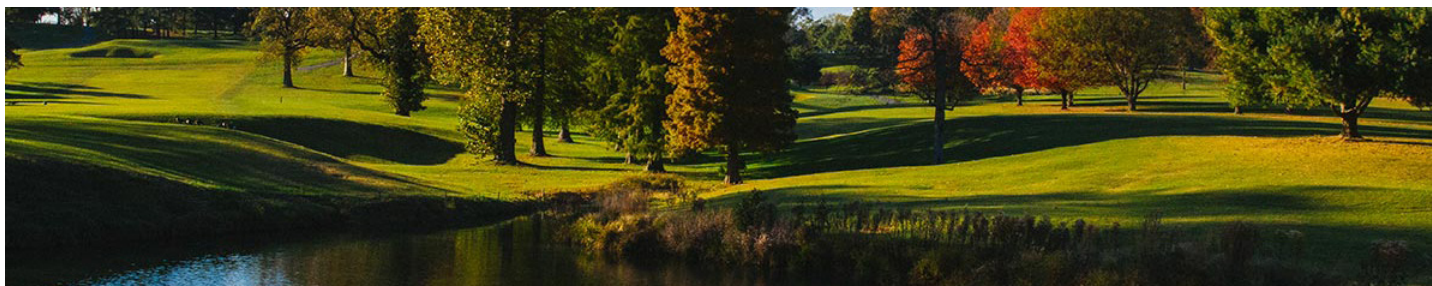

U.S. NAVAL ACADEMY GOLF CLUB - ANNAPOLIS, MD. (NAVY) - PAR-72, 6,084 YARDS



THE U.S. NAVAL ACADEMY GOLF CLUB is a private university golf course owned by the Naval Academy. It is operated by the Naval Academy Golf Association (NAGA) and is affiliated with the Naval Academy Athletic Association (NAAA). NAGA originally owned a nine-hole course established in 1916, which was adjacent to the Naval Academy Yard. However, the current golf course was acquired by the Naval Academy around 1939, when it was redesigned by renowned architect William Flynn (Shinnecock Hills, Cherry Hills, Upper Cascades).

The 18-hole course features 6,084 yards of golf from the women's tees for a par of 72. The course rating is 71.7, and it has a slope rating of 128.

The golf course serves approximately 600 annual members and their spouses. In addition, it serves as the home course for the Brigade of Midshipmen and all of the faculty and staff at the Naval Academy. Active duty and retired military personnel also have access to the course. The golf course averages roughly 30,000 rounds per year and is open year-round, weather permitting.

The current golf club staff features one head golf professional, three assistant professionals and several part-time staff members who administer the pro shop operation. Pat Owen, the head professional at the U.S. Naval Academy Golf Club, also serves as the head coach for the Midshipmen golf team, which has competed on the Div. I level since the 1930s. The golf team, a member of the Patriot League, competes primarily in the NCAA District 2 Region. It has produced four All-Americans - Eric Uteggard ('69), Dave Ziemba ('77), Aaron Wright ('98) and Billy Hurley ('04).

This is the fourth time the Naval Academy Golf Course will host the Patriot League Women's Golf Championship, serving as the host in 2015, when Boston University captured the League title, again in 2018, when Richmond won its third straight League crown and 2022, when Boston University earned its third League crown.

The Club has also been home to the Patriot League Men's Golf Championships seven times, including 1993, 1995, 2001, 2006, 2011, 2016 and 2021.



Navy claimed its third Patriot League Women's Golf title during the 2025 championship at the Saucon Valley Country Club in Bethlehem, Pa. The Mids placed five student-athletes in the top-12.

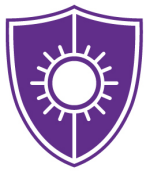

TODAY'S SCHOLAR-ATHLETES, TOMORROW'S LEADERS

The Patriot League continually demonstrates that student-athletes can excel at both academics and athletics without sacrificing its high standards. The Patriot League's athletic success is achieved while its member institutions remain committed to its founding principle of admitting and graduating student-athletes that are academically representative of their class. Participation in athletics at Patriot League institutions is viewed as an important component of a wellrounded education.

