STORYLINES

- The Bulls are playing in the MAC Championship game for the second time in school history. The Bulls defeated Ball State, 42-24, to win the 2008 MAC title.
- Buffalo's 10 wins are the most in school history.
- The Bulls finished 7-1 in MAC play. It is their best record since joining the conference in 1999. UB's previous best MAC record was 6-2 in 2013.
- Northern Illinois is the only Mid-American Conference opponent Buffalo has never beaten since joining the league in 1999. The Bulls are 0-10 against the Huskies as MAC members. UB trails the overall series, 11-1, with its lone win coming in 1968.
- The Bulls are playing in a dome for the first time since the 2009 International Bowl in Toronto's Roger's Centre on Jan. 3, 2009.
- Tyree Jackson's next touchdown pass will be his 26th of the season which would move him into solo second place in school history for touchdown passes in a season, breaking the tie with Drew Willy (2008). Joe Licata holds the school record with 29 in 2014.
- Jaret Patterson is 44 yards shy of UB's freshman rushing record. Aaron Leeper set the record of 917 yards in 2002.
- With 423 points on the season, Buffalo is one point shy of the school record for points scored in a season. The Bulls scored 424 points over 14 games in 2008.
- The Bulls are 58 yards shy of breaking the single-season rushing school record. UB has rushed for 2,406 yards on the year. The school record is 2,463 set back in 1998.
- The Bulls have won 13 of their last 15 games dating back to last season.

University at Buffalo football head coach Lance Leipold has announced the number 41 jersey will be worn by a different player each game to honor the legacy of former Bull Solomon Jackson who passed away in 2016.

Over the previous two seasons, players were chosen by the coaching staff to wear "41" for the entire year. Cornerback Boise Ross wore it for the 2016 season, while linebacker Jarrett Franklin wore it last season.

This is the first season the number will alternate for each game.

Solomon Jackson passed away unexpectedly following an offseason workout on February 29, 2016. Jackson, respected and beloved by his teammates, played both linebacker and defensive end over his career. The slogan ALL41 is a prominent fixture throughout the Murchie Family Football Center to honor his legacy.

Bulls and Huskies Tangle for Mid-American Conference Crown

The University at Buffalo football team will face off against Northern Illinois at Ford Field in the Mid-American Conference Championship game on Friday. The Bulls finished the regular season 10-2 overall, 7-1 in the MAC and are coming off a 44-14 win at Bowling Green last Friday. Running back **Jaret Patterson** rushed for 88 yards and two touchdowns to lead the Bulls.

Northern Illinois finished the regular season 7-5 overall, 6-2 in the MAC and is coming off a 28-21 loss at Western Michigan last Tuesday. The Huskies are led by defensive end Sutton Smith who has 21 tackles for loss and 13 sacks on the season.

Northern Illinois leads the all-time series, 11-1. The Huskies won the last meeting, 14-13, at UB Stadium last season.

Returning to the MAC Championship 10 Years Later

Buffalo will play in the MAC Championship game for the second time in school history when it faces off against Northern Illinois on Friday.

It has been 10 years since the Bulls won the 2008 MAC Championship - UB's first and only football conference title. After a 7-5 regular season, the Bulls stunned 12th-ranked Ball State, 42-24, in the title game. Buffalo went on to play Connecticut in the International Bowl - its first-ever bowl game.

Pure Michigan

It will be a homecoming for a number of key members of the Buffalo football team. Eight members of the Bulls hail from Michigan and most are from the Detroit area.

Detroit area natives include starting wide receiver **K.J. Osborn**, starting tight end **Tyler Mabry**, starting defensive end **Chuck Harris**, starting cornerback **Cameron Lewis** and starting punter **Evan Finegan**.

In addition, quarterback **Tyree Jackson** is a native of western Michigan. As a senior in high school, he led his Mona Shores team to its first ever state championship game appearance in Ford Field where they fell to De La Salle Collegiate.

Gold Rush

Through 12 games the Bulls have already broken the school record for rushing touchdowns in a season. Buffalo has scored 32 rushing touchdowns on the year, shattering the previous record of 27 set back in 2008 (over 14 games). **Jaret Patterson** leads the team with 12 touchdowns, **Kevin Marks** has 11, **Tyree Jackson** has seven and **Emmanuel Reed** and **Theo Anderson** each have one.

Setting the Tone

The Bulls have scored touchdowns on their first or second possession in eight of 12 games this season. In addition, Buffalo has scored first-quarter points in all but one game this year (Toledo). The Bulls are averaging 10.8 points in the opening quarter of games and have outscored their opponents 130-58 in the first quarter this season.

Scoring Pace

The Bulls are on a pace for their highest-scoring season in school history. Through 12 games, Buffalo has scored 423 points, one point shy of the school record of 424 set in 2008 over 14 games. In addition, UB has scored a school-record 58 touchdowns on the year breaking the previous record of 55 also set in 2008.

Big Play Bulls

The Bulls have made a habit of creating big plays this season. In fact, UB has had a play of at least 44 yards in 10 straight games. They have had touchdown plays of 70+ yards in four different games.

Serve and Protect

The UB offensive line has done a tremendous job this season. The Bulls have only allowed eight sacks on the year, easily a low for a single season as a FBS program. The previous low for a season was 16 in 2014 and 2015. Buffalo uncharacteristically allowed five sacks against Toledo and two against Miami (OH). The Bulls have not allowed a sack in nine games this season.

Hodge Ball

Khalil Hodge has 130 tackles on the season, making him just the second player in school history to have three seasons of 100 tackles or more (Davonte Shannon, 2007-10, was the other). He is the first player in school history to post three straight seasons of 100+ tackles.

Currently ranked 16th in the nation in tackles, Hodge has been in the national rankings since arriving on campus in 2016. He ranked eighth in the nation in tackles following the 2016 season and second in the nation in tackles after last season.

With 406 tackles, Hodge is just the fourth player in school history to register 400 tackles. He is the first player in school history to reach the landmark number in only three seasons. He currently ranks third in school history in career tackles.

Hodge has been named the MAC East Defensive Player of the Week three times this. Former All-American Khalil Mack is the only other UB player to win MAC Defensive Player of the Week honors three times in the same season.

Using His Legs

Quarterback **Tyree Jackson** is using his legs more in recent games. Prior to UB's game at Central Michigan on Oct. 6, Jackson ran the ball three times for eight yards and no scores over the previous nine games. Over the last six games, the junior signal-caller has carried the ball 36 times for 101 yards and seven touchdowns. In Buffalo's win over Miami (OH), he became the first quarterback in the Bulls' FBS era (since 1999) to score three rushing touchdowns in a single game. Cliff Scott was the last UB quarterback with three rushing touchdowns against Maine in 1993.

