MAC EAST AND WEST DIVISION CLINCHING SCENARIOS

The 2018 Marathon MAC Football Championship game is Friday, Nov. 30 at 7:00 pm ET at Ford Field (ESPN2). NIU has already clinched the MAC West Division title as the Huskies have won the West for the seventh time in the last nine years.

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The East Division comes down to Buffalo, Ohio and Miami in contention for the East title. Buffalo controls its own destiny, while Ohio and Miami need assistance.

MAC East Division Clinching Scenarios:

Buffalo: Buffalo win at Bowling Green (11/23) **OR** Ohio loss vs. Akron (11/23) Ohio: Ohio win vs. Akron (11/23) **AND** Buffalo loss at Bowling Green (11/23)

AND Miami loss vs. Ball State (11/20)

Miami: Miami win vs. Ball State (11/20) AND Ohio win vs. Akron (11/23) AND

Buffelo loss at Bowling Green (11/23)

Buffalo loss at Bowling Green (11/23)

* In a three-way tie with Buffalo (6-2), Miami (6-2) and Ohio (6-2), the multi-team tiebreaker is head-to-head record among tied teams. All three are 1-1 in head-to-head among the three teams (Buffalo beat Miami/lost to Ohio; Miami beat Ohio/lost to Buffalo; Ohio beat Buffalo/lost to Miami); then the tiebreaker goes to fourth-place Akron as all three teams defeated Akron. Then to fifth-place Bowling Green, as in this scenario Buffalo would have lost to Bowling Green and both Miami and Ohio won. Therefore the tiebreaker comes to Ohio and Miami -- as Miami defeated Ohio on Nov. 7, 30-28. Note: all three teams defeated Kent State.

MAC WEEKLY NOTES

Bowling Green

Kent State

- Ohio (7-4, 5-2) posted a 52-17 win over Buffalo as the Bobcats rushed for a season-high 437 yards and added 646 yards of total offense. It marked the fourth time this season Ohio has rushed for over 300 yards and the fifth time to score 50 or more points in a game. Ohio senior running back **A.J. Ouellette** rushed for a career-high 196 yards and two touchdowns for his 12th career 100+ yard rushing performance. Ohio has outscored its opponents 240-89 in the last five contests.
- Toledo (6-5, 4-3) rushed for a season-high 384 yards in a 56-34 win at Kent State as freshman running back **Bryant Koback** had a season-high 192 yards and two touchdowns, the third-highest total by a freshman in program history. Toledo eclipsed 50 points in a game for the fifth time this season, the most in Toledo history.
- Miami (5-6, 5-2) defensive back **Ja'don Rucker-Furlow** returned an interception 28 yards for the decisive play in a 13-7 win at MACCONNICTOR 14.
- Bowling Green (3-8, 2-5) won its second straight MAC game with a 21-6 win at Akron on Nov. 17. Falcons quarterback **Jarret Doege** was 19-27 passing for 178 yards and two touchdowns. Doege connected on 15 consecutive passes in the win.
 Ball State (4-7, 3-4) posted a 42-41 (OT) win over Western Michigan on Nov. 13. Cardinals quarterback **Drew Plitt** threw for 258 yards and a career-high three

touchdowns, as his 80.8 completion percentage was the best since 2013.

MAC Storylines

- The final week of the 2018 regular season will continue midweek MACtion with two midweek games on Tuesday and four games on Friday afternoon during Thanksgiving weekend. Week 13 begins on Tuesday, Nov. 20 with Ball State at Miami at 7:00 pm ET (ESPN+) and Northern Illinois at Western Michigan at 7:00 pm ET/6:00 pm CT (ESPNU).
- On Friday, Nov. 23 at Noon ET features Buffalo at Bowling Green (ESPNU), Akron at Ohio (CBS Sports Network), Central Michigan at Toledo (ESPN3) and Eastern Michigan at Kent State (ESPN3).
- NIU (7-4, 6-1 MAC) has already clinched the MAC West Division title. NIU has won the MAC West Division in seven of the last nine years. Buffalo can clinch the MAC East Division with a win at Bowling Green (ESPNU) on Friday. Both Ohio and Miami are still in contention for the East Division title.
- Toledo (6-5) joins Buffalo (9-2), Northern Illinois (7-4), Ohio (7-4), Western Michigan (6-5) and Eastern Michigan (6-5) as six MAC programs are bowl eligible. Toledo became bowl eligible with a 56-34 win at Kent State on Nov. 15, as the Rockets are bowl eligible for the ninth consecutive season. Miami (5-6) needs one more win to reach bowl eligibility.
- In MAC crossover games this season, the East and West Divisions are tied, 8-8. In each of the last eight consecutive years (2010-2017), the MAC West Division has topped the East Division in regular season head-to-head crossover games.

