounds were the most by a Hoggie since Jan. 29, 2005 when Robert Hamilton had 17 against Eastern New Mexico. The transfer averaged nine boards on the defensive glass including 11 at UTPB. Jahr had a pair of blocks against St. Edward's and one versus the Falcons.

Phil Henry, Eastern New Mexico University, averaged 8.0 points, 6.3 rebounds, 1.7 blocks and 1.3 steals last week in three games for Eastern New Mexico. His field goal percentage of 61.5% was the highest on the team. He set a career-high with nine rebounds versus Pittsburg State in the Pak-A-Sak WT Thanksgiving Classic and matched it the next day against Southwestern Oklahoma State. Off the bench versus Lubbock Christian, Henry had three blocks and scored five points. In the first game in Canyon, Texas, he scored eight points and recorded two steals. The Greyhound held the Bulldogs to 30.0% shooting as Henry blocked two shots, credited with two steals and contributed 11 points.

Kenny Williams, Angelo State University, helped lead the Rams to a 73-70 win over McMurry last weekend with a steal in the final seconds to secure the victory after recording 10 points and six rebounds. Williams' steal with three seconds remaining resulted in the Rams moving to 7-0 on the season. He is averaging 17.4 points, 7.6 rebounds and leads ASU with 10 steals.

Chuck Guy, Tarleton State University, had a great week defensively for the Texans, helping limit opponents to scoring just 47.5 points a game and shooting just 33 percent from the field. Guy had six steals in Saturday's win over East Central, which tied for seventh-most in a single game in school history. He finished the week with eight steals, five boards, 16 assists and scoring 13.5 points per game.

WOMEN'S OTHER TOP PERFORMERS

Chontiquah White, West Texas A&M University, earned PAK-A-SAK Classic MVP honors after averaging 17.0 points and 8.5 rebounds in a pair of wins for the Lady Buffs this past week. White went a team-best 13 of 19 from the field and 8 of 13 from the line. She tallied her first double-double of the season with 19 points and 10 rebounds Saturday in the 88-57 win over Colorado State-Pueblo. She had four assists on the week as well while scoring 34 points in 43 minutes of action. White has 738 career points and 450 rebounds.

Chelsea Stamp, Cameron University, left the weekend with nine three-pointers made and averaged 15.5 points per game in Colorado, she was named to the Colo-School of Mines All-Tournament Team for her efforts. Stamp shot the ball at the arc at 56.3% and scored 19 points in their 80-68 win against Mines. After a quiet first three games of the season, Stamp has hit double figures in her last three for the Aggies. So far this season Stamp has averaged 9.5 points per game for CU.

Raven McGrath, Tarleton State University, put together the best night of her Tarleton career Tuesday night when the No. 24 Tarleton TexAnns defeated Texas Wesleyan 80-40. The sophomore guard from Grandview led the team with a career-high 13 points on 4-8 shooting from the floor, including 3-5 from downtown, and 2-2 shooting at the charity stripe. This is the first time McGrath has led the team in scoring and did so in just 17 minutes of action off the bench. She also added three rebounds, two assists and a steal to fill up the box score.

Lakeeyscia Griffin, Eastern New Mexico University, registered an outstanding performance in leading the Zias to a win over Oklahoma Panhandle State. She hit all six free throw attempts in scoring 12 points, dished out nine assists and grabbed four steals.

Rochelle Norris, Angelo State University, averaged 10.7 points per game over the last week. The Dallas native helped the Belles go 2-1 by scoring double digits in all three games. She averaged 4.0 rebounds per game with 11 total rebounds coming on the defensive end. Her 12 points against Incarnate Word is a season high for the senior.

Kiara Wright, Tarleton State University, anchored a Tarleton defense that completely shut down the Texas Wesleyan offense in an 80-40 Tarleton victory last Tuesday. Wright played just 21 minutes of the game, the majority of which came in the first half as Tarleton held the Lady Rams to just four points over the first 15 minutes of the game. Wright finished the game with 13 points and nine rebounds in her 21 minutes of action, with seven of her nine boards coming on the defensive end of the court. She also added four steals.

Nelsha Peterson, Eastern New Mexico University, registered a strong defensive performance in Eastern's win over Oklahoma Panhandle. She finished with four steals, six defensive rebounds and was a constant presence in the passing lanes. She also earned the second double double of her career, with 11 points and 10 boards.

Lacy Reinke, Cameron University, was a force for Cameron in the second half against Colorado School of Mines to get the Aggies their fifth win of the season. Reinke pulled down 10 rebounds with two blocks and three steals in the final 20 minutes to hold Mines to 26.5% shooting after leading 42-40 at the half. In two games the last week, Reinke averaged eight rebounds and picked off four steals. So far this season Reinke has averaged 8.8 points per game with eight steals, and five blocks.

Angelo State

The Rams moved to 7-0 on the season with a 73-70 win over McMurry last Friday in their only game of the Thanksgiving week. ASU missed only five shots in the second half and finished the game shooting 59 percent from the field. Bryan Hammond led the Rams with 15 points in the game, while Daniel Skinner had 12, Reggie Sutton 11 and Kenny Williams 10. The Rams return to action this week with a home game against McMurry on Tuesday followed by a game against Arkansas-Fort Smith on Saturday at Collin College in Plano.