Not Standing Patt

Jaret Patterson rushed for a career-high 187 yards and two touchdowns against Kent State. He did so in only the first half and on only 18 carries (10.4 ypc). It was the most rushing yards in a game by a freshman running back in school history.

Patterson has rushed for 874 yards and 12 touchdowns on the year. He is 44 yards shy of the school record for rushing yards by a freshman in a season. Aaron Leeper holds the record with 917 yards set in 2002. In addition, Patterson's 12 rushing touchdowns are the most ever by a UB freshman and is four shy of the single season record held by James Starks (2008).

Record-Breaking Night for AJ

Anthony Johnson had a record-breaking night in the Bulls' 51-42 win over Miami (OH). The senior receiver had eight catches for a school-record 238 yards against the

RedHawks. He broke a 37-year-old record of 218 receiving yards set by Joe D'Amico against Cortland in 1981 when the Bulls were a Division III program.

Johnson has 23 touchdown catches over 23 career games. He is just the third player in school history with 20+ touchdowns in a career, joining Alex Neutz (2010-13) who had 31 and Naaman Roosevelt (2006-09) who had 28. Johnson reached the 20-touchdown plateau faster than any player in school history, doing so in just 20 games.

Quarterback **Tyree Jackson** is enjoying the best season of his career, having already thrown 25 touchdowns, 13 more than he did all of last season. He is tied for second in school history for single-season passing touchdowns, just four shy of the single-season mark.

He has thrown for 6,473 yards in his career, becoming just the fifth quarterback in school history to throw for 6,000 yards.

He has been named the Mid-American Conference East Division Offensive Player of the Week three times this season. He is the first player in school history to win the award three times in a single season.

Having thrown for 25 touchdowns and run for seven scores, Jackson's 32 total touchdowns are a school record, breaking Joe Licata's mark of 31 set in 2014.

Jackson is on the watch lists for the Davey O'Brien Award and Johnny Unitas Golden Arm Award.

Evan Almighty

Redshirt-freshman **Evan Finegan** has had a solid season in his first year as the Bulls starting punter. Finegan is averaging 41.8 yards per punt. The single-season school record for punt average is 41.6 set by Ben Woods in 2007.

Sack Lunch

The Bulls have done a great job getting to the quarterback this season. UB already has 30 sacks on the year, 11 more than all of last season. It is the most sacks since 2013 when UB had 38. The Bulls have been especially effective rushing the edge as defensive ends **Chuck Harris** (6), **Taylor Rig-gins** (5), **Myles Nicholas** (3) and **Malcolm Koonce** (3) lead the team in sacks.

The Bulls have registered at least one sack in every game this season.

Os-born to Run

K.J. Osborn is enjoying the best season of his career. He leads the Bulls with 46 catches for 769 yards and six touchdowns. He has already surpassed his receiving yardage total from his first two seasons combined (598).

He was recently added to the Biletnikoff Watch List - an award given to the nation's top receiver.

Osborn had one of the best games of his career against Eastern Michigan. The junior receiver had seven receptions for 188 yards and three touchdowns in the Bulls' 35-28 win. Two of Osborn's three touchdowns were 70+ yards (70, 75). He was rewarded by being named the MAC East Division Offensive Player of the Week.

Take Your Pick

The Bulls are tied for second in the MAC with 13 interceptions, their most since having 13 in 2015. Buffalo had a season-best

four picks at Central Michigan. It was the most in a game since picking off four passes against Ohio in 2015.

Eight different UB players have recorded an interception on the year. **Cameron Lewis** and **Brandon Williams** lead the way with three apiece. **Aapri Washington** has two picks. **Joey Banks**, **Devon Russell**, **Jordan Collier**, **Khalil Hodge** and **Tatum Slack** each have one.

Many Happy Returns

K.J. Osborn has been a game changer for the Bulls when it comes to punt returns. He has posted 25 returns for 257 yards - a 10.3 average. It is the most punt return yards by a UB player in its FBS era (since 1999).

Osborn ranks second fourth in the MAC in punt return average. He currently ranks second in school history in single season punt return yardage. Drew Haddad (1998) holds the school record with 410 return yards in 1998.

Lance Wins A Lot

UB's win over Miami (OH) on Oct. 30 was the 21st of head coach Lance Leipold's career at Buffalo. It gave him the most wins by a head coach in the Bulls' FBS era (since 1999), surpassing Turner Gill and Jeff Quinn who both won 20 games. Over 45 games, Leipold became the second fastest coach to reach 21 wins in school history. Only Dick Offenhamer got there quicker, doing it in 34 games. Leipold currently holds a 23-25 record in his fourth season with the Bulls.

Let's Go Bowling

With a 10-2 record, the Bulls are bowl eligible for the fourth time in school history. Buffalo was also bowl eligible in 2008, 2013 and 2017. The Bulls have won six or more games in consecutive seasons for the first

time since the 1983 and 1984 campaigns, when they won eight and six games, respectively.

Long Way Home

The Bulls have been using big plays to find the endzone this season. Buffalo has recorded 18 touchdowns of at least 25 yards. The Bulls have scored touchdowns of 25, 27, 29, 32, 32, 33, 34, 37, 40, 42, 42, 53, 53, 64, 70, 70, 75 and 75 yards on the year.

The Kids Are Alright

While many will credit the Bulls' record to their seasoned veterans, you can't discredit the play of the youngsters. 27 of Buffalo's 55 touchdowns on the season have been scored by freshmen. A freshman has scored a touchdown in every game this season.

Buffalo's top two leading rushers are freshmen. True freshman **Jaret Patterson** leads the Bulls with 874 yards and 12 touchdowns. Redshirt-freshmen **Kevin Marks** has rushed for 733 yards and 11 touchdowns.

Redshirt-freshman receiver **Charlie Jones** has 17 catches for 387 yards (22.8 ypc) and has three touchdown receptions.

It's All Relative

The UB football team features a pair of players related to two of the top five picks in the 2014 NFL Draft. Senior wide receiver **Anthony Johnson** is the cousin of top pick Jadeveon Clowney. Junior defensive end **Ledarius Mack** is the younger brother of former UB All-American and fifth pick Khalil Mack.



Last Meeting

Northern Illinois 14, Buffalo 13

BUFFALO, NY -- For the second straight week, the University at Buffalo football team dropped a nail-biter at UB Stadium. The Bulls fell to Northern Illinois, 14-13, in a defensive struggle on Saturday afternoon.

After Buffalo took a 3-0 lead in the first quarter on an Adam Mitcheson field goal, Northern Illinois scored on its next two possessions to take a 14-3 lead early in the second quarter. The UB defense wouldn't allow another point the rest of the game.

