Ranked vs. Ranked

There have been 179 games in which two MVFC teams ranked in the top 25 played one another. Of the previous 179 games, 48 times the meeting involved teams that were both ranked in the Top 10 at the same time. Ten meetings have occurred in the playoffs. The home team is 103-75, while the higherranked team is 114-65. One game (between Illinois State and North Dakota State in Frisco, Texas, on Jan. 10, 2015) was played at a neutral site. On Oct. 26, #1 North Dakota State beat #3 South Dakota State in what was just the fourth meeting between two MVFC schools ranked in the Top 3.

Players of the Week

Offense

QB Connor Sampson, Western Illinois
6-3, 215, Jr., Belleville, Mich. (Belleville HS)
Sampson threw for a career-high 368 passing yards with three touchdowns in Western's
38-34 win over South Dakota. The yardage ranks 14th all-time in Western's single-game records and also sits third-most on the MVFC's
2019 passing list. Sampson also completed 31 passes which ties for second all-time in WIU single-game history. The Western win snapped

a 10-game losing streak dating back to last

Defense & Newcomer

DB Omar Brown, UNI 6-1, 195, Fr., Minneapolis, Minn. (North Senior High)

Brown tallied two interceptions, a tackle for loss and five tackles, including four solo stops to help No. 9 UNI defeat No. 7 Illinois State 27-10 in Normal, III. In the first half, he took down Walter Payton Award Candidate James Robinson down in the backfield on fourth down to end a promising Illinois State drive in Panther territory. His first interception of the game came with less than a minute to play in the second quarter and set up a Panther touchdown that gave UNI a 14-7 lead. He picked off his second pass with 5:33 to play in the game to help UNI close out the statement road win.

Special Teams

RB/KR Kobe Johnson, North Dakota State 5-9, 177, Fr., Lawrenceville, Ga. (Discovery HS)

Johnson had 241 all-purpose yards and two touchdowns in North Dakota State's 56-17 win at Youngstown State. It was the fifth-most all-purpose yards by an NDSU player in a Division I game. Johnson notched his second career 100-yard rushing game with six carries for a season-high 103 yards including a 75-yard touchdown. In his first game returning kickoffs, he had three for 138 yards including a 94-yard touchdown that is tied for sixth longest in school history.

Offensive Line

LT Dillon Radunz, North Dakota State 6-6, 298, Jr., Becker, Minn. (Becker HS)

Radunz had zero missed assignments and allowed zero pressures in North Dakota State's 56-17 win at Youngstown State. He led a Bison offensive line that paved the way for six ball carriers who totaled 251 yards and averaged 7.4 yards per rush. NDSU gained 9.9 yards per play on 45 offensive snaps while limiting a productive Penguins defense to one tackle for loss.

Winning Against No. 1

When North Dakota State knocked off top-ranked and previously unbeaten James Madison in the 2017 FCS title game, It marked the 17th time an MVFC member had recorded a win vs. the nation's top-rated team (nine of those 17 wins were against a fellow league member). As an MVFC member, Western Illinois has a 1-8 record against No. 1-ranked teams, beating top-ranked Youngstown State in 1998.

The last time NDSU was ranked No. 1 and lost to an unranked team was on Oct. 13, 2012, when it fell to Indiana State, 17-14.

By virtue of a 5-0 sweep in games of Sept. 21, the MVFC captured its third-straight series win in the Big Sky-MVFC Challenge Series. Eight of the 10 games in this year's series featured at least one

ranked team, and in two of the games both teams were ranked.

Ten MVFC-Big Sky matchups were on the slate this year, and the MVFC won this year's series, 6-4. Playoff results do not count toward the series.

The MVFC captured the series in both 2017 and 2018 by a 5-3 margin.

The MVFC conducted one previous challenge series (with the OVC) and the MVFC won all three season series against the OVC (2003, 2004, 2005) with a combined record of 20-2 in those games.