Cameron

Cameron lost both of their games last weekend in Springfield, MO to Truman State and #4 Drury. The Aggies were more defensively sound against Drury, the defending NCAA Champions holding them to 70 points in an overtime loss. Will Cook has continued to excel this season netting a career high 26 points and 12 rebounds against Drury. Craig Foster continues to improve and have nailed double-figures in all seven games this season and has averaged 16.9 points per game with 5.0 assists. Despite the 3-4 start Cameron began last season in the same fashion before ending the year on a 15-3 regular season run. Cameron will have a busy week playing a pair of exhibitions on Dec. 3-4 at Oral Roberts and Missouri Southern before hosting Oklahoma Christian on Dec. 7 at the Aggie Gym.

Eastern New Mexico

Eastern New Mexico went 1-2 last week as they defeated Southwestern Oklahoma State in their final game of the Pak-A-Sak WT Thanksgiving Classic 71-49. The Greyhounds fell on a last second shot to Lubbock Christian in Clovis, N.M. and lost to Pittsburg State by two in Canyon, Texas. Rodney Blackmon averaged 18.5 points, 4.0 assists, 2.0 rebounds and 1.0 steals as he played in the first two games during the week. Devone Davis added 15.7 ppg, 4.3 apg, 4.0 rpg and 1.3 spg while Rafael Love contributed 14.7 ppg and 6.0 rpg. Phil Henry set a career-high with nine rebounds versus the Gorillas and matched it the next day against the Bulldogs. He also led the team with five blocks, for which is he currently third in the conference with 1.5 bpg. ENMU held SWOSU to 30.0% on field goals, the lowest for an opponent this season. This week the Greyhounds play just once when they host Northern New Mexico on Saturday at 5 p.m. MT.

Tarleton State

The Texans moved to 6-0 for the first time since the 2006-07 season with a pair of wins this past week ... Tarleton defeated Dallas Christian 106-41 on Tuesday to give the Texans back-to-back 100-point games for the first time since 1997-98 ... It also marked the first time in school history that a Texan team had scored 85 points or more in five straight games ... The Texans then defeated East Central for the ninth straight time on Saturday, downing the Tigers 75-54 ... Tarleton's 85-points or more streak came to an end, but it was the first time the Texans managed to score at least 75 points or more in six straight games since the 2001-02 season ... The Texans continue to lead the conference with 97.7 points per game ... Tarleton has three players averaging double-figures, but are

led by Chuck Guy's 17.2 points per game ... Guy also leads the squad in three-point shooting (.476), free throw percentage (.906), assists (40) and steals (12) ... Davene Carter leads the Texans in rebounds (8.3/game), while Jon Cathey-Macklin continues to lead the team with 13 blocks (2.17/game) ... The Texans will have just one game this week, facing Oklahoma State at home on Wednesday at 7 p.m. ... Due to the Texan football team playing in the Heart of Texas Bowl, Tarleton's game with McMurry that was scheduled for Saturday, Dec. 7, has been moved to Tuesday, Dec. 17, at 8 p.m.

Texas A&M-Commerce

A&M-Commerce notched two more victories over the weekend, improving to 8-0 on the season and matching the program's second-best season start ... The 8-0 start matches the 1953-54 team and is just two games shy of the program's best-ever start, a 10-0 run at the beginning of the 1947-48 season ... The Lions scored 17 of the first 19 points against Southern Arkansas Friday and never looked back, maintaining a double-digit advantage for the duration of the game en route to a 96-78 win ... LaDon Carnegie notched 18 points while Daniel Ehambe added a career-high 15 points as the Lions won their 12th-straight against the Muleriders and coach Walker improved to 16-2 all-time against SAU ... The following night, the Lions fought back from a nine-point first half deficit to outlast Henderson State 75-74 ... The Belles are 4-3 on the season after going 2-1 last week. ASU went 2-0 in the West Texas A&M Thanksgiving Classic with Amanda Weaver being named to the all-tournament team. She hit six three pointers in the win over Incarnate Word becoming to first Belle since 2009 to hit six three pointers in a single game. The Belles are 3-1 away from the Junell Center this season. ASU is holding opponents to 36.8-percent shooting from the field and are out rebounding opponents 40.3 to 35.3. Hillari Adam is the team's leading scorer and rebounder at 13.7 points per game and 8.7 rebounds per game. Texas A&M-Kingsville

The Javelinas were 1-1 on the week. They began the week with a last second loss at home on Wednesday to Southern Arkansas before downing Texas A&M International in double overtime on Saturday... Against the Muleriders, Kingsville rallied from a 10-point deficit with five minutes left taking a 1-point lead on a 3-point play by Lindsey Mahone. After SAU regained the lead, Sheana Jones had an opportunity to win the game with a drive to the basket in the closing seconds but missed the layin...Kingsville won in double overtime 92-86 over the Dustdevils. The overtime game was Kingsville's first since knocking off Midwestern State 83-76 in Wichita Falls on Jan. 27, 2010. The Hoggies outscored TAMIU 12-6 in the second overtime period. Two Javelinas - Rosalie Cutri with 25 and Lindsey Mahone 22 - finished the contest with 20 points, while Ashley Viera added 19 points...Cutri struggled against Southern Arkansas being held scoreless for the first time this season and scoring below 10 points for just the second time this season...With 49 points last week, Mahone now has three 20-point games and leads the Javelinas with 14.9 a game. She also leads the team with 5.9 rebounds after grabbing 12 at International which is the most by a Javelina this season...Ashley Viera posted a season-high 19 points against International and has tallied 17-or-more three times this season. She was 5-of-7 from the field...In two games this past week, junior transfer Lindsey Mahone had a tremendous all-around week.
