Thanksgiving is a day for celebrating, where we enjoy the company of friends, share delicious food, and reflect on our country's history and traditions. Throughout this celebration, though, there is one lingering thought in the back of our minds that cannot be ignored: Tomorrow there will be leftovers.

Will we eat pie for breakfast? Will there be turkey soup simmering on the stove? Did we buy bread specifically for the purpose of making sandwiches with leftovers? The answer to all of these questions should be yes.

Every family has its own unique Thanksgiving traditions and recipes. But the next day, homes across America are bound by a common ritual: the day-after turkey sandwich. And while our recipe for a Thanksgiving Sandwich has all of the classic components (plus bacon!), the beauty of leftovers is that they can be personalized to suit your mood — and the contents of your refrigerator.

Eventually, we all suffer from turkey and mashed potato fatigue. Luckily, all it takes is a few minutes and a little bit of creativity to transform these ingredients into something fresh. Make a gourmet brunch at home by chopping turkey, roasted veggies, and stuffing; browning it in a skillet; and serving with a fried egg and hot sauce.

Dessert isn't immune to leftovers, either. If you run out of enthusiasm for eating that apple or pecan pie, try scooping out the filling (or, if you're bold,

Volunteers needed for 2017 Homeless Count

Santa Monica's annual Homeless Count is scheduled for January of 2017 but officials are already recruiting residents to help with the important event.

About 200 volunteer spots are still available and the success of the count is dependent the generosity of locals who are willing to work into the late hours to help the city

track its homeless population.

"The 2017 Homeless Count will need volunteers more than ever to give the City of Santa Monica the best picture of how many people are in need of assistance," said Sergeant Jeff Glaser, Santa Monica Police Department. "Without the generosity of time given by those helping with this important count, we would not have the wherewithal to understand the true impact the city is facing and where those

people are who need the help from our outreach providers."

During the count, volunteers will gather at St. Monica Catholic Community, 725 California Ave. before dividing into teams and spreading out throughout the city. Volunteers take a physical count of individuals that appear to be living on the streets and the data is used by local, state and federal officials to provide services, grants and resources.

"The annual Santa Monica

Homeless Count plays an important role in the City's collaborative, interdepartmental efforts to address homelessness," said Brian Hardgrave, Santa Monica Human Services Division. "We rely on an eager group of volunteers who deploy late at night and diligently count every block in the city. Count results directly inform funding decisions that provide

Malibu teen, William Weinbach, 15 years old, has become an entrepreneur. He has started an online Media company - Cross Court TV- with the help of his father, Peter Weinbach, focused primarily on the sport of tennis. Through interviews with ATP professionals, tips from teaching pros, product reviews, among other features he has generated over 36K Instagram follow-

ers. Soon he will release an app filled with statistics and predictive technology to provide users with games and tools to use while watching live matches.

Cross Court TV has been up and running now for about 4 months as it was first launched in August of 2016. William says "At first it just started as an Instagram for tennis, but later on we saw the value in transforming it into a media company with multiple products and revenue streams." Weinbach continues that "the secret sauce is not only get content and engaging games but a business created by a teen targeting the teen market. As I am the target audience, I believe I really know what appeals to my customers."

On November 1, 2016, the transformation occurred, as William, and his team built a website, and opened their outlet up to advertisers. Elizabeth Brady was Pure Honey

Three weeks ago, I lamented the passing of Oscar de la Rascal, the 15-year-old seizure-alert Golden Retriever who belonged to an upstairs neighbor. Among Oscar's biggest fans was Elizabeth "Honey" Brady, my downstairs neighbor. (For 30 years, with her on the 2nd floor and me on the 3rd, it was like the "Shores Dorm.") We frequently took Oscar for walks or, more accurately, he took us. After sunset, to avoid a ticket, we'd occasionally let Oscar run in the water and dive through the waves. It was a thing of joy to watch. (A chore under the beach shower to get the sand off but worth it.)