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MYRTLE BEACH BOWL TO BEGIN IN 2020 BOWL SEASON

The MAC announced on Nov. 13 the creation of a newly created bowl game in Myrtle Beach, S.C. for a six-year period (2020-2025), which will be owned and operated by ESPN. The Myrtle Beach Bowl will be televised nationally on ESPN networks and will be played at Brooks Stadium, an open-air stadium opened in 2003 which seats nearly 21,000 fans on the campus of Coastal Carolina University.

The creation of the Myrtle Beach Bowl is an agreement with ESPN Events and the Mid-American Conference, Conference USA and the Sun Belt Conference, with each Conference participating in the bowl game four times during the six-year span.

"Myrtle Beach will be a great addition to the Mid-American Conference bowl line-up, and a destination we have been actively pursuing to develop a bowl game," said Dr. Jon Steinbrecher, Mid-American Conference Commissioner. 'A family-friendly destination with outstanding facilities for competition, entertainment, and lodging, Myrtle Beach is very accessible by ground or air transportation from throughout our geographic footprint. I have no doubt our student-athletes, staff, and fans will have a unique and exceptional experience at the Grand Strand. The Mid-American Conference is appreciative of the efforts of ESPN Events and the Myrtle Beach Area Convention and Visitors Bureau in bringing this exciting new bowl game to fruition."

With the addition of the Myrtle Beach Bowl, the MAC has expanded its bowl opportunities during the next six-year cycle beginning in 2020. The MAC will have a minimum six guaranteed bowl opportunities.

At future date to be determined, the MAC will reveal its complete bowl partnerships for the next bowl cycle (2020-2025).

MAC PROGRAMS WITH SUSTAINED FOOTBALL SUCCESS

Three MAC programs – NIU, Ohio and Toledo -- have sustained success over a 10 and 15-year period and currently rank among the FBS leaders in the MAC and college football, while a fourth program, Western Michigan, joins these MAC programs among the FBS leaders in college football and the MAC over the recent five-year period.

All four programs have been no stranger to college football's postseason bowl system. NIU (7-3) is bowl eligible for the 10th time in the last 11 years, while Ohio (6-4) is bowl eligible for the 10th consecutive year. Toledo (6-5) is bowl eligible for the ninth consecutive year, with seven bowl invitations. Western Michigan (6-5) has been bowl eligible in each of the last five straight years.

AKRON ADDS ROAD GAME AT SOUTH CAROLINA ON DEC. 1

Akron and South Carolina have agreed to play a football game on Dec. 1, 2018, at Noon ET in Williams-Brice Stadium. The game replaces Akron's Sept. 1 contest at Nebraska, which was canceled due to lightning, and South Carolina's Sept. 15 contest against Marshall, which was canceled due to Hurricane Florence. The game will be televised on the SEC Network Alternate channel and can be streamed on SEC Network+ and the ESPN App on connected devices. The game will be broadcast on the Akron-IMG Sports Radio Network.

"What a great opportunity to play at South Carolina against the Gamecocks," said Akron seventh-year head coach Terry Bowden. "Our young men were so disappointed when the Nebraska game was cancelled due to lightning. We felt it was important to give them a game in such a great venue.'

A.J. Ouellette, Offensive Player of the Week Ohio, Senior, Running Back

Ohio senior running back A.J. Ouellette (Covington, Ohio) rumbled for a career-high 196 yards and two touchdowns on 26 carries and also caught a touchdown to lead a 52-17 win over Buffalo on Nov. 14. Ouellette rushed for an eight-year touchdown in the second quarter, caught an eight-year touchdown pass from Nathan Rourke and capped off the scoring with a 33-yard touchdown run.



Ja'don Rucker-Furlow, Defensive Player of the Week; Miami, Freshman, Defensive Back

Miami freshman defensive back Ja'don Rucker-Furlow (Dayton, Ohio) had four tackles, an interception and a forced fumble in a 13-7 win at Northern Illinois. His interception, which occurred in the third quarter, was returned for a 28-yard touchdown, the first of his career. It also spotted Miami a 13-7 lead, a lead the Miami defense would not

Miami junior kicker Sam Sloman (Roswell, Ga.) was nearly perfect in a 13-7 win at Northern Illinois on Wednesday, Nov. 14. Sloman connected on field goals from 30 and 39 yards and added three touchbacks on his four kicks.

