





Fast Facts About Our Students



- Title I funds serve 23 million students nationwide in more than 13,400 LEAs, and 54,000 schools.
- Title III funds served 4.3 million students learning English in grades K-12 nationwide in 2010-2011.
- IDEA funds served 6.4 million children and youth ages 3-21 in 2011-2012.
- In 2011-12 approximately 80% of SIG schools were Title I participating schools.
- Approximately 70% of ELs are also Title I students.

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Fast Facts About Our Students: One State



- 63% of students with disabilities are also Title I eligible
- 31% of students with disabilities are also English learners
- 27% are in all three categories
- 90% are in at least one of these categories

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Why is Collaboration Important



- Common focus on ensuring that all students have access to high quality instruction aligned with college-and career-ready standards.
- Support teachers with improving student outcomes.
- Support states, districts and schools in their work to raise performance and close achievement gaps.
- Use funds effectively and leverage resources to meet student needs.

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THE COLLABORATION CONTINUUM Collaboration refers to a process in which two or more groups work together toward a common goal by sharing expertise, information and resources. The continuum represents a range in the level of possible collaboration and defines where respective collaborative activities have occurred along this process. Points along the continuum mark shifts in the collaborative process as activities become more complex until convergence is attained.