One night, and to Oscar's delight, Honey spontaneously jumped in with him! That was Honey, free-spirited, full of life and love. But, sadly, last weekend, and only days after her 70th birthday, she passed away. Stephanie Sanford, our friend of 40 years, made her a delicious organic birthday cake. And now, with Honey gone, truthfully, we're all still in shock.

Honey was also a fan of "Laughing Matters." Every Friday I'd drop a copy at her door and invariably, on Saturday, she'd call with kudos. If I disagreed she'd lecture, a la Katherine Hepburn, "Young man, don't be so bloody insecure!" I'd explain that, for some writers doubt, is baked in but she never really bought it. When she thought she was right (often) Honey could be stubborn. "I'm Irish," she'd say as if it was a free pass. It kinda was.

On occasion, Honey would accompany me on my "Shores paper route." For elderly or disabled neighbors, at night I'd go on Main Street, collect the Daily Press and leave it at their doors. Honey went, enjoying window shopping on Main and running into friends, which could instantly turn into a social event. Honey was a world-class schmoozer.

Honey's and her late husband, Fritz "Fred" Bahn, were married over three decades. (Fred's 4th generation family business, P.O. Bahn on Lincoln, started in 1927!) Honey and Fred traveled the world, including Alaska, Australia, New Zealand, Sri Lanka, Tahiti, and Bali to name but a few exotic locales.

Bud Harris knew Honey for 45 years and she did his books for the last 25. Worried when always reliable Honey didn't return calls, Bud, fearing the worst, rushed to the Shores. "The mind plays funny tricks," he recounted with a tear in his eye. "When I saw

her peacefully on the couch and the TV on, I was hoping she was alive." If only.

Honey leaves behind an older brother, Daryl, three younger sisters: Kathy, Gwen and Star and many sad nieces and nephews. Honey's late father, Daryl, a Clark Gable doppelgänger, was a WW2 bomber pilot in the Pacific. Shot down twice, he was awarded: the Silver Star, the Gold Star, the Distinguished Service Medal and a Purple Heart! After the war he was a foreign correspondent and filmmaker. Talk about a man's man.

Honey was also exceedingly proud of her late mother, Elizabeth, the first President of the Las Virgines School Board. (Honey's maternal Grandfather, Dr. Ralph N. Smith, was head of Abdominal Surgery at Hollywood Presbyterian Hospital and was a surgeon until he was 83!)

In the 1950's, the close-knit and beautiful-looking Brady family lived on an idyllic ranch in the Malibu Hills. Life included horse back riding and, with the ocean not that far away, swimming and surfing, too. A great athlete, Honey was quite the equestrian, polo player and ballerina, explaining her lifelong trim figure. Long before "Baywatch," California blond Honey was a lifeguard in summer and jogged on Santa Monica beaches for most of her life.

After graduating UCLA, Honey became an RN. Later, she was a Property Manager at the prestigious Ocean Towers. On the last Sunday of every month, Honey sold her collectibles in the Antique Show at SMO. Ever-busy (an understatement!) she was also employed at Rand and literally walked to work.

Honey had a flair for flamboyant fashion with stylish dresses and matching hats. But she also had a mysterious, private side. When I asked, "Exactly what do you do at Rand?" she countered, "If I told you, I'd have to kill you." (Private as she could be, if Honey ever read this she would kill me, though she might love the Hepburn reference!)

If there's an afterlife, I hope Honey's there with Oscar at the beach. And Oscar's joyfully diving through the waves as Honey joins him. Seeing that one more time, would be truly heavenly.

Dr. Jose Escarce Honored for 16 Years of Board of Education Service

Local elected officials, organizations, staff, community members and the Santa Monica-Malibu Unified School District Board of Education honored Dr. Jose Escarce for his 16 years of service to the community on his retirement from the school board, following the regular meeting held November 17, 2016.