Drew Plitt, Offensive Player of the Week Ball State, Sophomore, Quarterback

Ball State sophomore quarterback Drew Plitt (Loveland, Ohio) threw a career-high three touchdown passes on 21-26 passing for 258 yards in a 42-41 (OT) win over Western Michigan on Nov. 13. Plitt made his second start this season and completed 80.8 percent of his passes (21-of-26), the highest percentage by a Ball State starting quarterback since Keith Wenning completed 81.8 percent (27-of-33) of his passes against Miami in 2013.



Josh Corcoran, Defensive Player of the Week; Northern Illinois, Senior; Defensive End

Northern Illinois senior defensive end Josh Corcoran (Lakeville, Minn.) posted two quarterback sacks, two tackles for loss and a forced fumble while totaling three solo tackles in a 13-7 loss to Miami on Nov. 14. Corcoran led the way as the Huskies recorded one of their best defensive games of the year, holding Miami to season lows in total offense (201 yards) and passing yards (107).



Diontae Johnson, Special Teams Player of the Week; Toledo, Junior; Punt Returner

Toledo junior punt returner and kickoff returner Diontae Johnson (Ruskin, Fla.) had an 83-yard punt return for a touchdown late in the second quarter gave Toledo a 28-17 lead going into halftime in Toledo's win at Kent State on Nov. 15. It was his second return touchdown of the season and the fourth of his career, two punt returns and two kickoff returns.

Other Top Performers (WEEK TWELVE)

OFFENSE

- Western Michigan RB LeVante Bellamy rushed for 213 yards on 35 carries, both career highs, and one touchdown in a 42-41 (OT) loss at Ball State on Nov. 13. Bellamy's 200-plus yards put him over 1,000 for the season for the first time in his career. With 1,120 yards to date, it marked the fifth-straight season Western Michigan has had a 1,000-yard running back. Bellamy also became the first member of the MAC to rush for over 200 yards this season. Bellamy's 1,120 rushing yards leads the MAC, and ranks 14th in the nation and 1,502 all-purpose yards. He has five 100-yard rushing games this season.
- Toledo **RB Bryant Koback** ran for a career-high 192 rushing yards on 17 attempts and two touchdowns in a 56-34 win at Kent State on Nov. 15. His 192 rushing yards are the most by a Rocket since Kareem Hunt had 200 yards against Western Michigan on Nov. 25, 2016 and the third-most by a freshman in a game in Toledo history.
- Bowling Green **QB Jarret Doege** was 19-27 passing for 178 yards and two touchdowns in a 21-6 win at Akron on Saturday. Doege completed 70.3 percent of his passes and surpassed a 70.0 percent completion percentage for the third time this season. Doege sparked the come-from-behind win by completing 15-consecutive passes. The sophomore has now accounted for multiple touchdowns in 14 of his last 15 games.
- Northern Illinois **RB** Tre Harbison recorded his third consecutive 100-yard rushing game, and fifth of the season, with 103 yards on 16 carries in a 13-7 loss to Miami on Nov. 14. Harbison is the first NIU player with three consecutive 100-yard games since Jordan Lynch had four in 2013 and is 93 yards away from becoming the first Huskie to have 1,000 yards in a season since Joel Bouagnon in 2015.

DEFENSE

- Ball State **S Bryce Cosby** finished with a season-high 17 tackles and one recovered fumble in a 42-41 (OT) win over Western Michigan on Nov. 13. His 17 tackles were the most by a Cardinal since 2011. He recovered a second quarter fumble to set up a Ball State touchdown. Crosby was involved in the tackle on Western Michigan's two-point attempt in overtime to give Ball State the victory.
- Bowling Green **DL Kyle Junior** had a career-high 3.0 tackles for loss, including the fifth sack of his career, in a 21-6 win at Akron on Satuday. He was part of a Falcon defense did not allow a single touchdown and have not allowed a touchdown in six-consecutive quarters, dating back to the first half of the Central Michigan game on Nov. 10. Junior played a key role in the Falcons limiting the Zips to just one third-down conversion across 13 attempts.
- Ohio S Javon Hagan made a key defensive play in a 52-17 win over Buffalo on Nov. 14. Hagan chased down Buffalo quarterback Tyree Jackson's 55-yard run and forced and recovered a fumble at the Ohio four-yard line. Hagan has now forced eight fumbles in his career with three fumble recoveries. He added four tackles.
- Toledo LB Tyler Taafe had four tackles and returned an interception for a touchdown in a 56-34 win at Kent State on Nov. 15. It was the first interception return for a touchdown by a Rocket since Rolan Milligan on Sept. 26, 2015 against Arkansas State.

