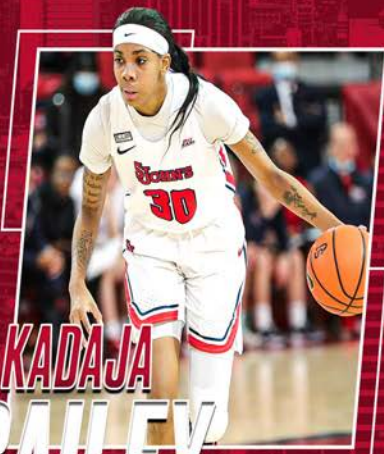

Lt. Frank J. Haggerty TWO-SPORT STAR



FRANK HAGGERTY

Mention that name in college and high school basketball and baseball circles and one will recall that he was the first graduate of both Chaminade High School and St. John's University to die in military service during World War II.

A shortstop as well as a basketball player, Haggerty was in the Army Air Force (now called the Air Force, since it is a separate branch of the military) as a pursuit pilot when his plane crashed over the Catawba River in North Carolina 1942.

At the time of Frank's death, Mike Lee, the late sports editor/columnist for the now defunct Long Island Press, wrote, "He was a great athlete...a distinguished student...a gentleman. He gave his best at all times. Frank had the American spirit...the will to win."

The Fathers Club of the Mineola school, to honor Haggerty, class of 1936, introduced a basketball tournament in his memory. Sixteen teams played at the Jamaica Arena in 1943 and 1944. So popular did it become that expansion was necessary. Preliminary rounds continued to be held at Jamaica arena and, in 1945, 16 teams moved into the old Madison Square Garden for the remainder of the tourney.

That marked the first schoolboy competition at the 49th Street and Eighth Avenue arena. Attendance reached a little over 8,000. The tourney was discontinued after 1948 but was brought back in 1983 by Jack Lenz, then the athletic director at Chaminade. It continues to be played there annually.

While at Chaminade (he graduated in 1936), Haggerty captained both the baseball and basketball squads. He was the school's first alumnus to die in the line of duty. At St. John's, he co-captained the basketball team with the now-deceased Bill McKeever. Ironically, it was McKeever who called some of his SJU classmates and friends to tell them of Frank's death.

Upon earning his degree from SJU, the shortstop signed with the Atlantic Crackers of the Southern Association. He was sent to Selma, Ala., a Class B team in the Southeastern League. After one season he joined the military and went on to give his life for his country.

The Metropolitan Basketball Writers Association, co-founder of the National Invitation Tournament, has been presenting All-Met teams since 1934. Following his passing, the MBWA decided to name its designation of the Met area's most outstanding men's collegiate player each season the Lt. Frank J. Haggerty Award.

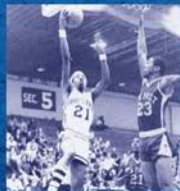

Three-Time Haggerty Award Winners

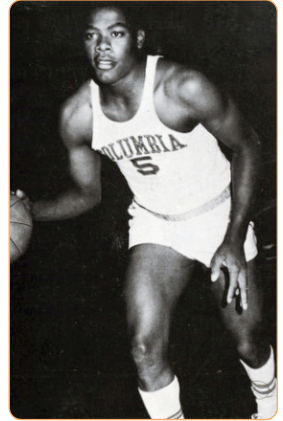
JIM McMILLIAN, COLUMBIA • 1968, 1969, 1970

The first three-time winner of the Haggerty Award, "Jimmy Mac" led Columbia to a three-year record of 63-14, earning All-Ivy League honors after each season.

As a sophomore, McMillian led the Lions to Holiday Festival title with wins over West Virginia, Louisville and St. John's on successive days, the Ivy League title and the second round of the NCAA tournament, as Columbia finished 23-5 that season.

McMillian, who was an All-City selection at Thomas Jefferson High School in Brooklyn, teamed with fellow forward Heyward Dotson to lead the Lions to one of the best three-year runs in school history. McMillian averaged 22.9 points per game over his three seasons and finished his career with 743 rebounds, figures that still rank second in school history. McMillian was drafted by the Los Angeles Lakers in the first round and played for them for three seasons before finishing his nine-year NBA career with the Portland Trail Blazers.

While with the Lakers, McMillian stepped in to replace Hall of Famer Elgin Baylor when he retired early in the 1971-72 season. In his first game as a starter McMillian had 22 points and 13 rebounds as the Lakers won the first game of their NBA-record 33-game winning streak on the way to the title.



CHRIS MULLIN, ST. JOHN'S • 1983, 1984, 1985

Along with Patrick Ewing of Georgetown, Mullin is considered the driving force behind the quick national success of the Big East Conference. The 6-foot-6 lefthanded sharpshooter from Brooklyn was the national player of the year in 1985, leading Redmen to the Final Four.

As a freshman, the only year he didn't win the Haggerty Award, Mullin was selected the area's rookie of the year. As a sophomore he swept the Big East awards for player of the year and tournament MVP as the Redmen won their first conference title. He averaged a career-high 22.9 points as a junior when he shared Big East player of the year honors with Ewing and the two did the same as seniors when both schools were ranked No. 1 during the season.

Mullin, who made being a gym rat fashionable, finished with 2,240 points and shot 55 percent from the field including many a long jumper in the days before there was a 3-point line.

He won two Olympic gold medals, in 1984 and as a member of the Dream Team and in 1992 again with Ewing as a teammate. A first-round draft pick of the Golden State Warriors, Mullin went on to a long and successful NBA career. From 2015-20, he served as head coach at his alma mater, St. John's.

