CENTRAL MICHIGAN SNAPS NIU'S HOME AND MAC WIN STREAKS

Central Michigan earned an impressive 34-17 road win at Northern Illinois on Saturday, snapping the Huskies 28-game consecutive home winning streak and the 24-game consecutive MAC regular season winning streak. Chippewas running back Thomas Rawls rushed for 270 yards and two touchdowns on 40 carries and quarterback Cooper Rush was an efficient 20-31 passing for 269 yards and two scores in the victory.

The last home loss for Northern Illinois came on Sept. 26, 2009 with a 34-31 loss to Idaho. Central Michigan was also the last MAC team to beat NIU at Huskie Stadium with a 33-30 OT win on Nov. 12, 2008.

Central Michigan also ended NIU's streak of 24 consecutive MAC regular season wins. The Chippewas were the last MAC team to beat NIU in the regular season when they defeated the Huskies 48-41 in Mount Pleasant on Oct. 1, 2011.

BRONCOS FRANKLIN LEADS NATION IN RUSH TDS & SCORING

Western Michigan true freshman running back Jarvion Franklin added another three rushing touchdowns and 161 yards on his 24 carries in a thrilling 42-38 comefrom-behind win at Ball State. Franklin leads the nation in rushing touchdowns (15) and scoring (90 points).

In six games, Franklin has rushed for 843 yards on 141 carries for 15 touchdowns. Broncos RB Jarvion Franklin ranks in FBS:

- -1st in rushing touchdowns (15)
- -1st in scoring (90 points; 15.0 ppg)
- -6th in rushing yards per game (140.5 ypg)
- -6th in total rushing yards (843 yards)

MAC LEADS 'GROUP OF FIVE' WITH FOUR WINS VS. 'POWER FIVE'

The MAC leads the 'Group of Five' Conferences with four wins over 'Power Five' opponents this season. The MAC has wins over Northwestern, Purdue and Indiana from the Big Ten Conference and Pittsburgh from the ACC. Among the 'Group of Five' Conferences, the MAC and Mountain West Conference are tied with four wins over opponents from the 'Power Five' Conferences.

Among the 'Group of Five' Conferences, the Mountain West has four 'Power Five' wins over two Pac-12 (Colorado, Washington State) and two ACC (Wake Forest, Boston College) opponents. The American Athletic Conference has three 'Power Five' wins over two ACC opponents (Virginia Tech, North Carolina) and one SEC (Vanderbilt) program. The Sun Belt has one 'Power Five' victory (Wake Forest-ACC) and Conference USA has zero wins vs. 'Power Five' opponents.

MAC Storylines

- This Saturday, Oct. 18 features five conference games with Akron at Ohio; Western Michigan at Bowling Green; Eastern Michigan at UMass; Ball State at Central Michigan and Miami at NIU, while the only non-conference contest is Army at Kent State.
- Akron Head Coach Terry Bowden celebrated his 150th career head coaching victory as the Zips defeated Miami, 29-19. Akron has now won three consecutive games and are 4-2 overall, 2-0 in the MAC. The Zips are 2-0 in league play for the first time since 2007 and just the fourth time since the 1992 season. The last time Akron opened the season with a 4-2 overall record was 2000.
- Miami and Notre Dame announced the two schools will compete on Sept. 30, 2017 in South Bend, Ind. Miami and Notre Dame have played each other on just one other occasion, a contest the Fighting Irish won back in 1909.
- The MAC has four wins over 'Power Five' teams this year with wins vs. Northwestern, Purdue and Indiana from the Big Ten and Pitt (ACC). The MAC is tied with the Mountain West with four wins over teams from the 'Power Five' Conferences: MAC (4), Mountain West (4), American (3), Sun Belt (1), C-USA (0).

MAC PART OF NEW COLLEGE FOOTBALL PLAYOFF ERA

Beginning with the 2014-15 season, college football will enter a new four-team playoff era. Two College Football Playoff Semifinals will be played in bowl games this year (Sugar Bowl; Rose Bowl) and the College Football Playoff National Championship will be played in Arlington, Texas on Jan. 12.

The two Semifinals and four other premier bowl games (Orange Bowl; Cotton Bowl; Peach Bowl; Fiesta Bowl) will be played on New Year's Eve and New Year's Day. The Semifinal games will rotate among these six different bowls. All MAC programs will join every FBS team in college football with equal access to the playoff based upon its performance. No team will qualify automatically.

