



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Trial, error fuel Moore's artistic voice

Dzanc House Gallery is an extension of Dzanc Books, a publishing company cofounded by Steve Gillis and Dan Wickett in 2006.

The gallery aims to serve as a space where creativity and artists can flourish, while uplifting the local art community.

In 2025, Dzanc House started hosting gallery shows and workshops with free gallery admission to the community.

The space hosts daily events including open mics, Riso printing workshops, photo walks and fiber arts.

Amanda May Moore, creative gallery arts director and residency coordinator of Dzanc House, is an established Ypsilanti printmaker and artist. In April 2024, Moore co-founded Bloom Studio and Gallery, and shortly after its closure in August 2024, Moore was offered her current position at

Dzanc House.

The residency program provides a supportive space for writers and artists to work and create, with the option to board a room in Dzanc House.

"Community relationships are key," Moore said. "I am constantly talking to people out in the community. I feel that it's important for my job to be relational and excited for what is going on."

It was at an Ann Arbor District Library community letterpress workshop where Moore rediscovered an interest in printmaking. Seeing another attendee carving a linoleum block sparked memories of the art form from middle school.

"When I started carving on that first block, I haven't stopped carving since,"

To further develop her artistic style, Moore challenged herself to draw every day and to keep her focus on three subjects: ladies, flowers and birds.

Through consistency, trial and error,

Moore found her artistic voice.

Moore creates prints from carved linoleum blocks, also transferring the image onto clothing, calendars, tote bags and more.

"I create wherever I can," Moore said.
"I like to create faces that are minimalist in hopes that people can see themselves."

Moore works with exhibiting artists at Dzanc House, bringing their art to the senses of the Ypsilanti community.

Dzanc's current show, "Our Streets," is a curated collection of protest photographs by Emily Mills.

Spanning the first floor of the house, Mills' photographs are displayed capturing protests from 2017 to 2025. Moore curated the show to act as a timeline through the events documented.

Moore and Mills collaborated to create a method of interactivity that suits the theme of the show. They determined the best way to get the audience involved was with postcards.

Guests are welcome to write letters to various government officials as a peaceful way to evoke change. Gallery hours can be found on Dzanc House Gallery's website.

Moore applies her artistic and teaching background to guide artists who have never shared their work through an exhibition or open call.

Having the community gallery space allows for experimentation at an earlier level, while preparing for future opportunities.

Moore strives for knowledge to be shared and spread amongst others.

"I want to see more things organized by artists for artists, with the thoughts and intentions behind it," Moore said. "Making it a really good experience for the artists because we need one another's art."

EMU alumni, Drew and Kin, perform at homecoming halftime

Colleen (Kin Curren) De Four and Drew De Four are a testament to what EMU students are capable of.

They both started as students in 2001 and have since traveled the world performing piano-rock for thousands of people under the name Drew and Kin.

"I had a band that played at Eastern when I was a freshman there ... and Colleen was just a friend, and she sang with our band in Goddard's courtyard," Drew De Four said.

Now they return to where it all started for a performance at this year's homecoming game's halftime show on Sept. 20, 2025 at Rynearson Stadium.

"We've done a lot of different things, and we've performed in a lot of different places, but we've never had a marching band learn a show that we've created," Colleen De Four said.

The two have performed and toured together professionally since 2009. When COVID-19 hit, they had to adapt their full-time touring lifestyle to the regulations of the world in a pandemic.

They were able to start putting on shows from the comfort of their home over live stream, taking requests from viewers and even doing album or genre-themed live streams.

"We were obliged to provide this positive energy during a dark time, and they [the viewers] supported us financially, and it was the most beautiful thing," Drew De Four said. After COVID-19 settled down, the pair started to work on an independent film called "Duelers." Both starred in the film, with Drew De Four working on all original music, along with the screenplay, producing and editing.

Drew De Four described the movie as one of the most remarkable artistic achievements the pair has accomplished in their 15-year professional career.

From attending and playing in bands at Eastern to now touring the world professionally, the couple feel a sense of pride in giving back to the EMU community.

"We love EMU and the Ypsilanti-Ann Arbor area. We live here, our community is here," Colleen De Four said. "I think being from Eastern and showing current students, alumni that we are here and we are also playing around the world. We want to do this because we love our university."

Brittanie Bondie, Megan Major dissect and explore human nature in Riverside Arts Center exhibit

Longtime coworkers and friends Brittanie Bondie and Megan Major opened their joint show, "Abstracting the Anthropocene: An Ecological Elegy" to a lively reception on Sept. 5, 2025 in Riverside Arts Center's North Gallery.

The collaborative show is an exploration of the human relationship to nature through abstract photography and alternative imagemaking.

Bondie and Major met through their work at the Detroit Institute of Arts, where the pair work with gallery collections. They soon discovered an alignment between their artistic aesthetics.

"A lot of her work is abstract and a lot of my work is abstract, so it was like 'why don't we try to do a show together?"" Bondie said.

Bondie's work incorporates bodies of water both as a subject and step in the creation project. Inspiration from her own experience living near the Huron River, where she spends summers wading in the water with her son.

When a chemical spill caused a

temporary closure of the river, Bondie personally noticed the effects of climate change in her community.

"When that ritual was interrupted, I really started to consider my relationship with water," Bondie said.

Bondie examined four rivers across Southeastern Michigan: the Rouge, Raisin, Flint and Detroit.

Major's work interrogates the relationship between humans and the environment. Her photos capture places around the world, including the University of Arizona research facility known as Biosphere 2.

"It was from the outside looking in," Major said. "The farther down the line, the more opaque the windows became with the growth that was on them."

Bondie and Major are trained photographers and have had their work exhibited across the country.

"Abstracting the Anthropocene: An Ecological Elegy" will be on display until Oct. 5, 2025. Open gallery hours are Fridays noon to 4 p.m. and Saturdays 11 a.m. to 2 p.m., with more to be announced on Riverside Arts Center's social media and website.
