Playoff Bids - MVFC History

The MVFC has had a league-record five teams selected to the playoffs three times (2014, 2015, 2017). In the past four seasons, the MVFC has had a total of 19 bids. Only CAA Football has had as many as 5 bids in the same season (also three times).

The Power 5

In the past seven+ playoffs (2010-17), five leagues (Big Sky, CAA Football, MVFC, Southern and Southland) have combined to win 143 of 169 total games. The MVFC has 50 of those wins (35 percent).

Dominance By Decade

The Missouri Valley Football Conference has recorded a 50-22 record since 2010 in the playoffs – better than any other league. Over the last three-plus years the MVFC has a 31-15 record in the playoffs, which includes seven intraconference games, meaning the league is 24-8 vs. the rest.

How Seed It Is

For the sixth time in league history, two MVFC teams are seeded in the Top 8. North Dakota State (2) and South Dakota State (5) are the league's seeded teams this year. The last time the league had those two positions (2/5) – the teams met one another in the title game (2014).

With South Dakota's first-ever trip to the FCS playoffs, every Missouri Valley Football team (past and current member) has qualified for the FCS playoffs.

Against the FCS

The MVFC is 23-7 against FCS schools this year, which includes four road losses to ranked FCS teams, one of which (Liberty) is transitioning to FBS. The MVFC is 6-4 against non-league FCS ranked teams.

South Dakota senior quarterback Chris Streveler is one of three finalists for the Walter Payton Award given annually to the top offensive player in FCS football. Streveler, along with Sam Houston State senior quarterback Jeremiah Briscoe and UC Davis junior wide receiver Keelan Doss, are invited to attend the STATS FCS Awards Banquet Jan. 5 in Frisco, Texas, where the winner will be announced.

Streveler would be the first player from the Missouri Valley Football Conference (MVFC) to win the award and the first Coyote to officially be named national player of the year. Streveler, Briscoe and Doss emerged from a field of 25 finalists in voting by a national panel of 151 sports information directors, broadcasters, writers and other dignitaries following the regular season.

It didn't affect the voting, but certainly worth mentioning is Streveler's postseason performance. He passed for 378 yards and four touchdowns in a 38-31 road win at Nicholls in the Coyotes' FCS playoffs debut. In the round of 16 in Texas Saturday, he passed for a USD and FCS playoff record 520 yards and accounted for six touchdowns (5 pass, 1 run) in a 54-42 defeat at fifth-ranked Sam Houston State. His 571 yards of total offense in that game is also an FCS playoff game record.

A first-place vote was worth five points, a second-place vote four points, a third-place vote three points, a fourth-place vote two points and a fifth-place vote one point.



Western Illinois senior linebacker Brett Taylor is one of three finalists for the STATS FCS Buck Buchanan Award, which honors the FCS Defensive Player of the Year, the organization announced Tuesday (Dec. 5). Taylor is invited to the STATS FCS Awards Banquet on Jan. 5, where the Buchanan Award winner will be announced. James Madison's Andrew Ankrah and Jacksonville State's Darius Jackson are the other two finalists.

The nation's leader in tackles (162), stops per game (13.5) and assistant tackles (96), Taylor recently became the fourth-ever Leatherneck to win a conference Defensive Player of the Year award. The native of Macomb, Ill., also logged four MVFC Defensive Player of the Week honors and totaled 13.0 tackles for a loss, 1.5 sacks, four breakups, two forced fumbles and one quarterback hurry on the season.

A 2016 STATS FCS All-American and three-time All-MVFC honoree, Taylor concluded his Western Illinois career with 469 tackles and 266 solo stops, which are each the third-most in school history, respectively. His 203 career assisted tackles rank fourth in program history.

Taylor finished seventh in the Buchanan Award voting a year ago, and seeks to become the third Leatherneck to ever be named FCS Defensive Player of the Year. James Milton earned the honor in 1998 and Edgerton Hartwell won the award in 2000.