2025-26 PATRIOT LEAGUE ATHLETICS & ACADEMIC SUCCESS

Now in its fourth decade as an all-sport conference combining academic and athletic excellence, the Patriot League sponsors championships in 24 men's and women's sports. Initially beginning as an NCAA Division I-AA football conference in 1986, the Patriot League became an all-sport conference in 1990 and now includes American, Army West Point, Boston University, Bucknell, Colgate, Holy Cross, Lafayette, Lehigh, Loyola Maryland and Navy as full members. Fordham, Georgetown, MIT, Richmond, Villanova (football 2026) and William & Mary (football 2026) are associate members. These institutions are among the oldest and most prestigious in the nation, while their alumni continue to play leadership roles in shaping our country.

The Patriot League's mission is simple: to provide successful competitive athletic experiences while maintaining high academic standards and preparing its student-athletes to be leaders in society. During the 2024-25 academic year, Patriot League student-athletes and teams accomplished the following:

*The League's 96 percent graduation success rate (GSR) is the second-best mark in the nation, finishing in the top three each year since the rating was released in 2013. All 10 member schools registered totals of 92 percent or higher, exceeding the record-high national GSR of 90 percent. In addition, the League's 87 percent Federal Graduation Rate (FGR) is the national leader for the 12th consecutive year.

*The Patriot League continues to lead the 32 NCAA Division I conferences in Academic Progress Rate (APR) (996) and retention trends (996) by conference. In the latest data release by the NCAA, the League is tied for first in retention trends and second in eligibility trends by conference. The League had 179 of its 194 teams score at or above the national average multi-year APR of 984. Eighty-two squads earned a perfect score of 1,000.

*Six student-athletes earned College Sports Communicators (CSC) Academic All-America recognition, including first-team accolades for Boston University's Vera Sjöberg and Navy's Tori DiCarlo (Women's Lacrosse) and Tenlea Radack (Women's Rowing). Second-team honorees include Army West Point's Christian Fournier (Men's Lacrosse) and Meghan Pedrani (Women's Lacrosse) and Navy's Charlie Kriel (Men's Soccer) received third-team accolades.

*There were a record 4,047 student-athletes named to the Patriot League Academic Honor Roll in 2024-25. The total marked the first year the League has topped 4,000 honorees and a 171-member improvement from the 2023-24 academic year.

*Loyola Maryland's Patrick Hayburn (Men's Swimming and Diving) and Boston University's Vera Sjöberg (Women's Track and Field) were named the Patriot League Men's and Women's Scholar-Athlete of the Year honorees, respectively.

*Bucknell's Jack Roberto (Men's Soccer), Colgate's Sophia Diehl (Women's Basketball) and Holy Cross' Caleb Kenney (Men's Basketball) each received the 2024-25 Patriot League Award of Outstanding Leadership and Character, recognizing their shared excellence in leadership and service.

*Boston University's Keegan Duffy (Men's Swimming and Diving) and Sophia Souza (Women's Swimming and Diving) were named the League's 2024-25 Sportsmanship Award winners for demonstrating fairness, equality and excellence in academics and athletics.

*Boston University's Vera Sjöberg (Women's Cross Country/Track & Field) and Holy Cross' Haley Murphy (Women's Track & Field) were the League's nominees for the 2024-25 NCAA Woman of the Year award, honoring the academic achievements, athletics excellence, community service and leadership of graduating female college athletes.

*Army West Point captured the Patriot League Presidents' Cup following the 2024-25 academic year. The Black Knights led the women's standings, while Navy finished atop the men's standings and second overall. It marked the first time since 2004-05 that Army West Point won the Presidents' Cup.

*Twenty-five Patriot League graduates have participated in the Victory Scholarship program, through the Sport Changes Life Foundation (SCLF), allowing them to attend graduate school in Ireland or Northern Ireland. A pair of League basketball student-athletes – Colgate's Zach Light and Lafayette's Naomi Ganpo – were the most recent recipients (2022-23 academic year).

*Two Patriot League football student-athletes were named to the 2024 FCS ADA Academic All-Star Team: Holy Cross' Christo Kelly and Frankie Monte.