SPECIAL TEAMS

• Ohio **K Louie Zervos** accounted for 10 points in a 52-17 win over Buffalo on Nov. 14. Zervos knocked down a 22-yard field goal in the second quarter and made all seven of his extra point attempts. He has made at least seven extra points in a game five times in 2018 and has knocked down all 58 of his extra point attempts this season, which ranks as the second-most in a single season in program history. His 154 career made extra points are a program record.

MAC MEDIA/TV TIMEOUT CLOCK

This marks the second season for the MAC with a Media/TV Timeout clock. The MAC is the first FBS Conference to mandate this league-wide with a Media/TV Timeout clock visible in each stadium to assist with pace of play. The Media/TV Timeout Clock enhances the in-game experience for fans while also providing the institutions a true stoppage time -- from beginning of the television commercial break to returning to play. Following the success of this pilot program, other FBS conferences have followed suit in 2018, including the Big Ten. The 2017 season saw the MAC's average game time reduced to 3:20, shaving nearly five minutes from the previous season

MAC BOWL NOTES AND 2017 SEASON

- Toledo won the 2017 Marathon MAC Football Championship Game with a 45-28 win over Akron on Dec. 2, 2017. The win was Toledo's first championship since 2004 and the 11th football title in program history. The Rockets have been a model of consistency in winning as Toledo has won at least nine games in six of the last seven years, and the 2017 record of 11-3 is the ninth time in Toledo history to win at least 10 games in a season.
- Five MAC programs received bowl invitations in the 2017 bowl season -- Toledo (11-3), Akron (7-7), Ohio (9-4), Central Michigan (8-5) and Northern Illinois (8-5). The MAC record for bowl invitations in a single-season is seven in both the 2012 and 2015 bowl seasons.
- Toledo (Dollar General Bowl), Akron (Cheribundi Tart Cherry Boca Raton Bowl), Ohio (Bahamas Bowl), Central Michigan (Famous Idaho Potato Bowl) and Northern Illinois (Quick Lane Bowl) represented the MAC in the 2017 bowl season.
- This marked the 10th time in MAC history to have five or more programs receive a bowl invitation (2004, 2008, 2009, 2011, 2012, 2013, 2014, 2015, 2016 and 2017) in a single-season.
- In the previous seven bowl seasons, the MAC has a record of 12-28 in 40 bowl games 2017 (1-4); 2016 (0-6); 2015 (3-4); 2014 (2-3); 2013 (0-5); 2012 (2-5); 2011 (4-1) as all 12 MAC programs have appeared in a bowl game during this span (2011-17).
- Akron (7-7, 6-2) won the MAC East Division for the first time since 2005. Akron secured its third MAC East Division title as the Zips were bowl eligible for the second time in the last three years, also a school record.
- Over the last three seasons, the MAC has witnessed six different programs participate in the Marathon MAC Football Championship Game. In 2015 Bowling Green defeated NIU, 34-14, while 2016 witnessed Western Michigan with a 29-23 win over Ohio and Toledo defeated Akron, 45-28 in the 2017 Marathon MAC Football Championship Game.
- In 2017 the MAC had 11 FBS wins, including four wins over Autonomous Conferences with two wins vs. Big Ten opponents (Nebraska, Rutgers) and two wins over Big 12 opponents (both wins over Kansas).

MAC NON-CONFERENCE WINS

This season the MAC has eight FBS wins with wins over Purdue, Northwestern and Rutgers from the Big Ten Conference; Temple (American Athletic Conference); Nevada (Mountain West), Georgia State (Sun Belt Conference) and independent BYU and UMass. The MAC concluded its non-conference regular season schedule last season with 11 FBS wins. The MAC record is 16 FBS wins in 2012, while the Conference posted 14 FBS wins in both the 2016 and 2008 seasons. In 2017, the MAC also has four 'Autonomous Conference' wins over Nebraska and Rutgers (Big Ten) and Kansas twice (Big 12). Among peer Conferences during the 2017 regular season, the MAC posted a 1-1 record against the American Athletic, Mountain West and Sun Belt Conferences, along with a record 3-4 vs. Conference USA.