The College Football Playoff Selection Committee will choose four teams for the playoffs based on body of work, strength of schedule, head-to-head results, comparison of results against common opponents, championships won and other factors. The highest ranked program by the Selection Committee from either the MAC, American Athletic, Conference USA, Mountain West or Sun Belt Conferences will play annually in one of the premier bowl games.

MAC AND ESPN ANNOUNCE HISTORIC 13-YEAR RIGHTS EXTEN-SION DEAL THROUGH 2016-27 SEASON

The MAC and ESPN announced on Aug. 19, 2014 a 13-year rights agreement that will be the largest and most extensive agreement in the 68-year history of the Conference. The extension, which adds provisions to the remaining three years of the original national rights agreement and adds an additional 10 years to the deal with ESPN, brings long-term security for the Conference through the 2026-27 academic year.

This agreement provides ESPN with exclusive television and digital distribution rights for all MAC sporting events, and guarantees coverage of every football game, and select men's and women's basketball and Olympic sporting events through the 2026-27 academic season.

The Marathon MAC Football Championship Game and the MAC football regular season is the foundation for the national deal with ESPN. The 2014 MAC football regular season will be highlighted by national coverage of 14 midweek games during the month of November on ESPN2, ESPNU and ESPN3 as the Conference race unfolds in both the East and West divisions. The Marathon MAC Football Championship Game is Dec. 5 at 7 pm ET (ESPN2).

MAC STARTING QUARTERBACKS IN 2014

The 2014 season will witness significant change for the MAC and starting quarterbacks across the Conference. Over the last several years the MAC has witnessed some of the greatest quarterback play in the 68-year history of the league as the likes of NIU's Jordan Lynch, Ball State's Keith Wenning, Toledo's Terrance Owens and Ohio's Tyler Tettleton were able to anchor themselves among MAC career leaders in many statistical categories.

With the everchanging landscape of college football, the MAC will be looking to a new crop of young quarterbacks to continue the rich legacy of MAC quarterbacks play. As we enter league play, the MAC will have only two senior quarterbacks starting under center with Miami fifth-year transfer senior Andrew Hendrix, who came to Miami from Notre Dame along with new Miami Head Coach Chuck Martin, and Eastern Michigan's Rob Bolden. The MAC will feature four juniors and seven sophomores starting at quarterback.



David Frazier, Offensive Player of the Week Miami, Senior, Wide Receiver

Miami senior wide receiver David Frazier (Columbia, S.C.) recorded a career-high nine catches to go along with 132 yards and two touchdowns (matches a career-high) in a 29-19 loss at Akron. Frazier and the Miami offense torched the Zips for 352 yards through the air.



Brian Sutton, Defensive Player of the Week; **Bowling Green, Senior, Defensive Back**

Bowling Green senior defensive back Brian Sutton (Fishers, Ind.) led a balanced defensive effort on Saturday, as the Falcons allowed just one offensive touchdown in a 31-13 win at Ohio. The 13 points were a season-low allowed by the Falcons, helped in part by two turnovers forced by the defense and four stops on fourth-down plays.



Robert Stein, Special Teams Player of Week; Akron, Junior, Kicker

Akron junior Robert Stein (Cincinnati, Ohio) converted two field goals and three PATs in a 29-19 win over Miami. Stein made his eighth and ninth consecutive field goals with a 28-yard score in the first quarter and a 46-yarder in the second quarter. He was also a perfect 3-for-3 in PATs and kicked off six times for a career-best 364 yards (60.7 avg.).

Thomas Rawls, Co-Offensive Player of the Week; Central Michigan, Senior, Running Back

Central Michigan senior running back Thomas Rawls (Flint, Mich.) rushed for 270 yards on 40 carries and scored two touchdowns in a 34-17 road victory.



Reginald Bell, Co-Offensive Player of the Week; Eastern Michigan, Freshman, Quarterback

Eastern Michigan freshman quarterback Reginald Bell Jr. (Los Angeles, Calif.) rushed for 202 yards and three touchdowns and threw for 144 yards and another score in a 37-27 win over Buffalo.



Anthony Zappone, Defensive Player of the Week Eastern Michigan, Sophomore, Linebacker

Eastern Michigan sophomore linebacker Anthony Zappone (Westlake, Ohio) recorded a career-best 13 tackles in a 37-27 victory over Buffalo to go with a career high three tackles for loss. The redshirtsophomore currently sits in a tie for first in the MAC in tackles for loss as he is averaging five a game. His 9.5 tackles per contest ranks seventh in the league among linebackers.