*The Patriot League featured 60 All-America selections during the 2024-25 athletic year with first-team status for Army Jackson Eicher (Men's Lacrosse), Christian Mazur (Men's Lacrosse), Christian Fournier (Men's Lacrosse), AJ Pilate (Men's Lacrosse) and Johnny Crush (Men's Swimming), Boston University's Vera Sjöberg Women's Indoor and Outdoor Track and Field) and Foster Malleck (Men's Indoor Track and Field) and Lafayette's Lineke Spaans (Field Hockey) and Saiku White (Football).

*One Patriot League men's lacrosse student-athlete was selected in the 2025 Premier Lacrosse League (PLL) College Draft, with Army Christian Mazur being selected by the Maryland Whipsnakes with the eighth pick in the third round.

*Army's Jackson Eicher (Men's Lacrosse) was honored with the 2025 Lt. Col. JI Turnbull Award, which is given annually to the nation's most outstanding attackman. He is the second student-athlete in Patriot League history to receive the award, joining Loyola Maryland's Pat Spencer (2018).

*Boston University's Timothy Shannehan (Men's Lacrosse) was honored as Inside Lacrosse's Freshman of the Year after earning Rookie of the Year honors from the Patriot League and ECAC.

*Nine Patriot League football student-athletes were on rosters during the 2024 season, including Bucknell's Abdullah Anderson (Tennessee Titans), Fordham's Chase Edmonds (Tampa Bay Buccaneers) and Nick Zakelj (San Francisco 49ers), Holy Cross' Liam Anderson (Indianapolis Colts), Jalen Coker (Carolina Panthers), C.J. Hanson (Kansas City Chiefs), Kalif Raymond (Detroit Lions) and Benton Whitley (New York Giants) and Lafayette's Malik Hamm (Baltimore Ravens).

*Four Patriot League baseball student-athletes have played on Major League Baseball (MLB) rosters during the 2025 season: Lafayette's David Bednar (Pittsburgh Pirates), who was selected as an MLB All-Star in 2022 and 2023. Army West Point's Jacob Hurtubise (Cincinnati Reds) and Lehigh's Mason Black (San Francisco Giants) and Matt Svanson (St. Louis Cardinals) also spent time on MLB rosters this season.

*Three Patriot League men's basketball student-athletes played on NBA rosters during the 2024-25 season, including Lehigh's C.J. McCollum (New Orleans Pelicans) and Loyola Maryland's Santi Aldama (Memphis Grizzlies) and Cam Spencer (Memphis Grizzlies). McCollum served as the President of the National Basketball Players Association (NBPA) from the 2021-22 season until July 2025. Aldama is a member of the NBPA Board of Directors. Former Bucknell men's basketball student-athlete Charles Lee enters his second season as the head coach of the Charlotte Hornets for the 2025-26 season.

*Five Patriot League soccer student-athletes are playing in the MLS or NWSL. Army West Point graduate Zac McGraw (Portland Timbers), Boston University graduate Dominique Badji (DC United) and Francesco Montali (San Jose Earthquakes) are currently playing in the MLS. Boston University graduates Kylie Naderan (Strom) (Orlando Pride) and Loyola Maryland graduate Didi Haracić (Angel City FC) are playing in the NWSL. Naderan helped the Orlando Pride capture the 2024 NWSL Championship.

*MIT women's rowing head coach Holly Metcalf was the 2024 recipient of the US Rowing Medal of Honor, awarded to a member of the rowing community in the U.S. who has rendered conspicuous service to or accomplished extraordinary feats in rowing.

*Three Patriot League Men's Lacrosse programs finished the 2025 season ranked in Inside Lacrosse's KANE Men's Division I Top 20 Poll, including Army West Point at No. 11, Colgate at No. 14 and Boston University at No. 17.

*Two Patriot League Men's Lacrosse student-athletes, Boston University's Tim Shannehan and Navy's Zach Hayashi, were selected to represent the United States at the 2025 World Lacrosse Men's U20 Championship.