A first-place vote was worth five points, a second-place vote four points, a third-place vote three points, a fourth-place vote two points and a fifth-place vote one point.



South Dakota State University wide receiver Jake Wieneke added to his growing list of awards Monday by being named the 2017 recipient of the STATS FCS Doris Robinson Scholar-Athlete Award.

In its third year and named after the wife of legendary Grambling State coach Eddie Robinson, the award is presented to an FCS student-athlete who excels not only in the classroom, but in the community and beyond. A senior from Maple Grove, Minnesota, Wieneke will be honored at the STATS FCS Awards Banquet and Presentation on Jan. 5 in Frisco, Texas — on the eve of the national championship game.

On the field, Wieneke holds SDSU and Missouri Valley Football Conference records for career receptions (281), receiving yards (5,042) and receiving touchdowns (58) during a standout career in which he has been a four-time first-team all-league selection and a three-time All-American. His receiving touchdowns total is tied for second in FCS history and his yardage total ranks third. In addition, Wieneke has tied the FCS record for most consecutive games with a reception of 52, which was first set by Eastern Washington's Cooper Kupp from 2013-16.

During his senior season, Wieneke also has been honored as a member of the Allstate AFCA Good Works Team and was one of 13 finalists for the William V. Campbell Trophy, receiving an \$18,000 postgraduate scholarship as a member of the National Football Foundation's All-Scholar Team. He also is a two-time honoree on the CoSIDA Academic All-America Team, while compiling a 3.62 grade-point average while majoring in physical education and teacher education.

Jabril Cox of North Dakota State earned both the Freshman and the Newcomer of the Year honor, while coach Chris Klieman has been tabbed "Bruce Craddock" MVFC Coach of the Year.

Streveler is the first Coyote to earn MVFC Offensive Player of the Year honors. Taylor is the first Western Illinois student-athlete to win the Defensive Player of the Year award since 2010 (LB Kyle Glazier). In addition to Taylor and Glazier, two other Leathernecks have won the league's top defensive honor including James Milton (1998) and Edgerton Hartwell (1999, 2000).

Cox is the first North Dakota State student-athlete to win the league's Newcomer of the Year award and also the Bison's first Freshman of the Year winner. Cox is the third in league history to sweep both honors, joining QB Sawyer Kollmorgen of UNI (2012) and RB Martin Ruiz of Youngstown State (2013).

Klieman, meanwhile, joins Craig Bohl (2011, 2012, 2013) as North Dakota State head coaches to earn the MVFC's top coaching award.

Missouri Valley Football Conference All-Newcomer Team; NDSU's Jabril Cox Sweeps Top Honors

ST. LOUIS — LB Jabril Cox of North Dakota State has been named the Missouri Valley Football Conference Newcomer and MVFC Freshman of the Year. He heads a list of 22 student-athletes named to the 2017 Missouri Valley Football Conference All-Newcomer Team. League coaches, sports information directors and a media panel selected the team.

Cox is the first North Dakota State student-athlete to win the league's Newcomer of the Year award and also the Bison's first Freshman of the Year winner. Cox is the third in league history to sweep both honors, joining QB Sawyer Kollmorgen of UNI (2012) and RB Martin Ruiz of Youngstown State (2013). It marks the first time since 2009 that a league Newcomer is a defensive player, while it's the second-straight year that a linebacker has been voted as the league's top freshman.

Cox, from Kansas City, Mo., is a finalist for the STATS FCS Jerry Rice Award presented to the FCS Freshman of the Year, and he is a two-time MVFC Newcomer of the Week. Cox leads NDSU with 52 tackles and 9.0 tackles for loss and has 4.0 sacks, one interception, two breakups, three QB hurries, one forced fumble and one recovery. He is NDSU's leading tackler on special teams. Cox played all 11 games and made four of the last five starts after being thrust into the lineup for the second half at Youngstown State. He was named STATS FCS National Freshman of the Week after making a season-high eight tackles including two sacks and a key TFL in overtime of the win at YSU. His 32-yard interception return at Illinois State set up a four-play scoring drive.