Northern Illinois (4-2, 2-0 MAC) entered Saturday's game with not only the best defense in the MAC, but one of the tops in the nation. The Bulls began to find their groove offensively after NIU's second score.

Buffalo (3-4, 1-2 MAC) drove 81 yards on just four plays behind the arm of quarterback Drew Anderson. The junior signal-caller completed a 27-yard pass to Anthony Johnson; a 40-yard pass to Emmanuel Reed; a short gain to Tyler Mabry and capped it off with a 21-yard touchdown pass to Reed to cut the NIU advantage to 14-10.

The Bulls were able to drive the ball down the field on their next possession, but had to settle for a 22-yard Mitcheson field goal to make it a 14-13 contest late in the first half.

However, late in the drive, Drew Anderson went down with an injury forcing him to leave the game. Prior to the injury, Anderson was 13-for-18 for 191 yards and a touchdown.

Enter Kyle Vantrease, the Bulls' third different quarterback to play this season.

The true freshman, seeing the first action of his career, finished 8-for-16 for 153 yards in the game. The youngster showed poise and completed a 47-yard pass to Johnson and a 43-yarder to Antonio Nunn.

It was another big game for Johnson as the junior receiver finished with seven catches for 140 yards.

Khalil Hodge led the Bulls' defensive effort with 19 tackles. Jordan Collier had a career-high 10 tackles in the game. Cameron Lewis had five tackles and forced two fumbles, both of which were recovered by the Bulls.

BUFFALO, NY -- Tyree Jackson tossed a career-high six touchdowns passes in just over two quarters of work to lead the University at Buffalo football team to a 48-10 win over Delaware State in the season opener at UB Stadium on Saturday night.

Jackson threw for 189 yards and six touchdowns before he was pulled early in the third quarter. The junior quarterback was responsible for the Bulls' first six touchdowns, finding four different receivers for scores.

Jackson's first touchdown pass was a nine-yard toss to newcomer George Rushing, who was playing in his first game with the Bulls after joining the program from Wisconsin. On the Bulls' next possession, Jackson found a familiar target in Anthony Johnson for a 27-yard touchdown to give the Bulls a 13-0 lead.

Devon Russell notched his first career interception on Delaware State's ensuing possession to set UB up in Hornets' territory. Buffalo capitalized when Jackson hit K.J. Osborn in stride for a 32-yard strike to extend the UB lead to 20-0 with 3:17 left in the first quarter.

Rushing struck again early in the second quarter with a one-yard touchdown catch from Jackson to give the Bulls a 27-0 lead. Osborn followed with his second touchdown grab of the night when he took a quick slant from Jackson and sprinted 19 yards to pay dirt.

Jackson's final touchdown pass was an 11-yard connection with redshirt-freshman Charlie Jones with 9:25 left in the third quarter. It was Jones' first career touchdown catch.

The Bulls' final score of the game came from freshman running back Jaret Patterson who ripped of a 16-yard with 5:21 left in the third quarter for his first career touchdown.

As well as the offense played, it was the play of the defense that put the team in a position to succeed. The Bulls forced four turnovers in the game, three of which were turned into touchdowns. After Russell's interception led to a touchdown, the Bulls quickly got the ball back when Ledarius Mack had a strip sack that was recovered by Chuck Harris. Later, Jordan Collier recovered a fumble that led to another touchdown.

With the Bulls able to quickly build a large lead, it afforded the coaching staff the opportunity to play a number of different players. In fact, 52 different players saw action in the game.

10 different players caught a pass on the night, led by Johnson who had four receptions for 57 yards and a score. Osborn had three catches for 54 yards and two TDs.

Johnathan Hawkins was the Bulls' leading rusher with 37 yards on eight carries. Patterson finished with 34 yards on nine carries and Emmanuel Reed had 32 yards on eight carries.

Matt Otwinowski had a career-high 10 tackles to lead the defense. Khalil Hodge had eight stops.

However, the night belonged to Jackson. The junior signal-caller became the first quarterback in school history to throw five first-half touchdowns and his six touchdown passes tied for the second in program history for a single game.

PHILADELPHIA, PA -- Anthony Johnson took a pass over the middle from Tyree Jackson, fought through defenders and willed his way into the endzone for a 29-yard touchdown with 59 seconds left to lift the University at Buffalo football team to a 36-29 win over Temple at Lincoln Financial Field on Saturday.

A resilient Buffalo team, now 2-0 on the season, had an answer for every Temple threat. With the Bulls leading by eight, Temple was able to score and get the two-point conversion to tie the game, 22-22, early in the fourth quarter.

The Bulls immediately responded by driving 58 yards on eight plays and Jackson's 5-yard touchdown pass to Antonio Nunn put UB back on top, 29-22, with 7:43 left in the game. Temple answered right back with a 75-yard drive of its own to again tie the game at 29 with 4:53 remaining.

The Bulls' game-winning drive was a thing of beauty. Buffalo surgically sliced through the Temple defense and drove 81 yards on 10 plays for the final score. On three separate occasions, the Bulls were able to convert third-and-longs to keep the drive alive. Even the game-winning touchdown was on a third down and 10.

The Bulls sealed the win when, on the Owls' final drive, Chuck Harris sacked Temple quarterback Frank Nutile and forced a fumble that Chibueze Onwuka was able to recover.

Jackson threw for 275 yards and three touchdowns in the game. Once again, he spread the ball around with touchdown passes to Nunn, Johnson and Charlie Jones.

Redshirt-freshman running back Kevin Marks had a breakout performance for the Bulls. Playing in just the second game of his career, Marks rushed for 138 yards and two touchdowns on 25 carries.

Cameron Lewis, who was wearing no. 41 in the game to honor the late Solomon Jackson, had two interceptions in the game. He became the first UB player to record two interception in a game since Okezie Alozie had two against Ohio in 2015.

The Bulls seemed in total control for much of the first half, leading 12-0, after a 33-yard TD pass from Jackson to Jones and a 22-yard touchdown run by Marks. However, Temple converted on a 39-yard Hail Mary pass, on the final play of the first half, to cut the Buffalo lead to 12-7 at the break. The Owls also scored on their first drive of the third quarter to take a 14-12 lead.

Sparked by Lewis' second interception of the game, the Bulls took a 19-14 lead on a one-yard touchdown plunge by Marks.

Buffalo extended its lead to 22-14 on a 46-yard field goal by Adam Mitcheson, late in the third quarter.

Johnson finished with six catches for 76 yards and the game-winning touchdown. The senior's performance was even more remarkable considering he was playing with a heavy heart. Just hours before to the game, Johnson learned his best friend, De'Mon Davis, was gunned down. There was question as to whether Johnson would be able to play, but he stepped up and not only played, but made one of the biggest plays of his career.

