## FIVE STANDOUT TEAMS REMAIN IN TITLE CHASE

### Minnesota Only One of Group Which Has Completed Its Schedule for Season

NEW YORK, Nov. 25.—(U.P.)—Five unbeaten and untied football teams dominate the nation today as the season goes into its last big week.

Each section has produced one outstanding team, and from them a good share of the post-season bowl contestants will come. Here they are by sections:

Midwest—Minnesota, boasting a strong claim to the national championship with one of the toughest schedules in the country.

South—Tennessee, playing a schedule that calls for frequent breathers, but still a powerful football team.

East—Boston College, a fast versatile attack operating behind what may be the best line in the nation. A great bet for any bowl game.

Far west—Stanford, the miracle team of 1940: A tricky squad that plays from the Chicago Bears' formations and has more mystery in its attack than Houdini. Almost a sure shot to carry the hopes of the west into the Rose Bowl.

Southwest—Texas A. & M., with a fine, rugged line working ahead of Kimbrough & Co. A powerful, balanced football team that could operate in any league successfully.

## Rus Petrick Named on Midwest All-Star Team

Russell Petrick, Knox co-captain, was placed on the Midwest conference all-star team which was selected by the nine league coaches, it was announced today. Knox rated two players, Co-captain Jack Rule and Izzy Radosevich on the second team, while Aldo Morotti received honorable mention.

All of the schools placed men on the first team. Cornell rated three positions, with the other eight schools getting one each. Lyman, who played in four posi-

tions during the season, was the only man unanimously chosen, so he has the additional honor of captaining the team.

That Beloit was considered a well balanced outfit is evidenced by the fact that the champions placed but one man, Captain Griffith, on the first eleven. Croft of Ripon, Raiter of Carleton and Tornquist are repeaters from the 1939 while Petrick and Lyman moved up from last year's second team. Wilson was the only sophomore to make the first team and Webb of Grinnell the only sophomore to be chosen for the second.
