LSC FOOTBALL

Midwestern State stayed perfect at 3-0 overall and 2-0 in Lone Star Conference play with a victory at Tarleton State for the first time since a 44-23 win on Nov. 4, 2000. Texas A&M-Commerce improved to 2-0 in league action, while West Texas A&M and McMurry notched their first LSC victories.

This week's slate includes four LSC contests with McM at WT, Angelo State at MSU, Eastern New Mexico at Texas A&M-Kingsville, and TSU at A&M-C.

LSC football teams are 16-12 overall this season. The squads are 5-1 combined versus the Great Lakes Intercollegiate Athletic Conference, Great Lakes Valley Conference and Rocky Mountain Athletic Conference teams, which are also in NCAA Super Regional Four.

LSC FOOTBALL PLAYOFFS

After playing seven conference games apiece over the first nine weeks of an 11-week regular season, the Lone Star Conference's eight football teams will split into two brackets to conduct a two-week conference playoff. The conference champion and playoff seeding will be determined by regular season results with the higher seeds hosting each round.

The top four teams (No. 4 at No. 1 and No. 3 at No. 2) comprise the championship bracket with Week 10 winners playing for the playoff title in Week 11, whereas Week 10 losers will meet for third place. The other half of the bracket includes the remaining four teams with No. 8 at No. 5 and No. 7 at No. 6 in Week 10. The winners will play for fifth-place in Week 11, while the losers meet in the seventh-place game.

PLAYERS OF THE WEEK

OFFENSIVE

Jeremy Watson, West Texas A&M University, SR, WR, Lubbock, Texas, Estacado HS

Watson tallied a career-high 269 yards receiving on a career-high 12 catches in the Buffs' thrilling 58-41, come-from-behind victory at unbeaten Angelo State Saturday night. Watson was all over the field as he scored on a 56-yard pass bringing WT within 35-31 early in the third quarter. Watson and the Buffs outscored ASU 37-6 in the second half for the win. It was Watson's second game of over 100 yards receiving in his WT career.

DEFENSIVE

Daniel Laudermilk, Midwestern State University, JR, LB, Austin, Texas, Austin HS

Laudermilk led the Midwestern State defense as the Mustangs defeated Tarleton State 27-23 to win in Stephenville for the first time since the Clinton administration. The 6-1, 225 pound junior linebacker from Austin, Texas/Austin HS chalked up nine tackles to lead the MSU defenders as the Mustangs held the Texans to 379 yards. Tarleton entered the game with the 17th best offense in Division II averaging 513.5 yards a contest. MSU leads the LSC in total defense (361.3 ypg) and scoring defense (21.0 ppg). The win for MSU was the first at Tarleton State since Nov. 4, 2000.

SPECIAL TEAMS

Anthony Yancy, Angelo State University, SR, PR/KR, Fresno, Calif., Hoover HS

Yancy broke the ASU single-game record for kickoff return yards with 195 against West Texas A&M. He returned a kick 100-yards for a touchdown at the end of the first half to tie the LSC record for longest kick return and put the Rams up 35-21. It was his first kickoff return for a touchdown of his career at Angelo State.

OTHER TOP PERFORMERS

Jacob Johnson, Eastern New Mexico University, caught eight of the Greyhounds nine completed passes went for 159 yards and two touchdowns. Six of his receptions resulted in first downs, while another throw to him resulted in a pass interference penalty. For the game, Johnson averaged 19.9 yards per catch.

Greg Pitre, Texas A&M University - Kingsville, rushed for a game-high 117 yards as the Javelinas outgained the War Hawks on the ground, 249-to-207... His 117 yards are a season-high for the sophomore and mark the second time in as many seasons that the Hutto, Texas native rushes for over 100 yards against McMurry.

Ryan Byrd, Angelo State University, scored three total touchdowns in the first half to build a 35-21 lead for Angelo State. He scored his first rushing touchdown of his career at ASU on a 3-yard scamper. His only reception from Kyle Washington was a 19-yard touchdown. It is his first reception touchdown of his career at ASU. The junior would score again on a bruising 30-yard run in the second quarter. The Lake Elsinore native rushed for 92 yards on 13 carries and averaged 7.1 yards per carry on the ground.

Jake Glover, Midwestern State University, directed Midwestern State to a 27-23 victory at Tarleton State giving the Mustangs their first win in Stephenville since 2000. The 6-4, 220 pound senior quarterback from White Settlement, Texas/Brewer recorded 319 yards of total offense in leading MSU to its third straight win. Glover hit 18-of-36 passes for 242 yards, including the game-winning touchdown pass of nine yards to tight end Mark Strange. He also ran for 77 yards on 12 carries, despite suffering sacks of nine and 14 yards. Glover is second in NCAA Division II with a 17.53 yards per completion average.