The Bulls are 2-0 for the first time since the 1983 season.

BUFFALO, NY — Fans of Mid-American Conference football are familiar with the term MACtion. University at Buffalo football fans were introduced to the term first hand in an exciting 35-28 win over Eastern Michigan at UB Stadium on Saturday night. The Bulls beat a 2-0 Eastern Michigan team to improve to 3-0 on the season for the first time since 1983.

Quarterback Tyree Jackson had arguably the best game of his career, going 21-of-26 for 325 yards and three touchdowns. His favorite target was K.J. Osborn who had seven receptions for 188 yards and three scores. Two of Osborn's three touchdowns were 70 yards or longer.

The Bulls jumped out to a 14-0 lead, scoring touchdowns on each of their first two drives. Following a 45-yard completion from Jackson the Anthony Johnson, Kevin Marks punched it in from 1-yard out to put the Bulls on the board. Osborn's first touchdown was an 8-yarder that extended the UB lead to 14-0.

The real fireworks started in the second quarter with three consecutive big plays by both teams. Eastern Michigan scored on a 76-yard touchdown pass to cut the UB lead to 14-7. The Bulls quickly responded on their first play of their ensuing possession when Jackson connected with a streaking Osborn for a 70-yard touchdown to extend the UB lead to 21-7. However, the Eagles answered right back with a 75-yard touchdown pass on the first play of their next possession to cut the UB lead to 21-14.

Marks scored his second rushing touchdown of the game, with 2:03 left in the second quarter, to extend the Bulls' lead to 28-14. Eastern Michigan scored on the final play of the first half to cut the UB lead to 28-21.

The signature play of the game came early in the third quarter when Jackson rolled to his right and hit Osborn in stride along the sideline. The junior receiver did the rest as he was able to outrace the defense for a 75-yard touchdown to give the Bulls a 35-21 lead.

"It's a pretty exciting group in there right now and I think they're proud of what they've been able to get done so far," head coach Lance Leipold said. "I don't know if it's looking at the 3-0 part or it's looking at 1-0 in the league which is a great start. I think they're just excited to get a win against a good football team and keep battling through this."

Osborn's 188 receiving yards were the fourth most in school history for a single game. It was Jackson's sixth career 300-yard passing game and his third highest single-game total in his career. It was the third straight game the junior signal-caller had 3+ touchdown passes in a game and he now has 12 touchdown passes on the season, matching his total from all of last season.

The Bulls' defense had eight tackles for loss and six sacks in the game. Leading the way was Chuck Harris. The senior defensive end, wearing number 41 in the game in honor of the late Solomon Jackson, finished with eight tackles, 2.5 sacks and a forced fumble. Khalil Hodge had a game-high 14 tackles for the Bulls.

The Bulls will take their 3-0 record to New Jersey next week to face Rutgers.

PISCATAWAY, NJ — It was a historic day for the University at Buffalo football program as the Bulls beat Rutgers, 42-13, at HighPoint.com Stadium on Saturday for their first ever win over a team from the Big 10 Conference. Buffalo improved to 4-0 on the season for the first time since the 1981 campaign.

The Bulls jumped out to a 35-6 first-half lead and never looked back. And, once again, they did so with a slew of big offense plays.

Tyree Jackson hit Anthony Johnson in stride for a 42-yard touchdown, midway through the first quarter, to not only open the Bulls' scoring, but the scoring floodgates.

Jaret Patterson followed with a 42-yard touchdown run, on the Bulls' next possession, to extend the Buffalo lead to 14-3. Patterson had the best game of his young career, as the freshman running back finished with 104 yards and two touchdowns on only 14 carries.

After a Rutgers field goal cut the UB lead to 14-6, early in the second quarter, Jackson eluded the pass rush, rolled to his right and threw a frozen rope to Johnson for a 59-yard gain, setting up a 1-yard touchdown plunge by Kevin Marks to extend the lead to 21-6.

The Bulls weren't done scoring. On a third down near midfield, Jackson hit a streaking Charlie Jones for a 53-yard touchdown right down the seam. Jackson then hit Tyler Mabry with a 9-yard touchdown pass, late in the second quarter, to give the Bulls a 35-6 lead at the half.

Rutgers never threatened in the second half. Patterson put the exclamation point on the win with a 4-yard touchdown run, with 3:34 left, to make the score 42-13.

It was another big game for Jackson. The junior signal-caller threw for 263 yards and three touchdowns in the game. He now has 15 touchdown passes on the season and has thrown for at least three scores in every game this year.

Johnson had 101 yards receiving and two touchdowns on only two catches. K.J. Osborn and Tyler Mabry each had three catches for the Bulls.

Buffalo had its best day rushing the ball this season. The Bulls ran for 182 yards on the day, led by Patterson's 104 yards. Marks had 63 yards rushing on 12 touches, including a 37-yard scamper.

Defensively, Khalil Hodge had a season-high 15 tackles to lead all players. Joey Banks added eight stops. The Bulls had eight tackles for loss in the game. None was bigger than Chuck Harris's sack on fourth down, with Rutgers on the UB 6-yard line and trailing 35-13, early in the fourth quarter.

BUFFALO, NY – The University at Buffalo football team suffered its first loss of the season on Saturday afternoon, falling to Army, 42-13, in front of 23,671 fans at UB Stadium.

The game couldn't have started better for the Bulls. K.J. Osborn took a screen pass from Tyree Jackson and sprinted 53 yards down the sideline for a touchdown to give UB a 7-0 lead less than two minutes into the game.

On Army's ensuing possession, Brandon Williams came up with an interception near midfield and the Bulls were back in business. However, while Buffalo was able to move the ball into scoring position, it wasn't able to capitalize and the Black Knights took over.

Army drove the length of the field on its next possession to tie the game, 7-7, late in the first quarter. The Bulls struggled to stop Army's triple-option offense and another rushing touchdown midway through the second quarter gave the Black Knights the lead for good, 14-7.

The real swing of emotions came on Buffalo's next drive. The Bulls drove down the field and had a short field goal that would have cut the Army lead to 14-10. However, the Black Knights blocked the field goal attempt and returned it 80 yards for a touchdown. Army led 21-7 at the half.

Jackson connected with Charlie Jones on a 32-yard pass play on the Bulls' first drive of the second half, setting up a first-and-goal for UB. Running back Kevin Marks punched it in from the 1-yard line to cut the Army lead to 21-13.

Army answered right back and scored on a rare pass play to regain a 28-13 lead late in the third quarter. The Bulls couldn't recover from the 15-point deficit to drop their first game of the season.