CHARLES JENKINS, HOFSTRA • 2009, 2010, 2011

The third three-time winner of the Haggerty Award is Hofstra's sensational guard Charles Jenkins. Over his four seasons, Jenkins amassed 2,513 points, becoming only the 63rd player in NCAA history to reach the 2,500-point plateau. He shattered the old Hofstra scoring record, held by former teammate Antoine Agudio (2,276 points), and also finished fifth in school history with 489 assists, 213 steals and 177 three-pointers. His 2,513 points also ranks second in Colonial Athletic Association history, behind only David Robinson of Navy (2,669).

Jenkins capped off his career with Hofstra by averaging a career-best 22.6 points per game, ranked sixth nationally, to help the Pride to a 21-12 final record and a second-place finish in the CAA at 14-4. In addition to the Haggerty Award, Jenkins also earned national recognition that season by earning third-team All-America honors from four major media outlets, and also earned the Chip Hilton Award from the National Association of Basketball Coaches (NABC), which is given to a senior who has demonstrated personal character on and off the court.

Jenkins was drafted by the Golden State Warriors with the 44th pick of the 2011 draft. He also played in the NBA for the Philadelphia 76ers and is currently playing for the Red Star Belgrade of the Serbian League.

Two-Time Haggerty Award Winners



DICK MCGUIRE, ST. JOHN'S • 1944, 1949

The first two-time winner of the Haggerty Award, McGuire bookended his around a stint in the Navy during World War II. Considered one of the best passing guards ever produced by the New York City playgrounds, McGuire still averaged 12.8 points his senior season. He won the award as a freshman despite leaving for the service before the Redmen won NIT. His last two seasons he played with his brother Al, who went on to win a national championship as coach at Marquette in 1975. He began his long NBA career with the New York Knicks, whom he later coached, and he was a player-coach with the Detroit Pistons. McGuire, who was a senior consultant for the Knicks, until he passed away in 2010, was inducted into the Naismith Memorial Hall of Fame in 1993, one year after his brother.



SID TANENBAUM, NYU • 1946, 1947

As a junior, Tanenbaum led the Violets to an 18-2 record and the NCAA tournament where they lost to North Carolina in the first round. He was team captain the next season and although NYU finished 12-9, Tanenbaum was named to several All-America teams and received the Bar Kochba Award given to the country's outstanding Jewish athlete. When graduated - he was the school's all-time leading scorer with 992 points. His professional career included a stint with the New York Knicks.



ED CONLIN, FORDHAM • 1954, 1955

As a junior, Conlin averaged 22.4 points and 17.4 rebounds for the Rams and then improved his statistics as a senior to the remarkable stage, averaging 26.1 points and 21.4 rebounds. He grabbed 36 rebounds against Colgate as a sophomore when he led the nation in rebounding at 23.5 per game. Still Fordham's all-time leading scorer and rebounder, Conlin is the only person to have his number retired on Rose Hill. Conlin, who went on to a seven-year NBA career, is still considered one of the best rebounders to play in the New York Metropolitan area.



PHIL SELLERS, RUTGERS • 1975, 1976

A 6-foot-5 forward, Sellers is still Rutgers' all-time leading scorer (2,399) and rebounder (1,115). He averaged 22.7 ppg and 9.4 rebounds as a junior when he became the first Rutgers player to win the Haggerty Award. He followed that up with a senior season that saw him average 19.2 points and 10.1 rebounds as the Scarlet Knights went unbeaten until losing to Michigan in the Final Four. He was a unanimous first-team All-America as a senior. Sellers played briefly with the Detroit Pistons before returning to his alma mater as an assistant coach.



MALIK SEALY, ST. JOHN'S • 1991, 1992

The only player besides Chris Mullin to score 2,000 points at St. John's, Sealy averaged 22.1 and 22.6 points to cap his impressive career with consecutive Haggerty Awards and 2,401 career points. As a junior, Sealy led the Redmen to the regional finals of the NCAA tournament and was a first-team All-Big East selection for the first of two times. A silky smooth 6-foot-7 forward, Sealy scored in double figures in a school-record 102 consecutive games. His NBA career was cut tragically short when he was killed by a drunk driver in 2000.



LUIS FLORES, MANHATTAN • 2003, 2004

A scoring phenom in high school, Flores transferred to Manhattan from Rutgers after his freshman season. As a junior, he was seventh nationally with a 24.6 scoring average as the Jaspers finished 23-7. Flores was fifth in the country in scoring as a senior, averaging 24.0 points as Manhattan went 25-6 and he shared the Haggerty Award with Andre Barrett of Seton Hall. A two-time MAAC player of the year, Flores finished as Manhattan's all-time leading scorer with 2,046 points. Including 39 points in 14 games at Rutgers, he totaled 2,085 for his collegiate career.



MYLES POWELL, SETON HALL • 2019, 2020

Powell, one of the most decorated Seton Hall Pirates in school history, was the schools' first first-team All-American since 1953, first BIG EAST Player of the Year since 1993 and the 2020 Jerry West National Shooting Guard of the Year award as a senior and led the Pirates to the 2020 Big East championship. He finished his career with 2,252 points (third all-time in school history), and is the program's all-time leader in three-pointers with 348. Additionally, he is the only Pirate to capture back-to-back Haggerty Met Player of the Year honors.