*Loyola Maryland extended its NCAA-record 93-game conference winning streak, qualifying for the 2025 NCAA Women's Lacrosse Championship.

*Three Patriot League Women's Lacrosse programs, Army West Point, Loyola Maryland and League champion Navy received berths in the 2025 NCAA Women's Lacrosse Championship, the most in League history. All three were ranked in the final KANE DI Media Poll: Navy (18th), Loyola Maryland (19th) and Army (21st).

*Lehigh ranked No. 20 in the Stats Perform Top 25 Poll and No. 21 in the FCS Coaches Top 25 Poll to earn a share of its first Patriot League crown since 2017. Holy Cross claimed a share of its sixth straight League title. The Mountain Hawks advanced to the second round of the FCS Playoffs after a first-round victory over No. 9 Richmond.

*Bucknell's Amar Tahirovic peaked at No. 84 in the Intercollegiate Tennis Association's (ITA) men's singles rankings. Tahirovic represented the Patriot League at the ITA Conference Masters in Georgia and advanced to the quarterfinals before falling one win shy of an automatic berth in the NCAA Singles Tournament. He led the Bison to the NCAA Team Championship for the first time in program history.

*The Navy women's golf team finished 11th at the NCAA Women's Golf Regionals in Gold Canyon, Ariz., with Emma Tang tying for 30th out of 77 golfers. The Loyola Maryland men's team placed 12th in the NCAA Men's Golf Auburn Regional, with Mike Crowley placing 20th out of 88 competitors. Holy Cross' Nolan Schuermann placed 49th at the NCAA Men's Golf Amherst Regional.

*Six Patriot League individual student-athletes and one relay team qualified for the NCAA Outdoor Track & Field Championships. Boston University's Vera Sjöberg (1,500m & 5,000m) became the first dual All-American in League history. The Stockholm native finished as the runner-up in the 5000m, earning First Team All-America honors, while also logging Second Team All-America honors in the 1,500m. Army West Point's Nathan Davis (3,000-meter Steeplechase) was a Second Team All-American, while Emily Fink (Hammer Throw) received Honorable Mention All-America laurels. Bucknell's Evelyn Bliss (Javelin) earned Second Team All-America honors. Navy's Nathan Kent (400m) and Murphy Smith (10,000m) each took home second-team recognition, while the Mids 4x400-meter relay (Pete DeJonge, Jacques Guillaume, David Walker, Kent) earned Honorable Mention All-America honors.

*Bucknell's Evelyn Bliss earned the silver medal in the women's javelin while representing the United States at the 2025 FISU World University Games in Rhine-Ruhr, Germany.

NCAA GOLF LOCAL RULES AND TERMS OF COMPETITION



LOCAL RULES AND TERMS OF THE COMPETITION FOR NCAA WOMEN'S GOLF TOURNAMENTS

The Rules of Golf as approved by the United States Golf Association and the R&A govern play and where applicable, by the following Local Rules and Terms of the Competitions. Complete text of Rules and Local Rules may be found in the Official Guide to the Rules of Golf, effective January 2026. Unless otherwise noted, the penalty for breach of a Local Rule is the general penalty. See applicable Championship Notice to Players for additional Local Rules and Terms of the Competition. If a player in a team competition breaches a Rule that results in disqualification, the effect will be to disqualify the player for that round only.

LOCAL RULES

OUT OF BOUNDS – Defined by the line between the course-side points, at ground level, of white stakes or fence posts.

PENALTY AREAS – When a penalty area is defined on only one side, it extends to infinity. When a penalty area is connected to the out of bounds edge, the penalty area extends to and coincides with out of bounds.

GROUND UNDER REPAIR – Defined by white lines. French drains are ground under repair. For grass-covered trenching, see Temporary Power Lines and Cables. Ground under repair may include areas of unusual damage, including areas where spectators or other traffic has combined with wet conditions to affect materially the ground surface, but only when so declared by an authorized member of the Committee. When immediately adjacent to an obstruction, such an area is part of the obstruction.

ANIMAL NEAR BALL - Model Local Rule E-13 is in effect.