MAC COLLABORATIVE REPLAY SYSTEM

The 2018 football season is the first time the MAC is using a conference-wide collaborative replay system. In conjunction with the Big Ten, all MAC stadiums will have two (2) monitors on the sideline to assist with replay of game action during reviews, similar to the NFL. The MAC experimented with sideline monitors the past two seasons during select games at the University of Akron and Central Michigan University. The monitor allows the referee to view video while in conversation with the replay official. The decision is still made by the replay official in the booth. The Big Ten and MAC are the only FBS conferences utilizing this program.

MAC WITH ONE NEW HEAD COACH FOR 2018

Kent State named Sean Lewis as head coach on Dec. 21, 2017 to replace Paul Haynes, who was Kent State's head coach for five seasons (2013-17).

Kent State: Sean Lewis: Kent State named Sean Lewis to lead the Golden Flashes on Dec. 21, 2017. Lewis became the 22nd head football coach at Kent State after serving as the co-offensive coordinator and quarterbacks coach at Syracuse. His background stretches from his four-year playing career at Wisconsin under Barry Alvarez, to winning the 2015 Marathon MAC Championship as the co-offensive coordinator at Bowling Green.

Lewis' ascension has led him to become the youngest Football Bowl Subdivision (FBS) head coach in the nation at the age of 31. That distinction was previously held by Oklahoma's Lincoln Riley at age 34. Lewis has spent his last six seasons alongside head coach Dino Babers at Syracuse (2016-17), Bowling Green (2014-15) and Eastern Illinois (2012-13).

Lewis' coaching career began as the offensive coordinator for his alma mater Richards High School in Illinois. He transitioned to the college level in 2010 as tight ends coach at Division II University of Nebraska Omaha. He made his first MAC stop in 2011 as a graduate assistant for the University of Akron. Lewis earned a bachelor's degree from Wisconsin in agricultural sciences in 2007.

OHIO'S SOLICH THIRD ON MAC CAREER WINS LIST

Ohio head coach Frank Solich and his Bobcats finished 2017 with a 9-4 overall record and a second-place finish in the East Division. Ohio is 7-4 overall this year, 5-2 in the MAC East. Solich continues to rise up the MAC career head coaching win list with 104 wins, which ranks third most in MAC history.

Solich has been the model for consistency in coaching in the MAC. Solich arrived in Athens, Ohio in 2005 and now is in his 14th season running the Bobcats program. Solich and the Ohio Bobcats have garnered a bowl appearance in eight of the last nine seasons and nine of his 13 seasons at Ohio. Solich has a 104-75 career coaching record at Ohio.

MAC VS BIG TEN OPPONENTS

Buffalo's 42-13 win at Rutgers on Sept. 22, Akron's 39-34 win at Northwestern on Sept. 15 and Eastern Michigan's 20-19 win at Purdue on Sept. 8, 2018, the MAC extended its streak of a regular season win vs. Big Ten opponents in each of the last 13 consecutive seasons (2006-2018), the longest streak in MAC history.

NIU'S SUTTON SMITH CONSENSUS ALL-AMERICAN

Northern Illinois defensive end **Sutton Smith** was a 2017 Consensus All-American, as determined by the NCAA. Smith became the ninth MAC player earn Consensus All-American status.

To be selected as a Consensus All-American, a player must be named to the first team of at least two of the five selected All-America teams, announced over the last week by the American Football Coaches Association (AFCA), Associated Press, Football Writers Association of America (FWAA), The Sporting News and Walter Camp Foundation. Second team selections are used to break ties. Players who earned the honor were listed on the most first team All-America teams, competing against players at that position only.

Smith is actually one of five defensive linemen on the 2017 Consensus All-America team as he and Maurice Hurst of Michigan tied for the final spot. The St. Charles, Mo. native was named a first team All- American by Walter Camp and the FWAA, and was a second team selection on the AP, AFCA and Sporting News teams.

Smith is the fourth NIU player – joining Jordan Lynch, Jimmie Ward and Shuwan Lurry – to garner first team All-America recognition in the last five seasons, surpassing the total number of Huskie All-Americans in the school's FBS history.