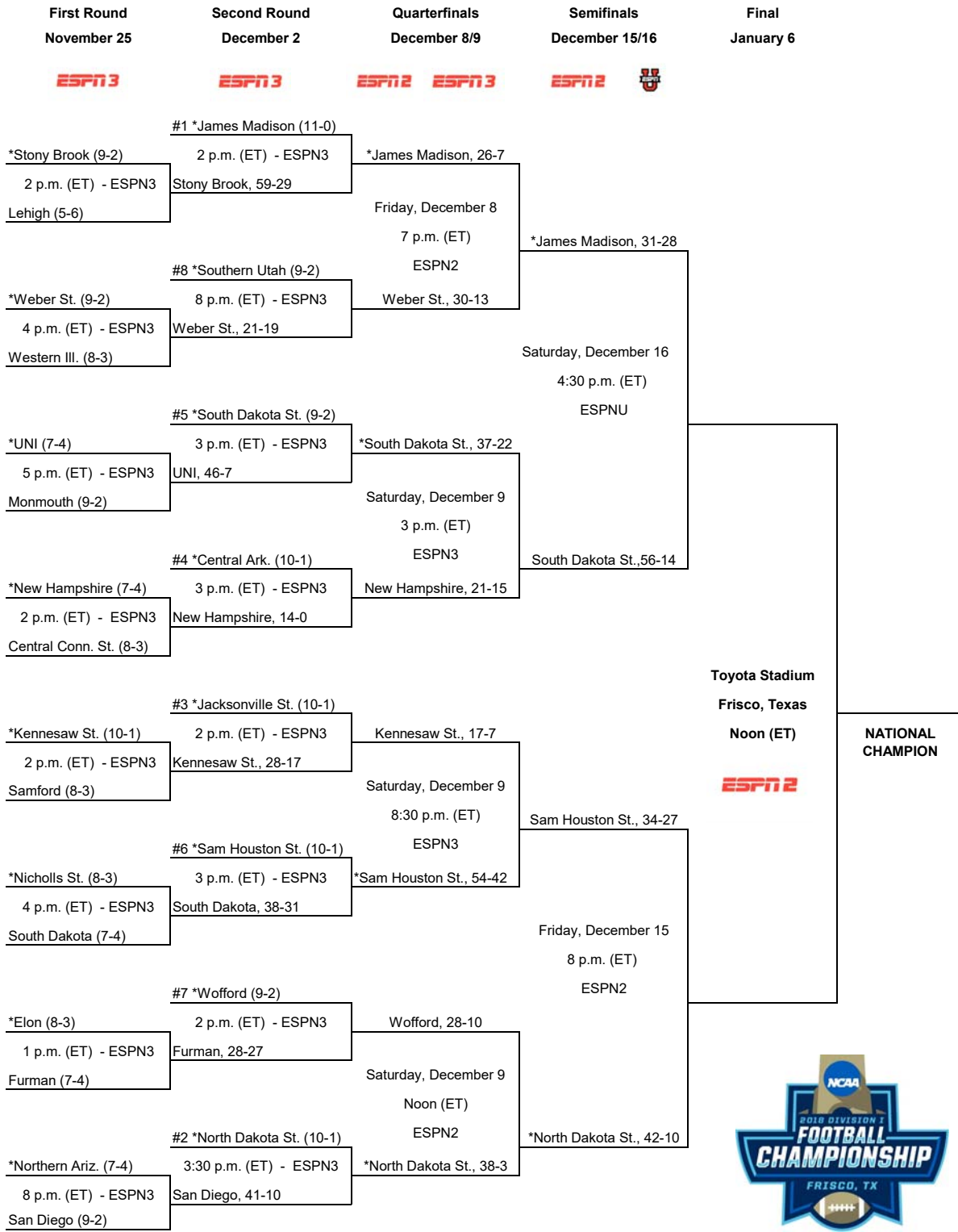