Great Start to a Career

Through the first nine games of his career, North Dakota State rookie QB Trey Lance ranks among the NCAA leaders in pass efficiency (2nd with a 186.1 rating) and 'points responsible for' (t9th with 18.0 points per game). He's the NCAA freshman leader in both categories. Former NDSU QB Easton Stick established the league single-season record with his 172.4 rating in 2018.

In the win at Youngstown State on Nov. 2, Lance extended his streak to 160 consecutive passing attempts without an interception, breaking the NDSU school record of 152 set by Easton Stick from 2016 to 2017.

Weston Leads MVFC Receivers

UNI's Isaiah Weston tallied a team-high 68 yards on five catches in the Panther victory at Illinois State but was held out of the end zone for the first time since week one's loss to Iowa State. He is the first Panther since Eddie Berlin in 2000 to score a TD in seven consecutive games.

Weston ranks 2nd in the FCS by averaging 24.97 yards per reception. He's tied for 5th in receiving TDs (10), sixth in total receiving yards (924) and eighth in receiving yards per game (102.7).

No Fly Zone

Redbird cornerback Devin Taylor had a strong sophomore campaign for the Redbirds in 2018, and has certainly built upon that success in 2019. Taylor currently ranks fourth on the team with 42 tackles, including 32 solo stops, and leads the Redbirds with 10 pass breakups. He also recorded his second interception of the season, when he picked off UNI's Will McElvain in the second quarter of Saturday's game. With 12 passes defended, Taylor ranks among the league's best defensive backs and is proving once again why he was worthy of All-MVFC honors a year ago.

Finally Leaving the Land of Lincoln

A scheduling anomaly for the Redbirds in 2019 resulted in the team not having to leave the state of Illinois until this upcoming weekend, when ISU flies to South Dakota to play the Jackrabbits. Five home games and four road contests against in-state foes have kept the Redbirds close to the nest, but that all changes this week when the nationally-ranked Jacks host the Redbirds. So far, the road has been kind to the 'Birds with a 3-1 record including three-straight wins over Eastern Illinois, Southern Illinois and Western Illinois. ISU has averaged over 23 points per contest in those games and have limited their hosts to an average of just 8 points per game.

Simon Says

When he joined the Redbirds this summer after transferring from lowa, Brandon Simon knew he would have an opportunity to make an immediate impact in a strong ISU defense. Mostly playing in a reserve role, Simon has racked up three sacks and 5.5 TFLs on the season from his outside linebacker position. The majority of that production has come in the past four games, with sacks in back-to-back wins at Southern Illinois and Western Illinois and TFLs in three out of the last four games, including one in his first career start against UNI.

Linebackers Setting the Tone

Linebackers Jonas Griffith and Clayton Glasco have dominated the defensive side of the ball for the Sycamores in 2019. Griffith is leading Indiana State with 82 tackles while Glasco has made 59 stops even though he has missed the last three games due to injury. The duo have combined for 18.5 of the team's 66 tackles-for-loss, six of the 21 sacks and two of the seven interceptions.

Griffth Moving Thru Top-10 List

Louisville, Ky., native Jonas Griffith finished Saturday with eight stops from the linebacker position. With the performance, the redshirt senior moved into a tie for eighth place in career tackles (358) in program history, passing Eric Chistensen (1988-91) and tying Alex Sewall (2008-11). Griffith is 30 tackles away from moving into seventh place on the list.

Nunez Adds to All-Time Program Marks

Senior kicker Jerry Nunez etched his name in Sycamore history after breaking three program records this season. The Naples, Florida native secured the all-time scoring (221) as well as the all-time field goal (42) marks in a win over Eastern Illinois. Just a week earlier, Nunez set the ISU all-time PAT record – a record that had stood since 1985. Nunez has currently scored 244 points, kicked 48 field goals and 100 PAT's.

Peyton's Passing Prowess

Bears quarterback Peyton Huslig has started 30 consecutive games and enters this week needing 222 passing yards to reach 6,000 for his MSU career. The senior from Andover, Kan., would become just the third Missouri State signal caller – joining Cody Kirby (8,183) and Jeremy Hoog (6,959) – to reach that elite milestone. With 34 touchdown passes, he is also two shy of matching Mitch Ware and Hoog for second place on the Bears' career chart. Huslig also ranks third all-time at Missouri State in completions (487), passing attempts (884), plays (1,217) and total offense yards (6,780).