RELIEF FROM SEAMS OF CUT TURF – Model Local Rule F-7 is in effect.

IMMOVABLE OBSTRUCTIONS – Include plastic bumpers on roads and paths and mats secured to the ground with spikes when the bumpers or mats cover cables.

WHITE-LINED AREAS TYING INTO ARTIFICIALLY SURFACED ROADS AND PATHS – White-lined areas of ground under repair and the artificially surfaced roads, paths or other identified obstructions that they are connected to are a single abnormal course condition when taking relief under Rule 16.1.

WOOD CHIPS AND MULCH – Are loose impediments.

INTEGRAL OBJECTS – Include objects when closely attached to trees and boundary objects, and artificial walls and pilings when located in penalty areas or in or adjacent to bunkers, and bunker liners.

Note: The Committee may treat an exposed bunker liner, not in its intended position, to be ground under repair. But interference does not exist if the liner interferes only with the player's stance

PLAYER HAS NOT PLAYED FROM WRONG PLACE WHEN UNAWARE BALL MIGHT HAVE MOVED - Model Local Rule E-14 is in effect.

TEMPORARY POWER LINES AND CABLES – Model Local Rule F-22 is in effect.

TEMPORARY IMMOVABLE OBSTRUCTIONS – Model Local Rule F-23 is in effect.

LIST OF CONFORMING DRIVER HEADS – Model Local Rule G-1 is in effect.

GROOVE AND PUNCH MARK SPECIFICATIONS – Model Local Rule G-2 is in effect.

LIST OF CONFORMING GOLF BALLS – Model Local Rule G-3 is in effect.

PROHIBITING THE USE OF MOTORIZED TRANSPORTATION - Model Local Rule G-6 is in effect. A player who will play, or has played, under penalty of stroke and distance is always authorized to ride on motorized transportation.

PROHIBITING USE OF CERTAIN TYPES OF SHOES – Model Local Rule G-7 is in effect.

PROHIBITING USE OF AUDIO AND VIDEO DEVICES – Model Local Rule G-8 is in effect.

REPLACING CLUB THAT IS BROKEN OR SIGNIFICANTLY DAMAGED - Model Local Rule G-9 is in effect.

USE OF CADDIE PROHIBITED – Model Local Rule H-1.1 is in effect.

MODIFICATION OF PENALTY UNDER RULE 3.3b(2) FOR MISSING PLAYER OR MARKER CERTIFICATION – Model Local Rule L-1 is in effect.

PACE OF PLAY – See separate memorandum to players for pace-of-play guidelines, when applicable.

STOPPING AND RESUMING PLAY – Model Local Rule J-1 is in effect.

All practice areas during an immediate suspension are closed until the Committee has declared them open. Players who practice on closed practice areas will be asked to stop practicing; failure to stop practicing might result in disqualification for serious misconduct. A suspension for a dangerous situation will be signaled by one prolonged airhorn note. All other suspensions will be signaled by three consecutive airhorn notes. In either case, resumption of play will be signaled by two short airhorn notes.

RESTRICTIONS ON PRACTICE BEFORE OR BETWEEN ROUNDS – Rule 5.2 is modified in this way: In match play or stroke play, a player must not practice on the competition course before or between rounds, including after completing her final round of that day in stroke play. Penalty for breach of Local Rule, see Rule 5.2.

ADVICE IN TEAM COMPETITION – See separate memorandum to players regarding who may give advice.

ELECTRONIC COMMUNICATION DEVICES – May be used by coaches in a private manner provided that such use does not breach Rule 10.2 (Advice) or disrupt practice or play. Violations will be considered a breach of NCAA misconduct provisions contained in the NCAA Golf Pre-Championships Manual.

WHEN COMPETITION IS FINAL – The competition is final when the trophy has been presented to the winner or, in absence of a prize ceremony, when all scores have been approved by the Committee.

The result of a match is final when the Head Rules Official has confirmed the result of the match.

MISCONDUCT – See NCAA Golf Pre-Championships Manual.

LOGOS, UNIFORMS, EQUIPMENT – See NCAA Golf Pre-Championships Manual.

EFFECTIVE SPRING 2026