Jeremiah Detmer, Special Teams Player of Week; Toledo, Senior, Kicker

Toledo senior kicker Jeremiah Detmer (Hilliard, Ohio) converted three field goals in a 37-30 loss at Iowa State. Detmer booted a season high three field goals, connecting on a 27-yarder in the first quarter, a 29-yarder in the second and a 41-yarder in the fourth period. He was also credited with five touchbacks in six kickoffs. Detmer moved into second place in Toledo history with 60 career field goals.

OFFENSE

- Toledo **WR Corey Jones** hauled in a career-high 12 passes for a game-best 118 yards, topping the century mark for the second-consecutive week, in a 37-30 loss at Iowa State. His 50-yard reception in the fourth quarter set up Toledo's final score.
- Western Michigan **RB Jarvion Franklin** had 24 carries for 161 yards and three touchdowns in a 42-38 win at Ball State. Franklin exploded for 120 yards and his three touchdowns, in the second half.
- UMass **RB Lorenzo Woodley** ran for 160 yards on 23 carries in a 40-17 win at Kent State. Woodley ran for 135 of his yards in the second half including all 80 yards of UMass final offensive touchdown drive in the fourth quarter.
- Akron **RB Jawon Chisholm** led the team with 102 yards and two touchdowns on 17 carries in a 29-19 win over Miami.
- Ball State **QB Jack Milas** in his first collegiate start passed for 326 yards and four touchdowns in a 42-38 loss to Western Michigan.

DEFENSE

- Akron NT Cody Grice had five tackles, one sack for a loss of four yards, 1.5 TFL for a loss of five yards, and the first fumble recovery of his career in a 29-19 win over Miami. Grice also saw action at fullback as he rushed twice for two yards each—one for first down, the second for his third touchdown on the season.
- Central Michigan **S Tony Annese** made seven tackles, one interception and two passes defensed in a 34-17 win at Northern Illinois.
- Northern Illinois **DB Paris Logan** had seven tackles and two pass break-ups in a 34-17 loss to Central Michigan. Logan held Titus Davis to just four catches for 54 yards.
- Miami **DB Jarrell Jones** recorded seven tackles, two fumble recoveries and a pass breakup in a 29-19 loss at Akron. Jones and the Miami defense held Akron to just 318 total yards.
- Western Michigan **FS Justin Currie** collected a team-high 12 tackles in a 42-38 win at Ball State. Currie and the Broncos defense held Ball State to only seven points in the second half.
- UMass LB Kassan Messiah led with 10 tackles and a blocked field goal in a 40-17 win at Kent State. His 10 tackles were his third double-digit effort of the season, while the blocked field goal in the fourth quarter was the first of his career.
- Toledo **LB Ray Bush** led with a career-high 11 tackles in a 37-30 loss at Iowa State. Bush also tallied his first sack of the season in the second period and finished with 1.5 tackles for loss.

SPECIAL TEAMS

- Bowling Green **P Joe Davidson** punted eight times (47.8 avg.) with a long of 57 yards and four inside the 20 in a 31-13 win at Ohio.
- Northern Illinois **P Tyler Wedel** punted six times (42.3 avg.) in a 34-17 loss to Central Michigan. Three of his kicks were inside their 20-yard line and had a long punt of 53 yards. Wedel scored five points, hitting both of his PAT attempts and a 24-yard field goal.
- Western Michigan **P J. Schroeder** had five punts for 219 yards (43.8 avg.) with a long of 74 yards and two inside the 20 in a 42-38 win at Ball State.
- UMass **K/P Logan Laurent** in his first collegiate game hit a pair of field goals and four-of-five PATs in the 40-17 win at Kent State. Primarily a punter, Laurent jumped into the kicking role on Saturday hitting field goals from 31 yards and 22 yards out.

MAC Week Seven Quick Recaps:

Central Michigan 34, Northern Illinois 17 -- Another day at the office for Thomas Rawls. Not just another win for the Central Michigan football team.

Rawls rushed for 270 yards on 40 carries and scored two touchdowns Saturday leading the Chippewas to a 34-17 upset of MAC heavyweight Northern Illinois at Huskie Stadium. The win by Central Michigan snapped the Huskies 28-game home winning streak and 24-game consecutive regular season MAC winning streak.