Wilson Watch

The long-awaited return of Bears' running back Jeremiah Wilson (So., Kansas City, Mo.) proved to be one of the highlights of Missouri State's efforts against No. 4 South Dakota State on Saturday. Wilson averaged 7.2 yards per carry in a reserve capacity, ripping off a 57-yard touchdown run in the fourth quarter – just the team's third rushing score of the year. Wilson racked up 87 yards on a dozen carries against the Jackrabbits to match a career-best.

Kicking It with Brendan

Bears' punter Brendan Withrow (Sr., Imperial, Mo.) recently moved into the No. 3 position on Missouri State's career punting average list. With 185 punts, Withrow is averaging 41.3 yards per attempts, which ranks just behind Nathan Stokes (42.3) and Pat Hogan (41.8) on MSU's career chart. He enters the final three games of his senior year sixth in punts (185) and punting yardage (7,645), while his season punting average (42.2) ranks second in the MVFC and 24th nationally.

First Quarter Scoring Outburst

North Dakota State's 21 points in the first quarter at Youngstown State were the most in an opening 15 minutes this season for the Bison, who have scored at least two first-quarter touchdowns in five of nine games. NDSU has scored more points in the first quarter (106) than the Bison have allowed all season (105).

Beware of Guests

For the third time in two seasons, North Dakota State has set a stadium record for points by a visiting team. NDSU's 56 points last week were the most by a team visiting Youngstown State since Stambaugh Stadium opened in 1982. Last season, the Bison scored 56 in a win at Northern Iowa, the most by an opposing team in the UNI-Dome since its 1976 opening. NDSU's 59 points at South Dakota last year tied the mark of 59 set by the Bison in a 1996 win at the DakotaDome, which opened in 1979.

Lance, Bison Limiting Turnovers

QB Trey Lance has attempted 160 career passes without an interception, breaking the school record 152 set by Easton Stick (2016-17). The Bison have committed the fewest turnovers in the MVFC this season (5) and are plus-8 in turnover margin, tied with Youngstown State for second best in the conference behind Northern Iowa (+9).

Another Winning Season

With its 35-14 win at Missouri State on Nov. 2, South Dakota State recorded its seventh victory of the season and with it secured its eighth consecutive winning season. Since finishing with back-to-back 5-6 overall records in 2010 and 2011, the Jackrabbits have compiled a combined 74-30 record since the start of the 2012 campaign, including posting 11 wins in 2017 and 10 victories in 2018 en route to semifinal appearances in the Football Championship Subdivision playoffs. SDSU also put together a string of eight consecutive winning seasons from 2002-2009. The 2002 and 2003 seasons were played at the NCAA Division II level before moving to the FCS ranks in 2004. The program's longest streak for consecutive winning seasons is nine (1913-22). No games were played in 1918 due to World War I.

Heide Passes First Test

True freshman Keaton Heide became the third different QB to start a game for the Jackrabbits this season as he took over the signal-caller duties Nov. 2 at Missouri State. A native of Wayzata, Minn., Heide completed 11-of-19 passes for 173 yards. His first career touchdown pass, a 10-yarder to Adam Anderson, opened the scoring in SDSU's 35-14 victory. Redshirt freshman J'Bore Gibbs started six games for the Jackrabbits before being sidelined by injury in the Oct. 26 game against North Dakota State. Junior Kanin Nelson started two games in September, helping lead SDSU to wins over Long Island and Drake.

Interceptions Streak Continues

South Dakota State came away with a pair of second-quarter interceptions at Missouri State last week. Safety Josh Manchigiah recorded his second interception of the season, with freshman cornerback Diamond Evans tallying his first career interception on the final play of the first half. The Jackrabbits have at least one interception in all nine games this season and 15 of 16 games dating back to 2018. SDSU's 12 interceptions as a team rank eighth among FCS programs and are spread among nine different players, with Manchigiah, Christian Rozeboom and Michael Griffin II sharing the team lead with two.