Smith is the most decorated defensive player in NIU football history and in addition to the five All-America teams mentioned above, was selected to six more All-America teams by media organizations.

Smith was the 2017 MAC Defensive Player of the Year was also a finalist for the Ted Hendricks Award as the nation's best defensive end. He finished the season and led the MAC with 29.5 tackles for loss and 16 sacks. He was 2.5 tackles for loss shy of the NCAA single season record of 32, set by Western Michigan's Jason Babin in 2003.

MAC 2018 FOOTBALL SCHEDULE HIGHLIGHTS

The 2018 football schedule will feature 16 nationally televised games during late October and November on ESPN2, ESPNU, ESPN+, ESPN3 and CBS Sports Network as the conference race unfolds in both the East and West divisions.

The regular season will conclude with the 22nd Marathon MAC Football Championship game on Friday, Nov. 30 at 7:00 pm ET (ESPN2) in Detroit. This will mark the 15th Marathon MAC Football Championship game at Ford Field, home of the Detroit Lions, Super Bowl XL, and 2009 NCAA Men's Final Four.

For the 11th year in a row, league schools will face a formidable non-conference slate of opponents from the following Football Bowl Subdivision conferences – ACC, Big Ten, Big 12, Pac-12, SEC, Notre Dame and BYU. In addition, the Conference will also face opponents from the American Athletic Conference, Conference USA, Mountain West Conference, Sun Belt Conference and Independents Army and UMass.

MAC programs will face five non-conference foes that finished in the final AP Top 25 poll: Penn State (9), Notre Dame (11), Miami-Fla. (13), Michigan State (15) and Northwestern (17).

A total of 12 non-conference games will feature a Big Ten opponent (Illinois; Indiana; Iowa; Maryland; Michigan; Michigan State; Minnesota; Nebraska; Northwestern; Penn State; Purdue; Rutgers). The MAC will face foes from the ACC (5—Florida State, Georgia Tech, Miami (Fla.), Syracuse, Virginia), SEC (2—Kentucky, Ole Miss), Pac-12 (2-Oregon, Utah), Big 12 (2—Iowa State; Kansas); and Independent Notre Dame, BYU, Army (3 games) and UMass.

The MAC will also face opponents from the American Athletic Conference (3— Cincinnati (2), Temple), Mountain West (3—Fresno State, Nevada, San Diego State), Conference USA (2—Marshall, Western Kentucky) and Sun Belt Conference (1—Georgia State). The MAC will host 10 games against FBS nonconference opponents.

MAC WITH SIX STUDENTS PICKED IN 2017 NFL DRAFT

The MAC had six draft selections in the 2018 NFL Draft. Western Michigan OT Chukwuma Okorafor was the highest player selected as the Pittsburgh Steelers made him a third-round selection, 92nd overall. Also from the Broncos, DB Sam Beal was selected by the New York Giants during the July NFL Supplemental Draft.

In recent years the MAC had students selected among the top five overall in the NFL Draft. In the last six years (2013-18), the MAC has had three players selected in the top five in the NFL Drafts.

In the 2017 NFL Draft, Western Michigan wide receiver Corey Davis was selected as the fifth overall selection in the first round by the Tennessee Titans. Davis' selection was the highest ever for Western Michigan and tied the second-highest in MAC history.

In 2014, Buffalo Bulls linebacker Khalil Mack was the fifth overall selection by the Oakland Raiders in the 2014 NFL Draft. Mack's selection was the highest ever for the Buffalo program and the second-highest ever selection for a MAC student-athlete.

In 2013, Central Michigan offensive tackle Eric Fisher became the first MAC football player to be selected as the overall No. 1 selection in the NFL Draft. The Kansas City Chiefs selected Fisher as No.1 choice in the 2013 NFL Draft. The previous highest player drafted from the MAC was Marshall quarterback Byron Leftwich, who was selected No. 7 overall by Jacksonville in 2003.

FORMER MAC ALUM RANDY MOSS INDUCTED INTO PRO FOOTBALL HALL OF FAME

Joining the list of MAC alum heading to the Pro Football Hall of Fame in Canton, Ohio, former Marshall wide receiver Randy Moss will increase this number to three, as Moss will be inducted into the Pro Football Hall of Fame as a member of the 2018 Hall of Fame Class. Moss, who was named MAC Offensive Player of the Year in 1997, posted 78 catches for 1,709 yards and 28 touchdowns with Marshall in 1996 and added 96 receptions for 1,820 yards and 26 touchdowns in 1997.