The win, CMU's second straight, lifted the Chippewas to 4-3, 2-1 in the MAC. It snapped the Huskies' 28-game home win streak, and their 24-game regular-season MAC win streak. Northern Illinois (4-2, 1-1) has won four consecutive MAC West titles and captured the league championship twice in that span.

As has been Rawls' pattern all season, he got stronger as the game progressed. He ran for 194 yards on 24 carries in the second half as the Chippewas salted the game away. Central Michigan held a near 2-to-1 advantage in time of possession and rolled up 30 first downs while holding NIU to 19.

Iowa State 37, Toledo 30 -- Toledo freshman running back Terry Swanson rushed for 124 yards and two touchdowns but it wasn't enough as Toledo lost at Iowa State, 37-30, on Saturday.

Toledo scored a touchdown with 56 seconds left when sophomore quarterback Logan Woodside's completed a four-yard shovel pass to sophomore Marc Remy. That cut the Iowa State lead to seven points and set up an on-side kick attempt by the Rockets, which ultimately was recovered by Iowa State.

Toledo's late rally came after a pair of Iowa State fourth-quarter touchdowns broke a 23-23 deadlock. The game was closely fought throughout. Iowa State held a slight 454-425 edge in total yardage. Neither team had a turnover. Woodside was 7-of-15 in the first half but came on strong in the final 30 minutes, finishing 22-of-36 for 189 yards.

Eastern Michigan 37, Buffalo 27 -- Behind 34 second-half points, Eastern Michigan was able to keep its record at The Factory untarnished with a 37-27 Homecoming victory over Buffalo on Saturday. With the win, the Eagles improve to 2-4 (1-1 MAC), while the Bulls fell to 3-4 (1-2 MAC).

The Eagles were led by a career day by redshirt-freshman quarterback Reginald Bell Jr. Bell threw 18-for-13 for 144 yards and one touchdown, but the Golden State native truly shone in his rushing. He led all players with 202 rushing yards and three touchdowns on the ground, including a pair of 70+ yarders. With touchdown runs of 71 and 72 yards, Bell became the first Eagle in school history to run for two 70+ yard touchdowns in one game. The last time an Eagle registered more than 200 yards rushing was Oct. 19, 2013, when Bronson Hill ran 257 yards against Ohio. The redshirt freshman is also the first Eastern quarterback to rush for over 200 yards; the previous high for a quarterback was Alex Gillett, who ran for 189 yards in a win over Ball State, Oct. 16, 2010.

Western Michigan 42, Ball State 38 -- Western Michigan outscored Ball State 28-7 in the second half, including 14-0 in the fourth quarter, and the Broncos authored a 42-38 comeback over the Cardinals at Scheumann Stadium on Saturday.

Western Michigan (3-3, 1-1 MAC) trailed Ball State (1-5, 0-2 MAC) by a 31-14 mark at the half, but the Broncos never stopped rowing and came out firing in the second half. The go-ahead score came with just 1:25 left in the game, when Daniel Braverman caught a swing pass from Zach Terrell and danced through tacklers for a 12-yard touchdown to go up 41-38. Andrew Haldeman nailed the extra point to set the score at 42 for the Broncos.

MAC Week Seven Quick Recaps:

Bowling Green 31, Ohio 13 -- Bowling Green raced out to an early two-touchdown lead before defeating Ohio, 31-13, at Peden Stadium on Saturday. With the win, the Falcons improve to 5-2 (3-0 MAC), while the Bobcats fall to 3-4 (1-2 MAC).

Redshirt-sophomore quarterback James Knapke completed 20-of-39 passes for 260 yards and two touchdowns. Redshirt-junior Travis Greene led all Falcon running backs with 50 yards on 10 rushes, and scored both a rushing and a receiving touchdown in the game. Fellow running back Andre Givens also rushed for a score on five carries. The receiving corp was led by freshman Roger Lewis, who caught six passes for a game-high 100 yards, while redshirt-junior Ryan Burbrink also contributed nicely with 77 yards and one touchdown over five receptions.

Four members of the Bowling Green defense – linebackers Gabe Martin and James Sanford, and defensive backs Nick Johnson and Brian Sutton – led Bowling Green with 11 tackles each. Defensive back Jude Adjei-Barimah, linebacker Paul Senn, defensive lineman Shannon Smith and defensive end Bryan Thomas all registered one sack apiece, while the tandem of Sanford and Martin combined for a key sack on a fourth down play to give the ball back to the Falcons offense at midfield in the third quarter.