**THE MBWA'S ONLY FOUR-TIME
MEN'S OR WOMEN'S PLAYER OF THE YEAR
CAPPIE PONDEXTER, RUTGERS
2003, 2004, 2005, 2006**

Cappie Pondexter of Rutgers enjoyed a remarkable collegiate career as one of the best to grace the hardwood of the RAC, winning her fourth consecutive MBWA Division I Women's Player of the Year honor. Pondexter's list of honors collected as a Scarlet Knight are long and distinguished, including ranking second in all-time scoring (2,211, 14th on the All-Met list). During her career, the Chicago native averaged 18.3 points, 4.4 rebounds and 1.8 steals in 121 games played. The highest WNBA draft pick in school history, taken second by the Phoenix Mercury in 2006, Pondexter's career continued to shine following her days at Rutgers. Before retiring in 2018, she became a two-time WNBA champion (Phoenix Mercury 2007, 2009), a seven-time All-Star and was named one of the 20 greatest players in the 20-year history of the league. Pondexter became the seventh player in WNBA history to score more than 6,000 career points.

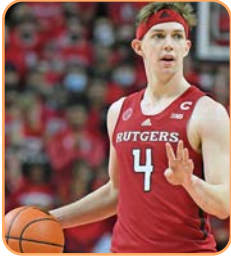

MARK A. CORINO

CALDWELL ATHLETIC DIR. / HEAD COACH



Mark A. Corino of Caldwell University is currently completing his 34th season in the dual roles of head men's basketball coach and Assistant Vice President/Director of Athletics at CU in Caldwell, NJ.

Corino is one of only three college head coaches in New Jersey to surpass 500 career victories and this past season became the state's all-time leader, finishing 2021-22 with 606 wins. He is followed on the state roster by Stockton's Gerry Matthews with 603 and Princeton's Pete Carril with 514. Corino's resume with the Cougars includes five trips to the NAIA national tournament, two appearances in the NCAA Division II playoffs, seven Central Atlantic Collegiate Conference regular season championships, six CACC tournament titles and an NAIA District 31 crown.

A former member of the NCAA Basketball Rules Committee, among honors that Corino has received: four CACC coach of the year awards; MBWA coach of the year in 1998; induction in 2016 into the Caldwell Athletics Hall of Fame. In 2018, Caldwell

named the playing floor at its George R. Newman Center the Mark A. Corino Court.

Corino is recognized as emphasizing academics among his student-athletes. His men's basketball teams have been awarded the NABC Team Academic Excellence Award seven out of the eight years the honors program has existed. During his tenure as Director of Athletics, the Cougars sports programs have grown from three to 17, the school completed its transition from the NAIA to NCAA Division II in 2002, and there has been an expansive upgrade in many playing, practice, locker and other athletic facilities, including the opening of the Newman Center in 2002.

A native of Belleville, NJ, Corino earned his Bachelor's degree at Kean University and a Master's at Caldwell. He resides in Cedar Grove, NJ, with his wife, Susan. They have a daughter, Michele, son-in-law Michael, and grandsons Vincent and Valentino.

RUSSELL ROGERS

STEVENS ATHLETIC DIRECTOR



Rogers' tenure has overseen an era of growth and development at Division III Stevens, including an increase in varsity sports from 17 to 25 and a transition for the Ducks from the Empire 8 to the Middle Atlantic Conference. Success at Stevens includes the school's first NCAA team national championship by men's volleyball in 2015. Additionally, the school is just one of three institutions among 320 at the NCAA Divisions I, II and III levels (along with Williams and Princeton) to be named the ECAC Institution of the Year for excellence in academics and athletics twice (2008, 2013).

Over the years the Ducks men's and women's basketball teams have enjoyed varying successes. This past season, the 17-9 Stevens men won their second MAC Freedom title and advanced to the second round of the NCAA tournament. Meanwhile, the 19-7 women's team was runner-up in the conference championship game, followed by a berth in the NCAA Division III tournament where the Ducks

also advanced to the second round.

Among numerous honors, Rogers was lauded as the NACDA Division III Southeast Athletic Director of the Year in 2009 and the ECAC Division III Male Administrator of the Year in 2015. He currently is president of the Collegiate Athletic Administrators of New Jersey. On campus, he has overseen many improvements for all sports, including the construction of the DeBaun Athletic Complex, the artificial turf home for Stevens soccer, lacrosse, field hockey and baseball.

Rogers, who earned a Bachelor's degree at Wake Forest and a Master's from North Carolina-Chapel Hill, lives with his wife, Mary Jane, in Branchburg, NJ. Son Bryan graduated from Stevens in 2018 and daughter Camryn is set to graduate in 2023. Both offspring have earned letters playing lacrosse for the Ducks.

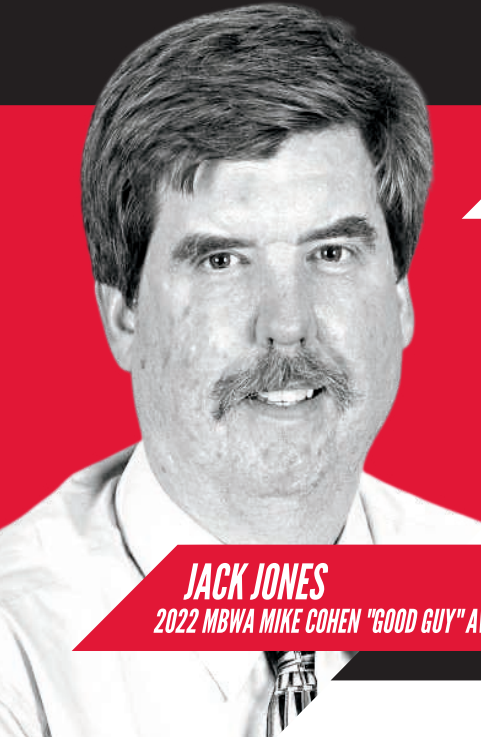

MIKE COHEN MBWA "Good Guy" award namesake

Mike Cohen was a revered figure in New York area sports in the 1970s and 80s. He served as Manhattan College's sports information director, and later as a sports consultant



to Fordham University. Cohen was the PR director at Yonkers Raceway and then head of publicity at NBC Sports. Later, he operated his own public relations firm prior to his untimely passing in 1988 at the age of 44.