Dr. Escarce received commendations and plaques from the Santa Monica City Council, Malibu City Council, Supervisor Sheila Kuehl, Assemblyman Richard Bloom, Senator Ben Allen, who served with Dr. Escarce on the school board prior to his election to the Senate, Community for Excellent Public Schools (CEPS), Santa Monica-Malibu Classroom Teachers Association (SMMCTA), Service Employees International Union (SEIU) and his school board colleagues.

In the remarks made by many people during the recognition, comments were repeated about his unparalleled intelligence, inquisitive nature, strong analytical skills, ability to problem-solve, compassion and kindness, among other valued traits, that brought a few speakers to tears over the thought of his retirement.

His accomplishments on the Board include leading the district's move toward centralized fundraising instead of a school by school approach, so that children in all district schools are afforded equitable opportunities to program and personnel enhancements provided through private fundraising. Dr. Escarce has been an ongoing proponent of academic achievement initiatives to close achievement gaps while always ensuring that the district continues to provide better and better instruction and opportunity for all students.

"Dr. Escarce has been an incredible asset to our school district, providing leadership and advocacy that always placed the best interest of all students and families at the forefront. He also had immense respect for the educators and support staff who have dedicated themselves to public education," Board President Laurie Lieberman said. "He is a staunch champion for equity and access for all students, and has been a tremendous mentor for all new board members. His departure represents a loss to our board and our district that cannot be expressed in a few sentences. We will be forever grateful that such an extraordinary person chose to commit 16 years to public education in our district."

Dr. Escarce's current four-year term expires next month and he chose to not submit for re-election.

"I was deeply moved by the commendation organized for my last school board meeting. It's been an honor and a privilege to serve on the board for the last 16 years," Dr. Escarce said.

"I am reassured that our district is on the right path and that our students are in wonderful hands all around."

Dr. Escarce and his wife Eileen raised three children in SMMUSD schools and will continue to live in Santa Monica.

much needed housing and services for our community's most vulnerable members."

Last year, the county found a total of 728 homeless individuals within city borders with 416 individuals living on the street or in cars and 312 in shelters.

While the total number has dropped slightly in recent years from 742 in 2014, the number of individuals on the street has increased from 346 in 2014, to 402 in 2016 and then 416 last year.

The U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD) released their 2016 Annual Homeless Assessment Report to Congress recently and found that 549,928 persons experienced homelessness on a single night in 2016 nationwide, a decline of 14 percent since 2010.

According to HUD, the nation experienced a 23 percent reduction among homeless families, a 47 percent drop in Veteran homelessness, and a 27 percent decline in individuals experiencing chronic homelessness.

While the numbers are dropping nationally, they are growing in California. The HUD report said half of all homeless people counted in 2016 were in one of five states: California (22% or 118,142 people); New York (16% or 86,352 people); Florida (6% or 33,559 people); Texas (4% or 23,122 people); and Washington (4% or 20,827 people).

California experienced the largest increase in homelessness when measured by raw numbers with 2,404 people. However, the largest states based on percentage were the District of Columbia, Idaho, Delaware, Oklahoma and Wyoming.

The increase in California numbers last year comes after several years of decline.

The number of people experiencing homelessness declined in 34 states between 2007 and 2016. The largest decreases were in California (20,844 fewer people), Texas (16,666 fewer people), Florida (14,510 people), and New Jersey (8,419 people) according to the HUD report.

Last year, California also ranked high for homeless individuals living on the streets without access to a shelter.

More than 70 percent of the state's homeless population was unsheltered with high rates in Fresno/Madera County (76% or 1,431 people); Los Angeles (75% or 32,781 people); and San Jose/Santa Clara (71% or 4,627 people).

Local officials said participating in the local count is important for securing resources but it's also a time to build community and can be a bonding experience for the city at large.

Councilwoman Sue Himmelrich has organized a team for the count in the past and said the experience is as educational as it is valuable.