Moss was selected in the first round, 21st overall, of the 1998 NFL Draft by the Minnesota Vikings. Moss spent 14 seasons in the NFL with Minnesota, Oakland, New England, Tennessee and San Francisco and amassed 982 career receptions for 15,292 yards and 156 touchdowns and was selected to five Pro Bowls. Moss becomes the third former MAC football standout to be selected to the Pro Football Hall of Fame.

Moss joins Jason Taylor of Akron and former Kent State linebacker Jack Lambert of the Pittsburgh Steelers. Moss was a member of the Marshall Thundering Herd, who competed in the MAC before departing after the 2004 season.

MAC PART OF NEW COLLEGE FOOTBALL PLAYOFF ERA

The 2018 college football season enters the fifth year of the current four-team playoff era with the College Football Playoff. The two College Football Playoff Semifinals will be played in bowl games this year (Capital One Orange Bowl; Goodyear Cotton Bowl Classic) and the College Football Playoff National Championship will be played in the Bay Area (Levi Stadium) on Jan. 7.

The two Semifinals and four other premier bowl games AllState Sugar Bowl (Jan. 1), Rose Bowl presented by Northwestern Mutual (Jan. 1), PlayStation Fiesta Bowl (Jan. 1) and the Chick-fil-A Peach Bowl (Dec. 29) highlight the annual bowl season calendar. The Semifinal games will rotate among these six different bowls. All MAC programs will join every FBS team in college football with equal access to the playoff based upon its performance. No team will qualify automatically.

The College Football Playoff Selection Committee will choose four teams for the playoffs based on body of work, strength of schedule, head-to-head results, comparison of results against common opponents, championships won and other factors.

The highest ranked program by the Selection Committee from either the MAC, American Athletic, Conference USA, Mountain West or Sun Belt Conferences will play annually in one of the premier bowl games.

MAC Week Twelve Quick Recaps:

Ohio 52, Buffalo 17 -- Ohio senior running back A.J. Ouellette rumbled for a career-high 198 yards and two touchdowns on 26 carries and also caught a touchdown to pave the way to a 52-17 win for the Ohio football team (7-4, 5-2 MAC) over MAC East Division rival Buffalo (9-2, 6-1 MAC) Wednesday night at Peden Stadium.

The Bobcats kept their hopes of a MAC East Division title alive heading into the final week of the 2018 regular season.

Ohio piled up 646 total yards -- including a season-high 437 on the ground -- and dominated the time of possession, 43:42-16:18. In addition to Ouellette's big night, redshirt senior running back Maleek Irons rushed for 92 yards and a touchdown on 12 touches. Junior quarterback Nathan Rourke accumulated 77 yards and a touchdown on the ground on seven rushes. Rourke also went 17-of-26 for 209 yards, three touchdowns and one interception through the air. Redshirt senior wide receiver Papi White hauled in eight receptions for 84 yards and a touchdown.

The Bobcats also came up big on defense, limiting Buffalo to 277 total yards -- including just 172 through the air -- and forcing four turnovers. Redshirt senior safety Kylan Nelson intercepted a pass and forced a fumble that was recovered by redshirt junior safety Javon Hagan. Redshirt sophomore safety Jarren Hampton and redshirt freshman cornerback Tariq Drake also came away with interceptions. Senior linebacker Evan Croutch led the team with five total tackles (two solo, three assisted) while redshirt senior linebacker Kent Berger recorded his team-high sixth sack of the season.

Jackson finished the night 9-of-21 for 116 yards and two interceptions while adding a team-high 70 yards and a touchdown on three rushes for Buffalo. Senior wide receiver Anthony Johnson caught six passes for a game-high 95 yards.

Miami 13, NIU 7 -- In a game dominated by the defenses, it was a defensive score that made the difference as Miami picked up a huge 13-7 road victory against Northern Illinois. Down 7-6 with 7:21 left to play in the third quarter, Miami freshman cornerback Ja'don Rucker-Furlow intercepted NIU quarterback Marcus Childers and returned it for a touchdown. The RedHawk defense would take care of business from there, sealing the win for the RedHawks (5-6, 5-2 MAC) and handing the Huskies (7-4, 6-1) their first conference loss of the season. This sets up a Redbird Rivalry game against Ball State Tuesday at Yager Stadium in which the 'Hawks will play for bowl eligibility.