Collin Strahan, Tarleton State University, was nearly flawless through the air against No. 18 Midwestern State Saturday night. The signal caller from Mesquite was 14-18 for 188 yards and two touchdowns with no interceptions. He also added 27 yards of offense on the ground and served as the holder for the field goal unit.

Jeret Smith's, McMurry University, 39-yard TD catch-and-run in the third quarter proved to be the difference

Ricky Collins, Texas A&M University - Commerce, was clutch for the Lions as A&M-Commerce topped the depending LSC champs, 48-32 Saturday. Collins hauled in six receptions for 93 yards including two TDs. His two touchdown receptions matched a season-high. Collins caught a 4-yard TD reception to put the Lions on the score board. Collins also had 39-yard reception as he tip-toed the sideline and setting the Lions up on the goal line. His final catch of the game came late in the third quarter, a 37-yard catch for a touchdown as he beat the defender on a post route. It was the Lions' final score of the game.

Rush Seaver, Angelo State University, led all tacklers with a career high with 22 tackles against West Texas A&M. He recorded nine solo and 13 assisted with one tackle for loss. On the season, the senior has made 41 total stops, two tackles for loss and three quarterback hurries.

Devin Figures, Tarleton State University, had another superb game, playing on all defensive and special teams units for Tarleton. The senior safety recorded a team-high 19 tackles, including 15 solo stops, to go along with his first forced fumble of the season – which Tarleton recovered.

Charles Woods, Texas A&M University - Commerce, was again all over the field for the Lions as he racked up a game-high 14 total tackles including eight solo tackles and two tackles for loss. Woods also recovered a muffed punt by the Greyhounds. Woods has led the Lions in tackles in each of the first four games. He is second in LSC in total tackles and sixth in average tackles per game despite seeing limited action in two of A&M-Commerce's games.

Chase Franklin, McMurry University, was game co-leader in tackles. His interception in McM territory with 53 seconds left in game, sealed victory for War Hawks over TAMUK

Benjamin Pedro-Langford, Eastern New Mexico University, made nine tackles against Texas A&M-Commerce with six solo stops. He also forced a fumble on a goal-line stand, during the third quarter.

Braedon Robinson, Texas A&M University - Kingsville, registered 3.5 tackles for a loss at McMurry on Saturday, including a crucial stop late in the fourth quarter to give the Javelinas one last chance to rally from behind and defeat the War Hawks... Robinson finished with five total tackles (three solo) and now has 7.0 tackles for a loss in his debut season.

Alex Tucci, West Texas A&M University, blocked a punt in the third quarter and teammate LaPear Willrich returned it 48 yards for a touchdown giving WT its first lead of the game and the lead for good (45-41) in a thrilling 58-41 victory at Angelo State Saturday night. WT was down 35-21 at half and battled back, outscoring ASU 37-6 in the second half. Tucci had two tackles with a half a sack which marked the first sack ASU had allowed all season, one pass breakup and the blocked punt which was the first of this season for him and fourth of his career.

Mitchell Henton, Midwestern State University, kept the field flipped in the Mustangs favor as Midwestern State defeated Tarleton State 27-23 in Stephenville. The 6-2, 205 pound redshirt freshman from Dallas, Texas/Lake Highlands, punted five times for an average of 45.0 yards, putting the Texans inside the 20-yard line three times. Henton posted his best punt of the season of 56 yards on his final punt of contest that went out-of-bounds at the TSU 11 with 5:41 to play. Henton leads the LSC and is 13th in NCAA Division II in punting with a 43.5 yard average.

Blake Barnes, Tarleton State University, handled all of the kicking responsibilities for Tarleton State Saturday against No. 18 Midwestern State. The junior was 3-4 on field goals with a season-best kick of 49

yards to go along with five kickoffs for 313 total yards. He also booted a career-long punt of 52 yards.

Connor Hollabaugh, West Texas A&M University, had an outstanding game Saturday in the Buffs' 58-41 win at Angelo State. Hollabaugh went a career-best 3 for 3 in field goals all in the second half as WT outscored ASU 37-6 in the second half for the come-from-behind win as the Buffs were down 35-21 at intermission. He also had a career-high 11 kickoffs for a 62.5 average for 687 yards and four touchbacks. Hollabaugh leads the nation in field goals per game at 2.25 and is 11th in field goal percentage at 90.0 on 9 of 10.