Cohen knew everyone, and everyone, famous or not, knew Mike. He was a hard worker, but he also believed that sports should be fun, and that the people involved in sports should get along. Even in the toughest of times.

Anyone involved in college basketball is eligible for this award... from coaches to players to administrators, sports information directors, even the media. The only criteria is that they --- male or female --- be a "Good Guy."

Fairfield University's veteran communications director Jack Jones will be honored with the Mike Cohen "Good Guy" Award from the Met Basketball Writers Association.

The Haggerty dinner is the longest running, media-managed college basketball awards program in the United States.

The Associate Director of Athletics for Athletic Media Relations, Jones is in his 25th year with the athletic communications office at the university in Fairfield, CT. He served as Director of Sports Information before being promoted.

At Fairfield he has helped coordinate media relations operations for 16 NCAA Championship events covering men's ice hockey, women's basketball and men's lacrosse. He also assisted with the media relations efforts for the 2007 and 2011 MAAC Basketball Championships in Bridgeport, CT.

Before coming to Fairfield, Jones spent nearly nine years as the Sports Information Director at the University of New Haven. He also spent a year as a graduate assistant at Glassboro State in New Jersey before working two years as an assistant at Princeton University.

Jones worked with the media relations teams at the 1994 World Cup in East Rutherford, NJ, and the 1995 Special Olympics World Games volleyball competition. He also was a member of the softball information team for the 1996 Summer Olympic Games in Atlanta.

Outside of college athletics, Jones currently serves as the Director of Challenger Baseball for Middletown (CT) Youth Baseball and Softball, which is Little League's adaptive program for children with intellectual and physical challenges.

Jones earned a dual degree in Journalism and Public Relations from Purdue University in 1985. He received a Master's degree in Computers in Education in 2001 and a Master's degree in Special Education in 2018 from Fairfield University. A native of Hamilton Square, NJ, Jones resides in Middletown, CT, with his wife, Donna, and their sons Benjamin and Jacob.

Jim O'Connell Sports Communications Scholarship Grant

In 2019, the Metropolitan Basketball Writers Association inaugurated an annual college grant to be awarded to a Met area student in sports journalism, communications or management which was named in memory of Jim O'Connell, the longtime Associated Press national college basketball editor who passed away in July 2018, at the age of 64.

Oc, as he was known, was a long-standing member of the MBWA Executive Committee as well as the Naismith Hall of Fame. For many years he served as co-chair and a presenter at the association's annual NIT-MBWA Haggerty Awards Dinner.

JIM O'CONNELL

'Oc' Scholarship grant namesake

Few held court like Jim O'Connell.

Whether you were Coach K, a TV analyst, a fellow sports writer or a fan, he had the same effect on everyone: In just a few minutes, he had you hooked, drawn into his colorful basketball world. And always told a tremendous story, often entertaining and educating AP co-workers in between bites of his nightly, well-done hamburgers and chocolate egg creams. He also was a fixture at college basketball games. TV analysts, other writers, fans, coaches and referees would gravitate toward a man with a long memory, Irish wit and perfect timing.

"You gotta hear the one about ..." he would start, and then everyone would stop and listen. O'Connell — he signed his name Oc, pronounced it "Ock" — was a former president of the United States Basketball Writers Association and entered that organization's Hall of Fame in 2002. The same year, he accepted the Naismith Memorial Hall of Fame's Curt Gowdy Award for his coverage of the sport. O'Connell served as the AP's national college basketball writer since 1987 and was a fixture at major events from the Final Four to the Big East Tournament to the Maui Invitational.

O'Connell is survived by his wife, Anne; sons James and Andrew; and sisters Winnie and Mary, below surrounding Robert Callaghan, the first-ever recipient of the scholarship. (A.P., July 2, 2018)

A native of Springfield, NJ, Wolz --- who carries an academic cumulative GPA of 3.98 and will graduate with a Bachelor's degree later in 2022 --- has built an impressive resume in his student tenure at Fordham, whose main campus is based in the Bronx, NY. His variety of activities include: Sports manager at WFUV 90.7 FM; student associate with the Rams' sports information department; production coordinator for Sound Mind Live; sports editor of The Fordham Ram. His highly developed skills include videography, photography; graphic design; audio/video production; website design; broadcasting and interviewing.

"Alexander Wolz is arguably the greatest member of the sports training program that I have ever had," said Bobby Ciafardini, sports director of Fordham's WFUV radio station. "He helped us transition our program by turning all of our radio shows into TV streamed programming."

Most notable in that transition, according to Ciafardini, is "One on One," New York's longest-running sports call-in show that airs weekly on Saturdays. "That program is the birthplace of such sportscasters from Mike Breen and Michael Kay to Spero Dedes and Ryan Ruocco," said Ciafardini.

