Winning national titles propelled two institutions to first place while scoring in six events helped a third institution force a first place tie in the 1987-88 NAIA-SIDA All-Sports Competition. A national softball title helped Pacific Lutheran WA seal the women's division title outright with 143 points. In the men's division, Grand Canyon AZ climbed to a first place tie with a basketball crown to its credit while North Florida staged a well-balanced attack to tie the Antelopes, each with 106 points. The 1987-88 titles were the first for all three institutions.

Established in 1969, the All-Sports contest measures the success of an institution's overall athletics program by accumulation of points in postseason competition on the district, area and national levels. In addition to receiving trophies, the three institutions will share \$2,000 in scholarship funds provided by Austin Travel, the parent company of NAIA's official air travel agency, Meeting Management Associates.

Pacific Lutheran won its first All-Sports title by being one of only two institutions to score in five of the 10 events in the women's division. In addition to winning the softball championship, the Lutes tallied points by finishing third in cross country, fourth in swimming and diving, adding points in soccer and outdoor track and field. Pacific Lutheran outscored runner-up Simon Fraser BC, 143-124.

Grand Canyon and North Florida reached the same end by different means. The Lopes scored 106 points in only three events, winning basketball, finishing second in baseball and ninth in golf. The Ospreys scored in six events, including third place finishes in cross country and tennis. They added points in baseball, golf, and indoor and outdoor track and field. The 106 points scored marked the smallest winning total in the men's division since the contest began. The 11 points separating the winners from third place finisher Azusa Pacific CA was the smallest margin of victory since 1981-82.

In the women's division, 145 institutions scored points while 184 scored on the men's side. Four institutions, Pacific Lutheran WA, Simon Fraser BC, Wayland Baptist TX and Wisconsin-Eau Claire, placed both their men's and women's programs in the top 10.

Designated hitter Mike Murphy doubled and homered, driving in four runs, to power Lewis Clark State College, Lewiston, Idaho, to a 9-5 victory over Grand Canyon College, Phoenix, Arizona, and the Warriors' second straight championship of the 10-team NAIA World Series. Lefthanded Steve Callahan picked up his second win of the series and was named the most valuable player. Warrior outfielder Dennis Springenatic earned the NAIA Hustle award, while Grand Canyon AZ second baseman John Patterson captured the Golden Glove Award.

Senior guard Rodney Johns hit a jumper from the top of the key with two seconds left, lifting Grand Canyon College, Phoenix, Arizona to a 88-86 overtime victory against Auburn-Montgomery, Montgomery, Alabama, and the championship of the ARA Services-NAIA National Men's Basketball Championship Tournament before a crowd of 6,669 at Kemper Arena. Johns scored a game-high 41 points in the final and was named the Chuck Taylor Most Valuable Player for the tournament. In the third place consolation contest, the College of Charleston, Charleston, South Carolina, had four players score in double figures, in a 89-61 victory over Waynesburg College, Waynesburg, Pennsylvania. Waynesburg guard Shawn McCallister was voted the Charles Stevenson Hustle Award.

Cox was named the meet's outstanding performer. Puget Sound's Don Duncan was voted the NAIA National Coach of the Year.

The Clansmen accumulated a winning total of 104.50, ending a four-year reign of Central State University, Edmond, Oklahoma, the Bronchos finishing second with a 89.00 total. Simon Fraser clinched the team victory when Ed Sernoski defeated Central State's Kevin Freeman, 12-5, at 150 pounds. Heavyweight Dan Payne was the other individual champ for the Clansmen with a 5-2 decision over Jim Williamson of Minnesota-Morris at 275 pounds. Chuck Pipher of Southern Colorado won his second straight individual title at 167 pounds and was voted the tournament's outstanding wrestler. Simon Fraser's Mike Jones was named the NAIA National Coach of the Year.
