POSTGAME NOTES

No. 1 seed UCONN

- UConn has won 10 National Titles the most of any women's basketball program.
- Coach Geno Auriemma joins UCLA men's basketball coach John Wooden as the only two college basketball coaches to win 10 or more titles.
- UConn sports a perfect 10-0 all-time record in the NCAA title games, including wins in both the 2013, 2014 and 2015 campaigns.
- UConn has now won nine national championship titles as a No. 1 seed. The Huskies have been a No. 1 seed 18 times in the NCAA Tournament, including nine-consecutive seasons.
- UConn is the only program in NCAA history to win three consecutive titles on multiple occasions. The Huskies rolled off three straight titles in 2002, 2003 and 2004 and now in 2013, 2014 and 2015. Tennessee is the only other program to win three straight: 1996, 1997, 1998.
- Coach Geno Auriemma now has 103 wins all-time in the NCAA Tournament, 11 behind Tennessee's Pat Summitt.
- As a program, UConn has won 103 games in the NCAA Tournament, which is second only behind Tennessee's 120.
- UConn has won 18-straight NCAA Tournament games.
- Breanna Stewart was named the Most Outstanding Player for the third-consecutive year, becoming the first player to ever achieve that mark. Other multi-year MOPs include: Cheryl Miller (USC, 83-84), Chamique Holdsclaw (Tennessee, 97-98), Diana Taurasi (UConn, 03-04), Candace Parker (Tennessee, 07-08).
- Stewart joins UCLA men's basketball player Kareem Abdul-Jabbar as the only two players to have won Most Outstanding Player honors three times in a career.
- Junior Moriah Jefferson garnered All-Tournament team honors for the first time in her career.
- Freshman Morgan Tuck also garnered All-Tournament accolades.
- Junior Breanna Stewart's 15 rebounds are the fifth-most ever in a NCAA championship game, tying Medina Dixon (Old Dominion – 1985) and Rachel Hemmer (Stanford – 1992).
- Stewart's four blocks are tied for fifth-most in a national championship game, joining Erica Westbrooks (Louisiana Tech – 1988), Vickie Orr (Auburn – 1989) and Teresa Geter (Tennessee – 1998).
- UConn used the starting lineup of Morgan Tuck, Moriah Jefferson, Kia Nurse, Kaleena Mosqueda-Lewis and Breanna Stewart.
- UConn is 4-0 this season when three players reach double-figure scoring.
- UConn is 37-1 this season and 77-1 the past two years when leading at the half.

- UConn's 31-23 halftime lead was only the sixth single-digit lead for the Huskies at the break this season. The other meeting with the Fighting Irish on December 6 was also an eight point edge. Other single-digit leads include: Dayton (1), Stanford (2), Duke (7), St. John's (7).
- Notre Dame outrebounded the Huskies by 11 the most by any team this season.
- UConn's seven free throw attempts are tied for fifth for the fewest in a title game.
- UConn's six blocks are tied for fourth all-time in a championship game.
- UConn held Notre Dame to the seventh-lowest field goal percentage (33.3%) in a title game.
- The Huskies eight three-point makes were tied for fourth and the 23 three-point attempts were the fourth most in a National Championship game.
- The NCAA's all-time made 3-point leader with 398, Kaleena Mosqueda-Lewis moved to No. 4 on the program's all-time scoring chart, passing Kerry Bascom (2,177) with her 15 points Tuesday.
- Kaleena Mosqueda-Lewis tied a season-high with two blocks, matching her two against USF on March 2, 2015.
- Moriah Jefferson matched a season-high with four steals, matching her four against Cincinnati on February 3, 2015.
- Junior forward Breanna Stewart was tabbed as the winner of the 2015 Naismith Trophy, as announced by the Atlanta Tipoff Club earlier on Tuesday.
- UConn has won more Women's Naismith Trophies than any other school -- now with a total of nine. Stewart, who won the award in 2014, becomes the third Husky to win the award in multiple seasons, joining Maya Moore (2009, 2011) and Diana Taurasi (2003, 2004).
- Guard Moriah Jefferson was selected as the winner of the 2015 Nancy Lieberman Award, as announced by the Naismith Memorial Basketball Hall of Fame selection committee on Monday. Jefferson becomes just the fourth Husky player to win the award and first since Renee Montgomery in 2008-09.