Wolz, who already has won a mantelshelf of awards, is a credentialed beat reporter for the New York Yankees and Brooklyn Nets; executes live ESPN+ telecasts of Fordham athletics, including replay, graphics and technical direction; and created a new, in-depth series of campus newspaper stories entitled "Fordham Features." He has become a mentor to numerous younger students.

"After seeing the impacts of the pandemic, I am grateful to have experienced everything that I have," said Wolz. "Each game feels more special, each road trip like it may be the last and each second in the studio as a moment with lifelong friends that I will never forget... I cannot wait to embark on this journey into the future."

2022 Div. I Women's PLAYER OF THE YEAR

Lauren Park-Lane of Seton Hall University has been named All-Met Division I women's player of the year for 2021-22 by the Met Basketball Writers Association.

A 5-6 junior point-guard from Wilmington, DE, Park-Lane — who also was named to both the MBWA All-Met and the All-Big East Conference First Teams — represents the third player from Seton Hall to be selected All-Met Player of the Year since the Met Writers inaugurated women's awards in 1996. Pirates previously so honored: Dana Wynne, 1997; Ka-Deidre Simmons, 2015.

A workhorse on the court (38.6 minutes per game, No. 1 in the nation), Park-Lane was among the leaders in numerous team, conference and NCAA statistical categories in helping to lead the Pirates (24-13, 12-8) all the way to the championship game of the postseason WNIT.

She averaged 18.3 points per game (third in the BEC, No. 50 in the nation), 1.6 steals (sixth in the BEC), 41.2% (202-of-490) shooting from the field, 39.2% (73-186) from 3-point range (fourth in the BEC) and 84.7% (155-of-183) at the free throw line (second in the BEC, 44th in the nation).

Park-Lane's 260 assists for the season led both the conference and all of Division I; her 7.0 assists per game were tops in the Big East and No. 4 in the nation. She registered 18 assists in a game against Butler, equaling the conference mark while setting a new program standard. Her 260 SHU record assists exceeds second place by 66. Her 678 points this past season are also a Pirates best.

Named to the WNIT All Tournament team, Park-Lane and her teammates defeated FDU, VCU, Drexel, Columbia and Middle Tennessee before losing the championship final on the road at South Dakota State.

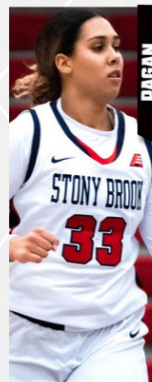

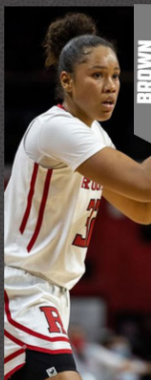

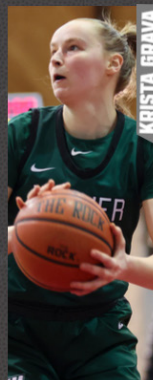

MAGGIE DIXON MET COACH OF THE YEAR

Joe Frager, Fairfield

In his 15th year at Fairfield following nine seasons at Southern Connecticut State, Joe Frager --- who also was named the Metro Atlantic Athletic Conference coach of the year --- earned his first Maggie Dixon Met Coach of the Year designation from the MBWA. He guided the Stags (25-7, 19-1) to the school's fourth MAAC tournament title and the first since 1998, propelling the team into their first NCAA Tournament appearance since 2001.

Fairfield's 19-1 mark was tied for the most conference wins in the nation; the team captured the MAAC regular season crown by a wide margin of five games, its first regular season flag in 22 years. The Stags registered a school-record 15-game winning streak in 2021-22 and concluded with a program-tying single-season mark with 25 victories.

Frager's won-lost record in his 15 seasons at Fairfield improved to 285-197 (59.1% W-L) and his career coaching record for 24 seasons is now 474-280 (62.9%).

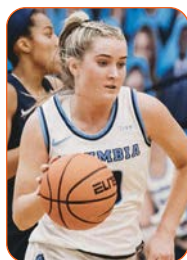
ROOKIE OF THE YEAR

A 5-10 freshman guard from North Curl Curl, Australia, Catriona "Kitty" Henderson was born in Oxfordshire, England, U.K., and grew up Down Under.

She started 23 games this past season for the Lions (25-7, 12-2), who advanced to the quarterfinal round of the WNIT. In a loss to Seton Hall in Columbia's final game, Henderson registered 18 points and seven assists.

For the season she was 21st in the Ivy League in scoring (8.3 ppg), T19th in rebounding (4.6 rpg) and sixth in total assists (78). Henderson shot 41.4% (92-of-222) from the field.

2022 Div. I Men's PLAYER OF THE YEAR

Ron Harper Jr. of Rutgers University has been named winner of the 2021-22 Lt. Frank J. Haggerty Award, presented annually since 1936 to the area's Division I men's college Player of the Year by the Met Basketball Writers Association.

Harper represents the third player and fourth time a Scarlet Knight has been named recipient of the Haggerty Award. The last time a Rutgers player was so honored was Quincy Douby in 2006. Previously, Phil Sellers won back-to-back in 1975-76.

A 6-5 senior guard/forward from Franklin Lakes, NJ, Harper also was named to the All-Met and All-ECAC First Teams, to the All-Big Ten Conference and NABC All-District Second Teams, and an Associated Press All-America Honorable Mention.