The defense also forced 29 incomplete passes from quarterback JD Sprague, who was 27-of-56 overall on the afternoon.

Akron 29, Miami 19 -- Akron found the end zone twice in the second half while posting nine sacks on defense to down the Miami RedHawks, 29-19, on Saturday at InfoCision Stadium. Akron (4-2, 2-0 MAC) has won five-straight league games dating back to last season. The victory marked No. 150 in head coach Terry Bowden's career.

Akron was outgained by Miami, 412-318, but forced three turnovers and sacked RedHawk quarterback Andrew Hendrix nine times. Miami (1-6, 1-2 MAC) recorded just two sacks.

The Miami offense recorded 352 passing yards, paced by Hendrix who connected on 24-for-41 through the air. The Zips were held to just 167 in the air, however, key defensive plays helped Akron stop the RedHawk offense.

After connecting on 13-of-22 in the air for 103 yards, junior quarterback Kyle Pohl left late in the first half following a sack. Freshman Tommy Woodson took over as the signal caller and went 7-for-14 for 64 yards passing.

Senior RB Jawon Chisholm led the Zips offense on the ground with 102 yards rushing for two touchdowns, followed by running back Conor Hundley with 64 yards rushing and three receptions totaling 15 yards.

UMass 40, Kent State 17 -- A 17-point third quarter paved the way for UMass (1-6, 1-2 MAC) football's 40-17 win at Kent State (0-6, 0-3 MAC) on Saturday at Dix Stadium. Lorenzo Woodley rushed for 160 yards and a touchdown, while Blake Frohnapfel threw for 286 yards and three touchdowns. The win was the first for head coach Mark Whipple in his second tenure with the team.

Woodley's effort marked the second 100-yard rushing game of his career with 80 yards coming on the team's final offensive touchdown drive in the fourth quarter.

Frohnapfel, who has thrown 12 touchdowns in the last three games, hit nine different receivers during the game. Jalen Williams, Jean Sifrin and Matt Tuleja all had touchdown receptions. Alex Kenney led all receivers with five catches for 76 yards.

Special teams played a big part in the win as well with Logan Laurent going two-for-two on field goal attempts and Kassan Messiah blocking a field goal attempt in the fourth quarter. Messiah finished the game with a team-best 10 tackles.

MAC 2013 SEASON & BOWL NOTES

- Five MAC programs were invited to bowl games last season as Bowling Green (Little Caesars Pizza Bowl), Northern Illinois (San Diego County Credit Union Poinsettia Bowl), Ball State (GoDaddy Bowl), Buffalo (Famous Idaho Potato Bowl) and Ohio (Beef 'O' Brady's St. Petersburgh Bowl) represented the Conference during the 2013 bowl season.
- The five bowl invitations marks the sixth time in MAC history to have five or more teams receive a bowl invitation (2004, 2008, 2009, 2011, 2012, 2013) in a single-season. The MAC record is seven bowl invitations, which was established in the 2012 bowl season.
- In the last three bowl seasons, the MAC has a record of 6-11 in 17 bowl games 2013 (0-5); 2012 (2-5); 2011 (4-1) as ten different programs have appeared in a bowl game in that span.
- In 2013, the MAC had three programs reach ten or more wins as MAC Champion Bowling Green (10-4, 7-1), Northern Illinois (12-2, 8-0) and Ball State (10-3, 7-1) all reached the ten win plateau. The MAC tied for third among FBS conferences with three teams with ten wins or more with the ACC, Big 12 and Conference USA, trailing only the SEC and Pac-12 with five teams with ten or more wins.
- Bowling Green won the 2013 Marathon MAC Football Championship with a 47-27 win over No. 14 ranked Northern Illinois on Dec. 6 at Ford Field. It marked the first championship for Bowling Green since the 1992 season. The Falcons had back-to-back MAC Championship seasons in 1991 and 1992.
- Northern Illinois (12-2) finished the 2013 season ranked No. 23 in the BCS Standings. The Huskies were ranked in all seven of the BCS regular season rankings starting on Oct. 20 and continuing each week during the season reaching their highest ranking of No. 14 prior to the Marathon MAC Football Championship Game against Bowling Green.
- The MAC had seven programs bowl eligible in 2013 -- Northern Illinois (12-2), Ball State (10-3), Bowling Green (10-4), Buffalo (8-5), Ohio (7-6), Toledo (7-5) and Central Michigan (6-6) -- to match the 2012 MAC record for most programs bowl eligible in a single season. Toledo and Central Michigan were not selected for a bowl game.
- Northern Illinois senior quarterback Jordan Lynch was one of six finalists invited to New York City for the Heisman Award Trophy presentation on Dec. 14. Lynch finished third in the Heisman Trophy voting, the highest ever for a MAC student-athlete. Lynch was just the third MAC student-athlete invited to the Heisman ceremony -- WR Randy Moss (Marshall, 1997) and QB Chad Pennington (Marshall, 1999).
- Northern Illinois has won four consecutive MAC West Division titles and appeared in the Marathon MAC Football Championship Game since 2010. From the East Division, there have been four different programs during this period Miami (2010); Ohio (2011); Kent State (2012) and Bowling Green (2013).
- Northern Illinois has witnessed the last four consecutive MAC Offensive Player of the Year as quarterback Jordan Lynch (2012; 2013), quarterback Chandler Harnish (2011) and running back Chad Spann (2010) have won the award.