The RedHawk defense was superb all game, limiting Northern Illinois to just 15 first downs in the game and turning the Huskies over twice. Following the Rucker-Furlow interception midway through the third quarter, Miami would force NIU to punt five times in a row and then seal the game with back-to-back fourth down stops late in the fourth quarter.

Both teams would struggle offensively to start the game. Northern Illinois and Miami each crossed midfield on their first drives before stalling and punting it away. The second set of drives for each team would follow the same pattern, with neither the RedHawks or Huskies able to string together enough first downs.

The Huskies would have the ball in Miami territory as the second quarter began, but would again be forced to punt by the RedHawk defense. Miami would finally break through on their next drive as the 'Hawks would go 75 yards in more than seven minutes, resulting in a 30-yard field goal from Sam Sloman.

MAC Week Twelve Quick Recaps:

Bowling Green 21, Akron 6 -- Bowling Green won its second consecutive game with a 21-6 win at Akron on Saturday afternoon at InfoCision Stadium. Bowling Green improves to 3-8 on the year, 2-5 in the MAC, while Akron falls to 4-6 overall, 2-5 in league play. Bowling Green was led by quarterback Jarret Deoge and his 178 yards passing and two touchdowns, while running back Andrew Clair added 112 yards rushing.

Bowling Green took the lead with 10 second left in the half as quarterback Jarret Doege found Dorian Hendrix for a seven-yard touchdown pass for the 7-6 lead.

The Falcons extended the lead as Rico Fry capped a seven-play, 77-yard drive with a five-yard touchdown run for the 14-6 lead with 1:13 left in the third quarter. Bowling Green added an eight-yard touchdown pass from Doege to Quintin Morris with 6:47 left in the fourth quarter to open the 21-6 lead.

Toledo 56, Kent State 34 -- Toledo redshirt freshman Bryant Koback ran for a season-high 192 yards and two touchdowns to lead Toledo to a 56-34 victory over Kent State at wintry Dix Stadium in Kent on Thursday. It was the sixth win of the season for Toledo (6-5, 4-3 MAC), making the Rockets bowl eligible for ninth consecutive season. It was also the fifth time this season Toledo topped the 50-point mark, a school record.

Toledo junior Art Thompkins added 122 yards and two scores to Toledo's running attack, which racked up a season-high 384 yards. Sophomore quarterback Eli Peters completed 11-of-14 passes for 131 yards and two scores. Junior Diontae Johnson helped the cause with an 83-yard punt return just before halftime that gave Toledo a 28-17 lead going into the locker room. Toledo then scored three quick touchdowns in the third quarter to take a 49-17 lead that ended Kent State's hopes of an upset.

Ball State 42, Western Michigan 41 (OT) -- Ball State held off Western Michigan's two-point attempt in the first overtime to claim a 42-41 win. This was Ball State's (4-7, 3-4 MAC) first overtime game since knocking off the same Western Michigan (6-5, 4-3) squad in 2012.

Tuesday's home finale for Ball State was a back-and-forth affair featuring ties at 7, 14, 28 and 35. The Cardinals went ahead 35-28 on a Malik Dunner 12-yard touchdown run with 5:36 remaining only to see Western Michigan even the score with 1:48 left.

The Cardinals got first crack with the ball in overtime and utilized a pair of creative plays to find the end zone. A reverse pass from wide receiver Corey Lacanaria to a wide-open Riley Miller on the first play moved the ball down to the one-yard line. Two plays later, quarterback Drew Plitt completed a jump pass to tight end Kyle Schrank for the touchdown. A Morgan Hagee PAT made the score, 42-35.

Western Michigan needed five plays to find the end zone on its possession. Quarterback Kaleb Eleby ran the ball in from one yard out to bring the Broncos within one point, 42-41. The Broncos elected to go for two points and the win. However, linebacker Jimmy Daw and safety Bryce Cosby broke through the middle of the line and tripped up running back LeVante Bellamy short of the goal line.

Plitt, making his second straight start for an injured Riley Neal, completed 80.8 percent (21-of-26) of his pass attempts and connected on three touchdown passes. Wide receiver Justin Hall finished with a season-high 117 yards, including a 61-yard catch and run to set up a touchdown in the second quarter. Running back James Gilbert chipped in with a pair of touchdown runs for the second time this season.

For Western Michigan, Bellamy and Jamauri Bogan combined for 318 yards on the ground. The Broncos have now lost three straight league games after winning their first four MAC contests.