He started all 32 games this past season for Rutgers (18-14, 12-8), scoring in double digits in 27 of those contests. He averaged a team-leading 15.8 points per game, along with 5.9 rebounds, 1.9 assists and 1.0 steals, and shot 44.4% (171-of-387) from the field, 39.8% (68-of-171) from 3-point range and 79.5% (97-of-122) at the free throw line.

A product of Don Bosco Prep in New Jersey, his 22 points scored in a season-ending NCAA First Four 89-87 double overtime loss to Notre Dame netted Harper a career total of 1,525 points at Rutgers, tying him for 12th on the all-time school scoring list with Roy Hinson. Having played in 121 games with 109 starts, Harper also finished with 622 career rebounds.

Other highlights from the past season: career-highs of 31 points and six 3 pointers made against Maryland; 29 points in the victory over Nebraska with a perfect 10-of-10 at the free-throw line; led the way with 30 points and made a memorable buzzer-beating 3-pointer to defeat No. 1-ranked Purdue; hit the game-winning shot at Indiana with 2.1 seconds remaining.

Harper is the first Scarlet Knight to be named an AP All-American since Douby and the highest All-Conference selection for an RU player since 2006.

PETER A. CARLESIMO MET COACH OF THE YEAR

Shaheen Holloway, Saint Peter's

In just his fourth year at SPU, Holloway guided the Peacocks (22-12, 14-6) all the way to the Sweet Sixteen and then Elite Eight stage of the NCAA Tournament, the first time the Peacocks program has reached either realm and the furthest in the NCAAs for any Metro Atlantic Athletic Team.

Saint Peter's, which finished second during the MAAC regular season, gained entry to the NCAAs by winning the conference tournament championship. It was the first NCAA appearance for the Peacocks since 2010-11, and the team had an 11-game winning streak snapped by eventual national runnerup

North Carolina in their Elite Eight matchup. To reach the NCAA quarterfinals, SPU defeated Kentucky, Murray State and Purdue.

Under Holloway's tutelage, senior KC Ndefo was named MAAC Defensive Player of the Year and MAAC Tournament MVP. The coach kept himself and his team on an even keel while making tournament runs. A Seton Hall graduate and former assistant at both SHU and Iona, Holloway was hired as the head men's coach by Seton Hall after the NCAA Tournament. His four-year record in Jersey City, NJ: 64-57, including the last three years with winning seasons.



ROOKIE OF THE YEAR • Jao Ituka, Marist

A 6-1 freshman guard from Gaithersburg, MD, Ituka --- who also was named the Metro Atlantic Athletic Conference and the ECAC Division I rookie of the year --- started 16 games for the Red Foxes (14-16, 9-11) and ranked in the top 10 in the conference in both scoring and shooting. His 15.3 ppg were tops on his team and third in the MAAC; his 52.6% (151-287) accuracy from the field was eighth. He also shot 41.0% (16-of-39) from 3-point range and 76.8% (109-142) at the free throw line.

Ituka's 34 points in a victory at Boston Univ. were the most by a Red Fox in a game in five seasons. Overall he had eight games where he scored 20-or-more points.

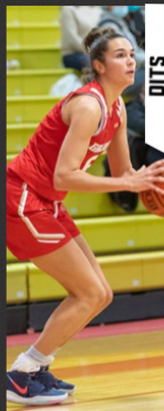

Women's Division II Awards • 2022

PLAYER OF THE YEAR • *Lauren Schetter, Pace*

A 5-10 grad student from Beacon, NY, forward Lauren Schetter was named All-Met Division II women's player of the year by the MBWA. Previously, she was named to the All-Met Second Team in both 2019 and 2020.

Schetter led the Setters (24-8, 14-5) to first place in the NE10 Conference's regular season, an-large berth in the NCAA Tournament and three national playoff victories enroute to a spot in the Elite Eight. She scored 74 points overall with 26 rebounds in Pace's four NCAA games, including posting 27 points and 8 rebounds in the Setters East Regional championship/Sweet Sixteen victory over Daemen.

For the season, Schetter started all 31 of her team's contests, averaging 19.5 points, 7.8 rebounds, 1.7 assists, 1.4 steals and 1.0 blocks per game. She shot 48.5% (224-of-462) from the field and 75.0% (141-of-188) at the free throw line. She ranked in the top six in the NE10 for ppg, rpg, FG pct and blocks per game.

Among many accolades, Schetter was named to the NE10 All-Conference First Team, D2CAA All-Region First Team, WBCA All-America Honorable Mention and Most Outstanding Player of the NCAA Division II East Regional. A Human Resource Management major with a 3.73 GPA, she was honored as NE10 Academic All-Conference.



COACH OF THE YEAR • *Carrie Seymour, Pace*

In 2022, Carrie Seymour of Pace ascended a pedestal all her own when she was selected the MBWA All-Met Division II Women's Coach of the Year for a record seventh time, more than any other such coaching laurel for men or women counterparts in Divisions I, II or III. Previously, she was honored in the inaugural MBWA women's awards season in 1996, along with 2000, 2001, 2006, 2007 and 2010.

This past season Seymour --- in her 30th year at the school that calls Pleasantville, NY, its home for athletics --- guided the Setters (24-8, 14-5) to first place in the NE10 Conference's regular season, an-large berth in the NCAA Tournament and three national playoff victories enroute to a spot in the Elite Eight. Pace finished ranked No. 15 in the nation in Division II in the final WBCA poll. Seymour notched career win No. 500 on Jan. 22 and is the 17th active coach in Division II with 500+ wins; now at 510.