MAC PROGRAMS IN BOWL GAMES

In the last three bowl seasons, ten different MAC programs have received a bowl invitation, as both Northern Illinois and Ohio lead the Conference with three invitations during this span. Ball State (2012, 2013), Bowling Green (2012, 2013) and Toledo (2011, 2012) each received two invitations in the last three years. Buffalo (2013), Central Michigan (2012), Kent State (2012), Western Michigan (2011) and former MAC-member Temple (2011) received one bowl invite during the last three bowl seasons.

MAC WITH FOUR NEW HEAD COACHES FOR 2014

The 2014 season will witness four new head football coaches. Bowling Green head football coach Dave Clawson was named the head coach at Wake Forest in December after five seasons at Bowling Green. Bowling Green named Dino Babers head coach on Dec. 18. Chuck Martin was introduced as Miami's head coach on Dec. 3, Eastern Michigan named Chris Creighton head coach on Dec. 11 and UMass named Mark Whipple as head coach on Jan. 14.

Bowling Green: Dino Babers

Babers comes to Bowling Green after serving as the head coach at Eastern Illinois for two seasons. He brings 30 years of coaching experience, including a 19-7 record as a head coach. This season, Babers led Eastern Illinois to a 12-2 record, a No. 2 national ranking, and a quarterfinal appearance in the FCS playoffs. Babers took a Panthers team which had finished in last place in the Ohio Valley Conference in 2011, and led them to a first-place finish in 2012 with a 6-1 league mark. Babers was named Ohio Valley Conference Coach of the Year in each of the past two years. During his two seasons at Eastern Illinois, Babers led the best offense in all of FCS. The Panthers led the nation in yards per game (589.5) and points per game (48.2) in 2013. Also, EIU averaged 372.4 yards per game passing and 217.1 yards per game rushing.

Miami: Chuck Martin

offensive coordinator/quarterbacks coach (2012-13) and defensive backs/recruiting coordinator (2010-11). Martin, who has more than 20 years of collegiate coaching experience, brings six years of head coaching experience to the RedHawk program. He has twice been named the American Football Coaches Association (AFCA) National Coach of the Year, earning the honor in 2005 and 2006 at Grand Valley State, and has coached in seven national championship games in the past 13 seasons. In addition to his head coaching experience, Martin has served as a coordinator on both sides of the ball. Of those seven national championship game appearances, he has been a part of four national championship wins, with two titles under his direction as head coach/offensive coordinator and one as a defensive coordinator.

Martin spent the past four seasons at Notre Dame, serving as the

Eastern Michigan: Chris Creighton

Creighton joins Eastern Michigan after serving as head football coach at Drake for the past six years. Creighton built Drake into a consistent power in the Pioneer Football League, sharing the conference crown during the 2011 and 2012 campaigns. During his 17-year head coaching career, he has accumulated eight conference titles and an all-time record of 139-46 (.764). Creighton departs Drake with the highest winning percentage in school history (.667) after also posting 63 wins as the head coach at Wabash College and 32 at Ottawa University. In his time at Drake, Creighton boasted a 30-5 home record and a 21-2 home conference record going undefeated against five conference opponents. Drake had an 11-game home win streak during Creighton's tenure as well as winning 16-straight home conference games with him at the helm.