The UB offense struggled on the day as Army held the Bulls to a season-low 255 yards of total offense. Jackson was held in check for most of the game, finishing 10-of-24 for 152 yards and a touchdown. Emmanuel Reed was the Bulls' top rusher with 63 yards in the game. Osborn had a team-best four receptions for 82 yards and a score in the game.

Khalil Hodge led the Buffalo defense with 20 tackles, tying a career high. The senior linebacker moved into sixth place in school history in career tackles with 344, passing three players, including All-American linebacker Khalil Mack.

James Patterson also had a career high in tackles, finishing with 11. Chuck Harris had his team-best sixth sack in the game.

Despite the loss, the atmosphere was electric at UB Stadium. The 23,671 in attendance was the fifth-largest crowd in UB Stadium history.

MOUNT PLEASANT, MI – The University at Buffalo football team rushed for a season-high 307 yards and three touchdowns to defeat Central Michigan, 34-24, at Kelly/Shorts Stadium on Saturday afternoon. It was UB's first-ever win at Central Michigan to improve to 5-1 overall and 2-0 in Mid-American Conference play.

UB's young running backs led the way. Redshirt-freshman Kevin Marks rushed for a career-high 167 yards and a touchdown. It was the second-most rushing yards by a UB freshman in the Bulls' FBS era behind Marquis Dwart's 173 yards against Akron in 2000. Freshman Jaret Patterson also rushed for a career high with 121 yards and a score.

"I think the thing that is really impressive is that when you have two young backs that are breaking tackles and getting yards after contact, it's pretty special, head coach Lance Leipold said."

While the running game paced the offense, the defense was led by its defensive backfield. The Bulls had a season-best four interceptions in the game. Brandon Williams, Cameron Lewis, Joey Banks and Apri Washington all recorded interceptions in the game.

After Central Michigan kicked a field goal on its first possession, the Bulls drove right down the field and scored a touchdown on their first possession when Tyree Jackson found Tyler Mabry on a 6-yard touchdown pass. The Bulls would never trail again.

Midway through the second quarter, Jackson scored on a five-yard run to extend the UB lead to 14-3. Adam Mitcheson drilled a 26-yard field goal to give the Bulls a 17-3 lead at the half.

Central Michigan scored on its first drive of the second half to cut the UB lead to 17-10. However, Marks quickly silenced the Chippewas faithful, when, on the first play of Buffalo's ensuing drive, he ripped off a 70-yard touchdown run to regain a 14-point advantage for the Bulls.

Late in the third quarter, Central Michigan scored again to cut the UB advantage to 24-17. But, following a Lewis interception, Patterson rumbled in from 14 yards out to make it 31-17 early in the fourth quarter and silence the Chippewa threat.

The Bulls rolled up 434 yards of total offense. With the running game working so effectively, Jackson only needed to attempt 20 passes and threw for 127 yards and a score.

Khalil Hodge had seven tackles and Chuck Harris added six stops to lead the defense.

"We've been through enough close games," Leipold said. "I think our upperclassmen and our leaders have understood that's the way this conference is and you're going to have to play 60 minutes or 60 minutes-plus each and every Saturday. You've got to be able to keep going and our guys have really embraced that."

At 5-1, the Bulls are off to their best start since 1996 and their first 2-0 start to MAC play since the 2013 campaign. Buffalo will return home next Saturday to host Akron at UB Stadium. Kickoff is slated for noon.

BUFFALO 24, AKRON 6

BUFFALO, NY – The University at Buffalo football team used its finest defensive effort of the season to defeat Akron, 24-6, at UB Stadium on Saturday afternoon in front of a homecoming crowd of nearly 20,000. It was the Bulls' sixth win of the season, making them bowl eligible for just the fourth time in program history.

Buffalo allowed only 235 yards of total offense, its lowest total allowed since allowing 223 yards against Colgate in last season's home opener. The Bulls held their opponent out of the endzone for the first time since the 2013 campaign.

"I'm really proud of our groups," head coach Lance Leipold said. "Our defensive effort I thought was outstanding, keeping them out of the end zone. Especially as you get to this point in the year when you're starting to get banged up in some spots. You're starting to see different guys at different times. Last week we had some guards step in. You saw a lot of those guys today. You're seeing the young freshmen and I think that's important because it wasn't the cleanest of first halves obviously, and for us to work through that, I don't know if we could have done that two years ago."

The Bulls got off to a bit of a sluggish start and trailed, 3-0, midway through the first quarter. Late in the first quarter, Tyree Jackson, who wore #41 in the game in honor of Solomon Jackson, rolled to his right and found George Rushing for a 17-yard touchdown pass to give the Bulls the lead for good, 7-3.

Adam Mitcheson kicked a 30-yard field goal midway through the second quarter to extend the UB lead to 10-3. An Akron field goal, as time expired before halftime, cut the UB advantage to 10-6, but that would be all the points the Zips would get.

The Bulls seemed to get the ground game rolling in the second half and Jaret Patterson played a big part. The freshman running back rushed for 54 of his game-high 91 yards in the third quarter and his 4-yard touchdown run gave the Bulls a 17-6 lead with 1:56 left in the third quarter.

The UB defense ratcheted up the pressure in the second half and did so with the help of reserve Taylor Riggins. The sophomore defensive end had back-to-back sacks and, on Akron's next drive, his quarterback hurry led to a Jordan Collier interception. The Bulls capitalized on their next drive when Jackson scored on a quarterback sneak to extend the UB lead to 24-6.

Khalil Hodge led the Bulls with 12 tackles and had 1.5 of the Bulls' seven tackles for loss in the game. Along with his interception, Collier added three tackles and 1.5 tackles for loss. The Bulls also forced four fumbles in the game and had five pass breakups.

The Bulls had a balanced offensive attack, rushing for 223 yards and passing for 212 more. Jackson threw for 212 yards and a touchdown. He also did damage with his legs, rushing for a season-high 57 yards and a score. Patterson rushed for 91 yards on 17 carries and Kevin Marks, making his first career start, finished with 64 yards on 15 tries.

K.J. Osborn posted his second 100-yard receiving game of the season with 116 yards on six catches. Anthony Johnson was back in the lineup after missing most of the last two games with an injury and had a pair of catches for 44 yards, including a spectacular one-handed grab for 28 yards.

The Bulls are 6-1 for the first time since the 1959 season. They will next play at Toledo next Saturday at noon.

TOLEDO, OH – The University at Buffalo football team rallied to score 24 unanswered points and erase a 17-7 halftime deficit to defeat Toledo, 31-17, at the Glass Bowl on Saturday afternoon. It was Buffalo's first ever win at Toledo and improved the Bulls to 7-1 overall and 4-0 in the Mid-American Conference.