The Setters made their third appearance in the national quarterfinals (1985, 2001) and the second under Seymour. Pace captured the program's first NCAA East Regional Championship since 2001, made its first NCAA Tournament appearance since 2012 and annexed the program's first-ever NE10 regular-season championship. Pace's 24 total wins are the most since 2010-11. Pace grabbed the NCAA East title by winning three tournament games on the SNHU court, defeating Daemen in the title contest. The Setters lost the NCAA Elite Eight game to North Georgia; a game played in Birmingham, AL.

CO-PLAYER OF THE YEAR • Justin Davis, Felician

Started 27 games for the Golden Falcons (19-10, 11-6). Selected All-Central Atlantic Collegiate Conference First Team, CACC Tournament MVP, D2CCA All-Region Second Team.

Finished second in the CACC in scoring (20.5 ppg, 27th in NCAA Div. II), sixth in rebounding (8.3 rpg), 10th in FG pct (50.5%, 224 of 444). Also averaged 1.3 assists, 1.0 steals; shot 34.7% (50-of-144) from 3-point range, 79.4% (77-of-97) at the free throw line. 575 points were second-most for a season in program history. Set school single-game record with 46 points vs. Caldwell. Felician won the CACC championship and had the second-most wins in program annals.



CO-PLAYER OF THE YEAR • Ronnie Silva, Adelphi

Started all 27 games for the Panthers (17-10, 11-7). Named NE10 All-Conference First Team, CoSIDA Academic All-District.

Led Adelphi and was second in the conference in scoring (20.4 ppg, 30th nationally in Div. II); topped the NE10 in total points (552); finished second in the nation in 3-point field goals per game (3.85). Had five or more 3-pointers in 10 games.

Also averaged 3.2 assists, 1.2 steals. Shot 48.3% (186-of-440) from the floor, 38.8% (104-of-268) beyond the arc. Was perfect from the free throw line in 15 games and only missed nine foul shots all season (89.4%, 76-of-85).



COACH OF THE YEAR • Tobin Anderson, St. Thomas Aquinas

In his ninth year at the STAC helm in Sparkill, NY, Anderson earned his second straight and fifth overall coach of the year selection (2015-16-17, 2021-22). He guided the Spartans (28-5, 17-1) to their fifth overall and second consecutive East Coast Conference regular season title, and their sixth overall and third straight ECC postseason tournament championship. St.Thomas Aquinas stormed into its seventh NCAA Division II tournament appearance in a row.

Also named the ECC coach of the year, Anderson pushed his won-lost career record at STAC to 209-61 (.746 pct) and his postseason mark to 25-9.

The Spartans won two games in the NCAA East regional, defeating Franklin Pierce in the first round and New Haven in a regional semifinal before losing the NCAA East regional championship game to the No. 1 seeded and tournament host Bentley.

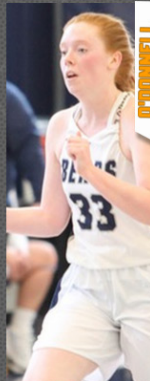

Women's Division III Awards • 2022



PLAYER OF THE YEAR • Chanel Jemmott, Brooklyn

Completing an all-time career for the books, Brooklyn College graduate student Chanel Jemmott was named CUNYAC Player of the Year for the second straight season. She was named the CUNYAC Championship MVP for the third time during her career while helping BC to three conference titles in four years. Jemmott was also named a WBCA NCAA Division III Honorable Mention All-American for the third straight season.

During the regular season, Jemmott became the program's all-time leading scorer, finishing her career with 1,688 points. She also surpassed 1,000 rebounds for her career (1,144) becoming just the fourth player in CUNYAC history to score more than 1,500 points and grab 1,000 rebounds. Helping Brooklyn to the school's first-ever win in the NCAA Tournament, Jemmott averaged 26 points and 15 rebounds in the two games including a 30-point, 22-rebound performance in the Bulldogs' first round win over Emmanuel. In her final campaign, Jemmott averaged 19.1 points, 11.8 rebounds, 2.5 assists, 2.4 steals, and 1.0 blocks per game.



COACH OF THE YEAR • Meg Barber, NYU

In her fourth season at the helm, NYU Alum Meg Barber led a young Violets' team to one of the best seasons in program history. NYU won its first outright University Athletic Association (UAA) title since 1997 and advanced to the Elite Eight of the NCAA Tournament for the first time since 2007 and sixth overall. Barber previously won this award in 2020.

The team's high-intensity defense and fast-paced offense produced a single-season program record in field goal percentage (44.9) and the second-highest scoring average ever (77.6). The Violets finished 25-2 overall and 13-1 in UAA play. They opened the year with 14 straight victories and followed with an 11-game winning streak after their lone regular-season loss. Barber, who also won MBWA Coach of the Year in 2019-20, was also honored with the Women's Basketball Coaches Association Division III Coach of the Year earlier this month.

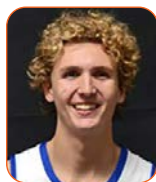

PLAYER OF THE YEAR • *Ryan Turell, Yeshiva*

A 6-7 senior guard from Los Angeles, CA, Ryan Turell completed a career for the ages, helping to transform Yeshiva University from a small school for Jewish students into a National Division III powerhouse over the last three seasons, becoming the first-ever three-time winner of this award..

