The Waynesburg Yellow Jackets captured their second consecutive PAC wrestling title at the 2011 PAC Championship, hosted by the Yellow Jackets at the Rudy Marisa Fieldhouse in Waynesburg. The Yellow Jackets captured six of the 10 weight classchampionship en route to the victory, led by junior 174-pounder Jared Roberts (Washington, PA/Trinity H.S.) who was named PAC Most Outstanding Wrestler following the meet. Third-year Yellow Jacket mentor **Ron Headlee** garnered PAC Coach of the Year laurels for the second consecutive year.
