UConn Postgame Notes

- UConn won its sixth conference tournament in seven years, its 19th overall with a 72-52 victory over Louisville in the American Athletic Conference Championship tournament final Monday night at Mohegan Sun Arena. The Huskies were in a conference championship game for the 24th time in the last 26 seasons. It is now 19-5 overall in conference finals.
- With her 16 rebounds and 10 points Monday, Stefanie Dolson recorded her 12th double-double of the season, and the 18th of her career.
- Dolson started her 146th game at UConn, and is alone in second place on the all-time career list behind Renee Montgomery (148).
- UConn is 34-0, and will enter the NCAA Tournament undefeated for the sixth time in program history.
- UConn opened the game with an 8-0 run, had another 8-0 run from 10:09-8:30 in the half and then ended the half with a 12-2 run to take a 40-22 lead at the break.
- Breanna Stewart scored 20 points for the sixth straight time, and 19th time this season. She missed a double-double by one rebound. It would have been her 10th this season. Additionally, she matched a season high with six assists, the fifth time she has reached that number, and also registered her 11th game with four or more blocks.
- Stewart collected her 500th career rebound. She needed three when the night began, and finished with nine.
- Needing two points to reach 1,500 for her career, Kaleena Mosqueda-Lewis scored 13. She is at 1,511.
- Bria Hartley had 16 points, six assists and four rebounds with three made threes Monday. It was her fifth game with at least 16 points and six assists. Back on February 19th, she joined Maya Moore and Diana Taurasi as the only players in program history to collect 1,500 points, 500 assists and 500 rebounds.
- Moriah Jefferson had two assists Monday giving her 170. That is the second best sophomore total in program history behind Diana Taurasi's 208 in 2001-02.

Louisville Postgame Notes

- Shoni Schimmel scored 20 points – the 11th time this season she has had at least that many – on a season-high 25 attempts. She had nine points in each of the previous two meetings this season with the Huskies. Schimmel also had seven rebounds, the seventh time she has had at least that many.
- Schimmel made four three-pointers, giving her 377, which ties her with Chynna Bozeman (Morehead St, 2008-11) for seventh place all-time in NCAA history.

- Louisville did not have a free throw attempt until Schimmel sunk a pair with 4:10 left in the game. They were outscored 16-3 at the line. The three free throws made and attempted were season-lows. The previous lows were also set against UConn (March 3), when the Cardinals were 4 of 6.
- The Cardinals fell to 1-16 against the Huskies all-time, and are 0-13 under Louisville coach Jeff Walz.
- Monday marked the first this season Louisville has lost a game when making more threes than its opponent. The Cardinals, who made 9 of 29 attempts from behind the arc, were 25-0 before today when they outshot their opponent from three-point range.
- Louisville committed 16 turnovers that UConn converted into 26 points. UConn converted 14 Louisville turnovers into 17 points in the first meeting (Feb. 9th) and 16 turnovers into 18 points in the second meeting on March 3rd.
