



Dollie Rot performing

Dollie Rot is a poet, singer and writer. Rot uses songwriting as an outlet to express her raw and unfiltered reality. The themes of Rot's work are an intimate retelling of personal tales and vulnerable experiences about romance, grief and nostalgia.

"What I put out I feel is a microcosm of something that is occurring at a much larger scale," Rot said. "My experiences are not unique."


Rot started writing in 2015 when her father passed away and started releasing music in 2017. Growing up watching him write inspired Rot to do the same.

Singing began as the vessel to have the writing be heard. Drawing inspiration from social platforms including Bandcamp and Tumblr, Rot felt accepted into a community where she could be herself.

Recording songs became a solitary practice where Rot could connect to her writing. Rot uses unconventional methods for songwriting. Rather than focusing on the mechanics or rhythms that most songs have, Rot starts with a poem or previous piece of writing and builds the guitar chords and then adds in background vocals. Pieces come together as Rot finds the perfect balance of clarity and impact.

"I like to get the words out, thoughts out, message out and then let the words act as my guide for writing the song," Rot said

Rot has experimented with different styles, but found her flourish in a goth aesthetic. For Rot, this includes the clothes

finds solace creating, in local community

and makeup but also influences the subject matter of the songs.

"It's all me, it's all a part of me," Rot said. "I love to be glamorous, fun and look crazy."

Catholicism was a part of Rot's childhood, and that symbolism has followed into her adulthood. Iconography is the interpretation of visual imagery in social and political contexts.

For Rot the image of the crucifixion is enthralling, representing suffering and redemption. Rot is connected to her suffering, and she says it is something that brings her comfort but also adversity.

"There is a holiness in suffering, there is a universal truth in suffering," Rot said. "We all have our own meanings of suffering, but we all experience it."

The sense of solidarity in suffering, is the community that Rot has built through online supporters and through in person shows.

Traveling across the country in recent years and residing in Ann Arbor has allowed Rot to connect with musicians, fans and create a local support system to make the process of creation less solitary.

"I would be nothing without the people who support me and enjoy my music," Rot said.

Abuse and mistreatment are more motifs that are

present in her writing and songs. Rot harnesses the isolation during or after an abusive relationship as a catalyst to share experiences and solitary.

The need to suffer and build strength to move through the pain is an integral part of Rot's personal philosophy on adversity.

"Suffering is just a part," Rot said. "Sometimes people act like their parts are in the way when the parts are the way."

The evolution of style and art is what Rot is doing while contemplating her newest release.

Building and growing a community in Ann Arbor has allowed for Rot to engage in self-reflection and build confidence as a performer.

"If I don't believe in what I'm doing, how is anyone else going to believe in what I'm doing?" Rot said.

Perfection is not the goal for Rot. The desired outcome is a piece of work to be proud of and grow from.

"Being afraid can be used artistically, evolving stylistically and keep pushing myself and doing more than what I am currently doing," Rot said.

EMU AMP, Pokito Productions' Wonderfest to bring together artists

Wonderfest is a new event by AMP! and Pokito Productions set for Nov. 4-5 combining galleries and artist alleys to showcase student work.

The free event will take place from 5-8 p.m. in the Student Center Ballroom. Students can earn LBC credit for attending.

Artists will be featured at designated tables and a trailer premiere for "WONDERCORD" by Pokito Productions will start at 6:30 p.m.

AMP! or Amplifying the Arts at Eastern Michigan University is a student organization dedicated to bringing audiences and opportunities to student artists. AMP! encourages students to explore their creative side and even bring their creative practices into careers.

Pokito Productions is an animation studio founded by

EMU student Rylee Curley in 2022. Pokito Productions is named to mean "Little Productions" because it brings small creators together to make stories through multimedia.

"WONDERCORD" is an animated series that follows 10 characters stuck in a new world. The characters must explore game worlds to collect batteries for the portal back home.

Each world changes animation style to reflect the game that the characters are exploring. According to wondercord com, the series was inspired by the idea of using a visually captivating world to tell a story.

WONDERCORD is meant to appeal to everyone, even those with niches. Some of WONDERCORD's voice actors will be in attendance at Wonderfest to host a Q&A session after the trailer viewing.

Wonderfest is intended to provide a collaborative space for artists to mutually benefit and share their work with the community.

Curley is the event coordinator for Wonderfest.

"Through artist tables, live presentations and networking opportunities, we seek to spark engagement and inspire students at EMU," Curley said.

Curley's work on Wonderfest is part of her Symposium Undergraduate Research Fellowship. SURF offers students the opportunity to enhance their educational experience and academic passions outside of the classroom.

Curley plans to go over the event planning in detail as well as more about WONDERCORD and Pokito Productions at the Undergraduate Symposium in March 2026.

"For years, I've spent time sifting through photos online and creating vision boards," Curley said. "Now I aim to learn more about how local artists brand themselves. This event hosts the perfect conversational setting to discuss more with each presenter."

5 tattoo shops near EMU's campus

Tattooing is a historical and cultural practice that has existed for thousands of years. For those looking for a new form of expression, this list is a great place to start within the Ypsilanti and Ann Arbor area. Here are five tattoo shops within 10 miles from Eastern Michigan University's campus.

Michigan Ave Tattoo and Piercing

Michigan Ave Tattoo and Piercing at 133 W Michigan Ave, Ypsilanti, Michigan is approximately 2 miles or a five minute drive from north campus.

To set up an appointment visit its website and fill out the questionnaire under the tab "Request Appointment". Walk-ins are welcomed when there is availability, it is advised to call ahead for your convenience.

Michigan Ave Tattoo and Piercing was founded in 2019 and has a full female/queer staff and promotes itself as a safe space for all. There are five artists and one piercing specialist.

Three Bird Tattoos

Three Bird Tattoos at 1687 Plymouth Road, Ann Arbor, Michigan, is approximately 8 miles or a 15 minute drive from north campus.

To set up an appointment visit its website and reach out to your selected artist under the "Booking" tab. Walk-ins are welcomed when there is availability, however it is advised to call ahead for your convenience.

Three Bird Tattoos was founded in 2016 and has tattoo artists ranging from 3 to 20 years of experience. As a private studio, Three Bird Tattoos works to bring a warm and welcoming environment to its clients. The shop is home to four artists.

Brite Idea Tattoo

Brite Idea Tattoo at 128 W Michigan Ave, Ypsilanti, Michigan, is approximately 2 miles or a five minute drive from north campus.

The shop is open from 1-7 p.m. Tuesday through Saturday. Walk-ins are welcome when there is availability, however it is recommended to call ahead.

Brite Idea Tattoo was founded in 2012. There are two artists.

Lucky Monkey Tattoo

Lucky Monkey tattoo at 3024 Packard St, Ann Arbor, Michigan, is approximately 4 miles or a 10 minute drive from north campus.

To set up an appointment visit its website and reach out to your selected artist under the "Contact" tab. Walk-ins are welcomed when there is availability, it is advised to call ahead for your convenience.

Lucky Monkey tattoo was founded in 2002 and is owned by married duo Dana Forrester and James Trunko. There are 15 artists.

Depot Town Tattoo

Depot Town Tattoo, at 33 E Cross St, Ypsilanti,

Depot Town Tattoo was founded in 2009, owner Jon Larson welcomes monthly guest artists to showcase a rotating style of different styles. There are five artists.