Davarus Shores, Texas A&M University - Commerce, spearheaded the Lions special teams unit against Eastern New Mexico. Shores blocked up a kick that led to a 40-yard scoop and score for teammate Richard Cooper early in the first quarter. Shores came up with the football on the opening kick of the second half when the Greyhound returner did not field the kickoff. Shores hustled down and alertly jumped on the football. The Lions scored three players later. Shores has blocked two kicks on the season as the Lions have racked up four block kicks including two blocked punts.

LSC NOTES (Submitted by LSC SID's) Angelo State

The Rams suffered their first loss of the season to West Texas A&M on Saturday and fall to 2-1 overall and 1-1 in the LSC ... Anthony Yancy broke the ASU single-game record for kickoff return yards with 195 ... Yancy also returned a kickoff 100-yards for a touchdown against WT ... Ryan Byrd scored three touchdowns in the first half against West Texas A&M ... Byrd rushed for 92 yards on 13 carries while averaging 7.1 yards per carry ... Rush Seaver set a career high with 22 total tackles against the Buffs ... Sam Fowler averaged 45.2 yards per punt and dropped three punts inside the 20-yard line ... The Rams will take on Midwestern State in Wichita Falls this Saturday at 7 p.m.

Eastern New Mexico

Last Saturday, the Greyhounds were led by senior wide receiver Jacob's Johnson's eight catch, 159-yard day, with two touchdowns. Texas A&M-Commerce raced to a 35-point lead, but the Hounds managed to score 22 of the final 25 points, to make it a two possession game. The Lions used a late interception to hang on for the win. Eastern's defense limited A&M-Commerce to 24 rushing yards and forced key turnovers to allow the comeback effort, which included Benjamin Pedro-Langford's forced fumble at the goal line. This week, Eastern will visit Texas A&M-Kingsville.

McMurry

McMurry University's football team was opportunistic when it counted the most and converted that into a 27-21 victory last Saturday over Texas A&M-Kingsville at Wilford Moore Stadium. The War Hawks (2-1, 1-1 LSC) also garnered their first Lone Star Conference victory with the win. McM needed all three of the interceptions turned in by head coach Lance Hinson's defense. The first two – by Tyreece House and Ryan Williams – were converted into scores. A third by linebacker Chase Franklin, occurring with just 53 seconds remaining in the game and in McMurry territory, sealed the victory for the hosts. Franklin and House each collected nine total tackles, to go along with their interceptions. Fellow linebacker Josh Jones had eight tackles and a sack versus TAMUK. McM quarterback Matt McHugh and his twin brother David McHugh, a wide receiver on the team, hooked

up on a pass play versus the Javelinas. The duo have managed at least one aerial connection in each of McMurry's first three games.

Midwestern State

Midwestern State is 3-0 overall and is 2-0 in Lone Star Conference play ... MSU's 27-23 victory at Tarleton State was the first time Midwestern State had defeated the Texans in Stephenville since a 44-23 win on Nov. 4, 2000 ... The Mustangs are ranked 16th in the AFCA Division II Coaches Poll, marking MSU's third consecutive week in the poll. It's also MSU's 35th ranking in the last 40 polls and 55th in the last 65...MSU has received at least one vote in the poll in 101 of the 102 polls ... The Midwestern defense once again leads the Lone Star Conference, allowing 361.3 yards a game and ranking 65th in NCAA Division II ... MSU also leads the LSC in scoring defense (21.0 points a game, 44th nationally), Passing Defense (190.7 yards allowed, 49th in DII), Passing Efficiency Defense (147.65 rating, 41st), and Team Sacks (3.00 per game, 21st) ... The MSU defense held Tarleton State to 379 total yards, its lowest output of the season. TSU entered the game ranked 17th in NCAA Division II in total offense averaging 513.5 yards a game ... TSU was limited to 180 rushing and 199 passing yards after averaging 261.5 rushing (then 15th) and 252.0 passing (then 56th) ... With the interception by LaKeith Murray, three different Mustangs have interceptions on the year, one in each game ... The MSU Offense is second in the LSC, averaging 485.7 yards a game (25th in NCAA II) and is third in scoring offense, averaging 36.3 points a game (35th nationally) ... Sophomore running back Dante Taylor posted his second 100-plus rushing game against Tarleton with 105 yards on 18 carries. It was his fifth career 100-yard game, moving him into a tie for eighth all-time at MSU ... MSU's string of 100-yard receiving games was snapped against TSU. Breion Evans recorded 91 yards on five receptions in the first half, but did not have another catch in the game, ending the streak at four straight contests dating back to 2013 ... MSU collected 30 first downs against Tarleton State, tied for the four most in school history, and the most since gathering 32 first downs against Abilene Christian on Nov. 10, 2007 ... Redshirt freshman punter Mitchell Henton leads the LSC and is 13th in NCAA Division II with a 43.5 yard average. He booted five punts for a 45.0 average at Tarleton State, three inside the 20 ... The Mustangs were flagged 14 times for 187 yards, tying for the second-most penalty yardage in a game. It was the most penalty yardage recorded by MSU since moving into NCAA Division II ... MSU has opened the Lone Star Conference season with wins over both the LSC defending co-champions, Eastern New Mexico and Tarleton State, and hasn't played a conference game at home until this week when Angelo State comes to visit Memorial Stadium ...