Salukis Aiming for Four-Straight Wins

A win versus Missouri State would give the Salukis their first fourgame winning streak in a season since winning 11-straight during the 2009 season. That was also the last time SIU made the playoffs. Southern has won consecutive road games for the first time since 2013 when it beat South Dakota State and UNI back-to-back.

Williams Leads DI Freshmen w 15 TDs

RB Javon Williams Jr. (6-1, 239, rFr.) has scored 15 touchdowns on the season (13 rushing, 2 receiving) — the most by a freshman in Division I. He is tied with Memphis RB Kenny Gainwell. No other FCS freshman has more than 10 touchdowns. The 15 TDs is a freshman record at SIU and seventh overall in FCS this year. It's the most by a Saluki player since RB Jewel Hampton had 17 in 2011.

In the game against Youngstown State, Williams Jr. became the first player in school history to rush for a TD, catch at TD and pass for a TD in the same game. Williams Jr. Frequently operating out of the Wildcat formation, Williams averages 7.0 yards per carry and his 717 rushing yards ranks second among freshmen in SIU history. Tom Koutsos holds the mark with 1.052 in 1999.

Davis Eclipses 5,000 All-Purpose Yards

During last week's game, RB D.J. Davis (5-8, 170, Sr.) became just the third player in school history to surpass 5,000 career all-purpose (rushing, receiving, return yardage) yards. He has 5,072 and trails Tom Koutsos by five yards. Arkee Whitlock is the school record holder with 5,601. Davis, who missed two games this season with a dislocated elbow, is coming off a season-high 160 yards at Indiana State. He has recorded 10 100-yard rushing games in his last 18 outings. Davis ranks sixth in career rushing at SIU (2,388). He is on the 2019 watch list for the College Football Performance Awards (CFPA) FCS National Performer of the Year trophy.

MVFC Player of the Week

In a span of 24 hours, Connor Sampson earned his first win at QB and his first career MVFC weekly award. The junior was named Offensive Player of the Week after throwing for a career-high 368 passing yards with three touchdowns in Western's 38-34 win over South Dakota. The yardage ranks 14th all-time in Western's single-game records, while also sitting third-most on the MVFC's 2019 passing list.

10-Plus

Five Leathernecks finished with 10 or more tackles in the Leathernecks' 38-34 win over South Dakota. Zach Glisan finished the afternoon with a career-high, season-high 16 tackles (eight assisted, eight solo), and was followed by Demetri Royer (13), Justin Nutof (13), Mike Viti (12) and Eric Carrera (11). This season, Western has seen no more than two finish with 10-plus, as Andre Whitley and Glisan recorded 13 and 12, respectively, against Indiana State. Glisan was also the last Leatherneck to record 15 or more tackles and did so with 15 versus Montana last year.

Waid's Future Bright

Freshman QB Mark Waid was forced into duty vs. North Dakota State when injuries forced Nathan Mays and Joe Craycraft out of the lineup. Waid performed well rushing for 79 yards on eight carries, including a 27-yard touchdown run. He completed 5-of-10 passes for 51 yards in the second half. Waid has played in three games this year and can play in one more to save a year of eligibility.

Joiner Stepping Up His Game

Sophomore TE Miles Joiner has seen increased production since MVFC play started. Joiner had four receptions entering league play, but since has caught 15 passes for 197 yards and three touchdowns. He has touchdown grabs against South Dakota State, Western Illinois and North Dakota State. Joiner caught a season-high five passes for 81 yards against SDSU. He had three catches for 88 yards against Duquesne, including a season-long 58-yard reception. For his career, he has 31 receptions for 498 yards and seven touchdowns.

Record Season For Coates

Junior PR Jake Coates is having one of the best seasons by a punt returner in school history. Coates has returned 26 punts for a school-record 319 yards this season, an average of 12.3 per return. Coates' nine-yard performance against NDSU helped him surpass Dave Roberts who had held the mark with 317 since 1992.
