# Hoyt Named on All-Midwest

## Bahorich on Second Squad In Balloting of Coaches

Clifford "Tippy" Hoyt, the slinging Siwasher who led the Midwest conference in passing this season, was named to the first team in the All-Conference selections announced today.

Other Knox players to receive recognition were George Bahorich, guard, who placed on the second team, and End Don Albright, Tackles Al Carstens and Wilfred Wollman and Center Jack Underwood, each receiving honorable mention.

The selections were made by the nine conference coaches in a poll conducted by the conference news service.

Hoyt earned the respect of the nine conference teams through his work as the Knox quarterback and his accurate passing. Official Knox statistics show that

Hoyt's passing accounted for 913 of the 1,933 yards gained by the Siwashers during the 1949 season. Eight of Hoyt's passes went for touchdowns. Although sporting only a 41 per cent in pass completions with 53 out of 128 tosses, Hoyt's average pass completion of 17 yards speaks well for the accuracy of his long passes.

Don Albright, Hoyt's favorite receiver, snagged 19 of "Tippy's" passes for 328 yards to rank among the leading pass receivers in the conference.

Outstanding work on both offense and defense were characteristic of the other Knox players mentioned. Carstens, Bahorich and Underwood completed four years of football for Siwash this season and were the mainstays of one of Knox's best lines in recent years. Both Carstens and Bahorich were named to conference honor teams last year and this is the third straight year that Bahorich has been selected among the most outstanding linemen of the loop. Wollman, in his third and final season for Knox, turned in the best performance of his grid career.

Lawrence college, 1949 football champs of the Midwest conference, dominated the selections. The Vikings placed five men on the first team, one man on the second and one on the honorable mention list.

Second place Ripon garnered three first string slots and Knox, Cornell, Carleton and Beloit each placed one man in the remaining positions. This year's team is composed of 12 men since Keith McDonald, Ripon, and Roy Peregrine, Carleton, tied for the center post.

Claude Radtke, of Lawrence, was the only player to be unanimously selected by all coaches. The star end was honored for the second consecutive season.

Other holdovers from last year's all-loop squad include Bob Peters, Ripon end, and Tackle Earl Zamzow, also of Ripon.

Nine of the first string are seniors this year. Only Haas of Lawrence, and Peters and McDonald of Ripon will be back for another season.