This year, he set the school's all-time single-season scoring record with 786 points, while shooting .587 from the field and .468 from long distance. Turell led all three NCAA Divisions with 27.1 points per game, en route to NABC National Player of the Year honors. Turell has also picked up NABC First Team All-America, D3Hoops All-America, NABC District 3 Player of the Year, Skyline Player of the Year, this season alone. He also added 5.5 rebounds and 2.7 assists per game for the Skyline Conference Champions, earning his second straight appearance in the NCAA Championships. Turell has been such a prolific scorer, he scored at least 20 points in 25 out of 29 games played this year and netted at least 30 points nine times during the season, including a program all-time single-game best 51 points during YU's victory over Manhattanville College, back on November 28. More recently, he declared for the NBA Draft and was the only Division III player to be invited to the prestigious Portsmouth Invitational Tournament for the best 64 prospects in the Nation.



COACH OF THE YEAR • *Elliot Steinmetz, Yeshiva*

Elliot Steinmetz's team changed the basketball landscape over the past few seasons, winning coach of the year each time. This year, the Maccabees were ranked No. 1 in the country while riding a 50-game winning streak. Yeshiva won the Skyline Conference Championship following a 14-2 league mark. The Maccabees also defeated nationally ranked No. 5 University of Saint Joseph Connecticut, back on February 17. Making the school's second straight NCAA Tournament, the Macs fell in the first round of this year's event, ending their season with a 25-4 mark. YU garnered national and global attention from media outlets. The YU yeam has inspired Jews from around the world with senior Academic All-American and All-Met first teamer Gabriel Leifer and three-time MBWA Player of the Year Ryan Turell, who also recently garnered NABC National Player of the Year honors.

He was instrumental in launching the preseason NIT, which has added so much vitality along with an exciting event to the world of college basketball.



For years, Peter Carlesimo attended these awards dinners, and often served as a keynote speaker. A native of Newark, NJ, he died in 2003 at the age of 87.

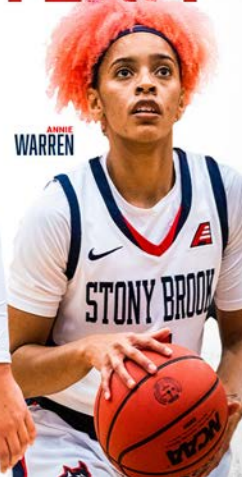

All-Met Women's Div. I Coach of the Year namesake

A native of North Hollywood, Calif., Dixon graduated in 1999 from the University of San Diego. She was an assistant coach at DePaul before coming to the U.S. Military Academy at West Point as head coach. She died on April 6, 2006, at age 28, following an arrhythmia heart episode.



In her one season (2005-06) at Army, Dixon guided the Black Knights to a 20-11 record, the team's first 20-win season since 1990-91; the first Patriot League Conference tournament championship; and the school's first berth in the NCAA Women's Tournament.

Dixon had a dynamic and emotional effect on West Point and the world of women's college basketball in such a short time.

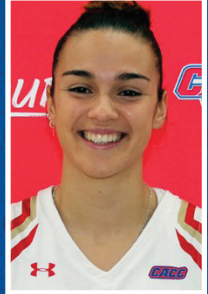

History of the Haggerty Award

The Lt. Frank J. Haggerty Award is given to the All-Metropolitan New York Division I Men's College Basketball Player of the Year, formerly presented by the National Invitation Tournament (NIT) and the Met Basketball Writers Association (MBWA). First presented in 1936, it is arguably the oldest and most prestigious award given to a metropolitan area player.

The award was named for Frank J. Haggerty, the first graduate of both Chaminade High School and St. John's University to die in military service during World War II. A shortstop as well as a basketball player, Haggerty was in the Army Air Force, as a pursuit pilot when his plane crashed over the Catawba River in North Carolina 1942.

As of 2022, the award has been earned by players from 15 Division I schools. St. John's University has the most at 27, almost twice the 15 awards received by players from number two Seton Hall University. The NIT/MBWA Collegiate Awards Dinner, which is now the Haggerty Awards Dinner was held at Mama Leone's Restaurant in Manhattan's Theater District for over twenty years until 1984. Then from 1985 through 2009, the annual event was held at the Giants Stadium Club in East Rutherford, NJ. Since 2010, the Haggertys moved to the Westchester Marriott in Tarrytown, NY.

Three players won the award three times: Jim McMillian from Columbia University (1968-1970), Chris Mullin of St. John's (1983-1985) and Charles Jenkins of Hofstra (2009-2011). McMillian would go on to win the 1972 NBA Championship with the Los Angeles Lakers; Mullin went on to win two Olympic gold medals (1984, 1992) with Team USA, was a five-time NBA All-Star and was elected to the Naismith Memorial Basketball Hall of Fame in 2011; and Jenkins has starred in the NBA and Europe.

Seven players have been awarded the honor twice, including Naismith Hall of Famer Dick McGuire, who won in 1944 and again after military service in 1949. The most recent winner Myles Powell became the latest two-time winner with back-to-back awards in 2019 and 2020. The Haggerty has also had co-winners four times and been given to a freshman twice in its 89-year history.

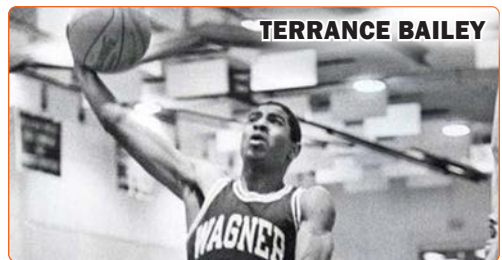