UMass: Mark Whipple

Mark Whipple was officially named the team's head coach on January 14, 2014. In his first stint from 1998-2003, Whipple led the Minutemen to new heights by winning the NCAA I-AA National Championship in his first season and making two other postseason appearances in the following five years. A 31-year coaching veteran of the collegiate and professional levels, Whipple is widely regarded for his prowess as an offensive coordinator and his ability to develop quarterbacks. He helped Ben Roethlisberger of the NFL's Pittsburgh Steelers win a Super Bowl in his second year, built the University of Miami's 2009 and 2010 offenses into two of its best all-time, and his teams set 40 offensive records while at UMass.

HUSKIES SET MAC CONSECUTIVE BOWL RECORD

Northern Illinois has set the MAC record for consecutive bowl appearances by a member of the Conference. FALCONS WIN 2013 MARATHON MAC CHAMPIONSHIP

Bowling Green rolled up nearly 600 yards of total offense to win the Marathon MAC Championship and defeated No. 14 Northern Illinois, 47-27, to capture the school's first league crown in 21 years, since the 1992 season. Sophomore quarterback Matt Johnson threw for 393 yards and five touchdowns, setting career bests in both categories.

Senior tight end Alex Bayer caught seven passes for 124 yards and one touchdown, while receiver Ronnie Moore had 145 yards receiving on four catches and one score and running back Travis Greene rushed for 133 yards and capped the win with a fourth quarter rushing touchdown.

Each team scored on its opening drive of the night, but the Falcons then took a 17-7 lead and never trailed thereafter. The Falcons led by a 31-13 count at the half, and Northern Illinois could not draw closer than 11 points in the second period.

RAYCOM MEDIA CAMELLIA BOWL TO BEGIN IN 2014

Last fall the MAC announced the creation of the Raycom Media Camellia Bowl, a newly created bowl game to begin in 2014, which will be based in Montgomery, Alabama, owned and operated by ESPN. The Raycom Media Camellia Bowl will feature a MAC program to face a member of the Sun Belt Conference for the next six consecutive seasons (2014-2019).

MAC ANNOUNCES CREATION OF BOCA RATON, BA-HAMAS AND MIAMI BEACH BOWLS; PRIMARY BOWL PARTNERS INCREASE TO FIVE BOWL GAMES IN 2014

The MAC announced the creation of newly created bowl games in Boca Raton, Fla., Nassau, Bahamas and Miami Beach, Fla. for a six-year period (2014-2019).

The MAC is a partner with the San Diego County Credit Union Poinsettia Bowl as a primary partner in 2017 and 2019, and a secondary partner in 2014, 2015, 2016 and 2018 bowl seasons. The MAC will play the Mountain West in both the 2017 and 2019 bowl seasons, played at Qualcomm Stadium in San Diego.

The creation of the Boca Raton, Popeyes Bahamas and Miami Beach Bowls is the centerpiece of a joint agreement between FBS conferences and will be supported by several FBS conferences on a six-year rotating basis. Starting in the 2014 season, the MAC will have a minimum five guaranteed bowl opportunities.

MAC 2014 FOOTBALL SCHEDULE HIGHLIGHTS

The 2014 football schedule will feature 14 midweek nationally televised games during the month of November on ESPN2, ESPNU or ESPN3 as the conference race unfolds in both the East and West divisions.

The regular season will conclude with the 17th Marathon MAC Football Championship game on Friday, Dec. 5 at Ford Field in Detroit on ESPN2. This will mark the 11th Marathon MAC Football Championship game at Ford Field.

For the seventh year in a row, league schools will face a formidable non-conference slate of opponents from the following Football Bowl Subdivision conferences – ACC, Big Ten, Big 12, Pac-12 and SEC. In addition, the conference will also face opponents from the American Athletic Conference, Conference USA, Mountain West Conference, Sun Belt Conference and Independent Army.

MAC programs will face six non-conference foes that finished in the final AP Top 25 poll: Michigan State (3), Missouri (5), Ohio State (12), Baylor (13), Wisconsin (22) and Vanderbilt (24). Two of these six games will be home games for MAC programs – Missouri at Toledo (Sept. 6) and Baylor at Buffalo (Sept. 12).