"The Homeless Count is a tremendous opportunity to bring people together to assess one of the most critical issues facing our community," she said. "The Count is a time when neighbors can work side-by-side with our public safety and staff teams to identify how many people are in need in Santa Monica. Volunteers leave with a new understanding of homelessness and the City receives the manpower only volunteers can provide."

The count will be held on Jan. 25 from 10:30 p.m. to 2:30 a.m. The deadline to register is Wednesday, Jan. 18 at 5 p.m.

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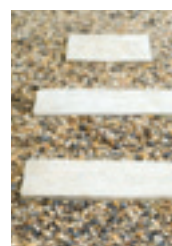

THANKSGIVING SANDWICH

Start to finish: 15 minutes
Servings: Four

- 1/2 cup mayonnaise
- 1 tablespoon chopped sage
- 8 slices whole-grain bread
- 3/4 cup Cranberry Sauce (recipe follows)
- 1 pound sliced turkey
- Lettuce, as needed
- Sliced tomatoes, as needed
- Sliced crisp bacon (optional)
- In a small bowl, combine the mayonnaise and sage.

■ To assemble the sandwiches, spread 4 of the slices of bread with the mayonnaise mixture, add a layer of cranberry sauce, and top with the turkey, lettuce, and tomato. Spread the remaining four slices of bread with cranberry sauce and place on top of the turkey. Slice the sandwiches in half and serve.

■ Chef's note: You can make a Turkey Club Sandwich by simply adding another slice of bread and another layer of cranberry sauce, turkey, bacon, lettuce and tomato.

CRANBERRY SAUCE

Makes 1 1/4 cups
3/4 cups fresh cranberries
2 tablespoons sugar
1/2 cup water
2 teaspoons grated orange zest

■ In a medium saucepan over medium heat, combine the cranberries, sugar, and water. Bring to a boil and whisk to break up the cranberries. ■ Cook the mixture until the cranberries burst and the sauce has thickened, about 5 minutes. Remove from the heat and stir in the zest. Cool completely before serving.

you are going to choose. Limit yourself to one plate along with selecting reasonable sized portions of foods.

Susan Dopart, Dietitian, M.S., R.D., C.D.E. and author of "A Recipe for Life by the Doctor's Dietitian", provided some insightful information.

For people who want to stay on track with their healthy habits during the holidays Dopart suggest, "A general answer would be go for the turkey, and the vegetable, watching the portion sizes and limiting carbs and sugars."

You can reduce the overeating and prevent the damage that Thanksgiving can cause to your diet by going with the healthy Thanksgiving holiday plate.

Lighten up your thanksgiving dinner by following this plate sample.

A three to four ounce piece of turkey with no skin, half a cup of mashed potatoes with whole milk, half a cup of candied yams, half a cup of stuffing, one biscuit, and one cup of brussels sprouts, and maybe even a glass of champagne you will be under 800 calories.

"Getting rest is important, and protein is always a good idea. Watch out for the alcohol, as that is the gateway to overeating," Dopart said. "It is possible to lose weight during this time. It depends on how willing someone is, and keeping the goals in mind is the key."

So how can us beach city residents avoid the Thanksgiving weight gain?

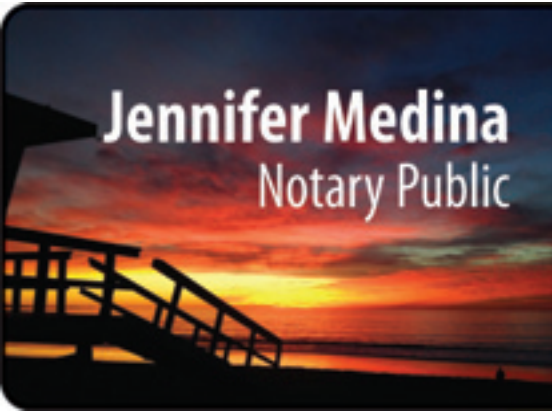
Increase your workout routine days in advance, go on a hike, take a jog on the beach, or go for a walk around the city.