Tarleton State

Tarleton State dropped its second straight game of the season Saturday night in a hard-fought battle against No. 18 Midwestern State. The Texans were led in passing by Collin Strahan (188), rushing by Zach Henshaw (79), receiving by Bubba Tandy (76) and defensively by Devin Figures and Marc Martinez, who had 19 and 15 tackles, respectively.

Texas A&M-Commerce

With a punt block in the first quarter against Eastern New Mexico, the Lions have blocked four kicks on the season ... Davarus Shores, who blocked the punt Saturday, leads the team with two blocked kicks ...

All told the Lions have three blocked punts on the year ... The Lions lead the NCAA in blocked punts. The Lions are second in scoring offense, fourth in passing offense and 12th in total offense in the NCAA. On the defensive side, the Lions lead the NCAA in team tackles for a loss. Senior kicker Saul Martinez connected on a career-long 48-yard field goal with 13:04 in the second quarter ... Two Lion kickers have combined for career-highs in each of the first four games ... Martinez with kicks of 41 yards against ETBU, 43 yards against Kingsville and 48-yards Saturday at Eastern New Mexico ... Junior Chase Thrasher hit a career-long 41-yard at Stephen F. Austin.

Texas A&M-Kingsville

Despite throwing three interceptions that led to 13 points, Texas A&M University-Kingsville (1-3, 0-2 LSC) had a chance to come from behind and escape Abilene with a victory. However, McMurry (2-1, 1-1 LSC) sealed the victory, 27-21, after their third pick of the game with 53 seconds remaining in the Saturday evening contest at Wilford Moore Stadium. A great defensive stand, highlighted by Braedon Robinson's tackle for a loss gave the Javelinas one last drive to rally from behind and win the game. On fourth-and-17, Sebastian Taylor found Patrick LaFleur for a 22-yard completion to enter McMurry territory. However, on the ensuing play, the War Hawks sealed the victory, 27-21, after their third pick of the game. Prior to the drive, the Javelinas drove down the field – 10 plays for 75 yards – and capped off the 3:29 drive with a 19-yard touchdown pass to Jordan Thomas to cut their deficit to 27-21 with 5:42 remaining in the game.

West Texas A&M

Once again the Buffs dug deep in the second half and battled for a thrilling victory...This time, WT was down 35-21 at halftime and outscored ASU 37-6 in the second half for a 58-41 victory knocking ASU from the ranks of unbeaten...WT evened its record at 2-2 and 1-1 in league play after things looked bleak in the first half...A huge blocked punt from junior Alex Tucci (his fourth career blocked kick) and 48-yard touchdown return on the blocked punt from sophomore LaPear Willrich gave WT a 45-41 lead which it would never relinquish...WT wide receiver Jeremy Watson had a career-high 12 receptions for 269 yards and a touchdown in the game, while junior quarterback Preston Rabb went 34 of 49 for a career-high 495 yards passing and three touchdowns for his breakout game...Tucci also was part of the lone sack in the game, the first ASU had allowed all season...ASU was the second team WT had beaten in consecutive weeks who was undefeated (Shorter)... In the two wins this season, the Buffs have outscored the opposition 57-6 in the second half...WT tallied a season-high 637 yards of total offense, while forcing three interceptions by the Rams...The WT "D" forced ASU quarterback Kyle Washington, who led the nation in completion percentage entering the game, to 26 of 43 with three picks as Washington was completing 85 percent of his passes entering the contest...WT sophomore kicker Connor Hollabaugh went a career-best 3 for 3 in field goals and had 11 kickoffs for 687 yards and a 62.5 average with four touchbacks...The Buffs return home to face McMurry for Homecoming. WT downed McMurry 90-57 last season in Abilene in a game that saw nearly 1500 yards of total offense between the two teams...WT tallied a season-high 32 first downs in the game...The Buffs, after allowing eight third down conversions by ASU in the first half, allowed just one in the second half.