A total of 11 non-conference games will feature a Big Ten opponent (Indiana, Iowa, Michigan, Michigan State, Northwestern, Ohio State, Penn State (2), Purdue (2) and Wisconsin). The MAC will face foes from the ACC (5—Boston College, Pittsburgh, Syracuse, Virginia, Virginia Tech), SEC (5—Arkansas, Florida, Kentucky, Missouri, Vanderbilt), Big 12 (3—Baylor, Iowa State, Kansas) and Pac-12 (1—Colorado).

The MAC will also face opponents from the American Athletic Conference (2—Cincinnati (2)), Mountain West (1—UNLV), Conference USA (4—Marshall (3), Western Kentucky) and Sun Belt Conference (3—Idaho (2), South Alabama), along with Independent Army (3).

MAC programs continue to increase the number of home or neutral site games against FBS Automatic Qualifying (AQ) Conference opponents. This season the MAC will host 11 games against FBS non-conference foes, including Baylor (Big-12), Boston College (ACC); Colorado (Pac-12), Indiana (Big Ten), Missouri (SEC) and Syracuse (ACC).

MAC HEAD COACHES IN HIGH DEMAND

Football programs continue to take notice of MAC head coaches. Last December, Bowling Green head coach Dave Clawson led the Falcons to the 2013 Marathon MAC Football Championship and one week later Clawson was named the head coach at Wake Forest. Clawson replaces Jim Grobe as head coach at Wake Forest and ironically Grobe previously coached at Ohio University.

Clawson joined the lengthy list of former MAC head coaches currently at head coaching positions within FBS. In 2012, both coaches from the Marathon MAC Football Championship game received new opportunities. Former Northern Illinois head coach Dave Doeren was named head coach at North Carolina State and former Kent State head coach Darrell Hazell was named head coach at Purdue.

There are 13 former head coaches from the MAC in a current FBS head coaching position-including nearly half of the Big Ten (five total) and both coaches from the 2013 BCS Championship Game – Alabama's Nick Saban (Toledo) and Notre Dame's Brian Kelly (Central Michigan).

For the 2014 season, 26 of the 126 FBS coaches (21%) will be either current or former MAC head coaches.

MAC EAST VS. MAC WEST

After four cross-over games in the 2014 season, the MAC West has a 3-1 advantage. There are three more games this Saturday, Oct. 18th as Miami visits NIU; Western Michigan plays at Bowling Green and Eastern Michigan travels to UMass.

Over the previous six years (2008-2013), the MAC West has had the upper hand in cross-over regular season games against the MAC East, winning the head-to-head regular season series in five of the last six years.

However, both the East and West Divisions have each won three Marathon MAC Football Championship games during the same six year span. From the East Division, Bowling Green (2013), Miami (2010) and Buffalo (2008) won the Conference Championship, while the West Division has witnessed Central Michigan (2009) and Northern Illinois (2011, 2012) take the crown.

Over the last six seasons (2008-13), the West holds a 71-37 (.657%) regular season record in cross-over games over the East. Take a look at the last six years in divisional play between the MAC East vs. the MAC West Divisions.

letes who excel both on and off the field.

A native of Lansing, Mich., Phillips holds a 3.05 GPA and has served as team captain the last two seasons. Phillips has volunteered his time with community service events such as the Isabella Community Soup Kitchen, the Special Olympics of Michigan and has visited with the elderly at assisted living homes near campus.

To be eligible for the award, a student-athlete must be classified as an NCAA Division I FBS senior and have notable achievements in four areas of excellence – community, classroom, character and competition.

An acronym for Celebrating Loyalty and Achievement for Staying in School®, the Senior CLASS Award focuses on the total student-athlete and encourages students to use their platform in athletics to make a positive impact as leaders in their communities.

The 30 candidates will be narrowed to 10 finalists midway through the regular season, and those 10 names will be placed on the official ballot. Ballots will be distributed through a nation-wide voting system to media, coaches and fans, who will select one candidate who best exemplifies excellence in the four Cs of community, classroom, character and competition. The Senior CLASS Award winner will be announced during the football bowl season in early January.

An acronym for Celebrating Loyalty and Achievement for Staying in School, the Senior CLASS Award honors the attributes of senior student-athletes in four areas: community, classroom, character and competition. The award program is designed exclusively for college seniors who are utilizing their complete athletic eligibility, remaining committed to their university and pursuing the many rewards a senior season can bring.