It was a tale of two halves for the Bulls who struggled to get anything going in the first thirty minutes. UB uncharacteristically turned the ball over and allowed a number of sacks that helped lead to the 17-7 halftime deficit. However, after regrouping in the locker room, the Bulls came out and played like a totally different team in the second half.

The Bulls defense held Toledo, the MAC's highest-scoring offense, to zero points and just 65 yards of total offense in the second half. Buffalo's offense did the rest.

On their opening drive of the third quarter, the Bulls drove down the field and Adam Mitcheson drilled a 39-yard field goal to cut the Toledo lead to 17-10. Mitcheson's field goal was the 44th of his career, tying A.J. Principe for the school record for field goals.

A K.J. Osborn 20-yard punt return to the Toledo 32-yard line had the Bulls back in business and it only took them one play to cash in. Tyree Jackson connected with Anthony Johnson on a slant over the middle and the preseason All-American did the rest, eluding tacklers and darting to the endzone to tie the game at 17-17.

The Bulls came up with their second turnover of the second half when Brandon Williams intercepted a pass near midfield. Three plays later, Jaret Patterson raced into the endzone on a 6-yard touchdown run to give Buffalo its first lead of the game, 24-17, early in the fourth quarter.

Patterson wasn't done. The freshman running back scored on a 25-yard touchdown run with 2:49 left to ice the game for the Bulls.

"I'm so proud of this group for how they battled back," head coach Lance Leipold said. "There wasn't any panic at halftime. We had guys step up. When you see people step up, creating depth, you're creating confidence. Right now, all across the board, this team is playing with confidence."

Jackson shrugged off a shaky first half to throw for 326 yards and two touchdowns. Johnson, who had been limited in previous games with an injury, looked healthy and had four catches for 83 yards and two touchdowns.

K.J. Osborn tied a season high with seven catches for 90 yards. Tyler Mabry and George Rushing each posted career highs with six and five catches, respectively.

On the ground, Jaret Patterson led the Bulls with 90 yards and two touchdowns. Kevin Marks added 49 rushing yards.

The Bulls' hung their hats on their defense for this win. Khalil Hodge led Buffalo with a game-high 13 tackles and added a tackle for loss. Freshman James Patterson had the best game of his young career with nine tackles, a tackle for loss and a forced fumble that was recovered by Cameron Lewis.

The Bulls were without starting defensive end Chuck Harris and starting safety Joey Banks for the game. Myles Nicholas stepped up his play with six tackles, a sack and 1.5 tackles for loss. Taylor Riggins started in Harris' place and notched his third sack in the last two games.

BUFFALO, NY – The University at Buffalo football team scored a season-high 51 points in a 51-42 win over Miami (OH) at UB Stadium on Tuesday night. It was the Bulls fourth straight win to keep them atop the Mid-American Conference East Division standings at 5-0 and 8-1 overall.

The Bulls rolled up a season-high 505 yards of total offense, mostly through the air thanks to a record-breaking performance by Anthony Johnson. The senior wideout finished with a single-game school record 238 receiving yards on eight catches and had three touchdowns grabs.

Quarterback Tyree Jackson accounted for six touchdowns in the game. The junior signal-caller threw for three touchdowns and ran for a career-best three more. Jackson threw for a season-high 358 yards in the game.

Trailing 7-0, the Bulls struck quickly, as Jackson connected with Johnson on a 75-yard touchdown pass on the Bulls' second play of the game to quickly tie the contest at 7-7. Following a Miami touchdown on its next possession, Jackson used his feet to score on a 7-yard touchdown run to once again tie the game at 14-14.

Following a blocked punt, Miami took its third lead of the game early in the second quarter to once again go ahead, 21-14. However, the Bulls struck back when, on 3rd-and-17, Jackson connected with Johnson again for a 20-yard score to tie the game.

Jackson's second touchdown run of the game came with just 38 seconds left in the half when he scored from five yards out to give Buffalo its first lead of the game, 28-21.

Capped by another Jackson touchdown run, this time from four yards out, the Bulls took the opening kickoff of the second half and drove 75 yards down the field to take a 35-21 lead in the game.

Johnson caught his third touchdown of the game on a 10-yard pass from Jackson to put the Bulls ahead, 42-28. However, in typical #MACtion fashion, Buffalo's 14-point lead didn't last long.

Following a 59-yard touchdown play from Miami, the RedHawks surprised the Bulls with an onside kick and recovered it. Miami capitalized and scored a touchdown in the closing seconds of the third quarter to tie the game at 42-42.

Midway through the fourth quarter, Jaret Patterson scored on a 4-yard run to give the Bulls the lead for good, 48-42. Patterson finished the game with 96 yards on a career-high 23 carries.

With 3:54 left, Adam Mitcheson drilled a 37-yard field goal to extend the Buffalo lead to 51-42 and put the game on ice. It was the senior kicker's 45th career field goal, setting a new school record.

Despite giving up 42 points, the Bulls played good defense down the stretch, when it mattered most. Kadofi Wright had a strip sack that was recovered by James Patterson to helped seal the win. Khalil Hodge had 11 tackles, a sack and two tackles for loss to lead the Bulls. Buffalo tied a season high with six sacks in the game.

BUFFALO, NY – The University at Buffalo football team cruised to a 48-14 win over Kent State on Tuesday night at UB Stadium to improve to 9-1 on the year – its best start in school history. The Bulls also improved to 6-0 in Mid-American Conference play for the first time since joining the league in 1999.

In blustery conditions, with wins over 25 miles per hour, the Bulls relied on a steady dose of the ground game and rushed for a season-best 358 yards in the game. Jaret Patterson set the tone early by ripping off a 64-yard touchdown run on the second play from scrimmage to quickly give the Bulls a 7-0 lead. The freshman running back ran for a career-high 187 yards and two touchdowns on 18 carries.

The Bulls scored on each of their first four drives of the game and five of their first six possessions. Five different Bulls scored rushing touchdowns in the game. Along with Patterson's two scores, Tyree Jackson (1 yd), Emmanuel Reed (2 yds), Kevin Marks (5 yds) and Theo Anderson (11 yds) also scored rushing touchdowns.

Jackson attempted only 16 passes in the game, but threw a three-yard touchdown to Anthony Johnson early in the third quarter to extend the UB lead to 41-0. It was Johnson's sixth touchdown catch in the last three games. Jackson finished the game with 111 yards passing.

A week after giving up 42 points to Miami (OH), the Buffalo defense played its most dominant game of the season. The Bulls held Kent State to just 34 yards of total offense through the first three quarters.

Matt Otwinowski filled in admirably for Khalil Hodge at middle linebacker. With Hodge out for the first half for his targeting penalty in last week's game, Otwinowski earned the first start of his career. The junior from Indiana led the Bulls with eight tackles and had a tackle for loss in the game.

Justin Brandon, one of 20 seniors honored before the game, had a career-best two sacks on the night. As a team, the Bulls had eight tackles for loss.

"I'm very proud and pleased with the way we played," head coach Lance Leipold said. "I think the thing that made the difference was getting off to the good start, getting the field position, scoring early and then being able to play a lot of guys in the second half."

Buffalo will travel to Ohio next Wednesday for a chance to win the MAC East Division Championship.

ATHENS, OH – In a series won by the home team every year since 2010, Ohio held serve, defeating the University at Buffalo football team, 52-17, at Peden Stadium on Wednesday night. It was the Bulls first conference and road loss of the season. At 9-2 overall and 6-1 in the Mid-American Conference, Buffalo will play at Bowling Green next week with a chance to clinch to MAC East Division title.

It was a promising start for Buffalo as the Bulls drove 75 yards on seven plays and scored on a four-yard touchdown run by Tyree Jackson on their first possession of the game. Jackson connected with Anthony Johnson on a 48-yard pass play on third down to help set up the score.

However, the rest of the night belonged to the Bobcats. Ohio capitalized on three first-half Buffalo turnovers and scored on seven straight possessions to build their lead. Trailing 24-7 midway through the second quarter, Jackson ripped off a 55-yard to the Ohio five-yard line before having the ball jarred loose and recovered by the Bobcats. That's the kind of night it was for the Bulls.

Johnson had six catches for 95 yards in the game to lead the offense. Jackson had a season-high 70 yards on three carries to lead Buffalo's rushing attack. Kevin Marks rushed for 54 yards on nine carries and scored on a 14-yard touchdown run for his ninth score of the year.

Ohio, the preseason favorite to with the Mid-American Conference, rushed for 437 yards in the game and dominated the line of scrimmage.

"Ohio executed really well," head coach Lance Leipold. "That's a good football team. We've been saying it all along. But we did not play well in any area. We had a few flashes. We've got to own that and turn the page quickly and get this group ready to play at Bowling Green."

Brandon Williams had a career-high 11 tackles for the Bulls. Khalil Hodge also had 11 stops and added his first interception of the season.

Buffalo will next play at Bowling Green next Friday at noon. If the Bulls defeat the Falcons they will win the MAC East crown and earn a trip to Detroit to play in the MAC Championship.

BOWLING GREEN, OH – For the second time in school history, the University at Buffalo football team will play for the Mid-American Conference Championship after defeating Bowling Green, 44-14, at Doyt Perry Stadium on Friday afternoon. The Bulls won the MAC East title and will advance to Detroit to face Northern Illinois next Friday.

Buffalo (10-2, 7-1 MAC) dominated the line of scrimmage and, behind the blocking of their offense line, rushed for 332 yards and four touchdowns in the game. Jaret Patterson set the tone early with 88 yards and two touchdowns on only 11 carries. He opened the scoring with a 40-yard touchdown run. The freshman running back added an 11-yard TD in the second quarter.

Kevin Marks also scored on touchdown runs of one and three yards and finished with 63 yards in the game. Buffalo's leading rusher was Emmanuel Reed who had a game-high 109 yards on only 15 carries.

With the game tied, 7-7, midway through the first quarter, Tyree Jackson connected with George Rushing on a 37-yard touchdown pass, on fourth down, to give the Bulls a 13-7 lead.

Bowling Green crossed midfield on its next possession, before the UB defense made a play that change the course of the entire game. Khalil Hodge jarred the ball loose from Falcon receiver Scott Miller and Brandon Williams scooped up the ball and raced 69 yards for a touchdown to extend the Buffalo lead to 20-7 early in the second quarter.

Patterson and Marks each had touchdown runs later in the second quarter to give the Bulls a 34-7 lead at the half.

Nursing a big lead, Buffalo worked the clock in the second half. Marks added his second rushing touchdown of the game late in the third quarter and Alex McNulty made his first career field goal, a 21-yarder, in the fourth quarter to make the score 41-7.

The Bulls held Bowling Green to 205 yards of total offense, including only 58 yards on the ground. Buffalo forced two turnovers in the game. Besides Williams' fumble return, Tatum Slack added his first career interception.

Khalil Hodge led the UB defense with seven tackles, to move into third place in school history with 406 career tackles. He became the fastest player in school history to reach 400 tackles, doing so in only three seasons.

"We have an awfully excited group in there and on a Thanksgiving weekend, I just told the team how thankful I was to be their head coach," head coach Lance Leipold said. "They've gone through a lot. They've worked really hard for this opportunity and to win 10 games and play for a championship is pretty special."

The 10 wins are a school record for a single season and the 7-1 finish in MAC play is the team's best since joining the conference in 1999.

Buffalo will next meet Northern Illinois in the Mid-American Conference Championship Game next Friday at Ford Field. The game will kick off at 7 pm and air on ESPN2. The Bulls will look to repeat history, 10 years after winning the 2008 MAC title.

HEAD COACH LANCE LEIPOLD

Lance Leipold is in his fourth season as head coach of the Buffalo football team.

Leipold had his most successful season in 2017 – his third with the Bulls. He guided Buffalo to a 6-6 record and bowl eligibility for just the third time as an FBS program. The six wins were the third most in a season since the Bulls made the move to the FBS ranks in 1999.

The Bulls featured an explosive offense that ranked second in the Mid-American Conference, averaging 432 yards per game and led the MAC with 291 passing yards per outing. UB's 5,183 yards of total offense were the most in school history for a single season. The Bulls produced 20 plays of 45 yards or more and those 20 plays came from 10 different players.

Buffalo posted key wins against Conference USA Champion Florida Atlantic as well as a nine-win Ohio team. The Bulls finished the season with three straight wins for the first time as an FBS program. In addition, UB's six losses were by a total of 29 points, including two one-point losses and a three-point, seven-overtime loss.

In 2016, Leipold led a very young squad, featuring 42 new players. The Bulls were the fourth most inexperienced team in the nation. Buffalo earned impressive wins over Army (a bowl team) and Akron. Buffalo had four players named to the All-MAC team.

In 2015, his first with the Bulls, Leipold led UB to a 5-7 mark. He became the first UB head coach to win five games in his first season since Bob Deming went 6-3 in 1969.

Included in the Bulls five wins was a victory at Florida Atlantic – Buffalo's first non-conference road win since the 2009 season. The Bulls won three road games in 2015 – the most in UB's FBS era (since 1999).

The Bulls had five players named to the All-MAC football team in 2015, led by tight end Matt Weiser who was also named an Academic All-American – becoming the first UB football player in the modern era to earn the distinction.

Leipold was named the 25th head coach in the history of the Buffalo football program on December 1, 2014.

Leipold came to UB from Wisconsin-Whitewater where he compiled an astounding 109-6 record and won six Division III National Championships over his eight seasons. A six-time National Coach of the Year, Leipold reached 100 career victories faster than any other coach in NCAA history – at any level.

Leipold has gathered multiple honors from as many as five football-related organizations. He earned his sixth American Football Coaches Association Division III Coach of the Year award in 2014. He has won the award more times than any active coach at any level. He passed the late Joe Paterno, who was a five-time recipient of the award.

In his first season as head coach at Whitewater, The Warhawks went 14-1 and won the national title. He led the Warhawks back to the national championship game in 2008, but they lost to Mount Union, 31-26. Wisconsin-Whitewater went 15-0, winning the national championship in 2009, 2010 and 2011 and won 46 straight games over that span. Following a 7-3 season in 2012, UWW went a perfect 15-0 and won the national championship in 2013 and followed with another perfect 15-0 season and a national title in 2014.

In Division III, where athletic scholarships aren't a part of the game, Leipold was able to recruit top-notch talent to the campus in southeastern Wisconsin. During his tenure, running back Justin Beaver earned the Gagliardi Trophy as the top player in Division III. Brent Allen earned the Division III Rimington Award as the top center. Jeff Schebler was the first recipient of the Fred Mitchell Award, given to the top placekicker in Division II or III. Tailback Levell Coppage earned D3football.com Offensive Player of the Year accolades, and Cole Klotz was selected D3football.com Defensive Player of the Year. Defensive back Jared Kiesow was named an NCAA Elite 88 Award winner. The Warhawks have piled up 56 All-America honors under Leipold's tutelage.

A native of Jefferson, WI, Leipold began his coaching career at Wisconsin-Whitewater in 1987 as a quarterbacks coach and then wide receivers coach. He moved to the University of Wisconsin from 1991-93 as a graduate assistant and helped the Badgers to a Big Ten title and a Rose Bowl appearance in 1993.

As an assistant coach at Division II Nebraska-Omaha from 1994-2000, Leipold helped turn the Mavericks from a 1-10 team in 1994 into three-time North Central Conference champions during his tenure. After being promoted to offensive coordinator in 2000, he moved on to the University of Nebraska, where he served for three seasons under current Ohio head coach Frank Solich. He was on the same staff as former UB head coach Turner Gill. The Cornhuskers competed in the national championship game in 2001 and earned bowl bids in 2002 and 2003.

He returned to Nebraska-Omaha to serve as associate head coach and offensive coordinator from 2004-06. The Mavericks finished 8-3 and won the conference championship each of his three seasons.

Leipold is a 1987 graduate of Wisconsin-Whitewater where he was a stand-out quarterback for the Warhawks. He ranks second in school history in career pass attempts (647), fourth in yards (4,277), sixth in completions (303) and tied for 10th with 27 touchdowns. He was inducted into the Whitewater Hall of Fame in 2003. He was inducted into the Wisconsin Football Coaches Association Hall of Fame in 2018.

Leipold and his wife, Kelly, have a daughter, Lindsey, and a son, Landon.

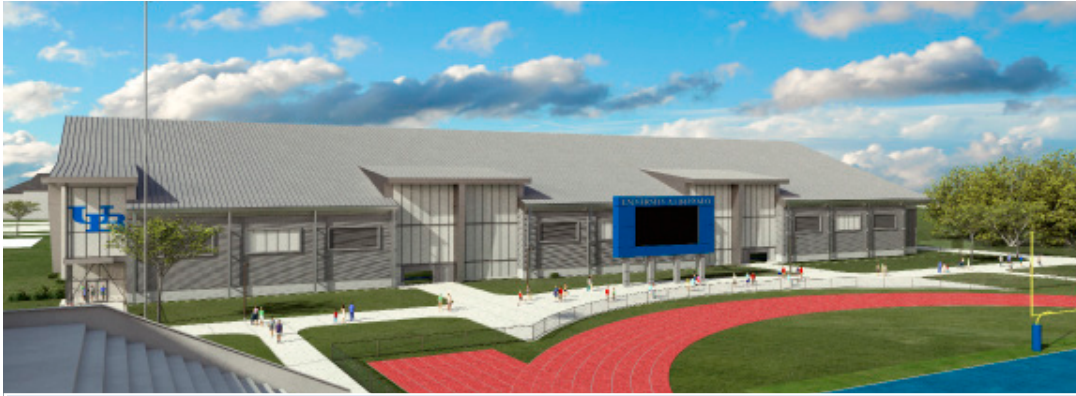

Murchie Family Fieldhouse Scheduled to Open in Spring 2019

The longtime dream of an on-campus fieldhouse at the University at Buffalo will soon be a reality. Thanks in large part to a major gift by former UB hockey player Tunney Murchie and his family, the Murchie Family Fieldhouse is scheduled to open in the spring of 2019. UB is utilizing Rochester-based LeChase Construction as the general contractor and New York-based architecture firm CHA for the project.

The 92,000-square-foot indoor practice facility will be situated just beyond the north end zone of UB Stadium on the university's North Campus. Construction is slated to begin in October with a completion date tentatively scheduled for the spring of 2019.

The multi-use facility will not only house a full-size football field, but will also feature 6,000 feet of rubber track for sprint practice as well as long/triple jump and pole vault pits. It will also have motorized suspended softball hitting tunnels.

The facility will also house university events, expanded student recreation programming and intramurals. With the new fieldhouse, UB is among 10 other Mid-American Conference schools that have such a facility in the 12-member conference.

"The University at Buffalo has a strong tradition of outstanding student-athletes who are successful both in the classroom and on the field," said UB President Satish K. Tripathi. "The intent of UB's

vision to create a 21st century living and learning campus is to ensure that all of our students—whether they are aspiring artists, architects, athletes, researchers, or physicians—have the same opportunities to be successful academically and in all of their extracurricular endeavors. This field house will be an asset that benefits not only our student-athletes, but our entire university community."

The \$18 million fieldhouse is funded through philanthropy and football revenue. No state funds are being used for the project.

University History

Here is how the years add up to something big.

Through a steady succession of big ideas, big ventures and big achievements, UB has advanced dramatically over the past century and a half. Our newest campus, in downtown Buffalo, has brought the medical school full circle, this time to anchor the city's first academic medical center.

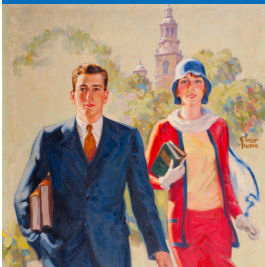
